This renewal of relations game with powerful Florida State tonight marks the beginning of a new chapter in University of Miami football history.

It's the commencement of Charlie Tate's career as Miami gridiron boss, the Hurricanes first new

head coach in 18 years.

Virtually all of the assistants are new . . . the player talent is sophomore laden ... a new offense—the Flip Flop—will be unveiled . . . you'll watch the game under some new Intercollegiate

Great excitement should come from this eleventh re-

newal of relations game be-tween Miami and Florida State. The Hurricane-Seminole rivalry has flared into one of hottest natural rivalries in the nation, and a gigantic struggle to the finish is certain to come.

Florida State, bursting at the seams with experience and holding the role of favorite, is here tonight with 27 sturdy lettermen, and most of the squad which last year spoiled Miami's opener, 24 to 0—and started the Hurricanes on a toboggan ride that ended in a 3-7 seasonal record.

The '64 grid edition of FSU is hailed by Coach Bill Peterson as the best in Florida State history. Only last week, he told Seminole Boosters: "FSU has possibly the best combination of football players that the school will have in the next 10 years.

All of these notes of optimism coming out of the Tallahassee camp, could hardly be hailed as jubilant news to ardent UM pigskin fans.

To meet this football giant from FSU, Miami has a young, inexperienced team. Among a squad of 54 pigskinners, close to 30 of them are sophomores and junior college transfers who have never played a game of varsity football.

When the kickoff comes tonight, only a handful of the men who played a prominent part on Miami's team last year will be seen. Fullback Peter Banaszak has returned to fullback, Russell Smith will be active in a "Floating Back" role, and a couple of linemen-including the sinewy All-American guard candidate Bruce Brinkos-will be in there mixing it with the powerful Seminoles.

New talent in the offensive backfield include Rick Swan, junior college transfer from California, and Bob Biletnikoff, hefty sophomore possessing running talent . . . Robert Domke, sophomore running back . . . Fred Cassidy, sophomore fullback . . . Don Clancy, sophomore wingback.

While Miami's quad is bubbling with a foaming sea of rookies, enthusiasm is at its highest pitch in many a year and prospects for a fiery, fighting Hurricane eleven appear a certainty. The defense could be the toughest seen at Miami in the past decade.

Florida State has all kind of stars to toss at the young Hurricanes . . . men who have been through the fire. Among the galaxy of Seminole stars are quarterback and passing ace, Steve Tensi, and dynamic flanker back Fred Biletnikoff, the two men who helped ruin the Hurricanes last year. The latter scored all three TDs against Miami in 1963, catching two Tensi TD passes and burglarizing an aerial for a 99-yard scoring dash.

Tonight, the brilliant Biletnikoff will be FSU's flanker back again, and his young brother, Bob, will be one of the UM quarterbacks.

Tensi, a great pro prospect and a man able to give FSU a powerful air arm, is one of two brilliant field generals the Seminoles will shoot at the Hurricanes. The other is Ed Pritchett. Last spring, Peterson said he had a problem at quarterback, but indicated that its the type most coaches wouldn't mind having. He hailed Tensi and Pritchett two of the best quarterbacks to be found on one team. He said: "We may have trouble trying to figure out which one to play. Tensi is a great passer and Pritchett a fine runner, so we may use both and let our opponents try to solve this one."

Against Miami last year, the spectacular Tensi completed 13 of 20 passes for 149 yards. FSU has all of its pass receivers back from last year.

IF YOU DON'T THINK clock-watching is an art, pay attention to the college football coaches on the field today.

Coaches will be depending more and more on the game clock this year as a result of the new substitution rule enacted by the Football Rules Committee of the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

The rule reads:

Any number of players may be replaced by either team during an intermission between periods. When the game clock is stopped during a period (for any reason) any number of substitutes may enter the game before the ball is put in play. When the game clock is running, two players of each team may enter the game before the ball is put in play.

Basically, the rule provides for two changes from 1963:

(1) When the clock is stopped, unlimited substitution may be employed, and

(2) When the clock is running, no more than two

players may enter the game.

Thus, coaches will be eyeing the clock closely this year. There will be ample opportunity for changing platoons, if desired. Coaches may send in entire teams each time a live ball goes out of bounds, when a touchdown, field goal or safety is scored, when a touchback is made, when a penalty is assessed, or when a time-out is called by either team.

Each team is allowed four free time-outs.

Two important interpretations accompany the substitution rule.

First, when more than two substitutes enter the game with the clock running before or after the ball has been declared ready for play, a time-out shall be charged to the offending team and no penalty enforced.

Second, when a team has exhausted all of its time-outs and sends in more than two substitutes while the clock is running, all substitutes will be accepted, a five-yard penalty enforced and the clock started when the ball is ready for play.

Another change states that a substitute who enters the game must remain in the game and a player withdrawn may not re-enter until there has intervened a down, a foul occurs or at the end of

a period.

In an attempt to prevent intentional grounding of a pass to stop the clock, the Committee enacted two rules. The first starts the game clock when the ball is ready for play following an illegal pass to conserve time. The second assesses a penalty of five yards and loss of the down against the illegal pass.

Other rule changes:

1. The extension of the uprights of the goal posts may be more than 20 feet if desired.

2. Tape and bandage may be used only for the

protection of an injury on the wrist, forearm, elbow or hand. For purposes of prevention of injuries, a pad may be worn, provided it is neither sole leather nor other hard or unyielding substance.

3. An incoming substitute must report to a desig-

nated official.

4. On a free kick, the kicker as well as the holder may be beyond the restraining line. This makes the soccer-type kick legal.

5. Once a member of a team has signalled for a fair catch, no player on that team may carry the ball more than two steps in any direction, even if the kick has touched the ground or an opponent.

6. No player shall deliberately and maliciously use his helmet or head to butt or ram an opponent's head, neck or face. Flagrant offenders shall be disqualified.

The following statement was made by the NCAA Football Rules Committee on January 12, 1964, after it enacted a new substitution rule:

The new substitution rule represents the arrival at a position in collegiate football rules where the various alternatives which have been tested in the past have resulted in what the NCAA Football Rules Committee believes will:

1. Offer the maximum development of the player's individual skills.

2. Permit and encourage current development of all around (two-way) abilities of the most versatile players.

AND will accomplish the following beneficial results for players, coaches, officials, and the general public:

A. Reduce injuries (permit more players and more timely substituting for the benefit of fatigued players).

B. Encourage future stability in the playing rules.

C. Make the administration more efficient and easier for both coaches and officials.

D. Permit players with specialized skills not now playing to do so.

E. Represent better the varying interests of all levels of NCAA competition and encourage universality of rule adherence.

F. Bring college football, high school, and junior college football nearer to a more uni-

form code of playing rules.





## Charlie Tate Era Begins Tonight

University of Miami President Henry King Stanford was talking about the football team which he entrusted to Charlie Tate, the new coach.

"The thing I like most about the Hurricanes is that you can hear them hitting and talking it up in their practices," said Dr. Stanford, an occasional visitor at the workouts.

The Hurricanes' attitude reflects confidence in themselves and their new coach, a feeling shared

by most of the fans.

Fortunately the majority of UM's loyal rooters expect no miracles from Tate who this time last year was setting up the Georgia Tech defense which stopped Florida in the opening game at

Atlanta, 9-0.

Tate is making no promises in returning to the city where he produced championship teams and outstanding individual players at Miami High from 1951 through 1955. Since that time Tate acquired football savvy as an assistant at Florida and Georgia Tech. No one questions that Charlie comes well prepared for producing a new era in Miami football.

"I have no hesitancy in recommending Tate as a head coach," Bobby Dodd of Tech declared last fall, months before Dr. Stanford chose Tate to succeed Andy Gustafson, now UM athletic

director.

The University of Miami is so new to football, fielding its freshman team in 1926, that Florida State is the only opponent engaged in intercollegiate football a shorter time that UM. Florida for example had its first team in 1906.

Tate is the ninth coach in UM's history and like predecessors he may not accomplish a great deal from a won-lost standpoint the initial season.

The late Jack Harding took over in 1937 and had a 4-4-1 record. Harding had a 54-32-3 mark in nine years. His 1945 eleven scored one of the greatest of the Orange Bowl victories, 13-6, over Holy Cross

Gustafson's first Hurricane team, 1948, won only four and lost six. Gustafson retired after 17 seasons with a 93-65-3 record, including four bowl appearances and the development of many All

appearances and the development of many All America stars, topped by George Mira.

I saw the Hurricanes of 1937 dedicate the new Orange Bowl in a game which Georgia won, 26-0. Four years later, I was fortunate enough to make

Miami my permanent home and since then some of my greatest thrills have been produced by Hurricane football teams.

The Hurricanes today are nationally recognized for past achievements and there is every reason to believe that under Tate and a new staff of assistants, with the exception of Walter Kichefski and Trainer Dave Wike, UM will earn more distinctions.

Local acceptance of the Hurricanes is reflected from attendance figures starting with 65,261 spectators for seven games in 1937 to a high of 339,-

963 in 1951.

The Hurricanes have drawn a total of 6,356,203 fans with 12 games which topped 55,000 each in attendance. The record turnout was 75,685 on Oct. 7 for the game here with Notre Dame, a highlight in Miami's climb to recognition. The Hurricanes have helped make possible the Orange Bowl, home of the New Year's Day college football classic. They have paid more than \$1 million in rental for one of the finest stadiums.

in rental for one of the finest stadiums.

But football, with its great victories and grim disappointments, is more than a game of records and statistics. It is a way of life in which Miamians delight and there is every reason to believe that the new phase introduced by Tate will match

past glorious eras.

"You don't have to worry about Tate," said State Representative Jess Yarborough, one of the first coaches to score phenomenal success at Miami

High. "Charlie will get the job done."

George Trogdon ,another who coached championship teams at Miami High, predicts a bright future for Tate. Trogdon coached Tate at Landon High, Jacksonville, and later brought him to Miami High as his assistant.

Trogdon likes to illustrate Tate's determination


and devotion to football with a story.

"When Tate returned from Navy service in the Pacific (1942-1945) I met him at the train in Jacksonville. I told Charlie we needed him to scout a Tennessee team we were going to play. He headed up there and scouted them before he had even seen his wife."

You can't become any more dedicated to foot-

ball that that.

My own guess is that football at the University of Miami is in good hands.

When the Hurricanes score . . . the cannon roars.


Touchdown Tommy is the little belching cannon which signals that a Miami ball carrier has crossed the goal.

Now carefully locked in the coach's office after each game, Touchdown Tommy II has become one sprig of ivy which the UM students want protected eternally.



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#### Meet Charlie

UNIVERSITY OF MIAMI football history moves into a new era this fall.

Now guiding the destinies of the Hurricanes is Coach Charlie Tate, former chief aide to Bobby Dodd at Georgia Tech and one time head grid mentor of Miami Senior High School.

On the eve of Dec. 23, 1963, Dr. Henry King Stanford, University of Miami president, announced the appointment of Tate as football boss to succeed Andy Gustafson, who retired from coaching at the conclusion of the '63 season to devote full time to the post of Athletic Director.

Tate is Miami's first new grid mentor in 18 years. He becomes the ninth man to hold the pigskin reins of the school since its founding in 1926. The first was Howard Buck (1926-28), followed by J. Burton Rix (1929); Ernest Brett (1930); Tom McCann (1931-34); Irl Tubbs (1935-36); Jack Harding (1937-1942); Eddie Dunn 1943-44); Jack Harding again (1945-47) and Andy Gustafson (1948-1963).

Tate came to Miami from Georgia Tech, where for five years—1959 through 1963—he served as assistant to Dodd (headed over-all defense last three years). Previously, he was freshman coach at Tech two years (1957-58) . . . freshman coach at Florida one year (1956) and head coach at Miami Senior High five years (1951 through 1955).

During the three campaigns he was head of Georgia Tech's over-all defense, the Yellow Jackets ranked among the leaders in the nation in team defensive statistics (Florida failed to score a single point on the Engineers).

When appointed coach of the Hurricanes, Charlie was given a ringing sendoff by long time Georgia Tech grid boss Dodd. "He was outstanding for us for seven years, and is ideally qualified to be a head coach anywhere," said Bobby.

Tate had an incredible coaching record in high school, his Miami High Stingarees scoring 43 astounding wins against only six losses and a single tie. In five years, they won four state titles. South Floridians can well remember his victorious, exciting elevens at Miami High, teams which rocked the Orange Bowl with their winning, spectacular football.

All of Charlie's grid playing days came in the state of Florida. Born in Tracy City, Tenn., he moved to Jacksonville with his family and started his pigskin career at Landon High. His college days found him starring at the University of Florida. At Landon, he garnered All-City, All-State and All-Southern honors—and captained his senior team. At Florida, he was All-Southeastern Conference two years in a row, calling signals from his fullback position.

Excelling in other sports too, Tate lettered twice in baseball at Florida—and made All-City, All-

Conference (basketball) and All-City, All-State and All-America (baseball) at Landon.

Graduating from Florida in 1932, Tate served as an officer in the United States Navy for 44 months, 24 of which were in the South Pacific. The 43-year-old UM grid boss was born Feb. 20, 1921.

#### TATE COACHED ALL-AMERICANS

New Head Coach Charlie Tate coached four gridders in high school who later became All-American college players—Bobby Moorhead at Georgia Tech, Jim Dooley at University of Miami, Claude "Tee" Morman at Duke, Joe Caldwell at Army. They played under Tate at Miami Senior High school.






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## THE MIAMI NEWS

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It will be three weeks before home town fans get another peak at the University of Miami Hurricane football team. A trip to Atlanta to play Georgia Tech and an open date intervenes before University of California comes to town Friday

night, October 9.

The Golden Bears, who have 28 of 33 lettermen back, resembled the Hurricanes last year. They have one of the nation's leading passers in Craig Morton, a host of good receivers—but a porous defense. They scored 15 points on Pitt, 22 on Duke, 26 on Washington and 17 on Stanford without winning any of those games. New coach Ray Willsey has Morton and a host of fine receivers back and will know pretty well before the Miami game how his defense is shaping up. The Bears entertain Missouri, Illinois and Minnesota the weeks before the Miami game, are home to Navy the week after. If the Bears look upon Miami as a breather, who can blame them? This would be an ideal week for the Hurricanes to come up with a dazzling upset—but Miami will have to prove its worth in pass defense to have a chance.

Georgia Tech, Miami's foe next week, is regarded as one of the nation's best this year with a backfield loaded with blinding speed plus a typical Tech defense. Only Auburn and Alabama got more than one TD on Tech last year. Opening against Vanderbilt this week and playing Clemson next, Tech can be counted on to be a relaxed but highly capable foe performing with all the confidence that experience, depth and the friendly confines of Grant Field can bring.

TV fans still wonder how Pitt lost to UCLA last week. It took three lost fumbles and two interceptions to bring it about, and no future Pitt foe can expect to have the advantage of that many breaks. Pitt can run, its quarterbacks can pass even though the receivers in the UCLA game left much to be desired. This is a Pitt team which will grow stronger fast—and Oregon next week and William & Mary and West Virginia in weeks following will get the full brunt of that upward swing. The Pitt team which comes here Oct. 17 might well be the most powerful team to appear on the Orange Bowl turf this season.

Indiana, following Pitt into the Orange Bowl Oct. 23, has a club which jelled last year after a slow start. The Hoosiers, once down 0-4, won three of their last five and the two losses were by six points apiece. Tom Nowatzke, 220 pound fullback, has an All America boom going for him. He rushed for 756 yards in nine games last year. The Hoosiers have a back breaking starting schedule and meet Northwestern, Ohio State, Iowa and Michigan State before coming here, but Big Ten teams seem to thrive on such schedules and the Hoosiers can be counted on to be chipper, tough—and very battle wise when they come here.

Miami's second road game of the year will be at Detroit with Detroit U the night of Oct. 30. The line averages 230 pounds to the man. The Titans won two, tied one a year ago but figure to have more wins than that when they entertain

the Hurricanes.


Tulane, Boston College and Vanderbilt are Miami's three home opponents on successive week ends in November. Tulane and Vanderbilt had disastrous seasons in 1963 while Boston has lost its great passer, Concannon. This is the part of the schedule in which observers believe the

Hurricanes can make their best showing.

The Florida game will be played in Gainesville this year with the Gators sporting one of their finest squads ever. Despite a schedule which includes a host of teams which played in bowl games last New Years, the Gators have bowl ambitions of their own and that plan of course includes a win over the Hurricanes Nov. 28. There's some extra rivalry generated in this game because of the fact that Charlie Tate who played for Florida and coached there and Ottis Mooney, who coached there are now at Miami while Gene Ellenson, John Eibner and Ed Kensler, once of the Miami staff, are now at Florida.

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## **Meet the Hurricanes**

ROBERT DOMKE

Fullback and running back from Pittsburgh, Pa. . . . Sophomore . . . nickname, Bob . . . age 19 . . . hgt. 5-10 . . . wgt. 178 . . . Domke was one of the pleasant "finds" of spring practice and could be seen in a dual fullback-running back role this season. He's expected to play a major part on the team. Bob joined the varsity as a halfback last March but was shifted to fullback when Pete Banaszak suffered injury and played first string throughout the 20-day period. Statistically, Bob has no business being a college fullback because of his small stature, but he made the coaches throw away the book as he came up with an amazing display of blocking, tackling and hard running. His walloping hitting ability overcomes any poundage shortcomings and tips the scales very much in his favor. Domke was primarily a runner in high school. "Until coming to college," he said, "I never threw a block in my life, because I always had the ball." He scored 96 points playing fullback in his senior high school year, but was a reserve halfback on the 1963 UM freshman team. High school—North Hills . . . set school record for low hurdles in track . . . high school coach—Mario Martorelli.

#### ROBERT BROWN

Tackle from Pittsburgh, Pa. . . . Senior . . . nickname, Bob . . . 21 . . . hgt. 6-2 . . . wgt. 227 . . . Brown starts off 1964 as a questionmark player. Though rated the interior line "find" of 1963, the sinewy Pittsburgh husky missed spring practice due to an operation and his playing status is not known. His loss would be a heavy one in a position where the Hurricanes need all the rugged experience they can muster. But his return to 100 per cent action would mean, coaches could throw off some nightmares regarding this vital up-front tackle spot. Brown wasn't even listed on the varsity roster at the start of 1962, but managed to wiggle his way from the "cannon fodder" crew into some spot action and started off last fall. No. 3 among tackles. He made his move early, crashing through for five thundering tackles and recovering a fumble deep in Miami territory against Purdue. A week later, playing first string for the first time in his career, he came up with 10 tackles and assists against Tulane—and scored Miami's first TD of the year by grabbing a fumble in mid-air and darting into the end zone. For the next seven games, six of which found him starting, Bob ranged between five and seven tackles per clash—and at the finish had almost equalled the tackling statistics of All-America Dan Conners. High school—Brentwood . . . high school coach—George Radosevich.

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
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#### DON CURTRIGHT

Defensive back from North Chicago, Ill. . . . Junior . . . age 20 . . . hgt 5-11 . . . wgt. 186 . . . Though harassed with injuries, Don performed some on defense last fall, and will be seen in that role again this season along with probable placekicking assignments He broke into the scoring column last year with a place-kick, making good the only extra point he attempted (Florida game). His two perfect placements following touchdowns won the 1964 spring game for the Greens 14 to 13. Curtright was a two-way star in high school, playing for the same school that produced former Hurricane guard, Jack Novak. In his prep days, he was a real scourge of the Northern suburbs of Chicago, grabbing all kinds of honors. As a senior, he gained 1,300 yards rushing and tallied 101 points. He ran for 198 yards, scored three TDs and had a long distance gallop of 80 yards in the game that decided the Tri-County championship. High school—North Chicago . . . high school coach —Tom Parker . . . hobbies—golf, swimming.

#### T. H. CLIFTON

#### FRED BROWN

End from Sacramento, Cal. . . . Senior . . . age 21 . . . hgt. 6-5 . . . wgt. 224 . . . Brown is one of several Californians (transplant from Honolulu) to join the Hurricanes in the last couple of years. Transferring to Miami from American River Junior College (Sacramento) in 1963, the skyscraper Californian played end on offense and middle guard on defense in junior college, making All-Conference. As a high school senior, he led his county in pass receiving, snagging 37 aerials for 508 yards. Brown was born in Honolulu but moved to California in the 50s, attending high school on the Pacific Coast. Fred played a lot of football for Miami last fall, gaining valuable experience as a wingman operating on the alternate team behind Ed Weisacosky. He started the Purdue game, one of three clashes won by the Hurricanes. Enhancing his reputation with some latent talents during 1964 spring practice, the elongated Californian holds a key position on Miami's end corps, ranked among the finest in college football. 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
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

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


#### HARRY FERSCH

Tackle from Miami, Fla. . . . Senior . . . age 21 ... hgt. 6-2 ... wgt. 227 ... Fersch paid his own way to school lo become eligible academically last fall and wound up starting two ball games—the Purdue and Tulane battles. Other clashes found him operating with the alternate unit. Against Kentucky, he was all over the field and came out as a defensive star. Early in the struggle, his fumble recovery broke up a Wildcat drive on the Miami 10 and set the stage for the Hurricanes to move 90 yards for the game's opening score. During the year, Fersch played both guard and tackle. Harry, as a sophomore, saw token service in the Pitt opener, but then was shelved because of injuries and was seen no more until the Maryland tussle, fifth on the schedule. He broke into that one mid-way in the first quarter and promptly made a tackle. Minutes later, he reached up to snare one of Dick Shiner's passes and before the night was over, he had three more tackles. From then on, the Miamian had a lot of assignments. High school—Archbishop Curley . . . coach—Sam Scarnecchia . . . hobbies—hunting, fishing and water skiing.

#### FRED HUBBS

Guard from Woodridge, Va. . . . Senior . . . age 21 . . . hgt. 6-2 . . . wgt 215 . . . Hubbs is a converted guard, having served in a reserve end role with the Hurricanes last fall after performing brilliantly as a wingman for San Diego Junior College (California). He was shifted to the interior line last spring—but if the need arises, he could help on the flank. At San Diego, Fred played offensive end two years on a team using the forward pass mainly in desperation. Only three passes were thrown to him in his freshman season and he caught all of them for touchdowns of 40 yards or more. He hauled in 10 more aerials as a sophomore, becoming a much-feared deep receiver. Hubbs' high school football career was late in starting since he failed to don a uniform until his senior year. Until then, the Virginian was strictly a basketball player—but in one campaign on the gridiron he became a star and led receivers with 25 receptions. Fred's high school days found him playing five different positions—blocking back, fullback and end on offense, and corner linebacker and halfback on defense.
