# Teepee Talk

**A**ssorted thoughts and insights of the SID five games into the 1985 season:

**BYE BYE SI:** Florida State lost more than just a football game last Saturday on the plains of Auburn. For four weeks Sports Illustrated has been sitting on a lengthy feature article on FSU coach Bobby Bowden. SI's Rick Reilly and a bevy of photographers have been in and out of Tallahassee in the last month preparing a substantial personality piece on the coach. Since the article is not necessarily timely, magazine editors have been picking the right spot to run it.

I received a call on Friday afternoon prior to the Auburn game from college football editor Jeff Weig reporting that the story was set to run should the Seminoles win. Yet another photographer was flown in expressly to shoot the "sod" ceremony following the supposed victory. Needless to say, SI saved some money on film. No victory. No ceremony. No article. Not this week, at least.

Reilly checked in on Monday to say that the story was still a long way from dead, though. It could run later this year or even be saved until next year's pre-season issue. Stay tuned.

**FORESIGHT AWARD:** Cover photos for Tribe Magazine are selected weeks in advance. Printing deadlines require early selections. When my staff and I arrived at the choice for tonight's cover it seemed appropriate. Through four games, FSU hadn't allowed a second half touchdown and were among the national leaders in defense. Wouldn't you know Auburn

would put 59 points on the board the week before our tribute.

Anyone who saw the game, though, surely knows all of that scoring wasn't the result of poor defensive play. We'll stand by our choice and figure the defense will again rise to the occasion. Maybe it's an omen of things to come in tonight's game.

**AND IN THE BULLPEN:** It comes to mind that Florida State's quarterback situation more closely resembles a baseball pitching staff than anything else. There is the thought here, tongue-in-cheek of course, that the grounds crew construct a fenced-in bullpen for the relievers to warm up.

Let's put some reserve wideouts down there to serve as bullpen catchers and quarterback (pitching) coach Mark Richt could look on, arms crossed, as Bowden orders some warm-up action. Only one problem. The Seminoles don't have the good lefthanded stopper.

**SPEAKING OF BASEBALL:** Dick Howser, Kansas City Royal manager, walked into a room full of media representatives after his team had lost a crucial game to California during the final week of the pennant race. First words out of his mouth—"You guys will probably pick Auburn to beat Florida State next week."

They did and Auburn did, but Howser was a little too busy to watch the FSU-Auburn contest. His team was involved in the American League Championship Series.

**IT WAS ILLEGAL IN MY BOOK:** Remember in the Auburn game when the Tigers were faced with a fourth down and very short yardage. Appar-

ently deciding to go for it, they lined up on the ball and suddenly quarterback Pat Washington shifted into the backfield, drawing the Seminole defenders offside. The five-yard penalty gave Auburn a crucial first down.

Well, it is absolutely legal for the quarterback to shift, but he must follow some guidelines. You may have seen the Dallas Cowboys shift from a regular formation into a shotgun. Here's what the rulebook says:

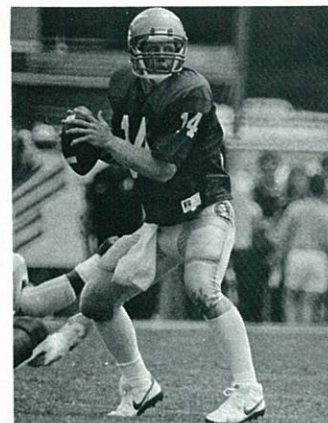
"It is not intended that (the shift) rule should prohibit smooth, rhythmic shifts if properly executed. A smooth, cadenced shift or unhurried motion is not an infraction. However, it is the responsibility of the offensive player who moves prior to the snap to do so *in a manner that in no way simulates the beginning of a play.*"

Is there any doubt that Washington's motion simulated the beginning of a play? I don't think so.

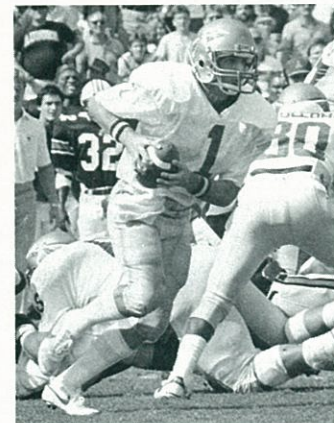
Florida State defensive coordinator Mickey Andrews took it all in stride though, saying it may have been illegal, "but we teach our players to move on the snap of the ball. It just shows we were undisciplined."

**THE MAN TOUCHED HISTORY:** One of the guests at dinner one night at Auburn was Bob Barrett, Director of Enforcement for the Southeastern Conference. After several hours of football talk, Auburn SID David Housel mentioned that we were in the presence of a man who had "touched history." It seems that Barrett, working with the FBI in Dallas on Nov. 22, 1963, took a hand gun away from a maniacal Lee Harvey Oswald and

**The starter (#14) has been knocked out: now FSU must turn to its Bullpen.**



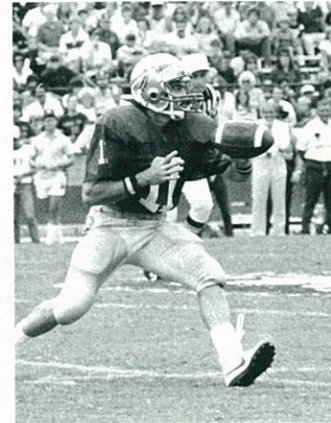

assisted in the arrest of the man who had an hour earlier assassinated President John F. Kennedy.

"We were after him because he had killed a police officer," Barrett said. "We had no idea we had the man who had assassinated the President until we got him down to the police station. It was the shortest All Points Bulletin in history. We were walking Oswald into the station when the APB went out."

Reflecting back on the next two days in Dallas, Barrett looked at my

Auburn counterpart and me and said; "you guys think you've got headaches running your pressbox for football games? Imagine us having media from all over the world there and no place to put them. No one had any experience at handling an assassination. The last one was McKinley and we weren't around then."

**OF ALL THE PLACES:** Florida State coach Bobby Bowden has established college football's top reputation for winning big games on the road. Probably no one in the game can

claim the remarkable road success that Bowden has achieved. It is ironic that the one he would like to have more than any other is in his home state of Alabama. Victory there has eluded him once again.

Despite being 19-7 on the road against Nebraska, Notre Dame, Ohio State, LSU, Syracuse, Boston College, Arizona State, South Carolina, Florida and Miami, Bowden is 0-3 at Auburn. The next four FSU road games are quite challenging: North Carolina,



DEE-FENSE!

**D**uring the Orange Bowl years 1979 and 1980, the Florida State defense was the toast of all Seminole fans. It was ranked in the top 10 nationally and was considered the strong point of the team.

But things changed beginning with the 1981 season and although Florida State remained relatively successful, the defense often received the majority of the criticism following an FSU loss.

Over the past four years, the Seminoles have given up an average of over 20 points a game. In this interview with the Tribe Magazine's Dan Pearson, three key members of the FSU defense talk about the defense, its problems over the past couple of years and its hopes for this season and the future.

GERALD NICHOLS, DT

**TRIBE:** You've been a regular in the defensive line for the past three years. During that time the defense has been criticized frequently by the fans, despite FSU's overall success. Has the criticism been justified?

**NICHOLS:** It was said this summer that the only way FSU ever wins is when it outscores the other team. To play defense and hear that hurts you, but when you look at the record you can understand the fans' frustration. I think we are headed in the right direction now and hopefully we

can give them something to cheer about. **TRIBE:** What about your early years at FSU? Was there a little more talent on those teams defensively than people are willing to admit?

**NICHOLS:** I think the talent was there. I really think team unity was the missing link. **TRIBE:** When the team's defense was nationally ranked for two years, it seemed invincible. One year later, it was giving up 50 points in a single game. Why the sudden turnaround?

**NICHOLS:** I think the main thing was graduation. Most of the guys after that last Orange Bowl graduated. There was no carry over of leadership.

**TRIBE:** Let's move to last season. FSU won its first four games in 1984 and totally dominated an explosive Miami team. Did you think that the defense had finally arrived?

**NICHOLS:** I personally thought that after that Miami game we had finally come together. I didn't think a team would be able to pound us offensively. But we started to make mental mistakes and weren't getting ready to play every week. Overconfidence might have been a problem. We just seemed to have a big let down after that Miami game—something I hope we can avoid this year.

**TRIBE:** Did the upperclassmen meet between this year and last to discuss the situation on defense? Did you guys set any goals for this season?

**NICHOLS:** During the spring, some of the older guys got together. Stanley Scott, Darryl Gray, Todd Stroud, Isaac Williams and myself. We talked about the situation

and met with the younger guys. The tone of the meeting was that we were sick about how our defense has been viewed and wanted to change it. I think getting some pride into the unit was our biggest goal.

**TRIBE:** After the Nebraska game, offensive guard Jamie Dukes walked into the locker room and started chanting 'defense, defense.' Did that fire you guys up?

**NICHOLS:** It takes a whole ball club to win and the offense was just as responsible for that win, but I'll tell you what—that sound felt great. To have someone from the offense shout that felt good and I think it helped fire up the whole unit.

**TRIBE:** If you were to grade the defense in 1985, what would the report card say? Room for improvement?

**NICHOLS:** I give us a C+ so far. We have played a lot better than last year but there is a lot more room for improvement. We're still making mistakes and Coach Andrews and Coach Amato have been patient with us but have made it clear that we have room for improvement.

**TRIBE:** What does this year's defense need to do to avoid a letdown like last year?

**NICHOLS:** The main thing is to stick together. We're all in this together, and I think we need to realize that to win. No part of this team is bigger than the whole, and we need to have 11 people go to the ball.

DEION SANDERS, CB

**TRIBE:** You were a standout at both defensive back and wide receiver. What position did you want to play in college?

**SANDERS:** I really wanted to play wide

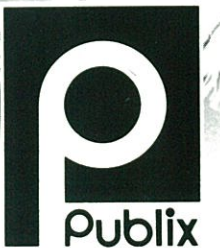

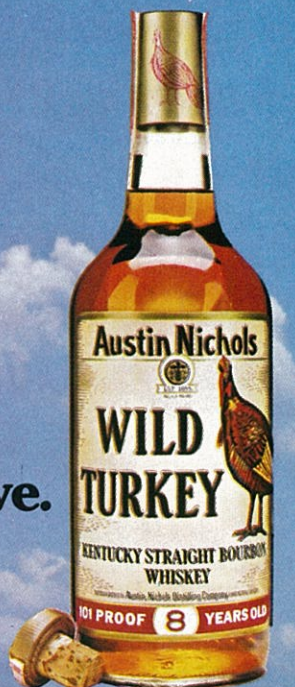

# Florida State Leaders



## Dr. Bernard Sliger *University President*

Dr. Bernard F. Sliger, Florida State University's 10th president, is an avid sports fan who believes that a top quality athletic program enhances—rather than hurts—a university's academic program.

Sliger is the first Florida State president to earmark substantial funds from bowl games and TV appearances for academic pursuits. In 1983, he was named by the American Council on Education to a committee of 26 college and university presidents to seek solutions to abuses in intercollegiate athletics.

Since assuming the FSU presidency on Feb. 7, 1977, Sliger has become increasingly visible on the national level. In February 1984, he was appointed to the executive committee of the Uni-

versities Research Association, which is comprised of 80 major research universities in the United States.

The American College Testing Program elected Sliger vice chairman of the Board of Trustees in December 1983. He has been on the 15-member board since 1981. He is also a member of the prestigious Federal Reserve Board of Atlanta.

The native of Trout Creek, Mich., holds three degrees—the B.A. ('49), M.A. ('50) and Ph.D. ('55)—from Michigan State University, all in economics. He has taught at Florida State, Michigan State, Louisiana State and at Southern University.

Sliger joined Florida State University's administration on May 15, 1972, as executive vice president. He assumed the additional duties of chief academic officer and further served as director of the University's London Student Center during the fall quarter, 1975.

Formerly executive director of the Louisiana Coordinating Council for Higher Education, Sliger's background as an educator includes 19 years as a faculty member and administrator at Louisiana State University.

Dr. and Mrs. Sliger (Greta) have four children.



## C.W. "Hootie" Ingram

*Athletic Director*

Cecil Ingram, known to his friends and associates as simply "Hootie," has headed Florida State's athletic department for the past five years. He came to FSU in January of 1981 after eight years with the Southeastern Conference.

Upon arriving in Tallahassee, Ingram initiated a \$10 mil-

lion dollar building program for athletic facilities. Moore Athletic Center, which houses administrative, coaching and ticket personnel and serves as home for the Seminole football team, was planned, built and completed under Ingram's leadership.

Seminole Baseball Stadium was also completed while Doak

Campbell Stadium, the Bim Stults Aquatic Center and Mike Long Track were all renovated.

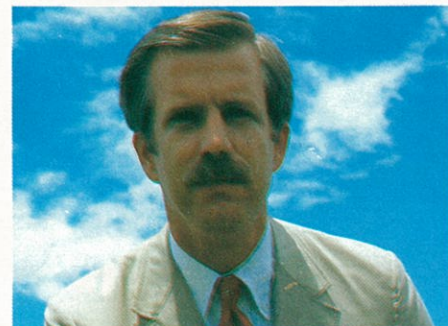
A native of Tuscaloosa, Ala., Ingram played football for the hometown Crimson Tide from 1951 to 1954. He was named all-SEC as a sophomore when he led the nation in pass interceptions. He was a member of both the 1953 Orange and 1954 Cotton bowl squads, and also lettered for the Alabama baseball team as an infielder.

After graduation and an Army stint, Ingram began his coaching career in 1956 as an assistant football coach at Bradenton (Fla.) Manatee High School. The next year, he became head coach at Tuscaloosa Brookwood High School for three years.

Ingram moved into the college coaching arena in 1960 as an assistant at Wake Forest. He also made coaching stops at Virginia TGeorgia and Arkansas before accepting the head coach's job at Clemson in 1970. Three years after taking the position, Ingram joined the SEC as assistant commissioner.

During his eight-year tenure with the conference, his duties included supervision of football and basketball officials, rules interpretations and eligibility. After five years as assistant commissioner, he was named associate commissioner in 1978.

Ingram and his wife, Toni, have a son and two daughters.



## Charles Ehrhardt

*Faculty Athletic  
Committee Chairman*

A professor of Law at Florida State University since 1967, Charles W. Ehrhardt is beginning his second year as Chairman of the FSU Athletic Committee.

Ehrhardt served on the committee from 1969-71, and was reappointed to the board in 1983. He succeeded Dr. James Jones as chairman in 1984, and became Florida State's representative to the NCAA with the appointment.

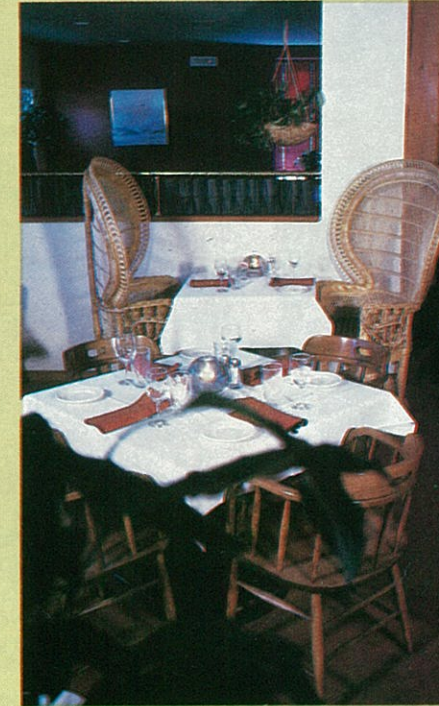
A native of Elkader, Iowa, Ehrhardt received a bachelor's degree from Iowa State University in 1962. Two years later he earned his law degree from the University of Iowa and went on to become an Assistant United States Attorney in that state before coming to Tallahassee.

A widely-respected expert in the field of Evidence, Ehrhardt holds the Florida State position as the Ladd Professor of Evidence. He wrote the Florida Evidence Code, passed by the state legislature in 1976, which deals with the admissibility of evidence in court trials. Ehrhardt is also the author of a book on evidence, first published in 1977 and scheduled for a second edition soon.

In the spring of 1984, he was voted President of the Metro Conference, a position which makes him chief representative of the league in dealings with the NCAA.

Ehrhardt and his wife, Judy, have three children.

# BOBBY 10th BOWDEN'S ANNIVERSARY

If you would know Bobby Bowden, and where he's coming from, go back to his first press conference at Florida State after he was named head coach that January of 1976. "I am very pleased to be back in Florida, and to what I consider home," he had said. "I know a lot of you are skeptical, and that does not bother me."

Perhaps he has, at long last, made his point. This is Bowden's 20th year of head-coaching, his 10th at Florida State. On that first day Bowden, with characteristic humor, talked of his identity with warm weather and the South. Once too often, he had slipped on the ice of West Virginia. "I got out of the car last night," he said. "I was standing there upright, and my feet slipped out from under me on that ice. I fell on my elbow. And I hollered to my wife 'I'll take it—I'll take it!'"

So he took the Florida State job, and was back in his beloved homeland. "I had always thought," said the Alabama-reared Bowden, "that anything beyond Birmingham was North."

Other Bowden observations that first time around:

**On discipline:** "I definitely believe in it. But if you hold a bird in your hand too tight, you squeeze it to death. And if you hold it too lightly, it gets away."

**On offensive philosophy:** "Take what they give you. I want the capability to run or pass equally. But don't misquote me—I did not say 50 percent. I said the capability to do it equally."

**On a common cause:** "Those folks down yonder—down in Gainesville. I know a lot of you look at me and ask if I'm a bigtime coach. I don't know what a bigtime coach is. But I know if I beat Florida, I'll

be a bigtime coach."

**On how it will be when he does not beat Florida:** "They're gonna get on me, and they're gonna get on me bad. If they didn't get on me, there would be something wrong." The greater drama of Bowden's success at Florida



State is reflected in the fact he turned a team that had gone 4-29 the three previous years into one that was 44-14 over a following five that included two Orange Bowl trips.

Overall, after 19 years, Bowden shows 146 victories that rank him No. 6 nationally among all active coaches. The record of 146-62-2 breaks down to 73-30-2 over nine years at FSU, 42-26 over six at West Virginia, and 31-6 for four at alma-mater Samford.

Bowden's extraordinary popularity among Floridians reflects much more, however, than on-the-field accomplishments. He is both a man of humor, and a man of God.

In a serious vein, Bowden speaks of life's priorities. "God, family, country and football," he said. "I think this country has been so blessed so much, we have so over-looked God. I think God is the reason we are a great nation, and that He is, unequivocally, the No. 1 thing in life. Now, I don't act like I feel a lot of times.

"Football figures in a way of life. It is a microcosm of life—full of battles, full of goals, full of laws, and full of penalties that if you don't abide by the laws you get into trouble. A lot of learning experiences and teaching experiences in football are so valuable. Football puts a lot of pressure on a young man, and that makes him better able to compete in life. Football is not the only way—like some coaches think—but is one of the ways, and very valuable to a young man."

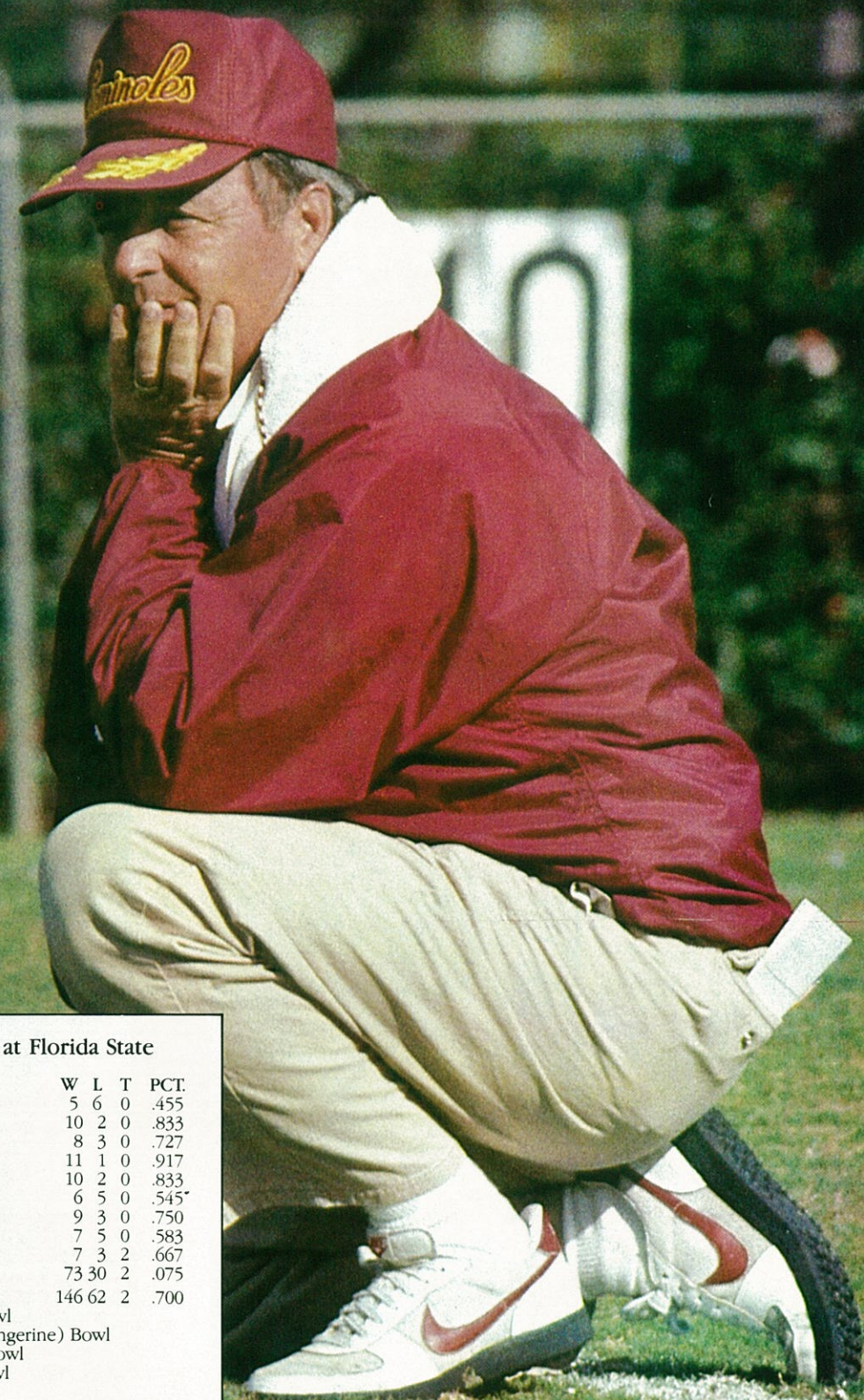
Bowden's approach to football is most positive. That approach also applies to whatever else is out there. "Everything I do is optimistic," said Bowden. "I am just an optimistic person." One spring, when not many things were going well, Bowden maintained his upbeat outlook. "I've got to figure that something good will happen," he said. "I don't know how, but it will." And it did.

Bowden is intensely competitive. Oddly, the point may be best illustrated when he speaks of his feeling about golf. "I'd play 36 holes every day if I had the time," he once said. "I really would. It gives me that chance to compete—and I love to compete. I don't have to have an opponent. I can compete by myself—for a low score—and have a great time. I even love to practice golf. Sometimes I feel like if I don't play, I'm gonna explode. Sometimes I get it up to here with the ringing telephones—all the details. It builds up like steam. Gotta come out. Golf is my way of letting it out. When I go after something, I go after it hard. It has always been that way. I don't know—it's in my blood."

Then the time comes to go after football hard. Along about August 1, Bowden puts his clubs aside, and they remain stored beyond season's end, through recruiting. "Football consumes me," says Bowden.

Now 55, Bowden's enthusiasm seems much the same as always. Once he spoke, most memorably, of how things were with him, his family and his job at Florida State. Bowden and his wife, Ann, have six children. Now there are a constantly increasing number of grandchildren. "The greatest, most satisfying time is to get all the children together with Ann and go to the beach for a week," said Bowden. "We've always managed to do that every year. Sometimes when I'm sitting in my chair out on the beach with my feet in the water, I just can't imagine how things could get any better."

He thought about it all. "I'll tell you the truth," he said. "Some nights I go home and I just can't wait for sleep to be over, just so I can go out and begin the next day."

**Greatest Win**—Nebraska, 1980, 18-14. "It will always be my favorite of favorites because it was in Lincoln and they were ranked #2 in the country," Bowden says. If he were to pick a second, it would be the Florida game in 1977 (37-9). "It was my first win over Florida," he says. "We needed it for state parity."

**Most Unbelievable Play**—Nebraska, 1980, Paul Piurowski hits Nebraska QB inside FSU 5-yard line with time expiring. Garry Futch recovers the fumble. Cincinnati, 1978, Fourth and 22 at FSU's own 46 yard line and 1:29 left to play. QB Jimmy Jordan connects with Sam Platt on a 54-yard touchdown play.

**Best Catch**—"Definitely Mike Shumann's catch vs. Florida in 1977," says Bowden. "He jumped up between two defenders and snatched it away."

**Most Exciting Come-From-Behind Win**—Southern Miss., 1976, 30-27. Down 27-10 with less than 12 minutes to play, the Seminoles and Rudy Thomas went on a 20-point scoring spree in the next seven minutes.

**Player Who Had the Most Impact on A Game**—Joe Wessel, Arizona State, 1985. "His two blocked punts totally changed the game around," says Bowden. Blair Williams, West Virginia, Gator Bowl, 1982. Says Bowden, "We started Blair because he could throw in the rain. He outdueled (Jeff) Hostetler. He was the center of our offense that night!"

# ISAAC WILLIAMS WANTS MORE RESPECT

"Florida State never beats anyone—they just outscore them." The words of the preseason publication jumped off the page at FSU defensive tackle Isaac Williams. He had seen enough and knew that he wanted to do something about it.

Williams, a three year starter, at defensive tackle was upset. "I'm a fan like everyone else," Williams says. "In August I got a hold of one of those magazines and it said we couldn't play defense. It said that the only way we could win a game is if we scored 40 points and held on. Personally, I was sick of it. I wanted to have a good year and I wanted the defense to have a good year. I was hoping things would turn around so next year they would say FSU beat teams, not just outscored them."

Although injured in the second half of the Nebraska game, Williams has been a key part in the improvement of Florida State's defense in 1984 and the first half of 1985.

After giving up over 250 points per season since 1980, the Seminoles

gave up 237 in 1984 and allowed only 55 through four games this year—roughly a 40 percent drop. Although Auburn scored 59 points in the fifth game the FSU offense was directly responsible for 28 of those points.

"I don't think our defense was nearly as bad as people think," Williams says. "When you run a wide open, high risk offense, you are going to turn the ball over. Between big plays and turnovers our defense had our backs to the wall a lot. But I'm not making any excuses. The bottom line is that we gave up a lot of points and lost some games we probably should have won."

As a senior, Williams feels good about this year's defense. "Maybe it's the experience and maybe it's because we simplified things, but I like our team this year. Everyone on the defense feels we have something to prove and everyone is hustling."

Although Florida State has improved defensively, injuries have slowed Williams from having the type of season that he expects of himself.

Williams injured an ankle and hand in the Nebraska game. He missed most of the Memphis State game and was visibly hobbled in the Kansas game. Through three-and-a-half games of actually playing, Williams has recorded 17 tackles with two for losses and one pass broken up.

If Florida State's defense is to turn around the fortunes of the past few years, a healthy Isaac Williams will be a key part. "No question about it," defensive line and assistant head coach Chuck Amato says. "When he's been healthy this season Isaac has played well and done everything we've needed. He's been a very good player for us. We need to get him back to 100 percent if we're going to continue winning."

The fact that Williams has emerged into an important part of Florida State's defense or the fact that he's even playing football at all is an interesting story.

As a youngster growing up in Midway, a small community located

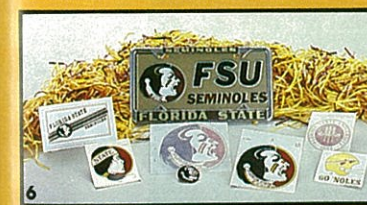
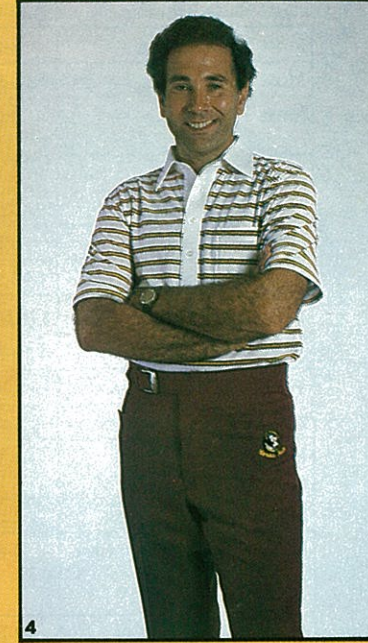
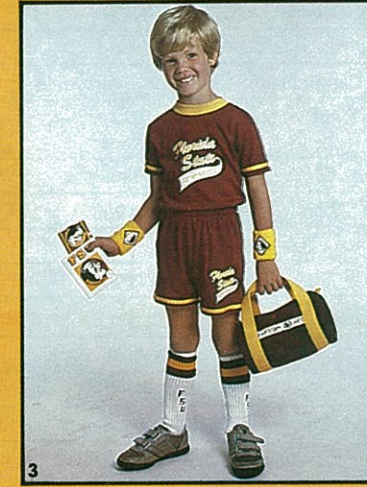

## RENEGADE AND CHIEF OSCEOLA College Football's Greatest Opening Show!

It is 6:40 on a warm Saturday evening in Tallahassee and Doak Campbell Stadium is filling with potentially the largest crowd in history. From underneath the bleachers behind the north end zone, a large Appaloosa horse emerges. The horse has several attendants grasping its reins. And there is Greg Ereckson, the newest of the Osceola bloodline. For three hours tonight, Ereckson is a Seminole Indian.

The horse, whose stage name is Renegade, is fidgety as he paces in the end zone, occasionally shaking his head from side to side. At 6:45, Ereckson mounts his horse and receives scattered cheers from the bleacher fans. He is wearing what looks like a brownish costume with a floral print, brown corduroy pants and a red headband. The original costume was actually designed by the Seminole Indians specifically for Florida State to insure its authenticity. His face is covered with a grease-based makeup that gives it an Indian-reddish tint. Garnet and gold stripes have been drawn along his cheeks. Aluminum coins hang around his neck.

At 6:55, Florida State game captains exit from under the bleachers and head to midfield for the coin toss amid war hoops from the Seminole fans. At the same time, a 10-foot wood and leather spear with feathers imported from Texas is being drenched with kerosene. The Florida State Marching Chiefs begin a tom-tom beat on their drums. Renegade still fidgets. Meanwhile the Florida State football team has appeared at the entrance to the field. Head coach Bobby Bowden is at the head of the pack.

The horse's owner, Bill Durham, applies a lighter to the kerosene-soaked paper on the spear and it erupts into a flame.

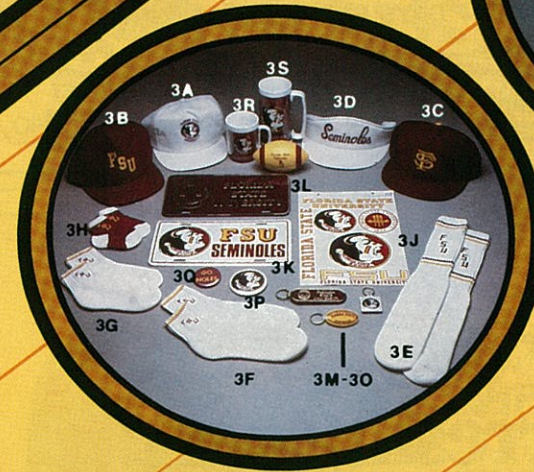
The electricity in the air increases. The tom-toms continue. A rumble of cheering begins in the north bleachers and a signal is given for Ereckson, astride Renegade, to lead the team onto the field.



Ereckson rides with the spear firmly clenched, and as the noise from the 60,000 fans descends and focuses on the 50-yard line, Ereckson pauses a moment, then digs his heels into Renegade's side. The horse responds by rearing on his hind legs. Then Williams firmly plants the flaming weapon in the middle of the Campbell Stadium turf. The air is filled with the gentle climb of thousands of garnet and gold balloons. The crowd is in a frenzy. Seminole football is about to begin.

## FSU Surrogate Parents Help Foster Home Atmosphere

There's no doubt about it, one of the biggest changes in a young man's life occurs when he packs up and goes off to college to play football miles from home, family, friends and familiar surroundings. The transition from high school to college, both academically and athletically, is made more difficult when compounded with the loneliness experienced from being ensconced in a totally new world. Names and places are strange, the college curriculum is more demanding, the level of competition on the gridiron is much higher than could be imagined and there's little free time in which to relax. But the feeling of being without family and close friends to confide in is what sometimes translates into a case of college freshman homesickness.

Fortunately, for the young FSU football player from out of town there is an excellent program to provide him with a foster family in Tallahassee who will take a personal interest in him. The player/parent program was established in 1980 by the women of the Extra Point Club and is designed to offer young athletes from out of town a "home away from home." The player/parent is there to offer encouragement and support and provides the young Seminole with a home off campus in which to relax in a family atmosphere when the pressures of school and football begin to gain on him.

Friendships with these Tallahassee families are developed not only with the players but with the players' families back home. It is comforting for the parents of the football players to know their son has someone who cares and can keep them apprized of his progress. Because the foster parent generally has the player all four years of his stay at FSU, many lasting friendships have been formed. The friendships continue far beyond the school years. Many player/parents have attended their foster sons' weddings and have even been included in the christenings of the children as well as other special family events years after graduation.

If there is any question as to the value of the program to the Florida State football players all you have to do is talk to them about it.

Fred Jones, inside linebacker for the Seminoles, came here in 1983 from Miami after graduating from South Miami High School. His freshman year nearly ended prematurely when tragically, three members of his family died and he seriously considered dropping out of school, giving up his scholarship and returning home to help his family. He credits his foster family with convincing him to continue his college education. In his words "they played a big role by encouraging me not to quit and to stay with it. They made me feel at home, like part of their family." The Seminoles are happy that his foster parents helped persuade him to stay in school since he was the second leading tackler on the team in 1984 and is currently an important cog on the 1985 team.

Another testimonial was offered by offensive tackle, Pablo Lopez, a sophomore from Miami. "Me and my foster parents have a very close relationship, closer than most players," he says. "I had a lot of problems in my freshman year, it was such a big change for me, they really helped me out and they really settled me down. They were a factor in me staying in school. They call my Mom and let her know how I'm doing in school. My freshman year was tough on me, I'm glad they were there for me."

Freshman quarterback Chip Ferguson was recruited out of Spartanburg, South Carolina. He said he found the adjustment from high school to college a tough one. "Moving out on your own and getting away from your parents is hard at first. Everything is strange and there isn't any time to do anything," says Ferguson. "The foster parent program helps when you have free time because you have somewhere to go. We practice football two times a day. You can get sick of that and sick of being around campus so you go to your foster parents' home and it's just like being at home. They treat you nice in a real home atmosphere where you can relax and watch television. My foster parents talk to my parents in South Carolina a lot too, which is nice."

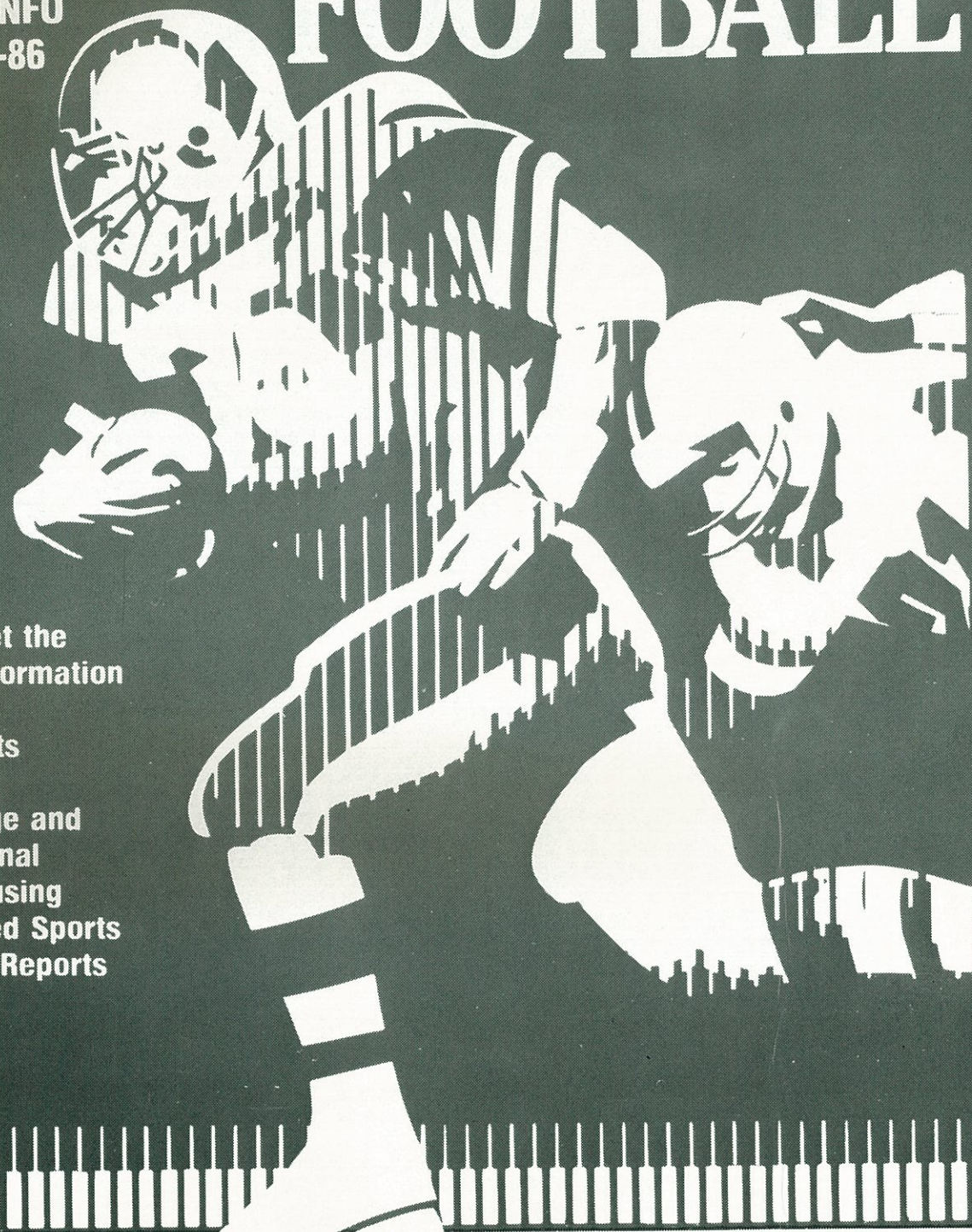
During holidays and semester breaks many players cannot afford to travel home and Coble Terrace, the players residence, can be a lonely place when most everyone else has gone home to their families. It's these times when it's especially comforting to have someone near who cares about them.

While the football players derive benefit from the program, the player/parents claim it's they who gain the most from the relationships in that

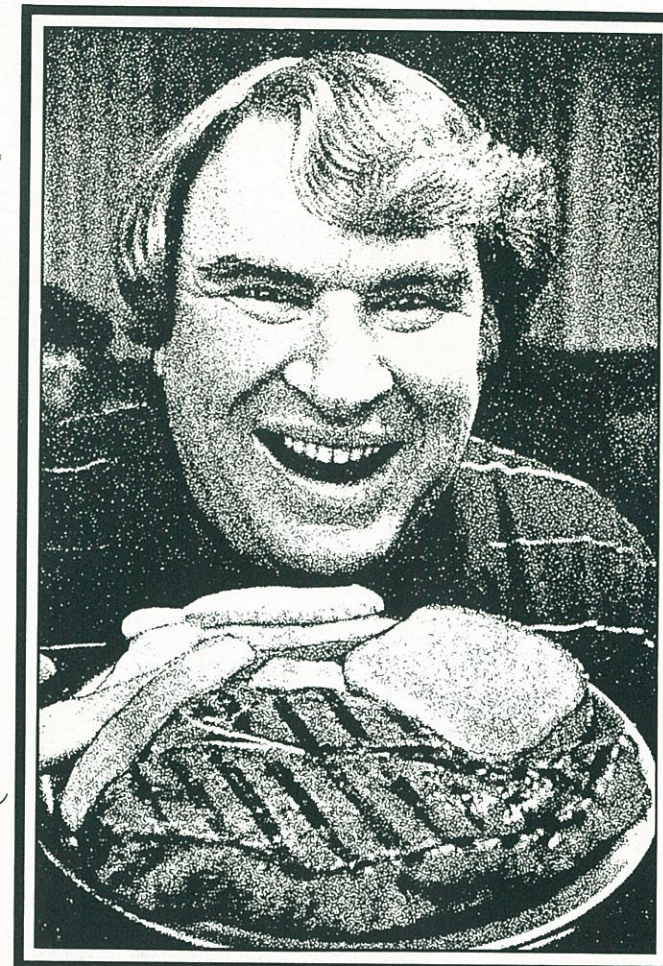

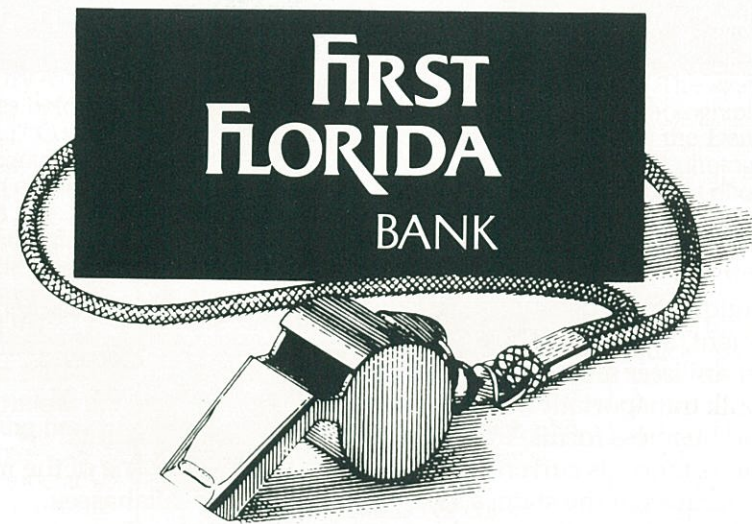


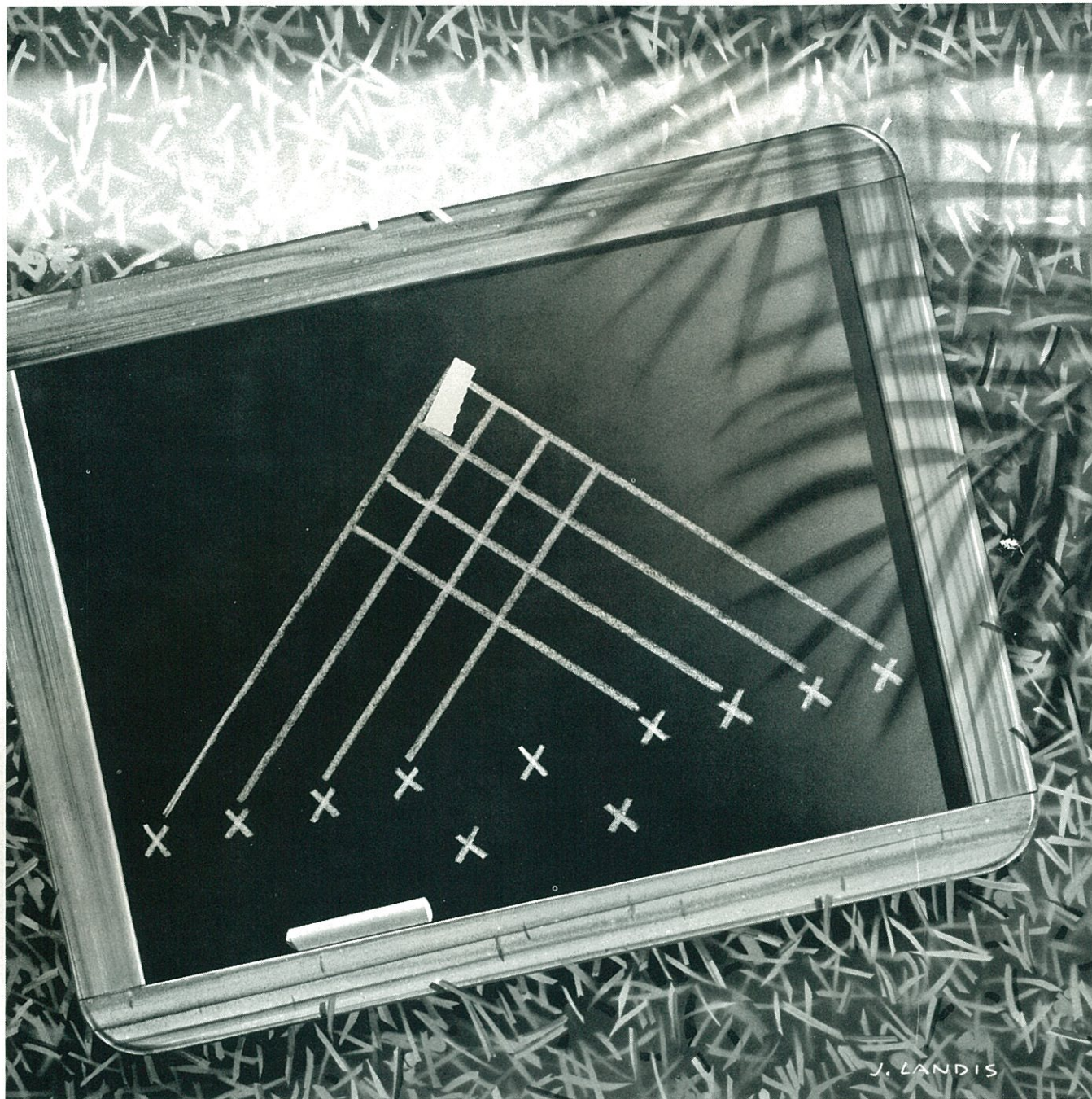

# Photographers' Battle Plans Include Sound Strategy

Many have compared the sidelines at Doak Campbell Stadium during a football game to that of a war zone. The shooting that takes place on the sidelines, however doesn't injure anyone.

Photographers who work for the Associated Press and newspapers like the Tallahassee Democrat overcome strict security, poor lighting, thunderstorms, and overcrowded sidelines to photograph that one prized photograph that will jump off the page at the reader. "We're looking for one picture" says Phil Coale, a Democrat staff photographer who helps decide which photographs will be used.

To get that coveted photograph, the Democrat sends four to five photographers to each home game. They will arrive about an hour before the 7:00 p.m. kickoff to pick up the necessary sideline credentials. Only accredited photographers and freelance photographers working for the sports information office are granted credentials for admittance to the field.

The photographer is faced with hundreds of players, coaches, managers, cheerleaders, security personnel and other photographers on the sidelines. George Kochaniec, chief photographer of the Democrat, said that the security will not allow photographers past the restraining line which is painted on the field, five yards from the out-of-bounds line. "We don't have much room to shoot," he said.

Equipped with lens varying in size from 180mm to 600mm, the photographers will be stationed at various spots around the field. "We try to meet on the field 15 minutes before kickoff to form a gameplan..." Coale says. "If we have four photographers, two will shoot on one side (of the field) and two will shoot on the other side. On one side (of the field) one photographer follows the action in front of the line of scrimmage, and one (photographer) follows the action behind the line of scrimmage."

The group of Democrat photographers will shoot two rolls of 30 exposure color film during the first quarter. One of the staff photographers will rush to the Democrat office to develop the color film at the conclusion of the quarter. "The color slides must be in the sports editor's hands by 9:00 p.m.," says Kochaniec.

"From the time he walks into the Democrat, to the time the slide is lying on the table for editing, the photographer has 30 minutes."

While one photographer develops the rolls of color film, the other three remain on the sidelines shooting only black and white photographs. The black and white has to be ready by 9:30 p.m.," Coale says. "I will leave with the bulk of black and white at the half." Coale said that the Democrat leaves two photographers to shoot the second half as a "precautionary measure." Because many of them will not meet the 9:30 deadline, the black and white photographs shot in the second half will be used in future issues or in Saturday's football supplement.

Once that first half film is processed in the darkroom, rapid decisions must be made as to which photographs will be used in Sunday's sports section.

"Out of the six rolls (of color), we'll have six to seven photographs technically correct," Coale says. "He (the sports editor) and I will pick

from these." Coale said he looks for a sharp photograph in perfect focus with complete color saturation, and one which has a meaning behind the picture. He says, "the best photograph we used this year was the Danny McManus shot at the Memphis State game when he got knocked out."

The strategy of the Associated Press photographers closely resembles that of the Democrat's. Mark Foley, staff A.P. photographer says, "I'll shoot the color (photographs). The other three photographers will shoot black and white." Foley also leaves following the first quarter to meet the color deadline. "The name of the game is to get the photographs ready as quickly as you can," says Foley. "If you don't have the color moving by 9:00 p.m. you can pretty much forget it."

A.P. photographs are circulated nationwide to subscribing newspapers and to papers around the state who elect not to cover the game with

## From the Tulsa Sidelines

**O**n March 25, 1985, 18 days following the departure of former head coach and athletic director John Cooper, who left to become the head coach at Arizona State University, the Don Morton Era began. The Don Morton Era has brought a new approach to Golden Hurricane football in the way of "TULSA'S TEAM" as Morton likes to refer to his Hurricane football program.

The TU football program has enjoyed tremendous success over recent years, as the Golden Hurricane has seven consecutive winning seasons since the 1978 campaign. Don Morton is no stranger to success. His accomplishments are many and his formula for success is "methodical day-to-day hard work."

Morton, who came to TU after compiling a 57-15-0 record and one Division II National Championship at North Dakota State University, brings the Golden Hurricane into tonight's game with a 2-4 record. Tulsa opened the season with a 31-24 win against the defending Southwest Conference co-champs Houston Cougars before dropping four straight games. TU regrouped last week for a last second 37-35 victory against Long Beach State University.

TU's losses have come to three SWC schools, Texas Tech (21-17) in Tulsa, Arkansas (24-0) in Little Rock and Texas A&M (45-10) in College Station. If facing four SWC teams on consecutive weekends wasn't enough, the Hurricane traveled the Cimarron turnpike to face cross-state rival Oklahoma State of the Big Eight only to come up on the losing end.

The Hurricane comes into Doak Campbell Stadium with an array of talent as well as a good mixture of experience and youth. Offensively, the Hurricane runs out of the split-back veer formation. As Morton said prior to the 1985 campaign, "I am thoroughly convinced that the best way for the University of Tulsa to move the football is with the option game." Tulsa has shown the ability to move the football on many occasions, as witnessed by last week's 526 total yardage performance. However, the offense has had difficulty at times in putting the ball in the end zone. The offense is led by junior quarterback Steve Gage, who has amassed 1,033 yards in total offense, including 414 rushing and 619 passing. Gage, the

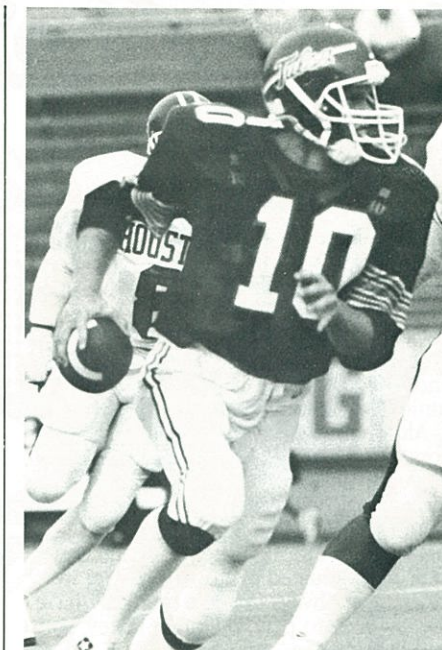
1983 Missouri Valley Conference Newcomer of the Year, has completed 53.8 percent of his passes, while he has rushed for nine of TU's 11 touchdowns via the ground.

Lending help to Tulsa's ground attack is senior fullback Gordon Brown, who is currently eighth on the school's all-time rushing chart with 1,534 career yards. He has carried for 539 yards this season for a 7.1 average and has three 100-yard rushing games to give him nine for his two-year career. Fellow senior Rodney Young has added 237 yards for a 4.6 average per carry. The effectiveness of the TU running attack is reliant on the offensive line, which is manned by junior Stan Fields of center, sophomore Steve Hegdale and junior David Alexander at the guard spots, and seniors Chad Muirhead and Tony Leapheart at the tackle positions.

Although TU concentrates on the running attack, one can hardly think of the Hurricane as a one-dimensional offense. Gage's primary receiving targets are sophomore Ronnie Kelley, who has caught 20 passes for 193 yards, and junior Eric Brown with eight receptions for 196 yards. Tight ends Kevin Andrews and Donnie Dee figure into the passing scheme, as they have combined for 13 receptions for 235 yards.

The Hurricane defense, once depleted by a rash of injuries as TU had five starters on the sidelines during the first three games, is now led by a bevy of players. The defensive line is led by senior threesome; Joe Dixon, who has 42 tackles including three for minus yardage, Bobby Daniels, who leads the "D" in sacks with four for minus 40 yards and has 30 tackles, and Kevin Lilly, who returned to the lineup two weeks ago after suffering a shoulder separation. He responded with eight tackles, including two for negative yardage and one sack against Oklahoma State.

The linebacking corps has been the hardest hit by injury as inside starters Xavier Warren and Tony Buford are lost for the season with broken arms and key backup Jimmy Summers is out after undergoing knee surgery. The young and inexperienced group is now led by junior Steve Kropp, who has 37 tackles and sophomores Mike Keil and David Haynes, a converted fullback, with 30 and 28 stops,

respectively. Senior outside linebacker Mike Williams is the team leader in tackles with 59, including 5 for minus 14 yards and four sacks for minus 36 yards. On the other side, sophomore John Brown, who has 39 tackles is the starter.

The youthful Hurricane secondary is led by sophomore Doug Desherow, second on the team with 51 tackles, juniors Tim Gordon, Charles Wright, the team leader with three interceptions, and Jesse Morrow, who sat out the first four games with a knee injury.

Placekicker Jason Staurovsky, a senior, is approaching the all-time TU scoring record as he needs 26 points to be the top point-getter. He has connected on 12 of 12 PAT's and eight of nine field goals for 36 points this year. Last week against Long Beach State, he connected on a season-long 45-yarder with no time remaining to raise the Hurricane to victory.

"No one ever said it would be easy," commented Morton. "But good things will happen, I don't know when, but good things will happen, just keep after it and believe it and good things will happen." As the atmosphere changes, the Golden Hurricane will travel the road to higher horizons causing opponents to raise the Hurricane Warning Flags.

# Former FSU Heroes

## The Past and Present

It never bothered Ken Burnett that he didn't receive the attention that the other Florida State running backs got in the early eighties.

"I was never really noticeable. I added a part to the offense that helped make it work," he says.

Recruited out of Brandon as an all-state quarterback in 1979, Burnett switched to fullback his freshman year when the coaches suggested the change. That decision was an easy one when he looked over the Florida State roster of quarterbacks that included Jimmy Jordan, Wally Woodham, Rick Stockstill, Blair Williams and Kelly Lowrey. "I had a quicker opportunity to play running back," he said.

Although he was faced with fierce competition for playing time, Burnett had a special motivation to sign with the Seminoles. His brother Brian, a linebacker from Brandon High School who had signed with Florida State, died one day after he graduated from high school in 1973. "I've always felt that he didn't have the chance (to play at Florida State), and I had that chance," he says.

During his four year playing career, Burnett made the most of that opportunity. He averaged over four yards a carry and was a versatile fullback. Nick Kish, vice president in charge of player personnel for the Jacksonville Bulls and Burnett's running back coach at Florida State,



told the Tallahassee Democrat in a 1982 article: "As a blocker Ken is between a nine and a ten. As a receiver, he is probably about an eight for a back—very good hands."

Starting at fullback as a senior, Burnett was most noted for paving the way for freshman Greg Allen's rushing records. "I don't think there's any question (he helped Allen)," says Kish. "I think he helped all the backs. He would always take time to help. He was such a good example."

Burnett was also a model student, graduating in the prescribed four years in 1983 with a 2.8 grade point average in his major of criminology.

Burnett first took a job with the State of Florida as a fraud investigator but six

months later, accepted a position with a Tampa insurance firm. He moved on to a post with All-State Insurance in Jacksonville two years ago and settles customer claims for the company.

Football is never far away, however. He works during the USFL season for the Jacksonville Bulls in the Gator Bowl press box, handling the statistical services at all home games.

Burnett's current project is the completion of a three bedroom, two bath home in south Jacksonville. He is subcontracting the work himself and calls the venture "a hobby or sideline." "It's always been one of my dreams to build my own house," he says.

Burnett is building the home for his family. He and his wife Cheri are expecting their first child in February. Cheri also graduated from Florida State where she was a batgirl and sports information intern.

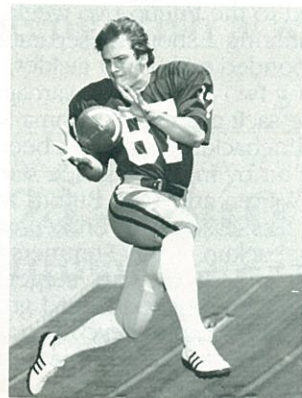
Although his importance to the Seminole offense was overlooked by many, head coach Bobby Bowden never underestimated the significance of Burnett in the starting lineup. Bowden told the Tallahassee Democrat in 1982, "what he is for us is a 100% football player in every way. He's been a winner every time he has been out there. He does it with great execution rather than super talent. I think if every kid puts into it what he puts into it, we would never lose."

Did you ever have one of those days when nothing went right? Phil Williams had five bad days when he tried out for the Florida State football team as a walk-on in 1977. "I was intimidated by the fact that I was not on scholarship. I was coming in as a nobody," Williams says. "For the first time in my entire life, I went out there and dropped about half the balls they had thrown to me at practice. I was so nervous I couldn't catch anything." Williams called Coach Bowden to inform him that he planned to leave school.

After following through with his plans and enrolling at Georgia Southern, Williams had second thoughts about his decision and contacted Bowden following the 1977 football season. He still remembers asking Bowden if he could rejoin the team. "I wrote Coach Bowden a letter that said, 'Coach, I made a mistake, please take me back,'" says Williams. "It was miraculous. I mailed a letter from Statesboro, Georgia, and three days later, I received a letter back from Coach Bowden welcoming me back for the winter quarter. That made me feel good."

After he returned to the team for the 1978 season, Williams faced a long road towards making the team. "There were like 30 receivers in the spring, and he had

me dead last (on the depth chart)," he says. "By the 15th period (a time period in practice), I was second and I was never less than that. I was able to step in and give a little consistency." Williams' rise to the top was even more noteworthy when one looks at the roster of Seminole receivers at the time that included Jessie Hester, Dennis McKinnon, Weegie Thompson, Hardis Johnson, Sam Platt and Kurt Unglaub. The Warner Robins, Ga. native became a frequent starter during his sophomore year and finished his career with 56 receptions. He made several catches in key games for Florida State



that enabled the Seminoles to receive successive Orange Bowl berths.

A two time academic All-American, Williams carried a 3.9 grade point average in his major of finance and accounting.

Earning his degree in 1981, Williams began to lay the groundwork for his current profession by passing the Certified Public Accountants exam, and securing licenses in securities, insurance and real estate.

With the help of an investor, he began the First American Sports Group. "I formed a company a couple of months back to handle financial affairs and represent ballplayers," he says. "I had a lot of guys come back to me in the past wanting advice on financial things, and I saw a lot of things I didn't agree with." Since the formation of the Tallahassee company six months ago, Williams has traveled the Southeast forming future connections on the professional and collegiate level. "I want to establish the pipeline throughout the Southeast," he said. "We're getting good responses, but it's a very competitive business."

Facing competition is not new for Williams. Whether on the field at Florida State or in the business world, overcoming the competition is something Williams has become accustomed to.

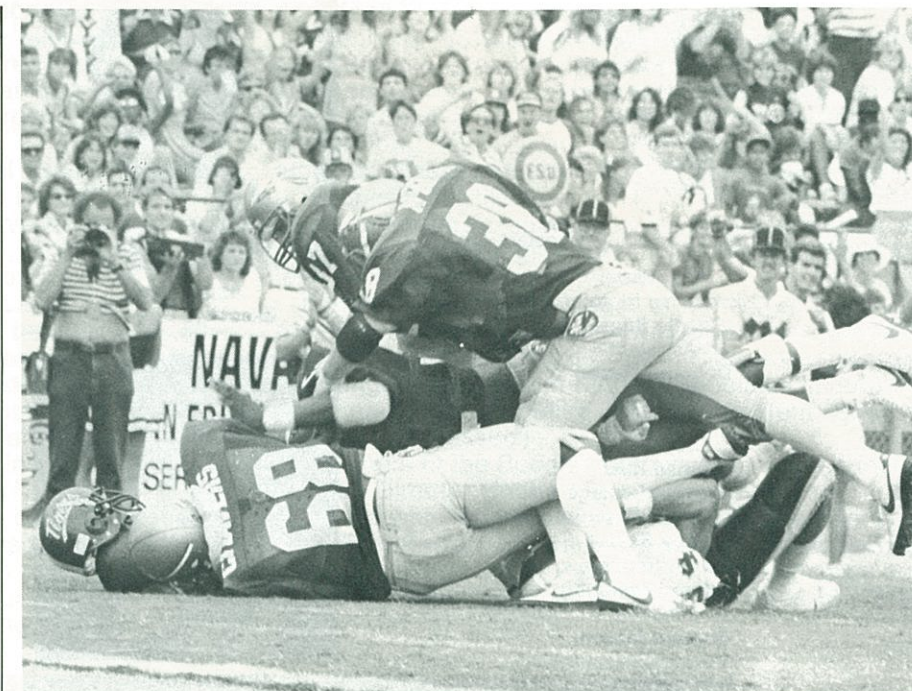

**Lenny Chavers: He's a team man all the way!**

One of Head Coach Bobby Bowden's main philosophies centers around the old "all for one, one for all" adage. A living example of this team spirit ideology is the 6-0 senior noseguard Lenny Chavers.

Growing up in Osteen, Florida in a family of six children, Chavers learned to be a team player early. "My family has always been athletically oriented and because I played a lot of high school sports, I learned the importance of making a team effort," he says. With two brothers ahead of him playing football at Florida A&M, it only seemed natural for Chavers to carry on the family tradition in Tallahassee. He chose FSU, though, because he, "wanted to go to a major school. I knew the area well

and have family here that I can go to when I get down."

Although one could never tell when Lenny is 'down,' one of the qualities that stands out in Chavers is his constant grin and jovial attitude which he obviously carries into the weight room, practice field and games. Strength coach Dave Van Halanger, who has worked Chavers from benching 405 two years ago to being the strongest player on the team presently (benching 460), says Chavers has "always been a good

weight room leader." Also, Van Halanger says that Lenny "took his back-up role and has turned it into something positive, that's a real credit to him."

Chavers has been rotating the noseguard position with senior Todd Stroud all season. Says defensive line coach Chuck Amato, "Todd can't take 70 snaps a game and he (Chavers) has done a good job working the rotating concept." Some players might see this as a lack of confidence, but Chavers feels its best because it "keeps us both fresh." When it comes down to that crucial fourth quarter, a team needs a defense that's quick and not exhausted.

Sharing credit with other players is not new to Lenny Chavers. Last season he was always in the limelight, but behind specialty teams sensation Joe Wessel. Originally, the coaches and fans were looking to Wessel for the big punt blocking plays; however, Chavers says, "I kind of sneaked up on them." By the end of the season it was plain to see Bowden's philosophy shining through Chavers. Three of his four punt blocks were picked up by Wessel and run in for touchdowns. In the Arizona State game, Chavers blocked a critical punt that turned the tide for a down 17-0 Seminoles. After the important play, Wes-

sel was receiving all the congratulations while Chavers was getting stitches in a gash caused by the ball as a result of the block. It didn't seem to bother Lenny. "It got the momentum back on our side ... someone got the job done and that's all that mattered," he says. This year the fans and the coaches both know who to look to for these team and crowd stirring plays. Chavers says, "I hope to do as well on the specialty teams this year, but my main goal is just to play where I can contribute the most to the team."

"We've gained experience as a working team and know what it takes to come together," notes Chavers of the difference between the 1985 defense that has played well through the first four games and last year's defense that gave up a total of 237 points.

Looking to the future, Chavers feels his performance in 1985 will determine his future aspirations in football. "It's my senior year and I want to go out big, but I'm looking forward to getting out in the real world," he says. Of course any player would miss the Seminole Saturday Nights, but if Lenny Chavers takes his team spiritedness and warm grin into the "real world," he'll be successful.

Booster contributions have financed four stadium expansions since 1977, and the construction of the Seminole Boosters' SKYBOX in 1982 has already generated hundreds of thousands of dollars in support of the athletic programs.

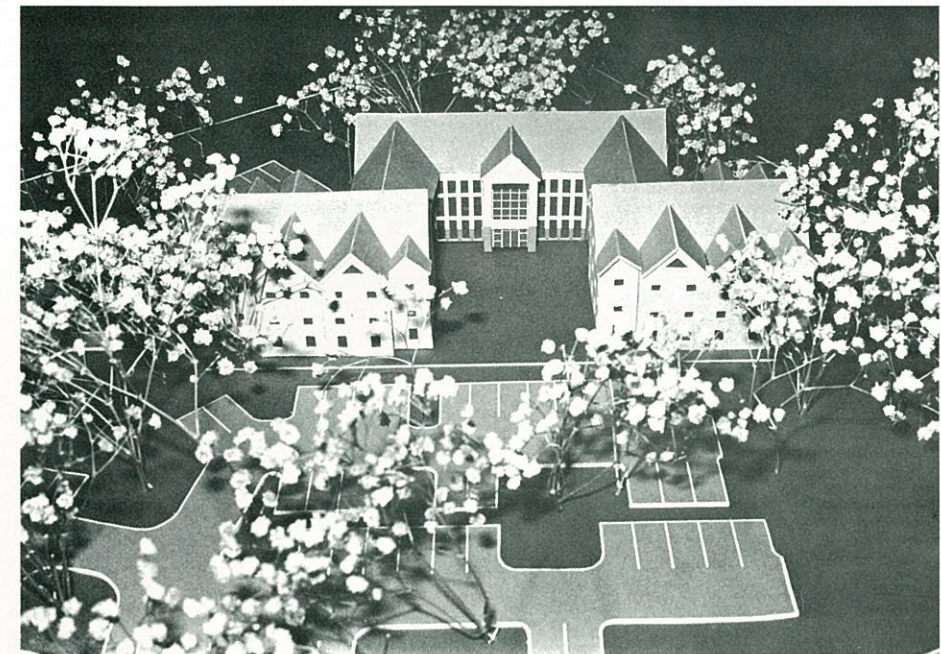
A multitude of Seminole Booster clubs now cover the three state area, and our Jacksonville Seminole Booster club is the largest such club representing any school in any city in Florida. Of course, no university enjoys greater support from its "hometown" than Florida

State. Tallahasseeans account for about half of all athletic donations.

In addition to the responsibilities of raising annual cash donations and maintaining the stadium gift shop and concessions operations, the Boosters also aggressively pursue a variety of special projects which add to the long term strength and stability of Seminole athletics. These projects include: the establishment of a reserve fund; the new Athletic Dorm; the Challenge Grant program in support of Women's Athletics; and the Seminole Heritage Foundation, which accepts long term deferred gifts and endowments.

**Langford**, who is president of Municipal Code Corporation, is aided this year by vice-president **Bill Parker** (president, Crest Chemical Corp. in Clearwater); secretary **Jim King** (president, Jim King & Associates in Jacksonville); and treasurer **Mike Fields** (president, Southern Bank in Tallahassee.)

Members of the Booster Executive Committee include Athletic Director **Hootie Ingram**, administrator **Phil Fordyce**, Regents representative **Dubose Ausley**, past president **Tom Barron**, insurance executives **Malcolm King** (Gainesville) and **Leslie Pantin** (Miami), Tallahassee businessman **Bob Camp**, and Board Counsel **Ted Steinmeyer**.

# Florida State University...

## Home of the Seminoles

Florida State University, a coeducational institution and a senior member of the nine universities in the state system, is in Tallahassee, Florida, the state's capital.

Located just a few blocks from the Capitol, the Florida State campus is considered to be one of the most beautiful in the Southeast. The 347-acre campus is covered with hardwoods, pines and palms as well as springtime greenery that combines the blossoms of camellias, azaleas and dogwoods.

The approximately 22,500 students currently enrolled at Florida State learn from a faculty of over 1,500, which includes four members of the National Academy of Sciences.

FSU was established in 1857, when the governor of Florida, James E. Broom, signed a bill establishing the Seminary West of the Suwannee River in Tallahassee. The school consisted of one building located on 10 acres of land.

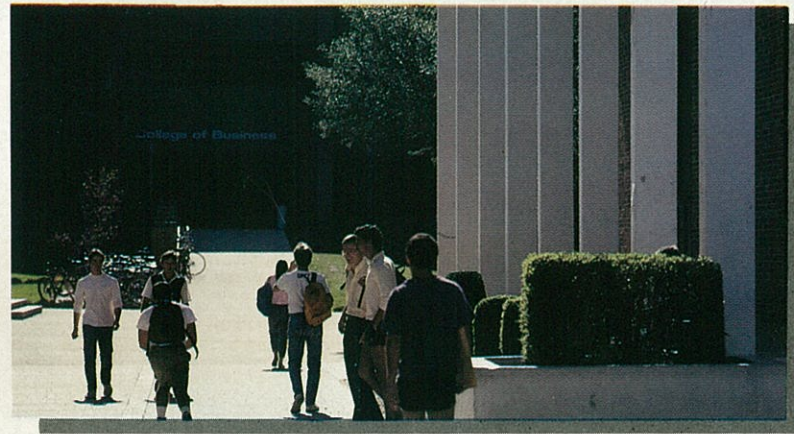
By 1860, the school, not yet a college, had an enrollment of 250. The president of the seminary organized the school into a four-year liberal arts college in 1887. At its first commencement in June 1891, degrees were conferred on two women and five men. Ten years later, the institution was renamed Florida State College. In 1905, it became Florida Female College, and in 1909 the name was changed to Florida State College for Women.

In 1945, FSCW took on the additional title, Tallahassee Branch of the University of Florida (TBUF), due to the fact that GIs stationed nearby were attending classes at the women's school, but, as men, couldn't legally enroll.

Gov. Millard Caldwell signed a bill in 1947 making both the University of Florida and FSCW coeducational. FSCW became Florida State University.

Florida State now offers students the opportunity to choose from more than 100 career options in arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, education, engineering, home economics, law, library and information studies, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theater and visual arts. Honors programs are available for top students.

The University has been recognized by the Board of Regents for its continuing leadership at the graduate levels of education.



Overseas study programs in fields ranging from law to hotel and restaurant administration are offered in Florence, Italy; Oxford and London, England; Switzerland, Yugoslavia, Costa Rica and the Panama Canal Zone.

The University's location in the state capital affords excellent study, research and internship opportunities in the areas of government, social sciences, law and policy sciences.

Florida State is setting the pace as higher education in Florida prepares to enter the 21st century. One of the few institutions of learning in the United States with its own supercomputer, FSU is attracting researchers from around the globe.

The Bay County Commission purchased 21 acres, 16 of which make up Phase I of the new campus. The remaining acreage will be available for expansion into technical degree programs such as engineering and science.

Social life for many students in Tallahassee centers around 24 fraternities and 20 sororities. Wind surfing, swimming and sunning are among the activities to be enjoyed at FSU's lakeside "Reservation" or along the sandy beaches of nearby coasts. In the fall, the campus goes wild for football, supporting the Seminoles both at home and away.

When it comes to intercollegiate athletics, Florida State has established a winning tradition. Both the men's and women's athletic programs are among the nation's best.

A unique extracurricular activity is the Flying High Circus, the nation's only all-collegiate circus. Students from every academic major can become stars on the flying trapeze or highwire, or in clown acts.

Florida State is growing. Construction has begun on the Florida A&M

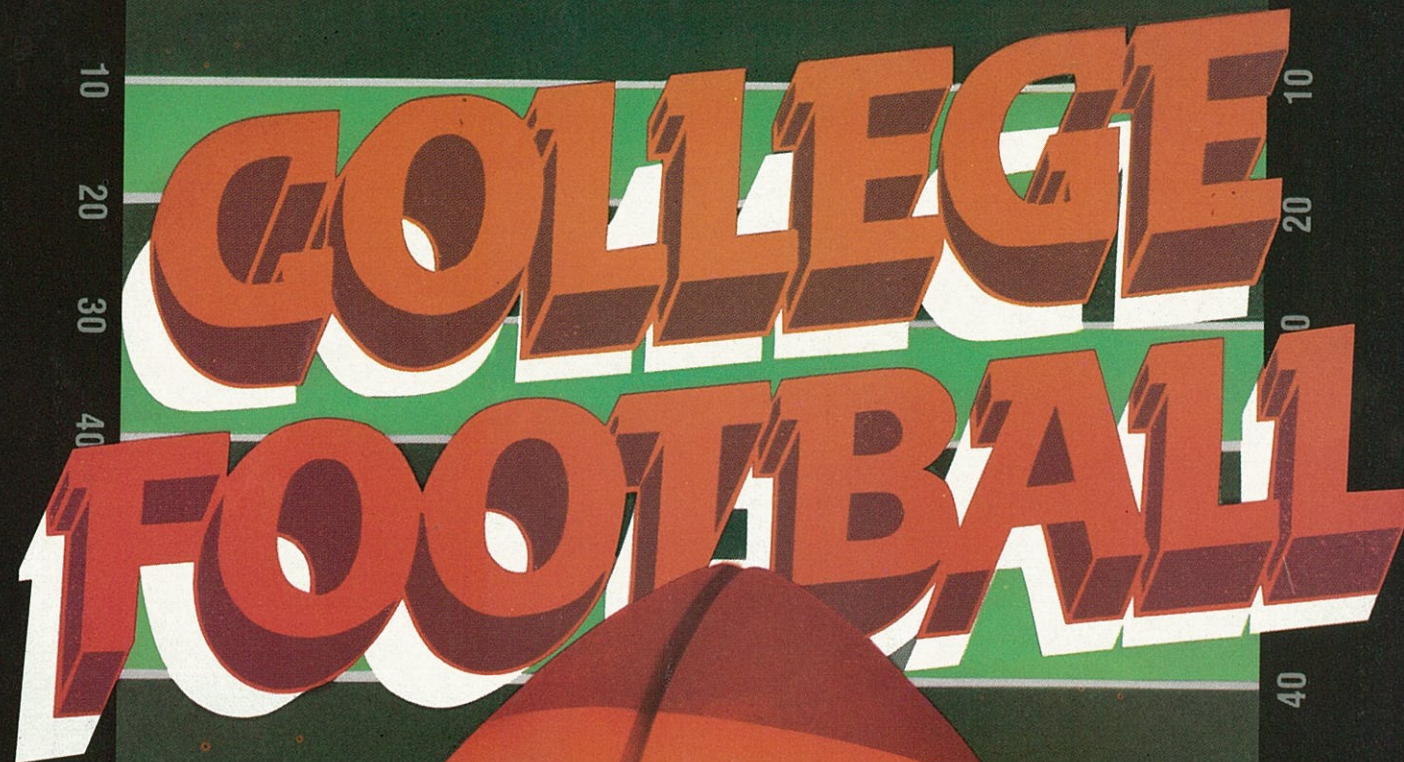
University/FSU College of Engineering Building, located adjacent to Innovation Park, two miles southwest of the FSU campus. It is expected to be completed by October 1987.

Construction began last fall on the new student union complex and construction is expected to be completed in 1987 on the Science Center Library.

Plans are also underway for a \$12.1 million multipurpose student gym, approved by the 1986 Legislature, as well as improvements to the central utility plant and renovation of the old Music Building (Music School South).

The College of Law's Village Green project has begun. When completed, the \$3.8 million project will feature four restored historic homes to be used as study, meeting and reception areas.


FSU President Bernard P. Sliger takes pride not only in the programs, but also in the people—students, faculty, administrators and staff—who make Florida State a successful monument to learning.



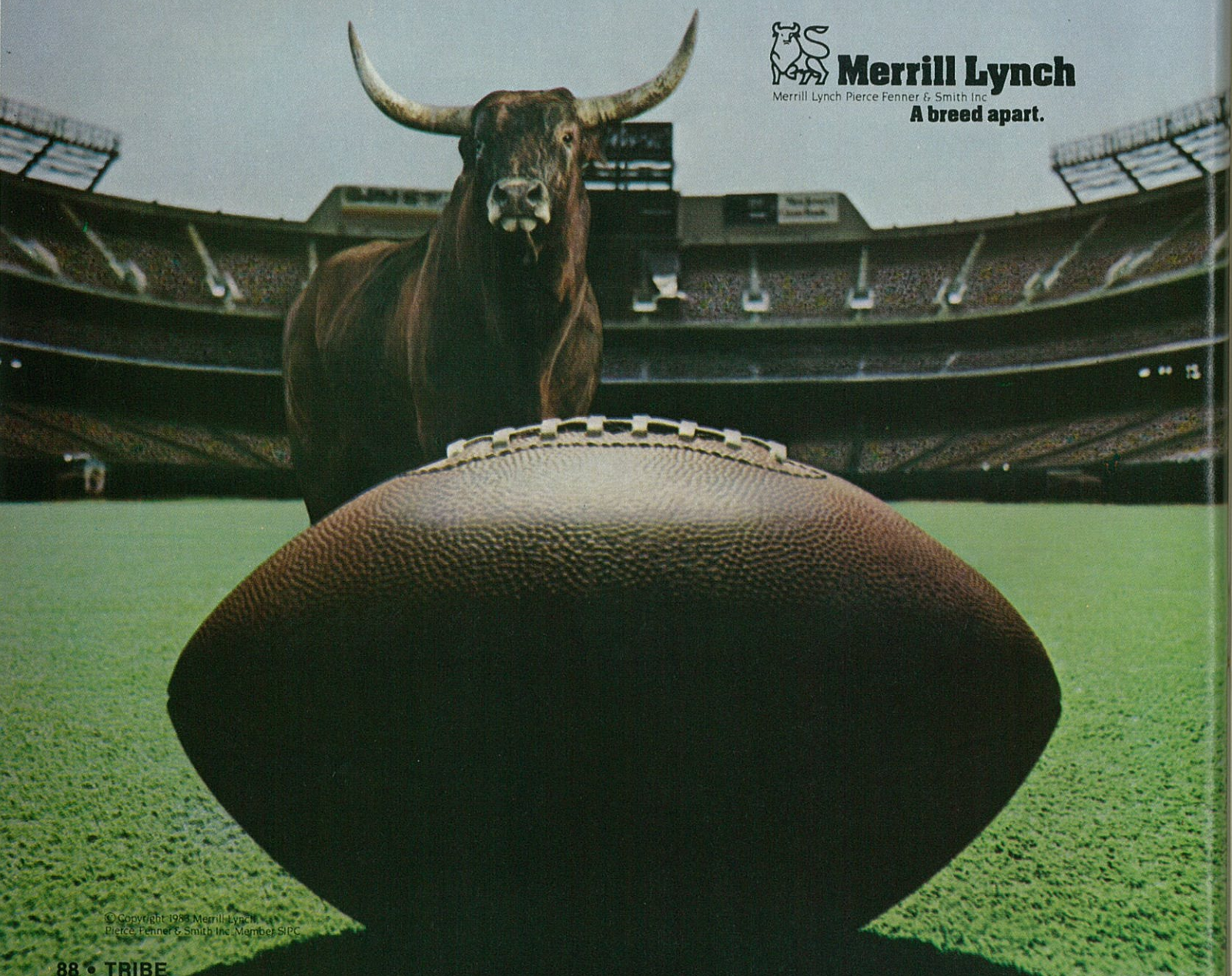

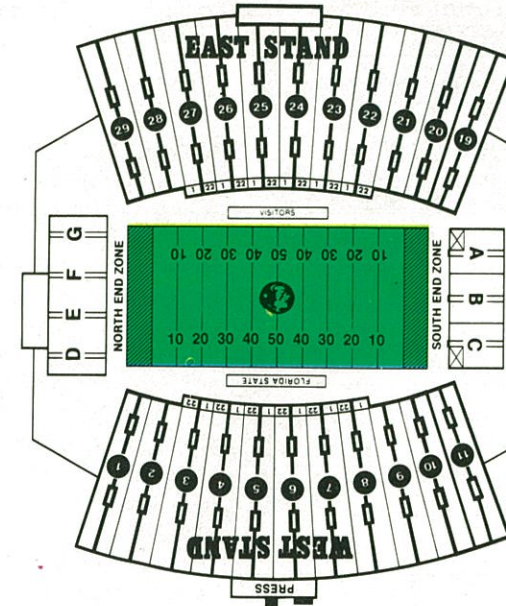

**PUBLIC TELEPHONES:** Public telephones are located on the ground levels of both the east and west stands.

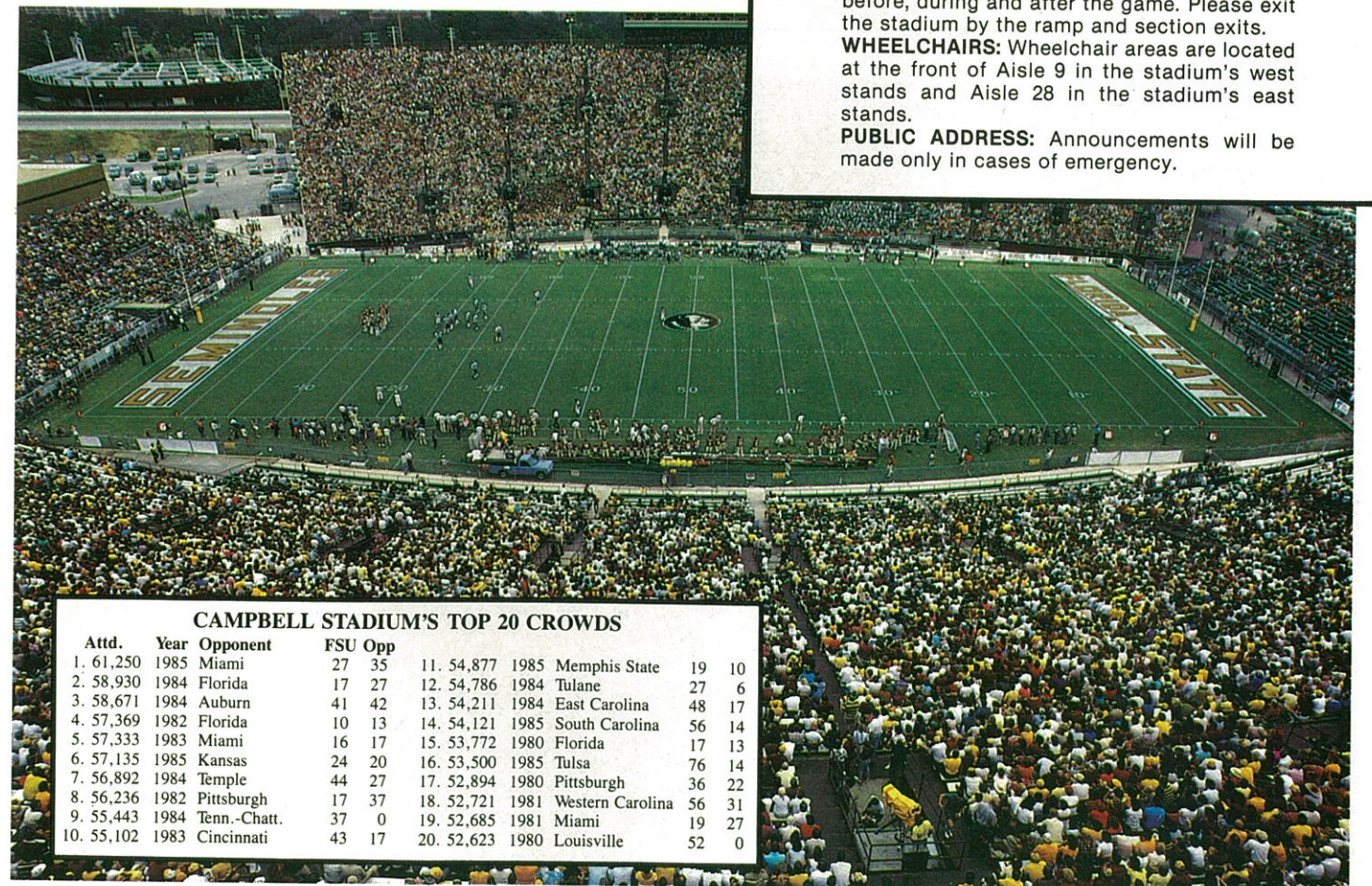
**LOST AND FOUND:** Items may be turned in or claimed at the police station, which is in the stadium's southeast corner.

## International Programs at Florida State

Florida State University is spanning the globe. Its outreach extends throughout the world. It gets around.

From the Panama Canal Zone to Florence, Italy, the major commitments FSU is making to international study, the internationalization of the curriculum and other study opportunities in several foreign locations.

FSU has provided undergraduate education from members of the U.S. Armed Forces stationed in Panama since 1957. Also attending are Panamanian and U.S. civilian, who comprise more than 45 percent of the student population at the Panama Canal branch. The branch centers on the Pacific and Atlantic sides of the Isthmus of Panama.

The Center for Yugoslav-American Studies, Research and Exchanges, located on the FSU campus since 1961, administers an inter-university program in Comparative Policy Studies. It encourages research in the social, legal physical sciences and facilitates exchanges of scholars between the United States and Yugoslavia. Close cooperative relationships are maintained with the Universities of Belgrade, Zagreb and Titograd as well as the Inter-University Centre for Post-Graduate Studies in Dubrovnik.

The University also operates International Study Centers in London, England, and in Florence, Italy. The centers are part of the state university system and are open to all university students in Florida on an available-space basis. Currently, more than 200 students each year study in these overseas centers.

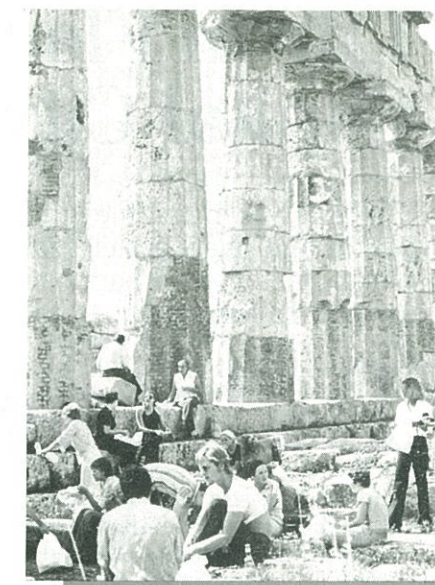
The Department of Classics conducts annual archaeological excavations at the Etruscan and Roman site of Cetamura, in the district of Chianti, near Florence, Italy. The excavation is an important part of the master's degree program with a concentration in classical archaeology. The field school also is open to undergraduate students in the state university system.

Collegians have the opportunity to discover a new world of hotels, restaurants, foods and wines through the European Summer Study Program in Hospitality Administration. The six-week program began in 1972 and is conducted annually from early May through mid-June in Leysin, Switzerland.

Since 1973, the College of Law has conducted a summer program of study at Oxford University in England. About 80 law students from Florida, other states and Canada are taught annually by FSU College of Law faculty and tenured dons of the University of Oxford.

The Spanish and Inter-American departments administer an eight-week program in San Jose, Costa Rica, each summer. The program is located within the Bi-National Cultural Center which is administered by the U.S. Information Service and the U.S. Embassy in San Jose.

FSU participates with International Schools Services in offering access to



the Taishan China Study Program under the auspices of Shongstan University—South China's most prestigious university. Students can earn 15 semester hours of academic credit in the program.

Also, the Learning System Institute conducts a range of research and development activities in the area of educational technology. The programs are designed to provide training and technical assistance to educational institutions and agencies both within and outside the United States.

International education at Florida State is a two-way street. The University offers U.S. students the opportunity to study and be exposed to the cultures of other countries, while more than 550 students from 82 countries come to the Tallahassee campus to study.

against each other and find new stars," said Sexton. "Spring practice is definitely the best time for a walk-on to make a move."

Those earning scholarships along with Sutton this past spring due to their excellent performance were defensive tackle Bart Schucts and fullback Dayne Williams. Schucts, a transfer from Georgia Southern and Williams, who transferred from South Florida Junior College where he had a baseball scholarship, literally came out of nowhere to earn their scholarships. In Williams' case, his impressive performance came at the right time. "With the loss of Cletis (Jones) and injuries to Chuck Wells and Tanner Holloman, it left only David Palmer, Reno Fells and myself," Williams said. "I had to run hard and prove that I could do the job." Both Williams and Schucts have seen major playing time in the Tribes' first five games.

Another former walk-on is a familiar name to Tallahasseeans. Leon High graduate Tanner Holloman, like Sutton, walked on to the FSU team after leaving a scholarship at the University of Tennessee prior to the 1983 season. He struggled in choosing between academics and football before finally deciding to join the team in the fall of

1985. "Many people thought I could not handle it physically after not playing football for two years," Holloman said. "But I had football on my mind."

Holloman worked hard prior to the 1985 season and played at fullback in every game but the Gator Bowl, rushing 12 times for 57 yards. Following the season, he was awarded a scholarship. "They knew all along I was worth it," he said. "But it was something I had to prove first."

He has confirmed that he was worthy of earning the scholarship. Through five games, Holloman has been the starter at fullback four times.

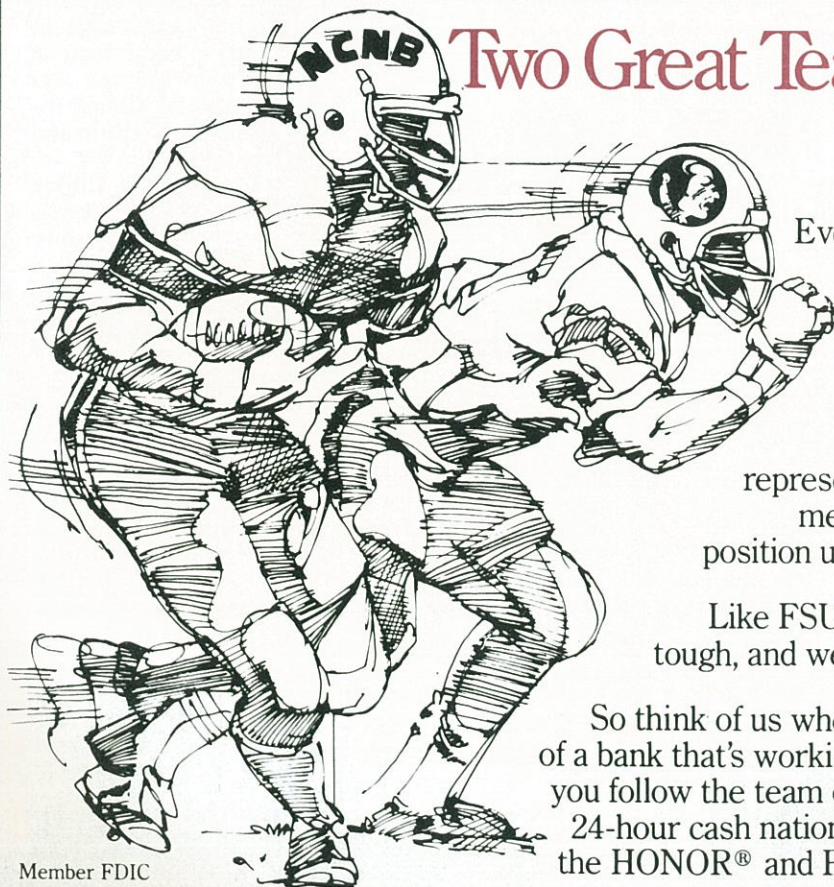
Although it took a lot of hard work and determination, Holloman is happy to be playing in Tallahassee and for the Seminoles. "Playing on the same field with Darrin (Holloman, his brother) makes my mom and dad happy. Being able to do that makes me happy."

The love of the game also draws young men out of the classroom and onto the field. Curtis Thomas, a junior defensive back from Thomasville, GA, came to Florida State on an academic scholarship. Even though he was an all-region wide receiver in his senior year, he had no real publicity and only offers from small schools. When he decided to try out as a walk-on, he knew it would

be tough. "I was serious about playing and I knew I would have to work hard," Thomas said. "The scholarship athletes get the first look; being a walk-on I had to make coaches notice me to get a second look." Today Thomas plays on the specialty teams and serves as a backup cornerback. He has made the travel squad each of the last two years.

Each one of these young men also had to get financial support before he earned his scholarship and each one reflected on how it matured him. Riggs said that he was more careful about the way his money was spent during his year as a walk-on. "I made a conscientious effort to conserve money. I didn't want to abuse the money my parents were paying."

Even though both scholarship athletes and walk-ons play for the same team and strive for the same goal, there is a difference between the two. "It's like two different worlds," said Dayne Williams. "Walk-ons have it tough; at first you must earn respect. After you go through all the practices and earn the scholarship you feel confident. Now I respect walk-ons, so does the rest of the team because it takes guts to go through it."

have taped enough footage to last them a good many years.

Through all the drizzle and drench, 38,821 loyal Seminole fans still turned out. One of them was Jeannie Dees, at the time the newly-married wife of Seminole center Allen Dees.

"I remember I was just soaked," she said. "I stood under the grandstands with another of the players wives and we just cheered them on. I kind of expected them to call the game off but that's before I knew they played football wind, rain or shine."

FSU quarterback Bill Cappleman's rendition of the game varied from some of his teammates.

"It's only typical that people tend to forget the bad things that happen to them, and I guarantee you fumbles aren't nice things to remember," said Cappleman, who fumbled twice. "The thing I remember most, beside the rain, is a 50-yard touchdown pass I completed to Tom (Bailey) on our first possession."

Somehow through all the mud and gunk, Cappleman managed 180 yards in the air on 12 completions.

"That Cappleman kid was out of sight," said Wilson after Cappleman's 1969 performance. "It was fantastic the way he threw the ball in this weather."

Allen Dees, who was a red-shirt that year, remembers the game from the sidelines, and when asked what Peterson told them at halftime his comment was, "I don't remember exactly what he said, but I doubt if it could be printed."

Fumbles or no fumbles Peterson had the last word on that rainy day in '69 and he still has the last word today; "you never have to apologize for a win no matter what occurs in the midst," he said. Or the mist, for that matter.

**Editor's Note:** Some of the quotes in this story were taken from the game's original play-by-play. In 1970, 14 members of the Wichita State team, including head coach Ben Wilson, were killed in a plane crash.

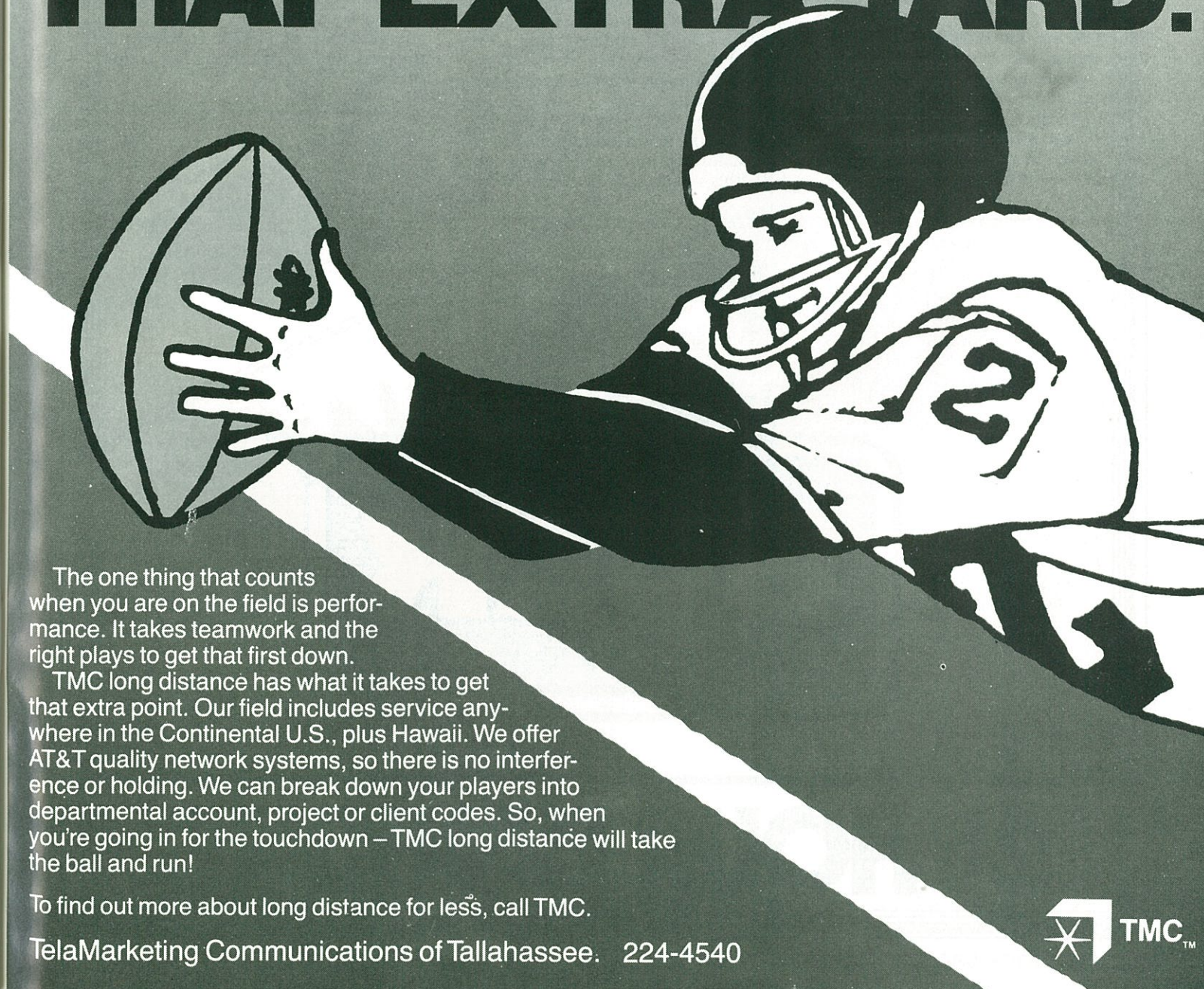

the governance of the University, or the influence it has on the administration of the University and its operation. Faculty in general feel comfortable here. Their attitude is good. They are cooperative and loyal to the University. Obviously, it is the nature of faculty to be loyal to their discipline, but at many schools that is their only loyalty.

At FSU, there is a loyalty to the University as well as to the individual disciplines. So, we have an excellent faculty and we hope to continue to improve it. Berkeley is trying to woo one of our younger professors away from us. That is the kind of faculty we have here. And though you don't like to have to be confronted with other universities taking your faculty, it is a good indication you have a good faculty. We are really proud of our faculty!

**Gilmer:** What about other Florida State programs?

**Sliger:** We are not trying to be all things to everyone and everything, but certainly we are not going to let our humanities suffer. Our music program and our theater program are outstanding. So, we will continue to excel in those areas. In athletics we have good facilities. We probably could improve

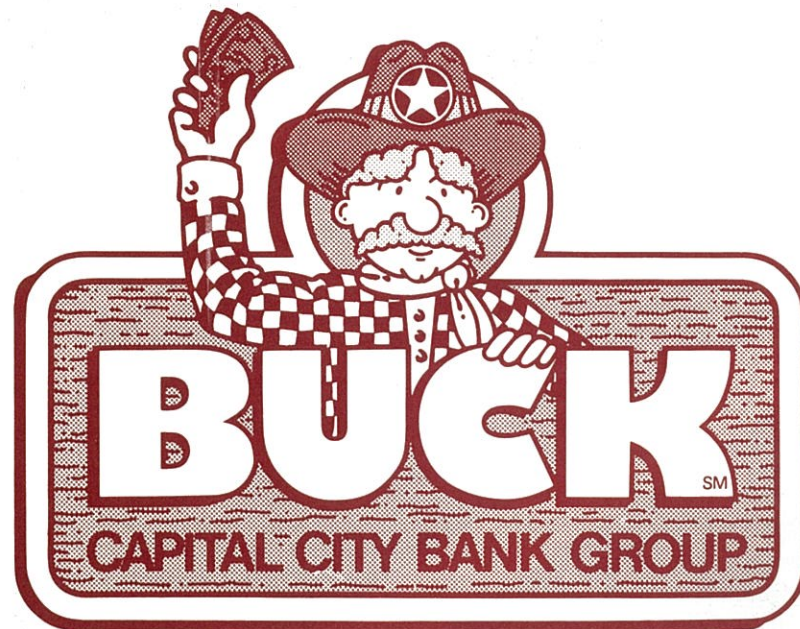

(1977-81) and with the Atlanta Falcons (1982). He returned to FSU in 1983 as offensive line coach and offensive coordinator.

Like fellow assistant Wally Burham, it was his high school coach who influenced his decision most to enter coaching. "I guess I decided I wanted to be a coach way back in high school," McDuffie says. "I came from a small town and the high school football coach was probably the most respected man in the town. He was very successful and was very influential."

McDuffie half-jokingly refers to the profession as the "greatest in the world when you're winning and the worst in the world when you're losing." He lists his greatest satisfaction from the job as encouragement coming from ex-players. "When they are in school, they don't always understand why we have to do certain things a certain way," he says. "To me, the greatest satisfaction in coaching comes when an ex-player comes back for a visit or you run into him somewhere and he thanks you for coaching him. Obviously you like to see all your players graduate and become successful members of society."

As with several other staff members, McDuffie has experience in the professional ranks, but prefers the college game. He says the basic difference between the two is technology and maturity of the players. "The professional game is a little different from the coaching viewpoint in that it is a high tech game. Even the worst teams have great athletes. Unfortunately not all those players are dedicated to the game — some will always try to get by on skill alone. Another area of difference is in maturity. In the pros, you were sometimes coaching guys who were as old or older than yourself. It's kind of hard to motivate players like that if they don't want to be motivated."

Recruiting is another difference between the professional and college games — and it's a difference McDuffie likes. "Some guys in this business just don't like to recruit," he says. "To me, it's one of the best parts of being a coach. For one thing, I like to think that by recruiting, I can control what type of person will be playing for us. Secondly, just like a game, recruiting is a battle. It's you against everybody else. You're trying to present your University as being the best place for a young man to play; the competition is doing the same thing. I enjoy those battles almost as much as I enjoy the games."

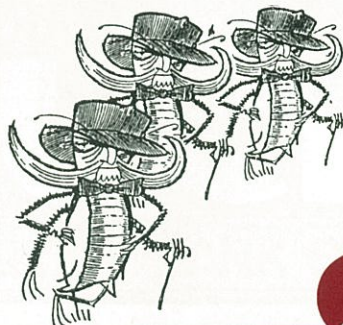
McDuffie credits his wife, Toni, and family as part of his success. "If you didn't have an understanding family, you couldn't stay in this business," he says.

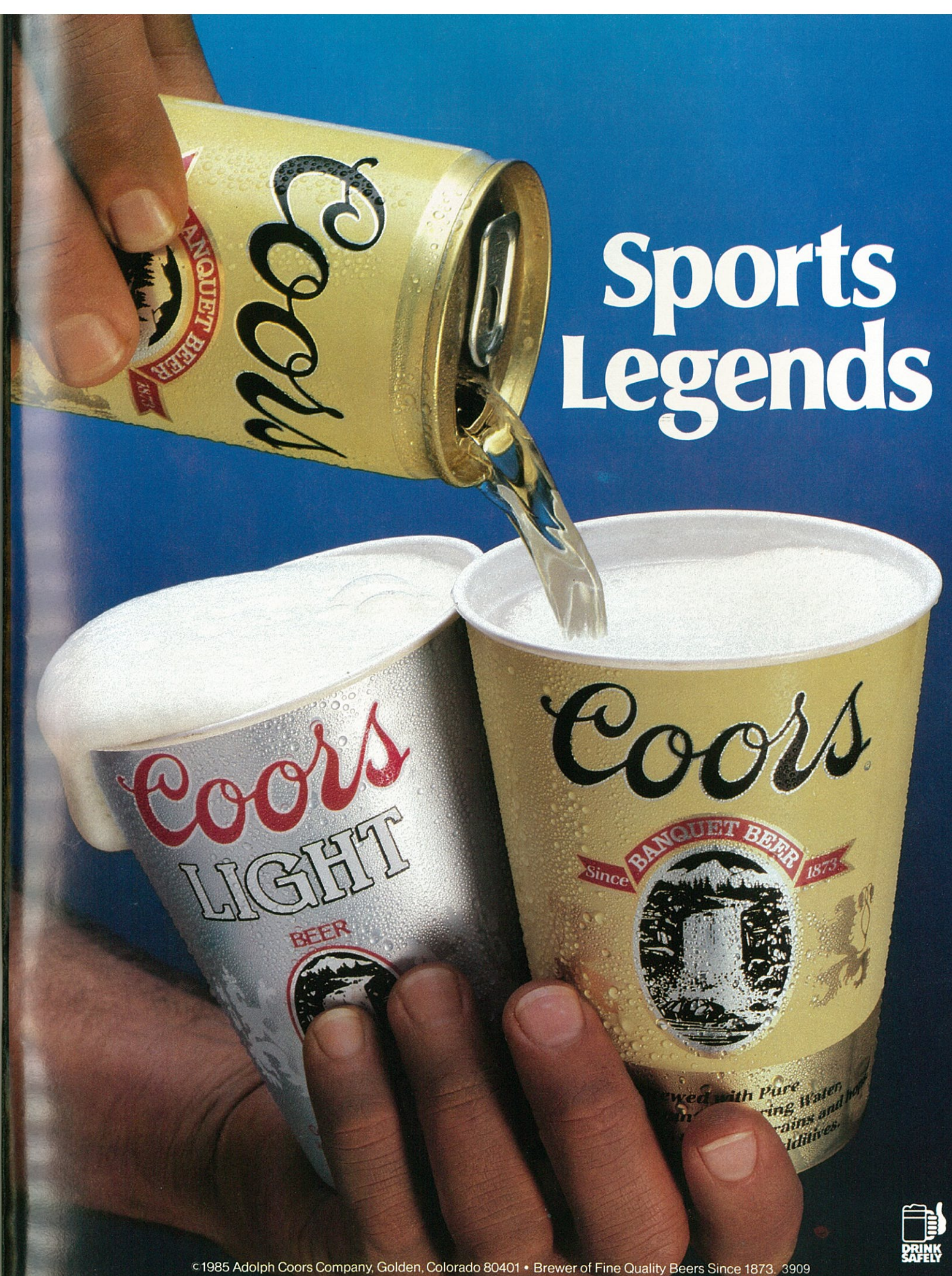
