SCOUTING REPORT

OPPONENT: Florida State (8-1)

DATE: November 19, 1977

OFFENSE: The Seminole offense centers around running back Larry Key. Key has rushed for 880 yards, caught passes for 234 yards and has 338 yards returning kickoffs.

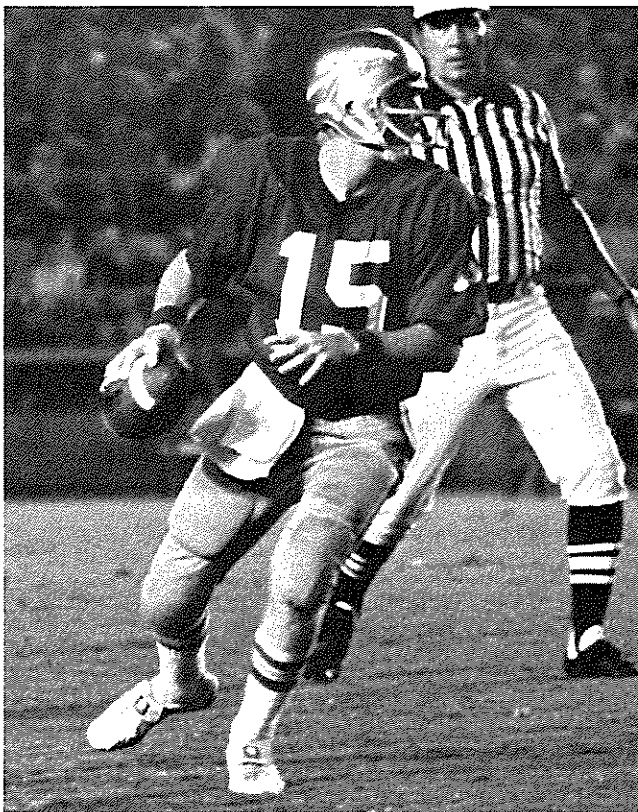
Wally Woodham figures to be the quarterback against the Aztecs with Jimmy Jordan ready in the wings. Roger Overby and Mike Shumann are the club's top receivers.

The offensive line is solid and big. The leaders are tackles Ken Lanier (6-4, 260) and Nat Henderson (6-5, 258) and guard Bruce Harrison (6-2, 245). The tight end is Grady King (6-4, 205).

DEFENSE: Florida State's defensive secondary is allowing its opponents just 97.7 yards per game passing. The men who hold down the secondary spots are corners Bobby Jackson and Ivory Joe Hunter and safeties Nat Terry and Mike Kincaid. Jackson, Terry and Hunter all have three interceptions.

The linebacking corps is led by Aaron Carter (5-8, 185) from his strong slot with help from Jimmy Heggins (5-11, 185).

Along the defensive front are ends Willie Jones (6-4, 225) and Scott Warren (6-3, 210) and tackles Louie Richardson (6-6, 235) and Walter Carter (6-4, 240).

TONIGHT'S GRID NOTES

The Aztecs and Florida State have met only once in the past with the Aztecs hammering out a 38-17 decision in 1973. San Diego State rolled up 590 yards total offense in the game and Jesse Freitas threw for 308 yards.

Florida State nose guard Ron Simmons (6-1, 220) is a doubtful performer for tonight's game. Simmons was the Associated Press Lineman of Week and Sports Illustrated's Defensive Player of the Week following Florida State's game with North Texas State. Simmons had five quarterback sacks, 10 solo tackles and nine assists in that game. He is only a freshman.

San Diego State has a five game winning streak coming into tonight's game and an 11 game win streak in the Stadium. The last Aztec loss was 34-14 to Fresno State. The last Aztec loss in San Diego Stadium was 8-0 to BYU last year.

Florida State has a six game win streak coming into tonight's game.

David (Deacon) Turner of the Aztecs has 952 yards rushing for the season and needs just 48 yards tonight to become only the third back in Aztec history to rush for 1000 yards in a season.

Turner has 188 carries this season and needs just six more carries to eclipse the record of 193 he set last year. Turner also needs just 26 carries to break Norm Nygaard's career total of 407 carries.

Turner now ranks second on the alltime career rushing list at San Diego State with 1934 yards. Nygaard is tops with 2619 yards.

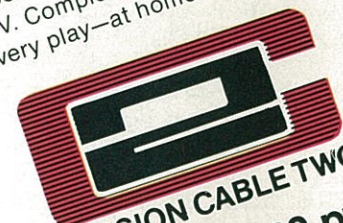
Aztec defensive back Terry Jackson intercepted his sixth pass of the season last week and his 10th in three seasons. Terry joins Ed Ricketts, Verne Dodds and Tom Deckert as the only Aztecs to ever intercept 10 or more passes in a career.

Quarterback Joe Davis of the Aztecs has thrown for 586 yards in the last two weeks. He ripped Pacific for 314 yards and Long Beach State for 272.

The Aztecs blocked their first two kicks of the season last week against Long Beach. Mike Douglass got to a Woody Tressler punt and Ed Imo smothered a Tressler PAT attempt.

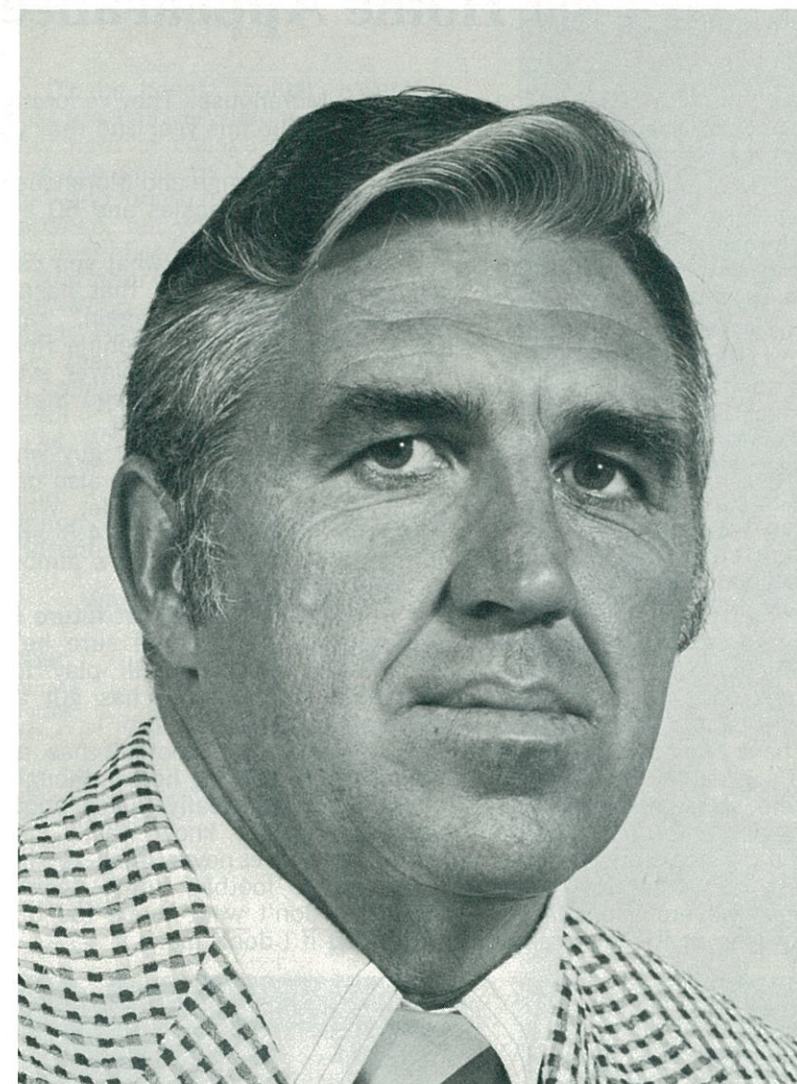
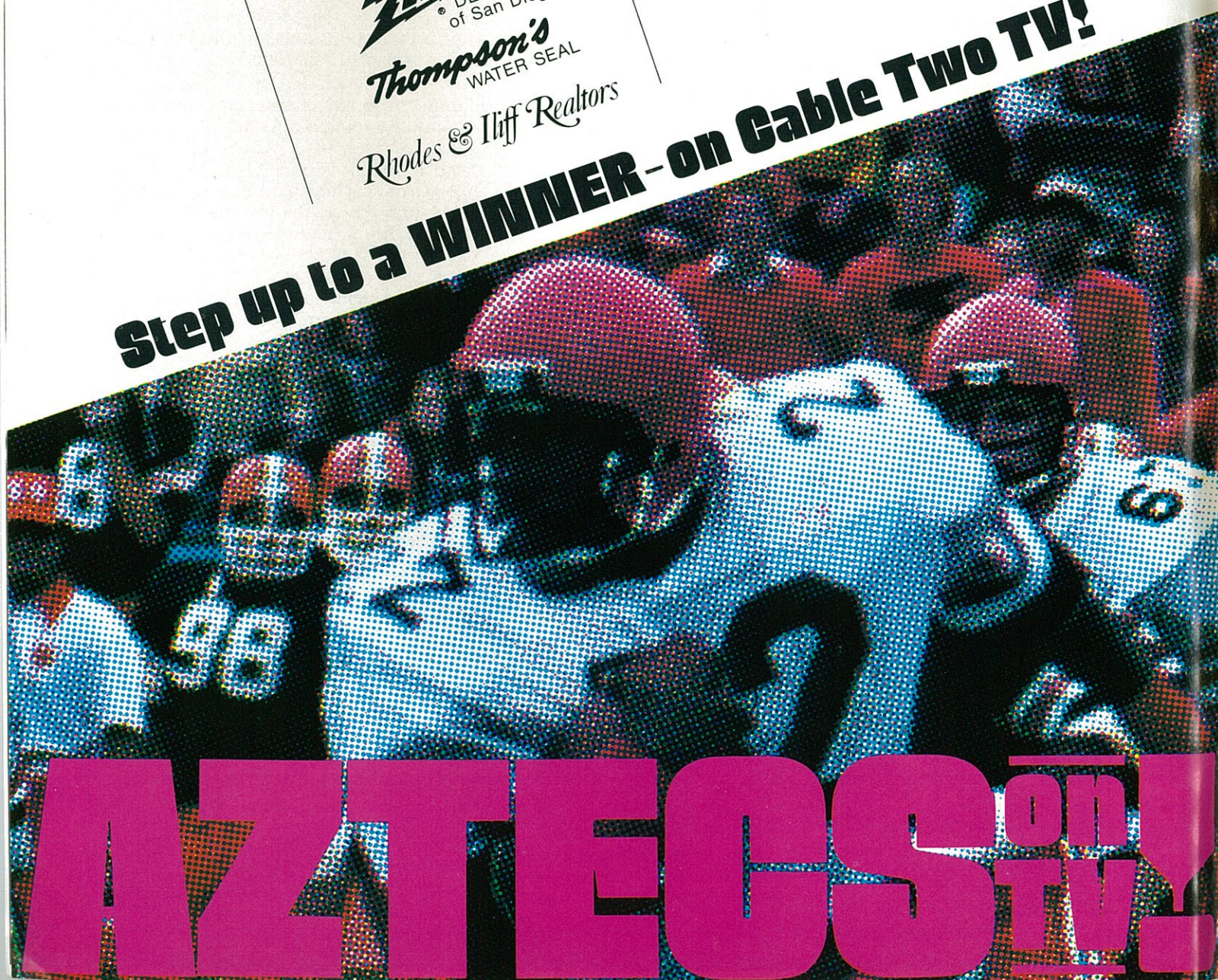

CLAUDE GILBERT

Aztec Head Coach

Claude Gilbert enters his fifth year as head football coach at San Diego State University after posting an outstanding 35-7-2 mark in his first four seasons.

Gilbert took over the Aztec job in 1973 after serving for six years on the San Diego State staff under Don Coryell. Gilbert coached the offensive line for two seasons and was defensive co-ordinator for four years under Coryell.

Gilbert played his collegiate ball at San Jose State where he was a fullback and flanker. He was the Spartan's team captain as a senior in 1958.

Claude went right into coaching following graduation from college and was an assistant coach at Tulare High School in 1959. In 1960 he got the head job at Shafter High School and in three years guided the Generals to a 24-3-0 record and two league titles.

Bakersfield College was the next stop for Gilbert where he was a defensive coach for the Renegades from 1963 to 1965. From there Claude landed the head job at Southwestern College in Chula Vista.

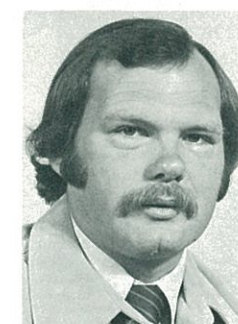

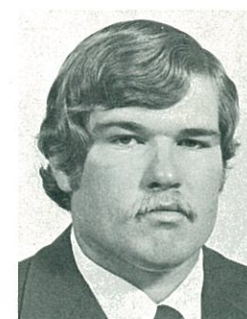

Whip Walton—Hopes His Last Home Appearance

Whip Walton has had 10 games in his San Diego State career in which he has made 10 or more tackles in a game.

The thing Whip wants most right now is to close out his fantastic four years as an Aztec with 10 tackle games against Florida State tonight and against San Jose State next week.

"My goals at the start of the season," said Walton, "were to get 100 primary tackles, 400 defensive points and go undefeated. Well we can't go undefeated any more.

"I really wanted to go undefeated this season and it hurt when Fresno State beat us. But we've picked up the pieces and I think we're really ready for a big effort against Florida State tonight. Florida State has a super team and we'll have to be very well to win, but now our goal as a team is back-to-back 10-1 seasons and not too many people can say they played on teams good."

The reasons 100 and 400 are so important to Walton is that no other player in Aztec history has ever attained those numbers. No one has ever made 100 primary tackles in a season and no one has ever gained

400 defensive points. Walton is the first player in San Diego State history to have three straight 300 point seasons.

As a sophomore, Walton had 305 points, last year he had 368 and with two games remaining in the 1977 season he has 343.

As a freshman, Walton finished in the middle of the defensive point race. As a sophomore, Whip tied Travis Hitt, his running mate at inside linebacker for top point honors, and last season he bested Hitt for first place.

This season Walton has had first place all to himself. With 343 points, Whip leads second place Mike Douglass by almost 60 points.

"We've got some awfully good defensive people," said Whip and we're proud of our unit. We've gotten ahead of some people this year and the coaches have played a lot of people and that's great. I think maybe they've let me stay on the field a little longer than some of the others so I can attain my goals and I appreciate it. I also think that I've got a couple of great players opposite me on the strong side in Rickey Orange

and Ron Morehouse. They've pretty much split time this year and they've been great."

Combined, Orange and Morehouse have 82 primary tackles and 60 assists for 367 points.

"I really don't know what you can say about Whip Walton that hasn't been said over and over again," said Aztec linebacker coach Donnie Rea. "Whip is just the finest player ever to play defense at San Diego State. His record speaks for itself.

"He is a super physical guy who can take on a block, but he also has great speed to the outside. Whip runs the 40-yard dash in 4.8 and that's super for a guy who's almost 6-3 and weighs 235.

"I think he's got a great future in professional football. I'm sure he'll be drafted high and will play for someone. Whip Walton has got all the tools to be a great pro."

For Walton, pro football has always been something he has thought about but never really talked about openly. "I don't know why," said Whip, "but I've never liked to discuss my pro football future openly. I guess I don't want to be too disappointed if I don't make it.

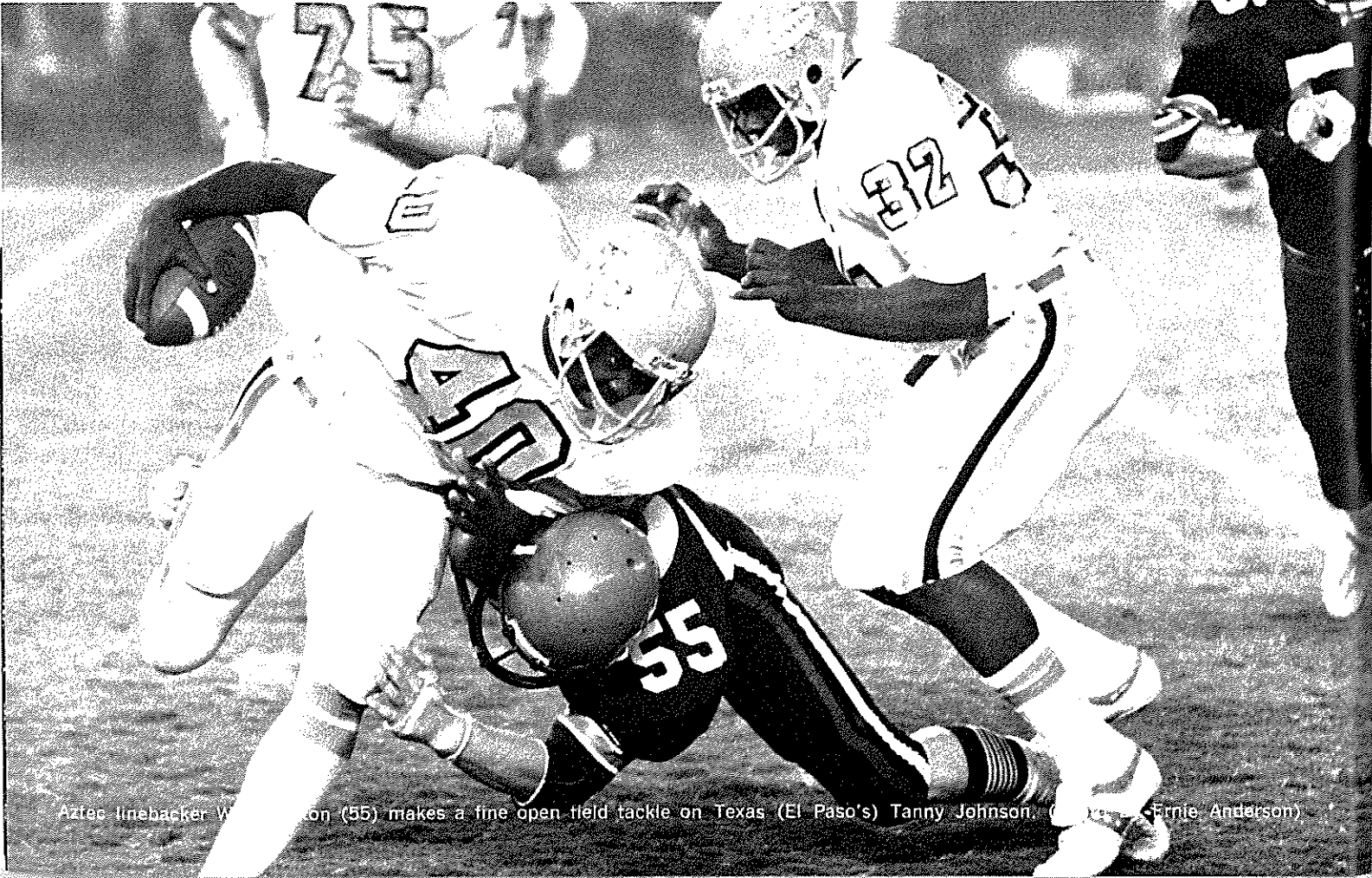
"To be honest though, I want to play pro ball very badly. I've worked very hard in college and I'd like to give the pros my best shot. If I do that and don't make it then I'll be satisfied, but you can bet I'll give it my best shot."

And after college and perhaps pro ball, Whip would like to become a coach. He's worked very hard to attain that goal, carrying a 3.1 GPA in college as a Physical Education major.

As Whip Walton plays his final game in San Diego Stadium as an Aztec it becomes very clear—Whip Walton is one fine football player and one fine young man.

So You Think You Know

The Aztecs?

The Aztecs and Seminoles have met only once in the past with San Diego State winning 38-17 in 1973. In that game, the Aztecs rolled up 590 yards total offense and Jesse Freitas passed for 308 yards.

Did you know that David (Deacon) Turner needs just 48 yards tonight to become only the third Aztec in history to run for 1000 yards in a season?

Turner has 952 yards this season on 188 carries. The alltime San Diego State record for yards gained rushing in a season is 1186 by Jim Allison. Turner needs 235 yards in his last two games to pass Nygaard. The only other Aztec back to gain 1000 in a season is Norm Nygaard with 1016.

Turner needs just six carries against Florida State to break his own single season record for attempts in a season. Deacon rushed 193 times last year.

Did you know that the Aztec career rushing record is held by Nygaard? He gained 2619 yards while playing in 1952-53-54. Turner's career total for two seasons now stands at 1934 and he ranks second alltime in back of Nygaard. Kern Carson is third at 1911.

Did you know that Nygaard also holds the Aztec record for rushes in a career with 407? Turner needs just 26 carries in his last two games to break that mark. Deacon has carried the ball 381 times for San Diego State in two seasons.

Did you know that Florida State quarterbacks Wally Woodham and Jimmy Jordan played at the same high school? Woodham, who is slated to start against the Aztecs, led Tallahassee Leon High School to second place in the State in 1974. Jordan came along the next season and passed for 4008 yards and led Leon to the State Championship.

Jordan was the starting quarterback for Florida State until the Oklahoma State game. The Seminole offense was struggling late in the first half and

coach Bobby Bowden decided to play Woodham for two series to let Jordan get a better look at the Oklahoma State defense. Well, Woodham led Florida State to a pair of field goals before the half ended and has been the Seminole QB ever since.

Mike Shumann, who is Florida State's alltime leading pass receiver, also attended Tallahassee Leon.



Did you know that San Diego State appears 10 times in the latest NCAA Statistics? David Turner is on the sheet three times. Deacon is tied for 8th in All-Purpose Running with an average of 146.7 yards per game. He is also 24th in Rushing with an average of 105.8 yards per game and 25th in Scoring with an average of 7.4 points per game.

Other Aztec individuals on the NCAA State Sheet are Terry Jackson (tied for 6th in Pass Interceptions), Joe Davis (8th in Passing and 13th in Total Offense), Ronnie Smith (tied for 21st in Scoring) and Dennis Pearson (14th in Pass Receiving).

As a team the Aztecs are 7th in Passing Offense and 14th in Total Offense. San Diego State is averaging 236.9 yards per game passing and 408.1 yards total offense.

Florida State brings a six game winning streak into tonight's game with the Aztecs. The last time a Florida State team won as many as six in a row was 1967.

The last time Florida State won seven games in a row was also 1967. That season the Seminoles were 0-2-1 after the first three games of the year and then strung eight wins together and gained a spot in the Gator Bowl. The Seminoles tied Penn State 17-17 in the 1967 Gator Bowl.

Did you know that San Diego State carries a five game win streak into tonight's game? Also the Aztecs have won their last 11 games in a row in San Diego Stadium, dating back to an 8-0 loss to BYU last season.

Tonight is the final home appearance for Aztec seniors Joe Bartels, Binky Benton, Scott Bradley, Rudy Castellanos, Lew Chumich, Mike Clancy, Terry Clement, Joe Davis, Mike Douglass, Steve Gearty, Donny Holmes, Ed Imo, Terry Jackson, Tim Johnson, Bo Larson, John Marsala, Ken Mathis, Rickey Orange, Dennis Pearson, Ronnie Smith, David Turner, Ron VanderSluis, Tom Vessey, Whip Walton and John White.

Did you know that David Turner is the only Aztec player to ever rush for over 100 yards and catch passes for over 100 yards in the same game?

Turner rushed for 118 yards against Long Beach State last week. That marked the fifth time this season and the 10th time in his Aztec career that he has been over 100 yards in a game.

Whip Walton is the San Diego State defensive point leader so far this season with 343 points. Whip has 80 primary tackles and 59 assists. Mike Douglass is second with 286 points. He has 42 tackles, 32 assists, 33 pass rushes and 10 QB sacks.

The Aztec Athletic Foundation is only \$5,000 short of its goal of \$250,000.

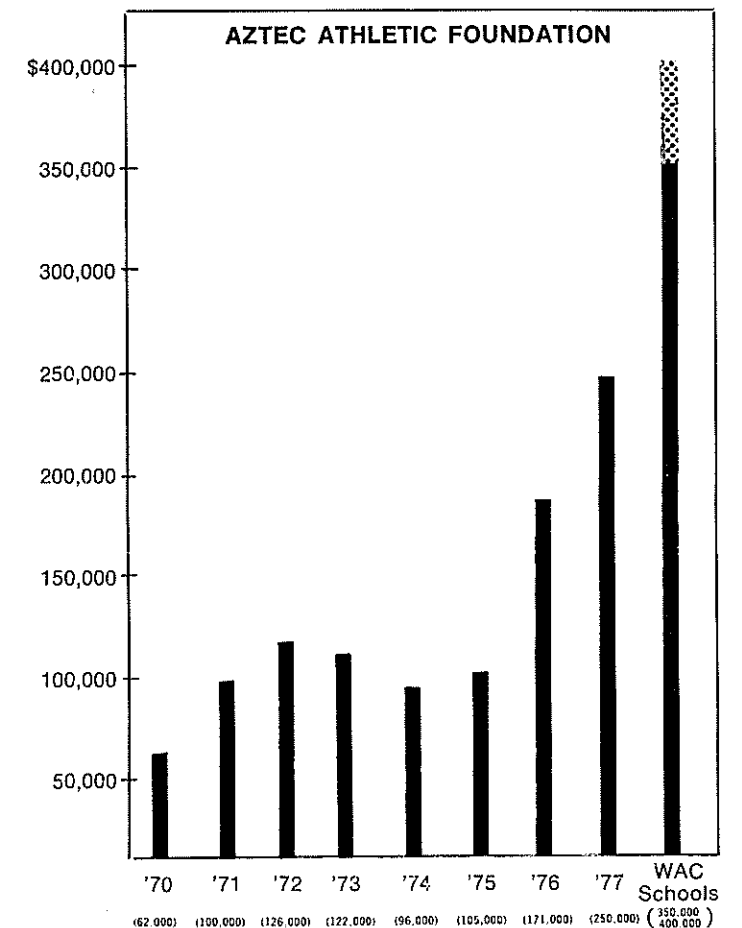
Foundation President Ken Golden commented, "We have many commitments certain to be fulfilled during November and December. We're confident we will meet and exceed our goal."

The success of the fund drive is great news to long time Aztec backers who have seen the Foundation campaign grow from \$105,000 in 1975, to \$171,000 in 1976, and \$250,000 this year.

Foundation Executive Director Cliff Baxter points to the high percentage of upgraded memberships and new contributors as a key to this year's success. "We had about 100 volunteers assist the drive by personally contacting friends, neighbors and business colleagues," Baxter said. "This type of personal attention encourages a higher level of giving."

The chart shows the results of the Foundation's fund raising campaigns during recent years. Even with the outstanding growth during the past two years, the AAF faces a big challenge when SDSU begins competing in the Western Athletic Conference. Many WAC schools currently raise \$350-400,000 for athletics.

"With a little time, some hard work, and cooperation from all Aztec fans," concluded Baxter, "we can raise those kinds of dollars just as well as WAC schools do."

THE AZTEC SPECIAL TEAMS

Many people think of football as a game of offense and defense. There is, however, another part of the game that often goes overlooked.

The special team members, the guys who run down after kicks and punts, are as much a part of a team as the offense and defense. This season the Aztec special units have gone unnoticed mainly because they are doing a super job.

"It's kind of funny," said Aztec coach Claude Gilbert, "but special teams don't get any notice until they give up a few TD's. Our guys have done a great job of containing our opponents. We haven't given up a long return and our kicking game has been good."

"We lost a fine kicker in Steve Duncan early in the year with an injury, but Tom Vessey has filled in well and Greg Roeszler is doing a great job as our punter."

Roeszler had his best night as an Aztec against Long Beach State last week, averaging 43.1 yards on seven kicks. He had a 51 yard punt and a 50 yarder.

As for returns, San Diego State has had only 15 of Roeszler's 47 punts returned for 50 yards. That's an average of 3.3 yards per return. The Aztecs are also allowing their opponents 18.1 yards per kickoff return.

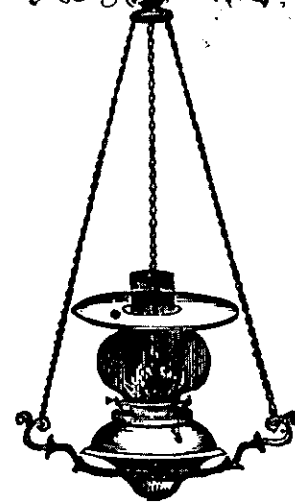

Aztecs Jump to 6th on "Winningest" List

San Diego State University has been winning football games for a long time. Over the last five years, however, the Aztecs have been winning games at such a pace as to rank sixth among the nation's winningest teams.

Over the past five seasons, the Aztecs have posted a 45-8-2 mark good for a winning percentage of .836 and a tie for sixth with Penn State. Penn State has a 46-9-0 record over the past five years.

The winningest teams over the last five years are Oklahoma and Alabama with winning percentages of .909. Oklahoma is 49-4-2 and Alabama 50-5 over the past five years.

In third place is Ohio State with a 47-4-2 record and a winning percentage of .906. The Buckeyes are followed by fourth place Michigan at 48-4-3 and .900 and USC at 46-7-2 and .855.

The teams behind the Aztecs are Notre Dame in eighth with a 43-10 mark, ninth place Yale with a 36-9 record and 10th place Nebraska with a 42-11-3 record.

Over the past 10 seasons, the Aztecs rate seventh among the nation's winningest teams with a 70-15-2 mark. Ohio State is first, Penn State second, Michigan third, Alabama fourth, Oklahoma fifth and USC sixth. If bowl games are included in the winning percentages of teams over the past 10 seasons the Aztecs jump to fourth behind Ohio State, Penn State and Oklahoma.

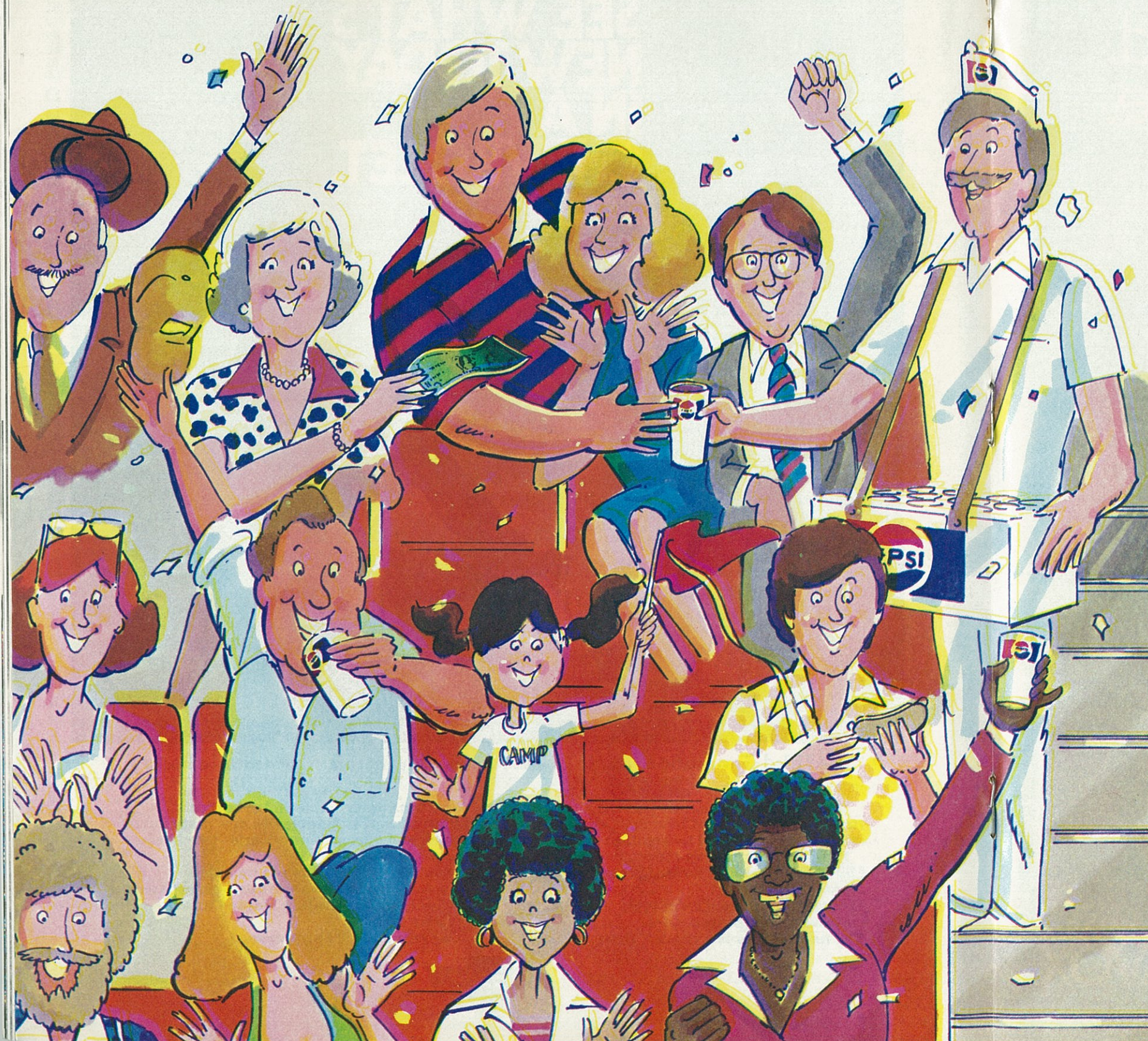

Aztec Defense Stays in National Spotlight

San Diego State University has long been noted as a team with a high powered offense.

The offense has long overshadowed the defense, but in the latest statistics released (by the NCAA the Aztecs rate 13th in Scoring) Defense, 18th in Rushing Defense and 18th in Total Defense. The statistics cover the past five years.

Last year's Aztec defense ranked 10th in the nation, allowing 11 opponents just 11.4 points per game.

Over the year's the Aztecs have produced several top defensive players who have gone on to play in the National Football League. Defensive end Fred Dryer is one of the top players in pro ball and an All-Pro Player.

Last season three of the top six interceptors in the NFL were Aztecs. Monte Jackson of the Rams led the NFL with 10 thefts while Joe Lavender of the Washington Redskins was tied for second with eight and Nate Wright of the Minnesota Vikings was tied for third with seven.

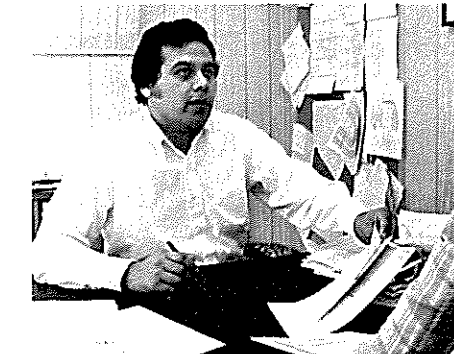

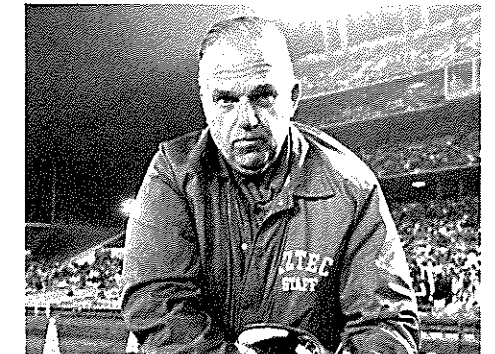

It's A Classic Confrontation of East vs. West When

It figures to be a classic confrontation of East vs. West tonight when Florida State's Classy runner Larry Key meets the pride of San Diego State David (Deacon) Turner.

Key is second in the nation in All-Purpose rushing, averaging 161.7 yards per game. He has 880 yards rushing on 195 carries, 234 yards on 20 pass receptions and 338 yards on 14 kickoff returns. Turner is 24 in the nation in Rushing with 952 yards. He is also seventh in All-Purpose Running. Deacon has caught 28 passes for 374 yards in addition to his rushing totals.

Key is 5-10, 180 and a senior. He is from Inverness, Florida and has played

four years on the varsity at Florida State.

In three plus seasons, Key has rushed for a Florida State record 2671 yards. His 880 yard total this season is just 64 yards shy of the Seminole season record. Key needs only 120 yards in his last two games against the Aztecs and Florida State to become the first runner to ever gain 1000 yards.

Last season he broke a run against Virginia Tech for 97 yards and a TD. That was the longest run from scrimmage in college football last season.

The biggest factor in Key's favor at Florida State has been his consistency.

He gained 602 yards on 123 carries as a freshman. As a sophomore he had 502 yards on 119 carries and last year he gained 712 on 144 attempts. In each of his seasons as a Seminole he has averaged 4.9, 4.4, 4.9 and this season 4.5 yards per carry.

Florida State has played a weak schedule in Key's four seasons. He has rattled off 100 yard games against Alabama, Memphis State, Auburn, Clemson, Houston, Oklahoma State, Kansas State and Texas Tech. His best individual game was this season against Auburn when he cruised for 170 yards. He also carried 32 times in the Oklahoma State game.

Larry Key Meets The Deacon

"Key is a very fine runner," said Aztec coach Claude Gilbert. "He is a darter and the type of guy who can break things up in a hurry. We have to contain him in order to have a chance to win."

Turner has been the key to San Diego State's offense since he checked in last year from Bakersfield College. Deacon set every junior college rushing record when he played for the Renegades and he hasn't let the Aztec fans down.

He has 952 yards rushing this season and is within 48 yards of becoming only the third player in San Diego State history to go over the 1000 yard mark in a season. Add to that total 982 yards last season and Deacon's career total yardage rushing is 1934 yards. That is second alltime on the Aztec list to Norm Nygaard's 2619 and Nygaard played three seasons.

Turner averaged 5.1 yards per carry last year and is right at that figure again this season.

The thing that has really separated Turner from the rest of the runners around the country this season is his ability to catch a pass. Already this season, Deacon has gathered in 28 passes (second on the Aztec squad) for 374 yards. He rambled 67 yards with a flare pass against Arizona before the hot Southwest sun stopped him two yards shy of the goal.

"It was our intention before the season to get the ball to Turner any way we could," Gilbert said. "We knew that David had good hands and we wanted to get him in situations where he would be out in the flat with only a linebacker covering him and then get the old Deacon the ball. I think David's made us look like great coaches the way he gets those little short passes up the field for 20 and 30 yard gains."

"David wants to play professional football and being able to catch the ball the way he does makes him that much more valuable. Look at the way the St. Louis Cardinals use Terry Metcalf to catch passes and I think you get the idea."

So tonight listen for the names Larry Key and David Turner. You probably will hear those names many times over the Public Address system. You'll probably hear the names many times on TV over the course of the next few years as both take their places on professional football rosters.

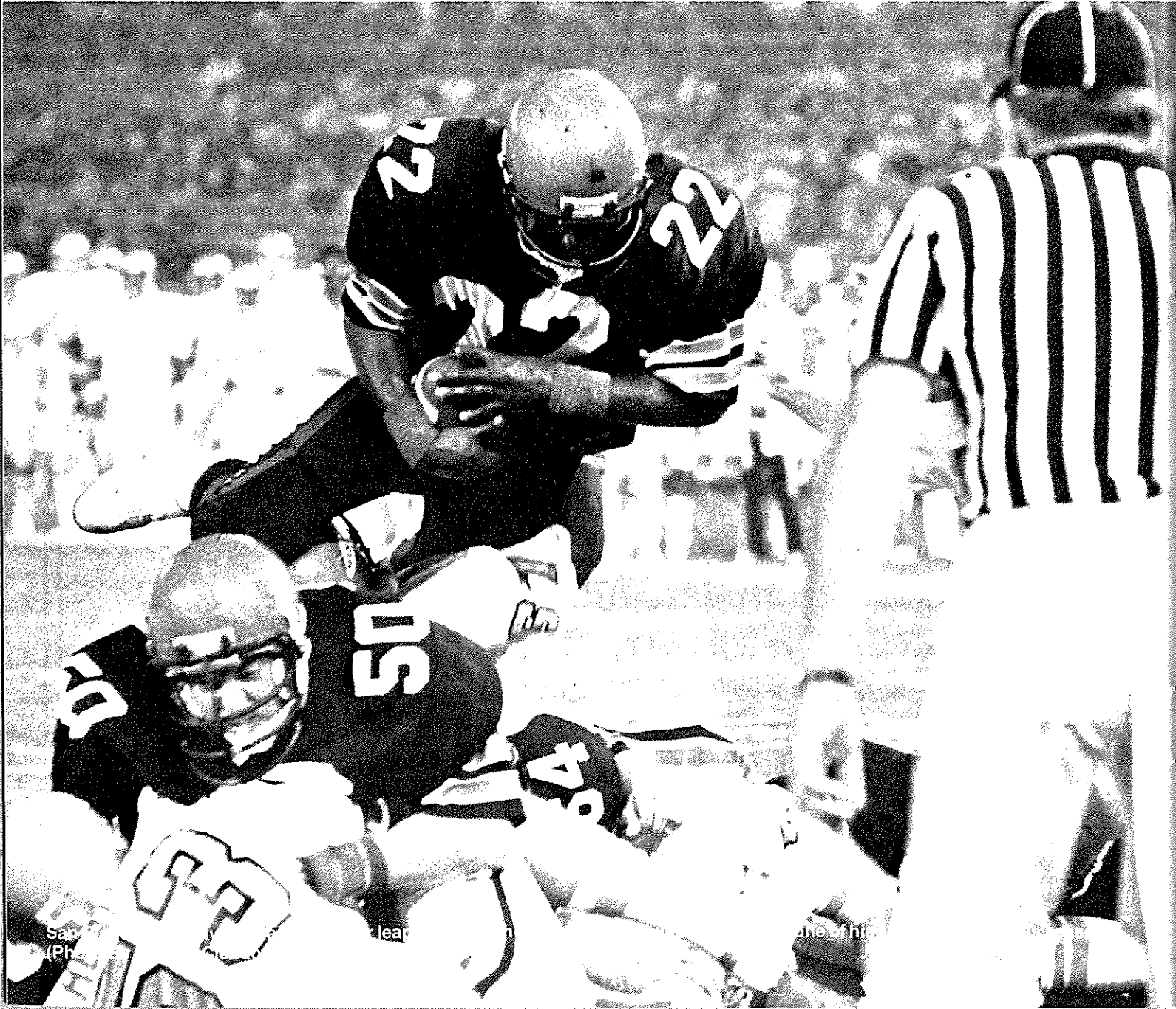

BOBBY BOWDEN Head Football Coach

A firm but fair person.
That is the way Florida State head football coach Bobby Bowden would like his players to remember him once they've graduated.

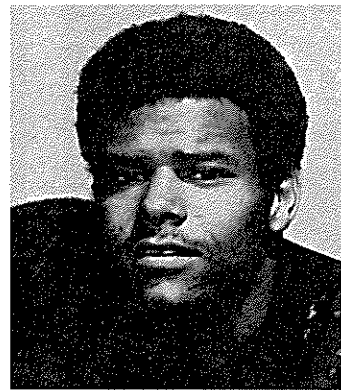
"I would like to think they would feel I've been fair," says Bowden who will guide the Seminoles for the second time in 1977. "I'm not interested in being liked. If a young man becomes a better person or better football player because I've irritated him a little, I've accomplished what needs to be done."

Bowden has had a history of success in his previous stops. He had head coaching experience at four year schools, Howard (now Samford) and West Virginia, before agreeing to take the assignment of rebuilding the Florida State program in January, 1976. Prior to 1977 his overall record is a nifty 78-38, a .672 winning percentage which ranked 11th among major college head coaches.

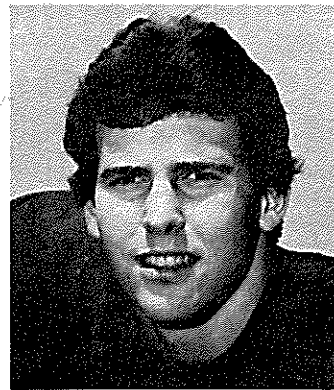
In addition to his head coaching positions at South Georgia Junior College, Samford and West Virginia, Bowden served as an assistant at Samford, Florida State and West Virginia. He was assistant football coach and head track coach at Samford for two seasons in 1954-55. From 1955-58, he was athletic director and head football coach at South Georgia Junior College.

In 1959, he returned to Samford and in four seasons his teams built a 31-6 record.

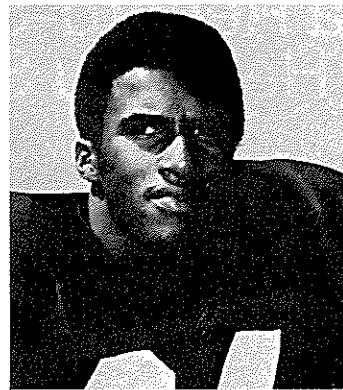
Bowden was tapped by Florida State head coach Bill Peterson to coach the Seminole offensive ends in 1963. It was off to West Virginia in 1966 as the offensive chief for the Mountaineers. Bowden was named head coach at West Virginia in 1970. His first team finished with an 8-3 mark, breaking 19 school records. The 1971 team was 7-4 and the 1972 squad finished 8-3 and earned a Peach Bowl invitation. In '73 and '74 the records fell to 6-5 and 4-7, but in 1975 the Mountaineers rebounded to an 8-3 record and added an upset win over North Carolina State in the Peach Bowl.



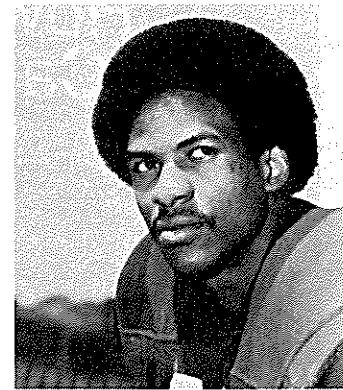

Aztecs Best In Passing Again

The names have now become household words— Jesse Freitas, Craig Penrose, Pete Teneschuk and Tom Craft. They are the men who did the throwing for San Diego State over the past five years that have allowed the Aztecs to rank as the No. 1 passing team in the nation over the past five seasons.

Penrose completed 330 of 584 passes for 4,343 yards and Freitas was 324 of 518 for 4,193 yards. Both are playing professional football now with Penrose with the Denver Broncos and Freitas with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Of course before Penrose and Freitas, Don Horn started the great tradition of Aztec quarterbacks by completing 257 of 459 attempts for 3,922 yards followed by Dennis Shaw's 333 of 575 for 5,324 yards and Brian Sipe's 436 of 788 for 5,707 yards.

The Aztecs have always had great receivers to go along with their passers. Men such as Tim Delaney, who had 180 receptions at San Diego, Tom Reynolds, who caught 177 passes, Ken Burrow, who grabbed 78, Darold Nogle, who caught 69 and Dwight McDonald. McDonald set a single season reception record of 86 in 1974 and is now with the San Diego Chargers.

Before Delaney, Reynolds, Burrow and Nogle, men like Gary Garrison (148 catches), Craig Scoggins (129 receptions), Haven Moses (111 catches) and Tom Nettles (90 receptions).

The Aztecs have won the NCAA Team Passing Title three times (1971, 1973 and 1975) and have had four individual win titles (Shaw in 1969, Sipe in 1971, Freitas in 1973 and Penrose in 1975). Shaw and Freitas were also the total offense leaders in the year they won the passing crown.

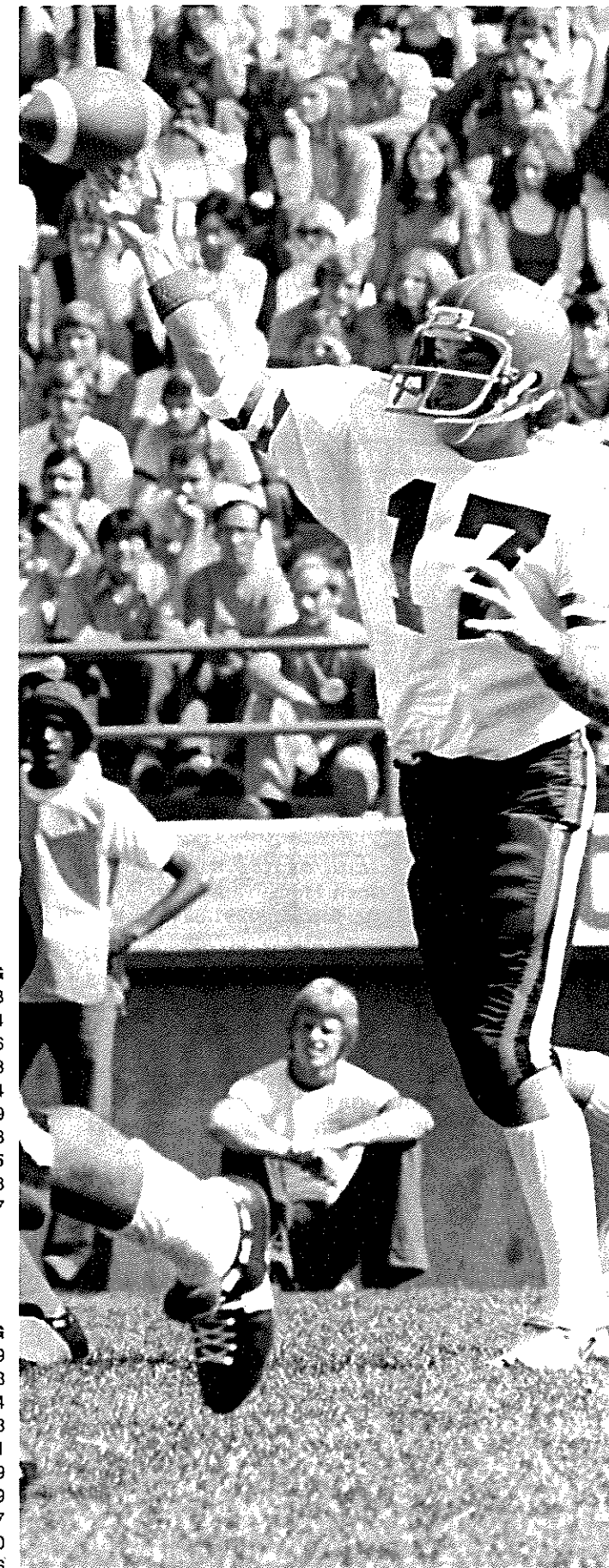

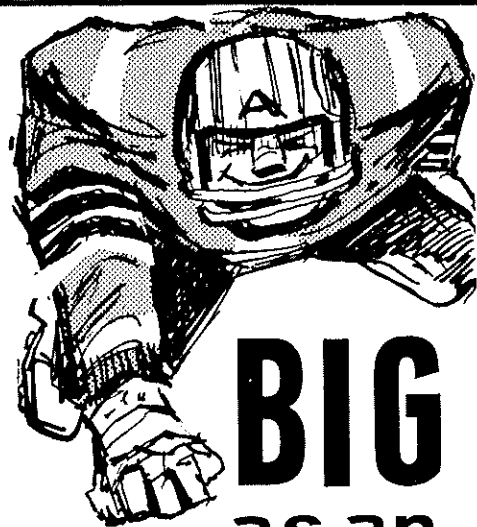
