

SEMINOLES MEET CITADEL IN HOMECOMING CLASH

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Coach Tom Nugent's vastly improved Florida State University Seminoles will tangle with the Citadel's Cadets this Saturday afternoon in a contest that pits two of the south's rapidly rising elevens against one another.

The Citadel has been the surprise team of South Carolina this season. After a poor 1954 season that saw but two close wins, the Cadets have pounded through the 1955 season with a record to date of five wins and three defeats.


Under the expert guidance of Coach John Sauer, the Cadets are out to regain their rightful place in the gridiron world, and have their sights set upon the Southern Conference title in the next few seasons.

Nugent's warriors, after a slow first half start against a fired-up Furman team, found that right combination of talent and clicked to near perfection in turning back the Purple Hurricane 19-6. The Seminoles not only performed in smart fashion on offense, clicking for 251 rushing yards from scrimmage, but held the fast and hard running Furmans to but 66 yards rushing for their best effort of the season.

This Saturday homecoming tussle before an expected, large turn-out should be a crowd pleaser all the way. With quarterback Vic Prinzi having found that confidence and experience, and with young Billy Weaver moving up to a starting berth at right halfback on the basis of his power-running, the Indians have a a "two-three" punch in Prinzi, Weaver and elusive Lee Corso, to offset the expected artistry of the Citadel's Budgie Broome, who has been one of the finest performers in the Southern Conference this year.

This is the final home game of the season for the Indians, who move to Hattiesburg, Mississippi, next week for one of the toughest games on the schedule against Mississippi Southern. For the Citadel, this game rings down the curtain on a highly successful 1955 campaign that has seen the Cadets move out of the door-mat class into a challenging position in future Southern Conference plans. Win or lose this one, the Cadets will still finish with a winning season, having already garnered five victories.

Following the clash with Southern in Hattiesburg next Friday night, the Seminoles wind up the campaign in Tampa with another rugged foe, the University of Tampa Spartans on December 3.



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

TOM FEAMSTER . . . senior . . . 6-7 . . . 250 pounds . . . 24 years old . . . calls Warwick, Virginia home . . . this lad is probably the largest end in collegiate football, and undoubtedly one of the finest . . . fast and rangy, he has excellent pass catching abilities as the record will show . . . in 1954, Feamster hauled in 28 aerials for a net yardage gain of 442 yards and six touchdowns . . . prime All-American candidate, this should be his greatest year.

RONNIE SCHOMBURGER . . . sophomore . . . 6-1 . . . 190 pounds . . . hails from Pittsburgh, Pa. . . . 22 years old showed splendid form last season as a freshman, and appears ready now to hold down the starting berth at left end . . . fast offensively and a strong defensive terminal player . . . caught 5 passes in 1954 for 164 yards and two TD's . . . strong All-Florida prospect.

TACKLES

DON POWELL . . . senior . . . co-captain of the Seminoles . . . 21 years old . . . 6-0 . . . 207 pounds . . . born in Birmingham, Alabama . . . top tackle prospect for this year's squad . . . fast, with quick reaction, is good blocker and excellent defensive player . . . will

see a lot of two way duty this season. TROY BARNES . . . sophomore . . . 6-2 . . . 206 pounds . . . 22 years old . . . hails from Chickasaw, Ala-bama . . . Troy lettered in 1952 as a freshman, then went into the service . . . his return to the Seminole camp will give added experienced strength where most needed.

BOB BARBER ... junior ... 5-11 ... 210 pounds 20 years old . . . comes from Belle Glade . . . tabbed by Coach Tom Nugent as one of the top linemen in the south, this fella will cause a lot of trouble for Seminole opponents this fall . . . has plenty of speed for man his size, quick reaction, will get starting nod at right tackle . . . good All-Florida and All-American bet.

GUARDS

JERRY JACOBS . . . senior . . . 6-1 . . . 205 pounder . . . 21 years old . . . calls South Bend, Indiana home . . . considered one of the finest blockers on the team ... not only good offensive operator, but top flight defensive product ... tabbed for starting duty at left guard when season opens.

VINCE GIBSON . . . senior . . . 5-10 . . . 185 pounds . . 22 years of age . . . comes from Birmingham, Alabama . . . will in all probability get opening game call at right guard . . . good defensive player, and can move fast on offense. LEO BAGGETT . . . sophomore . . . 5-9 . . . 195

has three more years of good football for the Seminoles ... on the stocky side, Baggett can move well and fast ... fine two-way prospect.

AL PACIFICO . . . junior . . . 5-7 . . . 203 pounder Seminole squad, and well see plenty of action again this season . . . small, but aggressive, he will give added strength to the middle of the line.

CENTERS

BOB CRENSHAW . . . senior . . . co-captain . . . 5-9 . . . 190 pounds . . . 21 years old . . . comes from Miami . . . though small in size, there's no lack of ability in this lad . . . an outstanding player for Miami Edison high school, Crenshaw played splendid football for the Seminoles last season and will again be the big gun at the pivot post this season.

RAY STAAB . . . junior . . . 5-11 . . . 205 pounds . . . 21 years of age . . . hails from Charleston, West

Virginia . . . will be at a new position this fall, having played tackle in previous seasons , . . a back injury necessitated moving Staab to center, and Coach Nugent thinks the big fellow will help take up some slack.

QUARTERBACKS

VIC PRINZI ... sophomore ... 6-0 ... 175 pounds . 19 years old ... comes from Waverly, N.Y.... filled in capably for starter Harry Massey last season . . . passing record showed 13 completions in 27 at-tempts in 1954 for 373 yards and 4 TD tosses . . . passing percentage was 48.1 . . . should come into his own this year with added responsibility.

LEE SWANTIC ... junior ... 5-11 ... 180 pounds 23 years old ... Len had a fine record last season completing 28 passes in 55 attempts for 355 yards and 4 TD's for an average of 51 per cent \ldots this Columbus, Georgia native could be in line for a terrific year in '55 . . . he threw three touchdown heaves against Villanova last season.

HALFBACKS

LEE CORSO ... junior ... 5-11 ... 170 pounds ... 20 years old ... hails from Miami ... Corso is called one of the finest halfbacks in the nation by Coach Tom Nugent, and he has seen plenty of them . . the gallopin' little sunshine scooter toured the turf last season for a record of 273 yards in 72 attempts for an average of 3.8 yards per carry . . . Lee scored 3 TD's, and most of this damage was done in a substitute's role, but in spring practice this year, he really kicked up his reels, and this season he should come into his own as the best in Florida and the south.

BUCK METTS ... junior ... 5-10 ... 175 pounds 19 years old ... comes from Sanford ... this

youngster is the big gun in the punting department . . . Metts punted 12 times last season for 478 yards for an average of 39.8 yards per effort . . . punting is not his only forte, however, as he is a good, fast, elusive half-back, and will do plenty of running this season.

BILLY ODOM . . . junior . . . 5-8 . . . 165 pounds . . . 20 years old . . . first saw the light of day in Mt. Dora . . . very fleet runner, used mostly as a spot player average in 1954.

BILLY WEAVER . . . sophomore . . . 6-0 . . . 180 pounds . . . 18 years old . . . here's a youngster who is tabbed by Coach Nugent as a strong possibility to develop into top flight material . . . comes from Miami.

FULLBACKS

JOE HOLT . . . sophomore . . . 5-10 . . . 180 pounder . . . hails from Graham, North Carolina . . . this 20 year old plunger will be getting the starting call at the fullback slot this year . . . Holt carried the ball 21 times and picked up 126 yards last season for an average of 5.7 yards per haul . . . though small in stature for a fullback, this husky little Tar Heel may well be the answer to Nugent's hopes at the fullback post.

BUD LEONARD . . . junior . . . 5-11 . . . 200 pounds ... 21 years old ... from Ocala ... Leonard excelled last season on defense, being one of the Seminoles' ball hawks on pass defense . . . plenty of size and good speed, he will give Holt a good run for the starting call at fullback.

JOHN GRINER ... senior ... 5-10 ... 175 pounds ... 22 years old ... from Jacksonville ... this young-ster could well have his best season in this, his final year with the Seminoles . . . Griner hauled the mail for 103 yards last season to average almost 3 yards per carry, and expects to swing into high gear this fall . . . could be a sleeper at the plunging spot.

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

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Intercollegiate Athletics Observes NCAA'S

50th Anniversary

Tercollegiate Athletics, during the current college year, 1955-56, commemorates the golden jubilee of the National Collegiate Athletic Association. The universities and colleges of the nation take pleasure in observing their national organization's 50th anniversary because the development and progress of the NCAA is the story of intercollegiate athletics' own expansion and improvement.

Fifty years is a long time. In 1905, the key offense in college football was the flying wedge ... organized track and field competition was just getting under way ... the original peach basket goal was about to be replaced by the open metal hoop in basketball but the sport still was new and strange to most sections of the nation ...

The NCAA evolved from a meeting of 13 colleges and universities called in 1905 to reorganize the game of intercollegiate football. (The rugged nature of the game was causing too many injuries and deaths.) A permanent organization was established, March 31, 1906.

Today, the NCAA is composed of more than 465 colleges and universities, athletic conferences and associations, devoted to the sound administration of intercollegiate athletics. Also today, the member institutions of the NCAA provide intercollegiate athletic competition for more than 130,000 students annually in more than 26 different sports. The men responsible for the coaching and administration of intercollegiate sports firmly believe that these competitive athletic programs are a vital part of the educational system which prepares our youth for future productive careers in society.

The universities and colleges of the nation have joined together in one Association—the NCAA for purposes of athletic discussion, legislation and administration at the national level. The NCAA is solely and completely responsive to the will of its members as expressed by their governing boards and chief executive officers. The NCAA concerns itself with any phase of college athletics which spreads across regional lines and becomes




national in character, and a majority of the member institutions concur that national action is needed.

These member institutions carry on many diversified activities through the NCAA. For example, they:

- establish and maintain athletic standards.
- formulate and publish the official playing rules for college sports.
- conduct National Collegiate Championship events in 13 sports.
- maintain the official national statistics and records of college sports.
- provide financial and other assistance to groups interested in the promotion and encouragement of intercollegiate and intramural athletics.
- conduct studies as a means of developing solutions to athletic problems; i.e., the recent surveys on television, post-season events, length and time of playing and practice seasons, admission taxes, college baseball, etc.
- participate in the U.S. Olympic and Pan American movements in matters of fund-raising, sports organization and the selection of coaches and athletes for United States teams.
- administer a group insurance program providing catastrophe medical coverage.
- maintain a large film library covering play in National Collegiate Championship events.

The development and expanded activities of the NCAA reflect the progress of intercollegiate athletics over the past half century. The NCAA and its member institutions, in the years ahead, will continue to make every effort to provide maximum opportunities for our youth to enjoy the experience of competitive athletics as an integrated part of their over-all college education.
