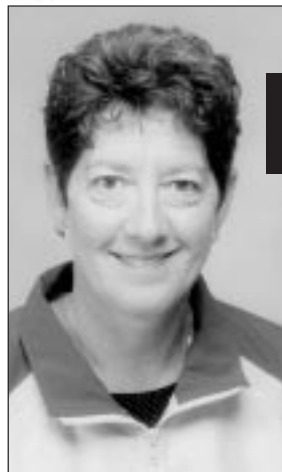

Florida State head coach Dr. Cecile Reynaud celebrated her Silver Anniversary with the Lady Seminoles' volleyball program in 2000, with a season to remember. The Lady Seminoles opened up the 2000 season with seven-straight wins, including their third win of the season which gave Reynaud her milestone 600th victory. Her 600th win placed her in the very distinctive "600-Win" club, in which only eight other active coaches are members. Reynaud went on to lead her team to a 21-win season, and ended the year with the greatest accolade the Atlantic Coast Conference can offer, Coach of the Year honors. Her team went on to finish fourth in the ACC and sixth in the AVCA East Region. Reynaud returns this season with a squad that returns all but one starter, including All-ACC and All-AVCA East Region middle hitter, Norisha Campbell. Reynaud, armed with a strong corps of returners, as well as five talented newcomers, will look for a return to glory in their quest for the squad's second ACC Championship since joining the league.

With a career record of 618-314, Reynaud ranks ninth nationally in career victories among active Division I coaches. Highly respected among her peers, Reynaud's involvement in international competition was elevated to an even higher level when she was chosen to serve as the Deputy Competition Manager for the 1996 Centennial Olympic Games. Years of volleyball experience paid off as she coordinated the activities of the Athens, Ga., venue for 10 days of competition.

As a coach, Reynaud has surpassed many milestones in her 25-year tenure at Florida State. Coach Reynaud notched her 500th career victory in the first match of the 1994 season against Southern Illinois, placing her among an elite list of coaches in the 500-win club. She reached win number 550 in a three-set win at Florida Atlantic in 1997 as she led the Lady Seminoles to the program's best ever start at 12-0, and most recently earned her 600th career win with a 3-0 win over Charleston Southern last season.

Looking back over 25 seasons of volleyball, post season play has become familiar to the Lady Seminoles. Florida State has made 10 NCAA post-season appearances, eight of which have been in the last 13 years. At the conference level, FSU has made three appearances in the Atlantic Coast Conference Championship match and earned its first ACC crown in 1998. Prior to joining the ACC, Reynaud and the Lady Seminoles claimed six regular-season titles five tournament titles in Metro Conference play, and played in three AIAW National Tournaments.

A two-time Metro Conference Coach of the Year, Reynaud earned her first Coach of the Year award by the Atlantic Coast Conference in 1992 when she led FSU to a first-place regular season finish. She was also named Florida Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women Coach of the Year in 1991 and in 1989 she garnered AVCA South Region Coach of the Year accolades.

In May of 1996, Reynaud received the George J. Fischer Leader in Volleyball Award, presented at the USA Volleyball National



Meetings in Dallas, Texas. This award recognizes long-time-significant contributions to volleyball programs and activities in the United States.

Reynaud's success directly correlates with the type of individuals she attracts to Florida State. This is evident on the court as well as in the classroom as reflected by the graduation rate of the student-athletes who have played for her. Among four-year volleyball letter-winners, all but two have earned their college degree, which is nearly a 98 percent graduation rate. These graduates have included two GTE Academic All-Americans and numerous honor roll students over the years.

In 1983, Reynaud was first involved at the international level and served as the assistant coach at the World University Games in Canada and in 1985 was head coach for the United States Junior National Team which toured Japan and China. She has been on the AVCA All-America Committee and was the Zone Coordinator for 1986 and 1987 Olympic Festivals. She served as the commissioner for the Olympic Festival for seven years. Reynaud participated in the 1990 Goodwill Games as the technical secretary and is past-president of the American Volleyball Coaches Association. Reynaud is a current member of the Volleyball Hall of Fame selection committee and spent 12 years on the USA Volleyball Board of Directors and Executive Committee.

As an expert of the game, Reynaud is co-editor of "The Volleyball Coaching Bible," which is due to be completed in 2002. She has also been a technical consultant for two Power Volleyball films. She has co-authored numerous articles pertaining to women's athletics and continues to be active on the speaking circuit. Reynaud has been an instructor at numerous camps and clinics across the country and hosts her own camp each year which attracts hundreds of young volleyball players.

A 1975 graduate of Southwest Missouri State, Reynaud enjoyed an outstanding athletic career on the volleyball team as well as an All-State Field Hockey player and was twice named among the Outstanding College Athletes in America. In 1983, she was inducted into the school's Women's Athletics Hall of Fame. She earned her master's degree from FSU in 1979 while coaching and in 1998 graduated with a Ph.D. in Sports Management. Her dissertation topic was "Factors Influencing Prospective Female Volleyball Student-Athletes' Selection of an NCAA Division I University: Toward a More Informed Recruitment Process."

SUE WOODSTRA

Assistant Coach

3RD SEASON

Sue Woodstra, former University of California-Berkeley head volleyball coach and an 1984 Olympic silver medalist, is in her third season as a member of the Florida State volleyball coaching staff. As Dr. Cecile Reynaud's top assistant, Woodstra is involved with recruiting for the Lady Seminoles, assisting the student-athletes with their academic progress, as well as the day-to-day management of the team.

After a decorated playing career, Woodstra turned her talents to the coaching arena as an assistant at Arizona State University in 1985. After four seasons at ASU, she began a four-year reign as head coach at the University of Pittsburgh (1989-1992) where she led the Lady Panthers to four consecutive Big East conference titles and NCAA Tournament appearances. She earned Big East Coach of the Year honors in 1990. Woodstra also spent a year coaching internationally at the professional level in Germany, guiding the USC Münster team to a 28-4 record and the C.E.V. European Cup Championship in 1993. The following year, Woodstra served as a volunteer coach at the University of Notre Dame before becoming the head coach at the University of California (Berkeley) in 1995 through 1998.

As a standout player at the University of Southern California, Woodstra helped the Lady Trojans to the 1977 AIAW National Championship while earning All-America honors. She went on to an impressive eight-year career on the U.S. National Team and served as team captain for four seasons. During her National Team stint, Woodstra helped the United States to the 1983 Zone Championship and three other top five finishes in Zone and World Championship play. Woodstra was also the team captain of the 1984 U.S. Olympic Team that earned a silver medal at the Olympic Games in Los Angeles. Woodstra played four seasons (1984-88) on the professional level for the NEC Volleyball Team of the Japan League. She also played three seasons with the Merrill Lynch/ Reebok USVBA team where she earned Most Valuable Player honors after leading the squad to its second straight national championship in 1986.

In 1993, Woodstra was selected as a USVBA All-Time Great Volleyball Player for her career achievements.



COURTNEY DIPERT

Assistant Coach

1ST SEASON

Courtney Dipert, who played defensive specialist for Reynaud from 1996-99, begins her first season as assistant coach. Dipert replaces former assistant Amy Bambenek, who departed in February. Dipert assists with the day-to-day operations of the program and is director of the FSU Summer Camps.

Prior to taking the assistant coach position Dipert gained coaching experience with the Big Bend Juniors Volleyball Club from 1998-2000, culminating with her position as head coach of the 18-1 team. Dipert has also coached at many volleyball camps throughout the south and midwest.

Dipert completed her master's degree at FSU in sports administration in June of 2001.

Team Manager

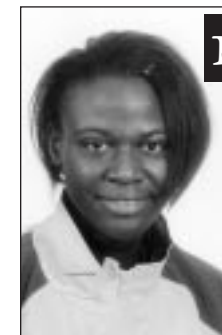
3RD SEASON

JILL HOOMES

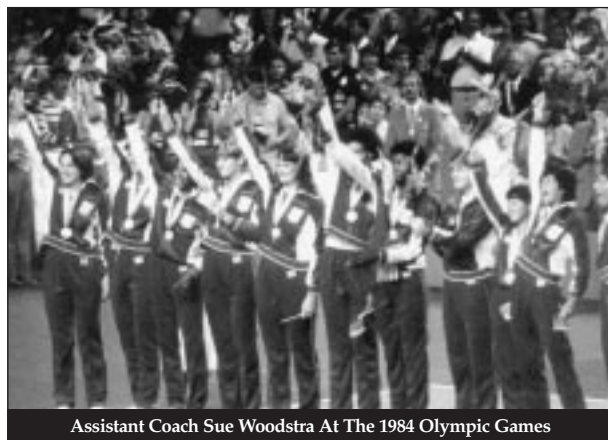
Secretary
