### Seminoles Underdogs to Strong Georgia

Florida State's rapidly improving Seminoles will be out for their second win of the 1955 campaign tonight, and Tom Nugent's forces have their work cut out for them in trying to get that win from Wally Butts' strong Georgia Bulldogs.

The Georgians move into Tallahassee for the second straight year, and this season the Bulldogs sport a 2-2 record to date with wins over Vanderbilt and North Carolina and losses to Mississippi and Clemson.

Last week-end the Bulldog offense got going at full blast to tame an ambitious UNC eleven to the tune of a 28-7 count.

The Seminoles, after looking rather sluggish in the first three quarters of the game against Virginia Tech, awoke with a bang and a vengeance in the final quarter to pull within 4 points of the very fine VPI team. That last stanza splurge by FSU left the almost 14,000 fans limp with excitement as Vic Prinzi came in to direct a ground attack that turned loose Billy Odom and Lee Corso into twin bolt attacks over, through, in, and around the big VPI line.

But time ran out on the late-starting Indians. But their splendid come-back answered the oft - asked question: "Where is the FSU offense?" The offense is there, all right, both on the ground and in the air.

#### IN THE PRESS BOX

WELCOME TO COACH WALLY BUTTS AND THE GEORGIA BULLDOGS! . . . if you haven't gotten your tickets for this game by now, might just as well stay home and listen to it on the radio . . . looks as if 20,000 fans will pour into Campbell Stadium tonight . . . if so, it will mark the largest crowd in FSU history . . . a history which only dates back 8 years, but it's still a record, and records are always made to break . . . in fact, the Seminoles have drawn their second largest opening night crowd (15,253) and second game crowd (13,268) this season against N.C. State and V.P.I. . . . many observers in this region are definitely convinced that V.P.I. has one of the crack teams in the south . . . the Techs really looked impressive on offense, and their big, fast moving line was tops . . . Coach Nugent thinks V.P.I.'s offense was better than Miami's . . . and Tom is the man who should know . . . the amazing thing is why no one gets worked up over V.P.I. . . . nationally, that is . . . the Techs finished the 1954 campaign with a ranking of 16th in the nation, and yet there are a lot of people who will say, "V.P.I.? . . . Where's that? . . . Who's that? . . . " . . . well, those interrogative individuals found out last Saturday night . . . opinions in the press box all seemed to concur . . . if FSU had about 5 more minutes in that ball game last week, the Seminoles would have taken it . . . the offense, both air and ground, had caught fire, and the confused Techs would have had a tough time stopping it. Prinzi made up for the poor start he made this season . . . Vic looked sharp indeed, both in running the team and handling the ball . . . little Billy Odom showed the crowd what the word RUN really means . . . as soon as he hit the 35 yard line on that long kickoff return he made, there was no doubt that he was going all the way . . . one V.P.I. defender looked around as if to flag down a jeep from somewhere, as he knew that was the only way anyone could catch the little red-head . . . 'twas a pleasure to see Lee Corso running as of old . . . there was a genuine fear that Corso's shoulder was still not up to par, but the Miami Meteor showed his stuff, particularly in FSU's last touchdown drive in the final canto . . . for those of you who are planning a big week-end in Tallahassee for Homecoming, it should offer plenty, as last week's results showed FSU's opponent, the Citadel, downed a good Richmond team by a 14-12 count . . . by the way, if you want a good football game on the 29th of October, hustle on down to Mt. Dora and watch the Seminole "B" squad meet the Miami Bees . . . maybe the JV's can wreak some revenge, what? . . . the books here predict that Virginia Tech will pile through the rest of the season unbeaten . . . the Techs will be solid favorites in all but one clash . . . they may have some trouble with Clemson . . . in handling the Indian aerial attack, completing 10 of 15 passes for 105 yards. Big Tom Feamster, Swantic's favorite target, hauled in five aerials to boost his average per-game receptions to 3. If Feamster averages this for every game, he will have caught 30 passes to surpass his 1954 record of 28 receptions.


Georgia enters tonight's fray a heavy favorite. Mostly because of the strong teams played to date and last week's impressive victory over North Carolina, the Bulldogs should be tabbed a two touchdown choice.

But Nugent's ever-trying Seminoles may make the odds-makers take another look in the future. And the future may start tonight.

After tonight's game, the Seminoles move into Atlanta for another big one next Saturday afternoon. Georgia Tech's Yellow Jackets, considered in many circles as the 2nd team in the nation, will play host to Nugent's warriors, and many here are hoping that history will repeat itself . . . last time Nugent took a ball club to Atlanta (V.M.I. in 1950) he upset the apple cart and whipped Tech 14-13.



#### SEMINOLE LETTERMEN

#### **ENDS**

TOM FEAMSTER . . . senior . . . 6-7 . . . 250 pounds . . . 24 years old . . . calls Warwick, Virginia home . . . this lad is probably the largest end in collegiate football, and undoubtedly one of the finest . . . fast and rangy, he has excellent pass catching abilities as the record will show . . . in 1954, Feamster hauled in 28 aerials for a net yardage gain of 442 yards and six touchdowns . . . prime All-American candidate, this should be his greatest year.

RONNIE SCHOMBURGER . . . sophomore . . . 6-1 . . 190 pounds . . . hails from Pittsburgh, Pa. . . . . 22 years old . . . showed splendid form last season as a freshman, and appears ready now to hold down the starting berth at left end . . . fast offensively and a strong defensive terminal player . . . caught 5 passes in 1954 for 164 yards and two TD's . . . strong All-Florida prospect.

**TACKLES** 

DON POWELL . . . senior . . . co-captain of the Seminoles . . . 21 years old . . . 6-0 . . . 207 pounds . . . born in Birmingham, Alabama . . . top tackle prospect for this year's squad . . . fast, with quick reaction, is good blocker and excellent defensive player . . . will

see a lot of two way duty this season.

TROY BARNES . . . sophomore . . . 6-2 . . . 206
pounds . . . 22 years old . . . hails from Chickasaw, Alabama . . . Troy lettered in 1952 as a freshman, then went into the service . . . his return to the Seminole camp will give added experienced strength where most needed.

BOB BARBER . . . junior . . . 5-11 . . . 210 pounds . . . 20 years old . . . comes from Belle Glade . . . tabbed by Coach Tom Nugent as one of the top linemen in the south, this fella will cause a lot of trouble for Seminole opponents this fall ... has plenty of speed for man his size, quick reaction, will get starting nod at right tackle ... good All-Florida and All-American bet.

#### **GUARDS**

JERRY JACOBS ... senior ... 6-1 ... 205 pounder ... 21 years old ... calls South Bend, Indiana home ... considered one of the finest blockers on the team ... not only good offensive operator, but top flight defensive product ... tabbed for starting duty at left grand when season opens guard when season opens.

VINCE GIBSON . . . senior . . . 5-10 . . . 185 pounds 22 years of age . . . comes from Birmingham, Alabama . . . will in all probability get opening game call at right guard . . . good defensive player, and can move fast on offense.

LEO BAGGETT . . . sophomore . . . 5-9 . . . 195 pounds . . . 19 years old . . . calls Panama City home . . . got his first letter last season as a freshman . . . has three more years of good football for the Semioles ... on the stocky side, Baggett can move well and fast ... fine two-way prospect.

AL PACIFICO . . . junior . . . 5-7 . . . 203 pounder ... 24 years old ... comes from Altoona, Pennsylvania ... Pacifico has been a two year regular on the Seminole squad, and well see plenty of action again this season . . . small, but aggressive, he will give added strength to the middle of the line.

#### CENTERS

BOB CRENSHAW . . . senior . . . co-captain . . . 5-9 . . . 190 pounds . . . 21 years old . . . comes from Miami . . . though small in size, there's no lack of ability in this lad . . . an outstanding player for Miami Edison high school, Crenshaw played splendid football for the Seminoles last season and will again be the big gun at the pivot post this season.

RAY STAAB . . . junior . . . 5-11 . . . 205 pounds . . . 21 years of age . . . hails from Charleston, West

Virginia . . . will be at a new position this fall, having played tackle in previous seasons, . . a back injury necessitated moving Staab to center, and Coach Nugent thinks the big fellow will help take up some slack.

#### QUARTERBACKS

VIC PRINZI . . . sophomore . . . 6-0 . . . 175 pounds . . . 19 years old . . . comes from Waverly, N. Y. . . . filled in capably for starter Harry Massey last season ... passing record showed 13 completions in 27 attempts in 1954 for 373 yards and 4 TD tosses ... passing percentage was 48.1 ... should come into his own this year with added responsibility.

LEE SWANTIC . . . junior . . . 5-11 . . . 180 pounds 23 years old . . . Len had a fine record last season completing 28 passes in 55 attempts for 355 yards and 4 TD's for an average of 51 per cent . . . this Columbus, Georgia native could be in line for a terrific year in '55 . . . he threw three touchdown heaves against Villanova last season.

#### HALFBACKS

LEE CORSO . . . junior . . . 5-11 . . . 170 pounds . . . 20 years old . . . hails from Miami . . . Corso is called one of the finest halfbacks in the nation by Coach Tom Nugent, and he has seen plenty of them ... the gallopin' little sunshine scooter toured the turf last season for a record of 273 yards in 72 attempts for an average of 3.8 yards per carry . . . Lee scored 3 TD's, and most of this damage was done in a substitute's role, but in spring practice this year, he really kicked up his reels, and this season he should come into his own as the best in Florida and the south.

BUCK METTS . . . junior . . . 5-10 . . . 175 pounds . 19 years old . . . comes from Sanford . . . this youngster is the big gun in the punting department . . . Metts punted 12 times last season for 478 yards for an average of 39.8 yards per effort . . . punting is not his only forte, however, as he is a good, fast, elusive halfback, and will do plenty of running this season.

BILLY ODOM . . . junior . . . 5-8 . . . 165 pounds . . . 20 years old . . . first saw the light of day in Mt. Dora . . . very fleet runner, used mostly as a spot player in 1954 . . . Coach Nugent will count heavily on this youngster to do a lion's share of work this coming season . . . carried 26 times for 147 yards for a 5.6 average in 1954.

BILLY WEAVER . . . sophomore . . . 6-0 . . . 180 pounds . . . 18 years old . . . here's a youngster who is tabbed by Coach Nugent as a strong possibility to develop into top flight material . . . comes from Miami.

#### **FULLBACKS**

JOE HOLT ... sophomore ... 5-10 ... 180 pounder . hails from Graham, North Carolina . . . this 20 year old plunger will be getting the starting call at the fullback slot this year... Holt carried the ball 21 times and picked up 126 yards last season for an average of 5.7 yards per haul... though small in stature for a fullback, this husky little Tar Heel may well be the answer to Nugent's hopes at the fullback post.

BUD LEONARD . . . junior . . . 5-11 . . . 200 pounds ... 21 years old ... from Ocala ... Leonard excelled last season on defense, being one of the Seminoles' ball hawks on pass defense . . . plenty of size and good speed, he will give Holt a good run for the starting call at fullback.

JOHN GRINER . . . senior . . . 5-10 . . . 175 pounds ... 22 years old ... from Jacksonville ... this young-ster could well have his best season in this, his final year with the Seminoles . . . Griner hauled the mail for 103 yards last season to average almost 3 yards per carry, and expects to swing into high gear this fall ... could be a sleeper at the plunging spot.







#### PENALTIES

#### LOSS OF FIVE YARDS

Delicious and

- 1. Taking more than five times out during either half (except for replacement of injured player).
- 2. Illegal delay of game.
- 3. Failure to complete substitution before play starts.
- 4. Violation of kickoff formation.
- 5. Player out of bounds when scrimmage begins.
- 6. Putting ball in play before Referee signals "Ready-for-play".
- 7. Failure to maintain proper alignment of offensive team when ball is

snapped. Also, backfield man illegally in motion.

Refreshing

- 8. Offside by either team or encroachment on neutral zone.
- 9. Attempt to draw opponents offside.
- 10. Crawling by runner.
- 11. Illegal forward pass (includes intentional grounding of forward pass). Also loss of down.
- 12. Taking more than two steps after Fair Catch is made.
- 13. Player on line receiving snap.
- 14. Any violation of the scrimmage formation.

#### **LOSS OF FIFTEEN YARDS**

- 15. Team not ready to play at scheduled time.
- 16. Violation of rules during intermission.
- 17. Illegal return of suspended player.
- 18. Interference by member of offensive team with defensive player making pass interception. (Also loss of down)
- 19. Interference with opportunity of player of receiving team to catch a kick.
- 20. Illegal use of hands or arms by offensive player.

- 21. Tackling or blocking defensive player who has made fair catch.
- 22. Roughing the kicker.
- 23. Piling up, hurdling, clipping.
- 24. Tackling player out of bounds, or running into player obviously out of play.
- 25. Coaching from sidelines.
- 26. Failure to stop one full second following shift.
- 27. Defensive holding.
- 28. Invalid Signal for Fair Catch.

#### **OTHER PENALTIES**

- 29. Striking an opponent with fist, forearm, elbow or locked hands, kicking or kneeing Mandatory disqualification of offending player plus loss of fifteen yards.

#### Intercollegiate Athletics Observes NCAA'S

### 50th Anniversary



rent college year, 1955-56, commemorates the golden jubilee of the National Collegiate Athletic Association. The universities and colleges of the nation take pleasure in observing their national organization's 50th anniversary because the development and progress of the NCAA is the story of intercollegiate athletics' own expansion and improvement.

Fifty years is a long time. In 1905, the key offense in college football was the flying wedge ... organized track and field competition was just getting under way ... the original peach basket goal was about to be replaced by the open metal hoop in basketball but the sport still was new and strange to most sections of the nation ...

The NCAA evolved from a meeting of 13 colleges and universities called in 1905 to reorganize the game of intercollegiate football. (The rugged nature of the game was causing too many injuries and deaths.) A permanent organization was established, March 31, 1906.

Today, the NCAA is composed of more than 465 colleges and universities, athletic conferences and associations, devoted to the sound administration of intercollegiate athletics. Also today, the member institutions of the NCAA provide intercollegiate athletic competition for more than 130,000 students annually in more than 26 different sports. The men responsible for the coaching and administration of intercollegiate sports firmly believe that these competitive athletic programs are a vital part of the educational system which prepares our youth for future productive careers in society.

The universities and colleges of the nation have joined together in one Association—the NCAA—for purposes of athletic discussion, legislation and administration at the national level. The NCAA is solely and completely responsive to the will of its members as expressed by their governing boards and chief executive officers. The NCAA concerns itself with any phase of college athletics which spreads across regional lines and becomes

national in character, and a majority of the member institutions concur that national action is needed.

These member institutions carry on many diversified activities through the NCAA. For example, they:

- establish and maintain athletic standards.
- formulate and publish the official playing rules for college sports.
- conduct National Collegiate Championship events in 13 sports.
- maintain the official national statistics and records of college sports.
- provide financial and other assistance to groups interested in the promotion and encouragement of intercollegiate and intramural athletics.
- conduct studies as a means of developing solutions to athletic problems; i.e., the recent surveys on television, post-season events, length and time of playing and practice seasons, admission taxes, college baseball, etc.
- participate in the U. S. Olympic and Pan American movements in matters of fund-raising, sports organization and the selection of coaches and athletes for United States teams.
- administer a group insurance program providing catastrophe medical coverage.
- maintain a large film library covering play in National Collegiate Championship events.

The development and expanded activities of the NCAA reflect the progress of intercollegiate athletics over the past half century. The NCAA and its member institutions, in the years ahead, will continue to make every effort to provide maximum opportunities for our youth to enjoy the experience of competitive athletics as an integrated part of their over-all college education.
