





A Top Twenty Showdown

Auburn head coach Pat Dye has an inkling that last week's domination of Ole Miss just might be the tonic his 1985 team

He'll get a chance for a further diagnosis this morning before a national television audience when fourth ranked Florida State invades Jordan-Hare Stadium.

For the Tigers (3-1), it's a chance to climb back into the top ten and the hunt for the national championship. Auburn sports a 12game home winning streak. The Tigers haven't been defeated at home since a 20-7 loss to Texas on September 17, 1983.

For the Seminoles (4-0), it's a chance to enhance their bowl possibilities and end an eight-game winless streak in Jordan-Hare Stadium. Florida State opened the '85 campaign with backto-back road wins over Tulane (38-12) and Nebraska (17-13) before posting home victories over Memphis State (19-10) and Kansas (24-20).

JACKSON, WASHINGTON KEY OFFENSE

After committing five turnovers in the Southeastern Conference opener at Tennessee, Auburn lost the ball only twice in its 41-0 win over Ole Miss. The Tigers played errorless ball in the first half and staked a 20-0 halftime lead.

Tiger Heisman Trophy candidate Bo Jackson (108 carries for 815 yards, eight TDs) has bounced back from an early-season knee injury. Jackson, who leads the nation in rushing with 203.7 yards per game, established a single-game record for rushing attempts with 38 against the Rebels while gaining more than 200 yards (240) for the fourth time in his career. The Bessemer, Ala., native also tied the Auburn record for career touchdowns (34) with two scores against Ole Miss.

Again assisting Jackson will be a trio of juniors—tailbacks Brent Fullwood (33 for 293, two TDs) and Curtis Stewart (27 for 153, one TD) and fullback Tommie Agee (27 for 143, three TDs).

In his first start of the '85 season, senior quarterback Pat Washington (10 of 22 for 156 yards, three intercepts, one TD) directed the Tiger offense to a single-game record 39 first downs and 606 total yards. Washington completed eight of 14 passes for 128 yards against Ole Miss. Backups Jeff Burger (16 of 29 for

226, one intercept, one TD) and Bobby Walden (11 of 28 for 134, five intercepts, two TDs) have starting experience.

For the second year in a row, split end Freddy Weygand (nine catches for 183 yards) paces the Tiger receivers, with help from flanker Trey Gainous (seven for 110), split end Scott Bolton (six for 80) and tight end Jeff Parks (four for 57, one TD).

Auburn ranks second in the country in rushing offense (387.2 yards per game) and total offense (516.2). The Tigers also stand among the nation's leaders in scoring offense (tied for 11th with 34.7 points per game).

Although the Tigers were not forced to punt last Saturday, senior Lewis Colbert continues to lead the nation in punting with a 48.2-yard average.

TIGER DEFENSE MATURING

Auburn's defense enjoyed its best statistical outing since 1958 against Ole Miss. The Tigers permitted only two first downs and

The Tigers are allowing 255.0 total yards (fifth in the NCAA), 90.5 rushing yards, 164.5 passing yards and 15.7 points per game. Top tacklers are tackle Gerald Williams (27 stops, six sacks), linebacker Ben McCurdy (21), end Pat Thomas (21, one sack), noseguard Harold Hallman (20, one sack) and tackle Tracy Rocker (20, two sacks).

The Auburn secondary—cornerbacks Kevin Porter and Jimmie Warren and safeties Arthur Johnson and Tom Powell-limited Ole Miss quarterback David McKinney to just two completions in 13 attempts.

SEMINOLE UPDATE

Florida State will benefit from having a week off to prepare for Auburn. Coach Bobby Bowden's prolific pro-set offense averages 384 total yards, 194 rushing, 190 passing and 24.5 points. A year ago, the Tigers gave up 591 total yards against the Seminoles, 115 more than it permitted any other team during the year.

The Seminoles are led by sophomore quarterback Danny McManus (34 of 60 for 431 yards, one intercept, three TDs) and senior tailback Tony Smith (50 carries for 253 yards). McManus threw for 191 yards in FSU's season-opening 38-12 win over Tu-

There's plenty of depth in the stable of Seminole receivers, thanks to the presence of wide outs Darrin Holloman (11 catches for 156 yards, three TDs), Hassan Jones (10 for 180) and Phillip Bryant (six for 145, three TDs) and tight end Pat Carter (eight for

Look for sophomore placekicker Derek Schmidt (seven of nine FG attempts) to play a key role in the contest. Schmidt booted two field goals against the Tigers last season and has connected on 24 of 33 attempts in his career.

SEMINOLE DEFENSIVE OUTLOOK

Florida State is allowing 315 total yards per game, 151 on the ground and 164 through the air. According to the latest NCAA statistics, the Seminoles stand 16th nationally in scoring defense (13.7 points per game).

Linebackers Paul McGowan (52 stops) and Fred Jones (25, two sacks) headline the FSU defensive alignment.

DYE ON THE TIGERS

The Tigers played well on both sides of the football against Ole Miss to earn their first SEC win of the season. "I hope the Ole Miss game left a message with our players," Dye notes. "If we execute like we're capable of playing, we can be a good football team. We controlled the clock for over 40 minutes and that will once again be a key this week. I was impressed with the way our players responded after an embarrassing loss to Tennessee.

"Pat Washington did an excellent job in his first start of the year. We've had confidence in Pat all along. It just took him awhile to overcome some nagging injuries. Pat performs extremely well in pressure situations.

Auburn yielded first downs on the first two plays from scrimmage last week before settling down. "The defense was ready to play," Dye says. "They caught a lot of heat after Tony Robinson put on a clinic in Knoxville. The pass rush was excellent and so


DYE ON THE SEMINOLES

The Tiger secondary figures to earn another stiff challenge. "Florida State has mastered the controlled passing game," Dye says. "Danny McManus is a poised quarterback who can hit the short and deep passes equally well. He has two all-star caliber receivers in Darrin Holloman and Hassan Jones.

What's been the key to FSU's success running the football? Look no further than its talented offensive line anchored by All-America guard Jamie Dukes. "Jamie Dukes may not have an equal in college football," Dye says. "Dukes is an excellent pulling guard who has great quickness for his size (6-0, 272 pounds). Florida State has two fine fullbacks—Cletis Jones and Chuck Wells—and a pair of exciting tailbacks—Tony and Sammie Smith.'

The Seminoles are known for their offensive firepower but they also can make a lot of noise on defense. "Florida State is a much improved defensive football team. Paul McGowan and Fred Jones are outstanding inside linebackers who really fill the holes well. The secondary is young but it's improving each week. Martin Mayhew is a first-class cornerback."

-Athletic Director/Head Football Coach

Pat Dye has established himself as a winner as an athletic administrator and a head football coach.

His Auburn teams have won 29 games over the last three years. During that three-year period, the Tigers own more victories than any other team in the Southeastern Conference. Dye's overall record at Auburn is 34-14 for a winning percentage of .708, the best record of any Auburn coach in his first four years.

Dye took over the Auburn coaching reins in 1981. With only 11 starters returning on his initial squad, the Tigers struggled through a 5-6 season that year. But the Tigers reversed their fortunes the next time out, and Dye began to make inroads in realizing his dream of making Auburn an annual football power.

In 1982, Dye guided the Tigers to a 9-3 record, including a victory over Boston College and Doug Flutie in the Tangerine Bowl. Auburn's holiday trip to Orlando marked the school's first bowl appearance in eight years.

The 1983 squad won Auburn's first SEC championship in 26 years and finished third in the nation—the Tigers' highest national ranking since winning the national title in 1957. Auburn won 11 games for the first time in its history.

The NCAA rated Auburn's 1983 schedule as the most difficult in the country. The Tigers faced nine bowl participants, including six opponents ranked in the top 10 the week of the Auburn game. Dye engineered wins over seven top 20 teams in 1983. He was named SEC and national Coach of the Year.

Last season, Auburn finished 14th in the final polls with a 9-4 record. The Tigers defeated Arkansas 21-15 in the Liberty Bowl to claim their third straight bowl title.

As the supervisor of 17 intercollegiate sports, Dye has helped Auburn to develop one of the most respected athletic programs in the country. Under his leadership in 1984-85, the men's and women's basketball programs gained national attention by advancing to the final 16 of the NCAA tournament. Seven Auburn teams were nationally ranked last year.

In 1983-84, Auburn enjoyed its finest overall sports year in history as it won the SEC all-sports championship for only the second time.

Dye has been a winner his entire career, from his days as an All-American under the legendary Wally Butts at Georgia, to his days under Paul "Bear" Bryant as an assistant coach, to his days at East Carolina, Wyoming and Auburn as a head coach.

The Blythe, Ga., native earned three letters as a defensive guard at Georgia and received all-conference and All-America recognition in 1959 and 1960. Dye also was honored for his academic achievement. He was a member of Georgia's SEC championship team as a junior.

After a brief career in the Canadian Football League and a tour of duty in the Army, Dye began his coaching career under "Bear" Bryant. During Dye's tenure at Alabama, the Crimson Tide won 80 games, four SEC titles and two national championships.

One of Dye's top attributes when he arrived at Auburn was his ability to take over a football program and quickly make it a winner. He compiled a 48-18-1 record in six seasons at East Carolina. In 1980, Dye led Wyoming to its first winning record in eight years and only its second in 12 seasons.

Dye became Auburn's 22nd head football coach in January of 1981. Four months later, he also assumed the role of athletic director.

He is married to his college sweetheart, the former Sue Ward of Augusta, Ga. They have four children—Pat, Jr., 23; Missy, 22; Brett, 19 and Wanda, 15.

Auburn University

Auburn University was founded in 1856 as East Alabama Male College, a private liberal arts college supported by the Methodist Church.

The college opened its doors on October 1, 1859 to 80 students. Auburn has come a long way since that simple beginning—but few of its priorities have changed. The Methodists' dream has become a reality. The quality education they envisioned remains the lifeblood of the University.

The college at Auburn has prospered and grown and now, as Auburn University, ranks as Alabama's largest institution of higher learning. More than 19,000 students are expected to enroll at Auburn this fall.

The college was renamed the Alabama Polytechnic Institute in 1899 and became Auburn University in 1960. Both changes came in recognition of the institution's expanding academic program. Auburn currently has twelve undergraduate colleges and schools offering degree options in 173 areas. The Graduate School administers programs in a total of 61 master's degree areas, 33 doctor of philosophy areas, seven education specialist areas and six doctor of education areas. Through its divisions of Instruction, Research, and Extension, Auburn daily touches the lives of every Alabamian and people throughout the nation and world.

Auburn's multi-million dollar plant on the main campus is composed of 62 main buildings located on 1,871 acres.

The City of Auburn, in Lee County, was incorporated in 1838. It is 50 miles east of Montgomery, 120 miles south-



east of Birmingham and 125 miles southwest of Atlanta, Ga.

A branch campus, Auburn University at Montgomery (AUM), has been in existence since 1967 and has more than 5,200 students enrolled this year. AUM is located on a 500 acre tract in eastern Montgomery.

DID YOU KNOW?

- ... An Auburn University student won first-place in competition among the nation's best aerospace engineering graduate students in 1982 and 1983.
- ... Over the past 15 years, Auburn University has consistently been one of the top schools in the Southeast placing students in medical and dental schools, based on percentage of applicants accepted.
- . . . Over the past 15 years, a former Auburn student has been the top scorer on the state of Alabama CPA examination ten times.
- In 1980, a recent Auburn graduate won first-place in national competition in architectural design sponsored by the American Institute of Architects.

- A team of Auburn students has placed first in the national soil judging competition three of the last six years.

TICKETS

Everyone, regardless of age, must have a ticket to enter the stadium. No pass out checks will be issued. The ticket-holder is restricted to the gate, section, row and seat indicated on his ticket.

All sales are final. Tickets cannot be refunded or replaced if lost, stolen or destroyed. The Auburn University Athletic Department reserves the right to revoke tickets by refund of purchase price.

The holder of tickets to Auburn University athletic events agrees to abide by stadium and university policies.

GATE PROCEDURES

All gates open one and one-half hours before kick-off. Ticket-holders should enter the gate indicated on their ticket. All food and drink containers including hard surfaced materials of any type may not be brought into Jordan-Hare Stadium.

Bottles, horns, cans, thermos bottles, ice bags, ice chests and any object related to the articles mentioned are prohibited. Gate personnel are instructed to enforce this rule in the interest of safety.

MEDICAL EMERGENCY

Should you need medical attention, notify the white-clad individual on the nearest concourse inside the stadium. Within three minutes, medical aid will be at your side. DO NOT LEAVE YOUR SEAT. Contact the nearest white-clad medical staff member. Remain in your seat. That is the quickest way to receive medical aid.

DOCTORS

Doctors on call should leave the location of their seat at the WILL CALL window, which is located on the West side of the stadium. A number will be assigned and you will be paged by that number throughout the season.

CROWD NOISE

Excessive and uncontrolled crowd noise can result in a five yard penalty against your team. Please observe quarterback and officials' signals for quiet.

GAME PROGRAMS

The official game program, Auburn Football Illustrated, is on sale outside the stadium for \$2.00.

ARTIFICIAL NOISEMAKERS

Horns and artificial noisemakers are not permitted in Jordan-Hare Stadium, according to an SEC rule. Stadium personnel have been instructed to pick them up at the gates.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES

State law prohibits the consumption of alcoholic beverages on the Auburn campus. Intoxicating beverages are prohibited at Jordan-Hare Stadium and on stadium grounds.

TELEPHONES

Public telephones are located beneath the North, South, East, West and Upper West Stands.

LOST AND FOUND

Report lost articles to the Auburn Campus Security Office on Monday following the game. All articles found in the stadium should be turned in to the first aid room.

RESTROOMS

Restrooms for men and women are located on the concourse level beneath the North, South, East, West and Upper West Stands.



Jordan-Hare Stadium

Auburn's Jordan-Hare Stadium represents a tribute to Auburn football's past and a vote of confidence in its future.

Named for Ralph "Shug" Jordan, Auburn's all-time winningest football coach, and Cliff Hare, a member of Auburn's first football team, the stadium was enlarged in 1980 to seat 72,169 fans.

There have been three major stadium additions since 1960.

Recently, another major expansion was approved that will add 10,000 additional seats to the stadium. An upper deck will be constructed on the east side of the stadium at an esti-

mated cost of \$15 million. The project, which will be completed by the 1987 football season, also includes the construction of 69 executive suites along the club level. In 1987, the capacity of Jordan-Hare Stadium will exceed 85.000, making it one of the nation's largest on-campus

With a capacity of 7,440, the Tigers opened Auburn Stadium by tying SEC foe Florida 7-7 in the home finale of the 1939 season. The facility consisted of what is now the bottom half of the west stands. It was renamed Cliff Hare Stadium in 1949 when 14,000 seats were added on the east sidelines.

As Auburn's national football reputation expanded

thanks to the coaching success of "Shug" Jordan in the early 1950s, the need for more seats became obvious. Another 14,000 seats were added in 1955 which brought the capacity of the stadium to 34,500. The south end zone stands were erected in 1960 and the stadium became a complete bowl 10 years later and the capacity grew to 61,261.

The structure was renamed Jordan-Hare Stadium in 1973 in recognition of Jordan's lasting contributions to Auburn football. It was the first stadium in the country to be named for an active coach.

Auburn's largest crowd ever to witness a game in Jordan-Hare Stadium was 75,942 in a 42-0 loss to Tennessee on September 27, 1980.

Since Pat Dye took over the Auburn football fortunes, over 1.6 million fans have come to Jordan-Hare Stadium to watch the Tigers. In 1984 Auburn established a Jordan-Hare Stadium record, averaging 75,037 fans per game. Dye's teams sport a 21-5 ledger at home.

Over the past 46 seasons, Auburn has compiled an impressive 135-33-5 (.795 winning percentage) mark in Jordan-Hare Stadium. The Tigers won 33 consecutive home games between 1952 and 1961.

Mom's Watching

GERALD ROBINSON

The reasons that people choose which college they want to attend are as varied and unique as the colleges and people themselves. Defensive end Gerald Robinson is no exception. Robinson's mother likes to watch him play football, and that is one of the main reasons why he has spent his last four years playing football at Auburn.

"When I was being recruited," Robinson says, "Auburn treated me better than any other school. I knew this was a place I would like to spend the next four years. But because my mom likes to watch me, I didn't want her to have to drive far to see me play. That's the main reason I stayed close to home."

Home for Robinson is Notasulga, Ala., 13 miles from Auburn down I-85. "I came from the smallest school possible," Robinson says. "We were class 1-A because we couldn't go any lower. There were only 20 people on our football team."

During high school Robinson used to watch Auburn play. He was mesmerized by the size of the players and always hoped that one day he would be playing in Jordan-Hare Stadium.

"They were so big and I was so small. Coach (Frank) Young (Auburn's administrative assistant) came to watch me my junior year. That summer I gained 30 pounds and Auburn signed me my senior year."

Coming from a small school to play football at Auburn did not worry Robinson. But coming from a small school to get a college degree at Auburn did worry him.


"I knew I could play football," Robinson says. "But because I came from a small school, I didn't think I had learned as much. Performing athletically didn't bother me as much as performing academically. In high school, I made C's without studying and here I had to study to make C's. But I got used to the program."

Robinson did adjust well at Auburn. In high school he played linebacker, tight end and was the team's placekicker. He was recruited as a linebacker and tight end but that's not exactly what he had in mind.

"During the first week, the coaches told us to go to the position we wanted to play. I went to the defensive end group even though I hadn't played that position since ninth grade. I was a little unsure at first but soon good things started to happen."

And good things are still happening to Robinson. In 1983, he was a second-team All-SEC selection and the leading tackler among the defensive ends. In 1984, he was a first-team All-SEC pick and again was the leading tackler among defensive ends. The Florida State game last year was one of Robinson's most memorable times on the field.

"The Florida State game last year was wild and exciting. Everybody was yelling for everybody else. I don't think I'll FOOTBALL ILLUSTRATED



ever forget the two sacks I made at the end of the game that helped us keep the win."

Robinson is a competitor and that is part of the reason that football is so alluring to him. "I love the excitement and the competition," Robinson says. "I like the fans and the glory after winning. I never thought I'd ever be signing autographs. But it's a lot of fun when the little kids run up to you after games wanting you to sign their programs."

As motivating as competition and glory are, there is one overwhelming and unselfish motive that keeps Robinson going day after day—his mother.

Robinson is the youngest of 12 children. One of his brothers was killed when Gerald was 12 years old, and his father died when he was 14. Throughout the rough times it was always his mother, Mrs. Annie Robinson, who kept the family together.

"We never really had a lot of things when I was a kid. I've always said that one day I wanted to be rich to pay her back for the hard times. I thought about going pro my sophomore year so I could take care of her. Whenever I get down, I think about my mom and everything she did for me."

Robinson is still thinking about pro ball, but in the process he'd like to earn his degree. "Football doesn't last forever," Robinson says. "But it's a start. I'd like to go back and coach at Notasulga someday. At Auburn they teach you that football isn't the only thing. They want you to receive an education and get your degree."

Robinson has come a long way since the day he first stepped out on the field at Jordan-Hare Stadium in front of 75,000 fans. "I had never felt that way before," Robinson says. "My mind just went blank when I went into the game. The coaches just told me to settle down and everything would be all right."

For years after that frightening, electrifying moment, Robinson is again a contender for All-SEC and All-America honors. He is a dominating player on the field and he has earned the respect of players and coaches all over the conference. Not bad for a guy who almost joined the army out of high school because he didn't think he could make it in the big time.

Florida State

FSU was established in 1857, when the governor of Florida, James E. Broome, signed a bill establishing the Seminary West of the Suwannee in Tallahassee. The school consisted of one building located on 10 acres of land.

By 1860, the school, not vet a college, had an enrollment of 250. The president of the seminary organized the school into a four-year liberal arts college in 1887.

At its first commencement in June 1891, degrees were conferred on two women and five men. Ten vears later. State College. In 1905, it became Florida Female College, and in 1909 the name was changed to Florida State College for Women. Dr. Edward Conradi was named president and held that post until 1941.

In 1945, FSCW took on the additional title, Tallahassee Branch of the University of Florida (TBUF) due to the fact that GIs stationed nearby were attending classes at the women's school, but, as men, they couldn't legally enroll.

Gov. Millard Caldwell signed a bill in 1947 making both the University of Florida and FSCW coeducational. FSCW became Florida State University.

As a university, Florida State has had six chief executives: Doak Campbell (1941-57), Robert M. Strozier (1957-60), Gordon W. Blackwell (1960-65), John Champion (1965-69), J. Stanley Marshall (1969-76) and Bernard F. Sliger, who has been president since 1976.







Bobby Bowden

Head Coach

If you would know Bobby Bowden, and where he's coming from, go back to his first press conference at Florida State after he was named head coach in January of 1976. "I am very pleased to be back in Florida, and to what I consider home," he had said. "I know a lot of you are skeptical, and that does not bother me."

Perhaps he has, at long last, made his point. This is Bowden's 20th year of head coaching, his 10th at Florida State. On that first day Bowden, with characteristic humor, talked of his identity with warm weather and the South. Once too often, he had slipped on the ice of West Virginia. "I got out of the car last night," he said. "I was standing there upright and my feet slipped out from under me on that ice. I fell on my elbow. And I hollered to my wife 'I'll take it.—I'll take it!"

So he took the Florida State job, and was back in his beloved homeland. "I had always thought," said the Alabama-reared Bowden, "that anything beyond Birmingham was north."

The greater drama of Bowden's success at Florida State is reflected in the fact he turned a team that had gone 4-29 the three previous years into one that was 44-14 over a following five that included two Orange Bowl trips.

Overall, after 19 years, Bowden shows 146 victories that rank him No. 6 nationally among all active coaches. The record of 146-62-2 breaks down to 73-30-2 over nine years at FSU, 42-26 over six at West Virginia, and 31-6 for four at alma-mater Samford.

The Florida State record includes astonishing accomplishments on the road—including 4-1 at Louisiana State, 2-0 at Arizona State, 2-0 at Ohio State, 1-0 at Notre Dame, and 1-1 at Nebraska.

Bowden's extraordinary popularity among Floridians reflects much more, however, than on-the-field accomplishments. He is both a man of humor, and a man of God.

In serious vein, Bowden speaks of life's priorities. "God, family, country and football," he said. "I think this country has been so blessed so much, we have so overlooked God. I think God is the reason we are a great nation, and that He is, unequivocally, the No. 1 thing in life. Now, I don't act like I feel a lot of times.

"Football figures in a way of life. It is a microcosm of life—full of battles, full of goals, full of laws, and full of penalties that if you don't abide by the laws you get into trouble. A lot of learning experiences and teaching experiences in football are so valuable. Football puts a lot of pressure on a



young man, and that makes him better able to compete in life. Football is not the only way—like some coaches think—but it is one of the ways, and very valuable to a young man."

Bowden's approach to football is most positive. That approach also applies to whatever else is out there. "Everything I do is optimistic," said Bowden. "I am just an optimistic person." One spring, when not many things were going well, Bowden maintained his upbeat outlook. "I've got to figure that something good will happen," he said. "I don't know how, but it will." And it did.
