THE 21st CENTURY'S GOALPOST: FLORIDA STATE

Florida State's position on the 30-yard-line of the 21st Century, in terms of academic research and instruction, places the University within field-goal distance of international distinction in 1970.

Already nationally recognized as a center of excellence in vital areas of scientific and technological progress, Florida State enters the decade of the 1970's with a momentum gained in more than a century of service to the state and nation. Founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, and elevated to coeducational university status in 1947, the University has a current enrollment approaching 18,000 students in its 10 schools and colleges.

Its \$100 million physical plant creates a skyline of research towers on the western quadrangle of the campus—visible from the west stands of Campbell Stadium—and reaches eastward to a stone's-throw of the State Supreme Court, where the new College of Law Building is under construction. Now graduating some 5,000 students each year, Florida State is one of only two dozen universities in the country annually producing more than 100 doctorates.

The University's role as a senior leader among the State's nine-institution University System is one in which it takes great pride. More than 100 specialized fields of study are represented in the University's schools and colleges of arts and sciences, business, education, engineering science, home economics, law, library science, music, nursing and social welfare.


A SALUTE TO THE FRIENDS OF THE SEMINOLES

TODAY'S GAME

Today's homecoming foe, Virginia Tech, is back on the winning track and this always means problems for Florida State. In fact, it doesn't matter whether the Hookies are winning or losing, they come to play when the Seminoles are the opponents.

Virginia Tech started the season with five straight losses but now have won its last four. The Gobblers lost to Virginia (7-0), Alabama (51-18), Memphis State (21-20), South Carolina (24-7) and Wake Forest (28-9). Now Coach Jerry Claiborne's outfit has recorded victories over Tulsa (17-14), Buffalo (31-14), William and Mary (35-14) and last Saturday upset a good Villanova club 34-7.

One of the key figures in Virginia Tech's suddenly rising fortunes is wingback Jimmy Quinn. The 205-pound junior from Philadelphia started the season as the No. 1 split end. Then he was switched to wingback to take advantage of his running talent.

He has carried the ball 49 times for 308 yards and has caught 25 passes for 398 yards.

Where in the past, Virginia Tech was somewhat leary about putting the ball in the air, that is not the case this season. After starting quarter-back Bob German was lost with an injury, Gil Schwabe has taken charge and done an outstanding job. The 210-pound senior from Roosevelt, N.Y., has hit on 60 of 122 passes for 807 yards and five touchdowns.

Tech's top rusher is tailback Perry Tiberio who has 611 yards in 148 carries including seven touchdowns.

Guards Jim Pigninelli and Sam Bria brace a Gobbler defense which has always given Florida State problems.

In the battle of these two Southeastern independents, Virginia Tech leads the series 7-6-1. Last season, the Gobblers and Seminoles played to a 10-10 tie on a cold day in Blacksburg, Va.

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

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The 1964 Seminoles

"The Magnificent Seven," "The Forgotten Four," "Bullet," "Tuxedo Steve" and "The Bomb" are all terms which were connected with Florida State's outstanding 1964 football squad. Winners of eight regular season games, the Seminoles were unscored upon in the first 15 quarters of the season, and came up 29 seconds short of their fourth straight shutout. The Tribe completed the regular season with seven games in which it held the opposition to a single touchdown or less and only one opponent scored more than two. Then came the Gator Bowl game. On Jan 2, 1965, the Seminoles—before a record setting capacity crowd and a national TV audience—scalped a strong Oklahoma team, 36-19.




THE OFFENSE

Florida State's 1964 offense scored 227 points in 10 regular season games, then added 36 more against Oklahoma in the Gator Bowl. The Seminoles scored 15 times via the airlanes and 14 times on the ground. Les Murdock kicked nine field goals and 22 extra points and there were two, two point conversions. They rolled up 3,415 yards in total offense, 2,029 of it passing. Quarterback Steve Tensi worked behind a line that gave him such good protection, that he earned a reputation as the quarterback, "who could have worn a tuxedo." So devastating was the Seminole offense that Jimmy Mann, then with the St. Petersburg Times wrote, before the Gator Bowl game; "Oklahoma, like Will Rogers, knows nothing but what it reads in the papers. Gomer Jones (Oklahoma Coach) has no way to imagine how truly terrifying a Tensi-to-Biletnikoff afternoon can be." A week after those words were first written, Jones and the Sooners saw Tensi and Biletnikoff at their best.

THE DEFENSE

The Seminoles 1964 defensive unit buried the tomahawk in more than a few opponents. Led by a superb front line that was nicknamed "The Seven Magnificents", the Tribe defense did not give up a single point until its 16 quarter of play—and that was set up by a fumbled punt, deep in Seminole Territory. The Magnificents trade mark was their bald scalps, and they made more than a few enemy quarterbacks wish that scalping was their only trade. Only one time during the regular season was the opposition able to score more than two touchdowns in a single game. They yielded just 66 points and only 1,811 yards total offense. The fame of the front seven overshadowed the play of a fine defensive backfield which became known as the "Forgotten Four." But it certainly did not let the opposition forget many of them. Seminole opponents completed only 39% of their passes and had 10 intercepted.

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REVIEWING 1964

Florida State 14, Miami O

Steve Tensi and Fred Biletnikoff teamed for a pair of 15 yard touchdown passes as the Seminoles shutout the Hurricanes for the second straight year.

Florida State 10, TCU 0

A wet, treacherous field and a defense that double and triple teamed Fred Biletnikoff combined to check the Seminoles, but Les Murdock's first period field goal and Phil Spooner's fourth quarter touchdown run provided the scoring.

Florida State 36, New Mexico St. 0

The home debut was a sweet one as the Seminoles shutout their third straight opponent to become the only unscored upon team in the country.

Florida State 48, Kentucky 6

It was Homecoming and this one was a real shocker.

Florida State 17, Georgia 14

The Seminoles trailed in this one for the first time in the season. Georgia scored midway in the final stanza to go on top, but Tensi took the kickoff and drove the Seminoles back on top with pinpoint passing.

VPI 20, Florida State 11

A black day in Blacksburg. The Seminoles had a record setting 423 yards in offense and VPI just 200, but the Tribe could not punch the ball across the goalline.

Florida State 34, So. Miss. 0

The defense limited the Southerners to 88 total yards and the offense indicated it really hadn't forgotten the way to the enemy's endzone.

Florida State 13, Houston 13

Going into the fourth quarter, the Seminoles appeared to have this one wrapped up. But then the Cougars, came to life for a pair of touchdowns, but missed the second extra point.

Florida State 28, N.C. State 6

The Seminoles jumped in front early and once again the opposition did not make the scoreboard until the fourth quarter.

Florida State 16, Florida 7

The largest home crowd in Florida State history watched as the Seminoles won their first game against Florida and earn the Gator Bowl bid.

Florida State 36, Oklahoma 19

Steve Tensi completed 23 of 36 passes for 303 yards and five TD's. Fred Biletnikoff caught 13 passes for 192 yards and four TD's and they were named co-recipients of the MVP award.

FLORIDA STATE 48, KENTUCKY 6

Perhaps no game in Florida State history was more electrifying and shocking than the Seminoles' 1964 conquest of giant-killer Kentucky. The Wildcats came into Campbell Stadium undefeated, they were ranked fifth in the nation and had just knocked off strong Ole Miss and Auburn clubs.

It was only the second weekend in October, but the Seminoles were celebrating Homecoming— and did they ever. When the smoke cleared the Tribe had smashed Kentucky's hopes of national glory (the Wildcats lost three straight following the Florida State game) with a resounding, 48-6, triumph.

Kentucky won the toss, but got only four yards and was forced to punt. The Seminoles took the kickoff and Steve Tensi set the pace of the afternoon, directing an 11 play scoring drive. A two-yard pass to Lee Narramore got the touchdown.

A minute and 40 seconds later the Seminoles had the game sewn up. Following a Wildcat punt, Tensi dropped back at the FSU 47 and unleashed the bomb. Fred Biletnikoff eluded Kentucky's secondary, gathered the pass in at the 12 and raced in for the score.

Late in the first period Kentucky finally held the Tribe, but even that was a blessing disquise. Kentucky touched the punt and the Seminoles recovered at the 13. Before the period ended, Florida State led, 21-0, as the crowd of 34,248 watched in delirious disbelief.

Kentucky came to life in the second period and twice the Seminole defense was tested. The first time the Tribe held at the 18. Minutes later a pass interception gave the Wildcats the ball deep in Seminole territory. At the two, Bill McDowell hit Roger Bird, who fumbled and Avery Summer recovered for State.

Near the end of the half, the Seminoles mounted a drive from their own 34. In five plays Tensi directed the Tribe to the one and from there Phil Spooner took the ball in for the touchdown. The point after was missed and the half ended, 27-0.

The Seminoles scored twice in the third period on a 12-yard Tensi to Biletnikoff pass and a one-yard run by Wayne Giardino as the runaway became a rout. In the final stanza Ed Pritchett, who was subbing for Tensi, fired a completion to Biletnikoff at the six. He then circled right end to score himself.

As the game neared its end, Kentucky's last apparent bid to get on the scoreboard was thwarted. The Wildcats punted from their own 45. The Seminoles' Pat Conway called for a fair catch, but fumbled and Kentucky recovered at the two.

The Seven Magnificents' scoreless string was receiving its severest test. On the game's last play from scrimmage Frank Antonini found an opening and went into the end zone. The string was snapped with just 29-seconds left in the game.

No Florida State victory had ever received such acclaim. As a result, the Seminoles cracked the AP's top 10, and were ranked 11th by the UPI. Dick Dunkel's widely circulated power ratings jumped the Tribe to number one.

Tensi was named the AP's "National Back of the Week" and was selected to UPI's "National Backfield". And Coach Bill Peterson was the "Coach of the Week".



Baseball

Florida State's baseball program takes a back seat to no other in the country. The Seminoles, over the years, have built a reputation as having one of the nation's very best collegiate baseball teams, and their record of "Top 10" ratings and tournament play reflects this.

Added to this are Florida State's outstanding facilities, weather and 50-60 game schedule, and it is no wonder that pro scouts and high school coaches alike reccomend the

Seminole program.

Even rival collegiate coaches will send a boy to the Seminoles. One coach in the Southeastern area recently had an outstanding prospect on his campus. When the boy told him he was not yet ready to sign, because he had been "invited to see Florida State," the coach told him, "If you have the chance to go to Florida State, don't even think of going to another school."

The Seminole program has produced more than a dozen All-Americas since 1957, and sent several of its graduates to the pros. Included among the latter are Dick Howser (Yankees), Woody Woodward (Reds), Jim Lyttle (Yankees), Ken Suarez (Indians), and Randy Brown (Angels). Many of them return in the fall and work with the younger players.

Last year the Seminoles made their 12th trip to the national playoffs, winning seven of nine games and placed second in the College World Series. The Tribe lost the final game, 2-1, to Southern California in 15-innings. Long-time observers of the Omaha, Nebr., tournament called it, "the bast game" ever played in the series finals.

Jack Stallings directs the Seminole baseball team. One of the nation's most respected coaches, he is starting his third season at Florida State. He came to the Tribe in 1969, after nine seasons at Wake Forest.

Among his many other honors, including "manager of the Year" in the Basin League, Stallings, this fall, will direct the United States team in the World Amateur Baseball Tournament in Cartagena, Columbia.


