## Ralph "Shug" Jordan



Ralph "Shug" Jordan, Head football coach, Auburn University.

No further introduction is needed. Not to Auburn people, not to football fans, not in the South, and not in the nation.

For Ralph Jordan is, in his own time, a legend.

He became Auburn's head football coach in 1951, and, for the last 23 years — this makes 24 — he has carved a niche in history for himself and for Auburn.

In recognition of that niche, Ralph Jordan — called "Shug" because of his early love of sugar cane — is the only active football coach in the nation to have a stadium named for him. That came a year ago when Auburn, his alma mater, named its football arena, "Jordan-Hare Stadium."

- Third place among active coaches in total victories, ranking ahead of such notables as Darrell Royal of Texas and Ara Parseghian of Notre Dame.

- A Heisman Trophy winner
- Numerous regional and national Coach of the Year honors.
- Only active coach in the Southeastern Conference who was coaching when the conference was formed in 1933.

He was recently the subject of an in-depth feature in *Southern Living* magazine. It was indeed appropriate. For Ralph Jordan is a distinctive part of Southern living.

In his own time, he has become a legend.

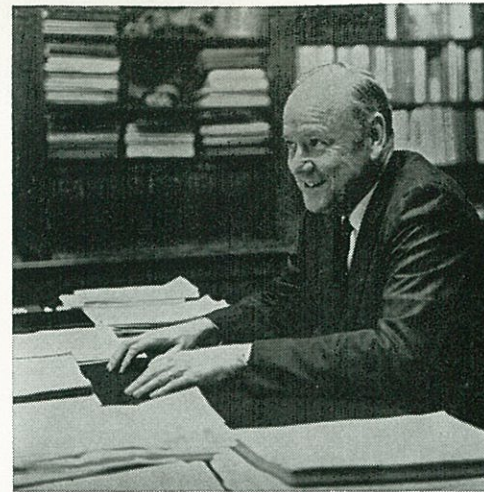

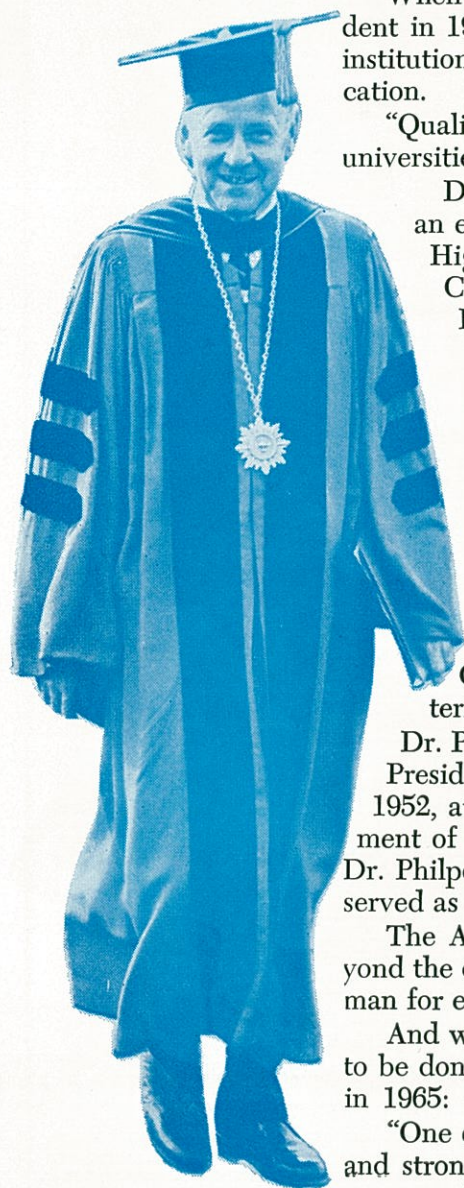

## Maintaining A Commitment



When Dr. Harry M. Philpott was inaugurated as Auburn University's 11th president in 1965, he made the statement that "as this state develops new programs and institutions, it must also face the obligation of providing excellence and quality education."

"Quality in the junior colleges, quality in the state colleges, and quality in the universities will be required."

Dr. Philpott has maintained this commitment to quality in education. He was an early advocate, soon after coming to Auburn, of the Alabama Commission on Higher Education and served as chairman of the Alabama Educational Study Commission which developed a 10-year plan for all of education in Alabama. From this study emerged the Alabama Commission on Higher Education.

The Commission directs many of its efforts toward avoiding costly duplication of institutions and facilities, a philosophy which Dr. Philpott has carried beyond the borders of Alabama. As chairman of the Southern Regional Education Board's Commission on Regional Cooperation, and later as vice chairman of the SREB, Dr. Philpott helped to formulate an academic common market. The program allows for an exchange of students at the graduate level among participating institutions.

In addition to his role with SREB, Dr. Philpott currently serves on the Executive Committee of the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges. He recently served a term as chairman of the Council of College Presidents of the NASULGC and has just completed a term as president of the Southeastern Conference.

Dr. Philpott was Vice President at the University of Florida when he was named President at Auburn in 1965. He had served on the faculty at Florida prior to 1952, at which time he became Dean of Religious Life and Head of the Department of Religion and Philosophy at Stephens College, returning to Florida in 1957. Dr. Philpott, who has traveled extensively in the Orient, Europe and South America, served as a chaplain in the Navy during World War II.

The Auburn president's influence as an educational leader has been felt far beyond the campus of the institution which he leads. He has been an important spokesman for education at the state, the regional, and the national levels.

And while there has been progress, Dr. Philpott understands that much remains to be done. Another comment from his inaugural address is as valid today as it was in 1965:

"One of our most important responsibilities in the next few years will be a clear and strong endeavor to attain excellence in all areas of education."

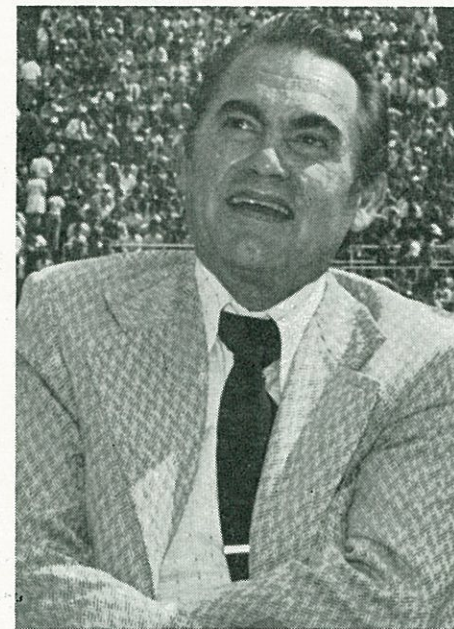

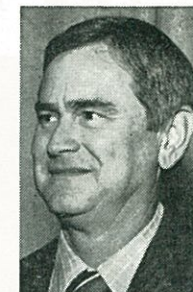

## Further Development of the University

Auburn Trustees are working toward the development of an institution, as John Masfield has put it, "Where those who hate ignorance may strive to know, where those who perceive truth may strive to make others see."

The members of the Board of Trustees are appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the State Senate. Two members are selected from the congressional district which includes Auburn and one is chosen from the remaining districts as they were drawn in 1961. The Governor of Alabama and the State Superintendent of Education are also members of the Board by virtue of their positions. In addition, two students—John Wiley, President of the Student Government Association at the main campus, and John Killian, President of the SGA at Auburn University at Montgomery—serve as ex-officio members of the Board.

Appointment to the Board of Trustees is a high honor that calls for a considerable commitment of time, energy and talent. The Auburn Board meets on a regular basis and makes important contributions to the operation and guidance of the University. Since many of them are sports fans, it is fitting that we salute them in this way for their contributions to the stability and well-being of the University.

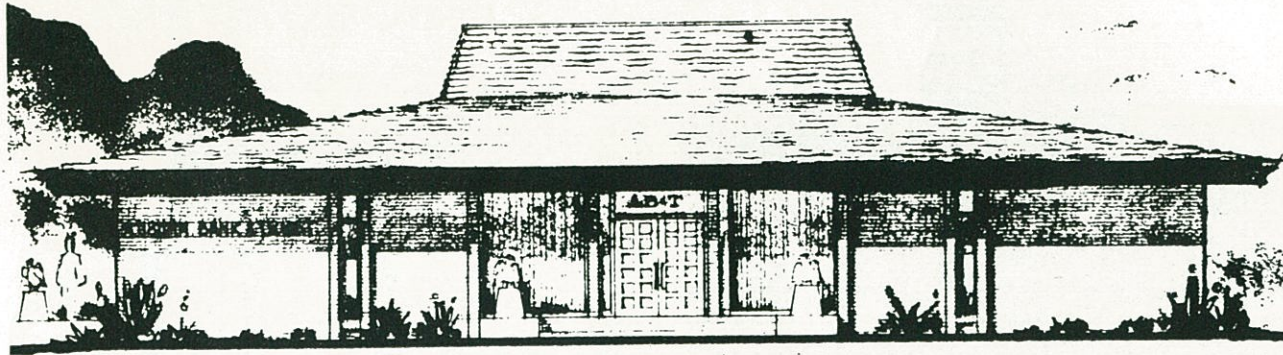

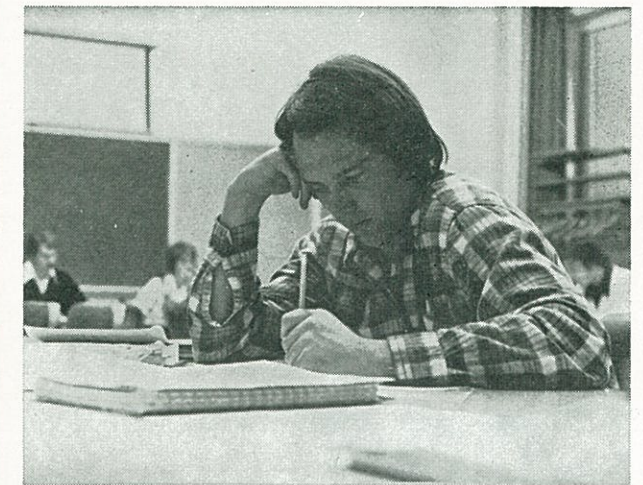

## Teamwork is paying off . . .

Auburn University and the people of Alabama . . . a team working together . . . growing together . . .

Through the years Alabamians have invested in Auburn. Last year, through their elected representatives, they gave unprecedented financial support to their land-grant university, enabling Auburn to give even greater returns on this public investment.

The most vital service Auburn performs is the education of Alabama's youth. There are approximately 16,000 students enrolled on the main campus this fall and another 3,000 on the Montgomery campus. At a time when many universities are experiencing declines in enrollment, Auburn had the largest percentage increase among all land-grant universities in the nation last fall.

Auburn students are pursuing the undergraduate degree in 121 areas; the masters degree in 48 areas; and the doctors degree in 22 areas.

A measure of Auburn's growth is the number of students graduated and the acceleration of the number of degrees awarded in recent years. From the first graduating class of five for the year 1859-60, it took 96 years to bring the alumni roll to 25,000. The next 25,000 degrees were awarded within a span of 13 years, and it will take only seven years to add the 75,000th graduate to the rolls. That milestone is expected to be reached next spring. President Harry M. Philpott, who came to Auburn in 1965, has awarded more than a third of the 71,883 degrees conferred on the main campus since Auburn was founded. An additional 1,404 degrees have been awarded through the Montgomery branch.

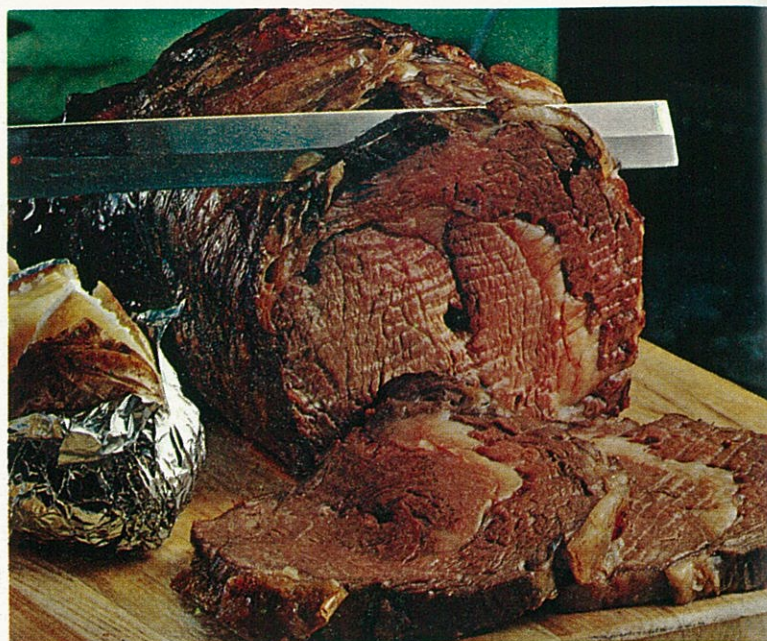




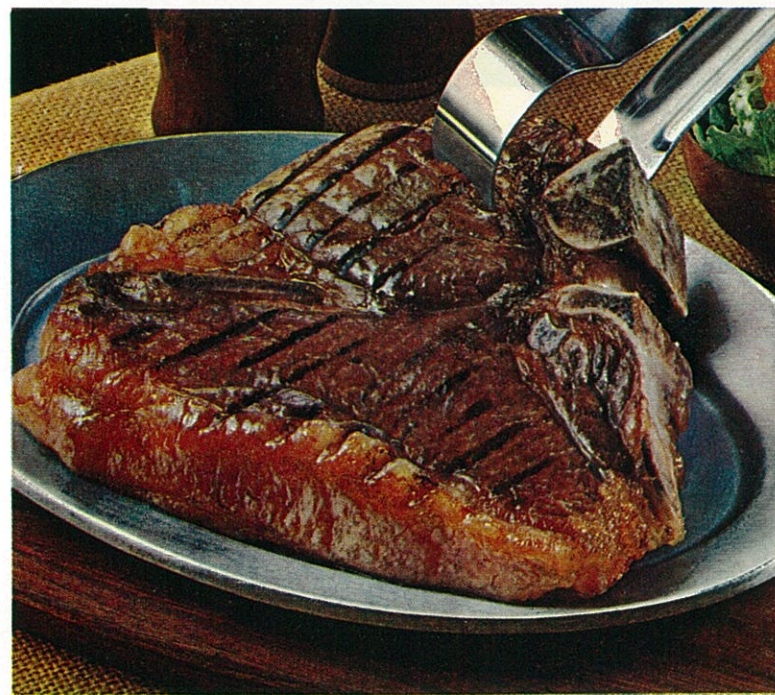

## A NEW LOOK

Sewell Hall, home of Auburn's scholarship athletes, underwent extensive renovation and modernization during the summer and a new two-story recreational wing was added, maintaining Sewell's reputation as one of America's finest athletic dormitories.

Construction of the approximately \$500,000 recreation wing began in March of this year with an expected late fall completion, while renovation of the dorm section of Sewell took place in the summer months and was completed in time to greet returning Auburn athletes for fall practice.

Designed primarily to provide athletes with space for recreational entertainment and study in their hours off the practice fields and playing courts, the recreation addition consists of eleven main rooms, and approximately 9,240 square feet of floor space.

On the first floor of the addition are a lounge type club room, a supervisor's office, a kitchen unit complete with oven and sink to be used for catering purposes at athletic social events, and a recreational game room, probably destined to be the most popular of rooms in the new addition.

Plans call for installation of ping pong, pool, card and foosball tables in the game room to provide athletes forms of relaxing entertainment in their leisure hours.

Located in the second story of the addition will be two classrooms for study purposes, an auxiliary training room where athletes can receive additional treatment for athletic injuries, and a "Letterman's Lounge" which the A-Club will use to hold its various functions. Also located on the second story will be three motel-type apartments, with the largest housing the dormitory supervisor, while the remaining two rooms will be used by visiting athletic personnel and guests of the Athletic Department.

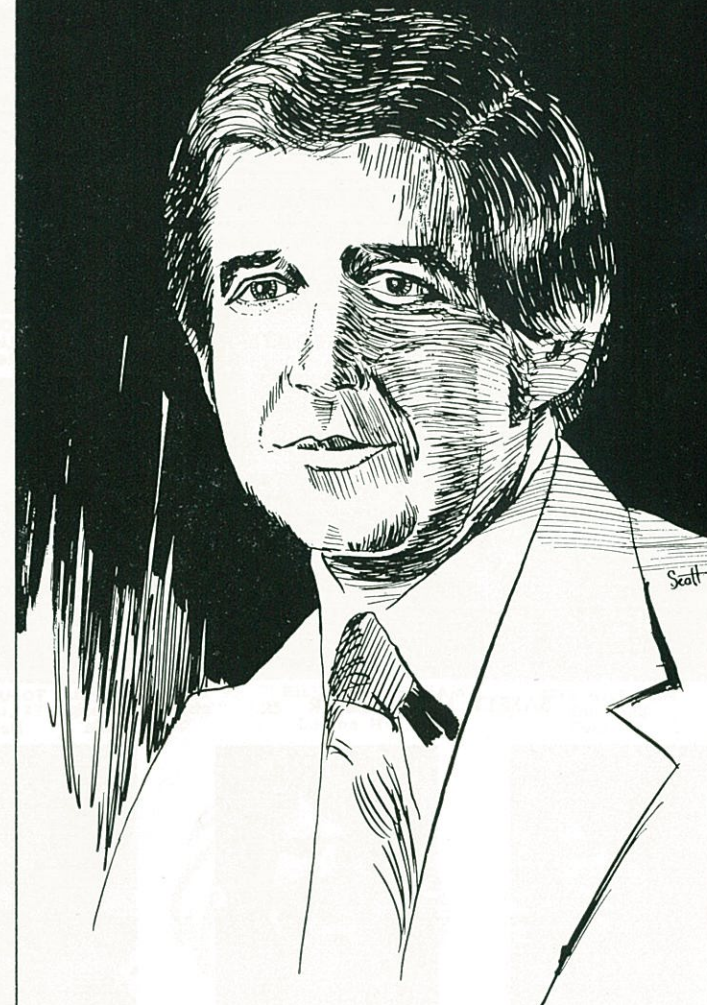
Summer improvements made to the dormitory, which was built in 1962 as the first of the modern type athletic dormitories in the nation, have already made Sewell a more comfortable place to live for Auburn athletes.

Improvements made include the repainting of all dormitory rooms, refinishing of all doors and sidewalks, replacement of all outside railing, and the improvements of showers and ceilings in dormitory rooms.

The new addition and the renovation are a major part of the effort to afford the Auburn student athlete the very finest in living accommodations.

# The Game Today

WITH

All the elements that lead to an upset are here! Auburn is one of only five unbeaten major college teams in the nation. Florida State has not won a game since 1972.

However, the Seminoles got the nation's attention just two weeks ago in Tuscaloosa when they took the third ranked Crimson Tide to the final minute before losing, 8-7.

Just the week before the Seminoles of coach Darrell Mudra jumped ahead of Baylor 17-0 at the half before losing, 21-17. In their opener against nationally ranked Pittsburgh, the Seminoles almost won, but finally dropped a 9-6 decision.

Florida State is in the enviable position this week. They have everything to gain and can afford to throw caution to the wind. They will be able to take more chances, and as a result Auburn can expect to see anything.

The Seminoles use more offensive sets than all the other six teams Auburn has faced put together. They run a lot of plays from an unbalanced line. They also like to put the ball in the air more than Auburn's previous opponents.

Defensively, FSU does the same thing. They use more different alignments than a team can prepare for in one week. They stunt a lot and Auburn's offensive line will again have to make many adjustments as the game goes along.

Mudra is in his first year as head coach at FSU, but he has faced Auburn before when he was head coach at Arizona and the two teams met in the 1968 Sun Bowl at El Paso, Texas.

Arizona scored first, but No. 2 quarterback Tommy Traylor sparked the Tigers to a 34-10 victory.

Having played the sixth best running attacks in the nation the last two games in Kentucky and Georgia Tech, Auburn's defensive totals have jumped some.

The Tigers led the nation in total defense from the first game until this week. Auburn now ranks fourth in total defense, giving up 195.8 yards per game. Notre Dame took over the lead at 179.8.

Auburn dropped to 15th in rushing defense, but moved up to third in pass defense. The Tigers are giving up 131.7 yards per game on the ground and only 64.2 per game in the air. Auburn is one of only four teams in the nation that has not given up a touchdown by passing.

Auburn is fourth in scoring defense, giving up 7.5 ppg. Yale is the nation's leader, giving up just 4.0 per game.

Auburn's running game netted only 1,678 yards in 11 games in 1973. Already this year the Tigers have passed that with 1,783 yards in six games.

The Tigers are gaining 297.3 yards per game and that figure ranks ninth in the nation in rushing offense.

Mrs. J. T. Sumner is an honest lady. "I'm not gonna lie to you," she said recently. "I get nervous when my boy is out there. I keep my head and my fingers crossed. When everybody else jumps up and hollers, I jump up and holler. Then I ask J. T. what happened!" Mrs. Sumner has spent a lot of time in the last seven weeks crossing her head and fingers. Her boy is Johnny Sumner, linebacker on the Auburn defensive unit.

Injury, of course, is her main concern. Johnny is the third of five children and her oldest boy, and even though he is not her baby boy, she still keeps an eye on him.

Mrs. Sumner is honest in other areas too. She doesn't claim to be a coach. She doesn't even claim to be a very knowledgeable football fan. In fact, she's not exactly sure what position her youngest son plays at Eufaula High School. "I think he tackles," she said. (Actually, he's an offensive tackle, and a defensive end.)

What she does know, however, is that she is proud, very proud, of all her children, especially her oldest son. And she has every reason to be.

Johnny came to Auburn five years ago as a slim 160 pound linebacker. There isn't much room in the SEC for 160 pound linebackers, but Johnny Sumner was determined to make himself a place in the sun, and there was never any doubt in his mother's mind that he would do it.

"I knew he would make it," she said. "We all knew he would make it. He got

discouraged sometimes — not very often — but we kept encouraging him. We had to wait a long time for this year, but we all knew it would come."

Now a 212-pounder, Johnny has joined the select ranks of walk-on football players who have followed and found their dream at Auburn. That list includes such notables as Sonny Ferguson, Bobby Strickland, David Beverly, Gardner Jett, Roger Mitchell and, of course, Bill Newton.

Perhaps Johnny's greatest moment came in the closing seconds of the Miami game, when Auburn was protecting a 3-0 lead, and trying to stave off a passing on-slaught by the Hurricanes. His mother, however, did not see his great moment. She is "scared of airplanes" and

did not go to Miami. She listened to Gary Sanders' play-by-play.

It was rough.

"I was wringing my hands," she recalls. "I had to get up and walk around the house. All I could say was 'Oh, Lord, Oh, Lord.'"

In other words, Mrs. Sumner had about given up.

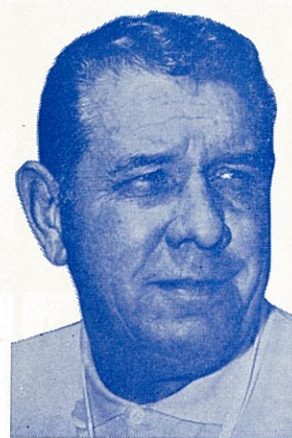

First, Coach Jordan: "We have the greatest respect for Thomas. He came here on his own and earned a scholarship. Nothing was given to him. Thomas has earned every thing he has and he hasn't always been working under the best circumstances.

"We aren't throwing the ball a lot now and it would have been easy for Thomas to have given up football after last season, but he came back for his fifth year and he has been one of the leaders of our football team — one of the real leaders. He realizes that downfield blocking and running good pass routes are just as important to our offense as catching a pass. But don't forget — Thomas is capable of breaking a game open anytime. He caught a big touchdown pass against Georgia Tech last week and he made two great catches in the Sun Bowl last year."

## Little Theatre (Y-Hut) Stages Comeback

If walls could speak, what a story the Little Theatre at the corner of College and Thach could tell. . . .

. . . Of how it was planned by the Edwin Reese family of Auburn 124 years ago, built of handmade brick on land donated by John Harper who developed the town. . . .

. . . Of the members of the First Presbyterian Church who came there to worship until the congregation outgrew the small sanctuary. . . .

. . . Of its role as a Y-Hut or as an entertainment center for World War I troops. . . .

. . . Of the tears and laughter and applause of legions of students and townspeople who were entertained there by Auburn thespians for several decades. . . .

*The historic building has been, in some form, a part of the life of every student who has attended Auburn University, for it is older than the institution itself.*

For the past two years, since the new Telfair Peet Theatre was completed, the Little Theatre has been retired from use. But like a great star who has appealed to audiences in

varied roles, the grand old building is about to stage a comeback. It will star in its original role — as a chapel. This time, it will be interdenominational to accommodate all of the students, faculty and townspeople who have come to claim it.

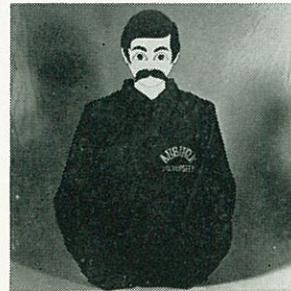
The Little Theatre has earned its "Oscar" for performance. As the oldest existing building on the campus, it is listed in the National Register of Historic Buildings.

Many people are lending support to the restoration of the Little Theatre as University Chapel. Part of the interior furnishings are being donated by Chi Omega sorority. A grant by the Alabama Historical Commission is being matched by the University. A substantial donation has been made by the Ed Lee Spencer, Jr., family of Auburn. Architecture Professor Nick Davis is preparing a historical study and design layout.

When completed, the University Chapel will again become an integral part of the lives of students, faculty and people of the University community who wish to use it for meetings, weddings, or for private needs. That, essentially, is what the early settlers of Auburn had in mind when they built it in 1850.



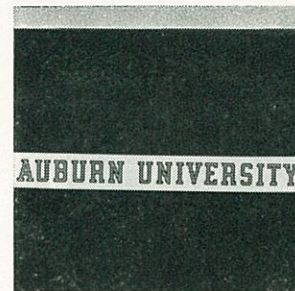

Upcoming junior Terry Leach, whose 9-0 pitching record was only the third perfect mark in Auburn history, and senior Davis May, 9-3, will head the mound corps in 1975.

**WRESTLING**—In his first season at Auburn, Coach Virgil Milliron continued a tradition that now-retired Swede Umbach began many years ago—keeping Auburn wrestling on the top in the Southeast.

Milliron took the Tigers to their third straight SEC title and had four wrestlers win individual championships. Keith Cotroneo (126), David Cathey (134), Bob Haun (142) and George Calloway (177) placed first in the SEC meet at Tuscaloosa. Haun was voted the outstanding wrestler of the meet and Calloway became the first athlete in history to win four titles in any sport in the SEC. Three Auburn wrestlers, Rick Romano (118), Ken Butts (158) and Gary Crews (167) placed second in the SEC. Milliron was the SEC's Coach of the Year.

Auburn also captured the Southeastern Intercollegiate Wrestling Association championship, its 26th crown in 28 years. Five Auburn wrestlers won individual titles in the SEIWA and eight of ten Tiger entrants were first or second place finishers.

Milliron will have everyone returning in 1975 except Cathey, Calloway, and Haun.

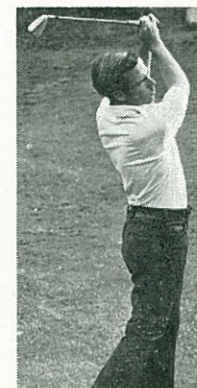
Drews heads up a contingent coming back in 1975 that includes Paul Buff, David Harbach, Don Langenmayr and Gary Schatz, all of whom placed third or higher in the SEC meet. Reese did not lose anyone to graduation last season.

**BASEBALL**—Coming within one game of winning the SEC's Eastern Division title, Auburn's baseball team finished third in the conference and had its best overall record in seven years. Coach Paul Nix' crew went 31-13 this spring, the best mark since 1967 when Auburn had a 32-10 record and made it to the College World Series.

Auburn loses All-SEC third baseman Vic Sharek and reserve pitcher Bill Lawrence but will have seven regulars around next season. Hitting leaders back include 2B David Dufner (.315), SS Mickey Miller (.290), 1B Gary Dailey (.282) and RF Steve Rea (.282).

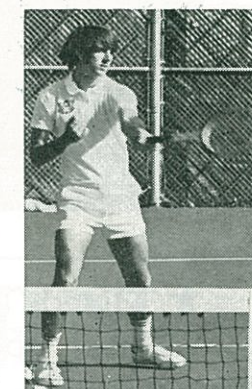

**TRACK**—With world-class sprinter Clifford Outlin putting a new-found notoriety into Auburn track, Coach Mel Rosen's squad finished a surprising

fourth in the SEC outdoor track and qualified six men for the NCAA championships, the most ever from Auburn. The Tigers were seventh in the SEC indoor meet.

Outlin became Auburn's most heralded sprinter ever by capturing the NCAA 60 yard dash indoor title and placing fourth in the 100 yard dash outdoors in the NCAA championships. Outlin beat Tennessee's Reggie Jones, the eventual NCAA 100 yard dash champ, in the SEC meet. After qualifying in an AAU meet to run the 60 meter dash, Outlin tied the world record in winning the 60 meters in a U.S.-U.S.S.R. meet in Moscow.

The six Auburn qualifiers for the NCAA meet were Outlin, Bret Dull (discus), Jerry Wooden (triple jump), David McKannan (3-mile), Danny Smith (440 hurdles) and Jim Carson (120 hurdles). A freshman from Huntsville, McKannan set varsity school records in the two-mile, three-mile and six-mile.

The Auburn cross-country team finished fifth in the league.

Auburn has signed New York sprinter Willie Smith, who runs a 9.3 hundred and holds two national prep records, national junior college decathlon champ Mike Anderson and outstanding distance man Coleman Spalding of Birmingham.

Auburn Basketball *BOUNCING BACK*

Bolstered by an outstanding recruiting year and stellar 1974 performances by freshmen Eddie Johnson and Pepto Bolden, Auburn basketball program is bouncing back, making strides toward respectability in the SEC.

Coach Bob Davis begins his second season at Auburn after a 20-year career at Georgetown (Ky.) College where he won over 400 games. Davis will have four starters returning off his first Auburn team which had a 10-16 overall record and a 5-13 SEC mark surprising the most optimistic forecasters.

Hard work by Davis and assistants Larry Phillips and John Lykins has Auburn basketball fans singing an optimistic song. Season ticket sales are expected to soar in 1975 as the War Eagles continue to work toward their ultimate goal—An SEC championship.

Johnson, a guard from Weirsdale, Fla., and Bolden, a center from Talladega, lead the list of returnees. Johnson averaged 22.3 points a game and became the first freshman in history to lead the SEC in scoring. Bolden swept rebounding honors in the conference by averaging 12.3 per game.

Versatile Gary Redding of Atlanta, Ga., and Bob Bond, from Bean Blossom, Ind., are the other starters back. The two forwards teamed with Bolden last season and were largely responsible for Auburn's second place SEC ranking in team rebounding.

Several prep All-Americans may give the veterans stiff competition for starting jobs in 1975. The guard slot opposite Johnson is wide open and a battle between junior Bob Mandula and incoming freshmen Wayne Bracy, Stan Pietkiewicz and Jim Krivacs is expected to develop. Other backcourt prospects include Bill Turner, Bill Wallace, and Dale Deschamps.

Junior center Glen Moon has made rapid improvement but will be challenged by freshman Mike Mitchell and Myles Patrick for playing time behind Bolden. Additional front-line candidates are junior Mike Roach and sophs David Cunningham, Roger Jorgensen, Emmett Thomas and Ray Woodard.

Davis' teams are known for their aggressive defense and fast break offense. "We have the personnel to play the running style of basketball," he says. "We don't believe in slowing things down and waiting for something to happen. We like to make it happen."

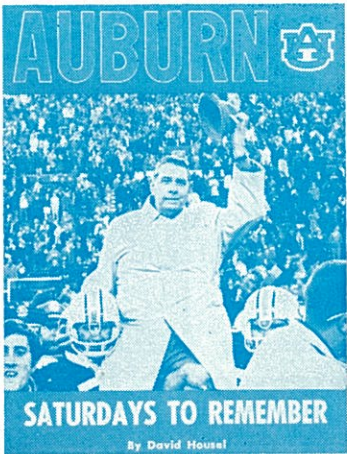

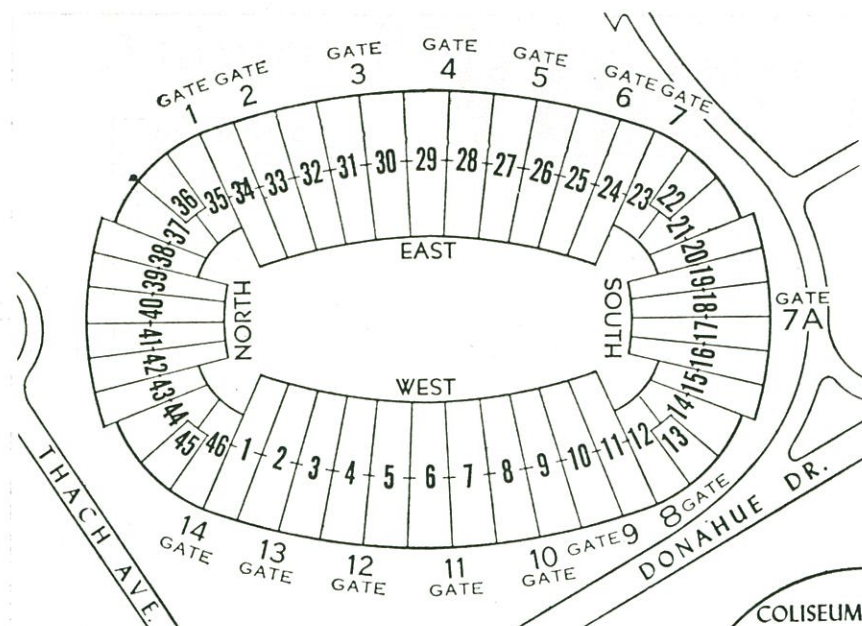

## REST ROOMS

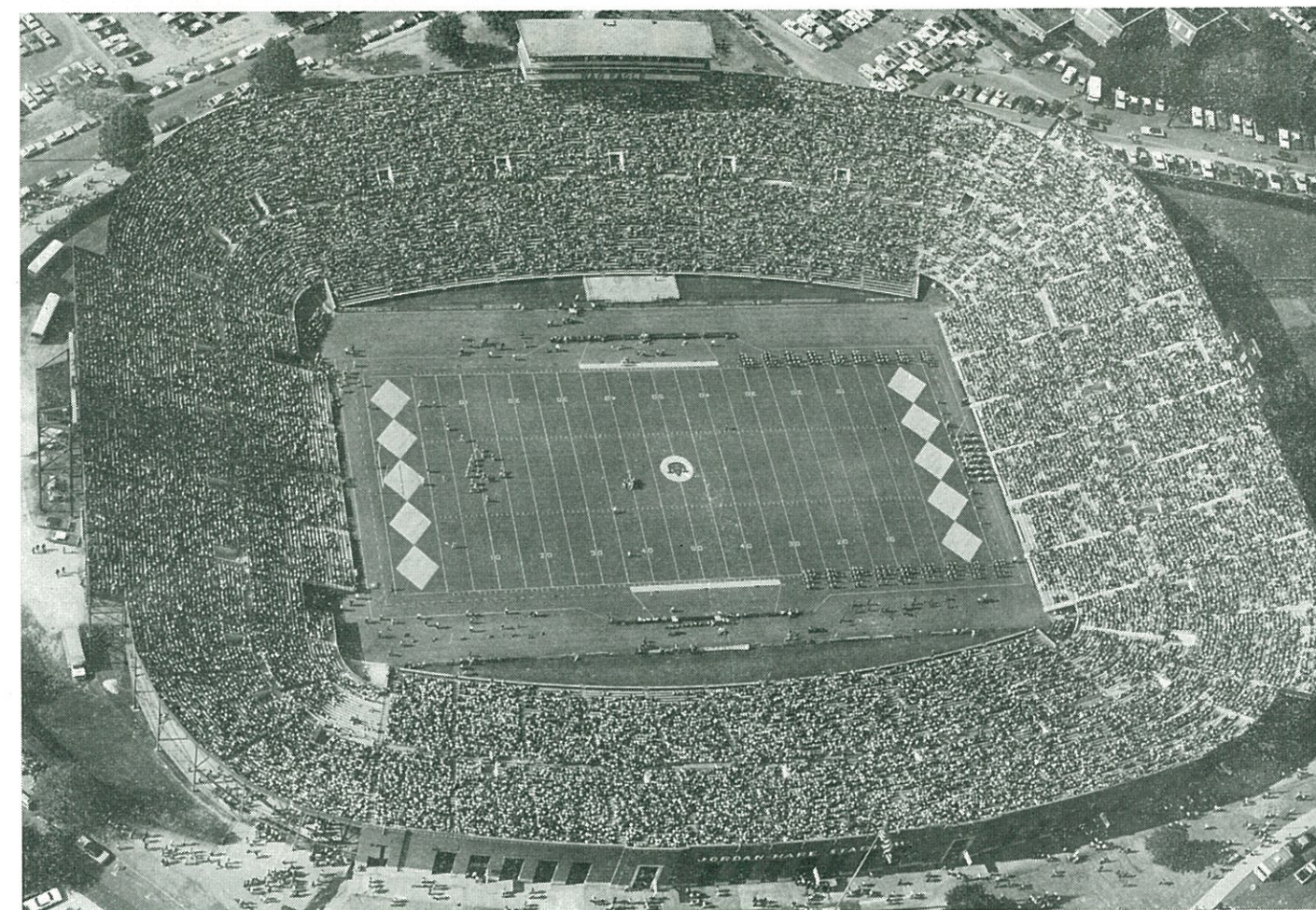

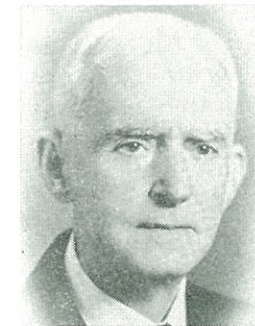

It was my pleasure yesterday to report to the Board of Trustees a number of substantial gains made by Auburn University during the fiscal year which ended June 30, 1974. Many of these are counter to experiences of other universities which have experienced declines in enrollment and in public support.

For instance, the 9.89 per cent increase in Auburn's combined enrollment for the two campuses last fall was the highest percentage increase reported by any member institution of the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges. On the main campus at Auburn, enrollment increased by 8.1 per cent, reaching 15,705. Auburn University at Montgomery enrolled 2,512 for an increase of 22 per cent. Graduate level enrollment was at a record high on both campuses.

Auburn received an unprecedented percentage increase in state appropriations. The \$62,879,408 appropriated by the Legislature for 1973-75 was 35.9 per cent over the previous biennial appropriation. Extramural funding for research and other programs amounted to \$11,903,207. This was 11 per cent over the previous year. Total giving through the Auburn Alumni Association exceeded \$1.2 million for a new high.

There are other measures of Auburn's growth. Our building program continues at a steady pace. The new pharmacy building program is moving as scheduled and this new center should be ready for occupancy by the fall of 1975. An \$800,000 development program has been initiated for the School of Pharmacy. Renovations of the Auburn Union and of the Animal Sciences building have been completed, as well as the second phase of Goodwin Hall in the Fine Arts Center and the first phase of a classroom building on the Montgomery campus. Physical education facilities are being expanded with the addition of nine tennis courts and ten indoor handball courts and improvements are being made to Sewell Hall.

The University has acquired additional land in Macon County which will enable the Agricultural Experiment Station to expand and modernize its research programs. The programs of Extension continue to serve the needs of those beyond our campuses.

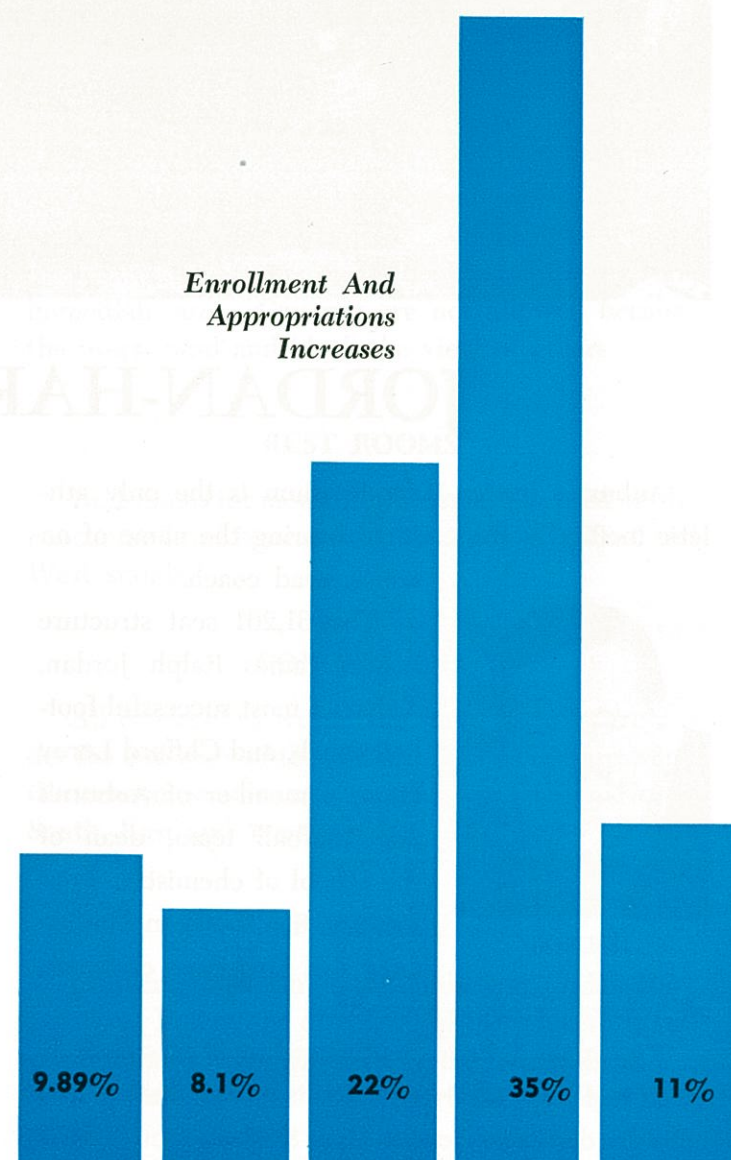
Final settlement of the estate of Miss Eleanor E. Ritchey opened the way for Auburn to begin receiving a portion of the earnings from this trust fund and to begin planning for its future use in research of small animal diseases.

**OFFSIDE** by either team; violation of scrimmage or free kick formation; Encroachment on neutral zone—Loss of Five Yards.

**ILLEGAL PROCEDURE, POSITION OR SUBSTITUTION**—Putting ball in play before Referee signals "Ready-for-Play"; Failure to complete substitution before play starts; Player out-of-bounds when scrimmage begins; Failure to maintain proper alignment of offensive team when ball is snapped; False start or simulating start of a play; Taking more than two steps after Fair Catch is made; Player on line receiving snap; Free kick out-of-bounds—Loss of Five Yards.

**ILLEGAL MOTION**—Offensive player illegally in motion when ball is snapped—Loss of Five Yards.

**ILLEGAL USE OF HANDS AND ARMS** by offensive or defensive player—Loss of 15 Yards.

**DELAY OF GAME**—Consuming more than 25 seconds in putting the ball in play after it is declared ready-for-play; Interrupting the 25-second count for any reason other

than a free or excess time out granted by Referee; Failure to remove injured player for whom excess time out was granted; Crawling—Loss of Five Yards. Team not ready to play at start of either half—Loss of 15 Yards.

**BALL ILLEGALLY TOUCHED, KICKED OR BATTED**—Forward pass being touched by ineligible receiver beyond the line of scrimmage—Loss of 15 Yards from Spot of Preceding Down and Loss of a Down. Eligible pass receiver going out-of-bounds and later touching a forward pass—Loss of Down; Illegally kicking the ball—Loss of 15 Yards.

**PERSONAL FOUL**—Tackling or blocking defensive player who has made Fair Catch; Piling on; Hurdling; Grasping face mask of opponent; Tackling player out of bounds, or running into player obviously out of play; Striking an opponent with fist, forearm, elbow or locked hands; Kicking or kneeing—Loss of 15 Yards.

**CLIPPING**—Loss of 15 Yards.

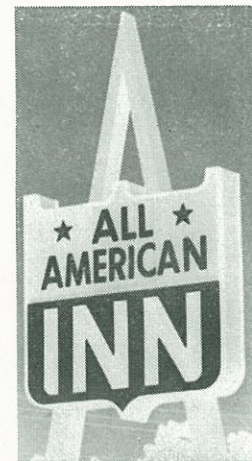

**FORWARD PASS OR KICK CATCHING INTERFERENCE**—Interference with opportunity of player of receiving team to catch a kick—Loss of 15 Yards. Interference by member of offensive team with defensive player making pass interception—Loss of 15 Yards Plus Loss of Down. Interference by defensive team on forward pass—Passing Team's Ball at Spot of Foul and First Down.

**INELIGIBLE RECEIVER DOWNFIELD ON PASS**—Loss of 15 Yards.

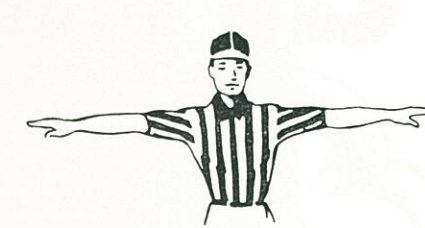

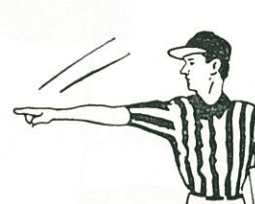
