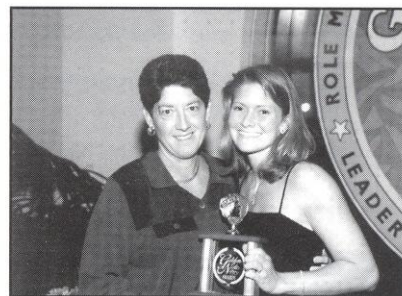

Along with success on the court, the Florida State volleyball program is also tops when it comes to academics. Five Lady Seminoles earned academic All-ACC and Dean's List accolades last season while with a 3.19 cumulative grade point average, the volleyball team was one of five FSU athletic teams to sport over a 3.0 GPA. The volleyball program also boasts one of the highest graduation rates within the athletic department. Among four-year letterwinners, all but two have earned their college degree in Coach Cecile Reynaud's tenure. This accounts for nearly 98 percent of all volleyball student-athletes over the past 23 years.

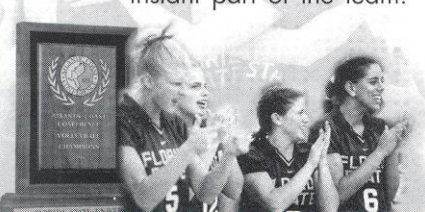


Coach Reynaud and Fiona Boltan at the 1999 Golden Nole Student Athlete Awards banquet

30th anniversary celebration

While women's athletics has held a rich tradition in Tallahassee since the early 1900's when FSU was known as the Florida State College for Women, the 1998-99

season marked the 30th Anniversary for a continuous women's athletics program at Florida State University.

Florida State began its year-long 30th Anniversary celebration when all former Lady Seminole student-athletes, coaches and athletics staff were invited back to campus, October 30-November 1, 1998, for a full weekend of activities.

The Lady Seminole volleyball program had the largest contingency of all the FSU women's programs as approximately 75 former Lady Seminole volleyball players, coaches and staff members returned to Tallahassee. All those in attendance were honored and recognized in a ceremony just prior to FSU's dominating three-game win over Georgia Tech and celebrated the victory with a post-match reception.

In all, 300 former FSU women student-athletes, coaches and staff joined in the weekend's events which included a welcome reception by the Varsity Club, a luncheon at the University Center Club and a tailgate party and half-

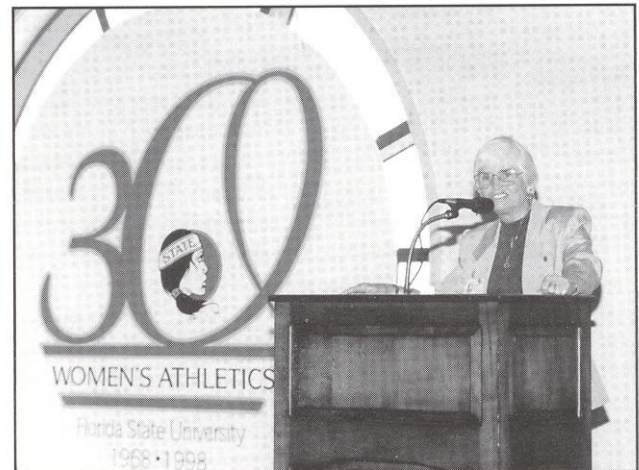


All former women student athletes were recognized on the field at the FSU-North Carolina football game.

Tully Gymnasium has been the home to Florida State volleyball over the years. Last season, the Lady Seminoles were virtually unstoppable when playing at home, recording a 14-1 record at Tully Gym. Overall, Tully Gym has been good to the Lady Seminoles as they have accumulated a 234-73 record on its home court for a winning percentage of .762 in the past 23 years in the facility.

The facility, which was constructed in 1956, was named for the late Robert Henry (Bobby) Tully, a 1952 FSU graduate who played football. Active on campus, Tully was a member of the Gold Key, ODK, the Arnold Air Society and Alpha Tau Omega fraternity. He died in May 1954 after battling a long illness.

The 2,500 capacity gymnasium has undergone several renovations in recent years. Over the past year, the playing floor was resurfaced and repainted and new lighting was added. New seating with pull out arena-style padded seating with armrests were installed to create a movie theater experience while watching the Lady Seminoles.

In addition to the always exciting Atlantic Coast Conference schedule, the 1999 Florida State home schedule is highlighted by the Florida State Classic, a four-team tournament featuring FSU, Florida International, Indiana and South Carolina. Big West power UC-Santa Barbara visits the Sunshine State, facing FSU on Sept. 15th. As always, rival-Florida will make its annual trip to Tallahassee (Sept. 28) while crosstown-foe Florida A&M (Oct. 11) is again on this year's slate.



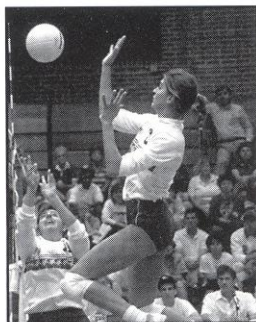
fsu hall of fame

The Florida State Athletics Hall of Fame enjoys a rich tradition as its first and largest class (15) was inducted in 1977. At least six individuals have been selected each year since, with the exception of 1996 when no class was inducted as Florida State celebrated its 50th Year Anniversary of Athletics. 1988 inductee

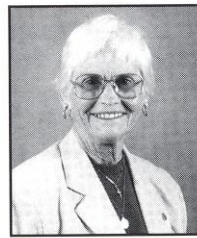
Named team MVP the last three years of her college career, **Margie Wessel** led the Lady Seminole volleyball team to a 127-60 record during her four years at Florida State. Twice during her career, the Lady Seminoles advanced to the AIAW National Tournament. The Miami native was co-captain of the Florida State squad as a senior and was named to the AIAW Region III all-star team in 1979 and 1980.

1997 inductee

A Lady Seminole from 1987-90, **Gabrielle Reece** quickly established herself as a force on the volleyball court. She holds the FSU career and single-season records for solo blocks (240 and 69) as well as the career record for total blocks (747). She garnered AVCA All-Region honors in 1989 and was a Metro All-Conference selection in 1989 and 1990. As a junior, Reece was named to the Metro All Tournament Team after helping to lead Florida State to the Metro Conference Championship. Reece did not go unnoticed nationally either. She was pegged the 1989 Dodge National Athletic Awards Most Inspiring Collegiate Athlete and was among Rolling Stone Magazine's Wonder Women of Sport that same year. Reece went on to play professional volleyball as the captain of Team Nike for the Bud Light four-woman beach volleyball tour. In addition to her playing career, Reece is also a supermodel and television celebrity. She recently added "author" to her resumé, when she co-authored her first book, "Big Girl in the Middle," which was released in the summer of 1997. She is currently playing beach doubles to qualify for the 2000 Olympic Games.

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Dr. Billie Jones
1998 inductee

As head coach of the Lady Seminole volleyball (1970, 1972-75) and softball (1971, 1972-74) programs, **Dr. Billie Jones** played a major role in paving the way for the success of women's athletics at Florida State University. Dr. Jones earned her PhD from Florida State in 1972 and began serving as an Associate Professor in the Department of Movement Science and Physical Education in addition to her coaching duties. Under Dr. Jones' direction, the volleyball program compiled a remarkable 107-22 record and made appearances at the AIAW National Championship Tournament in 1973, 1974 and 1975 while competing for state and regional championships along the way. Dr. Jones also coached the 1971 softball team to the state championship and the 1974 squad to a runner-up finish. Dr. Jones devoted her time to teaching full-time in 1975, but continued to be instrumental in the advancement of women's athletics at Florida State. She was recognized for service and dedication to FSU's women's athletics when she was given the Herb Morgan Award in 1982. In 1985, Dr. Jones became a Service Professor in the Department of Movement Science and Physical Education and in 1989, she was honored with the distinction of Professor Emerita. Among her many accomplishments, Dr. Jones has also co-authored four books on coaching and fitness. A scholarship by an anonymous donor, given in the name of Dr. Jones, is awarded annually in the College of Education to a female student who intends to coach.

A member of the Florida State volleyball team from 1987-90, **Maggie Philgence** made a name for herself not only at FSU, but at the conference and national levels as well. Philgence broke six school records during her senior season, three of which still stand, and earned All-Metro Conference and AVCA All-South Region team honors. A powerful hitter, she still ranks among FSU's Top 10 in 14 statistical categories and remains the FSU leader in career kills (2,110) and kill attempts (4,793) as well as single-season kills with 579 in 1990. Upon graduation, Philgence was drafted to the South Team for the Olympic Festival in Los Angeles and helped lead her team to a gold medal. She went on to play professionally with the international league in France.

support services

academic support

Academic, personal and professional support are essential to college success. At Florida State University, we have developed an outstanding support program which enables student-athletes to reach their full potential.

FSU's academic support philosophy is "to offer an academic support program integrated with the total university that will assess all student-athletes with the transition into college and provide continued support in all phases of academic and professional development culminating with graduation, job placement or graduate school."

To accomplish this goal, FSU has developed an academic environment which facilitates the academic success of student-athletes. Student success is encouraged through competent academic counseling, career exploration, planning and placement and academic assistance through tutorial programs and mentors.

The program operates on a "proactive" rather "reactive" approach. At Florida State, the academic staff

does not wait for an academic crisis to occur. They gather important background information and build an academic profile on all student-athletes to assess their needs in advance. Coaches also stay informed on the daily progress of each student athlete.

The academic support services are located in the state-of-the-art University Center and are on the sixth floor of the \$126 million facility. It includes private study carrels, a tutorial study area and a computer lab outfitted with 16 new IBM computers and laser printers. In addition, athletic sky boxes are utilized for group and individual tutorial instruction.

FSU offers 16 Schools and Colleges with 99 undergraduate degrees and 75 post-baccalaureate degrees.



mark melaney

Director, Athletic Academic Support Programs

Mark Meleney became Florida State's Director of Athletic Academic Support Programs in 1997 and brings 12 years of advising experience to the position. Over the past five years, Meleney has played an integral role in the development of a comprehensive program of student athlete support, which in 1996 won the "Program of Excellence" award from Athletic Management Magazine.

A native of Iowa, Meleney began his college education at Buena Vista College, where he earned varsity letters in football and baseball. Upon transferring to Florida State, he earned Bachelor's degrees in Management and Finance in 1986 and received a Master's in Athletic Administration from FSU in 1997. He is currently pursuing his Ph.D. in Athletic Administration.

Meleney oversees an academic staff comprised of five academic counselors, and administrative assistant, several graduate assistants, individualized learning specialists and a cadre of about 70 tutors and mentors.

Meleney and his wife Sarah are the parents of a five-year-old daughter, Montana Shea.

Volleyball Academic Counselor

Amy White is in her fifth year with the FSU Athletic Academic Support Staff where she serves as the Academic Counselor for the volleyball, baseball, soccer and men's and women's golf teams.

White is responsible for coordinating support services for these student-athletes, monitoring their academic progress and counseling them on academic issues such as course and major selection, study habits and eligibility requirements. She also assists in the recruiting process for these programs.

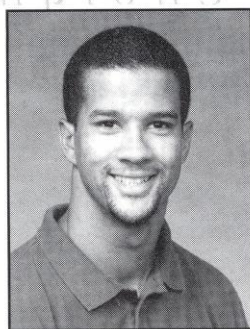

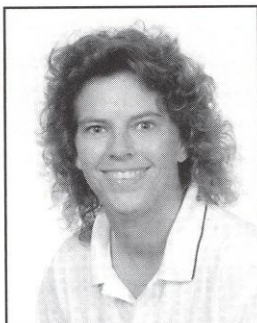
At Florida State, a supervised program has been developed for volleyball, emphasizing the objectives of not only building bodies, but strengthening and conditioning them. Strength coach Sterling Brown, who is in his fourth year on the Florida State strength and conditioning staff, individually customizes programs for each of the athletes beginning with pre-conditioning before the season gets underway. FSU takes pride in customizing the programs to help student-athletes reach their maximum potential.

A former student athlete himself, Brown was a four-year letterwinner in football at the University of Richmond. As a starting wide receiver, Brown set numerous reception records for the Spiders.

Brown, a native of Fort Lee, N.J., is married to the former Myssi Calkins. Along with the volleyball team, Brown also trains the Florida State women's basketball team.

events manager

A member of the Florida State athletic staff since 1990, Melissa Dawson begins her ninth season with FSU Volleyball and third as Intercollegiate Athletic Coordinator which, among other things, includes home event management and overseeing the equipment duties for the volleyball team.

A native of Hernando, Fla., Dawson attended Florida State earning her undergraduate degree in Physical Education in April of 1992 and her Master's in Athletic Administration in April of 1996.

weight room

The Tully Gymnasium weight room recently took on a whole new look following a complete renovation in 1996. The facility, which was expanded by 2,000 square feet, is now 3,500 square feet in size fresh with a new stereo system, drop ceiling, lighting and mondo rubber flooring.

Over \$140,000 worth of new exercise equipment was added to the Lady Seminole weight room, including 16 cardiovascular pieces such as Life Fitness, Stairmaster and Textrix. All Florida State women athletes train in the state-of-the-art facility.

medical care and treatment

An athlete can expect to receive the best care and treatment possible with the athletic training team at Florida State University. Prior to competition, all FSU student-athletes undergo screening in order to detect any potential injuries. If a problem is detected, the athlete may be placed on a prevention care system which may include any kind of treatment from icing to exercising. Graduate Assistant trainer Jenni Williams will handle the athletic training duties for the Lady Seminole volleyball team this season.

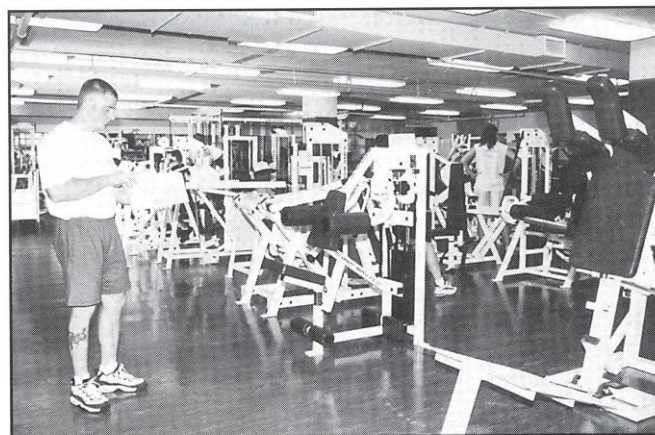

Williams is a 1999 graduate of Anderson University in Indiana, where she earned a Bachelor's degree in Athletic Training and Physical Education. At Anderson, Williams worked with the track and field, tennis, football and basketball teams.

Though the prevention of injuries is the main objective, some injuries are unavoidable. Rehabilitation is another component of the Florida State training room. The FSU athletic training staff will work with the athlete and provide an intense rehabilitation schedule that will allow the athlete to successfully rehabilitate after an injury. Some injuries and illnesses may be referred to the Seminole team physicians at the Tallahassee Orthopedic Center, who, for many years, have worked in conjunction with the FSU athletic training staff in successfully rehabilitating athletes after an injury.

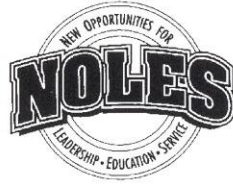
Drug testing is also a responsibility of the athletic training team which is dedicated to providing the best care possible for all FSU student-athletes.

the n.o.l.e.s. program

NEW OPPORTUNITIES FOR LEADERSHIP, EDUCATION AND SERVICE



Developed by the Florida State University Department of Athletics, the NOLES program represents a commitment to the total growth and development of the student-athlete. This program establishes an administrative commitment to academic and athletic excellence. Those efforts will be supported with programs and services in personal development, career development and community service.

personal development

Fostering the development of personal growth is a fundamental component of the NOLES program. These support programs ensure that the student-athlete will be provided opportunities to focus on personal growth issues such as values clarification, goal setting, fiscal planning, decision making and personal responsibility. Programming focuses on helping student-athletes develop a healthy lifestyle while they are at Florida State and habits that will benefit them for life.

career development

Preparing for life after college sports is a major focus of the NOLES Career Development program. The program is designed to work cooperatively with the University's Career Services to acquaint students with the job search process, provide networking opportunities and ultimately assist with job placement. This program places a priority on the development of the total person, with the goal of developing individuals who will have rewarding careers and productive lifestyles after they leave Florida State.

community service

Serving the community is the focus of our Seminole Spirit program. Student-athletes are challenged to give service to our community and individuals who are in need. With a clearly defined program of service, student-athletes are given the opportunity to develop the foundation for a lifelong commitment to volunteerism. The Seminole Spirit Student-Athlete Speakers' Bureau enables stu-

dent-athletes to improve their speaking skills, develop effective communication and impact the lives of others through their service as role models in our community.

leadership development

The Florida State University Department of Athletics is committed to developing programs of excellence that foster leadership development. The foundation of the leadership development program are the Seminole Leadership Institutes that are held four times a year. These Institutes offer student-athletes the opportunity to learn skills that will benefit them as students, as athletes, and as they pursue their goals after leaving Florida State. The Institutes are based on building communication skills. Students have the opportunity to use the values and work ethic taught by athletic participation as the framework for their leadership development. The Institutes attract outstanding guest speakers who challenge Seminole student-athletes to achieve their greatest potential and use their leadership skills to positively influence others.

The Student-Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC) serves as the advisory board to the NOLES program and the athletics administration. The prestigious board, comprised of two representatives of each athletic team at FSU, also recommends programming and serves as a liaison between student-athletes and the athletics administration. The Advisory Council plans and implements various events for student-athletes and serves as the department's most visible ambassadors. The SAAC hosts the annual Golden Nole banquet and plans such events as orientation for incoming student-athletes and the back-to-school picnic.



ncaa information

The following information is provided by the Florida State Office of Compliance for prospective student athletes. It is intended as a guideline to introduce some of the rules governing NCAA athletic involvement.

who is permitted to recruit for FSU?

Only Florida State University coaches who have successfully completed the NCAA Recruiting Rules Examination on an annual basis may be involved in the recruitment process. Representatives of our athletics interests **may not** make any recruiting contacts. This includes letters, telephone calls or face-to-face contact on or off campus with a prospect or the prospect's parents.

key terms you should know

You become a **prospective student-athlete** if you have started classes for the ninth grade. Before the ninth grade, you become a prospective student-athlete if the college provides you (or your relatives or friends) any financial aid or other benefits that the college does not provide to prospective students generally.

A **contact** is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect or the prospect's legal guardian and an institutional staff member or athletic representative during which any dialogue occurs in excess of an exchange of greeting. **NOTE:** At the Division I level, athletic representatives (boosters) may not contact you for the purpose of recruiting. A college coach may contact you in person off the college campus beginning July 1 after completion of your junior year in high school.

An **evaluation** is any off-campus activity designed to assess your academic qualifications or athletic ability, including any visit to your high school (during which no contact occurs) or the observation of any practice or competition in which you participate.

During your senior year, you can have one expense-paid **official visit** to a particular campus. You may receive no more than five visits. During your official visit, which may not exceed 48 hours, you may receive round-trip transportation between your home and the campus, and you (and your parents) may receive meals, lodging and complimentary admission to campus athletics events.

phone calls and letters

Phone calls from faculty members and coaches (but not boosters) are permitted beginning July 1 after completion of your junior year. A college coach or faculty member is limited to **one telephone call per week** except when it is:

- During the five days immediately before your official visit to the university
- On the day of a coach's off-campus contact with you
- During the time beginning with the initial National Letter of Intent signing date in your sport through the two days after signing date

Letters from coaches and faculty members (but not boosters) are not permitted until September 1 at the beginning of your junior year in high school. A Division I university may provide you with the following printed materials:

- General correspondence, including letters, U.S. Postal Service post-cards and institutional note cards
- Game programs which may not include posters and one Student Athlete Handbook can be provided only during official or unofficial visits to the university's campus
- NCAA educational information
- Pre-enrollment information subsequent to signing a National Letter of Intent with the university

- One athletic publication which may include only one color of printing inside the covers
- Official academic, admissions and student services publications published or videotapes produced by the institution and available to all students
- Schedule cards
- Questionnaires which may be provided prior to your junior year
- Summer camp brochures which may be provided prior to your junior year.

alumni and boosters do's and don'ts

You may forward information about prospective student-athletes to the appropriate coaches.

You may have contact with a prospect regarding permissible pre-enrollment activities such as summer employment, provided the prospect has already signed a National Letter of Intent and the Compliance Office is aware that you are making these contacts in regard to employment.

You may have a telephone conversation with a prospect **only** if the prospect initiates the call. Such a call may not be prearranged by an institutional staff member and you are not permitted to have a recruiting conversation, but may exhibit normal civility. You must refer any questions about our athletics programs to an athletics department staff member/coach.

You may view a prospect's contest at your own initiative provided you do not contact the prospect or his/her parents. In addition, you may not contact a prospect's coach, principal, or counselor in an attempt to evaluate the prospect.

You may continue established family relationships with friends and neighbors. Contacts with sons and daughters of these families are permitted as long as they are not made for recruiting purposes or encouraged by Florida State University coaches.

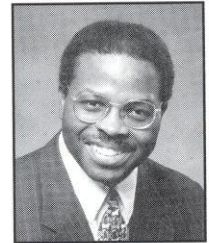
You may not become involved in making arrangements to receive money or financial aid of any kind for a prospect or the prospect's family and friends.

You may not make contact with a prospective student-athlete and his/her parents when the prospect is on campus for an official or unofficial recruiting visit.

You may not transport, pay or arrange for payment of transportation costs for a prospect, and his/her relatives or friends to visit campus (or elsewhere).

You may not pay or arrange for payment of summer camp registration fees for a prospect.

You may not provide **anything** to a prospect, the prospect's family or friends without prior approval from the athletics' Compliance Office.

'98 review

The 1998 season was one of great success for the Florida State Lady Seminoles. FSU earned its first Atlantic Coast Conference championship in commanding fashion by sweeping its three opponents in the ACC Tournament and made its second consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance and the program's 10th overall. FSU concluded the 1998 season ranked 17th nationally according to the NCAA RPI rankings - the highest of all ACC schools - and helped the conference to a ranking of third overall.

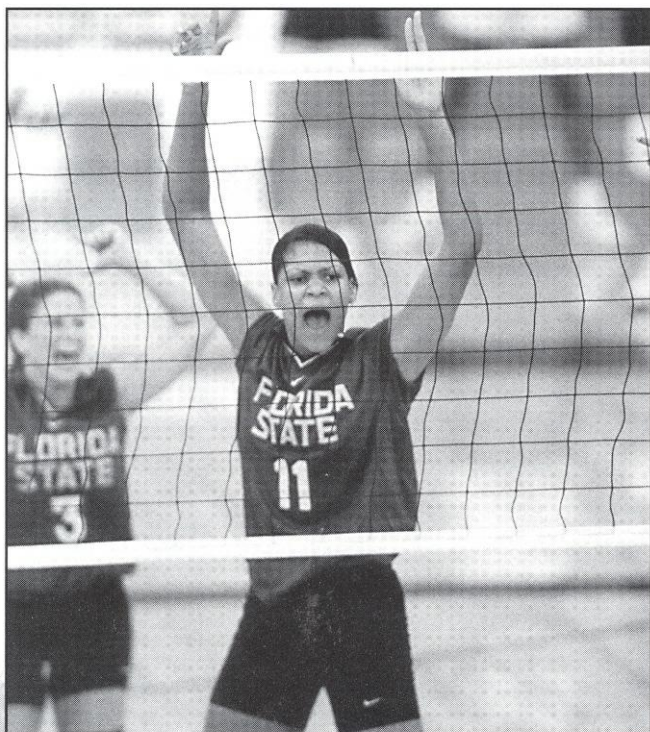
The season did not go without its challenges and the Lady Seminoles had to overcome some obstacles before reaching their goals. Perhaps the most valuable lesson the squad learned in 1998 was the importance of the meaning of the word *team*. When one player was unable to play because of injury or illness, it affected the performance of the entire team. When the team as a whole was intact, there was no stopping the Lady Seminoles.

According to the ACC preseason poll, Florida State was the unanimous choice to win the Atlantic Coast Conference and started the season nationally ranked as well. Things started out well as the Lady Seminoles won the first two tournaments they participated in and compiled a 7-0 record. But FSU's 10-match road swing took a toll

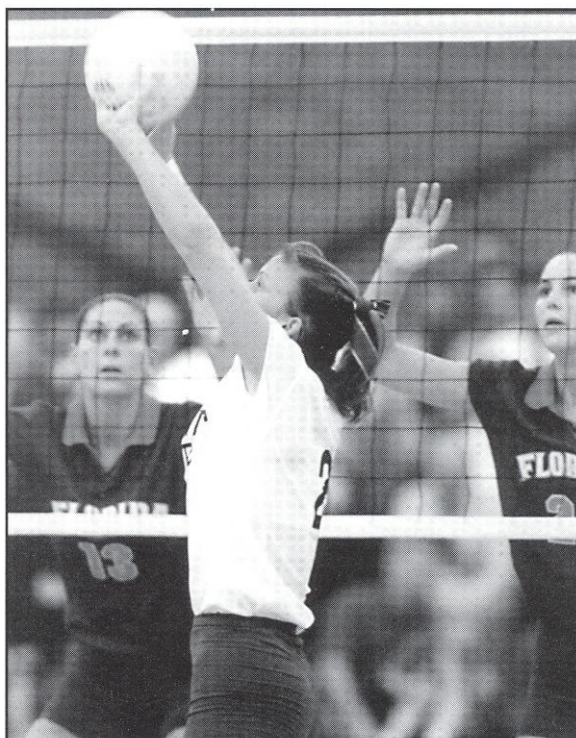


The Lady Seminoles Celebrate their first ACC Championship.

on the squad. Florida State faced three Top 10 opponents on the road within a five-day period which not only resulted in defeats, but an even more devastating blow ... the loss of junior middle hitter Aisha Thornton who was sidelined with an ankle injury. Thornton was having another stellar season and was the only FSU player to garner all-tournament team accolades in all three tournaments the Lady Seminoles played in. She was out of action for five matches and in her absence, the team dropped its first two ACC matches to Clemson and Georgia Tech on the road. Once Thornton returned,



Aisha Thornton

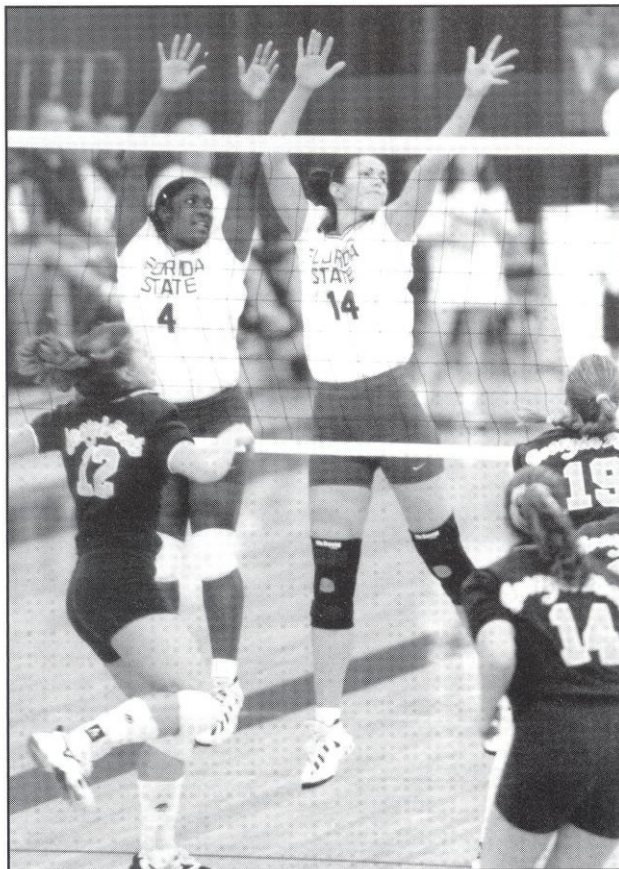

things seemed to turn around for the Tribe. Until the final weekend of the regular-season, FSU had won 11 of 13 matches, including seven straight victories in straight sets and were tied for first place with North Carolina. The meaning of team once again struck the Lady Seminoles when FSU went to Maryland and Virginia for its final matches of the regular season. The Tribe had to play without the services of setter Fiona Bolten who was down with the flu. In her absence, FSU was out of sync and lost in five-games to the Terrapins. The following day, Bolten returned but FSU lost again in five to Virginia.

Florida State entered the ACC Championships as the number two seed, but the Lady Seminoles certainly played like the tourney favorite. The Tribe marched in and downed Wake Forest in its first match as outside hitters Holly Schneider and Jennifer Werrick each tallied double-doubles while defensively, Sarah Rickertsen and LaToya Washington each had double-digit digs. In the semifinals vs. Virginia, FSU used an impressive defensive effort to stop a powerful Cavalier attack for the victory. Werrick, Washington, Schneider, Bolten, and Rickertsen each had double-digit digs, part of FSU's 79 digs in the match. In the final, Florida State rolled past top-seeded UNC including a 15-1 rout in game two to claim the championship title. Schneider and Werrick again notched double-doubles for FSU. The Lady Seminoles out-hit UNC .295 to .108.



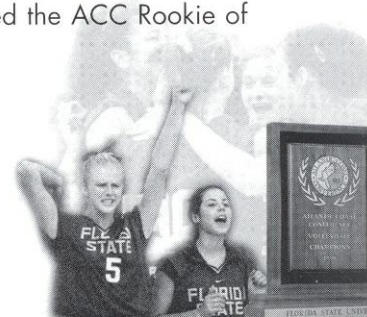

The team had many outstanding performances throughout the season. Following their loss at North Carolina on October 9th, the Lady Seminoles swept 10 ACC foes. Florida State swept eight October opponents during which time the Tribe won 23 consecutive games. In all, FSU recorded 19 sweeps in 1998 ... over half of its matches. Of its 14 victories against ACC opponents, 11 were by 3-0 margins. The Tribe was swept by only three opponents in 1998: then- #2 Long Beach State, #4 UC-Santa Barbara and #6 Florida. Also notable was the play of the Lady Seminoles in the friendly confines of Tully Gym. Florida State went 14-1 at home, including a perfect 8-0 vs. conference foes.

Individually, several players had impressive seasons. Thornton, a junior middle hitter who garnered AVCA All-District Team and All-ACC First Team honors, not only led the team in hitting at .352, but she led the ACC as well. She was twice named the ACC Co-Player of the Week and hit an amazing .401 in league play. Bolten, a senior setter who earned AVCA All-District Team and ACC First Team accolades, set a new FSU single-season record for assists with 1,744 and led the ACC in assists per game at 14.18. She was named ACC Tournament MVP, garnered ACC Player of the Week honors and recorded 17 double-doubles. Schneider, who didn't miss a match during her entire career at FSU, recorded a team-high 23 double-doubles and finished her career ranking second in digs, third in kill attempts and fourth in kills in FSU's all time records. She led the team this year in service aces (44) and digs (421). Washington made a solid return to action and recorded 10 double-doubles and had 15 matches with double-digit kills. Werrick earned ACC Player of the Week honors during the season. She had 17 double-doubles and had double-digit kills in all but eight matches. Freshman Norisha Campbell earned valuable experience when Thornton went out with injury. She played in 11 matches, recorded a individual season superlative with nine blocks vs. Wake Forest, and was pegged the ACC Rookie of the Week in mid-October.

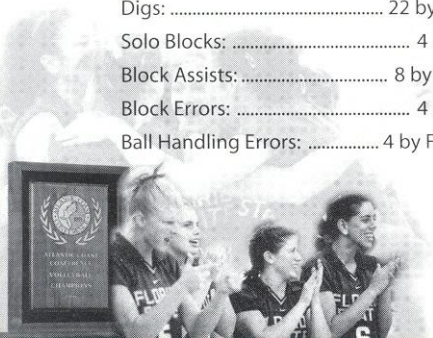

the tradition

Consistency. It's the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 46th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 72 national championships, including 37 in men's competition and 35 in women's. In addition, 108 men and 26 women have earned the coveted title of NCAA champion.



1998-99 in review

The 1998-99 academic year concluded with the league pocketing three more national team titles and seven individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 32 national team

titles in the last nine years. The past year, the ACC was the only Division I-A conference to have a team play in the national championship game in men's and women's basketball and football.

The ACC's 1998-99 national champions were Maryland in women's lacrosse, Virginia in men's lacrosse and Duke in women's golf. In addition, the ACC had six other teams participate in national title games — Florida State in football and baseball, Virginia in women's lacrosse, Duke in men's and women's basketball and North Carolina in women's

soccer. Overall, ACC teams posted a 66-45-1 (.595) mark in NCAA Tournament play.

The ACC placed at least one team in the Top 10 nationally in 15 of the 24 sports sponsored by the league. Other records of note during the 1998-99 season include 76 teams competing at NCAA Championships, five bowl teams and 28 Top 10 showings.

Seven ACC teams, in seven different sports representing six of the nine member institutions, earned a No. 1 ranking during the course of the past academic year.

The ACC Academic Honor Roll record was broken for the 12th-straight year in 1998-99 as 1,552 student-athletes were recognized for their work in the classroom.

the championships

The conference will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during the 1999-2000 academic year — 12 for men and 13 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet being held in tennis at Wake Forest University, October 6-8. Conference championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, volleyball, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing.

the history

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members - Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest - drawing up the conference bylaws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name officially became the Atlantic Coast Conference.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971 when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The conference operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when Georgia Tech was admitted. The Atlanta school withdrew from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964. The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State.

fsu volleyball history

Since its beginning in 1968 with a group of physical education students and a volunteer coach, Florida State volleyball, which is considered FSU's first women's intercollegiate sport, has shed its club team roots to become one of the nation's premiere programs.

In its infancy it was not uncommon for the group of aspiring athletes and teachers to pay their own way to tournaments and share warm-up suits with the other women's club teams. The club struggled to become established in those early years as team members were faced with having to find a new volunteer head coach each of the program's first five years.



Dr. Linda Warren, Dr. Judy Blucher, Dr. Billie Jones, Martha Pat Moore, Dr. Cecile Reynaud.

After Florida State made its first ever appearance at the AIAW National Tournament in 1971, Dr. Billie Jones assumed the coaching duties on a permanent basis for the next six seasons. Under Jones' direction the Seminoles amassed a 107-22 record, and volleyball at Florida State became a mainstay.

Success continued for the program as it returned to the AIAW National Tournament in 1973, '74 and '75, while competing for state and regional championships along the way. Popularity for the sport began to grow. In just a few short years, Florida State volleyball became recognized as one of the sport's up-and-coming programs.

Current head coach Cecile Reynaud continued to build on the foundation laid by her predecessors. Under

Reynaud's guidance, FSU qualified for the AIAW National Tournament three more times. After its AIAW appearance in 1981, Florida State joined the NCAA and began competing as a member of the Metro Conference in 1982.

Before FSU joined the Atlantic Coast Conference in 1992, the Lady Seminoles dominated the Metro Conference, capturing six league titles. Florida State seized its first ACC Championship in 1998. Overall, in eight years of ACC play, the Lady Seminoles have an ACC regular season co-championship to their credit and have played in three ACC Tournament title matches.

Since Florida State became a NCAA volleyball member in 1982, the Seminoles have qualified for the National Championship Tournament 10 times, including eight appearances in the last 12 years.

Several of FSU's volleyball alumni have gone on to play professionally. Whether it be in Europe or the sandy shores of California, Florida State's top athletes often choose to continue playing the game they love. In re-

cent years, three former FSU volleyball players have been on tour with the professional beach circuit.

Perhaps the most famous of the FSU volleyball alumni is world-class model Gabrielle Reece. After enjoying a standout career at Florida State, Reece went on to captain Team Nike on the pro beach circuit. She has had a fitness column in *ELLE Magazine* and appeared on MTV Sports. Reece recently co-authored her first book *Big Girl in the Middle* and has been featured on Lifetime Television's *Intimate Portrait*.

In the 31 years since its inception, Florida State volleyball has prided itself in giving athletes the opportunity to reach their full potential both on the court and in the classroom. Pride, tradition and success are all part of what is known as Lady Seminole volleyball.

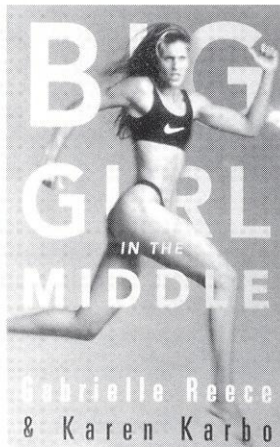

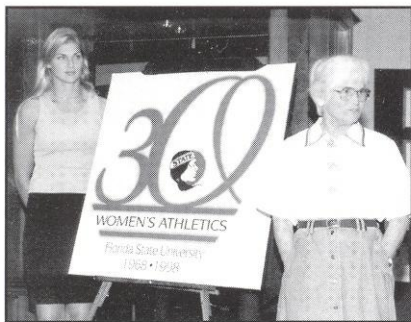
famous alumni

this summer. She also co-authored her first book entitled Big Girl in the Middle in 1997.

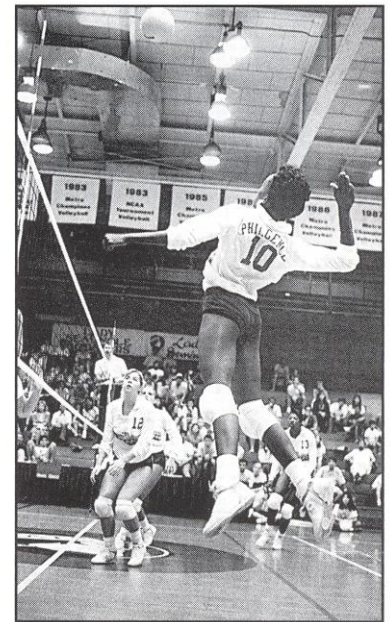

Reece returned to Tallahassee to unveil Florida State's logo for the 30th anniversary of women's athletics. Maggie Philgence

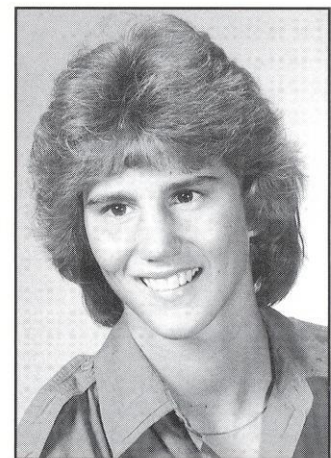


After breaking six school records during the 1990 season, Philgence was drafted to the South Team for the Olympic Festival in Los Angeles. Philgence helped lead her team to the championship game where the South defeated the West to claim the gold medal.

Upon graduation, Philgence traveled overseas to play professional volleyball with the international league in France. She was inducted into the FSU Athletics Hall of Fame in 1998.

Karyn Palgut

A three-sport athlete at Florida State, Palgut lettered in volleyball (four), basketball (one) and softball (two) from 1982-86. After a successful collegiate career that saw her named to the All-Metro Tournament team three times, including the distinction of MVP, she competed in the 1982 Olympic Festival on the East team. Upon graduation, Palgut joined the U.S.



Women's National Team for Handball and had a successful career. She participated in the Goodwill games, the Pan American Games (Gold Medal) and the 1988 and 1992 Olympics receiving a 7th and 6th place respectively.

Barbara Harris

After a playing career spanning from 1974-77, Harris has had a successful career in the magazine industry as Editor-in-Chief at *Shape*.

Harris returned to campus last fall when she was honored as a "Grad Made Good" during Homecoming Ceremonies.



Lisa Warman

A familiar face around the Florida State volleyball court, Warman was with the team from 1981-84 and still returns to Tully Gym as a sports commentator for the Sunshine Network.



Endowed Scholarships

Established in 1986 under the direction of William M. Parker of Clearwater, the Seminole Boosters Endowed Scholarship Program is the final step toward perpetual funding of all scholarships for student-athletes at Florida State. Cecile Reynaud Scholarship

Recognized in America and internationally for her pioneering leadership in the teaching and coaching of championship volleyball, Coach Cecile Reynaud, now in her 24th year at the helm of the FSU volleyball program, has been further honored by her former students through the establishment of an endowed scholarship in her name.



Claude R. Flory Scholarship

Drs. Claude and Daisy Flory, retired FSU faculty whose names are synonymous with the highest standards of both the character and accomplishment of Seminole athletics, have established a fully endowed scholarship for volleyball in the name of Claude Flory.



Lucy McDaniel Scholarship

A 1959 graduate of Florida State, Lucy McDaniel is known for her outstanding service and leadership to education and women's athletics, not only in the state of Florida, but in the Southeast region as well. A former collegiate volleyball coach herself, she has established a fully endowed scholarship for volleyball.



Nan Mitchem Scholarship

A scholarship has been established for volleyball in the name of Nancy Cooper (Nan) Mitchem, a 1967 graduate of FSU. Nan was a member of the Varsity "F" Club, a lifetime member of the Alumni Association and a Golden Chief and Tribal Chief with the Seminole Boosters. Her enthusiasm for FSU and positive attitude about life was a great example to all who knew her.

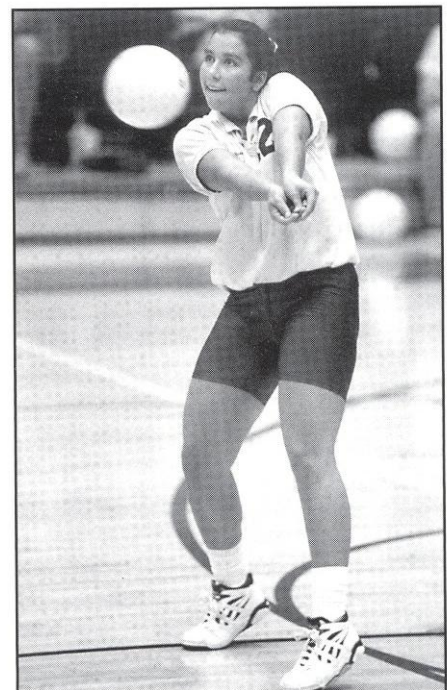
