ASSISTANT COACH BOB HARBISON

Bob Harbison, an outstanding guard for the late 'Bo' Mc-Millan at Indiana University in 1945, '46, and '47, begins his sixth season as an assistant coach at FSU. Harby is one



of the Tribe's line coaches.

Harbison came to FSU in 1948 under the then head coach Don Veller. He has worked with guards and tackles, primarily, here, and is cred-ited with developing Bill Dawkins, little All-America guard in 1951 and Hugh Adams, little All-America tackle in 1949.

A native of Evansville (Ind.), Harbison was elected to the North squad for the annual Blue-Gray game in Montgomery in 1947.

Harbison received his masters degree in physical education at FSU in

August of this year.

A rock 'em sock 'em player in his days at Indiana, Harby likes the same brand of play from his charges.

Bob is married - his wife's name is Jane. They have two daughters, Paula 3 and Susan 1.

as backfield coach three seasons under his present chief, Tom Nugent. Ragunas is a graduate of VMI where he played fullback and block-


ing back on the Keydet varsity teams of 1946, '47, and '48. He had played on the frosh team in '42 before going into the service and three years with

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS HOWARD DANFORD

From a pickup schedule of five games in 1947 with VMI, Furman, Miami (Fla.), North Carolina State and others sums up the growth of FSU football under Director of Athletics Howard Danford.

Danford heads up the athletic program at Florida State

as athletic director as athletic director and director of physical education for men. Danford came to FSU in 1947 from Madison (Wis.) where he had served as director of health, physical education, recreation and safety

for the Madison public school system. Under Danford's guidance the FSU Department of Athletics has been expanded greatly, both from a stand-point of curriculum and personnel.

A well-rounded program has been developed at FSU. The university competes in nine intercollegiate sports (football, basketball, swimming, ten-nis, gymnastics, volleyball, golf, track, baseball). In addition the university

athletic department sponsors the nationally famous student circus, "Flying High", and the equally renowned produc-tion, "Gymkana."

Danford received his bachelor's degree from Ohio University and later was awarded his masters and doctorate degree at NYU in 1943.

Author of numerous magazine articles, Danford has held positions of prominence in national organizations. He is current president of the College Recreation Association and regional representative of Region VI of the United States Volleyball Association. He is past president of the Florida Recreation Association and is chairman of the public relations committee of the Florida Health, Physical Education and Recreation Association.

Danford's wife's name is Helen. They have two children Martha 9, Danny 7.

ASSISTANT COACH WINSTON SIEGFRIED

Winston Siegfried comes to FSU this fall after eight highly successful seasons of coaching at the prep school level in Virginia and North Carolina.

A player under Wallace Wade on the 1938, '39, '40, and '41 Duke University teams, Siegfried was an all-Southern conference and second team all-America fullback selection in 1941. He played in the Rose Bowl

game that year against Oregon State.

Siggfried served in the Navy threeand-one-half years, getting in two seasons of play with the Bainbridge (Md.) team. He played pro ball with the Washington Redskins in 1945, then coached two seasons at Fork Union (Va.) Military Academy. His next stop was a two-year stand at Varina High in Richmond where his teams had a 13-5-1 mark.

SIEGFRIED

Siegfried continued his climb up the prep coaching ladder and in 1948 served as backfield coach at Hampton (Va.) where the team won the state title.

The 1949 and 1950 campaigns found him at Sanford (N.C.) High as head coach where his teams posted identical 9-3 marks and gained two regional titles.

He moved to Henderson (N.C.) in 1951 and there his team won nine, lost none, and tied for the Eastern championship. His 1952 team was runnerup for the North Caro-lina AA championship, losing in the state playoff, after copping the regional and Eastern crowns.

At FSU Siegfried will work principally with the backs.

Winston is married - his wife's name is Ann. They have three children - Judy 9, Nancy 6, and Tommy 3.



FSU's Head Football Coach Tom Nugent



Tom Nugent, originator of the 'l' formation, the typewriter huddle, the double quarterback, and recognized as one of the nation's brilliant young grid mentors, picks up the reins this fall for his first campaign as headmaster of Florida State University football fortunes.

Nugent comes to State from a highly successful fouryear tenure as boss man of VMI's colorful Keydets of the Southern Conference. In four seasons at the Lexington (Va.) school, Nugent injected new life into the VMI eleven. His record there was a respectable 19-18-2.

So successful has Nugent been everywhere he and football have associated that Seminole boosters are already looking to him as the man to carry the Garnet and Gold into the National gridiron spotlight.

the National gridiron spotlight. Nugent's coaching record dates back to his college days. After starring on the Ithaca College eleven three seasons and graduating in 1936, Nugent coached Ithaca frosh while doing graduate work.

A native of Lawrence (Mass.), Tom returned to his home town the next season where he became head coach of football, basketball and baseball at Essex Training School. Three seasons there produced two undefeated grid teams.

The Air Force summoned Nugent in 1941, interrupting his coaching career temporarily. But Tom and football soon joined forces again. He was named head football coach of the Rosecrans (Mo.) Air Base Flyers. Other duties included writing, directing, and presenting shows for the entertainment of troops. Nugent was then and still is quite a song and dance man. He likes to put on a show as his formations and the style of play of his teams attest.

After his discharge in 1946, Nugent was appointed head coach at Williamsburg (Va.) High. His '46 team was undefeated in league play and also copped the state basketball, baseball and track crowns, bringing about the reclassification of the school to Group II.

Tom moved to Hopewell (Va.) of Group I calibre in 1947. His '47 eleven posted a 7-2 mark. His 1948 team won eight and lost two, the losses both by a single point. So, three years of high school coaching produced a record of 24 wins, four losses for Nugent.

Then came Nugent's big change—head coach at Virginia Military Institute of the Southern Conference, a school steeped in football tradition but one which had been in the circuit's doldrums.

Armed with the same "optimistic" outlook and that "Nugent Golden Touch," Tom stepped into the VMI job. His first season there, 1949, was a 3-5-1 effort but the VMI folks were pleased. His team was a hustling hard-hitting eleven. The season of 1950 was a good one. The Keydets won six of 10 games including two resounding upset wins over Georgia Tech and William and Mary.

The 1951 season was Nugent's best at VMI. The Keydets won seven, lost three, to share the Southern Conference title with Maryland. The 1952 VMI team won three, lost six, tied one.

In his coaching career, Nugent has developed three major football techniques. His first was at Matthew Whaley High in Williamsburg, where he found two quarterbacks on his squad, one a left hander, the other a right; so he put both behind the center, and baffled the opposition. Notre Dame picked it up a year later. The typewriter huddle was employed first by Nugent at Hopewell High in 1947. Latest and most startling of the Nugent innovations, however, is the '1' formation.

Tom is married—his wife's name is Peg. They have five children: Tommy 10, Kerry 9, Peggy 7, TD 4, Pattie 2.

Symbolic of the Tide's greatest era, Mancha lettered on the 'Bama teams of 1944, '45, '46, and '47. He was an all-Southeastern and all-America selection as he helped pace the Red Elephants to an undefeated season and to a 34-14 win over Southern Cal in the 1946 Tournament of Roses. Big Vaughn played in two Sugar Bowl games (New Year's of '45 against Duke and New Year's of '48 against Texas).







The 1953 Furman Purple Hurricane



BILL YOUNG Head Football Coach Furman University's colorful Purple Hurricane enters today's game against Florida State with a 5-2 season mark, ranked No. 6 in the nation by latest NCAA figures among the country's rushing leaders, No. 8 in the nation in total offense.

The Purple has gained 2510 yards in its seven outings for a 358.6 yard average offense per game, and has amassed 278.6 yards per game along the ground.

This fine offense has produced five wins. The Hurricane downed Newberry (33-0), Wofford (7-6), Presbyterian (19-0), Citadel (27-0), and Davidson (34-0). The losses were to strong Army (41-0), in an early season game, and to a fine South Carolina team, (27-13).

The 1952 Furman team posted the best record a Purple team has enjoyed since 1937. The '52 team had a 6-3-1 mark including a 9-0 win over Florida State University.

From last season's team, Head Coach Bill Young greeted 32 lettermen this fall. Young felt then, and believes now, that this is a good sound Furman team. The record backs up his thinking. It is a team with depth, experience, and ability.

Young has employed a unique 'two-platoon' backfield system this season attempting to fully utilize his 13 lettermen backs. One group has had Jim Boyle at quarterback, Ted Yakimowicz at left half and Paul Stewart at right half, Bob Snead at fullback. Another alignment has found Gus Pringels at quarterback, 'Popping John' Popson and Jim Ransbothem at halves, Bo Barry at fullback. Furman has relied principally on a balanced running game utilizing its wealth of big, hardrunning backs. The team, however, has passing potential with fine tossers in Pringels, West, Russ Sutton, the latter injured most of the '53 season but expected to return to duty against FSU.

Up front, Young and his assistant coaches have had five lettermen ends, five numeral winning tackles, six lettermen guards, and three lettermen centers, with which to build a big, aggressive, experienced forward wall.

Leading the charge in the forward wall has been 1952 all-Carolina guard Vince Perone. An alert senior operative, Perone weighs 195, has excellent reaction, and is a fine play-maker and diagnoser. He is fast and leads interference well. He is a man to watch today. His number: 45.


But Peron is not all. Lettermen guards John Socha (195), J. R. Cobb (190), Webster Williams (200), Rod Hamby (190), and Andy Bielecki (215), all have been fine performers.

At tackles, Young has been flushed with depth. Five big yeomen have cavorted in the Purple and White spangles. Lettermen Les Fuller (210), Hal Pridmore (225), Dave Young (210), Dave Buffamoyer (235), Joe Gilreath (200), all are veterans.

Center has been manned by letterman Grubby Maddox (170), Gene Reed (210), and Ronnie Byrd (175).

At ends, lettermen Jackie Harris (210), Holdman Smith (180), Sam Pou (205), Roland Barefoot (185), Frank Abernathy (195), and sophomore L. G. Hightower (195), have operated well.

But in FSU, the Purple, its coaching staff and players, know they face a young hard-hitting team quite capable of rocking any eleven any time. The Purple thoroughly expects a hard battle today, one that will be a spirited contest to the final gun.
