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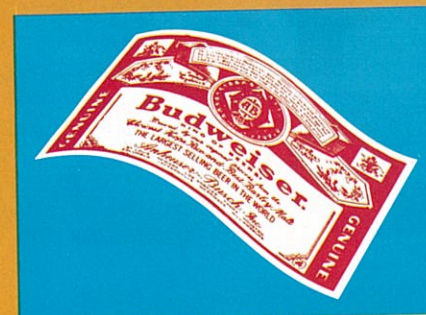

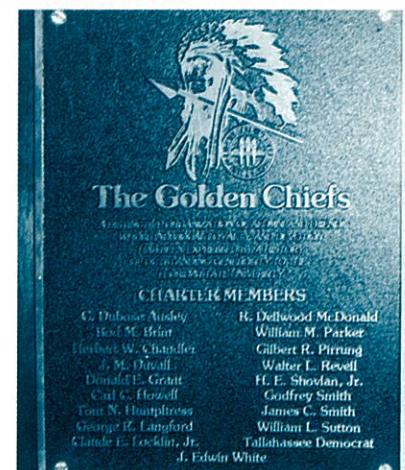

A group of nineteen individuals and companies has formed a new, super division of the Seminole Boosters, The Golden Chiefs. These dedicated supporters of the FSU athletic program say the purpose of the new organization is to provide additional funds for the athletic program and to help fill Doak Campbell Stadium for every home game. # IT BEGINS with BOWDEN!

## AND IT HAS BEGUN!

Each issue of SEMINOLE SIDELINE '76 has featured an interview with FSU head football coach Bobby Bowden. In this final football program magazine for the '76 football season, we talk to Bowden about that snow bowl at Denton, Texas, what the outlook is for tonight's game against Virginia Tech and preview next season's possibilities.

The game against North Texas State was played under "the worst possible conditions," according to Bobby Bowden. Legend has it, and Texans perpetrate the legend, that everything is bigger, or wider, or deeper, or longer, or whatever if it's in Texas. The Seminoles of FSU boarded a plane in sunny Tallahassee, checked in to their motel in Denton, and, next morning, woke up to find not just a snow fall but, true to Texas standards, a whopping 4 to 5 inches of snow on the ground!

The field at North Texas State had neither been covered with a tarp nor cleared of the snow. So, it was snow, that same 4 to 5 inches of snow on the playing field when game time arrived. Along with the snow was a temperature reading of 32 degrees and a brisk wind.

Surprisingly, the Tribe seemed to enjoy playing in the snow, played one of their better games of the season and, again, came from behind in the closing minutes of the game to win it, 21-20. That gives the Seminoles a 4-6 record going into tonight's game.

Late in the fourth quarter, North Texas State led FSU 20-13. The Tribe drove downfield (snow-plowed downfield?) some 69 yards. Jeff Leggett then scored on a run of seven yards. This made



the score NTS 20, FSU 19. There was no doubt in the minds of Bob Shackleton's radio audience that Bowden would go for two. But how?

Time out was called to set the play. Black took the snap, pitched out to Larry Key, and Key then lobbed a pass to Kurt Unglaub in the end zone. FSU 21, NTS 20!

Earlier, on that very cold Saturday afternoon, with only 3,850 fans

in attendance, Jimmy Black tied the score 7-7 in the closing seconds of the first half with a 9-yard pass to Ed Beckman.

Early in the second half, Black hit Unglaub on a 91-yard scoring play, but Cappelen's kick was wide. NTS came back with another TD, but the kick was wide. As the quarter ended, the score was NTS 20, FSU 13.

In the closing moments of the



game, FSU came back to win it 21-20, another cliff hanger.

Coach Bowden was enthusiastic about the win. Clad in a garnet sweater with gold slacks and a gold turtleneck, he described it, "Well, it really was a great win for us, going out there and playing under the worst conditions you could have. I never played in a game like that! I'm sure none of my boys have and may never again. Up north when it snows like that they either scrape the field or have canvas over it . . . the field may be a little damp but you never have snow on the field. But Saturday about five inches of snow had accumulated and they had no way of removing it."

Bowden was high in his praise for quarterback Jimmy Black. "Jimmy Black was the spark coming in to this one; anybody who could throw the ball on a day like that is just unbelievable. He just went back and scrambled until somebody could get open and then he'd throw a perfect pass and our receivers had their best day . . . they didn't drop any passes that were to them."

It was pointed out to Bowden that in the last two games (Southern Mississippi and North Texas State) two touchdown scoring passes were completed which erased the old 85-yard record held by Barry Smith.

Bowden said, "It was a great catch by Unglaub, and, of course, a great throw by Black and our offensive line gave them great protection. It was a fantastic play under the circumstances."

The final score again, FSU 21, NTS 20.

#### Tonight's game against Virginia Tech

Bowden was asked about tonight's game against the Virginia Tech Gobblers.

"Well, Virginia Tech has always been a thorn in the side of FSU. I remember when I was here before we'd go to Virginia Tech with a great football team, and, maybe, they wouldn't have such a good football team and they'd still beat us . . . they've been very tough on Florida State down through the years and I just hope it's time to turn it around."

"Richmond beat 'em last week

and that means the coach will have their attention this week, so they'll be very difficult."

What about the physical condition of the club for tonight's game?

"Well, against North Texas State, Keith Singletary was injured and did not make the trip, Woolford did not make the trip and Paul Philippy did not make the trip because of injuries and, uh, Joe Camps might have played about one play and that's about all."

"We came out of the NTS game with no injuries except for Jimmy Black who was hampered somewhat. He got hurt early in the game but didn't know it because it was so dad-blamed cold . . . it's just a pulled muscle. Going into the Virginia Tech game we should be in pretty good shape physically."

#### And, what about the Seminoles next year?

With the last game of the 1976 season scheduled for tonight, what can Seminole fans look forward to next year? A premature question? Probably. But Bowden had some thoughts on this when he was interviewed in his field house office last Sunday.

We pointed out that statistics do not always tell the entire story. FSU will wind up with a losing season but there are several areas that are encouraging. How does Bowden evaluate this year, looking at next year?

"Well, this past year there were only two games that I felt really bad about; one was Miami and the other was Clemson. To get beaten as bad as we did by Miami was very disappointing. Miami deserved to win, but not by that kind of score. Now the Clemson game I felt like we should've won."

"Now the fact that we've had a losing season disappoints me but, yet, I look at the effort of our boys and we've got a lot of these boys coming back next year, so I sure hope we can be improved."

Bowden went on to talk about the many freshmen he's played this year. "I feel this is very encouraging, because now these boys have a year under their belts, rather than not having a year under their belts. But, we'll probably have to play freshmen again next year because we're losing, y'know, thirty-some seniors. It

looks like we'll have to scramble again next year with youngsters we've got coming back. Then—I hope we're on sound footing so it will be harder for freshmen to play for us the year after that."

Bowden was lavish in his praise for Seminole fans and their support throughout the season. "I really appreciate the way they stayed behind us. Their enthusiasm has meant a lot to us, and especially during the Homecoming game. Our student body, especially, was unbelievable. When we were getting beat, uh, by seventeen points, they stayed up and cheered and kept their fight and I know it meant a lot to our football team when they were able to pull that football game out for them."

"I think our fans and their support have been excellent and just that—soon—we can give 'em a winner. Next year's the year!"

#### A final look at last week's game

Some of the stats from last week's game against the Mean Green of North Texas State are interesting. Perhaps the most interesting is the 21-20 score when, under the weather conditions, a much lower score would have been expected.

In the air, FSU completed a remarkable 12 out of 18 for 192 yards. North Texas State attempted only 9 passes, completed only 4 of those for 44 yards. Unglaub caught 4, Key 3 and Beckman 2. Barnes, Leggett and Thomas had one each.

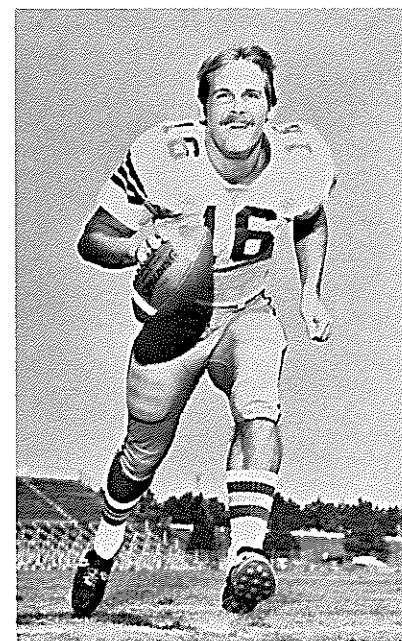
On the ground, FSU rolled through the snow for 151 yards, NTS, perhaps more used to that weather, accumulated 180 yards. For the Seminoles, Key gained 89 yards, Leggett 37, Thomas 18, Black 8 and Lyles 7.

Bill Duley, despite fumbling a snap from center on one play, averaged 42.6 yards a punt. FSU kicked four times, NTS seven times.

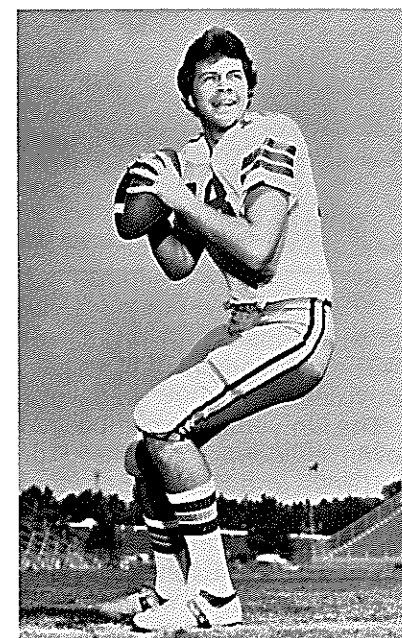
The cold weather really showed up in the fumble statistics. The Tribe fumbled seven times, losing five of them. The Mean Green fumbled only four times and lost just one of them.

Despite the snow and cold, FSU was penalized only one time. NTS, however, had the flag thrown four times.

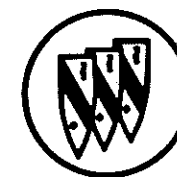
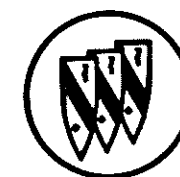

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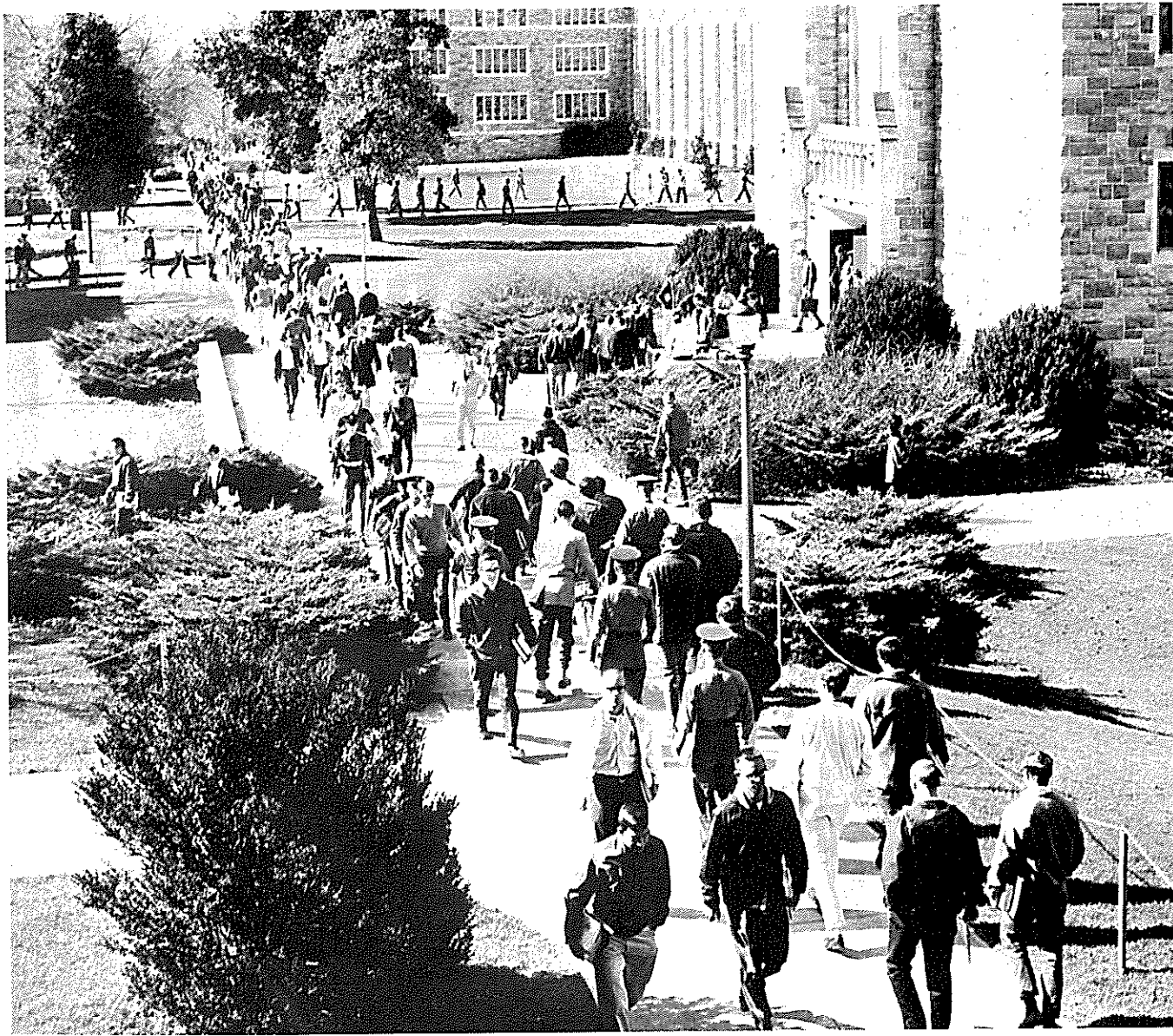
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# VIRGINIA POLYTECHNIC INSTITUTE AND STATE UNIVERSITY

Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University began its second century of service to the state, nation and world in 1972. Founded as Virginia's land grant university, Virginia Tech—as the University is popularly known—has the largest resident enrollment in the state with more than 19,000 students.

Tech's campus, acknowledged as one of the nation's most beautiful, includes 85 principal buildings. Among them are the Carol M. Newman Library, with more than 800,000 volumes; the modern Squires Student Center; Lane Stadium, seating 38,000 and the 10,000 seat Tech Coliseum.

Serving the student body are more than 1,000 faculty

members, 67 per cent of whom hold the doctorate. Virginia Tech offers an outstanding university-level education that is geared to meet the challenges of today's knowledge explosion. In addition, the University serves the state and the nation through its Extension Division (the off campus educational arm) and the Research Division (respon-

sible for fostering the growth and enhancement of research activities).

The University is composed of seven academic colleges: Agriculture and Life Sciences, Architecture, Arts and Sciences, Business, Education, Engineering and Home Economics.

Undergraduate work leads to the Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of

Architecture, Bachelor of Landscape Architecture or Bachelor of Technology degree. Each program of study includes liberal amounts of basic sciences, humanities and other electives to provide a broad education and a strong base for an effective life as a useful citizen.

Graduate work is offered in more than 65 fields of study leading to the Master of Arts, Master of Accountancy, Master of Business Administration, Master of Forestry, Master of Science, Master of Engineering, Master of Architecture, Master of Urban Affairs, Master of Urban and Regional Planning and Doctor of Education. Programs are offered in more than 40 fields leading to the

Doctor of Philosophy degree.

Virginia Tech is located in Blacksburg, Virginia with a population of 24,000. It's 2,100 feet above sea level in the Allegheny mountains, 38 miles west of Roanoke.

The official University colors worn by Tech athletic teams are Chicago Maroon and Burnt Orange. Those colors were worn for the first time on October 20, 1896 in a football game against Roanoke College. A committee chose the colors—so the story goes—because they "made a unique combination not worn elsewhere" at the time.

There are two nicknames given to Tech athletic teams, both used with about the same frequency, "Gobblers" and "Hokies".

Although the turkey gobbler has been adopted as the team mascot, the "Gobbler" nickname came to be applied to Tech teams in an entirely unrelated manner. Prior to 1909, the non-athletics and the athletes ate in the same dining hall, but at different tables. The athletes, at their special training tables, received a more abundant diet and were kidded by the non-athletes for "gobbling" their food.

"Hokie"? Well, that's something else. It came from a cheer made up by student O.M. Stull in 1896. He said the word had no special significance, was just an attention getter. When the "Gobbler" fans cut loose with a "Hokie" cheer, it does get attention!

## Virginia Tech Head Football Coach JAMES A. (JIMMY) SHARPE

Jimmy Sharpe, 36, once headed toward a career in personnel management, is the personable mastermind who, during the past two seasons, has revived Virginia Tech's previously sagging football fortunes.



After 15 years - four as a player and 11 as a coach - in Alabama's successful program, Sharpe's initiation as head coach at Virginia Tech started out as a shocking nightmare. The Gobblers lost the first four games of the 1974 season. Since then, the Hokies have won twice as many as they have lost, 12-6.

Promising nothing except that the Gobblers would "work and hit", Sharpe never let up in building a winning edge.

Prior to the start of this season Tech had won eight of its last nine.

Sharpe's credentials as a fundamentally sound coach and one of the nation's foremost salesmen of a well honed wishbone offense are well established.

"The wishbone puts an element of toughness into the

squad, and therein lies the biggest secret to the Hokies' so far modest but continuing improvement.

Alabama Coach Bear Bryant's original recommendation has proven most accurate. Of Sharpe as a player, Bryant said, "He wasn't very big (as a two-way guard), but he would fight until the final second. He put as much into playing as anyone I've ever seen, and he coaches the same way.

"He is intelligent, is a good coach at the blackboard and on the field, gets a lot out of his players and is a good recruiter.

"He's a hard worker and that's where it all starts."

Sharpe and his wife, the former Anne Alford, are natives of Montgomery, Ala. They have a son, Jay, and two daughters, Shannon and Valerie.

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# FLASHBACK

A flashback in time to the game played November 11, 1967. It was a high scoring game with Florida State coming out on the long end of a 38-15 score against Virginia Tech.

In 1967, then as now, the final home game of the season for the Seminoles was against the Gobblers of Virginia Tech. At this time in the 1967 season, the Seminoles were looking for a sixth straight win.

Grant Guthrie put the Tribe out front early in the game with a 45 yard field goal. In the second period, Bill Cox pulled in a Kim Hammond pass and scampered into the end zone with the first of FSU's many touchdowns of the day.

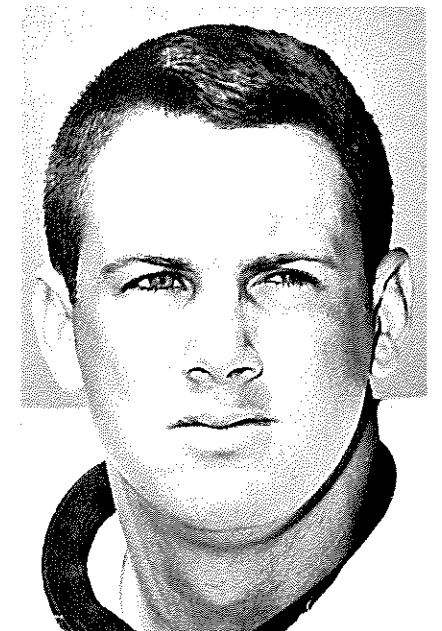
Leading 10-0 at the half, the Seminoles quickly expanded the margin as Hammond hit All-American Ron Sellers with a 75 yard bomb. Sellers made a spectacular run into the end zone, eluding Tech's All-American safety Frank Loria. But, the Gobblers narrowed the gap to 17-7 with an Al Kincaid pass. Then, Bill Moreman hit Sellers on the fullback option play for another FSU score. A pass interception by Chuck Eason set up another FSU score moments later when Hammond lofted a 10 yard aerial to Sellers.

Edwards added another touchdown for Tech before the end of the third period and Kincaid was successful with a two point conversion to make the score 31-15.

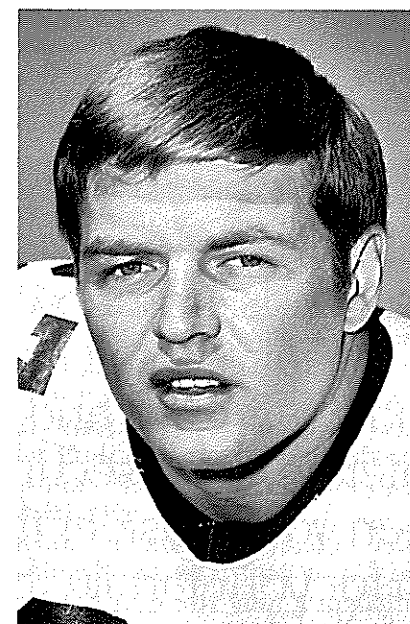
In the final period, Hammond found Cox again for a 13 yard scoring play and Guthrie added the PAT for a final score of FSU 38, Virginia Tech 15.



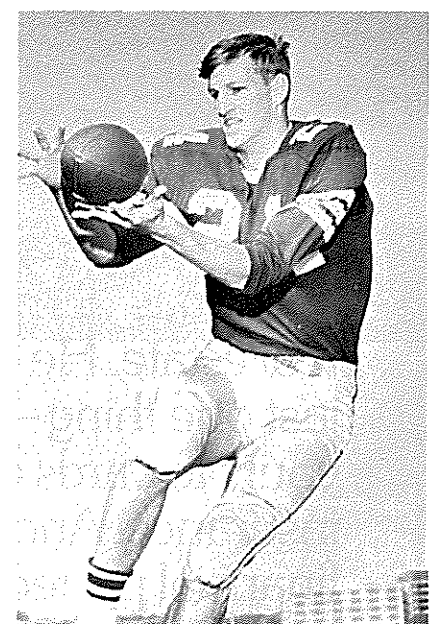

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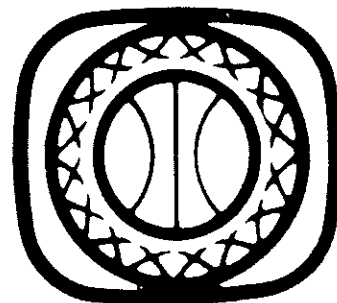


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## METRO CONFERENCE ADDS FSU BASKETBALL



Florida State currently plays its games in Tully Gym which seats only 3,500. Construction is about to begin on the new 12,000 seat Tallahassee Civic Center and officials are hopeful the Seminoles will be playing in it by 1978.

Durham also acknowledged the strong role that the University administration played in helping secure the conference berth. "We are certainly appreciative of the support and effort of the administration," he said.

"Without the concentrated effort of Athletic Director John Bridgers and Dr. Steve McClellan we would have never reached this reality."

McClellan, Vice President for University Relations, underscored the many advantages the Metro Conference membership will present to the University.

"Of course the financial advantages are numerous. The prospect of a large new home arena coupled with a strong conference schedule and the rivalries it will present should mean outstanding attendance for basketball.

"There will also be additional revenues coming from the Conference tournament and a probable Conference TV package. But even going beyond the financial picture, a strong conference tie-up like this will mean a great deal of additional exposure for Florida State University.

The Seminoles will be no stranger to the Metro Conference teams. The overall record in basketball against all six league charter members is 26-26. Under Durham's guidance, the Seminoles are 20-14

against league foes.

Florida State holds a 10-8 advantage over Georgia Tech, is 6-2 against Tulane and 1-0 against St. Louis. Cincinnati holds a 2-1 mark against the Seminoles, while Louisville has won four of five encounters and Memphis State 11 of 18.

Louisville (Jan. 3 at Louisville) and Memphis State (Jan. 15 at Memphis) are both on this year's Florida State schedule.

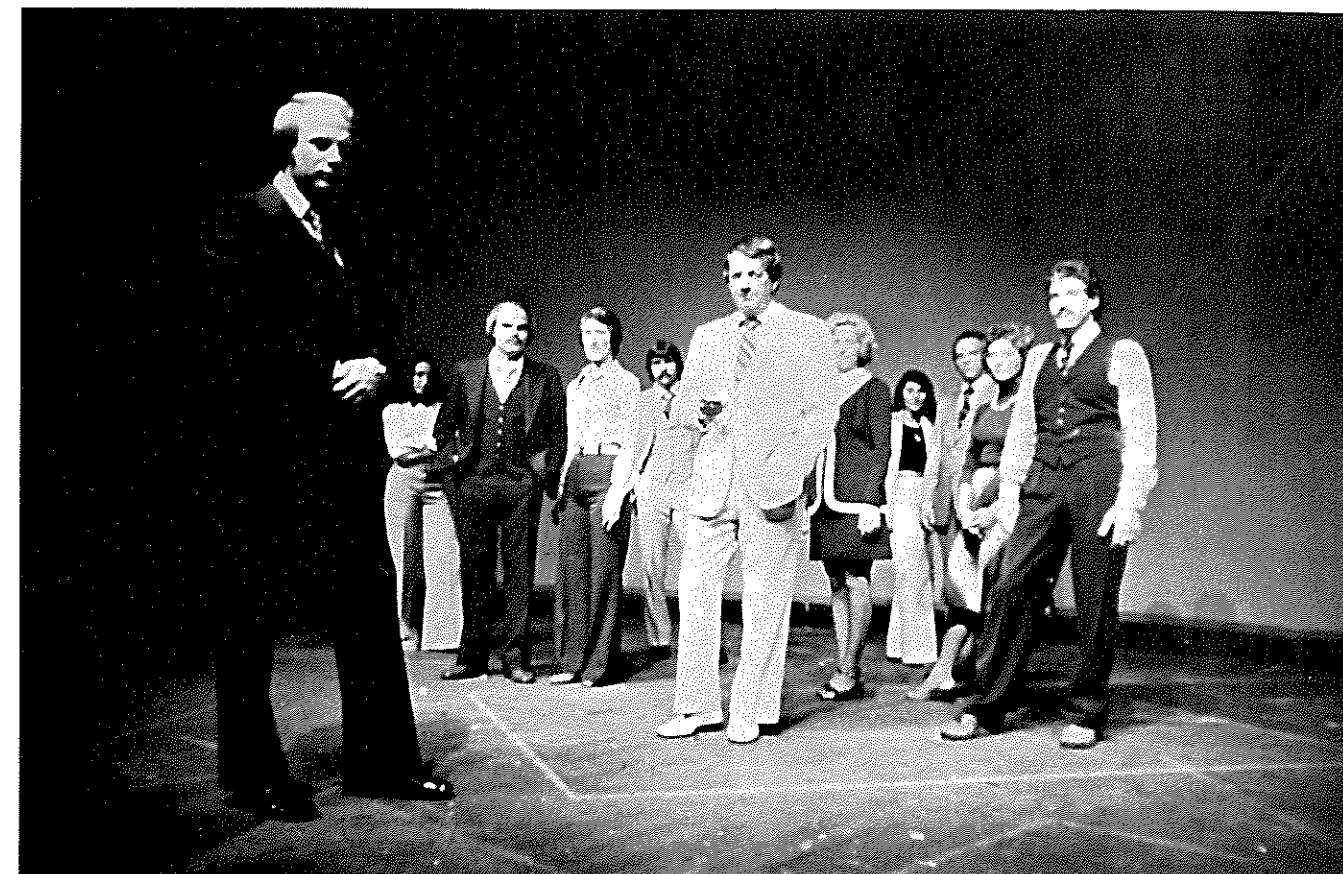
Although the Seminoles have traditionally been an independent in athletics, the conference affiliation will not be the first for the University. During the school's formative years of modern intercollegiate athletics in the late 1940's, FSU was a member of the old Dixie Conference.

The history of Florida State University dates back to 1857 when it was founded as the Seminary West of the Suwanee. The University enjoyed a brief athletic history early in the twentieth century with only very sketchy records remaining from football schedules in 1902-1905.

By 1905 the state legislature reorganized the university system and the Tallahassee school became Florida State College for Women, a status it retained until the close of World War II.

In 1947 the college became co-educational and renamed Florida State University. It played its first athletic competition that fall in football.

FSU is now one of nine institutions in the State University System and its athletic program as well as its academic area is one of the more highly regarded in the nation.

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# BOOSTERS

The FSU Seminole Boosters, Inc. was formed in January, 1974 to assume the impressive, if not monumental, task of securing voluntary and private financial support for the Florida State University intercollegiate athletic program. While most visible and usually associated with the football season, the Boosters actually support the entire athletic program, football, basketball, baseball, track and field, swimming, tennis, golf and women's athletics.

The Boosters have had three chairmen since organizing in 1974; Lou Hill of Tallahassee was the first chairman, he was succeeded by Doyle Pope of Quincy. The current Booster chairman is George Langford of Tallahassee. Other officers this year: Dr. Doug Henderson, secretary; Tom Kinnebrew, treasurer; Jim Smith, Alumni Association representative; Charles Gardner, chairman of the Committee of 100.

The executive director of the Boosters is Andy Miller, whose soft southern drawl belies the intense activity and frantic schedule he follows in directing fund raising activities.

"While our ultimate goal is raising funds for student athlete scholarships," says Miller, "we are interested in working with anyone who is striving to improve the status of intercollegiate activities at Florida State."

"We have, or are, developing programs that can involve all the friends of Florida State University, no matter what their status and we urge those friends to contact this office."

The local Booster Club and the Committee of 100 has sponsored the Spring Garnet and Gold Game and barbecue, the Seminole Celebrity Golf Classic, the annual Ticket Blitz-Booster Drive and various other projects.

However, Booster activities are neither confined nor limited to the greater Tallahassee area. There are active booster clubs in Jacksonville, Escambia county, Tampa, Orlando, Miami, Lake City, Gadsden county and Atlanta. These clubs arrange charter bus trips to games, assist coaches in recruiting, have regular meetings with game films and raise funds in their area.

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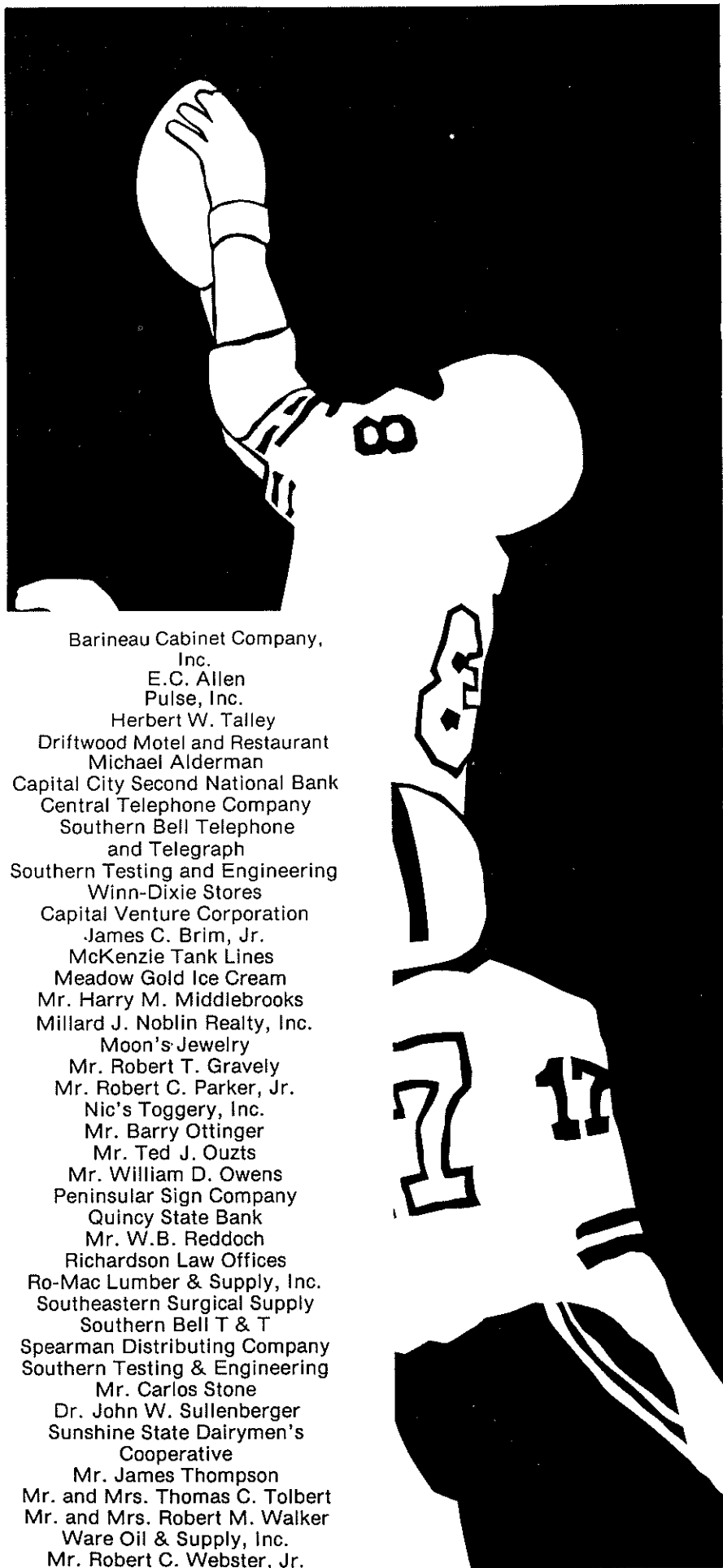



For those of you who'll be in town Monday, check with the Tallahassee Area Chamber of Commerce. The Chamber has literature detailing tours of the city that you can take yourself. And, of course, don't forget to visit the Capitol on South Monroe. Tours of the capitol and its historic exhibits are available on a continuous basis from 9:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m., Monday through Saturday.

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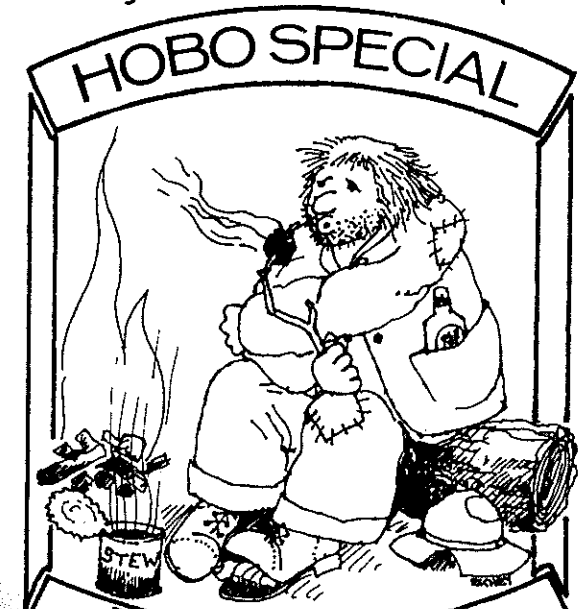
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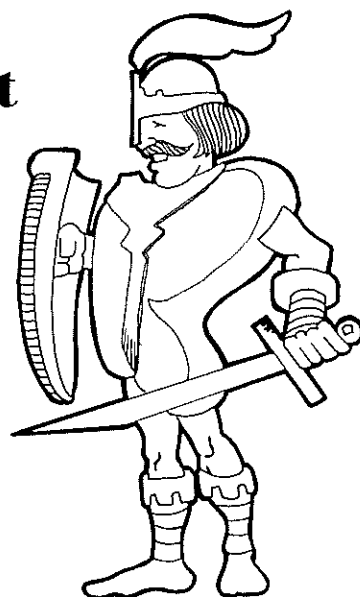
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# JOHN BRIDGERS

## Athletic Director, FSU

Since taking over the reins of Florida State's athletic program in the spring of 1973, John Bridgers has led the Seminoles to accomplishments that, in some respects, border on phenomenal. Since coming to FSU he has been faced by the same general financial woes that beset the economy in general and intercollegiate athletics in particular nationwide. However, these have been compounded by the fact that the Tribe football program — the department's prime source of revenue generation — has been suffering through its leanest years since the University became coeducational and resumed intercollegiate athletics in 1947.

In his quiet, soft spoken style, Bridgers has met these problems head-on. In most cases he comes away from the problems he tackles a winner.

Perhaps the most outstanding accomplishment of Bridgers' leadership is that at the close of the last budget year, the Seminole program not only avoided going into the red, but actually showed a profit. At a time when even the most healthy programs are finding it difficult to keep their heads above water, it is truly an outstanding achievement. It was done also without sacrificing the quality of performance the Seminoles displayed in competition. In the last two years, Florida State has fielded teams in NCAA Championship competition, and successfully recruited several athletes of world and national caliber in all sports. Intercollegiate athletics has also added the responsibility of a growing woman's program — one that promises to be as competitive in its area as the men's program.

Not all these things were accomplished through the singular efforts of the Seminoles' athletic director, of course, but much of the success can be credited to his untiring devotion to making the Florida State program one of the nation's best. Bridger's himself, how-

ever, is quick to point out that none of these things would have been possible without the dedication and understanding of a great many people, including his athletic department staff, coaches, boosters and an interested and supportive administration.

A native of Birmingham, AL, Bridgers came to Florida State from South Carolina. Previously he had spent 10 years as athletic director and head football coach at Baylor University, a period during which the Bears attended three bowl games and recorded the third best won-loss record in the Southwest Conference behind Texas and Arkansas.

A 1947 graduate of Auburn, he served two years with the Army in Korea, being discharged as a captain after enlisting as a private. His coaching experience includes service at the University of the South and Johns Hopkins. He has also served with the Baltimore Colts and Pittsburgh Steelers of the NFL. He was a coach at Baltimore during the famous 1958 "sudden death" game against the N.Y. Giants.

Bridgers is married to the former Frances Young of Florence, AL. They have two sons, John Dixon and Donald Hamilton.

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## SEMINOLE SWIMMING

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Only three times in 27 years of competition have the Seminoles finished with a losing season and only eight times have there been as many as three meets lost. Head Coach Terry Carlisle, now entering his third year, is enthusiastic about continuing the winning tradition.

The 1975 season was a strong indicator that Florida State is making a significant move toward reestablishing itself as a major swimming school in the South. For the first time in six years, the Seminoles defeated rival Florida, and continued to show their strength against conference schools defeating North Carolina, LSU and Georgia.

Over the years, the Seminoles boast nearly two dozen All-American swimmers and divers. Included are a pair of National Champions—one earned by Curt Genders in one-meter diving in 1969 and the other by Phil Boggs in three-meter diving in 1971.

The winning tradition and current move toward further excellence are only part of Florida State's success story. Many former Seminoles have gone on to become outstanding coaches in both high school and college. It is believed that more graduates from FSU are now coaching than from any other school in the country.

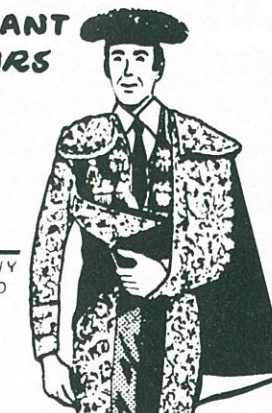
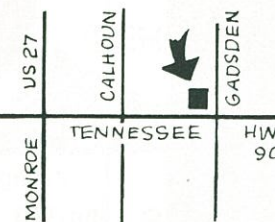

Carlisle will be assisted by three former collegiate performers now studying at Florida State.

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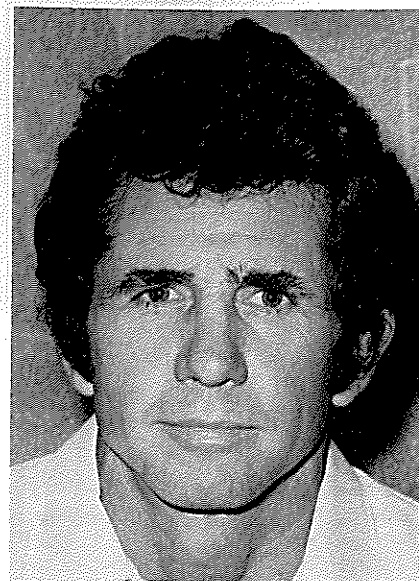
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## KEN VINSON Head Tennis Coach

He has been active in local tennis circles as a member of the Tallahassee Tennis Association, a private instructor and serving with the Tallahassee Recreation Department in planning and running tennis tournaments.

Although this is the first collegiate coaching assignment for the 40-year-old professor, he is no stranger to college athletics, having played football at Rice University and North Texas State.

Vinson earned his undergraduate degree at North Texas State before receiving at LL.B. from Texas and an LL.M. from Yale.

He is married to the former Patsy Burkleo of Abilene, TX and has two children, John, 11 and Jenifer, 9.

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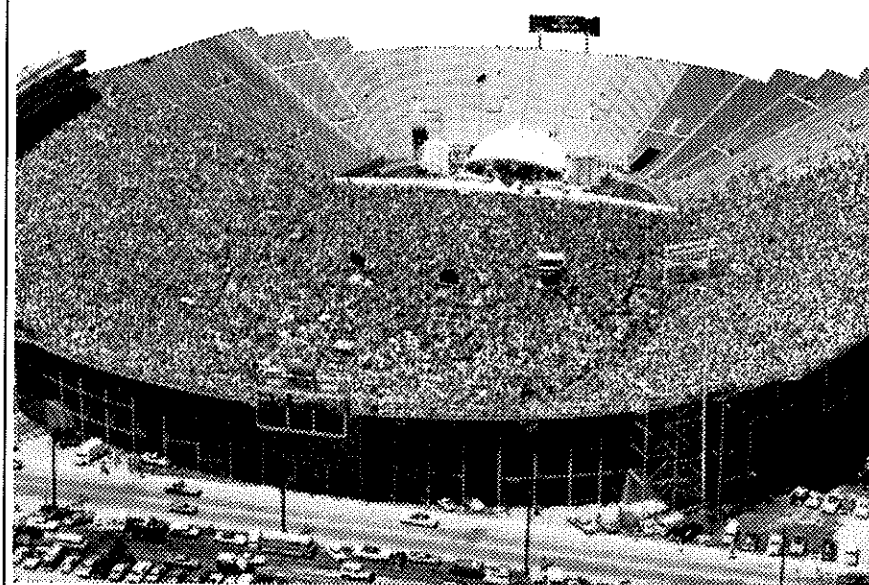
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## Dr. Don Veller Golf Coach



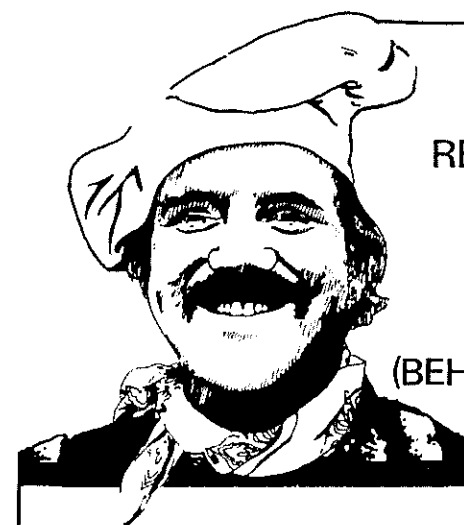
When Dr. Don Veller took over the reigns of Florida State's golf program in the fall of 1974, it marked the beginning of the third tenure for the veteran Seminole mentor.

The personable and well-liked former Seminole football coach first led the Tribe golfers from 1953-58. His second tenure began in the fall of 1967 and ran through the 1969 season. His 1956 and 57 teams placed fifth and fourth in NCAA competition.

Veller came to Florida State as Head Football Coach in 1948, the Seminoles' second season of intercollegiate athletics. At that time he had already had seven years of high school coaching experience, one season as head coach and athletic director at Hanover College and a season as an assistant to Bo McMillan at Indiana.

Veller's 1948-52 football teams won 30 of 42 games, including the Seminoles' only unbeaten season in 1950. The 1949 squad upset Wofford 19-6 in FSU's first ever bowl appearance, the 1950 (Jan. 2) Cigar Bowl in Tampa.

In addition to golf and football, Veller has also coached tennis (at Indiana) and track (at Hanover) on the collegiate level. During his tenure as FSU's head football coach he also served as chairman of the division of athletics and in 1958 and 59, he served as assistant athletic director.



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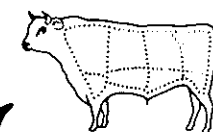
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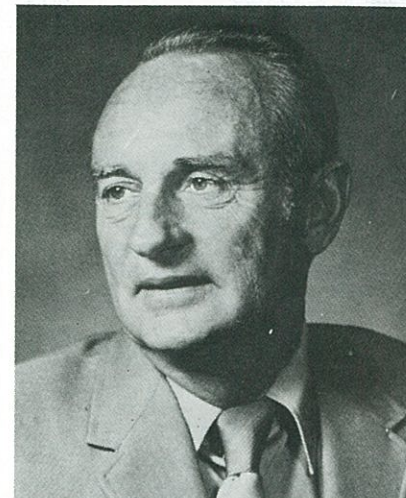
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## MIKE LONG: HEAD TRACK COACH



For more than two decades Florida State's Track program has been under the capable direction of Mike Long and for most of that time span, the Seminoles have enjoyed the reputation of having one of the finest programs in the South.

The 1976 season marks Long's 22nd as head coach of the track program. When he took over in 1955, the Seminoles were struggling for respectability. It did not take the former Minnesota pole vaulter long to straighten things out.

He quickly developed Florida State into one of the most respected dual meet teams in the Southeast. In 21 seasons his teams have an overall record of 108 wins and 28 losses in scored meets and the Seminoles' accomplishments at the relay carnivals is just as impressive.

In 13 of Long's 21 seasons, the Seminoles have lost no more than one dual meet. Five times they have gone unbeaten. Several of Long's runners have earned All-America certificates and one, Danny Smith in the indoor high hurdles, is a two-time champion.

Developing winners is only a part of Long's story of success at Florida State. His teams are noted for giving their very best no matter the situation. Considered one of the nation's finest "on-the-field" coaches, he has that special knack to bring forth the very best and perhaps a little bit more in his athletes.

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## HEAD COACH WOODY WOODWARD

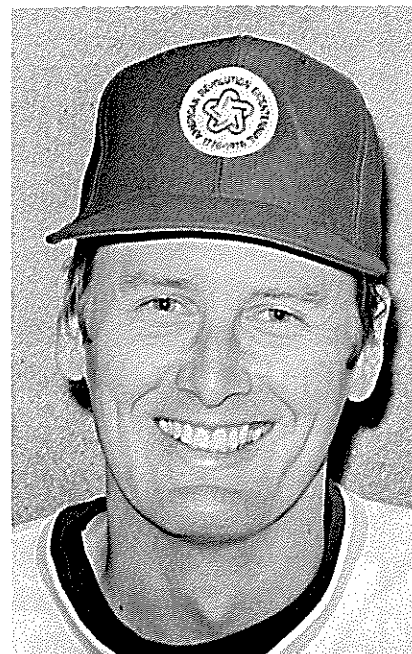
In 1975 Woody Woodward led Florida State back to the College World Series (and in the process to a record tying 49 victories) in what was not only his first year as the Seminoles' Head Coach, but also his first year coaching in the collegiate ranks period.

The 33-year-old native of Miami led the Seminoles through their usually rugged schedule, then past rival Miami twice and SEC title holder LSU to win what most observers considered the toughest regional title in college baseball. For his efforts, the Seminoles' rookie coach was named South Region "Coach of The Year", and the team was ranked No. 1 in the nation by **Collegiate Baseball** newspaper in its final poll of the year.

Getting off to fast starts is nothing new to the former Seminole All-America. Following the 1963 College World Series, where he was named to the all-tournament team, Woody virtually stepped from the ranks of college ball to the major leagues. A nine-year big league career saw him play for the Braves (in both Milwaukee and Atlanta) and the Reds.

When he took over the Florida State coaching job in the late summer of 1974, Woodward was well aware of the challenge that lay before him in maintaining the caliber program that Florida State baseball represented. As a player he helped lead the Seminoles to a record two straight College World Series appearances and in 1963 was named All-America at Shortstop.

Later as an alumnu he kept close ties with the University and its baseball program. He was frequent visitor to Seminole practices during the off-season as he returned to his Tallahassee home and to work on his master's degree. But his contribution went beyond his "coaching appearances" with a donation of part of his rookie bonus to establish a fund to install lights at Seminole Field. Later he played a



principal role in organizing the Varsity-Alumni Game which has become a tradition at Florida State's Homecoming celebration each fall.

Woodward came to Florida State in the fall of 1959 after graduating from Coral Gables High School. Following the 1963 College World Series, he signed a bonus contract with the then Milwaukee Braves. The 1963 Florida Amateur Baseball Player of the Year was initially assigned to the Braves AAA farm team, but before the conclusion of the 1963 season, he was brought up to Milwaukee. He was with Milwaukee in 1964 and '65 and moved with the club to Atlanta in 1966.

In 1968 Woodward was traded to Cincinnati and played there until retiring in 1971. "The biggest thrill of my professional career, says Woodward who still appears to be in top playing shape, "was being a starter in the 1970 World Series against Baltimore.

Woody is married to the former Pamela Terrell of Jacksonville. They have three children, Natalie, 7, Emily, 5, and Matt born last December.

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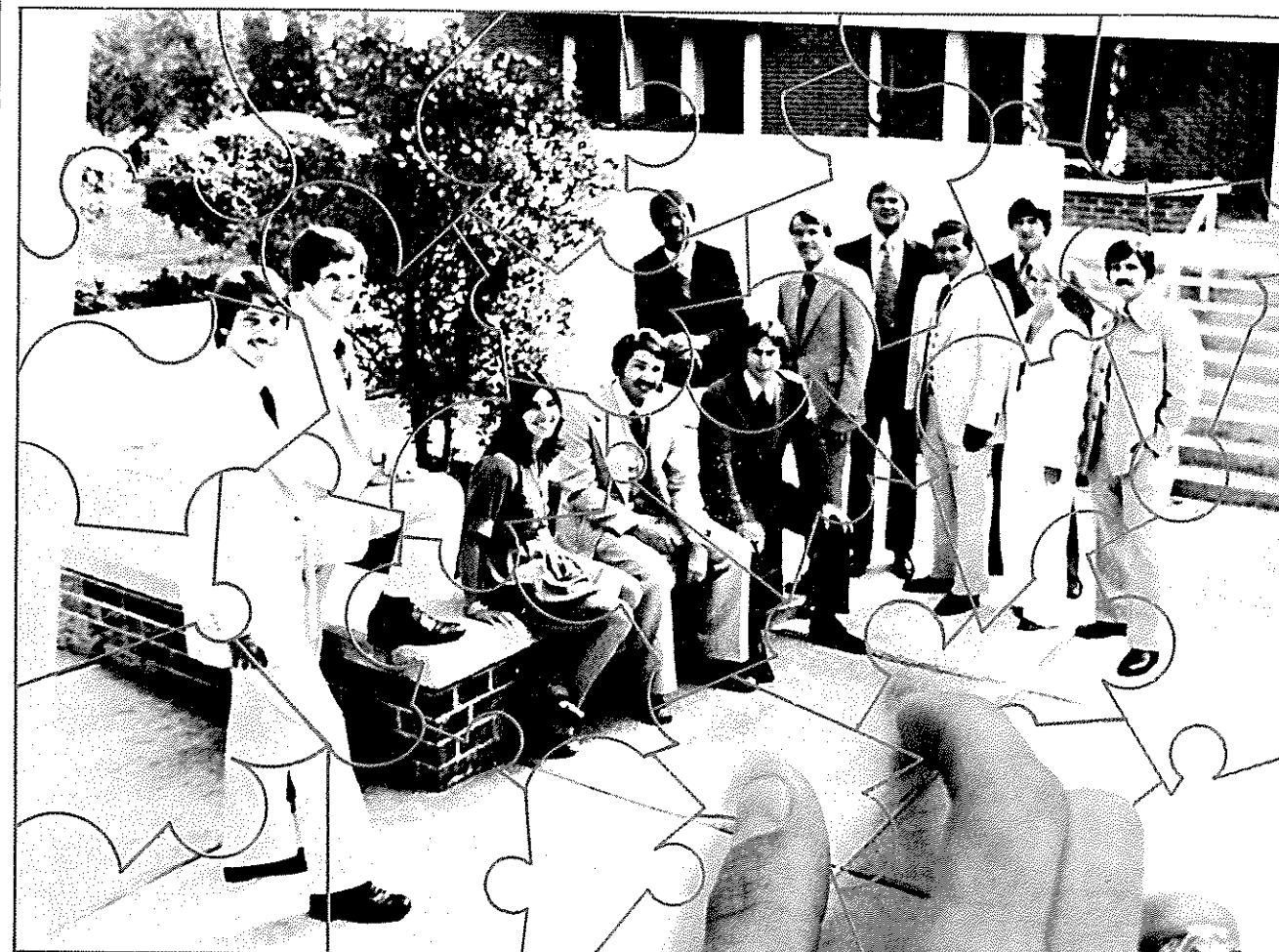
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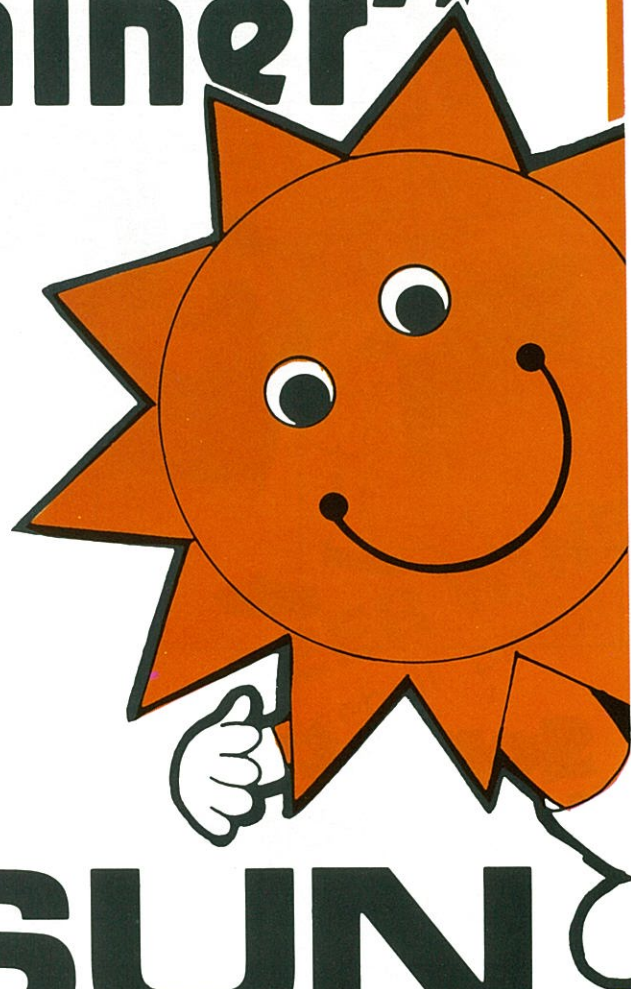

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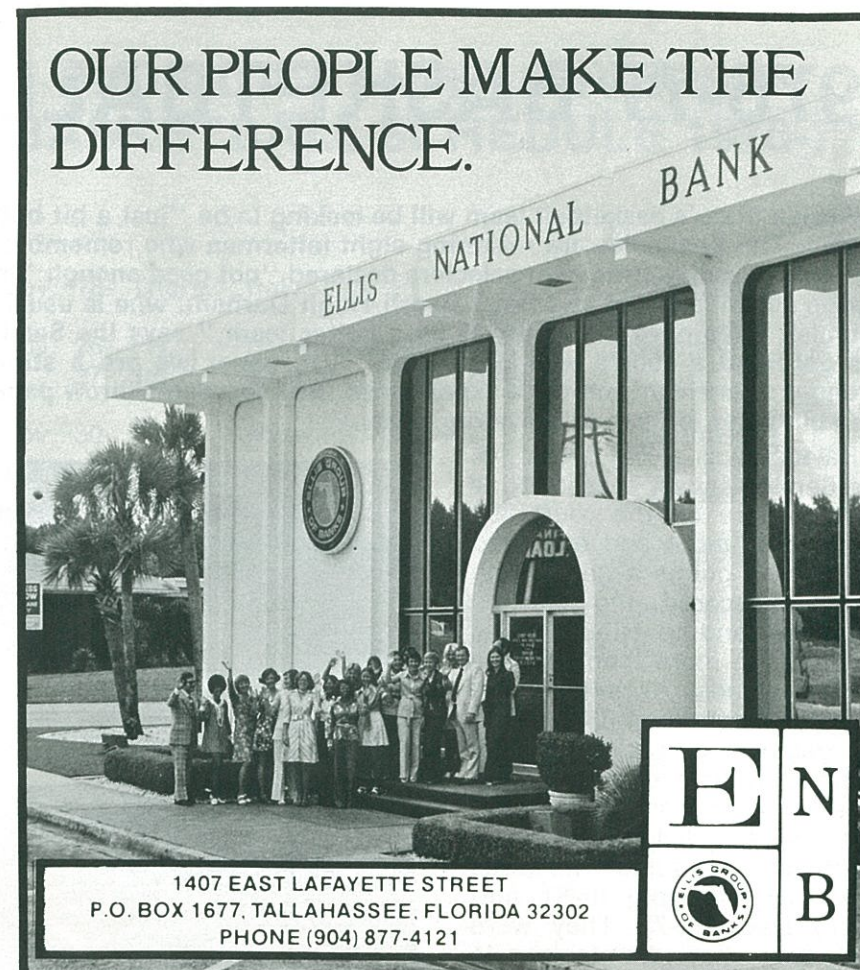
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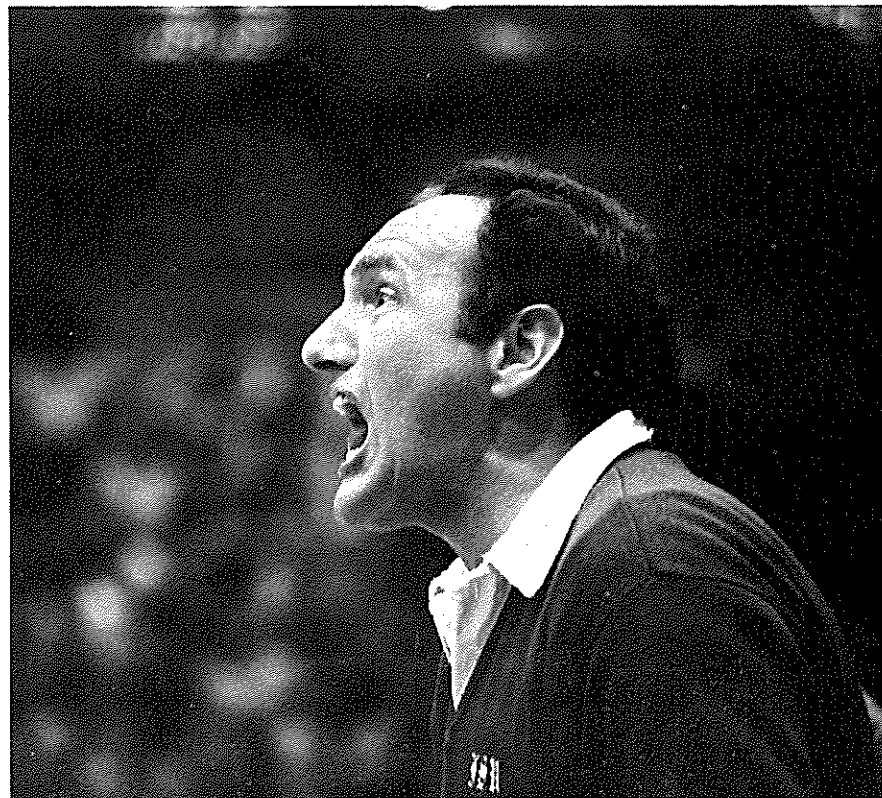


# 1976-77 BASKETBALL OUTLOOK

Florida State's basketball team will be looking to be "just a bit better" in 1976-77 than they were last season. The Seminoles are returning eight lettermen who remember the disappointment of a 21-6 year that post-season tournament selectors declared "not good enough" for an invitation. The outlook for the season ahead is bright and Head Coach Hugh Durham, who is usually realistically cautious, joins in the optimism. "We have the ability to be a better team," says the Seminoles' 10-year veteran mentor who has garnered a 190-79 won-loss record. "On paper we are a stronger team; we should be quicker, stronger offensively and more experienced. But you don't throw paper on the court and win games. We are still going to have to prove ourselves."

Balance was a big factor for the Seminoles last season. Nine players were on the court 393 minutes or more and averaged 6.4 to 14.4 points a game. The bench outscored the starters five times and contributed over 30 points in more than half the Tribe's games. As a team the Seminoles averaged 83.9 points per game while giving up 68.9 using Durham's constant pressure, man-to-man philosophy. Heading the list of Seminole returnees are junior forwards David Thompson (6-8) and Harry Davis (6-7). They were the only two Seminoles to average double figures. Thompson averaged 14.4 points while Davis scored at a 12.3 clip. Durham says they may be among the best pair of forwards in the nation. Thompson is a strong offensive-type player who can go to the boards (he tied for the team rebounding lead last year as a sophomore). Davis is the strong Paul Silas-type player, giving 100 percent all over the court, offensively and defensively. His .638 shooting percentage ranked him sixth in the nation last year in that category. Junior Jim Smith (6-6) is much improved. He averaged 14.1 in the Dominican Republic and will make a strong run for a starting berth.

A trio of seniors head the list of back court players. Carlton Boyd (5-8), Eugene Harris (6-0) and Wayne Smalls (6-2) have been starters at some time during their varsity careers. Harris and Byrd averaged 8.0 points per game last year while Smalls was just a bit behind at 7.4. Each is also a 50 percent shooter from the field. They complement each other ex-



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tremely well with strong all-around games. The competition they have created from within has made each of them a better player and gives the Seminoles as strong a back court as they have ever had in their history.

The big key for the Seminoles will be having someone step forward to fill the spot left vacant by graduated Greg Grady. A three-year starter, Grady leaves a big gap in the middle. "Someone will have to fill Grady's position," said Durham. "He will be especially missed defensively and on the boards. We have a number of people capable of stepping in, it is just a matter of who it will be."

The Seminoles recruited a trio of big men that Durham is hoping will produce some instant help up front, either in Grady's spot or as a back up at forward. Kris Anderson is a 6-8 product out of Yulee, Fla. and was the most sought after big man in the state. Murray Brown is a 6-7 candidate from Tampa. Donnie Kuhl is 6-9 and played prep ball in Orlando.

Also coming in for their freshman seasons are three guards, 6-2 Mickey Dillard of Dania; 6-0 Tony Jackson of Lexington, Ky.; and 6-3 Dave Vetica of Ellwood, Pa.

One thing Durham will not be fearing is overconfidence on the heels of the Seminoles' 21-6 mark last season. In spite of producing one of the best records in the country that included wins over Western Kentucky, Memphis State and Illinois State, as well as home-and-home sweeps over intra-state rivals Jacksonville and South Florida, the Seminoles were snubbed by post-season tournament selectors. Among their six losses were four to teams (Indiana, Oregon State, Washington and Alabama) who were at one time or another ranked in the top last year. Two of those contests were by four points or less. "We worked hard last year and felt we earned a bid. You can be sure that no one will take anything for granted this year."

# FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY

As the second oldest university in the state of Florida, Florida State University continues to revere its historic past while, at the same time, setting high standards for the future.

Since its founding in 1857, when it was known as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, the University has expanded on a sprawling campus with nearly 22,500 students—that's an all-time high—and can boast of a faculty that is recognized both nationally and internationally.

This has been a year of transition and change at Florida State. Members of the academic community witnessed not only the resignation of Dr. Stanley Marshall as the President of FSU, but also the possible discovery of new chemical elements. And, despite the lingering effects of the economic slowdown, the University proceeded with building and construction projects—both underway and those on the drawing board—that total almost \$15 million.

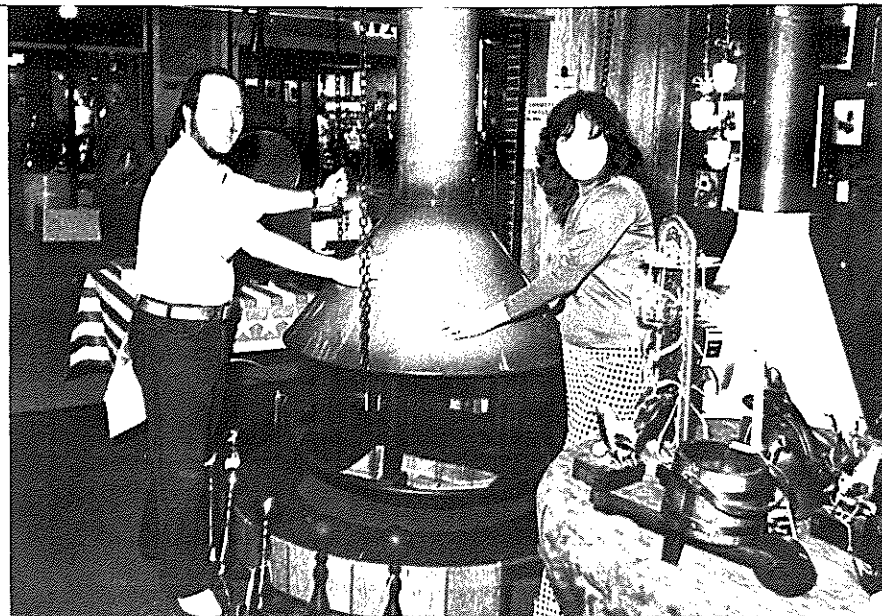
On March 8, Dr. Marshall submitted his resignation after serving the University as President for seven years. The man who led the University through some of its most difficult and turbulent periods simply stated that he thought it was "time for me to make a change in my professional life and in my life-style." Dr. Marshall was replaced by Executive Vice President Bernard Sliger who will serve as the Interim President until a replacement for Dr. Marshall has been elected.

Of course, another major change took place within the Athletic Department when Bobby Bowden was picked to



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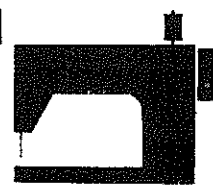

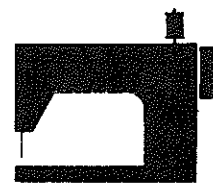
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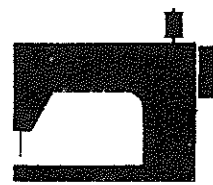
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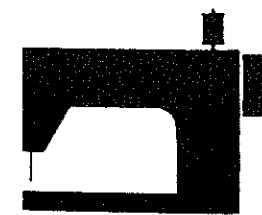


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replace Darrel Mudra as head football coach. Bowden is no stranger to the FSU campus as he was a former assistant Seminole coach. He came to Florida State this time from a successful career at West Virginia University.

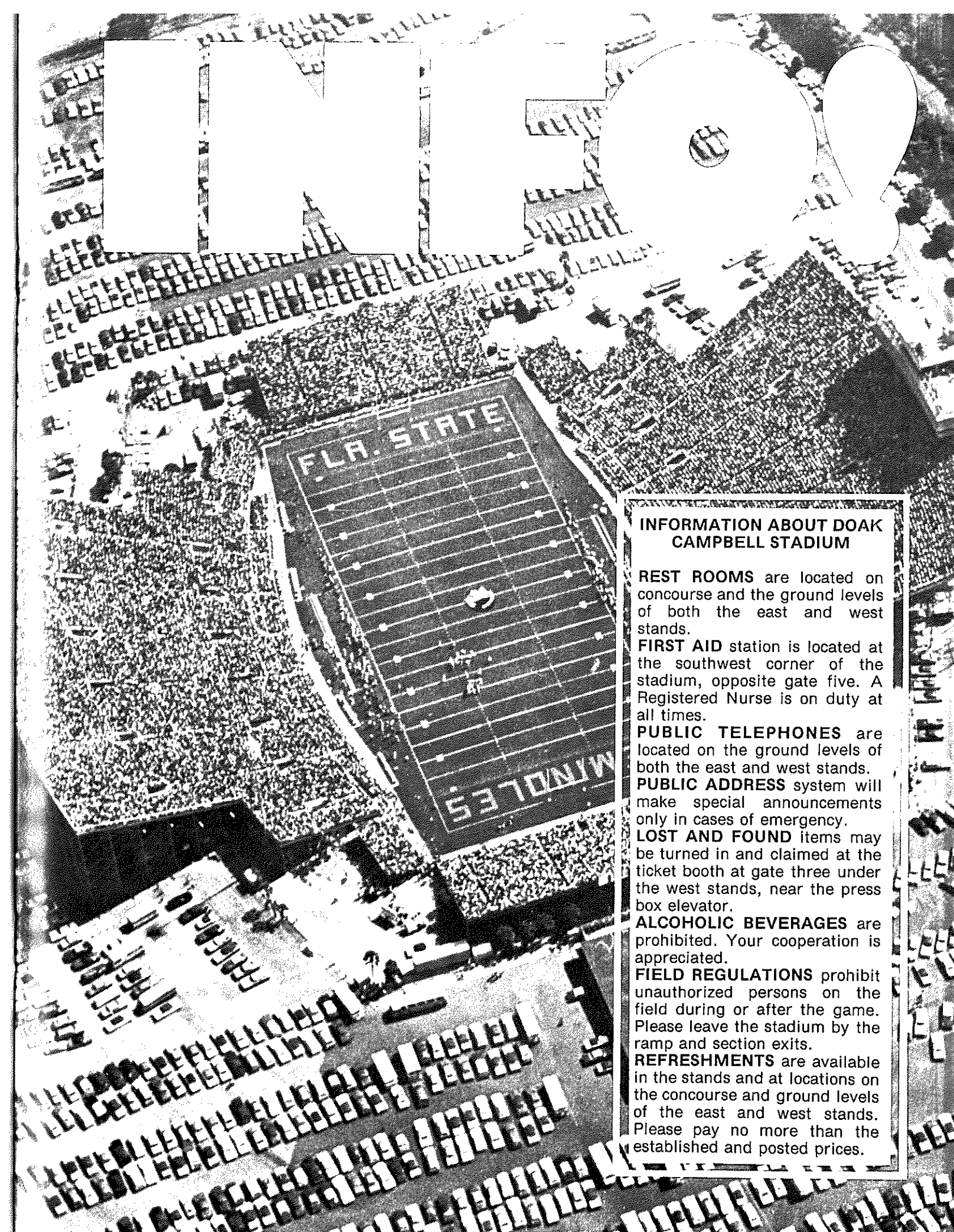
Of truly worldwide scientific significance was the possible discovery of new chemical elements, far heavier than any yet known, by a group of scientists working at Florida State University. If this discovery is confirmed, these new elements (and there may be as many as six new elements) would be the first natural elements found in 51 years and the first ever found within the United States. The research, which was started at the University of California, was moved to Florida State because of the unique capabilities of the Tandem Van de Graaf Accelerator laboratory located on campus.

Long known as one of the top research institutions in the entire nation, Florida State University continued to receive millions of dollars for research efforts. One grant, awarded for the Career Education Center, was for \$900,000 while another, from the Lilly Endowment, Inc., was for \$27,716 for the University's Charles MacArthur Center for American Theater. That center will eventually be housed in a multi-million dollar complex located next to the Fine Arts Building.

Construction was an important issue during the past year. Principal projects underway or in the planning state at the University include a physics laboratory, \$1,439,437; renovation of the Diffenbaugh Building, \$3,755,500; air conditioning of buildings campus-wide, \$6,000,000; a new College of Education Building, \$3,054,000; a music building, \$5,300,000; a maintenance complex, \$2,000,000; and the long awaited Tallahassee-Leon County Civic Center, \$24,000,000.

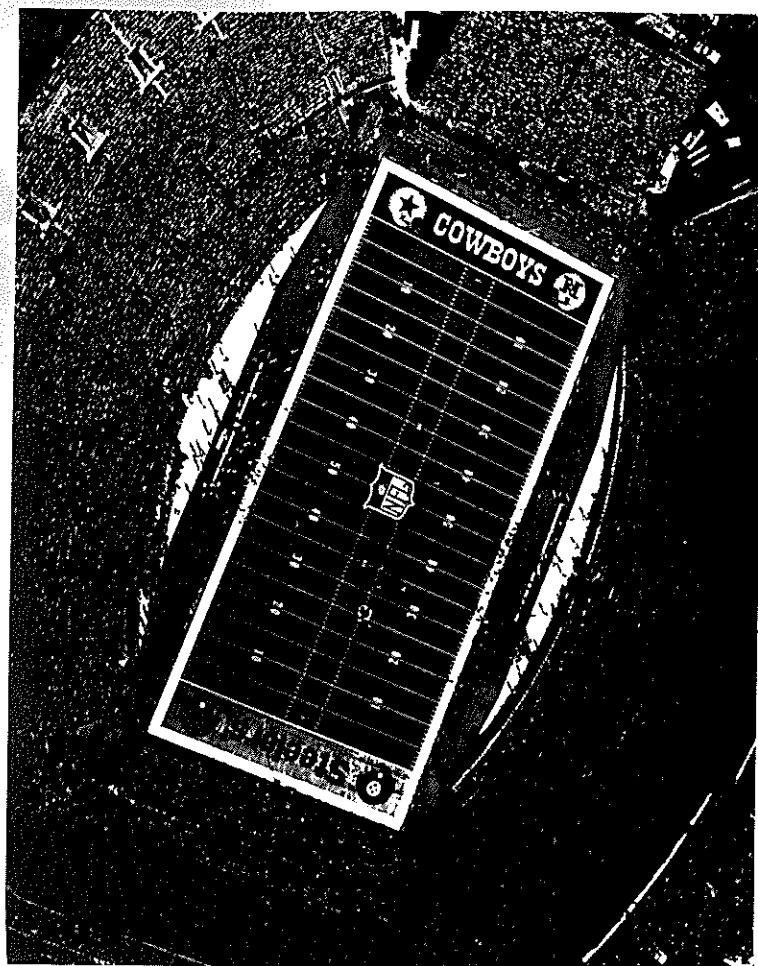

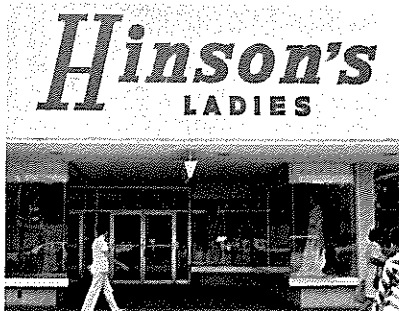

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# TERMS

**Audible** — A vocal signal by the quarterback changing the play called in the huddle.

**Blitz** — Commitment by defensive backs and/or linebackers to rush the passer.

**Blocking** — Legally hindering the progress of an opponent by contacting him with any part of the blocker's body.

**Bomb** — A long pass attempt for a touchdown.

**Buttonhook** — A pass pattern in which the receiver goes downfield and U-turns back sharply to receive the ball.

**Clipping** — Running or diving into the back of an opponent, for throwing the body across the back of the leg or legs of an opponent other than the ball carrier.

**Corner Back** — Defensive back who usually lines up across from wide receiver.

**Dive-Tackle Play** — A quick-handoff running play over tackle.

**Draw-Play** — Quarterback drops back as if to pass but instead hands ball to running back, after quarterback's teammates have assumed pass-blocking positions.

**Fair Catch** — The opportunity for a player of the receiving team to catch a kicked ball that has crossed the scrimmage line without being tackled or blocked by an opponent, after signaling his intention by completely extending one arm above his head.

**Flanker** — Offensive back deployed as a wide receiver. Must line up one yard behind line of scrimmage.

**Free Safety** — Same as weak safety.

**Fullback** — A running back who usually lines up behind strong side of the offensive line.

**Kickoff** — A free kick with which each half is opened, and which is employed also following each try-for-point or Field Goal. A kickoff must be either a Placekick or a Dropkick.

**Lateral Pass** — A live ball thrown toward or parallel with the passer's own goal line.

**Linebacker** — A defensive player operating immediately behind his line where he can either aid linemen in stopping a running play or cover an opponent's receiver if a pass develops.

**Look-In Pass** — Receiver runs straight pattern and looks for the ball immediately over his inside shoulder.

**Man-to-Man Coverage** — Pass defense plan wherein defensive backs cover receivers wherever they go, rather than field areas.

**Middle Linebacker** — So designated because he usually lines up across from the opposing center.

**Mike** — Nickname for middle linebacker.

**Monster** — Same as strong safety.

**Neutral Zone** — The space between the scrimmage lines of the offense and defense. Approximately 11 inches.

**Nose Guard** — Defensive lineman who lines up directly in front of opposing center on line of scrimmage.

**Onside Kick** — A kickoff that travels 10 yards or more is anybody's ball. The so-called "onside kick" is an effort by the kicking team to kick the ball barely beyond 10 yards and

recover it before the receiving team can do so.

**Pocket** — Area of protection for the passer formed by blockers. Passer drops straight back from scrimmage behind the blocking shield into what resembles a "cup" or pocket.

**Post** — A pass pattern in which the receiver goes downfield to pre-determined depth then cuts at an angle toward the goalposts.

**Prevent Defense** — A strategem replacing linebackers with additional backfield pass defenders, sacrificing strength against short gainers in order to prevent a long pass completion. Most often employed by a team protecting a lead late in either half.

**Pulling Guard** — Guard who pulls out behind scrimmage line for a trap block or to lead sweep blocking for ball carrier.

**Reverse Play** — A running play with backfield action suggesting one direction while ball carrier goes in opposite direction.

**Roll-Out Pass** — Quarterback runs laterally with blockers before throwing, instead of dropping straight back to pass.

**Running Back** — Member of the offensive backfield who primarily carries the ball. Also used as a receiver and blocker. Can be either tailback or fullback.

**Sam** — Nickname for strong linebacker.

**Screen Pass** — Pass to a receiver behind a wall of blockers, who have permitted defenders to penetrate.

**Scrimmage Line** — The yard line (marked or unmarked) that passes through the point of the ball nearest a team's own goal



line.

**Strong Linebacker** — So designated because he usually lines up across from the strong side of the offensive line.

**Strong Guard** — Offensive guard playing on the strong side of the line.

**Strong Safety** — Defensive back who usually lines up deeper than corner backs and across from strong side of offensive line.

**Strong Side** — The side of the offensive line where the tight end lines up.

**Strong Tackle** — Offensive tackle playing on the strong side of the line.

**Stunting** — Defensive players changing positions as the ball is snapped, to confuse offensive strategy.

**Sweep** — End run with wave of blockers leading the ball carrier.

**Tailback** — A running back who usually lines up behind the weak side of the line.

**Tight End** — Offensive end who lines up in close formation (as opposed to Split End's wide set) where he can either block for a ball carrier or be employed as a pass receiver.

**Trap Block** — Tactic whereby offensive lineman pulls out of position at the snap allowing man he would usually block to come through line and be blocked (or "trapped") by another blocker.

**Unbalanced Line** — Offensive line deployment whereby more blocking linemen are lined up on one side of the center than on the other.

**Weak Guard** — Offensive guard playing on the weak side of the line.

**Weak Linebacker** — So designated because he usually lines up across from the weak side of the offensive line.

**Weak Safety** — Defensive back who usually lines up deeper than corner backs and across from weak side of offensive line.

**Wide Receiver** — A lineman and/or a back who is set wide for pass receiving purposes. Also called Split End, Flanker or Wideout.

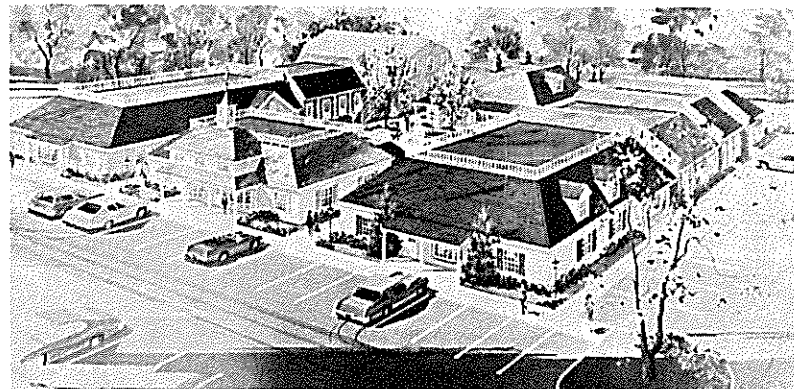
**Zone Coverage** — Plan of pass defense wherein areas are covered rather than individual receivers. Opposite of Man-To-Man.

## AT HALF-TIME, MUSIC IS THE NAME OF THE GAME!

Entertainment is their business, and for over a quarter of a century the Marching Chiefs have been doing exactly that; providing entertainment for countless millions around the world.

Formed in the early 1950's, the name of the Marching Chiefs has become synonymous with the finest in collegiate marching bands. With colorful, fast paced shows and music to satisfy even the hardest to please listener, the Chiefs have built and maintained a position as one of the top marching bands in the nation.

Through the years, the Chiefs have brought their style of pageantry to audiences in every corner of the nation and even beyond. They have performed in the Senior Bowl, in Mobile, Alabama; the Sun Bowl, in El Paso, Texas; two appearances in the Gator Bowl, in Jacksonville, Florida; and the Peach Bowl, in Atlanta, Georgia. In addition, numerous appearances on nationwide television have helped to bring the Chiefs into the homes of millions of people, and at the same time, bring new honors to an already distinguished group of musicians.

In 1969, the Chiefs appeared at the Half-time of a televised game between Florida State University and the University of Houston. As a result of their performance, they were selected as the weekly winner of the ABC Television "Band of the Week" contest. At the conclusion of the football season, ABC Television released a final rating of what is considered to

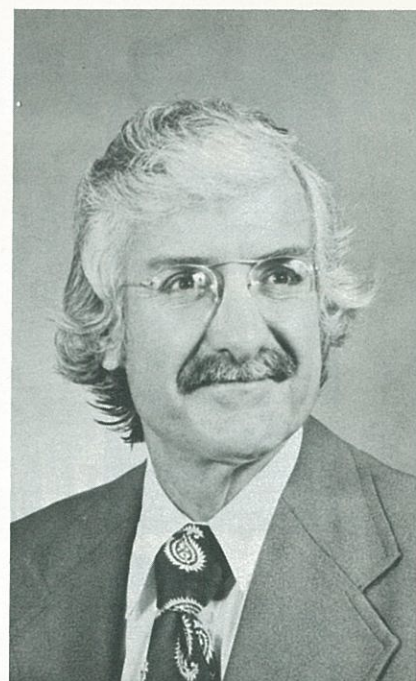
be the finest marching bands in the nation. In this final rating, the Chiefs finished second behind the Louisiana State University Band.

Honors continued to come to the Chiefs when, in the summer of 1974, they were selected by the United States State Department to become the "Musical Ambassadors" of the United States. Traveling to the International Trade Fair, in Damascus, Syria, the Chiefs performed over a two week period before almost two hundred thousand people. At the conclusion of their stay in Syria, the Chiefs were invited by the Jordanian Army Band to join them for a special performance in Amman, Jordan. King Hussein surprised all by attending the performance, and the Marching Chiefs saluted him by forming his name in Arabic script on the field.

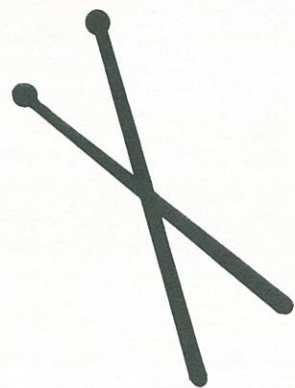
When the Chiefs step out on to the field this year, audiences will be greeted by a modified version of the style that, in the past, has entertained millions. Under the new leadership of Professor Carl Bjerregaard, Coordinator of Bands; William Raxsdale, Assistant Director of Bands; and Charles Carter, Associate Director and Arranger, the Chiefs will be presenting a more contemporary style of performance, in contrast to the "Big Ten" style of marching, which the Seminole fans have seen in the past. Music will be coordinated with the various drills and formations, to create a new dimension in sight and sound.

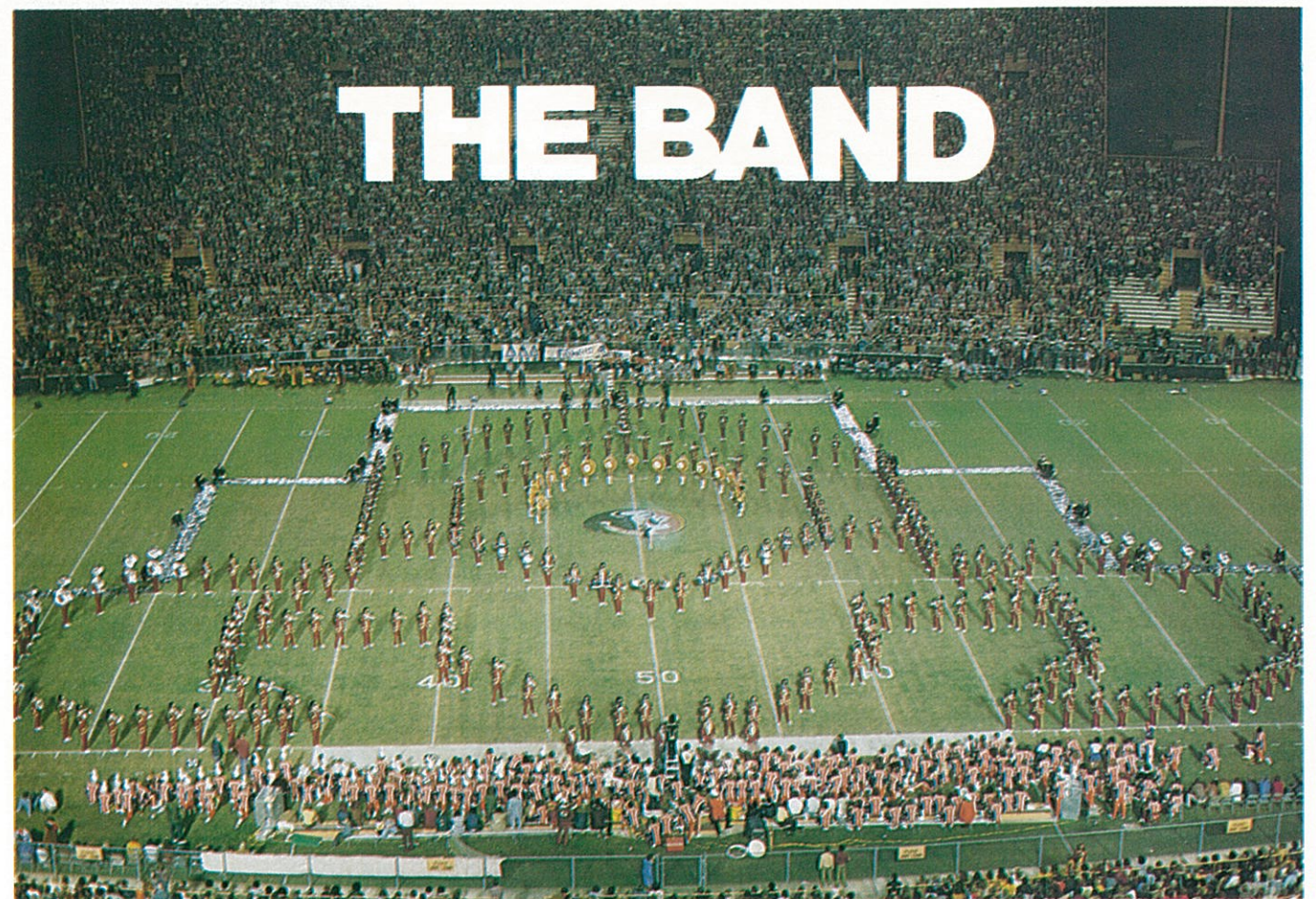

Professor Bjerregaard has directed instrumental music instruction in the Montague and Muskegan Public Schools. He has served on the summer faculty of Eastern Michigan University, Michigan State University and the Bule Lake Fine Arts Camp. Profesor Bjerregaard maintains a busy schedule of adjudication and clinics. As a guest conductor, he has directed All-Star Bands and school bands throughout the Midwest. Mr. Bjerregaard comes to Florida State University from Western Michigan University where he was Director of Bands from 1967 to 1976.



WILLIAM RAXSDALE, Assistant Director of Bands at Florida State University, has recently moved from Acadiana High School in Lafayette, Louisiana, where he was Director of Bands. Mr. Raxsdale served as clinician for the Florida All Star Marching Band, the Mississippi State University All Star Band, and the Texas Tech and Florida State University Marching Band Workshops. Mr. Raxsdale is also known throughout the south for his marching band and color guard adjudication. He spends a great part of his summers instructing clinics and preparing competition shows for championship bands. A native of Louisiana, Mr. Raxsdale earned the Bachelor of Music and Master of Music degrees from the University of Southwestern Louisiana and presently serves on a national advisory committee for the College Band Directors National Association.

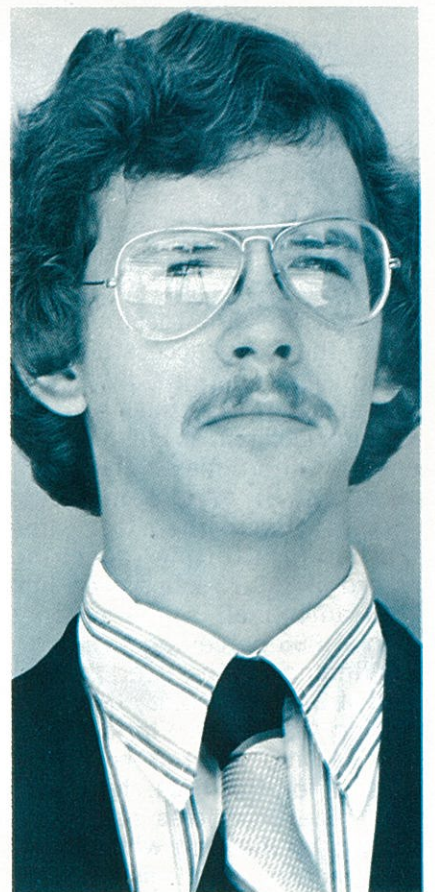


CHARLES CARTER, Associate Director and Arranger, received his Bachelor of Music degree from Ohio State University in 1950, majoring in theory and composition. The Oklahoma native furthered his education at Eastman School of Music where, in 1951, he received his Master of Music degree, followed by Doctoral work here at Florida State University, from 1953 until 1956. 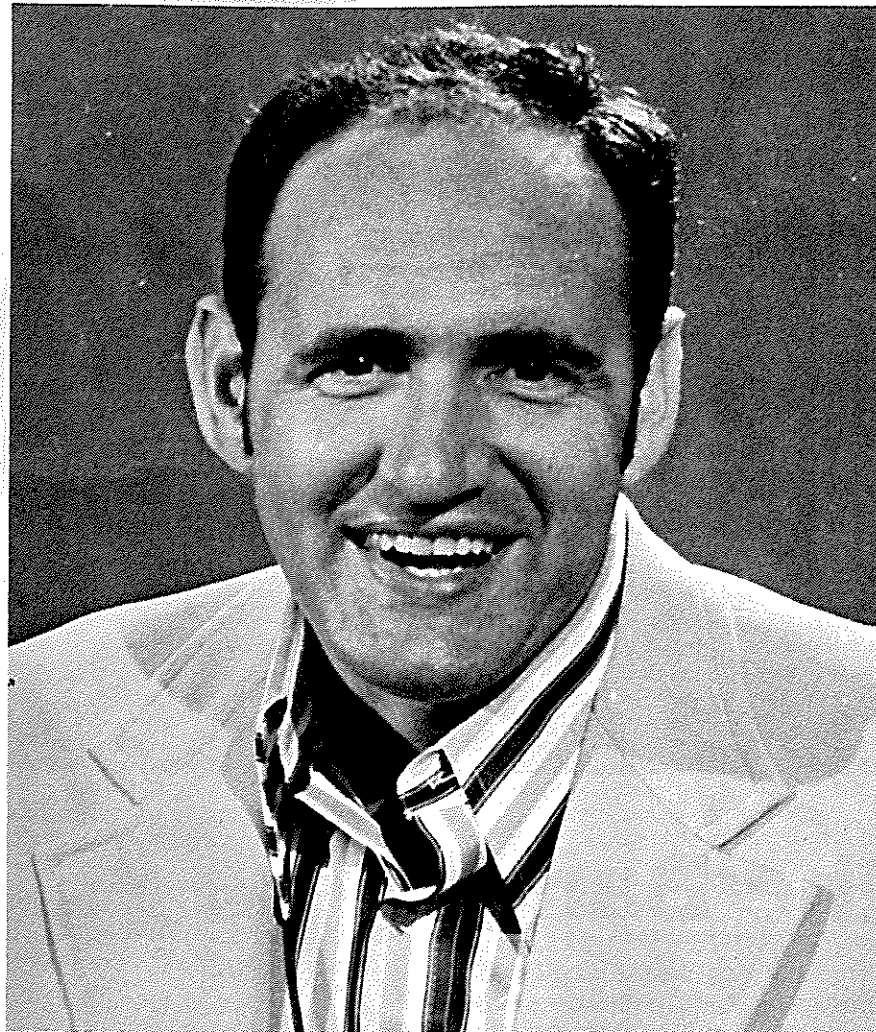
## Leader of the Band

Chris Dickinson, a Senior from Jacksonville, majoring in Music Education, is this year's Drum Major for the Marching Chiefs. Mr. Dickinson has numerous honors to distinguish his musical career. In 1973, he was selected to participate in the All-Star Band, composed of some of the best high school musicians in the state of Florida. Mr. Dickinson came to Florida State University from Florida Junior College in Jacksonville. While attending Florida Junior College, he was a trombonist with the Jacksonville Symphony Orchestra. Here at Florida State University, he has distinguished himself as a performer with such groups as the University Symphony, the Wind Ensemble, the Opera Orchestra, and the Marching Chiefs.





## HUGH DURHAM Head Basketball Coach



Over the last nine years, Florida State's basketball program has become recognized as one of the most successful in the nation. It is no coincidence that the same period marks the tenure of Hugh Durham as Head Coach. Actually, there may be no better measure of the Seminole's success than the fact that Durham's lifetime coaching record of 169-73 has placed him 13th among all active coaches with a .698 percentage.

Winning on the court is only part of Durham's story however. During his tenure Florida State has become favored recruiting ground for the pros. No fewer than nine Seminoles have been drafted by the pros with several now active, including NBA All-Star and MVP, Dave Cowens, of the Boston Celtics. Those

players who choose not to go into professional ball have also met with success, with several going on to graduate school, medical school or law school, and others starting on coaching careers of their own. "We make a total commitment to the individual," says Durham, who has seen well over 80% of his players earn at least bachelor's degrees. "We realize that for many of our players, basketball is not going to be a career. While we are trying to develop the playing ability of all our athletes, especially those with the potential to play pro ball, we also try to see that all of them are prepared in other areas as well."

Durham teams have been winners in all but his first season as head coach. That first year saw an injury-riddled Tribe struggle

to an 11-15 record. Since that time, no Durham-coached team has won fewer than 17 games. The 1969-70 squad finished 23-3 and the 1971-72 Seminoles went all the way to the NCAA finals before settling for a 27-9 record.

The Florida State head man has been associated with the Seminoles for 19 years as either a player or a coach. He came to Tallahassee from Louisville, Kentucky, where he was an outstanding prep athlete earning 14 letters in four sports. His enthusiasm for all sports is strong and he can be found regularly as a spectator at nearly all Seminole home events. He is an avid racquetball player, having won several state titles, and plays golf and tennis as time allows. For the last several years he has served as director of his own highly successful basketball camp.

As a Florida State player, Durham was one of the finest guards to play for the Seminoles. His three-year varsity scoring total of 1,381 points ranks sixth on the all-time list. He was as much a leader off the court as on, earning membership in the Gold Key Honorary and being named to Who's Who Among American Colleges and Universities. Following his graduation he was named coach of the freshman team and still holds the record for the best winning percentage with a 9-1 record. He became a fulltime assistant to Bud Kennedy in 1961 and was named head coach in 1966 following Kennedy's death. During his tenure as an assistant coach, Durham also served as coach of the FSU golf team and his squads were also highly successful, winning 48 of 54 dual matches. One of Durham's recruits in golf was Hubert Green, former PGA Rookie of the Year.

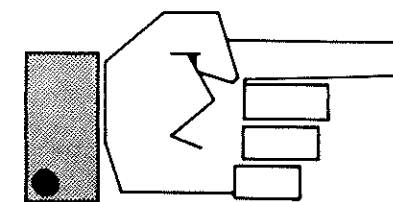

# KEEP YOUR OWN STATS

Every football fan knows that the score doesn't always give a good picture of a game. A few statistics, like those that can be kept on this page, can make the picture clearer, show what the individual stars contribute and help to win post-game "debates." Besides, it can be fun to second guess the official scorer whose statistics will appear in tomorrow's papers. But before you start, here are some pointers on being a statistician:

1. Keep cumulative totals to be informed “up to the minute” and to simplify our figuring of team totals. Example: Jones gains 3, 6, 9, 2 yards and you write 3, 9, 18, 20 on his line.
2. Be satisfied if you come within 10-15 yards of the official team totals. Individual judgments as to the line of scrimmage can make quite a difference in the totals.
3. Remember that it takes 10 yards to make a first down—that last inch can be as important as a yard and must be scored as one. Wait until the official places the ball and then go by the official down/yard marker on the sidelines.
4. Be sure to credit first downs on scoring plays or originating from lines of scrimmage beyond the 10-yard line.
5. On plays involving penalties measured from the point of the foul, credit the rusher or pass receiver with yardage only to the point of the infraction.
6. Charge gains and losses on fumbles to the player who, in your judgment, contributed most to the error.
7. Don't score two-point conversion attempts after touchdowns as rushing or passing plays.

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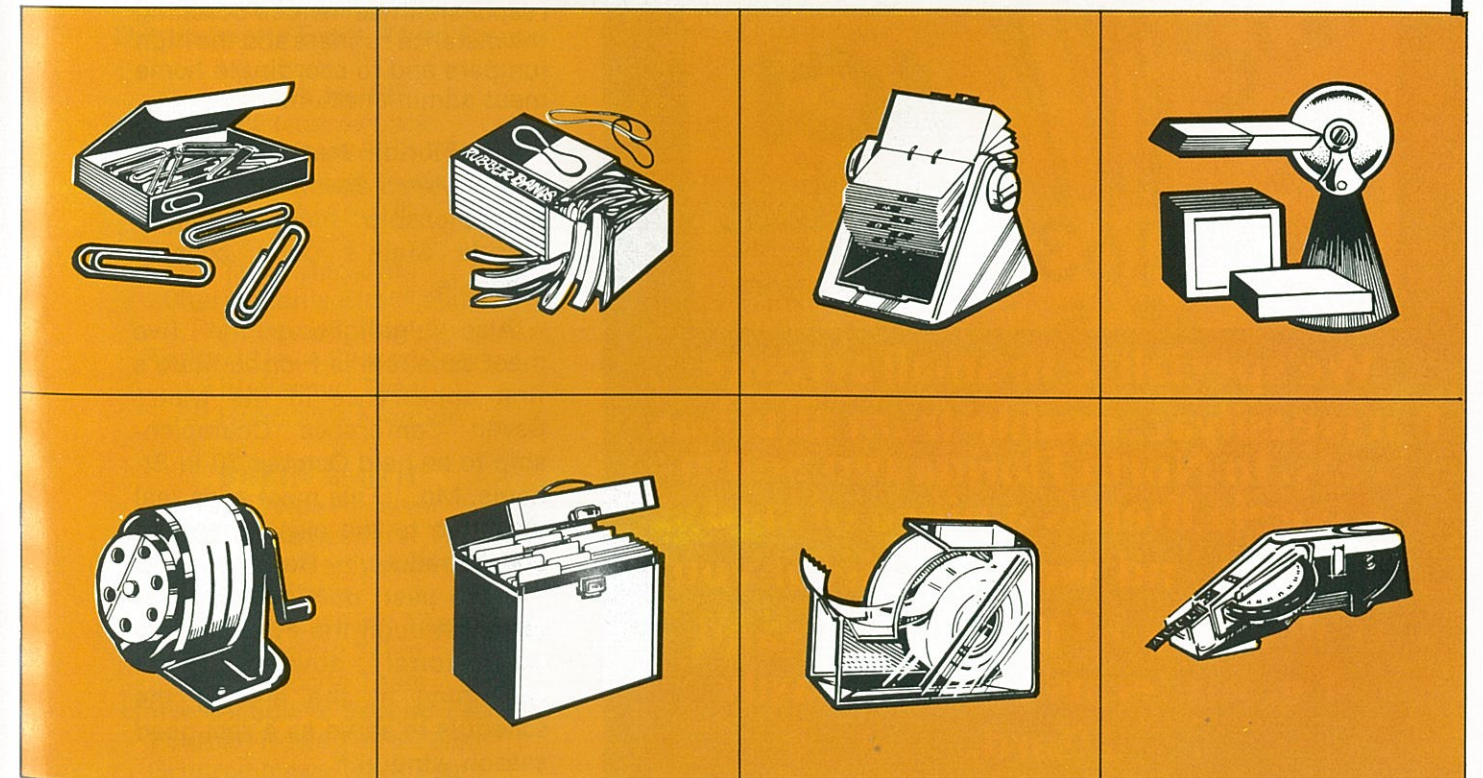
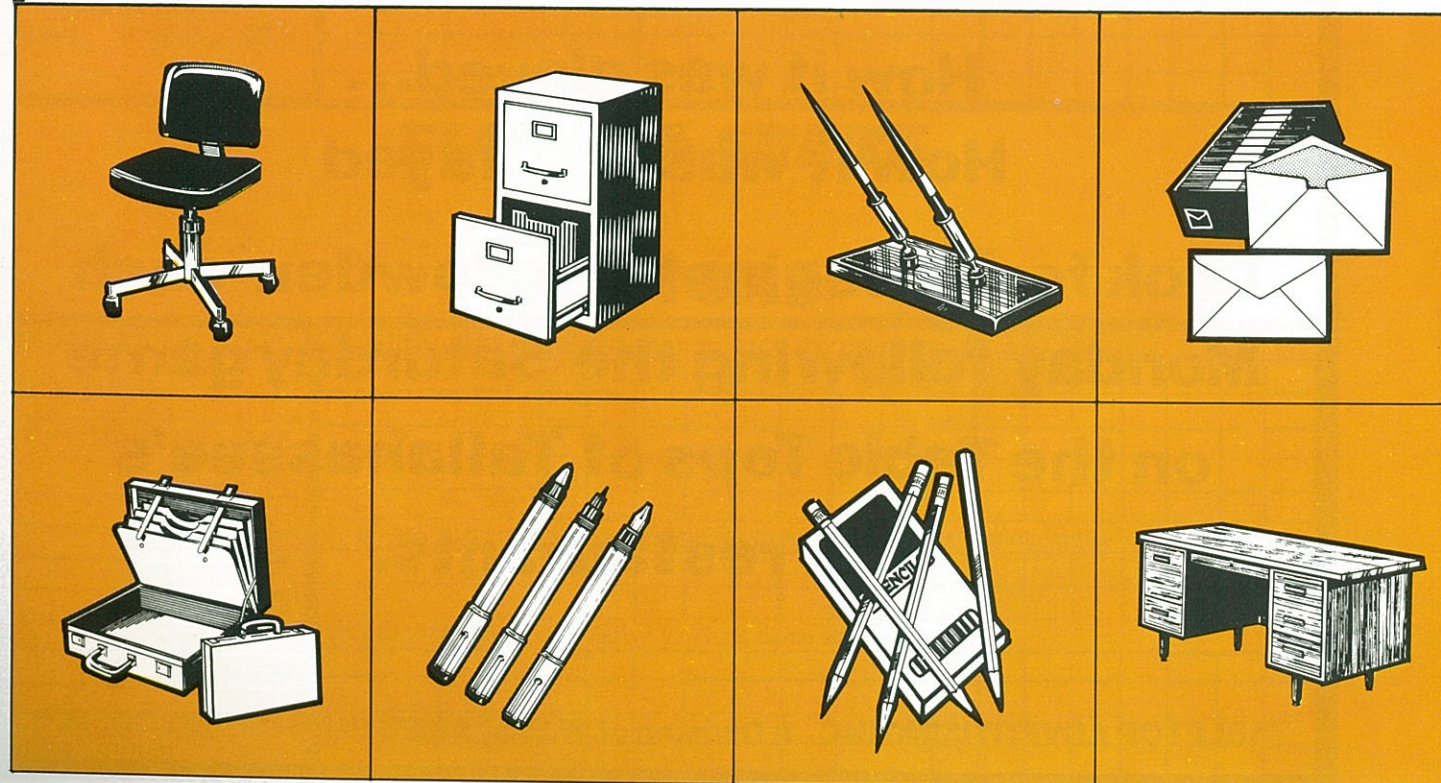

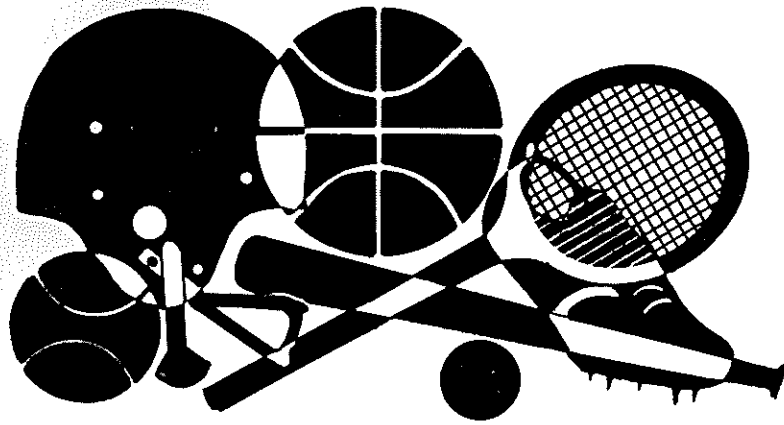

## DICK ROBERTS: ASSISTANT TRACK COACH AND HEAD CROSS COUNTRY

Dick is a man of many hats around the Florida State athletic department. In addition to his duties as an assistant to Coach Mike Long in the track program, he also serves as academic advisor to all athletes except those in football and as head of the Florida State cross-country team.

This will be the seventh season for the former Seminole distance star at his alma mater after a successful career as cross-country and track coach at Dunedin High School. His Dunedin teams produced one state championship, 10 individual champions and 13 state records.

One of the St. Petersburg native's primary responsibilities to the track program has been recruiting and he has proven highly successful by bringing several of the South's top athletes to the Florida State program. His on the field responsibilities include coaching the distance runners and the high jumpers and to coordinate home meet administration.

The Florida State Invitational and a Metro Seven Conference Championship meet highlight Florida State's cross country schedule.

Also highlighting the five meet schedule is Florida State's first appearance in the Metro Seven Conference Championship to be held October 30 in St. Louis, Mo. "This meet adds real incentive to the closing part of our schedule," Roberts said. "In the past, our incentive has lasted through the Florida State Invitational; now we have something at the end of the schedule to serve as a real good season windup."

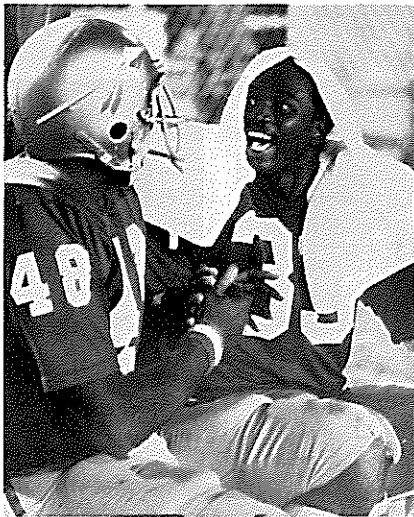
Some photo reflections of the 1976 FSU football season.

# THE CONCLUSION OF A SHORT HISTORY OF FSU FOOTBALL...

*we wrap up our series with a look at the late 1960's*

In the last issue of SEMINOLE SIDELINE '76 we described the early 60's, the victory over Florida in the first FSU-UF game played in Tallahassee, the honors that went to individual players and the win over Oklahoma in the Gator Bowl. In this issue, a look at FSU football in the late 1960's

Yes, 1964 was a good year, a great year, for the Florida State Seminoles, they were riding high. But, what goes up, must come down and in 1965 the Tribe came down, crashing heavily in comparison with the previous season.

TCU won the first game 7-3, and that was the first opening game defeat for FSU coach Bill Peterson. It was a mark of things to come in the 1965 football season. The season's tally was 4-5-1. Despite the losing record, Jack Shinholser made the 2nd team of the NEA and All-American by the AP.

In 1966, Florida State University played 11 games, including a post season loss to Wyoming in the Sun Bowl at El Paso. The season record was 6-5-0, a respectable, if not impressive, statistic. But, to most fans reflecting on the year 1966, those bare bones facts are not remembered. What IS remembered by fans, remembered vividly, is *that picture!*

The picture was taken in the closing moments of the Florida State - Florida game played, for only the second time, in Tallahassee. The picture shows FSU's Lane Fenner catching a pass from FSU quarterback Gary Pajcic in the end zone for an apparent score. He had the ball, he was in bounds. The head linesman, Doug Moseley, apparently thought so, he threw his hands in the air signaling a touchdown. Then - he changed his mind and signaled an incomplete pass. FSU at that time trailed 22-19; a field goal that would have tied the score fell short and Florida won the game.

Much has been written and

said about that call and the subsequent picture that would appear to dispute it. The final word was that Moseley's call was a "judgement" call and his decision was accepted.

1967 was a turn-around year, it was to be a banner year for the Tribe. The first game loss to Houston was not indicative of the way the Seminole season was to develop. The second game of the year saw FSU tie - and almost beat - mighty Alabama and Bear Bryant. Final was 37-37.

Other highlights of 1967 included a 21-16 win over Florida and a 17-17 tie with Penn State in the Gator Bowl.

Another outstanding season was in store for the Seminoles in 1968. The Tribe lost to Florida 9-3, lost to Virginia Tech 40-28 and, lost to LSU in the post

season Peach Bowl 31-27. The rest of the games were all victories, eight of them, to make the season record 8-3-0. And with all those victories came a multitude of honors for individual players. Ron Sellers was named All-American by Kodak, Time magazine, Sporting News and the AP; consensus All-American for the second straight year. The AP named Dale McCullers to its second team All-American list.

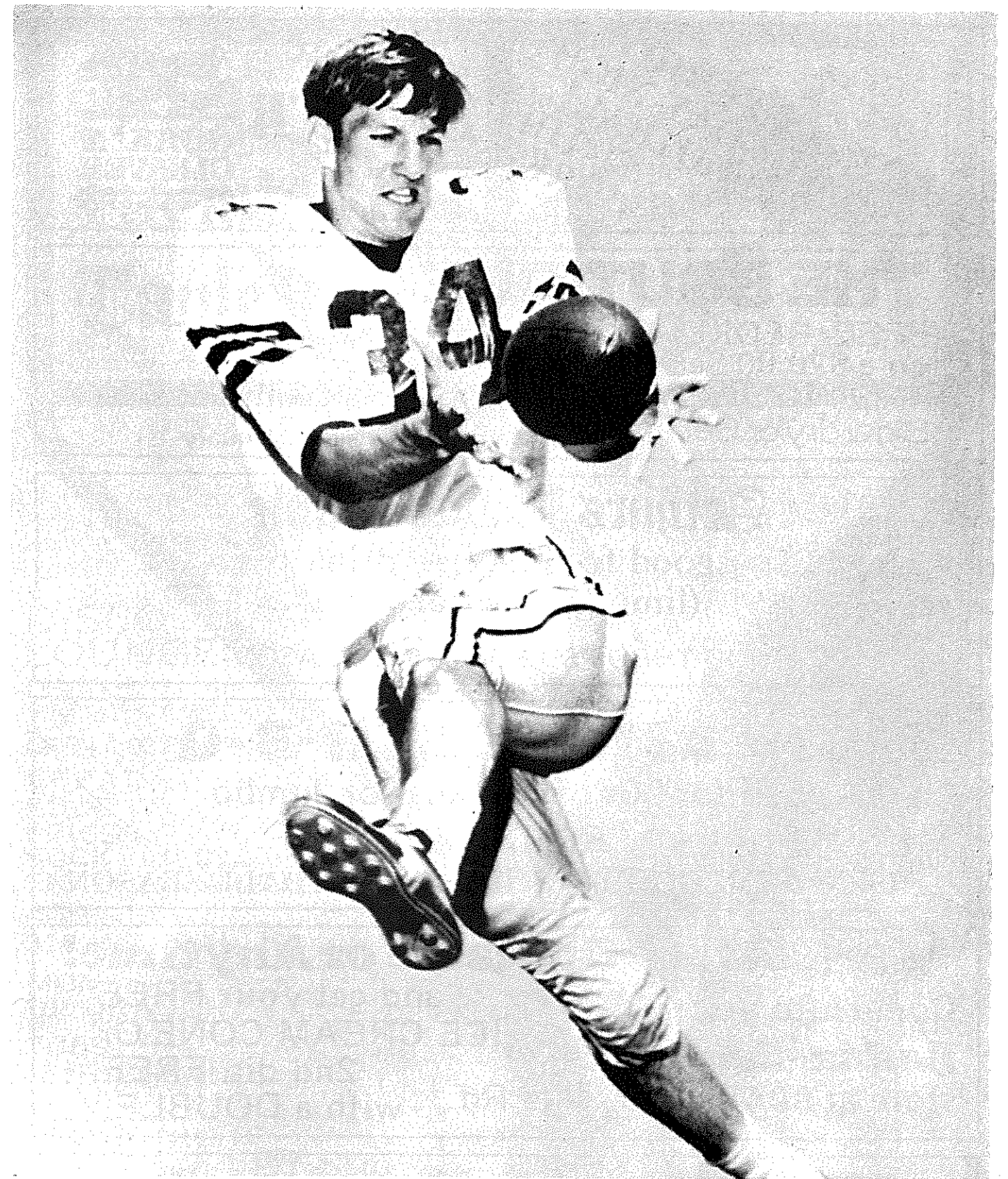
1969 was a down turn in the fortunes of the Seminoles. It was a winning year with a final tally of 6 wins, 3 losses and 1 tie game. Good, but not good enough to go bowling as they had for the past three years.

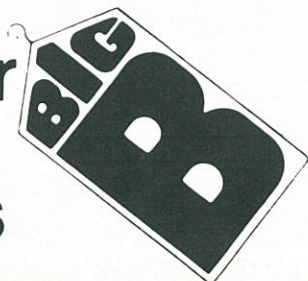

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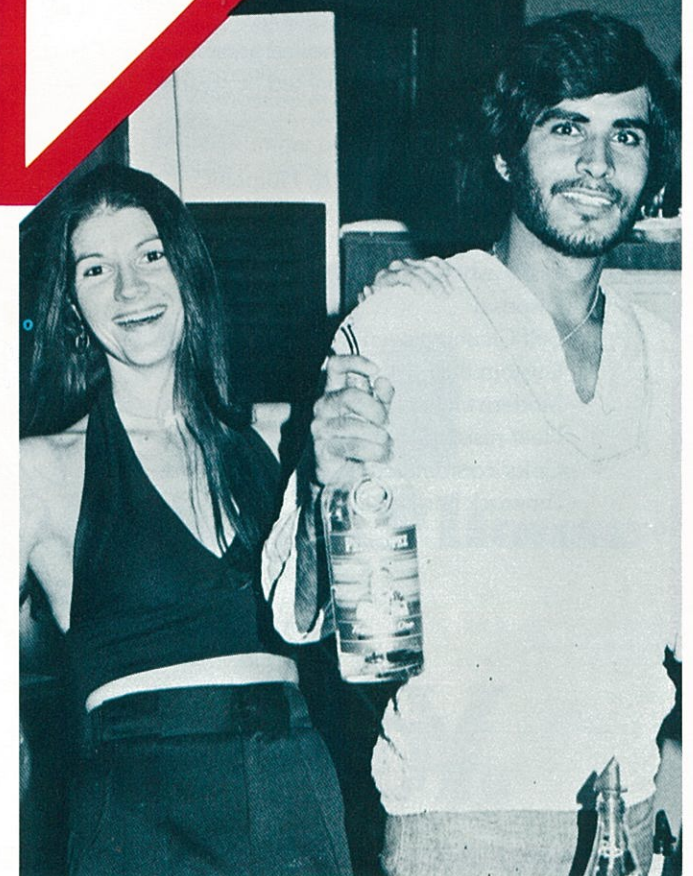
