# Teepee Talk

#### **FSU vs Wichita State**

Florida State and Wichita State have met in football just once before. That game on a September night in 1969 will certainly not be remembered for its rather expected 24-0 outcome, but for another reason it has taken a place in college football history.

It was Florida State's opening game of that 1969 season, back when college seasons began when they should—in mid-September. The Seminoles of Coach Bill Peterson had been to three consecutive bowls and were coming off a fine 8-3 season in 1968. Florida State had closed that '68 campaign by appearing against LSU in the inaugural Peach Bowl in Atlanta.

Bill Cappleman was the Florida State quarterback in 1969 and Rhett Dawson would become his favorite target. The scene was set for another fine year. Fans then, as they do now, waited in anticipation of that season opener. No matter who the opponent, there's always something special about that first football game every year.

The morning of September 20 broke gray and cloudy. Rain was falling steadily as the day wore on. As the 7:30 p.m. kickoff time approached most fans probably thought it had rained all it could. Wrong.

Wichita State brought a 1-0 team to Tallahassee after an opening game win over Utah State. That was significant because the Shockers had gone 0-10 in 1968. The game began in a hard rain.

Many current Florida State fans may remember recent rainy-day games against Pittsburgh in 1983 and Florida in 1984. There have been others in recent years. So what made this night any different?

"Second worst rain I've ever seen in a football game," says Lonnie Burt, Florida State's Sports Information Director at the time and a veteran of many a college game. "The worst was the TCU game in 1963. They almost postponed that one it rained so hard."

Burt was also a witness to the two recent wet games just mentioned.

"It ain't even close," he says. "In that Wichita State game we're talking about hard rain from start to finish. It never slacked off—not even for a minute. It was one of those where you couldn't see the field from the press box."

The way things went on the field that night, it may have been a blessing not to be able to see it (see story—page 19). There were a total of 27 fumbles by the two teams that night—17 by Wichita State, 10 by the Seminoles. Wichita State lost 10 of its bobbles, FSU lost seven. Those records still stand in the NCAA record books after 17 years. Some observers feel those marks will never be broken.

Amazingly, Florida State scored the first touchdown of the game on a 53-yard pass from Cappleman to Tom Bailey, who somehow managed to find the ball amidst the raindrops. Cappleman had another scoring pass — a 9-yarder to Don Penderson—in a second half that saw the hardest rain of the night.

Wichita State was left with bitter memories of that Tallahassee night. The Shockers managed just eight first downs and 77 net yards. Two interceptions added to 10 lost fumbles netted an unbelievable 12 turnovers.

Here's hoping for a dry night and a better game in the second FSU-Wichita State matchup.

Notes from the Seminoles camp:

\*\*\*While that one FSU-Wichita game occupies virtually the entire ''Fumbles'' category in the NCAA record book, there is one fumble record that wasn't attained in that game. San Diego State and East Carolina have both had the distinction of losing five fumbles in one quarter — that's an NCAA record.

\*\*\*Florida State's Danny McManus, asked after the Tulane game if his team was gearing up for No. 1 Miami coming up on Nov. 1: "We're gearing up for Wichita State and that's all."

\*\*\*Florida State might very well get a player into the NCAA record books this week. If Derek Schmidt makes his next extra point he will be 100-for-100 in his collegiate career. That is the magic number to be ranked in the PAT accuracy catagory. His 100 percent will tie Alabama's Van Tiffin, who reached the 100 mark without a miss three weeks ago. Schmidt has never missed an extra point on any level.

\*\*\*You can't tell much by comparing Florida State and Wichita State's common opponents this year. There are two. Florida State beat Toledo 24-0 in its season opener while Wichita State lost to the Rockets 30-13. Both FSU and Wichita State beat Tulane—the Shockers by 21-20 and the Seminoles by 54-21.

\*\*\*Wichita State is seeking just its third winning season since 1970, the year of that school's tragic plane crash. Since the 1970 season, the Shockers are 59-121-2 and have had just two seasons over .500. The winning seasons were in 1972 when they posted a 6-5 mark and in 1982 when the Shockers went 8-3. Ron Chismar is the fourth Wichita State coach since 1970.

\*\*\*Florida State coach Bobby Bowden on open dates: ''I don't like them unless you've got a whole bunch of injuries. I guess it's good to have one after a loss, but I don't know which games we're gonna lose so it's kind of hard to schedule them that way.''

\*\*\*Coming off a 3-8 season in 1985, Wichita State coach Ron Chismar was going for a quick fix and brought in 14 junior college players in his group of 27 signees.

\*\*\*Wichita State is in its first year as a Division I-A independent after the Shockers pulled out of the Missouri Valley Conference. Last year Wichita State was 2-3 in that league. Suprisingly, the Shockers opened the 1985 season with a road victory over Kansas State of the Big Eight. Despite the hot start, their only two other victories came against Drake and Southern Illipois

\*\*\*Wichita State is undertaking an adventurous schedule in 1986 with games at Iowa State, Tulane, Florida State and Arizona State.

\*\*\*Three of Florida State's five previous opponents have yet to lose a game. Nebraska, Michigan and North Carolina remain unbeaten. Down the road the Seminoles face another thus-far unbeaten team in No. 1 Miami which is off to a 6-0 start and has only Cincinnati to play before Florida State.

\*\*\*Wichita State has a player from Tallahassee on its 1986 roster. He is senior running back Valasco Smith, who attended Lincoln High School. According to the Wichita State media guide, Smith never played a down of football at Lincoln but was discovered in a flag football league after graduation. He attended Pratt Junior College before transferring to Wichita State. Last year he was the Shockers' leading rusher with 757 yards in 156 carries, the eighth best season in WSU history. Smith was also voted second team all-Missouri Valley Conference.

\*\*\*Florida State is 8-2 against teams from the State of Kansas, including a 1-0 mark vs. Wichita State, 3-0 vs. Kansas State and 4-2 vs. Kansas.

# The View from the President's Box

Recently, Florida State's president, Dr. Bernard F. Sliger, discussed the University in an interview with Dr. Gerry Gilmer, FSU associate vice president for public affairs and director of university relations. The following comes from that discussion:

Gilmer: What are your plans for the University?

Sliger: This year we are trying to get the Panama City campus buildings completed. We have an ongoing program there which will really take off when the buildings are completed. In Tallahassee, the engineering school and science library are under construction and renovation of the Student Union is underway. We have a lot of construction going on now, and it is important we finish and get the campus back to normal. The disadvantage of normalcy means you are not building anything, but we do have an inordinate amount of building going on at the moment.

**Gilmer:** How do you see the University developing over the next five years?

Sliger: In the long-run, I see an extensive expansion of our engineering program as it moves in conjunction and cooperation with Innovation Park and the supercomputer. Our supercomputer is one of nine located in state universities in the United States, and by the beginning of 1987 we will have the most powerful supercomputer of any university in the nation. Obviously, we are going to be in the forefront of the computing business. We have three of our engineering programs accredited after the shortest time possible. We are hoping the announcement will be soon coming that our chemical engineering program is accredited. We will be moving into graduate work in engineering, both master's and Ph.D's, because we have been able to attract particularly good faculty. People said this would be one of the difficulties we would have, but apparently Florida is an attractive place. We have been able to attract excellent teachers and researchers from Stanford and Cornell. To their misfortune but our fortune, we have gotten people from Texas, Louisiana and Oklahoma. I think the whole science area will expand. The MARTECH program, which comes out of physics and chemistry, is a part of that expansion. bolstering our programs in chemistry, physics and biology.

**Gilmer:** Please comment on students five years from now.

Sliger: We continue to show improvement on an already fine student body.

This year we had more freshmen than at any time in the history of FSU, and at the same time their SAT and ACT scores are higher. We have a progressive program for our Merit Scholars. I believe our program will continue. We are not only going for the Merit Scholars, we are aiming for the valedictorians and high achievers in leadership. I see the student body brighter, or at least better trained, and I would guess that during the next five years we will see a continuation of the kind of good students that we are getting now: students who are having some fun but who are primarily interested in getting an education, also in making associations while they are here in preparing for the world of employment. I think this is a trend that we will see for a while and I

commencement and every chance I get that I think and believe - and I have been in this business long enough I can almost say I know — that Florida State has the best faculty in Florida. In terms of percentage of total faculty, we have had more Nobel laureates, we have more members of the National Academy of Sciences than any other Florida school. That goes for most of the schools in the Southeast. We are certainly one of the top schools in terms of faculty in the Southeast. The last study that was made by a distinguished organization indicated that in the sciences Florida State was only behind Duke, North Carolina and Virginia in the Southeast. Or to put it more positively, we were ahead of all others schools in the Southeast in sciences ex-



hope that it will continue. I would not want to see students become complacent about worldly issues. I think our society would lose a lot. At least from an administrator's point of view, it's pleasant to have the kind of students we have now and I hope that will continue. **Gilmer:** What about the faculty?

Sliger: What I consider to be the highlight, or the most outstanding feature of Florida State is its faculty. I say at every cept Duke, North Carolina and Virginia. That includes all Southeastern Conference schools. So, we are very pleased with our faculty. We are always trying to get salaries increased, because they are not as good as we would like. On the other hand, there seems to be a comradery at FSU, primarily because of the heavy influence the faculty has on

You have heard the horror stories about the high school football player who can't even take out the garbage without being hounded by recruiters in his front yard, and about the kid whose mailbox is full of offers from various schools around the country. Yes, and all that speculation around freshman signing day in February about who will be attending school where!

Let me tell you about another class of athletes who have played the game of football all their lives and love the game as much as the other guy. But to them, it looks as if their football career just might be over after high school.

They are the guys who, out of their love for the game, make the gutsy decision to walk on to a college football team.

Every college football program has them. According to Florida State walk-on coach Billy Sexton, they are the ones who have been looked at by recruiters and are almost there but the university does not have a scholarship to offer them. "We will invite them to give it a try as a walk-on," said Sexton. "And if they make a good impression during practice, there is always a chance that we will award them a scholarship."

Life as a walk-on is not a glamour pro-

fession. They do not always receive the newest equipment and during the regular season, walk-ons play on the scout team. The scout team is made up of the guys who run plays similar to the upcoming team and have the Seminole starters chasing them around the practice field. Seminole defensive back Lenny Sutton knows about the scout team. In 1984, the Sanford, FL native was used for that purpose after transferring from the University of Tennessee following an unhappy freshman season.

"I was never used to playing on the scout team," said Sutton. "It hurt my pride as a player. I felt like I should be playing, but I didn't know the system at FSU. After a while I started feeling good about my team contribution and it helped me perform better which made the coaches take a good look at me."

Sutton's improvement continued through the spring and regular season of 1985 and following spring practice of 1986 he had finally convinced the coaches he was worthy of a scholarship. "It was my performance in spring practice of 1986 when I earned the scholarship," he said. "I let my ability prove it."

Each year, Florida State also brings in what is known as a "recruited" walk-

on. This is what convinced Seminole long snapper Marty Riggs to attend FSU. During Riggs' senior year at St. Xavier High in Louisville, KY, he had been in touch with Seminole recruiters. But there were some questions surrounding where he would attend college. He had early ambitions to attending a military academy, but after accompanying his father on a trip to Tallahassee to referee the FSU Garnet and Gold game in 1982, he struck a deal with Coach Bobby Bowden.

"Coach Bowden felt like I was the kind of player that FSU wanted," Riggs said. "He asked me to walk on my first year, which would be a redshirt year. Following that year I would be a scholarship athlete and have four years of eligibility."

Bowden kept his word and today, Riggs has moved from the scout team into his second year as the Seminoles' long snapper.

Spring practice has proven to be a turning point for many walk-ons. Spring is a time when there are no game preparations and it gives the coaches time to evaluate the ability of each athlete. "We have a chance to scrimmage



# **University Leaders**



Dr. Bernard F. Sliger
University
President

Dr. Bernard F. Sliger has served as the 10th president of Florida State University since February 7, 1977, following a six-month stint as the University's interim president.

After he joined the administration in 1972 as executive vice president, he assumed the additional duties of chief academic officer, and further served as director of the University's London Study Center during the fall quarter, 1975.


Sliger, a native of Trout Creek, Mich., was born Sept. 30, 1924. He holds three degrees, the B.A. ('49), M.A. ('50) and Ph.D. ('55), from Michigan State University, all in economics. He also has done postdoctoral study in mathematical economics at the University of Minnesota. Sliger has taught at Florida State, Michigan State, Louisiana State and at Southern University in Baton Rouge, La.

Sliger began his educational career as an instructor in Michigan's Interior Township Schools in 1947. Prior to joining Florida State, he worked for 19 years as a professor and administrator at Louisiana State University. During that time, he served LSU as head of the economics department, member and chairman of the graduate council, dean of academic affairs and vice chancellor. In 1969, he organized the Louisiana Coordinating Council for Higher Education,

which is similar to the Florida Board of Regents, and became its executive director.

Sliger holds memberships in a number of professional, scholastic and honor societies, including Omicron Delta Kappa, Phi Kappa Phi and Alpha Kappa Psi, Since 1983, he has been a member of the board of directors of the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta and presently serves as chairman of the Board of Trustees of the American College Testing Corporation in Iowa City, Iowa. He also is a member of the Council of Presidents for the Southeastern Universities Research Association. based in Newport News, Va. He is active in a number of other civic and academic organizations.

Sliger and his wife, Greta, have two sons, Paul and Sten, and two daughters, Nan and Greta.



Charles W. Ehrhardt
Faculty
Athletic
Committee

A professor of Law at Florida State University since 1967, Charles W. Ehrhardt is beginning his third year as Chairman of the FSU Athletic Committee.

Ehrhardt served on the committee from 1969-71, and was reappointed to the board in 1983. He succeeded Dr. James Jones as chairman in 1984, and became Florida State's representative to the NCAA with the appointment.

A native of Elkader, Iowa, Ehrhardt received a bachelor's degree from Iowa State University in 1962. Two years later he earned his law degree from the University of Iowa and went on to become an Assistant United States Attorney in that state before coming to Tallahassee.

A widely-respected expert in the field of Evidence, Ehrhardt holds the Florida State position as the Ladd Professor of Evidence. He wrote the Florida Evidence Code, passed by the state legislature in 1976, which deals with the admissibility of evidence in court trials. Ehrhardt is also the author of a book on evidence, first published in 1977 and scheduled for a second edition soon.

In the spring of 1984, he was voted President of the Metro Conference, a position which makes him chief representative of the league in dealings with the NCAA.

Ehrhardt and his wife, the former Judy Sutton, have three children.



# Athletic Director C.W. "Hootie" Ingram

On one wall of his office at the Coyle E. Moore Athletic Center, Hootie Ingram proudly displays an array of photographs of FSU's facilities. Those pictures hardly resemble those that might have been found when he first occupied FSU's athletic director's chair in 1981.

Needless to say, there's been quite a change.

Following a legislative appropriation in 1981 providing money for state schools to improve athletic facilities, Ingram assembled a committee of staff and boosters to line up the changes needed to be made at Florida State. "We had just come off the good football year of 1980 and we wanted the other sports to prosper as well," Ingram said.

Florida State was able to combine money provided by the state government and a supplement from the Seminole Boosters, Inc. Ingram and the committee went to work. They initiated a total renovation of the Bim Stults Aquatic Center, which Ingram described as being in "horrible shape" before the improvement; built

Seminole Stadium, one of the finest collegiate baseball stadiums in the southeast: installed a rekortan surface at Mike Long Track and added vast improvements to the spectator areas; built a new softball facility; renovated Tully Gym offices; expanded and made much-needed improvements to Doak Campbell Stadium; and provided Florida State athletics with a home in the form of Coyle E. Moore Athletic Center, which Ingram calls "the heart and soul of Seminole Athletics."

"We had been putting band-aids on all the facilities before and just getting by," Ingram said. He also said that just five years ago Florida State had been at a recruiting disadvantage with the facilities that existed. "When prospective studentathletes come to visit Florida State now, they see nice facilities where they will play and practice. That appeals to them and it helps br-

ing in better athletes," said Ingram.

As overseer of the athletic department operating budget, Ingram took a budget that had been steadily rising and made cuts necessary to keep it in check. But he is quick to share the credit. "To make the cuts we did without losing any sports is a credit to our coaches," he said.

Ingram also said that the success of the football team (four consecutive bowl games) and its many recent television appearances has played a big part in the balancing of the operating budget.

The importance of having reserves to fall back on is another area Ingram has stressed. "We are approaching a sound financial operation, but we need another year like last year and we must continue to monitor all phases of our program," he said. His philosophy recently paid off as FSU finished with a surplus in the athletic fund for last year.


Aside from his accomplishments at Florida State, Ingram also serves the University on a national level as a representative on the College Football Association Television Committee and as a representative on the NCAA Council. "It's a great experience and hard work, but I'm pleased that our University can contribute answers to national problems," he said.

Ingram's duties on the CFA television committee, where he represents southern independent schools, center around negotiating television contracts with ABC and ESPN.

As a member of the 44-member NCAA Council, Ingram is the chairman of the nominating committee which nominates the major officers of the NCAA and makes decisions on new council members when nominated. Being on the Council helps him keep up with rules and regulations that need to be known. "It's like the Supreme Court of the NCAA," he said.

During his college athletic career, which spans a period of 25 years, Ingram has seen how it works from all sides. He played at the University of Alabama from 1951 to 1954 and was named all-SEC as a sophomore when he led the nation in pass interceptions. He has coached on the high school level as an assistant at Bradenton (FL) Manatee High School and served as head coach at Tuscaloosa (AL) Brookwood High School. He then moved into the college coaching arena as an assistant at Wake Forest and later worked at Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas before accepting the head coach job at Clemson in 1970, where he served for three

Ingram then moved into administration, accepting a job with the Southeastern Conference as Assistant Commissioner in 1973. His duties included supervision of football and basketball officials, rules interpretation and eligibility. After five years as assistant commissioner, he was named associate commissioner in 1978 until 1981 when FSU called upon him to lead its department.

# **Head Coach Bobby Bowden**

nderneath it all, there can be no question that Bowden is a great football coach. In a day and time when success is measured by wins and losses, just take a look at his yardstick. Only five of America's division I head coaches have won more football games. Only nine division I coaches have a better winning percentage.

Since he set foot in Seminole territory in 1976, Bowden's Florida State teams have played 117 games. He has won 83 of those. And nobody, but nobody, has played a consistently tougher schedule. But this isn't a story of wins and losses. Those figures are well-documented. This is the story of Bobby Bowden the man.

What Bobby Bowden gives Florida



State goes much deeper than just a football coach. Encompassed in this 56-year-old fireball is the very essence of Florida State football. He is the spokesman, the personality, the heart and soul of the program he has built into a national power. Never assuming that he is bigger than the program itself. Bowden has been able to mold it into a family that reflects his philosophy.

Quite simply, what he does on the football field is only a small portion of what makes this man tick. With a never-ending supply of energy, Bowden, it seems, has never slowed down since the family doctor whacked him on the fanny on Nov. 8, 1929 in Birmingham, Ala.

As good as Bowden has become at winning football games, he just may have missed his true calling in life. He would be an absolute gem as a (1) public relations man; (2) salesman; (3) motivational speaker; (4) golf pro; (5) politician; (6) teacher; (7) minister; or (8)comedian. It just might be that the right combination of all of those Bowden traits is what makes great football coaches.

Bobby Bowden loves people. He thrives on public contact. He loves to talk and he's darn good at it. Most of all, he loves to talk with whomever will listen. There are no status lines with this man. President Reagan may very well have a 15-minute wait outside the coach's office while he finishes his interview with the Gadsden County Times. But even Ronnie would find it worth the wait. From the moment Bobby stands up from his chair with the familiar "Hey, buddy," you feel like you're the first human he's seen in weeks. It's a rare man indeed who can make everyone seem just a little bit special.

How about this revelation: Bobby Bowden gets along fantastically with the media. Let's take it a step further. Bobby Bowden likes the media. He studies and understands the media and its function. He is, very possibly, as comfortable in a room full of sportswriters as in a coaches' meeting. In some ways, talking to the press has become therapy for him—a way to unwind after a big game or relax before one.

His magic has touched the press. He is painfully sincere with them. He goes out of his way to accommodate them. And he does it in a way that is not phony. You can't fool these people over a long haul. Journalists are perhaps the most skeptical of all breeds and yet those who have dealt with Bowden not only respect him,

but many times marvel at his openness and honesty. A vast majority even count him as a friend.

It would be hard to imagine any other coach as aware of the media and in tune with its business. He reads newspaper clips from throughout the South on a daily basis. One day without clips puts him on edge. He studies the writers, knows their styles and remembers what they write and when. Invariably he will make a written or verbal comment about a story that was particularly well done. Writers are continually amazed by his attentiveness and retention of their respective work.

And he shows no favoritism to the "print" side either. Once he came out of the locker room 30 minutes before kickoff in Lincoln, Nebraska, to do a live sideline interview with an Omaha TV station. Most coaches would be tough to corral anytime inside 24 hours before kickoff, much less 30 minutes.

Yes sir, Florida State is a favorite stop for those folks. It's a dream "beat" thanks to Bobby.

Bowden has another ingredient that projects a positive image for Florida State. He is a truly great speaker. He is an absolute smash on the banquet circuit. His talks are informative, inspirational, entertaining and funny. Through the years Bowden has become increasingly quick-witted. His off-the-cuff remarks have become legendary—many of them printed in various publications. He is an outstanding joke-teller, as well, and has the art that keeps his audiences rolling in the aisles.

Most importantly, he has not lost the ability to laugh at himself. This man who many place on a pedestal is only human and he goes out of his way to admit it. Many of his funniest stories come from true every-day-life human situations. Bobby's wife, Ann, many times takes some ribbing. A polished speaker herself, she never hesitates to give it back to the coach. Never were two people so perfectly matched.



The Bowdens are extremely family conscious. Parents of six children and an ever-increasing number of grand-children, they can't seem to find enough time to get together. At least once a year they try to rally the clan and that is a very special time.

With three sons and a son-in-law in the coaching profession Bowden tells of how Ann now lives and dies by the scores of all her son's teams. Saturday night phone calls of each of them signals a happy weekend or a sad one around the Bowden household. Tommy Bowden is the offensive coordinator at Duke and Terry is an assistant coach at Akron. Son-in-law Jack Hines—married to daughter Robin—is on Bowden's staff at FSU, as is Bowden's youngest, Jeff. All four played college football under Bobby.

A fourth Bowden son, Steve, is a Baptist minister in Alabama, and Ginger, the youngest daughter, lives in Ft. Walton Beach, Fla., with her husband, former FSU player John Madden. Football is in the blood of this family!

There is one thing that sits atop of this with The Coach. God. Bobby Bowden is a very religious man. He does not curse, does not smoke or drink. He is around those who do much of the time. But he is the kind who teaches by quiet example, not loud talk. Bobby saves his preaching for the pulpit.

He is called on to preach to congregations throughout the area. He does so as often as he can, many times sacrificing precious free time he could spend at home.

Through all of the demands on his time, Bobby Bowden, maintains a strong control over his football team. He does not sidestep the problems that arise when 100 young men are involved. He has his set rules and they are adhered to completely. Players who don't follow the rules are dealt with by the Coach himself. All players are treated alike in his area. Bowden has suspended or dismissed players with great athletic ability as well as those without.


He is a man who is too good to be true. Solid citizen, family man, optimistic, enthusiastic, energetic, Godfearing Bobby Bowden. There is just one other thing. Bobby Bowden hates to lose. He is a fierce competitor whose drive to succeed has led him to where he is today. If his football record isn't a case in point, try him on the golf course.


"I'd play 36 holes a day if I had the time," he says. "I really would. It gives me a chance to compete—and I love to compete. I don't even have to have an opponent. I can compete by myself—for low score—and have a great time."

Bowden claims golf is a way to let off steam—his one recreational outlet. "When I go after something, I go after it hard," he says. "It has always been that way. I don't know—it's in my blood."

It seems that Florida State football has always been in Bowden's blood as well. He's the man who will forevermore be known as the savior of the program. The traits that have made Bobby Bowden what he is are not all that unique. But, it's the wonderful blend of all of the above that make Florida State fans everywhere glad he's our coach.



# **Fumbling Follies**

Seventeen years have come and gone since the Wichita State Shockers last visited, Tallahassee, Fla. It's probably just as well, since their last meeting resembled a swim meet as much as it did a football game.

Seventeen years ago on a rainy day in September the Shockers and the Seminoles tallied up a record total of 27 fumbles, 17 of which resulted in turnovers and still remain in bold digits in the NCAA record book as the most fumbles recorded in one game. That's quite an honor to bestow upon two teams who were not even trying to attain such an ugly feat. There are no other words to describe such a ridiculous achievement than the "fumbling follies."

In a matter of 50 minutes, 12 different players managed to dribble the pigskin 12 times.

Before the game the rain came down for two days and two nights and on a damp, dark Friday night Wichita State head coach Ben Wilson and his team landed in Thomasville as they could not land in Tallahassee because of low visibility.

"I remember them having to land in Thomasville," said former Florida State head coach Bill Peterson. "The rain had come down continuously for two days, and Ben and I briefly discussed postponing the game, but it was only a passing comment that went disregarded."

The only other time speculation arose concerning playing a game in the rain was a 1954 contest against Texas Christian.

"We discussed it and probably would have waited the rain out but since TCU is a church school they couldn't have played on Sunday," said Peterson.

Fortunately for the Seminoles the game went on as planned against Wichita State, and Florida State came out of the mud bath 24 points better than their shocked opponents.

One key word can best be used in describing the fabulous fumbling folly . . . consistency.

It may not be the kind of consistency



a coach looks for in his players, but it was consistency nonetheless. In a matter of 50 minutes, 12 different players managed to dribble the pigskin 27 times. Not to mention two blocked punts and three interceptions which typified the dreaded dropsies.

Several players had the fumblitis more than once — Wichita State quarterback Bruce Dusharm fumbled six times, losing four. And WSU running back Kenny Lee fumbled four times, including twice on the same play. At one point in the game the ball was exchanged on three successive series by fumbles.

"It was incredible," said Peterson, whose team had managed to lose the ball three times before the half. "The only thing I can remember about that halftime is that I was damned mad, and I told the boys to wrap the ball up and squeeze it like they never had before."

Squeeze it they did, right into the Shockers' hands four more times before the night was over. Don't be misled though, Wichita returned the favor, fumbling to FSU a grand total of ten times.

The game started on a freak fumble when an FSU snap was lost on a Grant Guthrie field goal attempt, and the game ended just as it began - with Wichita State quarterback Dusharm fumbling. However, these two fumbles served only as bookends for 25 more which stacked up in between.

If NFL films producer Ed Sabol and his crew would have been on hand for this fumbling phenomenon they would



# Making it Work

Last week, Tribe Magazine published Part I of profiles on the men behind the Florida State football scene — the assistant coaches. In part II of this article, we take a closer look at running back coach Billy Sexton, receiver coach John Eason, offensive coordinator Wayne McDuffie and strength coach Dave Van Halanger.

#### **Billy Sexton**



Next to outside linebacker coach Jim Gladden, Billy Sexton has the most tenure on the Florida State staff — serving in a full-time capacity since 1977.

He played his college ball at Alabama after a terrific playing career at Tallahassee's Leon High School, before transferring to Florida State for his senior season in 1973 - leading the Seminoles that season in passing yards and touchdown passes. Sexton coached two years at Leon High, before returning to Florida State in 1976 as a graduate assistant coach.

From 1977-81, Sexton coached the FSU quarterbacks. He moved on to assume the role of recruiting coordinator in 1982, before assuming his current position of running back coach the following year. In addition to his duties with the FSU backs, he also heads up the film exchange and the walkon programs.

"Coaching for a career never really entered my mind until my last year at Florida State as a player," Sexton says. "After my senior year I went to the World Football League's franchise in Detroit, where I thought I would begin a professional career. That lasted all of one week. That's when it hit me. I had always been around the game since I was a little kid and then all of a sudden I couldn't play any more. That's when I decided that coaching was what I wanted to do."

Sexton, who calls the move into coaching a natural one, says he still enjoys the profession 13 years later. "A lot of guys start to burn out after 10 years," Sexton says. "But I have always been in love with it. There's really no part of coaching on the college level I don't like."

Some coaches cite recruiting as a least favorite activity, mainly because of the time it takes away from their families. And although Sexton admits that is a problem, he still likes the challenge it brings. "I'm very fortunate in that my wife Joy understands that in order to be successful in this business you have to put in the time. Recruiting can be tough on the family and for that reason it can be trying at times," he says. "But at the same time, I see it as a battle. The same way a game is a battle. You're competing against other great teams for talent. When you look at it in that light, you realize it can be fun."

For Sexton, the biggest rewards of coaching come from the personal satisfaction of seeing a player mature. "Leaving home for the first time is one of the toughest things for a young man to do. He comes to college as an 18-year-old youngster who many times feels lost," Sexton says. "The greatest reward is to see him develop into a man. We, as coaches, have a responsibility to provide guidance and leadership to these athletes and when we're successful at that, it makes the job worthwhile."

The possibility of a head coaching job down the line is what motivates Sexton. "Eventually I'd like to be a head coach," Sexton says. "It is my career goal and hopefully it will pan out for

For relaxation, Sexton enjoys the links as his escape in the summer. But even on the golf course, his competitive nature is there. He plays to a four handicap when he's in top form.

#### Dave Van Halanger



Although only in his fourth season with Florida State, Dave Van Halanger's association with Bobby Bowden dates back to 1972 when he played for Bowden at West Virginia. He was an All-East and honorable mention All-America offensive tackle by the time he was a senior in 1975.

During his senior season, Van Halanger helped lead the Mountaineers to a 9-3 record and a Peach Bowl Championship. He began his coaching career in 1978, serving as head junior varsity coach at his alma mater. He assumed the position as WVU's first full-time strength coach in 1980 and stayed there until June of 1983 when he joined Bowden's staff.

Like most assistants in college football, Van Halanger had started as a graduate assistant at WVU after a brief professional career with the Atlanta Falcons. He worked with the offensive line, started the strength program and coached the junior varsity team.

It was during the 1979 season that he realized that he wanted to become a strength coach, instead of a football coach. "That year (1979) was really a tough one at West Virginia," he says. "We worked so hard, only to have a losing season. Frank Cignetti was head coach then and was dismissed after the season. The year before doctors had discovered he had a rare form of cancer. Although he was able to beat it, the disease almost took his life. That's what


### Seminole Saturday Night Fever





reaching its peak. Renegade and Chief Osceola gallop to the 50-yard-line. Renegade rears up on his hind legs and Chief Osceola plants the fiery spear into the turf. This is what the crowd of 60,000 has been waiting for.

The roar of the crowd is deafening. The moment the spear hits the ground, thousands of balloons are released, filling the Tallahassee sky with garnet and gold while the Marching Chiefs play the FSU fight song in the background.


# The Marching Chiefs


The Marching Chiefs, some 350 members strong, are the band behind the Florida State fight song. They are as much a part of college football in Tallahassee as the game itself.

# **FSU Frequent Flyers**

SEE EXCITING LANDS. PERFECT TECHNICAL SKILLS THAT CAN HELP YOU WITH YOUR CAREER. AND DO ALL THIS WHILE YOU GO TO COLLEGE

Does this sound like a typical Armed Forces advertisement? No, it's just the lifestyle that FSU track All-Americans Michelle Finn and Ocky Clark have become accustomed to. Each has logged enough airline mileage to qualify as a frequent flyer. During their careers, Finn and Clark have been invited to participate in meets around the globe in such faraway places as England, West Germany, Cuba, Japan and the Soviet Union.

Of the two, perhaps the most traveled is Finn. She was no stranger to international competition when she chose Florida State over 22 other colleges four years ago as a senior at Orlando Oak Ridge. The high school All-American and state 100-yard dash champion won a spot on the 1983 junior national team that set a junior national world record.

She continued that success early in her career at FSU. During her freshman season, Finn played a key role in the Lady Seminoles' climb to the national championship, placing fourth and ninth in the 100 and 200 meter dashes, respectively. She also ran the lead-off leg on FSU's national champion 100 meter relay team. Finn was not surprised to score more points in the NCAA meet than any other freshman.

"It really wasn't a big deal for me to go to the NCAA meet," Finn says. "I was used to running against three of the top sprinters in the country in Randy Givens, Brenda Cliette and Marita Payne at practice every day. If I had been an athlete from another school on the outside looking in, I wouldn't have wanted to run against Florida State."

Finn made believers of the track establishment by following up her sensational freshman campaign when she won both the NCAA indoor 55 meter and the outdoor 100 meter NCAA titles. Finn's performance in the indoor nationals helped the Lady Seminoles to their second national title in as many tries and landed her personal invitations to a number of prestigious meets, including the World University games, where she ran on the gold medal-winning 400 meter relay team.

Finn's competition has learned one thing over the past few years - never count the 21-year-old out of any race. Finn simply thrives on competition. A look at her top five performances reveals that each time occured in pressure situations against national caliber competition.

"She does all the things necessary to prepare herself to do her best," FSU head coach Terry Long says. "Michelle has one ability that rises above the rest. She knows how to compete and she will compete. The tougher the meet the better her performances will be."

The introverted Finn agrees. "I'm a self motivator," she says. "I'm not afraid of competition: I like it. I do my best when the pressure is on."

Finn placed fifth in the 100 meters at the NCAA Championships last June, somewhat of a disappointment by Finn standards. But, she went on to culminate the season in the Goodwill Games which was televised by the Superstation WTBS from Moscow. Teaming with Diane Williams, former FSU Olympian Givens, and 1984 Olympic Gold medalist Evelyn Ashford, Finn helped bring home a gold medal in the 400 meter relay.

Finn will graduate next summer or fall with a degree in rehabilitative services and believes that her final track season at FSU will be an important test for her 1988 Olympic hopes. She missed qualifying for the 1984 United States team by just one place at the Olympic trials.

"I'm looking forward to 1988," she says. "I need to have good spring and Cont. on Page 60

really opened my eyes. I had just gotten married and to see those coaches put so much time and work into something, only to be measured by how many wins you got really turned me off. That's when I decided that strength coach was the direction I wanted to go."

When Don Neheln took over the Mountaineer program in 1980, he named Van Halanger as his full-time strength coach. "In a way I was fortunate to be getting into the business at the same time the profession was taking off," Van Halanger says. "The position of strength coach was mostly a parttime or graduate position at most places up until the mid-to-late 1970's."

Van Halanger's current position is a dream come true for him. "This is what I want to do with my life," he says. "It gives me a chance to stay close to athletics and to do what I believe I can do best — help the athlete. At the same time, the job doesn't tie me down quite as much as it does the regular assistants as far as the late night hours or out of town recruiting trips. It gives me a chance to be with my family more and to keep involved in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and other organizations that are important to me."


On the job, it's working with the players that Van Halanger finds most satisfying. "People tend to look at a 6-6, 275-lb. player and view him as a man," Dave says. "The fact is that he's an 18-year-old boy out of high school. Because football regiments his life, he's told where to go and what to do on a schedule. Unless someone takes the time to counsel him, to sit down and talk to him, he may be in trouble when his playing career is over. That's what I try to do in my job — help him become the biggest and strongest player he can be, but at the same time make him a stronger person emotionally. When you can do that, it's a great feeling."

Van Halanger also points to rewards of hard work. "Obviously the measurable results are important. When I came here we had three guys who could bench 400; that number is now over 20. Our average player weighed 208, now he weighs 228. Our average bench press went from 280 to 330. From a strength coach's view, we've been successful and we will always strive to improve."

Away from the job, Van Halanger lists spending time with his wife Michele and two daughters as the most important thing in his life. "Family is most important other than your relationship with God," he says. "I heard a speaker the other day who quoted an interesting study. A survey in 1965 of the nation's high schools listed talking in class and running in halls as the major problems in the school system. In 1985,

the same people did a follow-up survey. The main problems were drug abuse, followed by alcohol abuse, followed by teen pregnancy and suicide. I think all that falls back on is family and family values. That's why I believe my job entails more than just building strong bodies."

#### John Eason



After a standout career at Florida A&M, John Eason went on to play professional football with the Oakland Raiders and then with the Montreal Allouettes. His coaching career started at Ocala High School in 1971 and included prep stops at Leon and Lincoln High Schools in Tallahassee. He joined Bowden's staff in 1980 and has coached wide receivers ever since for the Seminoles.

"I always loved the game and I guess that's why I got into coaching after my playing days," he begins. "After 10 years though, I decided to get out of it and I accepted the job of assistant principle at Lincoln High. Then Coach Bowden called and said he had an opening and wanted to talk to me. Halfway into the interview, he said he had a good feeling about me but he was committed to someone else. He asked if I would be interested in the job if the other guy turned it down. I said yes."

Eason returned to Lincoln and for the next month did not hear from Bowden. "I figured the other guy was in and just forgot about the whole situation." But shortly after, Bowden called again and Eason knew he would be offered the job. "I was still not sure I wanted the job," he says. "I don't fly very well and I remember a trip to a coaching clinic at Duke. I got sick on the plane and had a

# Wichita State Scouting Report

The Wichita State Shockers enter tonight's game against Florida State on the heels of a two-game winning streak after squeaking past Central Florida 9-6 last Saturday in a rainy, muddy and cold Cessna Stadium in Wichita. Sophomore placekicker Brad Fleeman tied a school record for most field goals in a game, hitting field goals of 21, 32, and 31 yards to lead the Shockers over the Knights.

In the Central Florida contest, senior quarterback Brian McDonald moved into second place in several Wichita State career offensive categories. In addition to holding Wichita State's career record for touchdown passes, McDonald now ranks second in career passing yardage, total offense, pass completions and pass attempts.

Since Coach Ron Chismar came to Wichita State in March of 1984, the Shockers' talent level has steadily increased and significant progress has been made in all areas off the field. After recording 2-9 and 3-8 marks in 1984 and 1985, respectively, Chismar felt 1986 was the year for the Shockers to make headway in the win column if they were to continue on a course toward respectability and competitiveness as a Division I-A independent.

The Shockers appeared to be well on their way after opening the season at home with a 69-6 thrashing of Division II opponent San Francisco State. The Shockers jumped to a 14-0 lead less than two minutes into the contest, one which marked Wichita State's first as a Division I-A independent school. The Missouri Valley Conference dropped its sponsorship of football after the 1985 season.

The Shockers scored on 10 of their 14 possessions against the Golden Gators, including an 87-yard punt return by junior Anthony Harvey, an 80-yard run by senior tailback Valasco Smith and a 4-yard return of a blocked punt by senior linebacker Terry Green.

Smith, a 5-7, 180 lb. speedster from Tallahassee's Lincoln High, established a Shocker record with five rushing touchdowns, scoring on runs of 25, 12, 7, 80 and 3 yards. He also rambled for a career high 103 yards — the seventh best single game effort in Shocker history.

In week number two, the Shockers suffered a 30-13 road loss to the Toledo Rockets, a member of the Mid

American Conference. The victory was the second in as many years for the Rockets over WSU. Toledo running back Kelvin Farmer established a career high for rushing with 195 yards and three TDs in Wichita State's worst defensive rushing game of the year.

Wichita State greatly aided the Toledo cause in the contest. The Shockers were penalized nine times for 100 yards, including six that resulted in Toledo first downs. Twice, Toledo converted fake punts into first downs to keep alive touchdown drives. The Shockers also snapped the ball out of the endzone for a safety, missed a 40-yard field goal attempt and tossed an interception into the endzone to kill a scoring threat.



Week number three against Morehead State provided the setting for an unbelievable turn of events. WSU let a 35-3 halftime lead slip away in the closing moments as Morehead State rallied for a 36-35 triumph.

While rolling to their early lead, the Shockers got TD runs of 47 and 39 yards from Smith, and a 36-yard scoring return of an interception pass by strong safety Chris Badciong. After pulling within 35-28 with 1:54 to play, the Eagles successfully conducted an on-side kick, then drove 55 yards for a touchdown with 0:27 to play. More-

head State missed the tying extra point but the Shockers were called offside on the play. On the ensuing play, quarterback Adrian Green dashed in with the 2-point conversion and the victory.

The Shocker offense ran into a stiff Iowa State defense in its fourth game. It was the Shockers' third consecutive loss to their midwest rival; a 36-14 setback. The Cyclones broke to a 16-0 halftime lead and expanded the margin to 29-0 before the Shockers got onto the scoreboard. In the fourth quarter, breaking a string of five scoreless quarters, sophomore quarterback David Kruse connected with Hardy on two scoring tosses late in the game. Kruse passed for 141 yards and freshman fullback Eric Gilstrap rushed for 57 yards to highlight the Shockers attack.

The Shockers' defense bounced back from the Morehead State second-half onslaught with a strong showing against the Cyclones. Wichita State limited Iowa State to 134 yards rushing and came up with four quarterback sacks.

Two weeks ago WCU put an end to its three-game losing streak by running up 21 second-half points to defeat Tulane 21-20 in the Superdome. The Green Wave scored just 38 seconds into the game and had a chance to break open the contest when it marched to the Shocker 1-vard line on its next two possessions, but fumbled the ball away both times. Trailing 10-0 at the half, Wichita State drove for touchdowns on its first two possessions of the third quarter and scored again in the fourth quarter on an 89-yard drive-all of the yardage came on the ground after Tulane had regained the lead, 20-14.

The Shockers will be looking for another stong defensive performance in tonight's contest, only the second meeting ever between the schools.

Chismar feels Florida State, coming off a 54-21 pasting of Tulane, is his team's biggest challenge to date. "Florida State will be a major test for our kids," Chismar said. "They are a very, very explosive team on offense and have been playing very solid defense."



"I do it because of the pictures," Eason says as he points to his office walls. On the walls, he has a color photo of about a dozen players. "Every guy up there has graduated except Hassan and I know he's going to come back and finish. That's what makes the job worthwhile. These guys came in and worked hard at football but also got their education. I'm proud of the players we sent into pro football, but I'm equally proud of the guys like Phil Williams and Jeff Bowden who knew they would never play pro football but gave us their best anyway. They got

their degrees and are now successful in other careers."


Eason sees recruiting as the least enjoyable part of the job. "I don't dislike it that much," he says. "But it really bothers me when we get a verbal commitment to sign or a commitment to visit and then the young man changes his mind at the last minute. That part is discouraging and it happens a lot. You begin to ask — was it something I said or should I have approached him in a different way?"

As with most coaches, time away from family 10 months a year is also a drain. "It really hit home with me during our off week before the Tulane game," Eason says. "I took my threeyear-old daughter for a walk and just being outside and enjoying the day was great. When we had our first practice the next week I got home at around 8:00 p.m. - it was dark but my daughter came up and wanted to go for a walk. That's when I realized how much time this job really takes. Fortunately my wife Dorothy understands that it is the life of a coach because I really couldn't do it without her."



A 1968 graduate of Florida State, Wayne McDuffie lettered three years during a time when FSU went 21-10-2 and played in three consecutive bowl games. He started his coaching career working with the Florida State offensive line in 1973; while making coaching stops at New Mexico (1974), Oklahoma State (1975-76), Georgia

summer seasons. I would like to add a couple more NCAA titles and All-American awards."

Already Finn is ranked sixth and seventh in the 100 and 200 meter dashes in the U.S. and is eyeing next year's World Championships in Rome as a springboard to success in the 1988 Olympic trials.

Also working toward the Olympic year is Clark, who arrived at Florida State through a much more indirect route. Clark's storybook journey began in 1977 as an underclassman at Seminole High School in Sanford. While at Seminole, a perennial track powerhouse, Clark remembers sitting underneath the stands while the Sanford team took a victory lap after caputirng its annual conference championship. "I felt that since I didn't score any points, I didn't deserve to run in the victory lap," he says. Clark had improved by his senior year and ran a 1:58 half mile, but that was about six seconds too slow to be recruited by any junior college, much less a four-year

Upon graduation in 1979, Clark joined the Navy and was stationed off the Washington coast on the U.S.S. Enterprise which was in port under repair. He used his two-and-a-half year enlistment as an opportunity to continue running; it provided an outlet from the rigors of living aboard a ship. "I still wanted to run after high school," Clark says. "I had some free time, so I would go run in the mountains."

During his training, a startling metamorphosis took place. Clark made dramatic progress, cutting his time by almost eight seconds in a Naval meet in Annapolis, Maryland. "I'll never forget that race when I ran a 1:51.65," Clark says. "I was so excited; I knew that it was my ticket to get out of the Navy and move on to college."

Clark's good fortunes continued when he returned home to Sanford and talked to Charlie Harris, a former FSU All-American who coached track at a nearby high school. Harris called his former coach Terry Long, who was then head track coach at Santa Fe Community College in Gainesville. "They talked for about an hour on the phone," Clark says. "Coach Long was willing to risk a scholarship on me when he hadn't seen me run in three years."

Clark's father passed away two years ago and Long became a close friend at Santa Fe. "Since that time he's been like a father to me," Clark says.

The rehabilitative services major had a pair of banner years at Santa Fe

and was named to the junior college All-American team. He was set to join Long, who was named head women's coach across town at Florida, but he didn't pass a math class and was forced to take the class again. He passed the class the next term, but backed out of his commitment to the Gators upon learning Long had accepted the same position at FSU.

Long is glad that Clark rejoined him in Tallahassee. "He's an excellent role model," Long says. "One of the great things about Ocky is that not only is he an outstanding athlete, but he's concerned about his teammates and other people. He's more happy when someone else does well than himself."



Clark has responded to the tutalege of FSU's head men's coach Dick Roberts and Long. In the 1985 National Sports Festival in Baton Rouge, he ran a 1:45.29 in the 800 meters — that's just one second above world class standards. He went on to place fifth in both the indoor and outdoor NCAA Championships last spring while wearing an FSU uniform.

At 5-11 and 155 pounds, Ocky (short for Octavius) has the ideal slim physique to race in the 800 or 1500 meters, and he has no regrets when reflecting on his long journey to Florida State.

"I never would have thought I'd be where I am now," the 24 year-old says. "I enjoyed the bad times I went through. It has helped me appreciate how I have progressed."

Over the next two years, both Finn and Clark will continue to add up the frequent flyer mileage and bring smiles to the faces of their travel agents. But the two have one more stop left to fulfill their Olympic aspirations — a plane ticket to the 1988 Olympics in Seoul, South Korea.



# Florida State University...

Florida State University, a coeducational institution and a senior member of the nine universities in the state system, is in Tallahassee, Florida, the state's capital.

Located just a few blocks from the Capitol, the Florida State campus is considered to be one of the most beautiful in the Southeast. The 347-acre campus is covered with hardwoods, pines and palms as well as springtime greenery that combines the blossoms of camellias, azaleas and dogwoods.

The approximately 22,500 students currently enrolled at Florida State learn from a faculty of over 1,500, which includes four members of the National Academy of Sciences.

FSU was established in 1857, when the governor of Florida, James E. Broom, signed a bill establishing the Seminary West of the Suwannee River in Tallahassee. The school consisted of one building located on 10 acres of land.

By 1860, the school, not yet a college, had an enrollment of 250. The president of the seminary organized the school into a four-year liberal arts college in 1887. At its first commencement in June 1891, degrees were conferred on two women and five men. Ten years later, the institution was renamed Florida State College. In 1905, it became Florida Female College, and in 1909 the name was changed to Florida State College for Women.


In 1945, FSCW took on the additional title, Tallahassee Branch of the University of Florida (TBUF), due to the fact that GIs stationed nearby were attending classes at the women's school, but, as men, couldn't legally enroll.

Gov. Millard Caldwell signed a bill in 1947 making both the University of Florida and FSCW coeducational. FSCW became Florida State University.

Florida State now offers students the opportunity to choose from more than 100 career options in arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, education, engineering, home economics, law, library and information studies, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theater and visual arts. Honors programs are available for top students.

The University has been recognized by the Board of Regents for its continuing leadership at the graduate levels of education.

# **Home of the Seminoles**



Overseas study programs in fields ranging from law to hotel and restaurant administration are offered in Florence, Italy; Oxford and London, England; Switzerland, Yugoslavia, Costa Rica and the Panama Canal Zone.

The University's location in the state capital affords excellent study, research and internship opportunities in the areas of government, social sciences, law and policy sciences.

Florida State is setting the pace as higher education in Florida prepares to enter the 21st century. One of the few institutions of learning in the United States with its own supercomputer, FSU is attracting researchers from around the globe.

The Bay County Commission purchased 21 acres, 16 of which make up Phase I of the new campus. The remaining acreage will be available for expansion into technical degree programs such as engineering and science.

Social life for many students in Tallahassee centers around 24 fraternities and 20 sororities. Wind surfing, swimming and sunning are among the activities to be enjoyed at FSU's lakeside "Reservation" or along the sandy beaches of nearby coasts. In the fall, the campus goes wild for football, supporting the Seminoles both at home and away.

When it comes to intercollegiate athletics, Florida State has established a winning tradition. Both the men's and women's athletic programs are among the nation's best.

A unique extracurricular activity is the Flying High Circus, the nation's only all-collegiate circus. Students from every academic major can become stars on the flying trapeze or highwire, or in clown acts.

Florida State is growing. Construction has begun on the Florida A&M

University/FSU College of Engineering Building, located adjacent to Innovation Park, two miles southwest of the FSU campus. It is expected to be completed by October 1987.


Construction began last fall on the new student union complex and construction is expected to be completed in 1987 on the Science Center Library.

Plans are also underway for a \$12.1 million multipurpose student gym, approved by the 1986 Legislature, as well as improvements to the central utility plant and renovation of the old Music Building (Music School South).

The College of Law's Village Green project has begun. When completed, the \$3.8 million project will feature four restored historic homes to be used as study, meeting and reception areas.


FSU President Bernard P. Sliger takes pride not only in the programs, but also in the people—students, faculty, administrators and staff—who make Florida State a successful monument to learning.





LOST CHILDREN: Lost children should report to the police station in the stadium's southeast corner or to the First Aid Station for assistance in locating their parents.


CONCESSIONS: Concessions are available from vendors in the stands as well as from concession stands under the east and west concourses.

# International Programs at Florida State

Florida State University is spanning the globe. Its outreach extends throughout the world. It gets around.

From the Panama Canal Zone to Florence, Italy, the major commitments FSU is making to international study, the internationalization of the curriculum and other study opportunities in several foreign locations.

FSU has provided undergraduate education from members of the U.S. Armed Forces stationed in Panama since 1957. Also attending are Panamanian and U.S. civilian, who comprise more than 45 percent of the student population at the Panama Canal branch. The branch centers on the Pacific and Atlantic sides of the Isthmus of Panama.

The Center for Yugoslav-American Studies, Research and Exchanges, located on the FSU campus since 1961, administers an inter-university program in Comparative Policy Studies. It encourages research in the social, legal physical sciences and facilitates exchanges of scholars between the United States and Yugoslavia. Close cooperative relationships are maintained with the Universities of Belgrade, Zagreb and Titograd as well as the Inter-University Centre for Post-Graduate Studies in Dubrovnik.

The University also operates International Study Centers in London, England, and in Florence, Italy. The centers are part of the state university system and are open to all university students in Florida on an availablespace basis. Currently, more than 200 students each year study in these overseas centers.

The Department of Classics conducts annual archaeological excavations at the Etruscan and Roman site of Cetamura, in the district of Chianti. near Florence, Italy. The excavation is an important part of the master's degree program with a concentration in classical archaeology. The field school also is open to undergraduate students in the state university system.

Collegians have the opportunity to discover a new world of hotels, restaurants, foods and wines through the European Summer Study Program in Hospitality Administration. The sixweek program began in 1972 and is conducted annually from early May through mid-June in Leysin, Switerland.

Since 1973, the College of Law has conducted a summer program of study at Oxford University in England. About .80 law students from Florida, other states and Canada are taught annually by FSU College of Law faculty and tenured dons of the University of Ox-

The Spanish and Inter-American departments administer an eight-week program in San Jose, Costa Rica, each summer. The program is located within the Bi-National Cultural Center which is administered by the U.S. Information Service and the U.S. Embassy in San

FSU participates with International Schools Services in offering access to



the Taishan China Study Program under the auspices of Shongstan University-South China's most prestigious university. Students can earn 15 semester hours of academic credit in the program.

Also, the Learning System Institute conducts a range of research and development activities in the area of educational technology. The programs are designed to provide training and technical assistance to educational institutions and agencies both within and outside the United States.

International education at Florida State is a two-way street. The University offers U.S. students the opportunity to study and be exposed to the cultures of other countries, while more than 550 students from 82 countries come to the Tallahassee campus to study.





against each other and find new stars," said Sexton. "Spring practice is definitely the best time for a walk-on to make a move."

Those earning scholarships along with Sutton this past spring due to their excellent performance were defensive tackle Bart Schucts and fullback Dayne Williams. Schucts, a transfer from Georgia Southern and Williams, who transferred from South Florida Junior College where he had a baseball scholarship, literally came out of nowhere to earn their scholarships. In Williams' case, his impressive performance came at the right time. "With the loss of Cletis (Jones) and injuries to Chuck Wells and Tanner Holloman, it left only David Palmer, Reno Fells and myself," Williams said. "I had to run hard and prove that I could do the job." Both Williams and Schucts have seen major playing time in the Tribes' first five games.

Another former walk-on is a familiar name to Tallahasseans. Leon High graduate Tanner Holloman, like Sutton, walked on to the FSU team after leaving a scholarship at the University of Tennessee prior to the 1983 season. He struggled in choosing between academics and football before finally deciding to join the team in the fall of

1985. "Many people thought I could not handle it physically after not playing football for two years," Holloman said. "But I had football on my mind."

Holloman worked hard prior to the 1985 season and played at fullback in every game but the Gator Bowl, rushing 12 times for 57 yards. Following the season, he was awarded a scholarship. "They knew all along I was worth it," he said. "But it was something I had to prove first."

He has confirmed that he was worthy of earning the scholarship. Through five games, Holloman has been the starter at fullback four times.

Although it took a lot of hard work and determination, Holloman is happy to be playing in Tallahassee and for the Seminoles. "Playing on the same field with Darrin (Holloman, his brother) makes my mom and dad happy. Being able to do that makes me happy."

The love of the game also draws young men out of the classroom and onto the field. Curtis Thomas, a junior defensive back from Thomasville, GA. came to Florida State on an academic scholarship. Even though he was an allregion wide receiver in his senior year, he had no real publicity and only offers from small schools. When he decided to try out as a walk-on, he knew it would

be tough. "I was serious about playing and I knew I would have to work hard,' Thomas said. "The scholarship athletes get the first look; being a walk-on I had to make coaches notice me to get a second look." Today Thomas plays on the specialty teams and serves as a backup cornerback. He has made the travel squad each of the last two years.

Each one of these young men also had to get financial support before he earned his scholarship and each one reflected on how it matured him. Riggs said that he was more careful about the way his money was spent during his year as a walk-on. "I made a consciencious effort to conserve money. I didn't want to abuse the money my parents were

Even though both scholarship athletes and walk-ons play for the same team and strive for the same goal, there is a difference between the two. "It's like two different worlds," said Dayne Williams. "Walk-ons have it tough; at first you must earn respect. After you go through all the practices and earn the scholarship you feel confident. Now I respect walk-ons, so does the rest of the team because it takes guts to go through

have taped enough footage to last them a good many years.

Through all the drizzle and drench, 38,821 loyal Seminole fans still turned out. One of them was Jeannie Dees, at the time the newly-married wife of Seminole center Allen Dees

"I remember I was just soaked," she said. "I stood under the grandstands with another of the players wives and we just cheered them on. I kind of expected them to call the game off but that's before I knew they played football wind, rain or shine.

"I told the boys to wrap it up and squeeze it like they never had before." - Bill Peterson

FSU quarterback Bill Cappleman's rendition of the game varied from some of his teammates.

"It's only typical that people tend to forget the bad things that happen to them, and I guarantee you fumbles aren't nice things to remember," said Cappleman, who fumbled twice. "The thing I remember most, beside the rain, is a 50-yard touchdown pass I completed to Tom (Bailey) on our first possession."

Somehow through all the mud and gunk, Cappleman managed 180 yards in the air on 12 completions.

"That Cappleman kid was out of sight," said Wilson after Cappleman's 1969 performance. "It was fantastic the way he threw the ball in this weather.'

Allen Dees, who was a red-shirt that year, remembers the game from the sidelines, and when asked what Peterson told them at halftime his comment was, "I don't remember exactly what he said, but I doubt if it could be printed.

Fumbles or no fumbles Peterson had the last word on that rainy day in '69 and he still has the last word today; "you never have to apologize for a win no matter what occurs in the midst," he said. Or the mist, for that matter.

the governance of the University, or the influence it has on the administration of the University and its operation. Faculty in general feel comfortable here. Their attitude is good. They are cooperative and loyal to the University. Obviously, it is the nature of faculty to be loyal to their discipline, but at many schools that is their only loyalty.

At FSU, there is a loyalty to the University as well as to the individual disciplines. So, we have an excellent faculty and we hope to continue to improve it. Berkeley is trying to woo one of our younger professors away from us. That is the kind of faculty we have here. And though you don't like to have to be confronted with other universities taking your faculty, it is a good indication you have a good faculty. We are really proud of our faculty!

**Gilmer:** What about other Florida State programs?

Sliger: We are not trying to be all things to everyone and everything, but certainly we are not going to let our humanities suffer. Our music program and our theater program are outstanding. So, we will continue to excel in those areas. In athletics we have good facilties. We probably could improve

them somewhat; there is always room for improvement. Our home schedule gets better, and that's a part of our fiveyear plan. As far as athletics are concerned, a five-year plan is a short-run plan because schedules are set so far in advance. But Hootie Ingram does a good



(1977-81) and with the Atlanta Falcons (1982). He returned to FSU in 1983 as offensive line coach and offensive coordinator.

Like fellow assistant Wally Burhham, it was his high school coach who influenced his decision most to enter coaching. "I guess I decided I wanted to be a coach way back in high school," McDuffie says. "I came from a small town and the high school football coach was probably the most respected man in the town. He was very successful and was very influential."

McDuffie half-jokingly refers to the profession as the "greatest in the world when you're winning and the worst in the world when you're losing." He lists his greatest satisfaction from the job as encouragement coming from explayers. "When they are in school, they don't always understand why we have to do certain things a certain way," he says. "To me, the greatest satisfaction in coaching comes when an ex-player comes back for a visit or you run into him somewhere and he thanks you for coaching him. Obviously you like to see all your players graduate and become successful members of society.'

As with several other staff members, McDuffie has experience in the professional ranks, but prefers the college game. He says the basic difference between the two is technology and maturity of the players. "The professional game is a little different from the coaching viewpoint in that it is a high tech game. Even the worst teams have great athletes. Unfortunately not all those players are dedicated to the game some will always try to get by on skill alone. Another area of difference is in maturity. In the pros, you were sometimes coaching guys who were as old or older than yourself. It's kind of hard to motivate players like that if they don't want to be motivated."

Recruiting is another difference between the professional and college games — and it's a difference McDuffie likes. "Some guys in this business just don't like to recruit," he says. "To me, it's one of the best parts of being a coach. For one thing, I like to think that by recruiting, I can control what type of person will be playing for us. Secondly, just like a game, recruiting is a battle. It's you against everybody else. You're trying to present your University as being the best place for a young man to play; the competition is doing the same thing. I enjoy those battles almost as much as I enjoy the games.'

McDuffie credits his wife, Toni, and family as part of his success. "If you didn't have an understanding family, you couldn't stay in this business," he says.
