New Faces Theme For 1960 Opener With Richmond

Bill Peterson, a personable football scientist who helped project LSU into the national limelight during the past few seasons, makes his debut tonight as a college head coach.

Seminole fans also will greet a flock of exciting new players and an intriguing new "Flexible T" offense. Tonight's task for Coach Peterson and his young squad—16 of the top 36 players are sophomores—will be a tough opening assignment.

The University of Richmond is launching a "Four-Year Plan," a program that calls for an additional athletic expenditure of \$50,000 for each of the four years. The Southern Conference Spiders have a solid, hard-nosed nucleus of experienced players.

There is Bob Coolbaugh (85), 195-pound senior end who caught 26 passes last season; Bob Buffman (74), 240-pound co-captain at tackle who moves exceptionally well for a big man; Don Christman (50), 215-pound center who is regarded as the finest linebacker in the Southern Conference; Earl Stoudt (24), a breakaway halfback, and John Boggs (30), a polished fullback who last year won a trophy as the best blocker in his conference.

The Seminoles know they have a tough opponent. In its first meeting with Richmond, last season, FSU nursed an 8-6 lead with a minute to go in the third quarter. The Seminoles scored twice more to win, 22-6. Richmond bounced back to roll up 94 points in winning its final three games, the last one a victory over William and Mary, the team that surprised FSU at Homecoming last year.

Some promising sophomores will be making their first showing for the Garnet and Gold. New faces include quarterbacks Eddie Feely (14) and Ed Trancygier (10); halfbacks Happy Fick (13), Ken Russom (22), and Tom Hillabrand (29); ends Bill Lee (88), Lamar Elton (83), and George Tillman (82); tackles Tom Slicker (70), Marion Bronson (76), and Mike Blazovich (79); guards John Levings (65), Gene McDowell (63), and Jim Sims (62), and center Bruce Darsey (50).

The President . . .

DR. GORDON W. BLACKWELL

Dr. Gordon W. Blackwell, a 49-year-old social scientist and native of South Carolina, is the new president of Florida State University.

The former chancellor of the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina is the third president for Florida State since the institution, more than 100 years old, became a coeducational university in 1947. Dr. Doak S. Campbell and Dr. Robert M. Strozier, who died last April 20, were the others.

Dr. Blackwell is a native of Timmonsville, S. C., the son of a Baptist minister. He grew up in Spartanburg, S. C., and in 1932 was graduated summa cum laude from Furman University where he was a varsity tennis player for three years. He is a member of Kappa Sigma fraternity.

He was awarded the M. A. degree by University of North Carolina in 1933, working while there as a research assistant. He was awarded the Ph.D. by Harvard in 1940.

After research work with several government agencies from 1933 to 1936, Dr. Blackwell joined the faculty of Furman and served from 1937 to 1941. He joined the faculty of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1941 but left soon thereafter for two years of war service as community organization specialist in the Office of Civilian Defense.

He returned to North Carolina in 1944 as a professor and director of the Institute for Research in Social Science, and in 1955 was appointed Kenan Professor of UNC.

A former co-editor of the journal, "Social Forces," Dr. Blackwell is the author of several books and numerous articles in his field.

The Vice President . . .

DR. MILTON W. CAROTHERS

Dr. Milton W. Carothers calmly took over and held the University on its course as acting president following the tragic death of President Robert M. Strozier last April 20.

At that time, the 61-year-old native of Newbern, Ala., had been with FSU for 17 years. His first job here was as registrar at Florida State College for Women. In 1946, when the Tallahassee Branch of University of Florida was set up at FSCW to take care of an overflow of male students, Carothers was placed in charge of the Tallahassee Branch.

After FSU officially became coeducational in 1947, he was selected as first dean of the Graduate School. In 1958, he was appointed associate dean of the faculties and last spring was named vice president.

Before entering the administrative ranks in higher education, Carothers had a long record of service in public school work. After getting a degree from the University of Alabama, he served as school principal at Carlowville in 1919, and then at Selma, Ala. He left Selma in 1927 for Tampa where he served for five years as principal of Plant High School and five years as supervising principal of Tampa schools. From 1937 to 1942, he was director of the Division of Instruction in the State Department of Education.

He has served as president of the Florida Education Association and twice has been elected president of the Florida Association of Colleges and Universities. He also has been president of the National Association of Directors of Teacher Education and Certification and of the Southern Conference on Teacher Education.

Dr. Carothers is a camellia-grower, collects old glassware and china, and loves deep sea fishing but is a little behind on it.

ABOUT FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY

Located in Tallahassee, fast-growing Florida State University has barely been able to keep up with the demands for additional classroom and living space of the increasing numbers of students seeking admission. University officials expect an enrollment of 8,900 by the fall of 1961.

The main campus of 300 acres, stretching for a half-mile along Highway 90, includes a cluster of older buildings of Tudor Gothic architecture, with many newer buildings of functional design to the west of these. A new 11-story men's dormitory was occupied last year to supplement one of like size which has been in use eight years. Together they house more than 1,100 students.

A new eight-story women's residence hall, along with an existing structure of the same size, takes care of more than 500 students.

Among newer buildings are a \$2,000,000 Library, the School of Education Building, School of Business Building, and Tully Gymnasium. A new Mathematics-Meteorology

Building is being built and a Nuclear Research Building whose two Van De Graaff accelerators were dedicated last spring is being expanded to accommodate FSU's growing program of basic research and teaching in this field. The larger of the two accelerators is the third of its kind on this continent.

There will be a building to house a new Institute of Molecular Biophysics. The Atomic Energy Commission last spring agreed to provide FSU \$3 million during the next few years to support a research program in molecular biophysics.

Authorized by the 1851 Legislature, the institution was first established as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, and was opened on the present campus. The name was changed to Florida State College in 1901 but in 1905 became a college for women. By act of the 1947 Legislature, Florida State College for women again became coeducational and was renamed Florida State University.

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VAUGHN MANCHA

Whenever Alabama disciples gather to talk football, the conversation invariably gets around to Vaughn Hall Mancha, a living symbol of the Crimson Tide's great teams of the midforties.

Mancha is practically as legendary in Alabama football circles as Don Hutson and Harry Gilmer. For Florida State University's personable director of athletics was a 240-pound All-Southeastern Conference center at Alabama for four seasons (1944-47) and everyone's All-America center.

Mancha was a solid choice to return to FSU as athletic director in November, 1959, ending a three-year absence from the Seminole campus. He gained wide popularity with Florida State officials and fans while serving as line coach at FSU

From 1952 through 1956.

Born in Sugar Valley, Ga., in 1921, Mancha moved to Birmingham at an early age. He entered Alabama in 1944, when he was issued jersey No. 41, a number Alabama's football opponents tried to dodge for four years. During Mancha's four seasons, Alabama rolled to a 30-9-2 record and played in three major bowl games. Vaughn was a starter when the Crimson Tide met Duke in the 1945 Sugar Bowl, Southern Cal in the 1946 Rose Bowl, and Texas in the 1948 Sugar Bowl.

Mancha earned a B.S. Degree in Education at Alabama in 1947 and played with the professional Boston Yankees in 1948. In 1949, he returned to Alabama to earn a Masters Degree in Education. Turning to coaching, Mancha put in a highly-successful three-year tenure as head coach and athletic director at Livingston (Ala.) State.

Mancha first came to Florida State in 1952 as assistant football coach and also served as an assistant professor of Physical Education. In 1957, he went to Columbia University as an assistant football coach and associate member of the Department of Physical Education, positions he held for three years. While at Columbia, he completed all work for the Doctorate with the exception of the dissertation.

The Head Coach . . . BILL PETERSON

Florida State University begins a new era of football this season under the leadership of 40-year-old Bill Peterson, one of the most personable head coaches in the game.

A former offensive line coach at Louisiana State University, Peterson was the highly-popular choice of Florida State officials and fans to become the Seminoles' fifth modern-day head football coach last Dec. 7. He has impressed Sunshine State football fans from Pensacola to Miami in scores of personal appearances since his arrival in Tallahassee.

Peterson, a sincere, straight-shooting person who bears a striking resemblance to television's Gene Barry (Bat Masterson), has been associated with success throughout his coaching career.

Following his graduation in 1946 from Ohio Northern University—he was a standout end and captain in his senior year—he was a successful high school coach for 10 years in Ohio. His teams at Forest, Wapakoneta, and Mansfield, Ohio, sported a combined won-lost record of 51-22-3. Two of his Mansfield elevens won Ohio state high school championships.

In 1955, Peterson was the only assistant coach that LSU's Paul Dietzel brought with him to the LSU campus. Peterson was credited with obtaining many of the players who boosted Louisiana State into the top ranks of collegiate football. LSU's 1958 team won the national championship and defeated Clemson in the 1959 Sugar Bowl. The 1959 Tigers compiled a 9-1 record and were ranked No. 3 nationally.

A native of Toronto, Ohio, Coach Peterson has done graduate work at both West Virginia University and LSU.

THE FSU COACHING STAFF

DICK FLOWERS, a native of Mobile, Ala., is in his second season on the FSU football staff. A graduate of Alabama, where he was a first-team tackle from 1945-48, Flowers played in the 1945 Rose Bowl and 1947 Sugar Bowl games. He was an assistant coach at Alabama in 1949-50 and at LSU in 1951-52. He coached one year at Live Oak, Fla., High School (1953) and was out of coaching in 1954 before taking over as head coach and athletic director at Gainesville, Fla., High School.

BOB HARBISON, in terms of longevity, is the real veteran of the Seminole coaching staff. Harbison is in his 13th season. In his playing days, Bob was an outstanding guard for the late Bo McMillin at Indiana University from 1945-47. A native of Evansville, Ind., Harbison came to Florida State in 1948. He is credited with developing Little All-America linemen Bill Dawkins in 1951 and former Seminole coach Hugh Adams, in 1949.

KEN MEYER is in his first season as a member of the FSU staff. He joined the Seminoles prior to spring practice after serving two years as an assistant coach at Wake Forest and six years as backfield assistant at Denison University, Granville, Ohio. Meyer was a standout halfback at Denison for three years. During his first two seasons, Denison compiled a 19-game winning streak under Woody Hayes, now head coach at Ohio State. Ken was born in Erie, Pa., but attended high school in Ashtabula, Ohio.

JOHN COATTA, one of the sharpest passing quarterbacks in Big Ten history, came to Florida State last year from Wisconsin. He was an assistant coach with the Badgers for four years. A native of Dearborn, Mich., Coatta was a passing whiz for Coach Ivy Williamson at Wisconsin from 1949-51. In 1950, John set an all-time Big Ten pass completion record with a .642 percentage. He was named to the All-Big Ten and All-Midwest honor teams following the 1951 season.

DON JAMES has packed a lot of football experience into his 27 years. The Massillon, Ohio, native came to Florida State last year from Southwest Miami High School, where he was backfield coach in 1957 and 1958. Don was an outstanding high school quarterback at Massillon, playing under Chuck Mather and leading Massillon to two state championships. He set passing records as a quarterback for the University of Miami (Fla.) in 1952 and 1953.

VINCE GIBSON, one of the toughest guards in Florida State's relatively brief football background, is a new varsity coach. Vince, who served as assistant freshman coach in 1959, had the knack for recovering fumbles and slipping through to block punts when he performed for the Seminoles in 1954 and 1955. Following his graduation from Florida State, Vince became line coach and basketball and track coach at South Georgia College. He is a native of Birmingham, Ala.

BUBBA McGOWAN, who also serves as head tennis coach at FSU, has the distinction of being the first person to have coached at both the University of Florida and Florida State University. A former left halfback at Florida—he played as a freshman and sophomore under Bear Wolf and as a junior and senior under Bob Woodruff—McGowan was Florida's freshman backfield coach in 1952. The Dothan, Ala., native coached the Fort Jackson, S. C., Army team in 1953-54 and was track coach and football assistant at Gainesville High School from 1955-58.

CHARLIE LaPRADD, second oldest member in terms of service on the FSU staff, is in his second year as head freshman coach. The former All-America tackle at Florida (1952) led FSU's frosh to a perfect 4-0 season in 1959. A native of St. Augustine, Charlie was graduated from Florida in 1953 before serving in the Air Force. He was a graduate assistant at FSU in 1956 and became a full member of the staff in 1957.





PENALTIES

- OFFSIDE by either team; Violation of scrimmage or free kick formation; Encroachment on neutral zone —Loss of Five Yards.
- 2. ILLEGAL PROCEDURE, POSITION OR SUBSTITUTION—Putting ball in play before Referee signals "Readyfor-play"; Failure to complete substitution before play starts; Player out of bounds when scrimmage begins; Failure to maintain proper alignment of offensive team when ball is snapped; False start or simulating start of a play; Taking more than two steps after Fair Catch is made; Player on line receiving snap—Loss of Five Yards.
- ILLEGAL MOTION—Offensive player illegally in motion when ball is snapped—Loss of Five Yards.
- ILLEGAL SHIFT—Failure to stop one full second following shift—Loss of Fifteen Yards.
- ILLEGAL RETURN of substitute not previously disqualified—Loss of Fifteen Yards.
- 6. ILLEGAL DELAY OF GAME; Taking more than four times out during either half (except for replacement of injured player)—Loss of Five Yards. Team not ready to play at start of either half—Loss of Fifteen Yards.

- 7. PERSONAL FOUL Tackling or blocking defensive player who has made fair catch; Piling on; Hurdling: Grasping face mask of opponent; Tackling player out of bounds, or running into player obviously out of play; Striking an opponent with fist, forearm, elbow or locked hands; Kicking or kneeing—Loss of Fifteen Yards (Flagrant offenders will be disqualified.)



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

One of the big factors in the success of Florida State University athletics is the support given by the school's booster organization, Seminole Boosters, Inc.

This organization—devoted entirely to assisting FSU in athletic and scholarship programs, with particular emphasis on athletics—is comprised of persons interested in FSU athletics, many of whom never actually attended the school. Membership is open to everyone with a sincere interest in the University's athletic welfare.

Minimum annual dues are \$10, but many persons see fit to contribute more. This money is handled directly through the University treasurer's office. Members of Seminole Boosters receive a colorful automobile license plate (provides reserved parking at stadium), membership card, a publication called "The Grandstand Coach," and certain priorities on season and individual tickets.

Godfrey Smith is the current president of Seminole Boosters, Inc. Hard-working executive secretary of the organization is Robert L. Bannerman, Jr., director of FSU alumni affairs.





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
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BAY-SEMINOLE NETWORK

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Play-by-play announcer for the games is Charlie Harville, sports director of WFMY-TV in Greensboro, N. C., who is recognized as one of the nation's finest in his field. A native of High Point, N. C., Harville first called the action for Seminole games in 1959 after handling broadcasts for the University of Virginia, the Washington Redskins, and Atlantic Coast Conference regional television.

Harville's co-worker is Walt Dunbar, a veteran of 10 years of broadcasting sports in New England states and sports director for the past three years of WFGA-TV in Jacksonville, Fla. A native of Brockton, Mass., Dunbar will do the pre-game, halftime, and "time-out" color commentary for the games.

The network is sponsored by the Bay Petroleum Co. with some 15 stations forming the basic portion of the network. Other stations are added, with the number varying with each game.

Broadcasts of the games are produced by the Galen E. Broyles Co. of Denver, Colo.




