NOTES, QUOTES AND ANECDOTES ... FLORIDA VS. FLORIDA STATE

💙 ain, rain go away . . . That's what Florida quarterback Kerwin Bell might be saying today, as he's playing his last game at Florida Field.

Bell needs just 79 yards to become the Southeastern Conference's all-time leading passer, breaking former Gator John Reaves' record (7.549).

Bell, who has given the Orange & Blue many memories (see page 62), including three consecutive victories over Florida State, is already the SEC's all-time passing TD king with 56.

But while Bell is undefeated versus the 'Noles, as Florida has won six straight over FSU, in three prior encounters versus the Tallahassee team he has been held to under 72 yards twice (1984 and 1986). But, as fans should remember, both those games came in driving rainstorms.

Combining his three games versus the Garnet & Gold, Bell is 27 of 53 (59%) for 479 yards with six TDs and two interceptions.

In the 1985 contest at Florida Field, Bell had one of his best days of his storied career. He completed 14 of 22 passes for 343 yards and three TDs. He was especially sensational in the first half, completing 13 of 16 passes for 233 yards and two touchdowns. His three TD strikes came from 14, 75 and 82 yards. The 343 yards performance ranked as the fifth best single-game passing total in UF history.

Last year, in a game "fit for ducks" as one sportswriter put it, Bell was eight of 17 for 65 yards with one TD, an 18yarder to Ricky Nattiel late in the game that gave the Gators a come-frombehind 17-13 upset victory. In 1984, again in the rain. Bell was five of 14 for 71 yards with a TD as Florida won 27-17.

Rain, rain, go away.

Williams gained 57 yards on 12 carries. while James Massey added 33 yards on 14 carries . . . Defensively versus FSU, OLB Clifford Charlton turned in an All-America performance last year. The Tallahassee native registered 17 tackles (eight solo) including two tackles for loss (-18 yards)... Free safety Louis

Oliver added 13 tackles (eight solo) in last year's game. As a back-up in 1985. Oliver picked-off his first career interception in the 38-14 win over the Semi-

... Florida State represents the sixth nation's top 12 (AP Poll), and perhaps the best . . . The Gators lead the series vs. FSU 22-6-1 . . . Florida shows a ... Last year versus FSU, RB Wayne 13-3-1 edge in the 17 games in Gainesville and a 9-3 advantage in the 12 games in Tallahassee.

> . . . Says Gator middle guard Jeff Roth about the UF—FSU game, "First of all, you can throw out all the statistics and all the records. It's a great rivalry, one of the best in college football."...


Gator Defensive Notes: Florida's defense has allowed just four TD passes in the last 67 quarters of play . . . The UF stop troops have given up 1,165 net rushing vards, an average of 116.5 yards per game and 2.80 per carry ... Florida has held five of ten 1987 opponents to less than 100 yards rushing . . . Florida's defense has racked up 99 tackles behind the line of scrimmage (36 sacks and 63 other tackles for loss) . . . Opponent OBs have averaged a low 89.3 passing efficiency versus Florida . . . The defense has not allowed a TD in the second quarter this season . . . The defense has only allowed 42 points in the first half of games this season . . . Opponents have converted just 34.5% of third down conversions this season.

Gator Offensive Notes: Florida is averaging 4.3 vards per rush this season, up from 3.3 yards per carry last season . . . Florida has 20 rushing TDs this year, eight more than all of last year on the ground . . . Florida has displayed balance after ten games. It averages 185.1 yards rushing per game and 184.0 passing per game . . . Florida has outrushed eight of 10 opponents this season. Since the start of the 1983 season (55 games), UF has outrushed its respective opponents 38 times and is 32-3-3 in those games.

Gator Special Team Notes: Gator placekickers have achieved a high degree of success in field goal conversions over the past five seasons. Since 1983, UF PKs are 94-115 (81.7%) in FG attempts . . . Jerry Odom leads the team with 18 special team tackles, while Bill Lang has 17 . . . Fifteen Gator punts have been downed inside the 20vard line this season.



lorida State and Florida have met two common opponents this fall— Miami and Auburn. Florida was defeated 31-4 at Miami and the Seminoles suffered a heartbreaking 26-25 setback to Miami in Tallahassee. Florida lost at Auburn, 29-6, while FSU posted an impressive win at Auburn a week later. 34-6 . . .








TODAY'S GAME



FSU's Sammie Smith has averaged 7.2 yards per carry this season. He needs just 21 yards to set the Seminole single-season rushing record.



Coach Hall's career record stands at 29-10-1, a .737 winning percentage. He is undefeated at 3-0 versus the Florida State Seminoles.

... Florida State has a Smith of their own, Sammie. Smith needs just 21 yards to erase Greg Allen's single-season FSU rushing mark of 1,134 yards. Smith is a 222-pound sophomore and defending Metro Conference 100-and-200-meter sprint champion. He's averaged 7.2 yards per carry this season . . .

Says Florida QB Bell about FSU's defense, "Their defense is awesome. They are big, fast, quick and strong from the line to the secondary. Adds Gator FS Louis Oliver about the FSU offense, "Florida State has a fantastic offense that has seemed to improve from week to week. They have a great running back in Smith and have a great quarterback in Danny McManus. When he's hot, they're tough to beat."

Florida State Head Coach Bobby Bowden, in his 22nd year as a head collegiate coach (12th season at FSU), is Florida State's all-time winningest coach. He owns four of the six total FSU wins in this series.

GABBIN WITH GALEN

ead University of Florida Football Coach Galen Hall . . . "Florida State is a big challenge. I think they have as fine a team as there is in college football at the moment. They have so much talent and

depth in every area and they are playing with confidence and poise.

"It's the case of a good football team playing a great football team, but it's here at Florida Field and it should be an exciting contest. FSU has always been good at throwing the football. Now they run it about as well as anybody in the country. Defensively, they are the most talented group Coach Bowden has had since their Orange Bowl teams."

"In order to have a chance to win we have to play 60 minutes of football to the very best of our ability. It will take a total team effort."







squad in school history to post wins over Auburn, Georgia, and Florida State in the same seasons.

Hall's achievements at Florida may have surprised most people, but a review of his past makes one realize that it is just the latest chapter in a pattern of success that has followed him throughout his 30 year association with intercollegiate athletics. Prior to joining the Florida staff in February of 1984 as Offensive Coordinator, he had served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma for 18 seasons (1966-72 as running back and receiver coach and 1973-83 as offensive coordinator). During his association with the Sooner program, Oklahoma won two national championships, ten Big Eight Conference titles, appeared in 13 bowl games and finished ranked in the nation's Top Ten final poll 11 times. In addition, during his eleven years as the offensive coordinator, the Sooners annually ranked among the nation's top three of the respective organization. teams in scoring, rushing offense, and total offense. Joe Washington, Billy Sims, Greg Pruitt and Elvis Peacock were just some of the outstanding backs he coached.


Hall came to Oklahoma in 1966 after

serving as receiver and backfield coach at West Virginia during 1964 and 1965. In that short two-year period, however, he earned a reputation as one of the country's young rising coaching talents. That reputation led to the opportunity at Oklahoma and he responded to the challenge by playing a very big part in the Sooners' high national profile during the next 18 seasons.

As a collegiate player, Hall was also part of a program that is associated with success-Penn State University. Hall was a quarterback for the Nittany Lions from 1959 to 1961. He was a starter at that post in each of his last two seasons of play and led the squad to bowl game appearances both years.

Throughout his three decade involvement with college football, Hall has been associated with winning and successful programs. His leadership abilities have been a very big part of the success that each of those programs

Hall was born in Altoona, PA on August 14, 1940 and he graduated from Williamsburg (PA) High School in 1958. He was an all-state prep quarterback in 1957 and then continued his football career at Penn State. He



started for the Nittany Lions at quarterback under coach Rip Engle in 1960 and 1961. In 1959 as a sophomore, he passed 19 yards for a touchdown off of a fake field goal play to beat Alabama, 7-0. in the Liberty Bowl. As a junior he quarterbacked Penn State to a 42-19 victory over Oregon State in the '60 Liberty Bowl. In 1961 he threw for three TD's and was named the MVP as the Nittany Lions defeated Georgia have enjoyed while he has been a part Tech, 30-15, in the Gator Bowl. He played pro football with the Washington Redskins and New York Jets in 1962 and 1963 before beginning his coaching career in 1964.

Hall and his wife, Elaine, have five children: Alan (26), Kelly (20), Jill (20), Jennifer (18), and Bo (13).

- First coach in Florida history to lead the Gators to two consecutive nine win seasons (1983-84, 1984-85) and three consecutive nine win seasons (1983-85)
- His 9-2-0 record in 11 head-to-head meetings with Auburn, Georgia, Florida State and Miami is the best in that category in school history
- He's the first coach in UF history to defeat Auburn and then Georgia on back-to-back weeks twice (1984 and 1986). Overall, Florida has registered this rare double just five times in its history (1956, 1962, 1973, 1984,

- Posted wins over Auburn and then Georgia on back-toback weeks for just the fifth time in school history

- He was a starting quarterback for the Nittany Lions his junior and senior years. He led Penn State to two Top Twenty national rankings





OFFENSIVE COACHES

he Florida offensive coaching staff boasts nearly seventy years of combined collegiate coaching experience. Over the past few seasons the Gators have received national recognition as a result of an offense that has ranked among the country's best in rushing, passing, total offense and scoring.

The Gator offensive staff is coordinated by Head Coach Galen Hall. He is assisted by Phil Maggio (line), Mike Heimerdinger (wide receivers and quarterbacks), Larry Kirksey (backs), and Jerry Anderson (tight-ends).

Phil Maggio joined the Florida staff in 1980 as the squad's offensive line coach. He has held that post throughout his tenure at Florida and has greatly improved this aspect of the UF unit. His 1984 unit, dubbed "The Great

the finest collegiate offensive line in history. Two of Maggio's players, tackle Lomas Brown and guard Jeff Zimmerman, have been accorded first-team All-America honors under his guidance. Brown was selected in the first round of the NFL Draft in 1985. Three members of the 1984 line, tackles Lomas Brown and Crawford Ker and guard Billy Hinson, played in the NFL in 1985. Zimmerman was a third round selection of the Dallas Cowboys in 1987. Maggio is a 1966 University of Florida graduate. He coached high school ball in the Tampa area until joining the Florida staff in 1980.

Mike Heimerdinger is in his fourth year as an offensive assistant. He graduated from Eastern Illinois in 1975 and coached in high school and at Air Force

Wall of Florida." might well have been and North Texas State before joining the Gator staff in 1983. Heimerdinger has played a big role in developing a high powered Florida passing attack that ranked first in the SEC and eleventh in the nation in 1986. In addition, the '85 offense tied a school record for most TD receptions in a season (24) and accumulated 2,924 yards in passing, the second best seasonal total in school history. Ricky Nattiel completed his career as one of the most productive receivers in UF and SEC history. Nattiel was a first round NFL Draft selection in 1987 (Denver).

Larry Kirksey is in his fourth year as running back coach at UF. Kirksey graduated from Eastern Kentucky in 1973. He coached at Miami of Ohio (1974-76), Kentucky (1977-81), Kansas (1982) and then was named head coach at Kentucky State in 1983. He held that post for a year before becoming a valued member of the UF staff in the spring of 1984. In the spring of 1986, Kirksey saw FB John L. Williams and RB Neal Anderson get selected in the first round of the NFL Draft by Seattle and Chicago, respectively. Their selection marked the first time since 1971 that two backs from the same collegiate team were selected in the first round of the NFL Draft. In addition, one other Gator back, RB Lorenzo Hampton, was selected in the first round of the 1985 NFL Draft by the Miami

Jerry Anderson is the newest member of the Gator offensive staff. He is in his third year coaching the tight ends. In addition, Anderson also coordinates Florida's special teams. Anderson is a 1968 UF grad. He was co-captain of the 1967 Orange Bowl squad as a middle quard. After coaching the high school ranks in the Miami area from 1968-76, he joined the Vanderbilt staff in 1977. He coached at Miami (1978), Army (1979-82) and Central Florida (1983-84). He served as interim head coach at Central Florida for much of the 1984 season. He joined the UF staff in the spring of 1985.

that to be successful you must play very good defense. Florida's ranking of second, first, first, and third respectively in total defense in the SEC the past four years is solid evidence that the Gators tough defense has been the backbone of the squad's fine 33-9-3 combined record from 1983-86.

Florida's 1987 defensive staff, which has over 70 years of combined collegiate coaching experience, is coordinated by Zaven Yaralian who is in his second year at the helm. He is assisted by Dan Brooks (line), Dan Coughlin (line), Jim Dickey (inside linebackers), and Ty Smith (outside linebackers).

with the Gator staff. He came to Florida in 1983 as defensive back coach, a post he held until being elevated to the coordinator's post in January of 1986. In his first year as coordinator in 1986, the Gators ranked 16th in the nation in total defense and fourth in the country vs. the pass (117.0 ypg). Opponents registered just four TD passes the entire year, none in the last 27 quarters of play. Opponent QB's compiled a lowly

efense. Any coach will tell you 91.8 passing efficiency vs. Florida. Strong-safety Adrian White and cornerback Jarvis Williams earned All-SEC and second team All-America honors. White was selected in the second round of the NFL Draft by the NY Giants.

Yaralian, a 1974 graduate of Nebraska, served as defensive back coach at Washington State (1976-77) and Missouri (1978-82) before joining the UF staff in 1983.

Dan Coughlin, a 1960 Miami (Fla.) graduate, has an extensive coaching background. He coached at the high school ranks from 1962-72. In 1973 he became a defensive staff member at the University of Kentucky, a post he held Overall, Yaralian is in his fifth year until 1981. After serving as an administrative aid at UF during 1982, he returned to coaching when he was named a defensive line coach with the Gators in 1983.

Coughlin is assisted on the defensive line by Dan Brooks, a member of the staff since 1983. Brooks, a 1976 graduate of Western Carolina, primarily concentrates on the middle guards. He coached at the high school level in North Carolina from 1976-82 and then

joined the UF staff as a grad assistant in 1983. He was elevated to full-time status in 1985.

Over the past few seasons Coughlin and Brooks have coached defensive lines at UF that have ranked among the toughest in the nation vs. the rush. The '84 Gator unit allowed just three rushing TD's the entire season. MG Tim Newton was a second team All-America in 1984 and was named to the NFL All-Rookie Team in 1985. MG Jeff Roth and DT Rhondy Weston were Sophomore All-America selections in 1986 while DT Keith Williams was a first-team All-SEC

The outside linebackers are coached by Ty Smith, a 1979 Western Carolina graduate, who has been a full-time member of the UF staff since 1983. Smith has coached two first-team All-America selection at UF; Wilber Marshall (1983) and Alonzo Johnson (1984-85). Marshall, a first-round choice in the NFL Draft by Chicago in 1984 who earned All-Pro status in 1986, was named the "National Defensive Player of the Year" by ABC-TV in 1983. Johnson, a second round NFL selection by Philadelphia in 1986, was one of five finalists for "Butkus Linebacker of the Year Award" in 1985. In 1986, junior Clifford Charlton was a consensus first-team All-SEC choice and senior Ron Moten became a sixth round selection in the NFL Draft by Philadelphia this past spring.

Inside Linebacker Coach Jim Dickey is the newest member of the UF staff. The 1956 University of Houston grad became a part of the Gator staff in the spring of 1986. He has 25 years of collegiate coaching experience. He was an assistant coach at Houston (1962-65). Oklahoma State (1966-69), Oklahoma (1970-72), Kansas (1973-74) and North Carolina (1975-77). He was the Head Coach at Kansas State from 1978-85 before becoming part of the UF staff in 1986. His first inside linebacking contingent in 1986 saw Scott Armstrong get drafted by the Dallas Cowboys and Pat Moorer earn All-SEC Freshman Team honors.



he University of Florida, a charter member of the prestigious Southeastern Conference, is fast developing a national reputation for across-the-board athletic excellence that ranks among the best in the nation.






The Gator basketball team played in its fourth consecutive post-season tournament in 1987 while making its first-ever NCAA Tourney appearance on the way to posting a school record 23 wins. Florida advanced to the NCAA's final round of 16 before bowing to Syracuse, the eventual national runnerup. Their achievements were part of an extremely successful 1986-87 athletic year. Overall, the combined men's and women's program at UF was rated the sixth most successful in the nation this past year.






Florida's swim program continued to distinguish itself in 1987. The men's squad finished third in the nation and the women third while also claiming their sixth SEC title in the past seven years. The men have finished among the nation's top five teams in each of the last nine NCAA Championships while the women have finished in the top three in each of the past six national championships.



The Gator grid squad has compiled the seventh best combined record in the nation since the start of the 1983 season.



The women's tennis team compiled a sparkling 29-1 dual meet record in 1987, captured their seventh SEC title in the last eight years, and advanced to the semifinals at the NCAA Championships in May. The men finished fourth at the SEC's and were ranked in the nation's top 25 for the entire year.




Florida's men's track team turned in its most spectacular year in school history during 1986-87 as it captured the school's first-ever "SEC Triple Crown" in winning league championships in cross-country, indoor track and outdoor track. 



expertise of its more than 1,500 faculty members—including four members of the National Academy of Sciences—and the quality of the graduate students involved in research represent major strengths of the University.



hree decades of football competition between Florida and Florida State will elapse with Saturday's 30th contest in a series which is a classic despite its youth.


This budding rivalry was memorable before it even started due to the heated debate between Florida officials, who said it as a no-win situation and didn't want the Seminoles on the slate, and FSU brass, who insisted their infant program deserved state gridiron scheduling equality.

Contrary to rumors which have sprouted since that time, there never was legislative mandate requiring this game to be played. There was, you might say, considerable pressure exerted to get the series started pronto.

Seminoles should salute wily Don Veller and ex-coach Tom Nugent for their part in this process, while former Gator Athletic Director and head coach Bob Woodruff did all he could to delay the inevitable.

It started with a bang in the ninth game of the 1958 season when FSU's Bobby Renn took a handoff on the opening kickoff and steamed 78 yards toward Florida's goal until Jimmy Dunn halted him on the 15-yard-line.

FSU scored moments later to take the first-ever lead of the series. It wasn't long, however, before big Dave Hudson of Pensacola blocked a Seminole punt and ran it in for a TD for the Gators to even the count. Dunn's two touchdowns and a stout Florida

defense resulted in a 21-7 victory.

Dunn, who was named the game's MVP, had originally signed with FSU out of high school, but recanted and signed with Florida after the summertime high school all-star game.

Florida-FSU has produced all the ingredients which go into a classic series. There have been great comebacks, close wins, brilliant individual performances, dynamic coaches, heavy media attention and, of course, controversy.

Fans of the orange-and-blue remember Steve Spurrier motioning Charlie Casey into the end zone for the winning TD catch in a last-second 1965 rally, the

defense shutting down All-American Ron Sellers on national TV for a 9-3 victory in Tallahassee in 1968, the 0-5 Gators whipping the 5-0 'Noles 17-15 in 1971, the Nat Moore-led 1972 team stomping favored FSU 42-13 the next year, and the current six-game UF winning streak highlighted by last year's gutsy comeback in the rain at Doak Campbell Stadium.

Wearers of the garnet-and-gold no doubt recall FSU's first win in the series, 16-7 in Tallahassee behind Steve Tensi-to-Fred Biletnikoff; the Lane Fenner catch, or non-catch, in 1966; a dazed Kim Hammond coming off the bench to find Sellers in the Florida Field north end zone for a 21-16 win in 1967, and the four-game winning streak generated from 1977-80.

Obviously, both sides remember far more than that.

The series has had strong coaching personalities from the start. Florida's


Woodruff was a gruff, defensiveminded, no-nonsense man, while FSU's Nugent was a coaching free spirit who invented the I-Formation and thought nothing of taking chances such as a reverse on the opening kickoff of the first game.

Florida's Ray Graves brought wideopen offense to the fore with the passing of Spurrier-to-Casey, to Richard Trapp, Jack Harper and many other talented receivers. His Seminole counterpart and good friend was Bill Peterson, who couldn't remember names very well, but was an offensive genius copied by NFL coaches.

Doug Dickey's Florida teams were physically overpowering outfits who muscled the finesse-oriented Seminoles of the mid-1970s. Bowden, the witty southern charmer, restructured the FSU offense with a two-quarterback tandem of Jimmy Jordan and Wally Woodham, combined it with exceptional defensive play, and ran up his school's longest winning streak.

Now the Gators have Galen Hall, who is 3-0 against the Seminoles and 9-3 in Florida games against the top rivals of FSU, Auburn, Georgia and Miami.

The kickoff of the 30th Florida-FSU football game is nearly here. More memories to follow.


eligibility. Not one transferred.




