

Teepee Talk

Welcome to home-opener II.

After five grueling weeks the Florida State Seminoles finally return to Doak Campbell Stadium tonight to play a football game. Like the old saying goes "what a difference a few weeks make."

When most of you last saw the Seminoles, they were flying high. They were ranked No. 6 in the nation—enjoying their highest pre-season build-up in the history of the school. Some polls were figuring Florida State to finish in the top five and one or two folks felt there was a seriously about what you think would have happened had they been shot at the national championship. All of that has changed now.

So what in the world, you may ask, went wrong? Before we get into the heavy talk about tonight's contest against Cincinnati, a few observations on just what IS going on around here.

First, I think that Bobby Bowden has made blind followers out of everyone, including the national pollsters. His ability to take Florida State teams on the road into places like Lincoln, South Bend, Columbus and Baton Rouge and come out a winner had progressed to a point where people felt it was old hat. We Seminole fans were the first to take the bait. After all, we had seen the man do it with our own eyes. Many of us spent our hard-earned dollars to follow his teams into these historic places and we danced and partied as each mighty opponent fell.

The national folks were a little slower to believe. For several years we howled to the pollsters that we would win nine, 10 or 11 games despite our schedules. For years they snickered at the thought of FSU going on the road and winning time after time. Finally one day they collectively looked at the coach's road record and then at the teams he had played. Going into this season, Bowden's teams had won 16 of their last 21 games away from home. I'm not sure if another team in the country could match that feat over the same period. It's a cinch no one could match it faced with the same schedules.

So in 1983 the time was right for Florida State to get some hype. A national television audience had watched the Seminoles humiliate a good West Virginia team in the Gator Bowl last December. People read where 16 of 22 starters were returning. They saw where FSU had the nation's leading scorer and a possible Heisman Trophy candidate in Greg Allen returning. Best receivers, best offensive line, best running backs in the school's history.

In the pre-season coach Bowden talked of the difficult schedule especially on the road. The Sports Information Office warned of the road slate. Nobody listened.

Going into Baton Rouge and winning 40-35 in the second game of the year just made things worse. Now it was 17 of 22 wins on the road. Just Tulane, Auburn and Pittsburgh remained in the next three weeks. Oh, they were at their place but that was no factor for Bowden's Seminoles. Or was it?

There were many problems in those three losses. The reasons for defeat were many and varied depending on which game you are talking about. I contend that perhaps the biggest single factor, in light of the closeness of each game, was the home field. To put it simply— THE ODDS FINALLY CAUGHT UP WITH FLORIDA STATE.

Bowden himself verified that this was his feeling as well following the Pitt game. And what he spoke of was much more than just the luck of the cards. There were actual circumstances to back up the contention.

"When you're locked up in a tight ballgame and it's going right down to the wire having that home crowd and that home field can really make the difference between a win and a loss," said the man who could become Florida State's all-time winningest coach with a victory tonight. "There are a lot of games in which the way things happen that home field don't mean a thing. Three weeks in a row we were fighting for our life in the final minute of a game. I'll promise you having that crowd giving you that little something extra can make the difference.'

Bowden wasn't making excuses. Just pointing out that contrary to what he's made us believe, the home field is a very viable advantage. Going on the road and beating a quality team at their place in front of their fans is a rarity. Just check the scores every week. Florida State has defied the odds time and again over the last few years. The fact is, it was almost sure to finally catch up.

Take any of the three losses Florida State has suffered and think very played here in this stadium. I doubt that a handful of you would say that FSU would have lost all three. Most, like I do, feel the outcomes would have been reversed.

There is extreme disappointment surrounding this Florida State team to date. Many hopes have been dashed. But let's all take a step back and look at the facts. Florida State is certainly not a national championship contender, but the Seminoles aren't chopped liver either. They were upset by Tulane. It hasn't happened much to Bobby Bowden, but upsets run rampant in college football nowadays and that was just one of those days. They then played a very, very good Auburn team down to the final play before losing 27-24.

The Pitt loss was frustrating as well. The Panthers may have lost two in a row prior to the game but they had won 44 of their last 50 games. A one-point loss on their turf does not mean Florida State is ready

"It's not time to push the panic button yet," said Bowden earlier this week. "We have played some great teams very close on the road. We are not as bad as everyone is making us out to be. Of course I'm frustrated and I'm disappointed because you want to go on beating everybody in the world on their field. But sometimes when you look at it realistically you know that you can't keep on doing that week after week."

But enough already about things of the past. Tonight, the Seminoles return for the 36th homecoming game in the school's history. And if nothing else, it should be entertaining. If ever a game seemed earmarked to go down to the wire this is it. Couple the wild finishes in every FSU game so far this season with the wild finishes in each of the four FSU-Cincinnati games and it seems a dead-lock to be a barn-

The first meeting between these two schools was in 1978. As has been the case in each successive meeting, Florida State was the prohibitive favorite. With just a few minutes left in the game it was 7-0 and the outcome was very much in doubt. Only a late FSU touchdown that stretched it to the 14-0 final, gave the Tribe any room to breathe

In 1978 Florida State trailed the Bearcats 21–19 with less than a minute

to play. The Seminoles stood a midfield facing fourth down and 23 yards to go. FOURTH-AND-23. The game appeared over—a Cincinnati upset. But Jimmy Jordan found a streaking Sam Platt over the middle and Platt carried the ball to the left sideline and all the way into the end zone for a miracle touchdown that pulled it out 26-21.

Florida State went 11-0 in 1979 but perhaps the closest shave of all was the come-from-behind thriller over the Bearcats. The Seminoles trailed 21-7 with just one guarter to play before a fourth period rally left the snakebit Bearcats with the same final score as the year before,

Last year's game need not be re-hashed except to say that it was three Cincinnati passes falling incomplete in the FSU end zone with less than a minute to play that preserved a heartstopping 38–31 victory.

Four-and-0 against Cincinnati and not a single one decided before the final minute. Could it be more gray hair for Seminole coaches and fans?

The Bearcats have a new coach this time around. He is the youngest coach the Seminoles will face and one of the youngest in the country today at 33. Watson Brown was the offensive co-

ordinator under George McIntyre at Vanderbilt before taking the head job at Cincinnati in the off-season.

Brown had a rather interesting debut at UC. In his first game as head coach his team beat Penn State 14-3 at State College. Since then it's been a little up and down with victories over Cornell and Temple and losses to Oklahoma State and Louis-

While Brown will have a major hand in planning the offensive strategy for the Bearcats tonight, it will be an ex-Seminole who will be running the Cincinnati defense. Dick Hopkins, a 1974 FSU graduate and exgraduate assistant on Bowden's staff, is the defensive coordinator. Hopkins left FSU after the 1980 Orange Bowl and spent some time at Duke before joining Brown at UC.

As a tip, look for the Bearcats to throw the ball tonight with a pair of talented wideouts who return off last year's team that played so well here. Jason Stargel is the flanker and Bill Booze the split end.

While we all had to wait quite a while for football in Tallahassee, we'll get our share in the hurry with two games in the next five days. Don't forget the FSU-Louisville game will be played here next Thursday night with an 8:05 kickoff. It will be televised nationally into 27 million cable homes by WTBS, Ted Turner's Atlanta's SuperStation.

Tribe Tidbits—Fans are reminded that the Seminole Sidelines hotline has recorded messages available to the public on a 24-hour basis. Ranging in length from one minute to three minutes, the messages include statistical updates as well as information about the next opponent and voice actualities from coaches and players. Scott Atwell is your host and Sun Federal Savings and Loan sponsors the hotline . . . when tailback Greg Allen ran for 85 yards against Pitt, he moved ahead of Mark Lyles on the all-time career rushing list. Allen's 2,219 yards eclipsed Lyles' total by one yard . . . if QB Kelly Lowrey continues to pile up passing yardage as he has in the first five games (1,219) he has a shot at breaking the all-time single season passing yardage mark. That mark is currently held by Gary Huff when he threw for 2,893 yards during the 1972 season.



At the Crossroads . . .

F ate singles out a few; a few who don't just play the game. They're the lucky ones who find themselves at the crossroads where history intersects with chance.

Burt Reynolds was one. As fabulous as his successes as an actor have been, he told Tampa sportswriter Mick Elliott in 1979, "One of the greatest thrills in my life was that 54 yard run from scrimmage I made against Auburn". Reynolds was a starry-eyed freshman halfback then. What made it even more exciting and important, said Reynolds, was that "it was the first year (1954) Florida State moved from playing the Furmans and Stetsons, to the likes of Georgia, Auburn and Georgia Tech.'

Burt Reynolds had stood at a crossroads in the history of Seminole football, and that may have drawn closer the lifelong ties between he and the school. "It was absolutely incredible," he said, "I'll never forget it as

long as I live."

Celebrities, politicians, and others prominent in the public eye often have backgrounds in college athletics. Presidents Gerald Ford, Ronald Reagan and Richard Nixon all played football (at Michigan, Eureka College and Whittier, respectively). John Wayne played football at Southern Cal; Tom Selleck played basketball there. Both Robert Redford and ABC's David Hartman were on baseball scholarship: Redford at Colorado; Hartman at Duke. George Steinbrenner played both baseball and football at Williams College, and Supreme Court Justice Byron "Whizzer" White was an All-American running back at Colorado.

Former Governor of Alabama Fob James was the Auburn back who finally managed to tackle "Buddy" Reynolds at the end of his 54 yard scamper.

Whether they become world reknown in later years, or stay closer to home, the ultimate experience for a college player may be having the opportunity to play some key role in shaping the history of his program; to participate in a classic game . . . to be part of a classic team ... to stand at the crossroads.

Burt Reynolds is one who had that opportunity. Here are three more:

KEN MacLEAN

e plucked the white football out of the air and tucked it away, and gave no thought at all to what he had done except that he had gained yards and Florida State was rolling.

What Ken MacLean

had done was catch the first pass in Seminole football history.

The first touchdown came later, in the second quarter, when Don Grant lofted a beautiful soft pass into the right corner of the

endzone to end Charlie McMillan. This scrappy team, in their first-ever game as Seminoles, ended the first half up 6-0 over a stunned Stetson University crew.

Ken MacLean was no novice. He had played football in the service, and at the University of Florida before that. He started at halfback for the Gators as a 17 year old freshman in 1944, and had a 91 yard run against Georgia in Jacksonville. But Georgia won the game, 38-12. "That was the year we were supposed to win the S.E.C.", he chuckles. "You know how that goes."

After the war, he re-enrolled at Florida, but, "I was dating a girl in Tallahassee, and my home was in Quincy, so a bunch of us transferred up there as soon as they began admitting men.'

"That summer of 1947", he recalls, "most of us spent our time at the Mecca and the Sweet Shop, just playing cards and pinball, and one day somebody said, 'Let's see if we can't get up a football team' . . . So, five of us went to see Howard Danforth, the Director of Physical Education and Recreation . . . I don't think anyone realized that we could get a team so soon ... Ed Williamson volunteered to coach, and Jack Haskins to assist, and they put together an abbreviated schedule that included Stetson, Cumberland, Tennessee Tech, Troy State and Jacksonville

People started to get excited. "There was a lot of campus spirit . . . They had a contest to decide the team name, and the winner got a \$25 wristwatch . . . Of course, the coaches didn't get any pay, and there weren't any scholarships for the players . . . Oh, I think we got an extra carton of milk in the cafeteria

MacLean led the new team in rushing, punting and receiving for two years. "Well", he puts off modestly, "I was a tailback, and under the old single wing I ended up handling the ball 90% of the time."

Enthusiasm was high for the opener against Stetson. Three thousand fans came to watch the practice scrimmage, and eight thousand jammed into the old Centennial Field for the

Stetson stormed back after the half, scoring once in the 3rd quarter, and again in the 4th. The final score was 14-6. "Ken caught the first ball for us," recalls quarterback Don Grant, laughing. "but the very first pass I threw was intercepted! . . . We played tough, though". Grant completed five passes that day for 65 yards and a score. MacLean picked up another 45 on the ground.

The Tribe didn't win a game that first season, but the following three years produced three consecutive Dixie Conference championships, and an undefeated season in 1950.

Ken MacLean became the Freshman Coach under Bill Peterson, then Head Recruiter for three years, and finally Assistant Athletic Director under Vaughn Mancha. He is close

to retirement now, and serves as Principal of Havana Middle School.

"I guess I'm one of the few people who really do cheer for both Florida and Florida State . . . I played for both, and have good friends from both", he says. "But, as far back as I can remember, Florida State fans have been more avid and more loval than Gator

What about when the Gators and Seminoles line up against each other?

"Well", he says, "then you'll see me in garnet and gold.

VIC PRINZI

was a very young ball club", Vic Prinzi remembers. "We had only three seniors, and most of the rest were sophomores.'

As senior quarterback and captain, it was Prinzi's job to lead the Tribe against their



most aggressive schedule ever; a schedule that included Georgia Tech, Georgia, Florida, Miami, Tennessee, and Wake Forest.

"Wake Forest was ranked #4 in the country, he says. "We beat them, then lost a close one to Georgia ... and then, we went to Knoxville to play Tennessee.

In their short football history, Florida State had not beaten a team from the Southeastern

"That was our first big win. Really, it vaulted us into the big time. We'd never been in the Top Twenty before, and after that game we were", Prinzi recalled with relish. "Going in, it was obvious that this was a significant game. As it turned out, Tennessee was one of three in a row we shut out."

Tallahassee Democrat sportswriter Bill McGrotha remembers that a game-day article in the Knoxville paper provided considerable motivation for the young Seminoles. "They had a great tailback named Billy Majors, who was brother to Johnny Majors, their All-American", he said. "Prinzi's back-up was another Majors boy, Joe, who had forsaken Tennessee for Florida State . . . The Knoxville paper that day said, 'The fact is: Billy Majors is a first class player on a first class team, and Joe Majors is a second class player on a second class team'."

Tribe defensive end Tony Romeo sent Billy Majors out of the game with broken ribs in the 1st quarter. In the end, Tennessee managed just 61 yards total offense for the

The Seminole team was not large. The offensive line averaged only 194 lbs. per man. "But", says Prinzi, "we were very hungry for a big win . . . We'd knocked off some good teams and we found that we could play with the big boys."





Florida State Leaders



Dr. Bernard F. Sliger President

His name is Bernard but almost everybody calls him "Bernie", and that's really the name he prefers. He is Dr. Bernard F. Sliger, president of Florida State University.

Bernie is probably the most down-to-earth president Florida State has ever had. He prefers sportshirts to a coat and tie. He's more at home shooting pool than attending a banquet. He does more walking than riding around campus and off-campus.

Throughout it all, however, President Bernie Sliger is almost fanatically loyal to the faculty. He keeps reminding you that he was, is and always will be a member of the faculty.

Sliger, an economist, came to Florida State in the early 1970s as executive vice president. After the resignation of former President Stanley Marshall, he was named president in 1977.

Sliger has the reputation of listening to the problems of others, students, staff or faculty, and, if warranted, trying to do something about it.

He listened to students and went to bat for an enlarged student union and the 1983 Legislature targeted \$9 million for it. Though parking spaces are still at a premium, students today have more paved parking areas than ever before.

He listened to faculty and today a new library science building, business building annex, music building, law library, conference center, education building and numerous renovations and expansions have been completed or are under construction. On the planning board is a long-sought science library.

When he first became president he started beating the drums for the addition of an engineering program and last year the first students enrolled in the FAMU/FSU Institute for Engineering. Bernie also successfully fought for increased library funding, quality improvement funds and an early retirement plan for faculty.

An avid sports fan, Sliger believes that an athletic program, in perspective, is an asset to a good university. He believes that students should be scholars first and athletes second but he also believes they can make A pluses in both.

Bernie resisted moving into the president's official home when he was first appointed but, under some pressure to conform, he reluctantly gave in. A plus factor is that the location enables him walk to stores and movies and to and from his office in the Westcott Administration Building. He spends a lot of time in the comfortable, white-columned house relaxing with his wife, Greta, younger son, Sten, his daughters, Greta Lee and Nan, and son Paul and his wife and baby.

A native of Trout Creek (pronounced "Crick"), Mich., Bernie still spends several weeks a year there in his "cabin" where he mostly catches up on his reading.



C.W. "Hootie" Ingram Athletic Director

"Hootie" Ingram is in his third year as Florida State's athletic director. He came to the post in 1981 after serving as associate commissioner of the Southeastern Conference.

Since his arrival Ingram has initiated a \$10 million dollar building program for athletic facilities. Included is a new athletic center that houses all administration, coaches and ticket personnel. Fully equipped with locker rooms, weight rooms and a cafeteria, the

complex will also serve as a home for the Seminole football team. A new baseball stadium was completed last April, while further improvements to Doak Campbell Stadium and renovations to the pool

area have also been completed.

A native of Tuscaloosa, Ala., Ingram played football for Alabama from 1951 through 1954. After an Army stint and several high school coaching assignments, he moved into college coaching. His assistant coaching stops came at Wake Forest, Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas and his only head coaching job began in 1970 at Clemson. Three years later he joined the SEC as assistant commissioner.



Dr. James P. Jones *Faculty Athletic*

Committee Chairman

Dr. James P. Jones, a member of the Florida State University History Department, is the chairman of the FSU Faculty Athletic Committee.

Jones has served on the Athletic Board since 1973. He was first chairman of the Board's Academic Sub-Committee until 1980 when he was named Board Chairman. In this capacity, he is the University's representative to the NCAA.

Jones received his B.A., M.A.

and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Florida. He accepted a post in the FSU History Department in 1957 and was named to chair the Department in 1980.

Jones is a historian of the American Civil War and has published five books and thirty-five articles on the history of 19th century America. He has also written on such sports subjects as minor league baseball, Hank Aaron and the Gator Bowl. Among Seminole fans, Jones' best-known work is FSU One Time! A History of Seminole Football, published in 1973 and updated in 1974, 75 and 76. He is presently working on a fifth edition.

Head Goach

Breeding Success

Some say Bobby Bowden was born to football. "From my back door," he once recalled, "you could kick a ball right through the goalposts straight into the middle of the field there at Woodlawn High."

Florida State's head football coach was born in that house flush by that playing field back in Birmingham. And ever since, it seems he has been little more than a short punt away from a game that he loves.

After he started playing that game—he was a tailback in the old single wing—Bowden developed rheumatic fever and was out of high school for a full year, flat on his back. The family doctor said he never again could play football.

"And that is why we changed doctors," Bowden said. Remarkably, he returned to the game and has since had no ill ef-

fects. The year, 1949, found him at the University of Alabama.

"It was the only time I ever quit anything in my life," said Bowden, no pride in his voice. "There were 100 freshmen there out for the team, and I thought I could not play. I'd get to run one play, and then 13 plays later be in for another."

There was more. Back in Birmingham was the lovely Ann, his childhood sweetheart. They

sweetheart. They decided to get married, and there was a rule against married players on Alabama's team. The two were wed the following April, and Bowden decided to transfer to Howard University (now Samford) in his native Birmingham. He was chosen All-Dixie through three seasons at Howard.

"There was an uncle who gave me my first football when I was five," said Bowden. "It was one of the best presents ever."

Quickly, Bowden moved into coaching—first at Howard as an assistant, then to South Georgia Junior College as head coach, back to Howard as head coach, to Florida State in '63 as an assistant, on to West Virginia as an assistant and then head coach, and finally back to Florida State in '76 as head coach.

His overall record as a head coach was a remarkable 132-54 following the conclusion of the 1982 season. His record with the Seminoles: 59-22. Most remarkable of all, perhaps, is his record at FSU on the road: 29-14.

Bowden's enthusiasm seems both boundless and highly contagious. "Big thing about our coach," said one Florida State fan, "is he always sees the blue in the sky and the green in the grass."

Little things—or big things—do not bother Bowden for long. Soon he's laughing. He laughs a lot, and finds humor in almost everything. He seems to get along with all people. There are no known enemies.

"I think people are good, before I think they are bad," Bowden once said. "Too many people the first time they see somebody don't

like 'em right away. My first reaction is to like 'em.


"I don't know of a person in this world that I detest."

Exceptionally considerate of all people, Bowden does not exclude sportswriters. It may be accurate to say that Bowden enjoys the "best press" of any sports figure in State of Florida history. Bowden makes a hard effort to give writers the time they feel they need.

"We are in the selling business," he said. "We need the press. I don't agree with everything writers write, but a guy walks in here and I nearly feel like I owe him a story. He does not owe me."

One of the best short descriptions of Bowden came from Dr. Coyle Moore, retired dean of FSU's School of Social Welfare.

"Bobby Bowden is a Southern Cracker, to the manner born," he said. "He is perfectly adapted to us Southern Crackers and rednecks in porthern Florida.



"He speaks our language, adheres to our religious faith, and fits our needs like a glove."

A lay preacher in the Baptist faith, Bowden speaks often of religious groups.

"When I was young, people used to tell me I ought to be a minister," he said. "But I never felt like I was called. It was more like I was called to coaching."

Bowden is most tolerant. "I really think God loves the

sinners as much as he does the upright," he said. "Ain't nobody perfect."

Bowden's worst vice is perhaps food.

"I love to eat," he said, laughing. "Gotta do something! I've got no prejudices about what I eat. I'll eat anything."

On a busy November day last season Bowden was having a late lunch in his office of fried squirrel and biscuits. An assistant coach had brought that from home hours before. Now the food was cold, but Bowden was obviously relishing that unusual late lunch.

Chocolate is the great temptation of his life.

"I keep waiting for the terrible moment they tell me if I don't quit eating chocolate I'm gonna die," said Bowden.

Bowden is said to complain that the only time he gets his favorite chocolate pie at home is on his birthday, and once—with characteristic humor—he pronounced himself henpecked.

"Yeah, sometimes, I'd have to say so—definitely," he said. "Now, she will let me make the big decisions, like whether to let China in the United Nations.

"Yeah, I will have to say Big Ann runs the show."

When it comes to football, Bowden insists he is a fundamentalist. "I believe in blocking and tackling," he said. "Everything else is irrelevant."

There is compassion in the discipline he metes out.

"I've always said if perfect hair and perfect manners won football

games, Army and Navy would be playing for the national championship every year," he said.

The last two years Florida State's schedule was rated the nation's toughest by the NCAA going into each of those seasons—based solely on the record of teams the Seminoles were playing.

But Bowden seems to have relished the opportunity to play teams like Notre Dame, Nebraska and Ohio State—even if games could be arranged only in their stadiums.

Whatever is out there, whatever develops, Bowden tries to minimize the worry factor in football. He says that he does not want his players worrying.

Rapport with those players seems to be one of the most significant keys for Bowden.

Few teams have received a bigger contribution from walk-on candidates than the Seminoles. Apparently, that's because in Bowden's system these non-scholarship players remain motivated to stay with the program.

Place-kicker Philip Hall is a prize example. Two seasons ago, with the junior varsity, he missed every field goal he attempted. Yet last season, still minus a scholarship, Hall was practically flawless on what he was asked to do.

Now 53, Bowden himself seems a happy and acutely motivated man

"The greatest, most satisfying time is to get all the children together with Ann and go to the beach for a week," said Bowden. "We've always managed to do that, but every year it becomes tougher and tougher."

There are six Bowden children.

"Sometimes when I'm sitting in the chair out on the beach with my feet in the water, I can't imagine anything better," said Bowden. But soon the zest for the quest returns.

"Some nights I go home, and I just can't wait for sleep to be over," said Bowden. "Just so I can go out and begin the next day."

Always there are bigger goals.

"I want to win every game and have the best football team in the United States," he said. "I want to have a perfect season. We came close a couple of times, but they were not perfect.


"If I ever accomplish that, I'll set something bigger and go after that."

Postcard Paths Cross For Harp, Widner

Up highway 27 North out of Tallahassee, and a few more miles West on State Road 84 out of Bainbridge, squats the small country town of Donalsonville, Ga., population 3,500. That's Donalsonville with no "d" in the middle, contrary to what your Florida State roster might indicate. Even misspelled, Terry Widner has done more to put this rural town on the map than a century of peanut and soybean farming could.

Widner's the one who emerged from the pack of his 26-man high school varsity football team, and was big enough and played well enough to earn a major college scholarship. He's been the only one from Donalsonville ever to do so, and for a community right off the drugstore postcard of Small Town, America,—the one with only four stoplights, one of those a caution—having a native son suited up in Saturday afternoon battle gear is a pretty big deal.

The town of Winter Garden, Fla., is offset about 13 miles West of Orlando. Locked in the heart of the citrus sunbelt, this is the place Herbert Harp has called home most all of his life. Right down the road is West Orange County High School where Harp was known as one of the best football players around. He was named to the Class 4A All-State team as a senior and then ushered off to Florida State with the unlimited promise of a college education and football career.

Widner and Harp are seniors today. They share the same right tackle position on the Florida State offensive line but their similarities are not limited to the football field. Both were born and raised in small rural towns on genuine, All-American ideals. Both have had to overcome personal hardships en route to the success they enjoy today and because of those hardships, have developed a more practical observation on the merits of football and how they intersect life.

It is not enough that Harp and Widner must battle the anonymity that accompanies their

offensive line position, but they must also rise above that fact that, individually, they are not full-time starters. Since the early part of last year's Gator Bowl season, the two have traded off the starting call every other week, while sharing playing time during the course of each game.

"I don't care a darn about starting," Widner says. "I'd just as soon let Herb start all of the games this year. All starting means is getting your name called over the loud speaker or if the game is televised, getting your picture on TV. That's all starting is. With the system we have, we just rotate and it works out beautifully. I love it."

From a coaching standpoint, Bobby Bowden sees this dual-role position as a resource from which to draw incentive.

"Nothing will motivate a player more than having somebody behind them that's good," Bowden explains. "We have that at this position."

"Sometimes I'm lazy at practice and I will see him doing good," Harp says. "Coach will get on me, tell me that Terry's gonna take the whole position. That will make me start doing better."

Harp will tell you the story of a star-crossed career—one which saw him falter, fall, then pick himself up again. Many times over the last four years Harp has had to reach deep inside himself for motivation.

He came to Tallahassee in 1979 and worked with the freshman team as a defensive tackle. A year later he came back overweight, had knee problems and was redshirted. But it was in the spring of his sophomore year when the real problems came to light.

Midway through spring drills he was declared academically ineligible. In accordance with NCAA regulations, Harp lost his scholarship and found himself out on the front curb with few alternatives. But rather than turn and run, he decided to take the hard road back to the top.

With the help of financial aid and some money from Mom back home, Herb enrolled in Tallahassee Community College. After a few months of looking, he finally found a job with Goodwill. He also volunteered his time with kids at the local YMCA.

It was life in the real world and at times the task seemed insurmountable.

"It was very hard," Harp remembers today.
"Lots of times I felt like giving up. But I was living here in Tallahassee and was going to all of the FSU games. Being in the stands watching the players really motivated me. It kept me going."


After a year at TCC, Harp earned his A.A. degree. Meanwhile, the football folks at Livingston College in Alabama were seeking Harp's services and offered him a scholarship. Just as Herb was on his way out the door, FSU came calling. Without hesitation he checked back into the Seminole camp and was again getting fitted in garnet and gold. In light of his adversity, Harp's return in the fall of 1982 surprised, but, at the same time, inspired many.

"When a boy leaves here academically and goes to another school, he pays his own way," says Bowden. "At that time, he either wakes up and comes back positive or never makes it back. Herb's one that did. He was determined and I think it shows what he's made of."

At the start of the 1982 season, Herb was listed at No. 3 on the depth chart behind Eric Ryan and Widner. A season-ending injury to Ryan in the opener moved Harp to No. 2 and by the third game of the year Widner and Harp had begun their rotating system.

"I worked hard to get back," says Harp, who in August became the only married Seminole when he said "I do" to the former Felecia Milton. "Now that I'm back I want to stay here."

The big social hangout in Donalsonville is the "dirthole," just ask anyone. Located (Continued on page 76)

and the family just started calling me that and the name stuck throughout grade school, high school and college. My teammates give me a rough time about it sometimes but it doesn't really bother me.




- Q: Did the fact that Florida State is located in your hometown of Tallahassee play a role in your decision to sign with the Seminoles?


- Q: Florida State has played a lot of good teams since you were a freshman. In your opinion, who are some of the better athletes FSU has faced?

Enforcement Has The Fan In Mind

Perhaps the most impressive example of coordination and skill will not come from the playing field tonight. Take a look at the stands across from your seat. The safety and well-being of all those people is the responsibility of the Florida State University Police.

That's right, while the first game for most Seminole fans consisted of worrying about whether or not the defense was strong against the pass and whether the offense could match last season's records, Lt. Ron Phillips and Lt. Ron Baxley of the FSU police were busy coordinating their efforts since early last summer. Coordination is the key, according to Phillips. "We use the Leon County sheriffs deputies, Tallahassee police, Florida Highway Patrol and Auxiliary, as well as our own police," he said.

Just as the Seminoles have gone through meetings to analyze their opponents, the police have held "chalk talks" of their own. Establishing a traffic plan, mapping out security stations and evaluating hypothetical situations are all part of the coordination that ease the rush of Seminole fans to Doak Campbell Stadium.

"The biggest problem we have right now is the traffic and parking," said Phillips. Like coaches all over the nation who point with pride to their "bread and butter" play on the chalkboard, Phillips has mapped out a scheme for traffic around the stadium. Imagine the problem of parking 25,000 cars within walking distance of the stadium. For those less familiar with FSU, be assured that there are precious few open areas on the campus. Adding to the numerical problem are certain vehicles (campers, emergency, V.I.P.'s, generous alumni, etc.) that must be allowed access to actual stadium parking. Parking becomes a matter of packing them as close as possible, wherever possible.

"I've been at this for 19 years and I feel I've got a pretty good hold on the problem, but, every year there are less and less parking spaces and more and more fans," said Phillips. "The intramural fields and band fields are being used this year to ease the problems. The one dollar fee we're asking fans to pay will go toward repairing any damage to the fields. It would sure make everyone's life a lot easier if people would plan to arrive a couple of hours before game time, and followed the special traffic signs," he added.

Long before the first players have arrived for the game, in fact early Friday afternoon, security begins at the stadium. From this time

until well after the game, Doak Campbell is under constant surveillance. Police check for everything from bombs to loose bleachers. The security of 55,000 people is not something left to chance.

"Our next big problem occurs with the entrance into the stadium, namely the smuggling in of alcohol," said Phillips. Alcohol is not allowed in Doak Campbell (neither are coolers) and the police do enforce the rule. The no-alcohol rule arose from fans' habits of discarding the empty bottles. Sometimes the glass is left for someone to step on and other times it has been used as a throwing device in a moment of rage.

As you settle into your seat in FSU's newly painted home, you may notice a policeman in your section. Again, he's there for your protection and the protection of those around you, FSU fan or not. Extreme measures are taken to safeguard the lives and property of the fans. In certain situations, an interesting paradox develops. Example: Last year's rivalry with Florida was stronger than ever. The police went through special measures to insure the safety of the visiting Gator loyal, however, it was these same "protected" fans that stormed the field and tore down the FSU goal posts. "We're (the police) not going to tolerate any fans on the field this year," said Phillips. "This goal post thing could have become a fad, but we're gonna stop that."

A "no umbrella" policy at Doak Campbell has been initiated this year after several years of urging by the police. "We've had a lot of accidental pokings and stabbings, plus those things make a nice weapon if tempers flare," said Phillips. "So, you see, the no umbrella policy was not enacted to bolster sagging FSU poncho sales, but was added with the fan in mind."

Although at times it may seem as though the FSU police are determined to interrupt the fun of the game, keep in mind that they merely have the safety of all in mind. Sacrifices must be made to protect the public from itself. Remember, no one enjoys seeing the Seminoles win more than the police. They're just trying to make sure everyone sees a lot more Florida State victories.

FSU's MAC(K) ATTACK— Hitting With His Best Shot

When Florida State linebacker Kim Mack does something, he does it one way: at full speed or "full steam ahead" as he would say. In a game, at practice, or in his mind, Mack gives the task at hand his total concentration. To him, it's not good enough to try hard; he has to know that he did his best—all the time.

That's why the Daytona Beach native admits that he is not a "game player", a player who doesn't perform well in practice but linebacker. After seeing him try the position, the coaches were happy to oblige.

"I had played defensive back in high school, but I was actually a roverback," explains Mack. "I got to do a lot of hitting. Up here it seems like all the secondary gets to do is run backwards 20 yards and then turn around and run 20 more yards down the field. Then if it's a running play they have to run 40 yards back. That's why I love it at

Another thing Mack gets teased about is last year's mysterious broken arm. It was mysterious because it appeared while he was asleep. One morning he woke up with a swollen arm. When the swelling persisted, X-rays were taken and a broken bone was found. Mack says his friends still enjoy telling people that he is the only person who could break an arm while sleeping. Mack does have some interesting bedtime

stories. He tells of the nights when he thinks the whole game through in his mind before it's played. He remembers assignments and even sees certain plays, all while he's sound asleep. Mack is certainly "into" the game.

More proof of this came earlier in the season when the Seminoles had an open Saturday between the Tulane and Auburn games. While other players were at the beach or at home, Mack went to the Florida A & M football game.

He loves football so much that many would think he'd consider coaching as a possible career. But Mack brushes that idea aside.

"I think that I would be too hard on my players as a coach," he says.

He did have a chance to test his coaching inclinations this winter when the Seminole coaches turned their whistles and coaching uniforms over to the seniors for a day.

"I think I was harder on our linebackers than the coaches are," says Mack of the experience. "I took it seriously, and boy I found out how hard it is to be a coach. It was kind of frustrating, but I had a lot of fun."

Besides rejecting the possibility of a coaching career, Mack hasn't thought too much about his senior year coming to an end. He says he'll definitely finish his degree in criminology no matter how long it takes. But other than that, he's not sure.

"I'm the type of person who just kind of goes with things as they come," he says. "I'll deal with the question when the time comes. If I start looking too far in the future, I'll lose my confidence. But if I get a chance to play pro ball, they better look out, 'cause I'll come

looks great in games. Mack sees every practice and every meeting as an opportunity to improve and to learn something new.

In practice, he is often the player who looks up and alive on the days that everyone else wants to go home. The 21-year-old, who will celebrate his birthday against Arizona State next Saturday, enjoys practice as much as he enjoys the game.

"I take practice almost like a game," says Mack. "Some days I'm not really 'up' when I get out there, but even if I'm not in the mood to practice, I pretend like I am. The other guys think I'm crazy but pretty soon I start feeling better about practicing and I think everyone else does too."

Although he has had to take some teasing from his teammates about his "get up and go" attitude, he maintains, "that's just the way I

Last year that way was good enough for the Seminoles. As a junior, Mack played the key role in FSU's flex defense. From his position as a third linebacker, he made 36 tackles and caused two fumbles.

That success came despite the fact that he had always played defensive back—a more likely position for the six-foot, 190 pounder. across the street from Seminole County High, it is actually the parking lot of a nowabandoned Tasty Freeze. There are no franchise businesses in Donalsonville. All they have is the Green Top Restaurant and it's locally owned. Terry Widner wouldn't have wanted it any other way.

"Donalsonville is a good country town with good country folks," he explains. "It's a small place where everyone knows what this or that person did the night before."

It is no surprise, then, that Widner was "scared to death" when he first came to Florida State. His career began with the freshman team in 1979. A year later it was a redshirt season while winning the "Offensive Scout Team Award." In 1981 he worked his way up to second team and was "just excited to be traveling."

In the spring of '82, it was clear that Widner would have to spend one more year as a backup. Ryan was a senior and had a lock on the starting right tackle position. Widner entered fall camp with the proper frame of mind when, in the middle of two-a-day workouts, word came down from Donalsonville that his father had passed away.

"His death set me back a bit," Widner says a year later, gazing far across a now empty practice field on a cool, late afternoon. "After going through all of the trauma, after the funeral services, I just couldn't believe he was gone. My mind wasn't on football, although I tried to get it on it. I'd be out here practicing on the line but my mind would be back in Georgia. Finally I just had to accept the fact that he was gone. But I know he's watching up there. I had to rededicate myself."

That rededication was tempered by a final wish of his Dad's.

'When Dad was on his death bed, he was dying of cancer, the last thing he said to me was, 'I want you to start, son. I want you to start.' That just tore me up. I said, 'Dad, I'm gonna do it."

Fate has a way of making believers of us all and for Terry Widner the opportunity to fulfill his Dad's final wish was only a couple of Saturdays away. It was in the '82 season opener, you'll remember, when Ryan was knocked out for the year. Widner finished the game, thus setting the stage for his first start the following week against Pitt.

It rained that night in Tallahassee, the night Terry Widner's name was announced as a starter on the loud speaker at Doak Campbell stadium. They may have been tears of joy from someone upstairs who, on that night, had as much a right as anyone to feel proud.

"I knew my Dad was watching that Pitt game." Widner says. "I knew he was up there. I hope it was as big a thrill for him as it was for me.'

Widner will graduate this December with a degree in criminology. But before it is time for a career in pro football or some type of ballistics investigation, there is some unfinished business back in Donalsonville.

"After the season, I'd like to go home and visit with Mom," Widner says. "I've been away for a while and I'd like to spend some time with her. Do some things she has wanted me to do for and with her for the last few years."

Harp is looking to graduate in the spring with a degree in Sociology. He likes kids and would enjoy becoming a coach. There probably are some useful stories he could relate.

"I'd let kids know that school is the most important thing, that school comes first and football second. You can't put your life in one area when there are lots of things out there you can go for."

Widner and Harp are content today. Enlightened, it seems, from their experiences over the last few years.

"Me and Herb talk about it in the locker room and it really doesn't matter who starts," Widner says. "We laugh about it because the main objective here is just to play. It's just a thrill to play for Florida State."

And in for the Touchdown is . . .

Florida State's wild 47-46 win over East Carolina in the season opener ranked as one of the wildest scoring games in the state's history. Where does that game stand on the all-time list for highest combined score? Surprisingly, it's not even listed. Oklahoma and Colorado hold the all-time record when OU beat the Buffalos by a 82-42 count on Oct. 4, 1980. Other scores include a 100-6 Houston win over Tulsa in 1968 and 103-0 win for Wyoming over Northern Colorado in 1949.



Greg Allen led the nation in scoring last year with 126 points (excluding two TD's in Gator Bowl). That total puts Greg into some pretty exclusive company as it was the 16th highest total in the history of college football. Lydell Mitchell of Penn State holds the all-time record with 174 points in 1971 (29 touchdowns). Other names ahead of Allen include Tony Dorsett (134 in 1976) and Hill Street Blues' Ed Marinaro of Cornell University (148 in 1971).

Football . . . Replaces Baseball

Florida State's defensive players might think it strange tonight if they start hearing signals like "let's give 'em a slider on the outside corner" from the linebacker who gives the defensive signals. But those are exactly the type of signals that FSU's Ken Roe expected to be calling in college.

As a standout baseball and football player at Pell City High School in Cropwell, Ala., Roe was recruited by quite a few small Alabama schools who wanted him for his baseball talents. Roe, a power-hitting catcher, had helped his 1978 youth league baseball team to a spot in the Youth League World Series. But when FSU coach Bobby Bowden came to Cropwell offering a football scholarship, Roe jumped at the chance to play college football.

"I could have played baseball at a small school," said Roe. "But I liked the idea of playing college football for a school like Florida State."

Still it wasn't easy for Roe to give up the sport he had played since he was six years old.

"I thought about my decision a lot," said Roe. "I still think about it sometimes. I don't watch baseball on television too much any more or else I'll start to miss it.

"But I can't really complain; football has been good to me."

And Roe has been good to the FSU football program. His 145 tackle total put him second on the team last year behind 1982 linebacking partner Tommy Young. For his play, Roe was named to the Associated Press' All-South Independent second team squad.

Of Roe's 243 tackles in the past two years there is one that stands out in his mind.

"One of my biggest memories so far is of last year's game against Miami," said Roe. "When Tommy Young and I made that tackle it was a big thrill."

In that game, a 24-7 FSU win over the Hurricanes, Roe made a season-high 24 tackles, including a goal line stop on fourth down with Miami at Florida State's one-yard line.

In 1982, Roe showed a particular talent for being right where the Seminoles needed him most. That's often the key for a defensive player and Roe was a "big play" man for FSU. Those big plays included two quarterback sacks, two fumble recoveries, two interceptions, three blocked kicks and two tackles for losses.

As a senior this year, Roe is once again being called on to make the big plays. Although he suffered a minor knee injury in the Tulane game, Roe has responded to expectations. Like any good player, Roe sees a lot of room for self-improvement.

"I have been a little disappointed in myself," said Roe. "I've been hustling, but I have a tendency to overrun the ball carrier and miss the tackle. I think about things like that a lot."

Thinking is one thing Roe does on the football field. His coaches have labeled him a "smart" player and Roe likes the tag.

"I think I have to be a smart player because I don't have the speed that some of our guys do," Roe said. "I have to make up for my lack of speed by using my head more."

Those qualities which make the three-year starter a smart player also led the coaches to choose Roe to give the defensive signals to his teammates on the field. Other Seminole linebackers had done the job in the past and Roe seemed the natural pick to FSU coaches.

When Roe first came to Florida State, the coaches didn't think he was a natural choice for anything. In fact, not many people thought he would be playing. In spring practice before the 1982 season, the coaches listed Roe last on the depth chart. By the start of his sophomore season Roe had worked his way up to first on the list and he's been there ever since.

He's not ready to give up his position yet. "I've had so many great experiences in my years here," said Roe. "At first it was hard to be away from home; I put a lot of miles on my car in my freshman year, but I love Tallahassee now."

Although he loves it in Tallahassee, Roe did enjoy being able to play in his home state of Alabama two weeks ago against Auburn.

The Auburn game was a big one for Roe, but he said the best thing about his years at FSU so far was last year's Gator Bowl. Not only did the Seminoles defeat West Virginia in that game, Roe said, "We had fun." That's something that there isn't time to do during the regular season away games when players

spend just about all of their time in their motel

But the Gator Bowl was different, and better, the senior linebacker asserted.

"It was great in Jacksonville," said Roe.
"We got to spend some time there and they
treated us very well. Everyone was so nice,
I wouldn't mind being able to do something
like that at the end of this season."

Neither would any Seminole fan. Roe believes that the 1983 Tribe can make it to a bowl.

"Our defense is coming around," said Roe.
"Once we do, I believe we'll have a good team because our offense is the best in the country. It's up to us and the special teams to help them out more. If we do, we could be somewhere in January."

As for after January, Roe is thinking about giving pro football a try, probably in the USFL. But he's not ready to take off the Garnet and Gold yet.

"It's strange to think about leaving," said Roe. "In some ways I'm ready to go but I'll miss it. Moving on and trying pro ball is another step, just like coming here was four years ago."

"Still, I'll always have my great memories of FSU."


Seminole fans can only hope that Roe adds a lot of 1983 memories to his collection before he goes.

Astronaut Norm Thagard, Florida Teacher of the Year Cynthia Gardner Taylor, and concertmaster Charles Rex are here with us today—watching the game from the President's box because they are among the most honored of the University's guests.

Early this morning, Omicron Delta Kappa honorary fraternity designated these three alumni "Grads Made Good". The annual ODK breakfast is always one of the highlights of Homecoming because ODK singles out Florida State graduates for outstanding achievements in their respective fields.

Thagard, a 1965 graduate of FSU, is a Marianna native who calls Jacksonville home. He was one of the five astronauts aboard the space shuttle Challenger which orbited earth in June. During the flight, he conducted various medical tests and collected data on physiological changes associated with astronaut adaption to space.

After completing bachelor's and master's degrees in engineering science at Florida State, Thagard served four and a half years as a Marine pilot. In 1977 he received a medical degree from the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School. Thagard lives in Houston, Tex., with his wife, the former Rex Kirby Johnson, also an FSU graduate. He is

scheduled to return to space in November 1984 as a mission specialist aboard Spacelab Three.

Taylor, the 1984 Florida Teacher of the Year, received a master's degree in speech pathology and audiology from the FSU College of Communication in 1976. She is a speech and language teacher at Tallahassee's Gretchen Everhart School for Exceptional Students, where she has been instrumental in forming the school's parent support group, the "Everhart Family Circle."

Commissioner of Education Ralph Turlington has nominated Taylor for America's Teacher of the Year competitions in the fall. She has been highly acclaimed by various state agencies and has received a number of additional awards, including the first Distinguished Achievement Award as an outstanding graduate of the College of Communication at FSU.

Since being named Florida Teacher of the Year, Taylor has spoken to numerous groups about public education and the teaching profession.

Rex, associate concertmaster of the New York Philharmonic since 1980, received bachelor's and master's degrees from Florida State in 1971 and 1972. While at the Univer-

sity he was on a full scholarship and studied with Richard Burgin, former concertmaster and associate conductor of the Boston Symphony.

Rex served as a member of the Philadelphia Orchestra for eight years. He has appeared as guest concertmaster with the Lancaster, Reading, Dallas and Delaware symphonies and he has performed as guest soloist with others. Most recently he premiered John Harbinson's violin concerto with the New York Philharmonic. His position as concertmaster of the the New York Philharmonic is matched in national prestige only by the corresponding chair in the Philadelphia, Boston and Chicago orchestras.

A native of Winter Park, Rex began violin at the age of four and debuted with the Florida Symphony in Orlando at 13. In April, Rex was awarded the Ernst Von Dohnanyi Faculty Citation for excellence in performance by the faculty of the FSU School of Music.

(Continued from page 7) It was 3-0 at the half. In the 3rd quarter, Al Ulmer intercepted a Volunteer pass. Prinzi hit Tony Romeo at the two yard line, and Bobby Renn took it in for six. John Sheppard kicked, and the score stood at 10-0. It would be final.

Tennessee crossed the 50 yard line only once, late in the 4th quarter. Prinzi intercepted a pass at the one, and ran it back to the forty to preserve the shut-out.

Afterwards, when the team plane returned to Tallahassee, over 3,000 fans jammed the old airport, where the Tallahassee Community College is today. Bill McGrotha recalls, "There has never been a Seminole homecoming like that one." Prinzi agrees: "It was the first time we'd ever had a welcoming crowd . . . The police nearly panicked . . . They'd never had to control that many people before."

At 6'1", 185 lbs., Prinzi was good size for a quarterback, and tryouts with the Giants and the Broncos followed. After military service, he returned to Florida State where he was Freshman Coach from '59 through '63, then became Offensive Coordinator for the University of Tampa until 1969. Today, he is vice-president in charge of the wholesale operation of Dulin Brokerage, a food brokerage firm in Tampa, and does radio broadcasts for the Tampa Bay Bandits as well as radio and television commentary for the Seminoles.

"I love FSU", he says. "Florida State is my life . . . Without it I'd be back in Waverly, New York working in a foundry. Florida State was my gateway to whatever success I have today ... It is the love of my life."

Prinzi downplays his long and close association with Burt Reynolds, but one measure of how strong the bond between them is can be glimpsed in a little joke Reynolds played on his friend. In the movie CANNONBALL RUN, actor Dom DeLouise plays Reynolds' sidekick. If you've seen the movie, note that the character played by DeLouise is named: Dr. Victor Prinzi.

One of the Bulldogs' greatest feats in 1950 was playing a strong game against Florida State, ranked among the top eleven (small colleges) in the country.

The Seminoles had to resort to

every possible resource to stop the marauding Bulldogs.

By the end of the first half, the opponents were leading by only 13-6. In the second half, FSU pushed hard to come forward to win 20-6.

Despite the defeat, this game will long be remembered by Howard fans as one of the best of the season.

Howard College's signal caller would become an All-American by his senior year, but on this day, not even the sidelines antics of his sweetheart, Howard cheerleader Ann Estock, could inspire sophomore quarterback Bobby Bowden to overcome

Bowden recalls: "FSU had this little defensive end who was in our backfield all day long ... We just couldn't keep him out of there ... I really believe he was one of the main reasons we weren't able to beat them."

His name was Jim Arnold.

tough Florida State.

And Florida State did have a great team in 1950. The Tally-Ho yearbook proudly trumpeted: "The biggest news of the football season is the undefeated and untied

In the spring of 1980, Bobby Bowden was in Lake City, celebrating the second undefeated season in Seminole history: the 1979. 11-0 team that featured Bowden as Head Coach instead of opposing quarterback. Arnold cherishes a photograph taken that night of he and Bowden together, arms clasped. Bowden signed it: "Jim, this is the way you held onto me 30 years ago!"

Arnold was a freshman on that 1950 team. "Four of us who had played together in high school came down from Bainbridge to try out", he remembered. "Coach Don Veller told me I was too small to play, but I stuck

it out . . . There were about 100 walk-ons and players, and they put us all in those Army barracks during the weeks of practice . . . It was real hot, and every night boys were dropping suitcases out the windows and stealing away to quit the team."

The week before the first game, Arnold was placed at defensive end. "In practice, they had this big fullback, Mike Sellers, who weighed about 195 lbs. . . . They ran him right at me four times ... I stopped him three."

Arnold showed more than that. The team travelled to Troy State for the opener ("Charlie Durbin drove the bus," recalls Jim. Today, Durbin is the Seminoles' cinematographer). When Don Veller read the list of starters, he called Arnold's name.

"I was scared ... I was just a little freshman, 150 lb. defensive end. I had to have heart and guts because I didn't have any size . . . I knew if they hit me they'd kill me, so I just had to out-quick 'em.'

That's exactly what he did. He blocked two punts against Troy, and the Seminoles won 26-7. He started every game, helping anchor a defense that for the entire season allowed just 54 points; by far the best record in Florida State history.

Of the game against Bobby Bowden and Howard College, he recalls: "I had a desire to get back there and get somebody . . . to hit somebody."

"Somebody" is now the winningest coach in Tribe history.


And Jim Arnold was a charter member of the Lake City Seminole Boosters, the very first Seminole Booster club to have a "Bobby Bowden Day" after he became Head Coach here in 1976.

Arnold coached at Lake City Columbia High School for four years, and holds a masters degree in Industrial Arts. Today, he is an Inspector for the Florida Division of Motor

"We had fun!", he says. "That's what it's all about to me . . . Even when we lose, it's the fun and the cheering and the

"I have confidence in Bobby Bowden", he adds. "He's the best there is."



Bucks For **Books**

"The library is like the flag, motherhood and apple pie," said Dr. Mary Pankowski when she made a guest appearance at a meeting of the Committee on Supplemental Library show. McCormick said:

And she was right . . . the University community has rallied round the library ever since President Bernard Sliger put out the call for additional support for Strozier to help make it—and subsequently the University—"great." Assistant Vice President for Academic Af-

fairs Pankowski, director of the Center for Professional Development, came to the meeting that mid-September day to issue a challenge to fellow faculty and staff to give a day's pay, via payroll deduction, to benefit Strozier.

She had conceived the idea less than 24 hours previously and brought with her a list of fourteen names of persons willing to join the fight to "make Strozier great." Before she left, she had ten more names—those of all the committee members present. A week later. with only person-to-person contacts, the honor roll of faculty and staff willing to pledge a day's pay to help a library hit hard by inflation and spiraling printing costs had grown to fifty and the grass-roots movement was well under way. Support is coming from many directions.

The athletic department gave the drive its biggest shot in the arm by pledging \$100,000 of the television receipts from the FSU-

Louisville football game. Seminole Tom McCormick spoke up for the library in a videotaped public service announcement which Coach Bobby Bowden used on his

"Athletics mean a lot to me and I'm proud to be a Seminole football player. But when I graduate from Florida State University, I hope I'll be ready to prove my abilities off the playing field also. A well-stocked library is the heart of a good education. Support Strozier Library. Your contributions can make a difference in education and research at Florida State.

Students are manning the containers at the stadium gates at all home football games, collecting "Bucks for Books." Led by Student Body President Tom Abrams, the students also have promised to donate \$500 from their Student Government allocation and to work with Wendy's on a coupon sale to benefit Strozier. Another group of students, members of Kappa Delta Pi education honorary, sent a check for \$250.

The United Faculty of Florida and the FSU Credit Union sweetened the pot with donations. Now, a formal request is going out from the FSU Foundation to friends and alumni with a special insert in the annual fund

Charles Miller, director of the library, even has had calls from University of Florida facul-



ty, wanting the details of the drive to help the library at Florida State-so they could

In August President Sliger started the ball rolling with a letter to the entire University community. In part he said:

"As we look toward the end of the 20th century and consider what basic elements of Florida State University we should emphasize in order to grow toward greatness. Strozier Library heads the list.

"I am writing to you in order to bring this to your attention and to encourage you to support this vital part of our institution. In fact, the library is the heart of a university, and especially in a graduate research institution like Florida State, emphasis must be placed on its completeness and quality."
