




WILLIAM F. (BILL) YEOMAN Head Coach

There is no doubt that Bill Yeoman, who is in his eighth season as head football coach at the University of Houston, is the most imaginative coach in the Southwest, if not the nation.

Yeoman's Cougar teams, using the often copied Houston Option and Houston Veer-T offense, have led the nation in total offense for the past three seasons, averaging almost 475 yards per game during that period. The 1968 Cougar team set an all-time NCAA record for total offense of 562 yards per game, breaking the existing record by more than 80 yards a contest. Houston's ground attack was also the nation's best in 1967 and 1968

Playing colorful, exciting, game-breaking football, Yeoman has watched his teams compile the best record in the state of Texas for the past three years against the state's toughest schedules.

He has often said, "You play defense for the coaches and offense for the fans." His teams reflect this. Yeoman's University of Houston elevens have broken more than 300 school records in his seven-year tenure.

Seven of his UH players, Ken Hebert, Warren McVea, Greg Brezina, Paul Gipson, Rich Stotter, Johnny Peacock, and Royce Berry have earned All-America Honors.

The 41-year-old Yeoman came to the UH campus in December, 1961 from an eight-year stint at Michigan State University as Duffy Daugherty's top assistant. Earlier, in 1949 and 1950, he served as an assistant coach under Col. Earl "Red" Blaik at West Point.

Though he was born in Elnora, Indiana, and was an All-America center at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point in 1948, Yeoman has strong ties to the Southwest.

The 6-2, 200-pound son of a former college professor graduated from Glendale, Arizona, High School and attended Texas A&M as a freshman. His wife is the former Alma Jean Vance, a University of Texas graduate, of Bryan. Her father, Harold Vance, was the head of the petroleum engineering department at Texas A&M for 18 years and later a vice-president at the Bank of the Southwest in Houston.

Yeoman has an outstanding athletic background. He was an all-state football player and basketball star at Glendale High. He added letters in both sports at Texas A&M as a freshman before receiving his appointment to West Point in 1946.

A three-year letterman for Col. Blaik at Army, Yeoman captained the 1948 team and was a second-team All-America pick at center.

Following his graduation from the Academy, the Cougar coach assisted Blaik for the 1949 and 1950 seasons. After two years of active duty in Europe with the Army's Fourth Division, Yeoman received his Army discharge in December of 1953 as a first lieutenant.

He joined Daugherty's first staff at Michigan State a month later. Daugherty became acquainted with Yeoman while he was lecturing at an armed forces football clinic in Europe.

Yeoman became the M.S.U. defensive backfield coach in 1957. He took over the offensive backfield in 1959, which was his title at the time of his resignation at the Michigan school.

Yeoman has been nominated for "Coach of the Year" for the past three seasons by the Football Writers of America Association.

Yeoman and his wife have four children. They are: William, 18; Gary, 17; Kathy Ann, 14; and Carrie Lynn, 11.



UH/ASSISTANT COACHES



JOE ARENAS Omaha University, '51

A six-year member of the Cougar football staff, Joe Arenas is a former National Football League star. One of the NFL's leading kick return men fram 1951 to 1958 while he played for the San Francisco 49er's, Arenas still holds 49er and NFL records for kickoff returns. The 43-year-old ex-Marine was the most yaluable player and athlete of

most valuable player and athlete of the year at Omaha. He graduated from there in 1951 with a B.S. degree. He was also selected as the utstanding alumnus at Omaha in

Arenas, a top receiver as a pro, works with the Cougar pass catchers and kick return men.



BOBBY BALDWIN Houston, '58

Bobby Baldwin is a five-year member of the Cougar coaching staff, but he is an old hand on the UH campus. Baldwin, 37, was a Cougar freshman in 1951. He was a center and linebacker on the famed 1952 UH team that posted an 8-2 record, the best in the school's history at the time. A graduate of Galena Park High School, Baldwin will coach the Cougar freshman team this fall. He coached seven years in the

He coached seven years in the high school ranks before joining the Houston staff. After a three-year stint in the Army interrupted his undergraduate work, Baldwin returned to get his degree in 1958.



MELVIN BROWN Oklahoma, '54

Melvin Brown was a head coach for six seasons at Southeastern Okahoma State College before join-

ing the UH staff eight years ago. Brown, 37, is a native Texan, who was born in Sherman, but graduated from Denison High. He was a starting tackle for Denison's 1948 state semi-finalist football

"Brownie" entered the University of Oklahoma and became a starting offensive tackle as a sophomore. A broken leg forced him to miss the 1951 season. How-ever, he was a starting guard for the 1953 Sooner team that beat



BEN HURT Middle Tenn., '57

Ben Hurt, 35, is in his fifth season of collegiate coaching. The former guard linebacker, and captain of the 1956 Middle Tennessee

tain of the 1956 Middle Tennessee State College team is well acquainted with high school football along the Texas Gulf Coast.

He came to UH from Nederland High, where he was first assistant coach for one season.

A native of Nashville, Tenn., Ben played his collegiate football under Charles "Bubba" Murphy at Middle Tennessee. Ben works with the UH Tennessee. Ben works with the UH defensive line, which allowed opponents a school record low of just 94.3 yards per game on the ground in 1967 and 94.7 in 1968 to rank in 1967 and 94. 10th nationally.



MELVIN ROBERTSON West Texas, '50

A long-time West Texan is the de-fensive co-ordinator. He is Melvin Robertson, 40, a graduate of West Texas State and a veteran of 14 years high schol coaching experi-

Robertson also coached a season under former UH staff member "Bum" Phillips at Amarillo High before joining the staff of Odessa High. Robertson came to the Cou-gars from Odessa in June, 1965.

Robertson's defensive secondary set a UH school record for pass interceptions in 1968 with 31. The 1967 UH defensive unit ranked 10th nationally, allowing just 207.8 yards per game to foe. UH gave up 261.8 yards per game in 1968 to rank 19th



BARRY SIDES Houston, '68

The youngest member of the Cougar football coaching staff is Barry Sides, a former Spring Branch High school and UH football star, who is in his first season as a full-time Cougar assistant.

Sides, 24, was a three-year let-terman at UH in 1964-66, starting all three years at either center or guard. He was a key man in the UH offense that led the nation in total offense for the 1966 season and posted an 8-2 record, equalling the best mark ever by a UH

team.

Named the team's outstanding lineman as a senior Barry completed his collegiate career by playing in the Shrine North-South game in Miami, Fla.



HOWARD TIPPETT East Tennessee State, '58

A three-year member of the Cou gar football coaching staff Howard Tippitt, a native of Tallassee, Ala., s no stranger to the Texas Coach-

ng scene.

UH's linebacking corps, under Tippett's direction, played a big role in the defensive unit's ranking among the nation's top ten.

Two years at Port Arthur, Texas, High School preceded his entry into the major college ranks. He

into the major college ranks. He also had four more years of high school coaching in Kentucky at DuPont Manual High in Louisville and Lafayette High in Lexington. Tippett, 34, was a quarterback and captain at East Tennessee State, graduating in 1958 with a B.S. degree.




BILLY WILLINGHAM Texas Christian, '51

Billy Willingham spent six sea-Billy Willingham spent six seasons as an assistant coach at West State University before coming to Houston in the winter of 1966. His first three UH lines have helped the Cougars lead the nation in total offense in 1966, 1967 and 1968 and in rushing offense in 1967. A graduate and former football player at Trass Christian University of the propers of the season of ball player at Texas Christian University under Coach Dutch Meyer, Willingham also received a Master's degree in education at Mid-western University. The 41-year-old native of Steph-

Ine 41-year-old native of Steph-enville has been coaching since 1951. After his graduation, Willing-ham coached three years at Albany High as line coach. He followed that with a one-year stint at No-cona in 1954. He moved to Sweet-water High from 1955 to 1959. Dur-ing that time, he coached with Cougar aide Melvin Robertson.

HARRY WALKER - "MR. SPORTSMAN" 1969



When a football coach or baseball manager receives a high honor his team usually finished in first

This is not the case of Harry Walker, manager of the Houston Astros of the National League, who is being honored tonight as "Mr. Sportsman" of 1969.

The Houston Astros the past season finished in fifth place in the Western Division of the National League, although they remained in contention until the fading days of the season. Yet members of the Knights of Columbus and B'nai B'rith, sponsoring organizations of the Interfaith Charities. Lea

No one on the Houston scene more deserves the honor this year

The 53-year old Walker after a preseason controversal trade left the spirits and starting team of the Astros in a muddle watched in dismay as the Houston team won only four games the first month of play. That's when Walker's expert managerial ability came into play as he molded the Astros into a contender that was in the thick

of the fight down to the wire.

The popular "Harry the Hat" has been managing for 16 years either in the major or minor leagues. Eleven of his previous 14

years his teams finished in the first division.

Walker is a veteran of 21 years of professional baseball as a player, 12 of them in the majors. He won the 1947 National League batting title with a .363 average, while playing for both St. Louis and Philadelphia. Walker is ranked a master in teaching hitters. and was brought to Houston mainly because of his knowledge of batting. He won the American Association batting title also.

"The Hat" is no stranger to Houston sports fans. He piloted the old Houston Buffs to the Texas League title in 1956 and stayed on as manager at Houston in 1957 and 1958. He opened his managing career in 1951 at Columbus, Ga. He managed in Rochester for three years before being promoted to skipper of the St. Louis Cards in 1955. He also managed at Atlanta and Jacksonville in the minors and with Pittsburgh in the major leagues.

A native of Pascagoula, Mississippi where he attended school, Walker first entered pro baseball in 1937 with Montgomery of the Southeast League. He reached the majors when he was called up by St. Louis in 1940. He also played with Philadelphia, Chicago and Cincinnati in the majors. His brother Dixie also was a Major League star and is now managing in the minors.

Walker is married to the former Dorothy Fulmer and has three daughters . . . Carol, Mary Sharon and Barbara.

He is Bill Cappleman, a Florida State University senior who has been called "the finest college quarterback in the country" by his head Coach, Bill Peterson.

The 6-3, 210-pound senior from Dunedin, Fla., is no stranger to the Cougars. He led the Seminoles to their first victory ever over a UH team last season in Jackson-ville's Gator Bowl Stadium by a whopping 40-20 count.

Cappleman personally accounted for four of the State six-pointers in that game and hit 25 of 34 passes for 351 yards. He did not have an interception in the contest, the best of his career at FSU. The national leader in touchdown tosses last fall, Cappleman is just one of many Seminole stars the Cougars will have to contain tonight.

Tom Bailey, a 215-pound junior, is labeled "the best running back I've had at Florida State" by Coach Peterson. Frank Vohun, the 225-pound tackle who played his greatest game against UT last season, returns as State's top lineman.

The Seminoles enter tonight's game with a season record

of 6-2-1. UH, currently riding a seven-game winning streak, has a 7-2-0 mark. This will be the ninth meeting in the series between teams from these two schools. UH leads the series by a 5-1-2 count to date.

Thirteen Cougar seniors will be closing out their regular season careers at UH tonight. Of course, they will make one more appearance in the Astrodome on New Year's eve when the Cougars battle the Auburn Tigers in the Astro-Bluebonnet Bowl.

To these seniors, thanks from Cougar fans for the memories of national championships in rushing, total offense, school records in rushing defense and passes intercepted and three of the greatest seasons in UH history during their three-year varsity careers.

The seniors are: Calvin Achey, flanker; Jim Arthur, center; Ken Bailey, quarterback; Bill Bridges, offensive guard; Rusty Clark, quarterback; Jerry Drones, defensive end; Glenn Graef, linebacker; Mike Johnston, linebacker; Phillip Jones, defensive end; David Schneider, offensive guard; Otis Stewart, flanker; Jim Strong, running back; and Allen Sumerford, defensive back.

Special congratulations are also in order for Elmo Wright and Bridges, who have both been named to All-America teams by national publications.

And, special thanks also go to you, the Cougar fans who have given your support to this fine team and collegiate football in its 100th anniversary year.

PART FOUR

THE MODERN ERA of intercollegiate football began with the forward pass in 1906. But it was not until after the last basic structural changes in 1912, including the addition of the fourth down, reduction of the field length from 110 yards to 100, with end zones; raising the value of the touchdown from 5 to 6 points, moving the kick-off from midfield to the kicking side's 40, and lifting of the limitation on the length of the pass, that the game began settling into the pattern of today.

The inaugural Army-Notre Dame game in 1913 accentuated the turning point. Notre Dame's sensational passing display, to the surprise and 35-13 discomfiture of the Cadets, as Gus Dorais fired again and again to Captain Knute Rockne, end, and Joe Pliska, right half, awakened the East to the great potentialities of the new weapon. Except for St. Louis University, Chicago and Glenn Warner's Carlisle Indians, few teams made extensive use of the pass, though Oklahoma and Texas were about ready for aerial fireworks.

The most successful teams between 1906 and the first World War were winning, with few exceptions, on their running, kicking and defense. Warner's Carlisle Indians of 1911 and 1912, with possibly the greatest of all backs. Jim Thorpe, won far more on his fast, powerful running and great kicking than on passing.

It was following another appearance of Notre Dame in the East, against Army at the Polo Grounds in New York in 1924, that college football became a hysteria.

Grantland Rice, most famous, noble and beloved of sports writers, wrote of the game: "Outlined against the gray-blue October sky, the Four Horsemen rode again. In dramatic lore they are known as famine, pestilence, destruction and death. These are only aliases. Their real names are Stuhldreher, Miller, Crowley and Layden."

Then and there was created the most glamorous and publicized team of all time-the Four Horsemen of Notre Dame. The press across the nation sang praises of the horsemen and the "seven mules," led by Captain Adam Walsh at center.

Riding into legendary fame with them was their coach, Knute Rockne,

the flat-nosed, bald-headed immigrant from Norway whose dynamic personality, brains, wit, caustic sarcasm, mastery of psychology and command of men, as well as knowledge of football, contributed to making him the most celebrated of all coaches. When he fell to his death in the crash of a plane over Kansas March 31, 1931, a whole nation was stunned and grief-stricken.

There never was a decade to equal the 1920s for the host of great coaches, players and teams.

It was the decade of the Four Horsemen, of Red Grange of Illinois who was to rank on all-time teams, of George Gipp of Notre Dame, of Ernie Nevers of Stanford, Ken Strong of New York University, Bronko Nagurski of Minnesota, and scores of other legendary heroes.

The Notre Dame shifting attack was riding high in the 1920's, with Rockne so successful and so many of his disciples teaching it. Then came successive rules changes imposing a full stop, and the offense began to lose favor. The Warner style of football, single and double wingback, became more and more the vogue.

Warner, perhaps the most prolific of coaches next to Stagg in his originations, invented the single wingback while he was at Carlisle and the double wing came a few years later. It was not until 1938 that the double wing caused a great stir. That year his Stanford Indians put on a tremendous show in crushing Army, 26-0 at the Yankee Stadium in New York, and coaches rushed to get on the Warner bandwagon.

The Colgate team of 1932, coached by Andy Kerr, used the double wing. This was the "unbeaten, untied, unscored-on and uninvited" team. which was passed by as a bowl attraction. Lou Little's 1933 Columbia team, which perpetrated the Rose Bowl upset of all time in defeating Stanford, used the single wing, with variations.

Bob Neyland's Tennessee teams of 1938, 1939 and 1940, which each won all ten games, used the single wing, as did, of course, the Stanford "Vow Boys" of 1934, and Carl Snavely's 1939 Cornell team, which had a perfect record and continued unbeaten in 1940 until the next to last game.

Late in the 1930s, George Halas of

the Chicago Bears worked out with Clark Shaughnessy, University of Chicago coach, the modern version of the T, with a flanker in motion and quick-opening plays. They had such sensational success with it that football offense took on a new look in a few years. The Warner wingback and Notre Dame box with a shift were supplanted as coaches made the switch after Frank Leahy at Notre Dame and Earl Blaik at Army were

Until Bud Wilkinson went to Oklahoma in 1948 and started one of the most successful regimes in history, Army and Notre Dame dominated the 1940's, challenged by Michigan in 1947 and 1948. Notre Dame from 1946 to 1949 won 36 games, lost none and tied two. Army from 1944 did not know defeat until its stunning loss to Columbia, 21-20, in 1947.

Wilkinson exploited the Split-T formation, invented by Don Faurot, with wider line spacing and using the quarterback as a ball carrier on the option play. His Sooners won 47 games in a row from 1953 to 1957.

In the late 1950's, the Split-T formation lost in favor and the Slot-T was widely adopted in college ranks. The Wing-T vogue increased and Blaik's Lonely End formation at Army led to the use of a widely split end and a flanker back deployed to the opposite side. In the past several years, the I formation has been popular since John McKay used it extremely successfully with Mike Garrett and O. J. Simpson at USC.

Two games in the 1960's belong among the legendary contests in football: In 1966, Notre Dame and Michigan State, with perfect records, met before the largest television audience on record for a regularly scheduled college game, 33,000,000 viewers, and played to a 10-10 tie. In 1968, Haryard and Yale met, both unbeaten and untied for this game for the first time since 1909. Harvard, trailing 22-0 in the second quarter, pulled out a 29-29 tie with two touchdowns in the last minute, the second on the last play of the game-one of the most incredibly exciting on record.

Both were in keeping with the excitement and tradition of college football, and heralded games to come. (This is the fourth of a four-part se-
