
# Spartan Football '87

AN INSIDE LOOK AT THE SPARTANS AND THEIR OPPONENTS

## SPARTANS HOST NATION'S #1 SCORING TEAM: FLORIDA STATE SEMINOLES

What major college football team has already scored 125 points in its first three games while piling up an average of 529 yards per game?

If you said Florida State, you're absolutely right! Michigan State's opponent today has squashed its first three challengers on the way to high national ranking which, at press time, was seventh in both the AP and UPI polls.

The Seminoles opened at home with a 40-16 blasting of Texas Tech. Their first road contest resulted in a 44-3 crushing of East Carolina, as sophomore tailback Sammie Smith earned "Player of the Week" honors from *Sports Illustrated* for his 244 yards and one TD in 19 rushes. Last week, FSU made quick work of

Memphis State, jumping to a 21-0 lead in its first three possessions on the way to a 41-24 conquest.

FSU enters today's game as the nation's scoring leader, averaging 41.7 points per game. The Seminoles also rank third in the nation in total offense, averaging 529 yards per game, behind only Oklahoma and Nebraska.

### A LOOK AT FLORIDA STATE

To say Florida State can score is like saying Walter Payton can run. To say FSU has a good offense is like saying the New York Giants have a good team. Rather understated, but definitely true! FSU returns 18 starters and 42 of its top 50 players from last year's 7-4-1 team that beat Indiana in the All American Bowl.



MSU's middle linebacker Percy Snow has started his sophomore season on a strong note, leading the Spartans with 26 tackles after two games.


"Florida State has a lot of skilled athletes," Spartan coach George Perles says. "They have people that can really run the football."

And how! FSU's sophomore tailback tandem of Dexter Carter and Sammie Smith combined for 203 yards rushing last week versus Memphis State. Carter, 5-9 and 160 pounds, sprinted for 135 yards and two TDs in 15 carries, while Smith added 68 more in 13 tries. To date, Smith is averaging 9.8 yards per run. Not to be outdone, Carter amassed 311 all-purpose yards last week, adding four receptions for 63 yards and four kickoff returns for 113 more to his 135 yards on the ground.

"They're going to try to put points on the board by the running game," Perles figures. "If we overload in that area, they'll try to throw the football."

And throwing the ball is something the Seminoles also have excelled in to date. Senior QB Danny


McMannus has completed 40 of 78 passes (.510) for 632 yards and three TDs, with only two interceptions. Junior back-up Chip Ferguson has connected on 13 of 17 attempts (.765), while adding 153 yards and a TD to the air totals. Carter, second in rushing to Smith

(312 yards to 261), leads the FSU receivers with nine catches for 99 yards and one TD.

On defense, the Seminoles feature senior inside linebacker Paul McGowan (6-1, 224) who leads the team in tackles with 33 (20 unassisted and 13 assists) plus four tackles for loss. McGowan is a preseason All-America selection of *Street*

& Smith, as is junior cornerback Deion Sanders who is virtually a consensus All-American.

Last season, McGowan had especially fine games vs. Nebraska and Michigan. Against the Huskers, he registered 20 tackles (two for loss) and he collected 18 (one for loss) hits on the Wolverines.

### A LOOK AT MSU

Michigan State will try to bounce back from a disappointing 31-8 loss at Notre Dame last week. The Spartans got off on the wrong foot and could never seem to get untracked offensively. The key was a sterling performance by senior Tim Brown who accounted for 275 all-purpose yards for the Irish. The biggest blows, of course, were the two consecutive punt returns for touchdowns that vaulted ND into a 19-0 first quarter bulge that was too much to overcome.


"Offensively, we had problems because of getting so far behind," Perles notes. "It's a very tough place to be in that quarterback position when you are behind that many points. The element of surprise is gone. People know you have to play catch-up and go for the big plays."

"Our defense did a whale of a job most of the game."

They played hard, they hit hard, they hustled, they never hung their heads, they never looked tired, although they were on the field for quite some time. All our players, except Rob Stradley (knee), stayed healthy. It shows that we were giving out some hits on defense, but it was too much to overcome."


The Spartans trailed at half-time, 24-0, in spite of the fact that the Irish offense had not crossed the goal line. The scoring came on two safeties, two field goals and Brown's two punt returns.

The Spartans were limited to 21 net yards rushing, in-

cluding eight McAllister sacks for -39 yards. But the passing game produced 208 yards and the lone MSU touchdown, as McAllister hit 10 of 18 passes. Five of the completions were

claimed by Andre Rison for 137 yards, giving the junior from Flint a total of 10 catches for 213 yards in the first two games (21.3 yards per catch average).

Percy Snow continued to dish out punishment to opposing ball carriers with 13 tackles vs. ND, for a two-game team-leading total of 26.

"Percy shows he's an outstanding linebacker," Perles says. "He's as good as there is in this conference. It's not just that he makes the tackles; he has some impressive statistics. But when he gets there, he hits with such thunder that he's going to cause fumbles."



### QUOTING COACH PERLES

On the lessons he learned from his father: "My father never made mistakes. Everything he did was right. He always said to be on time. Always be organized. Always be honest. He sounded like Abraham Lincoln!"

On the Notre Dame game: "Percy Snow and Mark Nichols had great games. Harlon Barnett was a nice addition. He came in at corner and played very well. It's going to be tough to get him out of there. The defense never gave up much yardage in the running game; they didn't give up much yardage in the whole game. They contained their offense pretty well. But the fact is we lost the game and we certainly don't have many bouquets to give out in a losing effort. We lose as a team; we win as a team."

## EXTRA POINTS


MSU will try to improve its record to 2-1 with a win today, while Florida State hopes to advance to 4-0 and climb even higher in the national polls. Next up for MSU is a trip to Iowa to open the 1987 Big Ten schedule. Florida State will return to Tallahassee to tangle with Miami for a big in-state rivalry.

MSU's defense has been effective in both games to date. After limiting Southern Cal to 61 yards rushing and 13 points, the Spartans allowed Notre Dame only 252 total yards (112 passing, 140 rushing).

Lorenzo White still needs two TDs to tie MSU's career touchdown mark (31) held by Lynn Chandnois (1946-49). He also needs 31 yards to pass former Ohio State back Tim Spencer's 3,246 career rushing yards. If "Lo" picks up 80 yards, he will pass Kelvin Bryant's 3,295 yards, and 100 yards will surpass former Purdue great Otis Armstrong's 3,315 career yards.

Looking ahead, White needs 211 yards to move ahead of USC's Anthony Davis (3,426) and 216 to beat Michigan's Butch Woolfolk (3,431).


Gil Brandt, Dallas Cowboys' V.P. for Player Development, says of Lorenzo: "He's a strong-legged type of runner. He'll have a play where he should gain one or two yards and he gains six. Or he'll have a play where he should gain three or four and he'll gain 12."





**Head Coach**

**GEORGE PERLES**



After four seasons in East Lansing, Head Coach George J. Perles has sounded a warning to Big Ten football foes that Michigan State's gridiron program is once again on solid ground.

Since he took over as boss of Spartan football fortunes, the 53-year-old MSU graduate has re-established Michigan State's proud tradition in the sport. In the four years previous to Perles' arrival on the scene, State struggled to only 15 wins in 44 games. Since then, however, Perles has directed the Spartans to three consecutive winning records in regular-season play, the first time that's happened at MSU in 24 years.

During Perles' coaching reign, State has appeared in two postseason Bowl

games—the 1984 Cherry Bowl and the 1985 All American Bowl—and has posted an overall record of 23-22-1.

Four of Perles' athletes have gained first-team All-America status—linebacker Carl Banks and punter Ralf Mojsiejenko in 1983, tailback Lorenzo White in 1985 and punter Greg Montgomery in 1986. That quartet, plus Phil Parker, Jim Morrissey, John Wojciechowski, Shane Bullough and Andre Rison, have been first-team All-Big Ten selections. As equally outstanding to the athletic all-stars Perles has produced are first-team Academic All-American Dean Altobelli, 1985 and 1986, and Shane Bullough in 1985. Additionally, Altobelli was named as one of only 11 National Football Foundation Scholar Athlete Award winners

last year and as winner of Toyota's "Leader of the Year" award.

Returning to the campus where he served as both a varsity player and as an assistant coach under Duffy Daugherty, Perles was named to succeed Frank (Muddy) Waters as the Spartan mentor in December, 1982, just six months after taking the reigns as head coach of the United States Football League's Philadelphia Stars.

Perles gained his biggest fame as defensive architect of the National Football League's Pittsburgh Steelers. In 10 years as an assistant under Steeler Head Coach Chuck Noll, including the last three as assistant head coach, Perles molded a strong defense which played a major role in winning four Super Bowl championships (1974-75-78-79) and recognition as the "Team of the Decade" in the 1970s.

Perles, a native of Detroit and a 1952 graduate from Western High School, played under Ed Rutherford, now his chief administrative assistant. After high school, Perles served in the Army and, following his discharge, enrolled at Michigan State where he began his football career.

As a sophomore tackle with the Spartans in 1958, he earned a varsity letter, but sustained a knee injury in a game against Wisconsin which ended his playing career. Perles went on to earn a B.S. degree in 1960 and an M.A. degree in 1961, working as a student coach with the Spartan freshman football squad.

In 1961, he became an assistant football coach at Chicago's St. Rita High School. The next year, he returned to the Detroit area as head coach of St. Ambrose High where, in three years, he built a team that produced two undefeated seasons and won a pair of city championships.

College work then beckoned, and Perles became an assistant coach under former MSU aide John McVay at Dayton for the 1965 and 1966 seasons. Daugherty brought him back to the MSU campus as an assistant in 1967, first as defensive backfield coach and then, in 1970, as defensive line coach.

His career in the professional ranks began in 1972 when Pittsburgh offered him a position as defensive line coach. Perles was promoted to defensive coordinator of the Steelers in 1978 and to assistant head coach in 1979.

George and Sally Perles have four children. Oldest son, Terry, and daughter, Kathleen, reside in the Pittsburgh area. Sons John and Pat were members of State's football team under their father, John lettering as a reserve inside linebacker in his final season (1984), and Pat playing on the defensive line as a sophomore after transferring from Kent State.

# Spartan Assistant Coaches



**NICK SABAN**  
Defensive Coordinator;  
Defensive Backs  
Kent State '73

Entering his fourth year as defensive coordinator and fifth year as State's defensive secondary coach is Nick Saban. Prior to joining the MSU staff, Saban coached at the U.S. Naval Academy (1982) and served under Earle Bruce at Ohio State (1980-81). He also has coached defensive backs at West Virginia (1978-79), defensive ends at Syracuse (1977) and linebackers at Kent State (1975-76). Saban was a defensive back on the 1970-72 Kent State teams. He also lettered in baseball.



**STEVE BECKHOLT**  
Tight Ends & Special Teams;  
Recruiting Coordinator  
Michigan State '71

Beckholt begins his fifth season as an on-field coach and has served as recruiting coordinator since 1982. In addition, he assists other MSU varsity coaches in the area of recruiting. Before joining the MSU staff, Beckholt was head football coach and athletic director at Earlham College in Indiana, 1979-81. He also has been the defensive coordinator at Bowling Green State (1976-78) and at Albion (1972-75), and the defensive ends coach at Central Michigan (1970-71).



**LARRY BIELAT**  
Running Backs  
Michigan State '60

Larry Bielat starts his fourth season as running backs coach, but spent the 1985 season tutoring the Spartan quarterbacks. He will continue to work with the punters and placekickers. After high school coaching jobs, Bielat was a two-year member of the Colorado football staff and was at New Mexico, 1968-69. Following a seven-year hiatus as a sports broadcaster and Dallas Cowboy's scout, the MSU football letterman (1957-59) joined Jackie Sherrill's Pittsburgh staff in 1977 and served as an assistant at Northern Michigan in 1978. From 1979-81, Bielat was head coach at Uniontown, Pa., High and then served as an assistant with the USFL's Philadelphia Stars in 1982.





Former MSU quarterback Charlie Baggett begins his fifth season on the Spartan staff and returns to coaching wide receivers for the fourth year. During the 1985 season, he coached the running backs. Baggett came to MSU from Minnesota, where he was the Gophers' running backs coach (1981-82). Previously, he had been the offensive back field coach at Bowling Green State for four seasons. A three-time letterwinner (1973-75), Baggett finished his career as the Spartans' all-time leader in total offense and was named All-Big Ten first team and MSU's MVP in 1974.




**NORM PARKER**

He joined the Lions in 1981 before Perles appointed him to the Philadelphia Stars' staff in 1982.

Beginning his fifth year overall and his second as inside linebackers coach is Bill Rademacher. He served as Spartan quarterbacks coach his first two seasons and was receivers coach in 1985. Before taking the head job, he was the Wildcats' offensive coordinator for four years. ## A Monument to Learning

Sliger, a native of Trout Creek, Mich., holds three degrees, the B.A. ('49), M.A. ('50) and Ph.D. ('55), from Michigan State University, all in economics.

Florida State is a university which boasts of such diverse assets as the world's most powerful supercomputer and the greatest all-collegiate show on earth, the Flying High Circus.

Located in Tallahassee, the capital of Florida, FSU is a public, coeducational university and a senior member of the State University System.

About 23,500 students, representing all 50 states and more than 100 foreign countries, work toward more than 250 different graduate and undergraduate degrees in the 15 schools and colleges of Florida State. The colleges of arts and sciences, business, communication, education, engineering, home economics, law and social sciences combine with the schools of criminology, library and information studies, music, nursing, social work, theatre and visual arts to make FSU a nationally acclaimed school.

The Florida State campus, located just a few blocks from the state Capitol, is one of the most beautiful in the southeast. Traditional Gothic-style structures combine with the latest in modern architecture, all brought together by an array of oaks, pines, palms, dogwoods and azaleas. The natural beauty of the 347-acre main campus mirrors the picturesque features of the surrounding North Florida region.

Florida State was founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee River. Name changes over the years included Florida State College and, in 1909, Florida State College for Women. Gov. Millard Caldwell signed a bill in 1947 which again made the institution coeducational and named it Florida State University.

The FSU Supercomputer Computations Research Institute has attracted international attention to the university, home of the world's fastest supercomputer. The ETA 10 has the capacity to perform 10 billion calculations per second.

The Tandem Van de Graaf-Superconducting Accelerator Laboratory in the Department of Physics houses two powerful atom smashers

and has been ranked in the top four in the nation by the National Science Foundation.

The university's location affords excellent research and internship opportunities in government, law and the social sciences. The reputation of Florida State's research programs, the expertise of its more than 1,500 faculty members—including four members of the National Academy of Sciences—and the quality of the graduate students involved in research represent major strengths of the university.

Programs in music, dance and theater at Florida State have earned well-deserved national recognition. The visual and performing arts exhibited and produced on campus offer students and the community a wealth of enrichment opportunities.

Student activities at FSU create an important balance between the classroom experience and the personal life of the individual scholar. Honors programs, student government, intramural sports and more than 200 organizations are available for student involvement.

Students from every academic major have a chance to become stars on the highwire or flying trapeze by participating in the Flying High Circus, the only one of its kind in the nation.

The physical growth of the university during the Bernard F. Sliger administration is best evidenced by such additions as the new wing of the Rovetta Business Building, the University Union expansion project, the new Paul A.M. Dirac Science Library Building, the Panama City Campus, the Jeffersonian Village Green project at the College of Law and the new building for the FAMU/FSU College of Engineering, now under construction.

Florida State is setting the pace, as higher education in Florida prepares to enter the 21st century. And President Sliger takes pride not only in the academic programs and facilities of the university, but also in the people—students, faculty, alumni, administrators and staff—who make Florida State a successful monument to learning. ■

## SELECTED TO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

George Webster, selected in 1969 as MSU's all-time greatest player, is one of 11 former All-America football players who will be inducted into the National Football Foundation's College Football Hall of Fame at an awards dinner on Dec. 8 at the Waldorf-Astoria in New York City. He later will be enshrined at the College Football Hall of Fame in Kings Island, Ohio.

Webster, who is here for today's game, was a roverback on MSU's 1964-66 teams. His college coach, Hall of Fame member Duffy Daugherty, called him one of the best linebackers to ever play college football.

A native of Anderson, S.C., Webster, 42, led the Spartans to the national championship in 1965 and to the conational championship in runner-up position in 1966 when he served as cocaptain. His number 90 was retired at Michigan State, only the second Spartan in history to win this distinction.

In addition to being outstanding football players, the electees also have had notable careers after their playing days ended, which is part of the criteria for election to the College Football Hall.

After playing professional football with Houston, Pittsburgh and New England for 10 seasons, Webster retired and is self-employed in Houston. He served in the Air Force Reserve and went back to college to get his degree in 1971. He has worked as Athletic Director of the Gulf Coast Community Services and was a member of the Houston Council and Human Relations.

Other class of 1987 College Hall of Fame inductees are Carroll Dale (Virginia Tech), Don Heinrich (Washington), Ted Hendricks (Miami, Fla.), Johnny Majors (Tennessee), Mike Reid (Penn State), Richard Scott (Navy), Jim Ray Smith (Baylor), Joe Steffy (Army), Fran Tarkenton (Georgia) and Ron Yary (USC).





## MSU'S FIRST BOWL TEAM

With us here in Spartan Stadium today is a still-lively band of septuagenarians who, 50 years ago, wrote one of the most stirring chapters in Michigan State football history.

Coach Charley Bachman's 1937 team stormed to an 8-1 season record, beat Michigan for the fourth straight time, 19-14, just missed an unbeaten season by a 3-0 upset loss to Manhattan and received an Orange Bowl invitation.

The Michigan game at Ann Arbor, where these games always were played, was and remains a classic. The strongly keyed Wolverines went ahead twice at 7-6 and 14-13. Each time, MSC clawed back, finally to prevail. Big Spartan plays included an 89-yard gallop to a touchdown by Gene Ciolek and two scoring passes, halfback John Pingel to end Ole Nelson.

The Orange Bowl selection was the biggest honor ever extended to the college in athletics up to that time. Bowls were just getting started. The Rose Bowl, the grand-daddy of them all, had been in business since 1902, but the Orange and Sugar Bowls had debuted in 1935, the Sun Bowl in 1936 and the Cotton Bowl in 1937.

Because of a Big Ten ban on bowl games, only Michigan and Ohio State ever had been to postseason classics. Both had been in the Rose Bowl years before, Michigan in 1902 and Ohio State in 1921. So MSC joined the bowl

pioneers long before many bigger names became involved.

The Spartans lost the game to Auburn, 6-0, but no matter. The important thing was having been there.

State's trip to Florida for the Orange Bowl was made by train. There were several transfers enroute. No one line could make it all the way from Michigan to Florida. First drills were held at University of Florida in Gainesville, where coach Bachman had been head coach before coming to Michigan State. Christmas was spent there, too, and, on December 26, it was on to Miami by rail.

The team party contained 41 players, a large squad for those days. About three quarters of them are with us today.

Famed radio sports announcer Ted Husing led the official reception for the team in Miami and also broadcast the game. There were various social affairs and some competition for space in the Miami sports pages by the Miami Open golf tournament, won by Sam Snead. His winning purse was \$500. Horse racing at Tropical Park also received press attention.

The game was played in a brand-new Orange Bowl stadium costing \$360,000 and seating 23,000 fans. A near-capacity crowd sat in blazing heat, as Michigan State and Auburn played on a rock-hard surface.

The Michigan press delegation was led by *Lansing State Journal* sports editor George Alderton and *Michigan State News* sports editor Marshall Dann. Both of them are with the reunion party here today.

The 1937 Spartan team captain, Harry Speelman, is deceased, but the 1938 cocaptains, Dave Diehl and Al Diebold, both members of the Orange Bowl team, are substituting as squad leaders for him today. They also served as the local committee on arrangements for the reunion.■
