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#### Tonight's Game

"Bagdad on the Bayou" is the Houstonian's affectionate term for his city, a sprawling metropolis of over six million people; home of the manned spacecraft center, scores of millionaires, and what is unabashedly called "The Eighth Wonder of the World"—The Astrodome.

Houston's fabulous domed stadium is home field for tonight's foe, and that fact gives rise to a rather weird statistic. The Cougars haven't won a game outdoors this season. No other football team can make that statement.

Coach Bill Yeoman's team is much like Florida State's in several respects, not the least of which is a seeming inability to win football games played away from home. In fact, the last road game won by the Cougars was a 7-0 decision here in Doak Campbell Stadium in 1962.

On the other hand, Florida State comes into this home finale with an 11-game winning streak at home, a skein Yeoman's Cougars would like to break. It's the final game of the season for Houston, and one which means the difference between a losing or break-even season.

It's also a "must" game for the Seminoles. A 3-0 loss to N.C. State last week evens the record at 4-4, and a victory here tonight provides a chance to finish the season a winner.

Through a quirk of schedule, Florida State has met each team it has played this season at the very peak of the opponents' potential. Witness Kentucky, Alabama, and N.C. State to name a few.

Houston is no exception. The Cougars struggled through a rough early season before their sophomore-laden lineup caught fire and dumped Mississippi and Kentucky on successive weekends. The Kentucky victory came even as Wildcat quarterback Rick Norton set three new passing records, gaining over 300 yards in the air.

However, the mighty Kentucky offense was held to 13 yards rushing by a scrambling Houston defense, and therein lies a problem for the Seminoles tonight.

The Cougars are not without an offensive punch. Quarterback Bo Burris played one of the season's best games in a 13-13 tie with FSU last season, and seems to have found himself under center. The 6-2 junior was moved to quarterback last year after playing most of the season as a defensive back.

Another familiar face is halfback Dick Post, who scooted 18 yards for the touchdown which tied Florida State last year. Post, a junior, has gained 1076 yards in two years, making him the third leading ground gainer in Houston history.

The Cougars present a wide-open offensive arrangement featuring the versatility of Ken Hebert and the pass receiving talents of Tom Beer and Wondrous Warren McVea.

McVea, one of the most touted high school runners in Texas history, was somewhat less than wondrous during the early season, however, he comes into this game as Houston's third leading runner and pass receiver. He has caught 14 for 322 yards and three touchdowns.


Hebert is the leading receiver with 20 receptions for 307 yards and four TDs. The sophomore from Pampa also handles placements and punts for the Cougars.

The Seminole defense will be sorely tested as it has so many times this season. Meanwhile, quarterback Ed Pritchett and company will go against a secondary which has intercepted 15 passes so far this year, including five against Kentucky last weekend.

Everything points toward a tremendous home climax and perhaps the best game played on Doak Campbell turf this season.










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
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
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#### PENALTIES

- OFFSIDE by either team; Violation of scrimmage or free kick formation; Encroachment on neutral zone —Loss of Five Yards.
- 2. ILLEGAL PROCEDURE, POSITION OR SUBSTITUTION—Putting ball in play before Referee signals "Readyfor-play"; Failure to complete substitution before play starts; Player out of bounds when scrimmage begins; Failure to maintain proper alignment of offensive team when ball is snapped; False start or simulating start of a play; Taking more than two steps after Fair Catch is made; Player on line receiving snap—Loss of Five Yards.
- ILLEGAL MOTION—Offensive player illegally in motion when ball is snapped—Loss of Five Yards.
- ILLEGAL SHIFT—Failure to stop one full second following shift—Loss of Fifteen Yards.
- ILLEGAL RETURN of substitute not previously disqualified—Loss of Fifteen Yards.
- 6. ILLEGAL DELAY OF GAME; Taking more than four times out during either half (except for replacement of injured player)—Loss of Five Yards. Team not ready to play at start of either half—Loss of Fifteen Yards.

- 7. PERSONAL FOUL Tackling or blocking defensive player who has made fair catch; Piling on; Hurdling: Grasping face mask of opponent; Tackling player out of bounds, or running into player obviously out of play; Striking an opponent with fist, forearm, elbow or locked hands; Kicking or kneeing—Loss of Fifteen Yards (Flagrant offenders will be disqualified.)
- 8. CLIPPING-Loss of Fifteen Yards.
- ROUGHING THE KICKER or holder—Loss of Fifteen Yards.
- 10. UNSPORTSMANLIKE CONDUCT— Violation of rules during intermission; Illegal return of suspended player; Coaching from sidelines; Invalid signal for Fair Catch; Persons illegally on field—Loss of Fifteen Yards. (Flagrant offenders will be disqualified.)
- ILLEGAL USE OF HANDS AND ARMS by offensive or defensive player; Defensive holding—Loss of Fifteen Yards.
- 12. INTENTIONAL GROUNDING of forward pass—Loss of Five Yards Plus Loss of Down.
- 13. ILLEGALLY PASSING OR HAND-ING BALL FORWARD—Loss of Five Yards Plus Loss of Down.

- 14. FORWARD PASS OR KICK CATCH-ING INTERFERENCE Interference with opportunity of player of receiving team to catch a kick—Loss of Fifteen Yards. Interference by member of offensive team with defensive player making pass interception—Loss of Fifteen Yards Plus Loss of Down. Interference by defensive team on forward pass—Passing Team's Ball at Spot of Foul and First Down.
- 15. INELIGIBLE RECEIVER DOWN-FIELD ON PASS—Loss of Fifteen Yards.
- 16. BALL ILLEGALLY TOUCHED, KICKED OR BATTED—Forward pass being touched by ineligible receiver beyond the line of scrimmage—Loss of Fifteen Yards from Spot of Preceding Down and Loss of a Down. Eligible pass receiver who goes out of bounds and later touches a forward pass—Loss of Down. Illegal touching of kicked ball within opponent's ten yard line—Touchback.
- 17. PENALTY DECLINED: Incomplete forward pass; No play or no score.
- CRAWLING by runner—Loss of Five Yards. Interlocked Interference —Loss of Fifteen Yards.


