




In our football programs this fall, we have attempted to indicate some of the emphasis we place on scholastic attainment. The institute is composed of the College of Agriculture, the Agricultural Experiment Stations, the Agricultural Extension Service and the School of Forestry.

Florida's agricultural income was \$986 million last year or 10 times that of 30 years ago. The research findings of the Agricultural Experiment Stations, the carrying of this knowledge to the agricultural producers of the state by the Agricultural Extension Service and the transfusion of capable and knowledgeable graduates from our College of Agriculture and School of Forestry have been basic to this achievement.

There is no state in the Union where science and technology have brought more significant and revolutionary gains in agriculture than in Florida.

Florida's agricultural industry has led the nation in rate of growth since 1948, registering a 210 per cent gain while all other states together marked an increase of less than 30 per cent. Figures are in terms of value of farm products. Experts predict the state's agricultural industry will generate nearly \$8 billion to the economy by 1975.

In football terms, Florida's agriculture holds a "No. 1 ranking"—fastest rate of growth in the nation.

National rankings depend upon developing top talent and then molding that talent into a winning combination—whether in football or in industry.

Growth of Florida's agricultural industry has been promoted and sustained largely by the University of Florida's agricultural programs which are organized into the Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences.

The Institute uses a "three-platoon" system to carry out its state-wide agricultural development efforts.

The College of Agriculture is the teaching team and trains future agricultural scientists and businessmen; Experiment Station scientists make up the fact-finding team and the Extension Service is the off-campus squad that shows growers, ranchers, agricultural businessmen, industrialists and others concerned with agricultural development how to put the new technology into practice.

"Head coach" is Provost E. T. York Jr. Directing the research team is Dr. J. R. Beckenbach, with Dr. M. A. Brooker heading up the College's teaching unit and Dr. M. O. Watkins calling signals for the Extension team. School of Forestry Director John L. Gray leads a squad of "both way" specialists who alternate on all three teams.

This championship-caliber squad has helped boost the state's agricultural economy to \$3.8 billion per year. Oddsmakers bet it will boom to \$10 billion by 1975.

No wonder! Each person here this afternoon ate, on an average, 174 pounds of beef and other red meat in 1964. During the same period, each Floridian ate 39 pounds of poultry, 186 pounds of fruits, 255 pounds of vegetables, 623 pounds of dairy products and 116 pounds of potatoes.

To store enough energy to cheer their favorite Florida team to victory, fans here have consumed some 80 tons of food since last night.

Some are still eating!

But being well fed is not a foregone conclusion. It takes new strategy to keep up our winning momentum. To supply an ever-increasing population with nutritious, high quality, safe and relatively inexpensive food in the future, agriculture must continue to produce more per acre with less labor. This means the University's agricultural team must continue to come up with the right combination of education and leadership.





Little needs to be said of Ray Graves' football coaching ability other than mere presentation of facts concerning his record at the University of Florida.

- (1) Florida finished in the Southeastern Conference first division four times in 27 years prior to Graves takeover in 1960. Graves has fielded five Gator teams with four winding up in the first division.
- (2) Florida's two highest SEC finishes have come under Graves, second in 1960 and tied for second in 1964 while playing the toughest schedule in Gator history.
- (3) Graves has compiled the best five-year record in Florida history with a 33-17-2 mark.
- (4) Florida owns only three wins in history over teams which finished in the nation's top ten, all three under Graves. These came over Penn State (1962), Alabama (1963) and LSU (1964).
- (5) Since the formation of the SEC in 1933 Florida's three best records have been 8-3

(1952), 9-2 (1960) and 7-3 (1964) the latter two by Graves' teams.

(6) Graves first team at Florida won more games (9) than any in Gator history.

As Athletic Director Graves has seen the Gators, competing in eight intercollegiate sports, total a winning percentage a shade above 69 percent.

This energetic, enthusiastic speaker and recruiter came to Florida after 13 years as an assistant football coach at Georgia Tech, where he had been assistant head coach under Bobby Dodd from 1957-60.

He is a 1943 graduate of the University of Tennessee and later played professional football with the Philadelphia Eagles. Graves served as captain of every team he played on Knoxville Central HS, Tennessee and the Eagles.

He is married to the former Opal Richardson of Tazwell, Tenn. and they have three lovely daughters, Becky 21, Kathy, 18, and Beth, 15.







**MAKALA TROPHY** 

Awarded annually and \$500 to winner of Fla.-FSU football game by Exchange Club of West St. Petersburg.

#### THE MAKALA TROPHY AND SCHOLARSHIP

Each year the winner of the FSU-Florida football game receives the Makala Trophy, carved wooden figures of an Indian and an alligator which were discovered near Shawano Indian Reservation.

This presentation is made by the Exchange Club of West St. Petersburg. Along with this symbolic trophy goes a \$500 scholarship donated to the winning school by the club each year.

These figures, originally found in the Big Cypress Swamp, were evidently hewn in the implied period of 1725-1810.

According to the Legend Makala, an Indian warrior possessing superhuman powers return-

ed apparently unscathed after defeat at the hands of a pack of alligators, while defending his people.

According to Paul A. Hounchell, D.D.S., Chairman of the Makala Trophy Committee for the Exchange Club, the club sees the value of these figures as becoming more and more a symbol of strength to these two institutions of higher learning.

As the trophy and scholarship are passed back and forth the club wants it to serve as a reminder of the resurgence of the spirit of Makala after defeat and the ever present threat of a formidable adversary.

#### An Agreement with Professional Football

EVERETT D. BARNES, director of athletics at Colgate University, became the first athletic director to serve as president of the National Collegiate Athletic Association when he was elected to that position in January, 1965. Barnes is a former major league baseball player (Pittsburgh, 1925-27) and now serves as president of the U. S. Baseball Federation, which sent a team to Tokyo in conjunction with the Olympics in

ESS than a year ago as the college football season was drawing to a close, a situation arose which threatened far-reaching effects on the college-professional football relationship. A number of players had been signed to contracts by the American and National Football Leagues before the college season ended.


This premature action not only cost the players their eligibility but also jeopardized that of their teammates and the athletes against whom they continued to compete.

Such action violated the spirit of cooperation existing between the colleges and the professional organizations. Although there was no legislation that covered the situation, there was an understanding that a player was not to be signed until his eligibility had been exhausted. To sign a college player before or during a season, then allow him to masquerade as an amateur, is reprehensible.

The members of the National Collegiate Athletic Association were deeply concerned by these premature signings which undercut the basic concept of intercollegiate athletics. The NCAA principle of amateurism clearly states:

"An amateur athlete is one who engages in athletics for the physical, mental, social and educational benefits he derives therefrom, and to whom athletics is an avocation. One who takes or who has taken pay, or has accepted the promise of pay, in any form, for participation in athletics . . . shall not be eligible for intercollegiate athletics."

Moreover, these signings contradicted repeated assurances by professional football that it would avoid the practice. The signings were conducted in secrecy approaching conspiracy, and, in some instances, were masked by undated contracts that falsely implied an athlete's eligibility would not be affected.



At the NCAA Convention in Chicago in January, the members moved quickly to correct the situation. They directed the College-Professional Relations Committee, under James J. Corbett of Louisiana State University, to gain reasonable protection for student-athletes with eligibility remaining, and to regularize the contact procedures of the professional leagues.

The Committee, meeting with the National and American Football Leagues, worked out an agreement to govern the situation that says substantially:

(A) No college student shall be signed to a contract or any other document (including a letter of intent), directly or indirectly, from the time of his first college enrollment until completion of his institution's football season during the academic year in which the student's entering class is to graduate. The football season includes post-season football contests (but not all-star games) in which the team of the college of such player is to participate and in which the player is to participate.

(B) The leagues may sign a student with football eligibility remaining between the completion of the varsity season of his fourth academic

year and the beginning of his fifth year of academic work. Once said student enrolls for classes in his fifth year, however, neither league will sign the student until he has completed his football competition of that year, including post-season team events (not all-star games).

(C) The leagues will continue the general practice of having their scouts make initial contact with the athletic director or head coach. They agreed that during such meetings, ground rules for subsequent contact will be arranged as long as such rules are reasonable.

(D) Although the clubs of neither league promise to disclose promptly all signings because of the requests of some student-athletes that the signings not be disclosed, each league does pledge to disclose any and all signings of fifth-year students prior to the September first of their final season of eligibility.

Admittedly, there is room for improvement, especially in the area of players with eligibility in other sports who sign such secret contracts. The NCAA will maintain its surveillance in this matter as it has in other fields as a part of its continuing service to intercollegiate and amateur athletics.







## Complete Sports Coverage



This is Casey's final football game before Florida home field fans. His final appearance in a Gator uniform comes Jan. 1 in New Orleans in the Sugar Bowl against Missouri.

The Game Today is a salute to Casey and the other seniors who walk out on Florida Field for the final time this afternoon in a Gator uniform.

"This is the finest group of seniors we have had since I came to Florida in 1960," says Gator head coach Ray Graves. "They have been the heart of this football team and the leadership they have shown is why we are where we are today.

"Next year's team will have a long road to travel without these boys."

In all the Gators graduate 19 boys who have

spent this season on the first two units. The list includes some of the best football players Florida has ever had.

Offensively, both starting ends (Casey and Barry Brown), tackles John Whatley and Randy Jackson, guard Larry Beckman and running backs Jack Harper and Alan Poe are first unit men.

Off the second offensive unit the Gators lose guard Neal Sneed, center Gary Cliett, tackle Mike Waxman, flankerback Hal Seymour, and end Gary Thomas.

Defensive seniors are end Lynn Matthews, tackle Larry Gagner, linebacker Ron Pursell, defensive backs Allen Trammell, Bud Williams, Dick Kirk and Bruce Bennett.

This is the eighth meeting between FSU and Florida in a young football rivalry which has become one of the hardest-fought in the Deep South.

Florida leads in the series, 5-1-1, but the games have all been close and virtually every one has gone down to the wire.

Florida won the first two games by relatively comfortable margins of 21-7 and 18-8 in 1958 and 1959. The Seminoles came back to provide an indication of what was to come in future years by bowing only 3-0 in 1960 and earning a 3-3 tie in '61.

Tommy Shannon guided the Gator Bowl 1962 Florida team to a 20-7 win, the 1963 team rode the running of Larry Dupree to a 7-0 victory and last year FSU broke the ice and won 16-7.

Make no mistake about it, this is "THE GAME" to both schools now.

#### The Gator Marching Band



#### Research

This is quite a challenge, but thus far the research unit has scored very well, winning new fans among consumers. Over the past 16 years, while the general cost of living has risen 33 per cent, the cost of food has been held to only a 13 per cent increase. This has come about through improved effectiveness in producing agricultural products. And, of course, it means more of our dollars for other things.


To do this kind of job, the Experiment Station has called on 350 skilled scientists, stationed in a network of 21 research units that stretches from Santa Rosa County to Homestead. They must solve a great diversity of problems posed by growers, ranchers and food processors.

One amazing jackpot for Florida's economy that came from agricultural research was discovery that minor elements in citrus fertilizers would greatly boost yields.


This one discovery has brought three times as much money to citrus producers each year as the total cost of all agricultural research undertaken by the University in the last 75 years. And this is just one of thousands of discoveries by Station scientists. Through development of adaptable varieties, Florida has become the nation's winter "vegetable basket."


But developing new technology is like making a first down—it is only one step toward the goal.



#### Instruction

New technology must be put to work in the classroom and in the field. The College of Agriculture and School of Forestry are responsible for training tomorrow's scientists, farmers, ranchers, food processors and marketing specialists.

They present both undergraduate and graduate curricula in three broad areas—agricultural science, agricultural technology and agricultural business.

The dimensions of resident teaching take agriculphysiology, bacteriology, genetics, mathematics and to acres of asphalt. economics.

The graduate student conducting research works with space age tools. He might solve an intricate problem with the aid of a giant computer or see a new plant virus through the eye of an electron microscope. Or he might help develop a new plant variety by means of atomic irradiation.

Forestry graduates and undergraduates alike study the problem of producing a continuing supply of high quality timber for the nation's giant paper and buildture students deep into the world of science. #### Extension

But education cannot stop in the classroom. The off-campus team of the University has by far the largest enrollment—potentially every citizen of Florida. Currently, this cooperative state-federal-county program is reaching men and women, boys and girls in every county of the state.

Today's Extension workers—both men and women—are the University's "grass-roots professors" with many classrooms and many subjects to teach. They are trained to help a grower apply science to produce a better box of oranges, show a homemaker how to get the most from a Thanksgiving turkey or a homeowner how to care for a lawn.

Florida ranchers, growers, homeowners and homemakers find what they want to know through bulletins, newspaper stories, radio and TV programs, training schools . . . or by calling the local agent's office.

Home economics agents are especially trained to help special groups—such as young homemakers, low income families, working-away-from-home wives and retired people.

The Extension Service teaches some 45,000 Florida boys and girls annually through 4-H clubs. Projects aren't limited strictly to agriculture and home economics; strong emphasis is placed on leadership, citizenship and safety.

#### A Unique Opportunity - - -

Growth of new markets in tropical countries of the Western Hemisphere has placed Florida in a strategic position to develop crops and practices for the tropics. Food production in tropical countries lags far behind their rapid population growth and slow economic development curtails the increase of expected trade with Florida and the U. S.

To help meet this challenge, the University of Florida created the Center for Tropical Agriculture—the first of its kind in the country. Research and training in tropical agriculture are sponsored, in part, by a \$300,000, three-year grant from the Ford Foun-

dation.

#### Operation DARE—Planning for the Future

Helping Florida develop its abundant resources to the maximum potential for agricultural expansion is the primary goal of the Institute—for as agriculture expands, every segment of the state's economy also

expands.

But the agricultural teams realize there are many possible stumbling blocks before reaching that goal. Just as fumbles, pass interceptions and penalties can take all of the steam out of a sustained drive on the field, many problems could stall Florida's agricultural growth. The industry faces competition for natural resources (land, labor, water, etc.), competition for available markets and a great array of technological problems.

Can Florida agriculture meet and overcome these problems and still stay competitive in the market

place?

This is the question that led to initiation of Operation DARE (Developing Agricultural Resources Effectively) in the spring of 1964. Under the leadership of Provost York, DARE has brought industry and educational leaders together in a concerted effort to explore Florida's agricultural potential. Detailed analyses are made continuously of past, present and future trends affecting agricultural growth. Problems on the horizon are thus identified and programs of action are developed to meet them.

Several of these action programs are now in progress and there are more to come. In short, DARE is a framework to study, plan and take action on those problems confronting agriculture that might limit

its potential growth and development.

This information is used by the Institute's team of specialists who must develop the new technology, then take it into the classroom and into the field where it can be put to work bringing what are now dreams and hopes into reality.

This is the challenge of agricultural development and service to which the University's agricultural team

is committed.


