

Guard BILL DAWKINS of Miami, an Intercollegiate All-State and All-Dixie Conference selection last year, is playing his burth season as a regular for Florida State and will captain the team. . . . Bill sets a great example for the ball club by his own stellar play and has fine leadership qualities. . . . He is a physical education major and hopes to coach in the state *after he graduates in June. . . .

GUARDS—CHARLIE BOOTH of Lakeland is a Sophomore with lots of promise. . . . CHARLEY BROWN of Mononga-hela, Pa., will also be used as a tackle and line-backer on defense. One of the best newcomers on the squad. . . . BOB CHMELZ of Willoughby, Ohio, like Captain Dawkins, is starting his fourth season as a Florida State regular. He was an III-Dixie Conference selection last Fall and is expected to have his greatest year. . . . ROGER SLABAUGH of Mishawaka, Ind., may be the best of the Freshmen candidates at this position. . . . BOB TULLY of Tallahassee was a reserve on the 1949 Seminoles. Bob has lots of fire, likes it rough and backs up the line on defense. . . .

TACKLES—VERN FREEZE of Mishawaka, Ind., is a promising Freshman who also punts well. . . . JOHN KARLOWICZ 📢 Fairbank, Pa., is a newcomer who is outstanding on defense. . . . DONALD LINTON of Port St. Joe was a reserve fullback n Florida State's 1950 eleven. He's learning fast as a lineman. . . . DOSSEY MERRITT of Lakeland is the largest man on he 1951 Florida State squad at 243 pounds. Dossey, a Freshman, handles his weight well and may become a great player the continues to develop. . . . EARL O'NEAL of Valdosta, Ga., was a letterman guard last year and looks yen better at tackle. Earl is one of the most aggressive players on the squad. He plays guard on defense. . . . NAT POLAK f Miami is another promising Freshman who lacks experience. . . . VIC SZCZEPANIK of East Rochester, Pa., is one of the wo returning lettermen tackles. He likes the going rough and is at his best on offense. . . . BOB WODRICH of Miami lettered at Florida State as a Freshman last Fall and is expected to play lots of ball. He is also battling an early season injury jinx. GORDON DAVIS of Fort Myers, TOM NADRICH of Youngstown, Ohio, CHUCK SANDERS of Monongahela, Pa., and GEORGE KIRBY of Tallahassee are all unproved Freshmen. . . . Kirby, in particular, is coming along fast.

CENTERS—BUDDY BRYANT of Perry was a letterman on Florida State's first football team in 1947 and has been out of school since. . . . He could help lenty if and when he gets back into shape. . . . STEVE KALENICH of Barberton, Jhio, was the Seminole's regular center last Fall and is expected to do better this year. . . . ED LOCKARD of Jacksonville is another returning letterman at center. MARVIN MOLLNOW of Jacksonville Beach looks good at times—he's a newcomer. . . TOMMY OWEN of Webster was a reserve center last year and is expected to have a great year. . . BILL WHALEY of Ocala is a promising Freshman who has scrap but lacks experience. . . . Ditto JOHN MURCHEK of East Chicago, III., and EARL BROWN of Tallahassee. . . .

ENDS-JIM ARNOLD of Bainbridge, Ga., is one of the smallest men on the squad and one of the surest tacklers, . . . He was a defensive standout for the Seminoles as a Freshman last year. . . . CURTIS CAMPBELL of Pensacola is a returning letterman who is a fine pass receiver and is equally good on defense. He will also be used at right half. . . . BILL DRIVER of Girard, Ill., was the Seminoles' regular quarterback last season and is looking even better at end. . . . JOE ROBINSON of Coral Gables seems to be the most promising Freshman end. . . BOB WHITMER of South Bend., Ind., is a fine pass receiver and blocker. Big and rangy, Bob could be great this Fall if he catches fire. . . Newcomers GENE BRIDGES of Pensacola, JERRY ELLENWOOD of Fort Wayne, Ind., AL GARRETT of Sarasota, TED MORRILL of Miami, MANUEL MOSHONAS of Tarpon Springs and RUSS SORGEN of Fort Wayne, Ind., are still unknown quantities.

QUARTERBACKS—PRESS BRADLEY of Lake Wales lettered as a fullback

last year and has looked even better in his new blocking back role. One of the most versatile players on the squad, he is also used some as an offensive guard. . . . MAC HUEY of Tampa, who played guard the Seminoles' first few games this year, has returned to his old quarterback position and is playing outstanding ball there. . . . TOM SEBRING of Tallahassee is the best passer of the quarterbacks and also punts well. . . . JIMMY LEE TAYLOR of Tampa, a newcomer, is a good blocker and may also be used as a defensive end. . . . GERALD SMITH of Miami

and JOHNNY SHEPPARD of Tallahassee are promising Freshmen. .

HALFBACKS—WAYNE BENNER of LaPorte, Ind., is a great defensive half-back and a good punter. . . . HARRY BRINGGER of Winter Haven is one of the fastest men on the squad, a shifty runner, good pass receiver and fine defensive halfback. . . . TOMMY BROWN of Tallahassee, rated one of the finest pass defense backs in the South, will also do most of the Seminole's punting. . . . BOBBY FIVE-ASH of Bainbridge, Ga., is a Sophomore with great promise as a runner and passer.

... GARY FOLSOM of Jacksonville is at his best when throwing the ball. Gary is a returning reserve. . . . ERNIE HUGGETT of Mishawaka, Ind., is the Seminoles' kickoff and extra point specialist. . . MIKE SELLERS of Barberton, Ohio, Intercollegiate All-State and All-Dixie Conference at fullback last season, has been moved to left halfback by Coach Don Veller. Mike has proven even more effective at his new position and still backs up the Seminole line on defense. ... ROY THOMPSON of Wrightsville, Ga., is probably the best of the new players on the squad this season. Fast, shifty, and a hard runner, he is a touch-down threat every time he gets beyond the line of scrimmage. . . . RALPH ATWELL of Pensacola, and AL WOODHAM of Albany, Ga., are the unproved

newcomers.

FULLBACKS—GEORGE CARNES of Tampa is a promising Freshman who is at his best on defense. . . . GEORGE GRAHAM of Santa Rosa, Calif., is a hard. fast runner. . . . NELSON ITALIANO of Tampa has been moved to fullback from halfback in an effort to speed up the Seminoles' offense. He does everythingpunts, passes, runs—well. . . . 












THE WOFFORD COLLEGE TERRIERS

A preacher who picked up pins and a coach who scored 96 points in one grid game are responsible for Wofford's football fortunes being what they are today.

The preacher was Benjamin Wofford, a Spartanburg, S. C., minister in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, over a hundred years ago. Known as an "economy-minded" person, Wofford combined two things rarely found together in the Methodist Church—a minister and money. He spent his life preaching and saving money, money which eventually went into the founding of a liberal arts college in Spartanburg.

His contribution to Wofford's football record? Wofford.

The coach is William Phillip Dickens, a Tennessee graduate of 1937. As a high school tailback, he once scored 96 points in one game. (Has the clippings to prove it, too.) But fans around Spartanburg consider his greatest record the coaching job he has done at Wofford.

When he came to the small college in 1947, the football Terriers were a down-trodden bunch who spent most of their time in the dog house. That soon changed. His first year, the Wofford team turned into a ripping, snarling crew that won six games and lost five for the first above .500 season the Terriers had had in many, many a moon.

The next year Wofford went undefeated although they won only four games. That's right. The other five tilts ended in deadlocks, giving Wofford a national reputation as the "Tying Terriers." In 1949 it was another undefeated season with not even a tie in 11 games to mar the picture. But Florida State punctured any real dream of greatness with a 19-6 win over Wofford in the '50 Cigar Bowl.

Last season Wofford won seven, lost two and tied one. Both of the losses were to Florida teams (Stetson and Tampa). In fact, until they trimmed Tampa 20-14 in their second game of this season, the Terriers had a Florida jinx that was al-


most unbelievable—they had never in history defeated a Florida team.

Dickens' five years at Wofford include the two undefeated seasons already mentioned, a national record of five straight ties in 1948, four consecutive South Carolina "Little Four" titles and a 6-2 record for this season. Last week Wofford upset Furman University of the Southern Conference by a 14-12 score. The Terriers' two losses this year were administered by Auburn University, a Southeastern Conference leader, and by V. M. I., which is undefeated in the Southern Conference.

In Captain Bob Pollard (guard), halfbacks Jack Beeler and Eli Sanders, and fullback Bobby McLellan we think we have at Wofford four of the outstanding small-college football players in the nation today.

And, just for the record, Wofford has an allmale student body of 518; the Terriers were last year's state championship basketball team; and at Wofford we have one of the two collegiate Phi Beta Kappa chapters in the state of South Carolina.

We are happy at this opportunity to re-open athletic relations with Florida State University and hope we can do our part to make today's football game one every fan will remember for a long time.
