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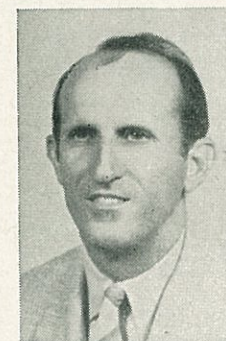


FSU - Miami Could Be A Bruising Battle

Before king football bobbed into the air this fall, Florida State—on the rise to fame in recent years and boasting talent from three undefeated freshman teams in a row—predicted it would have one of its best grid machines in history.

This glowing optimism was significant because it came on the heels of a 1961 campaign which found the Fighting Tribe of Tallahassee knocking off Georgia and deadlocking Florida, both Southeastern Conference teams.



Grounds for the early optimism is now reflected in the three ball games waged by the Seminoles.

So far nobody has come even close to tarnishing FSU's goal line. Offensively, they've been going wild both in the air and on the ground. Ninety-one slaughtering points have been tallied on opponents as compared to 93 scored all last season. State has eaten up 1,250 yards rushing and passing.

Against Kentucky, through failing to score, FSU was complete master of the game, and just missed tallying on each occasion in four deep penetrations into Wildcat territory.

In slamming the door shut in the enemy's face, Florida State has rocketed to the front as one of the nation's top defensive teams. Only 39 passing yards per game have been racked up on the Seminoles in three battles. On the ground, State has given up just 66 yards per game. Kentucky of the Southeastern Conference was held to a scant 22 rushing yards. The Citadel had a minus two-yards passing.

Along with their spectacular three-team attack, sinewy line and rugged pass defense, the Peterson coached Seminoles have two dangerous quarterbacks to throw at the Hurricanes — Eddie Feely, total offense leader for the past two years, and a six foot, five inch giant named Steve Tensi, who

has been passing like a demon this fall. Coach Peterson has found a gold nugget in the lanky Tensi. Against the Citadel, the blond sophomore had a perfect passing record, chunking for 116 yards and three touchdowns.

Feely, who directs the Chiefs (first string), no doubt will start the game against Miami. The Fox, as they've dubbed him (because he's so fast and elusive), has completed 22 aerials for 338 yards and three touchdowns. He's also one of FSU's leading ball carriers and the team's leading TD grabber.

FSU's top runner has been fullback Marion Roberts. The Seminoles boast real halfback speed, something they've lacked for two years. Top ball carriers among the halves are Keith Kinderman, a real speed demon at 205 pounds, and Ken Russom, a scat back. They have plenty of experience behind them.

You can look for another bruising battle tonight. It's no secret that the Seminoles have been pointing for this game, hoping to take another big step upward on their rise-to-fame ladder.

As for the Hurricanes, they would like nothing better than to add Florida State to their list of victims and continue as an unbeaten, united team of the nation. Miami will be going for three in a row, having whipped Pitt, a powerhouse of the East, and Texas Christian, a definite threat for the Southwest Conference title.

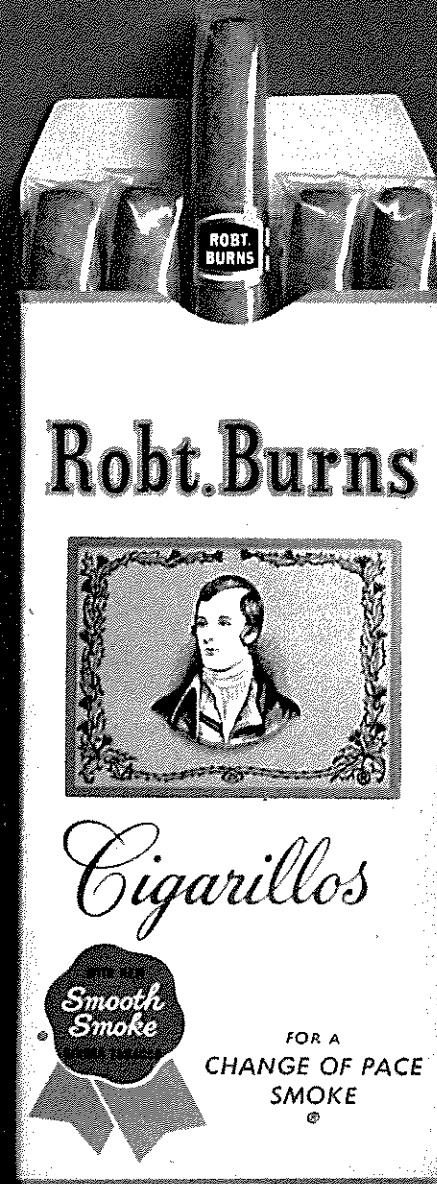
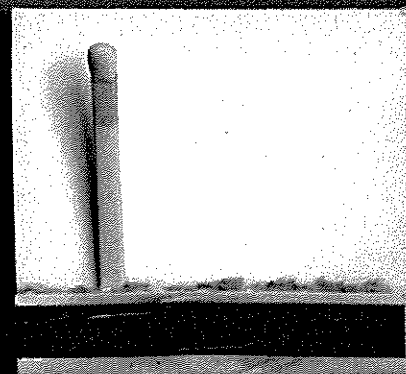
George Mira, who led Miami in its triumphs over Pitt and Texas Christian, goes into tonight's game with a total offensive mark of 454 yards. He's the first football player in University of Miami history to account for more than 200 yards per game in two successive football games. Mira is Miami's rushing leader also with 126 yards, followed by big Nick Ryder with 102. Mira has a 6.3 average per jab, and Ryder, 5.1.

Captain Ben Rizzo and Nick Spinelli are tied for first in the scoring column, each with 12 points. Spinelli leads pass receivers with seven catches, followed by Rizzo with five.

Much Ado in '62

College football in 1962 is being moulded by the personalities of the men who coach it, by the talent of the men who play it, and by one interesting change in the rules.

The rule change permits the kicking team to down the ball within the opponent's 10 yard line. Previously this was a touchback, bringing the ball out to the 20 yard line. The new refinement puts an even high premium on punting, and brings into play downfield blocking where previously a polite game of tag was played.

It puts a premium, too, on catching the ball and running it out—and that could make for excitement in the form of fumbles and more scoring opportunities.

There now seems to be general agreement that the rule on substitutions is free enough to bring into action all the talent that a team has, when it needs it. It isn't platoon football. It is tribe football.

There is a subtle change that has been under way for some time and only now is coming into full flower. That is the requirement that a quarterback should be something more than just a good thrower. He must be a tailback as well, a resourceful and heady runner, particularly if effective passes are to develop out of plays that start out as sweeps.

All this put together—more punting, more opportunities for fumbles in the shadow of the goal line, fluid substitutions, quarterbacks who both pass and run—adds up to a sparkling offensive game.

Wider use of the winged-T and of the lone-some end has also opened up the college game for the better. Although the single wing still has its staunch adherents—and when beautifully executed there isn't a prettier game—the trend to the T with all its variations continues unabated.

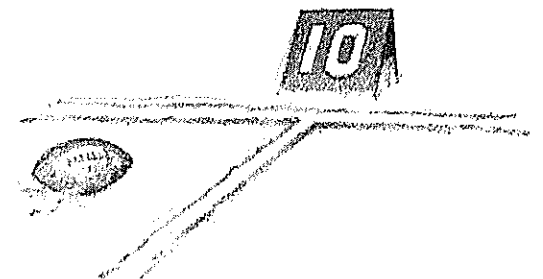


Just as the offense has become more brilliant, so, too, has the defense. The "Oklahoma style" defense of five men on the line with the other six positioned to guard against passes or runs has been giving way to a six-man front with the tackles wide. There is even a tendency to an eight-man front line on defense.

Along with all these theories and the touchback rule change making for an open, interesting game there has been a determination on the part of officialdom to protect the players from injury. Too many men were hurt last year, with the result that orders went out to enforce to the letter the rules against piling on the ball carrier, and clipping. That explains the whistle blowing you hear.

There is mathematical proof that all these developments are a delight to behold. Attendance at college football games in 1961 increased for the eighth consecutive year to an all-time record total of 20,677,604 in games at 616 senior colleges. This was 274,195 more spectators than set the previous attendance record in 1960. Everything points to another new high mark in 1962.

So now spread before you is the game of football. It is as old as recorded history—the combination of willing men and a ball that can be kicked. It is also eternally new, changing subtly through the years, but retaining an emotional hold on spectators and participants alike. The bond that unites everyone within a stadium, regardless of partisanship, comes from the season of the year, from friendships and campus memories, from the vivid colors on the field, and above all from the high drama of the game itself.





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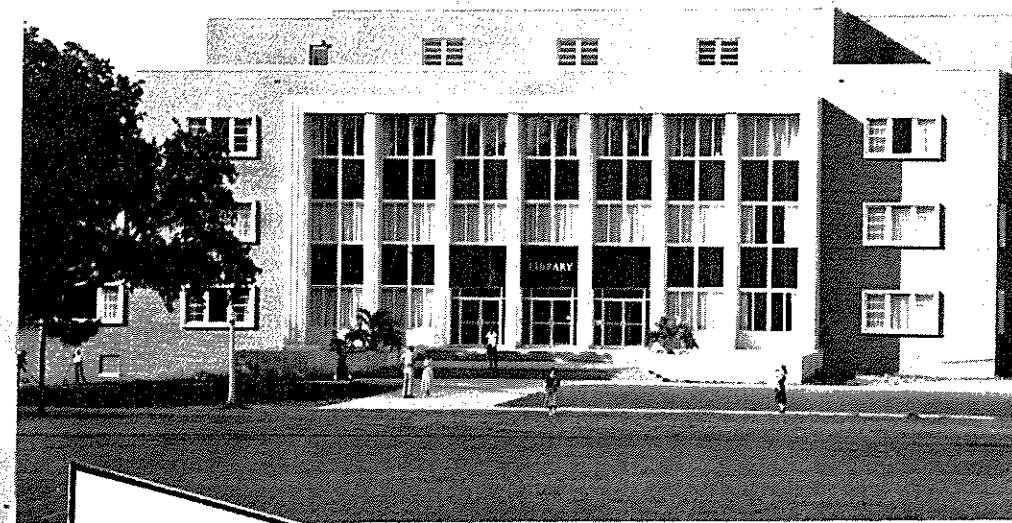
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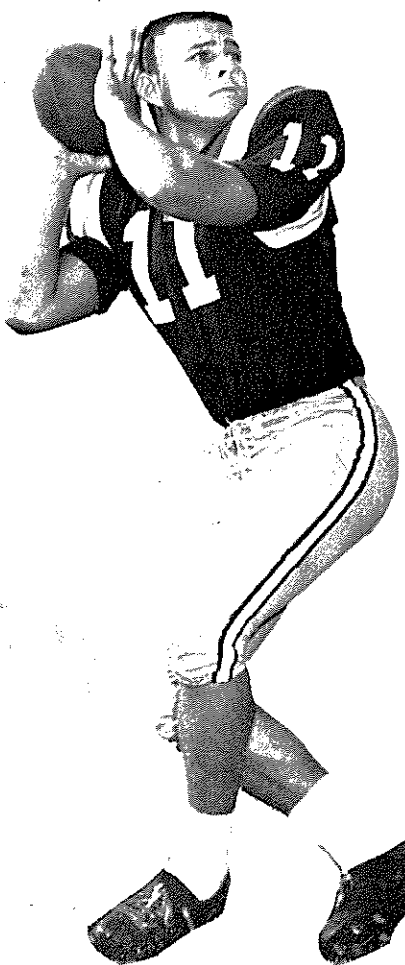

Football Does Help Build Character!

There is some dispute whether football builds character. Even coaches generally concede that this job already has been done — or botched up — in the home, in the church and in the school by the time they get hold of a college football player.

There's no doubt, though, that football gives a young man certain qualities and aptitudes to cope better than a non-football citizen with the complex problems of modern living.



Take the new greater Miami telephone directory, for instance. It not only takes an ex-football tackle to lift it, but only an oldtime quarterback can use it.

He's the only person qualified to succeed in life today. The oldtime quarterback is the only guy who now can get anybody on the telephone he wants.

We must have tried for 15 minutes to get Reynold Jarvis on the phone the day we got our new telephone directory before giving up in despair. It may sound strange why we were trying to get Reynold Jarvis on the telephone because we don't even know the guy. But we also tried to get Kurt Motors on the phone, too, and we don't even drive a car.

To explain our psychiatric behavior, we were practicing to call up U-M football coach Andy Gustafson at home — something we often do in an emergency in pursuit of our journalistic sports writing duties and curiosity.

Getting Andy on the phone now is harder than getting George Mira on an action pass play.

Andy's unlisted telephone number has been changed from something like a simple memorable MOhawk 4-6200 to something like 377-5410 (but if you're a disgruntled fan who wants to bark and growl at Andy about some play don't call that number because it's actually the Humane Society and they'll probably haul you in.)

It was easy when you just dialed something like MOhawk 4-6200, for a football writer to do his job and give the reading public the lowdown on the Hurricanes right from the oracle's mouth.

Now to get Gustafson on the phone at his home

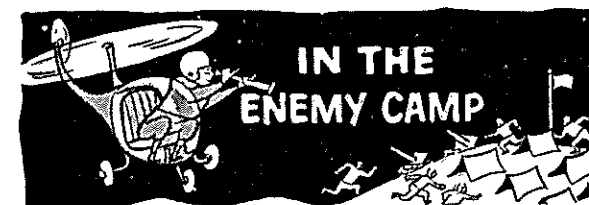
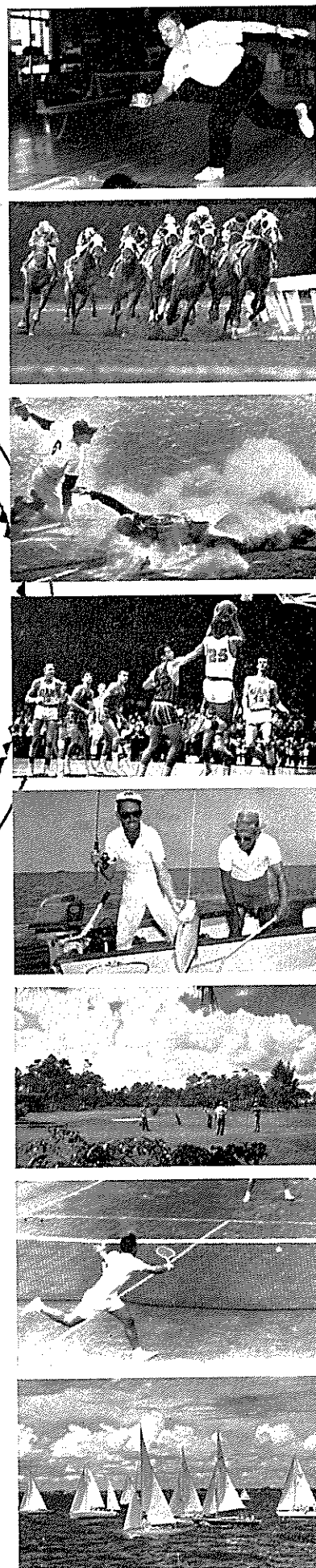


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"The Best Newspaper Under The Sun"

THINGS WERE NOT SO ROSY for some of U of Miami's future foes last week but they still show more wins than losses. Florida State, in for tonight's game, ran up the biggest score, and is one of the few unscored upon teams in the nation.

LSU, next for Miami, was looking ahead to this week's TV appearance with Georgia Tech and had to rally to tie stubborn Rice, 6-6. LSU appeared vulnerable to passing. Tech's Lothridge will explore that idea this week and it may provide some ground work on which George Mira can operate in Baton Rouge the night of Oct. 13.

Maryland's Dick Shiner is developing into quite a passer and he steered the Terps to their second straight win, 13-2 over defensive minded Wake Forest. North Carolina State will be more of a test this week but the Terps, deep and under no real pressure to date, should be ready.

Air Force outplayed mighty Penn State much of the way before bowing 20-6 to superior manpower. The Falcons may do better against S.M.U. this week since the Texans only have two good units, not three as is the case with the roaring Lions.

Coach Bradshaw says his Kentucky Wildcats are tough for any foe. No one believed him but Ole Miss knows. The score there was 14-0 after a real fight. Auburn, which passed its way past Tennessee, will be favored this week but the Wildcats are not tabby cats, will get even meaner.

Alabama, which murdered Tulane last week, will win as it pleases over Georgia. The Tide has a setup schedule until mid-season and will go into its major tests, refreshed but untested.

Northwestern rested last week, launches conference play against sub par Illinois. The Purple Wildcats are a definite threat for the Big Ten crown, could come here Nov. 24 on their way to the Rose Bowl.

Florida's loss to Georgia Tech 17-0 was a bitter

one for the Gators, who can't get their passing untracked and hence can't take full advantage of the ball carrying potential of one of the finest set of running backs anywhere around. At that, Tech crowded its scoring into a nine minute space when the Gators were temporarily off balance. For nearly 28 minutes of the first half, Florida appeared a mite better.

Duke, breaking even in two games, has not been exactly awesome and the Gators, rebounding, should come through. Duke doesn't have the passing or fleetness of backs to bother a Florida team which is powerful defensively against any save the most mobile of foes.

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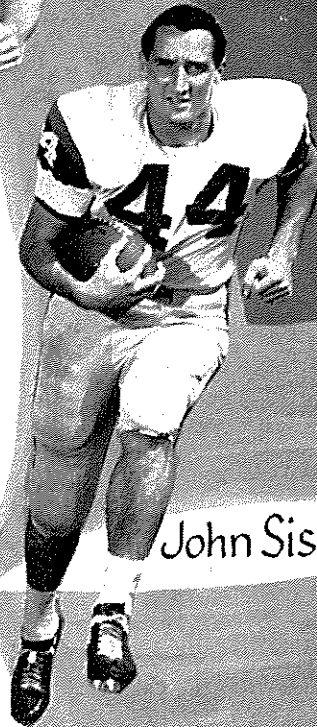
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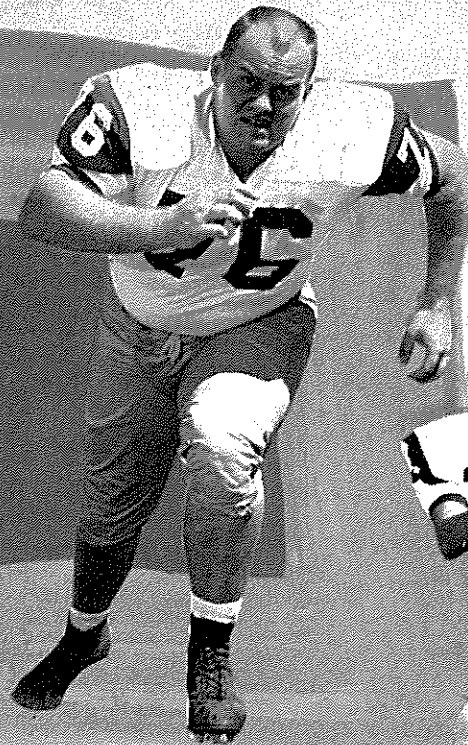

WALTER KICHEFSKI

For two decades, Walter Kichefski has been associated with University of Miami as a player and coach. He played varsity football on the 1936-1938-1939 Hurricane eleven, and won himself a place among all-time Miami end greats. He played with the Pitt Steelers 1940 through 1942, and has developed many great ends for Miami.

JIM ROOT

Jim is serving his third year as a member of the University of Miami coaching staff, coming to the Hurricanes from Tulane. The 29-year-old Root starred as a quarterback 1949 through 1952 at Miami U. of Ohio. Jim quarterbacked the Chicago Cardinals in 1953, 1956 and 1957, and played with the Ottawa Rough Riders of the Canadian Pro league in 1954.



ED KENSER

Kensler is serving his 2nd year on the University of Miami coaching staff, coming to the Hurricanes from University of North Carolina, where he first served as line coach under the late Jim Tatum and then later under Jim Hickey. During his college days, Kensler played tackle, guard and center under Tatum on Maryland's greatest teams and won All-Conference honors.



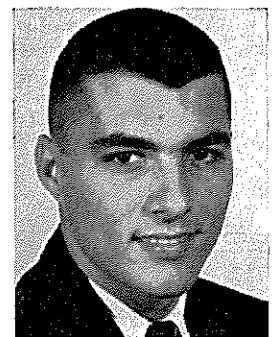
BILL CRUTCHFIELD

This fall marks Bill Crutchfield's third with the Hurricanes. He's defensive backfield coach. Bill came to Miami in 1960 after serving in various coaching capacities at Wake Forest, Furman, Presbyterian, Atlantic Christian College and North Carolina, where he also played fullback for the Tar Heels in 1947.



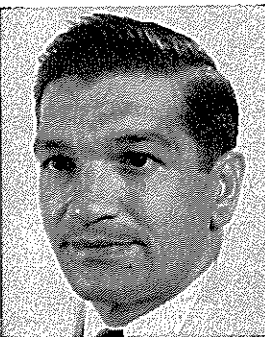
FRAN CURCI

ARMAND VARI

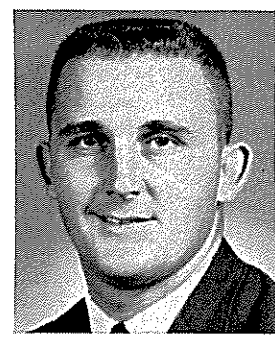

BILL BRICKMAN

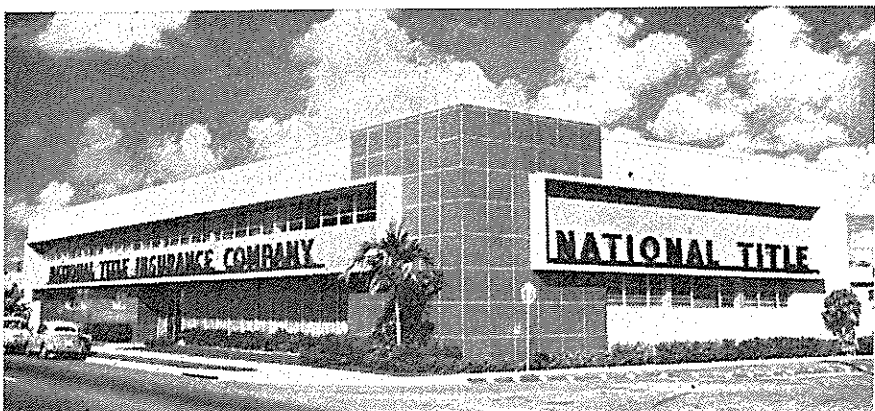

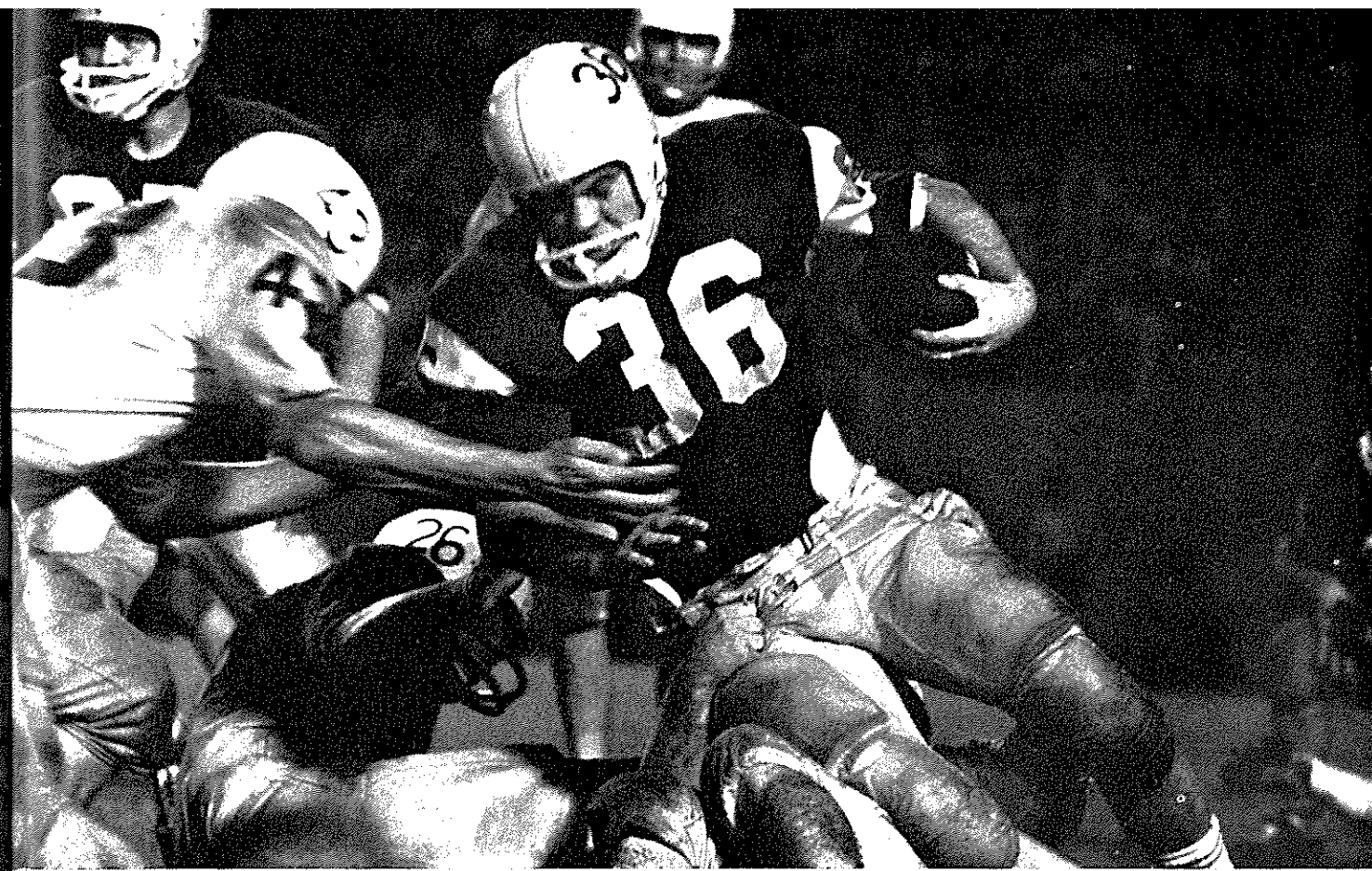

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ROBERT HART

Center and guard from Munster, Ind. . . . Junior . . . Arts and Sciences . . . Listed No. 4 man on the depth chart at center and also eyed as a possible guard replacement at the start of last season, Hart made his varsity debut in the third battle against Penn State when injuries to higher ups came early and often and somewhat depleted the middle of the line. The next week against Navy he was all over the field making thundering tackles — and climaxed the game as one of Miami's defensive leaders with nine tackles. Bob played on Miami's alternate unit at guard against Colorado, North Carolina, Georgia and Tulane, and did center sub duty in the Northwestern and Florida battles, and the Liberty Bowl game against Syracuse. This fall, he's being eyed for guard and center duty again. He's a nephew of former world tennis champion, Doris Hart. High school — Bishop Noll . . . high

school coach — John Quinn. Bob was a leader in high school activities and was chief justice of the student administration.

BRUCE BRINKOS

Left guard from McKeesport, Pa. . . . Sophomore . . . Education . . . Brinkos was a high school All-America selection at guard, and also made the Big 33, All-State and played in the Junior Chamber of Commerce All-Star game in Pennsylvania. He was his team's most valuable player. Coming to Miami with a reputation as a walloping hitter on defense and tremendous blocker on offense, Bruce added to this with an outstanding performance on the frosh squad. During spring work, he suffered a hair-line break of a bone in his leg and missed much of the spring work. As a result, he failed to make a place for himself on one of the top two playing units in the preliminary alignment of talent. Coaches, however, feel that he is very likely to carve out a spot on one of the top units before the season is well under way. High school—McKeesport . . . high school coach—Harold Weigle.

RAY TIMMONS

Quarterback from Homestead, Fla. . . . Senior . . . Business Administration . . . Most of Racey's action to date has been on defense. As a sophomore, the South Floridian was third highest among backs in the tackling department and was Miami's big pass stealer, grabbing seven to equal UM's all-time record and tie for the national leadership (two of the interceptions came against Syracuse, two others were against Florida). Last fall, Timmons virtually dropped out of sight as a pass interceptor, stealing only one. The lone air burglary came against Kentucky. His best defensive games of '61 were against Florida, Colorado, Navy and Kentucky—on each occasion he ranked among the five top men making tackles. One of Racey's few offensive moments of last fall came against Penn State when he quarterbacked and tossed a two-point conversion pass. Once again this season, main chores of the Homestead gridders will be defense—and he could become one of the toughest deep backs in the southeastern part of the United States. He found himself as a rugged, crashing backfield defender in 1962 spring drills—finishing as one of the most potent on the squad. Racey was a two-way player as freshman, operating as first string

ROBERT DENTEL

Center from Pittsburgh, Pa. . . . Senior . . . Business Administration . . . nickname, Bob . . . Bob is an ex-fullback who made good as a center. Playing fullback both as a high schooler and freshman, Dentel was shifted to center in his sophomore year, becoming one of Miami's hardest hitters on defense and finishing the year as a starter. His top performance of '60 was against Syracuse when he crashed through for 14 tackles and assists, and recovered a fumble. Counted on again to be a line standout last fall, Dentel was injured in a freak accident in the second game against Kentucky while chasing a Wildcat out of bounds and saw no more action the rest of the year. He missed 1962 spring drills. High school — Central Catholic . . . honors won in high school — All-Catholic, All-City . . . high school coach — James Flynn.

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JOHN BENNETT

Right end from Clifton Heights, Pa. . . . Junior . . . Business Administration . . . John is winding up as a Jack Of All Trades in football. In high school he played quarterback and halfback, as a freshman he was a signal caller while his first varsity year in 1961 found him running from both quarterback and halfback. This fall, he operates from an entirely new position — end. While playing two backfield positions last season, the hard-running John scored two touchdowns, completed seven of 13 passes for 153 yards (one for a TD) and picked up 142 yards rushing. He was one of the hardest driving of all Miami halfbacks. His first TD came from two yards out in the Kentucky game as he carried several tacklers with him into the end zone in a real bull-like charge. High school — Clifton Heights . . . honors won in high school—All-Delaware County. All-East Delaware County, voted top star in the post season All-Star game in Delaware County . . . high school coach—Carmen Libertore . . . hobbies—fishing, hunting, skin-diving.

ROWLAND BENSON

Right tackle from Miami, Fla. . . . Junior . . . Business Administration . . . Benson, a local boy from Miami Edison, is the biggest man on the squad—and could become one of the big surprises of Miami's 1962 line. Rollie is a tower of offensive strength, being exceptionally mobile for a big man. In spring practice, he displayed potentials of developing into a first string tackle. High school—Miami Edison . . . honors won in high school—All-City in football, All-City in track . . . high school coach—Heywood Fowle . . . hobby—fishing.

JOHN WILBER

Right halfback from Port Clinton, Ohio . . . Sophomore . . . Arts and Sciences . . . high school Port Clinton . . . honors won in high school—All-Conference, All-Area, named most valuable back on team . . . high school coach—Joe Lukac. John was an oboe player in his high school orchestra and band, in addition to participating in sports. As a freshman footballer last year, he scored two touchdowns. In the Mexico Poly Tech game, John galloped 55 yards to the goal after catching a screen pass, and against Florida lunged over from the one-yard line.

DAVE ZELCH

Quarterback from East Liverpool, Ohio . . . Junior . . . Education . . . Dave, a heavy hitter, has been playing defense since coming to the Hurricanes and has shown promise in pass defense. Most of his frosh campaign found him concentrating on defense, while he received some experience in this phase of the game with the varsity in 1961 before being shelved with an injury—and then later saw reserve action in the Liberty Bowl battle against Syracuse. His best play as a sophomore came in Miami's walloping triumph over Penn State. This fall, Zelch will substitute for quarterbacks on defense. High school—East Liverpool . . . honors won in high school—All-County . . . high school coach—Louis Venditti . . . hobbies—swimming and horseback riding.

MICHAEL SOLTIS

Left tackle from Westland, Pa. . . . Senior . . . Arts & Sciences . . . Mike played briefly as a sophomore two years ago (saw limited action against Pitt, South Carolina and Boston College), while his play last fall was limited to two games—Penn State and Georgia. Against the latter, he tied with Leo Lillimagi, Stan Maluty and Frank Reinhart as second best on defense (each made four tackles) . . . high school—Hickory . . . honors won in high school—All-Conference, All-WPIAL, honorable mention All-Big 33 . . . high school coach—Eugene Seiling.

WILLIAM SPARKS

Left end from Miami, Fla. . . . Junior . . . Education . . . Bill was a quarterback in high school and halfback as a freshman, but was shifted to end for his first varsity year. Even behind All-America Bill Miller and Frank Reinhart, he was able to get in a few playing moments and got over that hump of varsity inexperience while learning to play a new position. Sparks was one of the big pass catching guns of 1962 spring practice (snared two aerials in spring game). High school—Miami Jackson . . . honors won in high school—second team All-City. . . . high school coach—Roy French.

WILLIAM SPEAR

Left end from Cleveland, Ohio . . . Sophomore . . . Business Administration . . . Bill made a name for himself as a pass catcher in high school and continued to show exceptional potential in this phase of the game as a freshman and in 1962 spring drills. He was one of the top pass receivers of the spring, displaying signs of tremendous ability to snag the ball, and elusive running talents after catching a pass. He'll be a threat to the opposition anytime he goes into action.

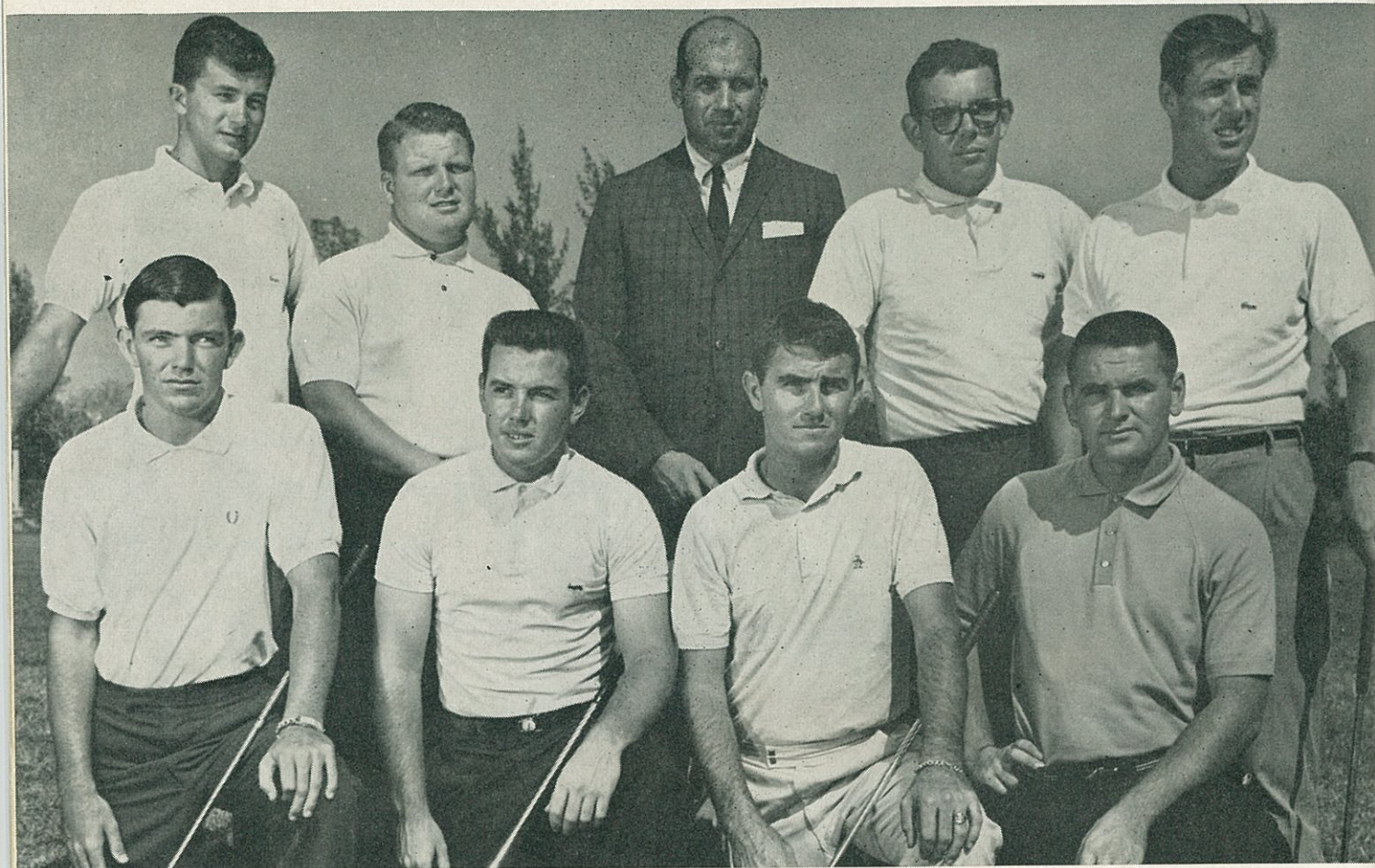

The U. of M. Invitational Golf Tournament will be going into its seventh year and will feature teams from Maryland, Boston, Michigan and Illinois.

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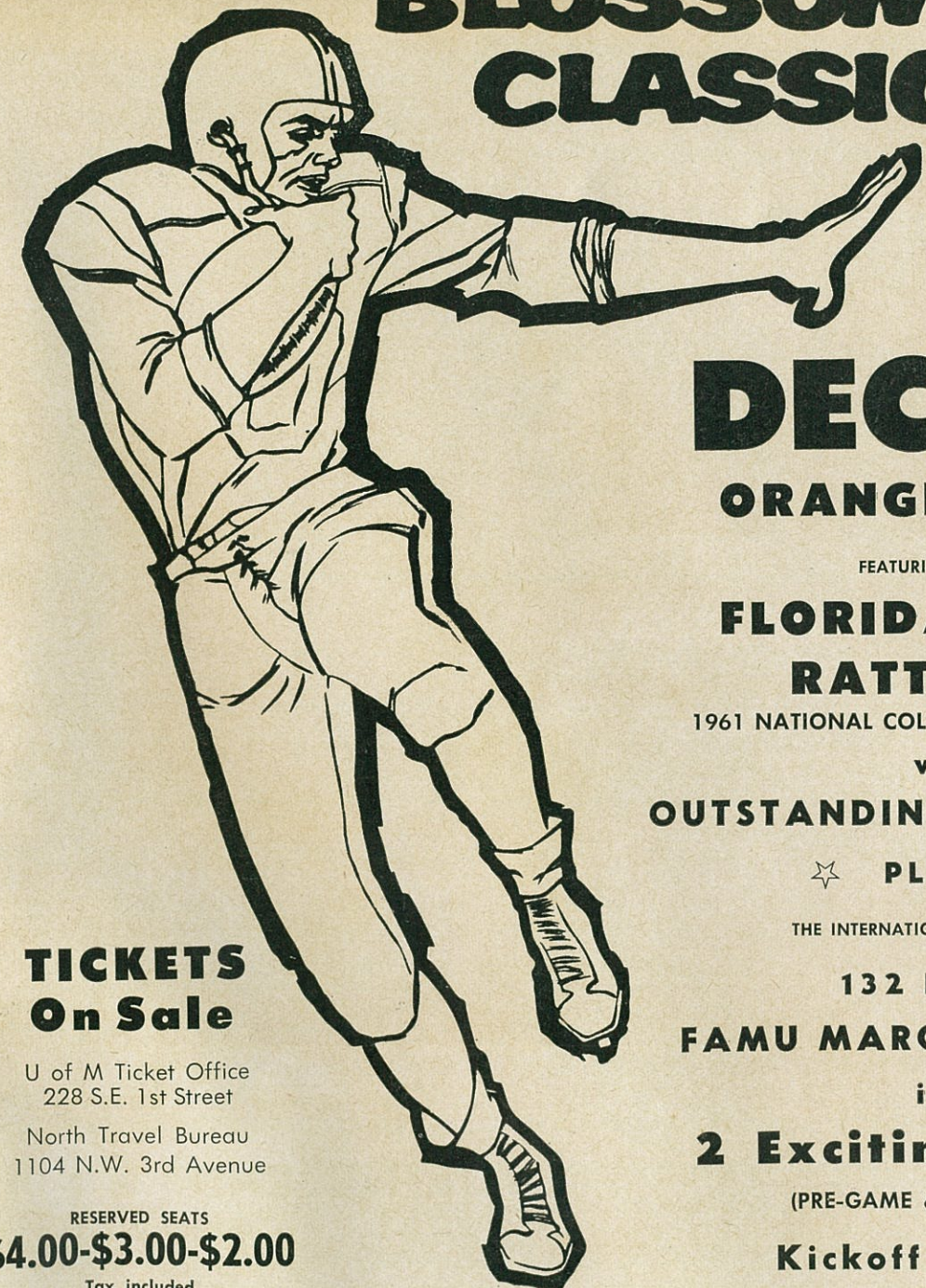
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
