




Tee Pee Talk

Florida State University should be awfully proud to welcome Georgia Southern to Doak Campbell Stadium this afternoon. After all, the Eagles represent almost a mirror image of the Seminoles. Both are programs built from scratch – thrust into a fast-paced, big-money college football world, and both have grown much faster than they had a right.

Of course, Florida State has had a bit of a head start on the Eagles, but Erk Russell may have made a few notes on the rise of the FSU program. The Seminoles first put on the intercollegiate pads in 1947. Georgia Southern did not have a football team of any kind until 1982 when it began playing as a club sport.

Florida State's football program has been the most successful college program of any that started after World War II. Georgia Southern College could well be on the way to challenging that distinction.

After the first-year Seminoles got off to an understandably shaky start at 0-5 in 1947, the look of things to come quickly took shape. The 1948 Seminoles went 7-1. In 1949 they were 9-1 and played in a bowl game. In 1950 – just four years into a football lifetime – the Seminoles were undefeated. Eight wins and no losses!

From those beginnings came the Florida State program of today. It boasts a storied football history crammed into a mere 40 years. A history no one could have dreamed possible. A small women's college in a rural area becomes co-educational and takes up the sport of football. With nothing more than a tiny stadium, a few good supporters and a dream of going big-time, the Seminole program was launched. Lately, this program has challenged for the national championship of college football. This year it will again. And to think, it hasn't been many years since those humble beginnings.

A small band of dreamers in Statesboro, Ga., must have had similar foresight a few years back. Their vision is not unlike that of Seminole backers of the 1940's.

"Let's start us a football team," they said in 1982. "But let's not just field a team. Let's field a winner. Why not make an impact right away?"

Erk Russell was summoned form Vince Dooley's staff at Georgia. For two years, he ran the program as a club sport. In that first year of 1982, the newly-founded Eagles played their final game of a 7-3-1 season against – get this – Florida State Junior Varsity. Erk beat those Seminoles 31-20. By 1984, Georgia Southern entered college football's Division I-AA. The Eagles leap-frogged some options to start at a lower

level of competition. Right into the frying pan they went. Just like those far-sighted Seminoles of 1947, they felt they could play with the big boys and do so right away.

And play they have. No Division I-AA school has won more games or a higher percentage of games than Georgia Southern since the Eagles burst onto the scene in 1984. They have won 38 games and lost nine (Better than 80 percent). Florida State's record over its first five years? 30-9! That's called getting it done in a hurry. And, oh yeah, Georgia Southern had to delay some other construction plans to make some space for two national championship trophies. They were the best in America in their division in 1985 and '86.

The success has been a combination of great coaching, outstanding players and tremendous outpouring of support form Statesboro and surrounding communities. Since 1984, Georgia Southern has built a \$7 million stadium – with plans for major expansion – has gone from no scholarships to 70, and built a big-time practice facility and weight room. Like those Seminoles of old, they don't like any grass growing under their feet at Georgia Southern.

Like Florida State's rise in the football world, the Eagles have had some outside forces helping along the way.

"I'd rather be lucky than good," says Russell, stealing a page from Bobby Bowden's book.

The Eagles have managed to lure an abundance of talent. Seven former Eagles are now playing professional football. At least 10 Georgia Southern players have been named All-American since 1984.

But the bottom line is, Erk Russell is a winner. Some think he's a magician. Many thought a start this fast wasn't possible. Longtime Florida State historians know better.

James Palmer of the Macon Telegraph wrote this about the job Russell has done: "Maybe Erk Russell is a magician. After all, he turned a Statesboro drainage ditch into beautiful Eagle Creek and created a two-time Division I-AA national champion out of team that didn't exist six years ago. If he's not a magician, he's still one of the best loved coaches Georgia has ever known, and nothing short of a legend at Georgia Southern College."

Florida State, too, had many legends in its formative days. Those men, like Russell, who may have been magicians in their own right. I think it takes a little magic to do what has been done at Florida State, and at Georgia Southern.

The reason all Seminoles should feel great in welcoming the Eagles is because it's finally our turn to return something that has helped build our own fame and fortune. This is a chance for the Eagles to leap into the national spotlight. Could Florida State's program ever have progressed to this point had the Seminoles not been able to get into the arena with football's elite?

While it may not be today, the time will come when Georgia Southern may be as capable of pulling off a win over the Seminoles as, say, Florida State was in beating Nebraska in Lincoln for the first time. The point is, the proud Seminoles just wanted a chance to play with the biggies. Georgia Southern is starting to feel its way down this path. I'm glad Florida State can help it along.

Get ready to watch as these two youngsters of college

Notes & Quotes

- Sammie Smith's 212-yard performance against Tulane was the third 200-yard game of his career and his best total since gaining 244 last season against East Carolina. A 48-yard run in the second quarter was the ninth-longest of his career. His total was good enough to tie Victor Floyd for the fourth best on FSU charts. Smith now holds three of the top six single game rushing bests in school history.
- Georgia Southern was a late addition to the FSU schedule after Memphis State begged off its 1988 contract last season. It will be the first meeting between two Birmingham-born coaching greats Erk Russell and Bobby Bowden.
- Although the Florida State offense has been effective on its own, it is getting quite a bit of help from the FSU defense.
 A defensive player has scored a touchdown in each of the Tribe's last four games with three of those scores coming on interception returns.
- Erk Russell and his Georgia Southern team will get a double dose of Bowdencoached teams in 1988. In addition to this week's matchup against Bobby's FSU team, the Eagles meet Terry's Samford squad November 12 in Statesboro.
- Deion Sanders missed the Tulane game, but "Prime Time" did not miss a chance to do a halftime interview on the Sunshine Network's delayed broadcast. When asked about playing offense Deion said, "I think I'd make a great wide reciever. In fact, if I was a wide reciever, the only person who could cover me would be me."
- Florida State is 31-8-1 in Homecoming games since the tradition started in 1948, but the Seminoles have not lost a Homecoming contest in the Bowden era a string of 12 straight.
- Although it is the first meeting between Bowden and Russell, FSU offensive coordinator Wayne McDuffie is familiar with the Georgia Southern mentor. The two coached on Vince Dooley's staff at Georgia from 1977-81. McDuffie led the offensive line while Russell was the defensive coordinator.







Soft-Spoken Shiver is FSU's "Hit-Man"

Florida State defensive coordinator Mickey Andrews has been known to tell folks on the way out to the football practice field "it's a good for crackin'."

For senior strong safety Stan Shiver, "crackin' day" is every day he suits up for football, whether for practice or game.

Shiver, you see, has gained the reputation as Florida State's hardest defensive hitter. Going into his sophomore year, he delivered a hit to his own teammate, wide receiver Herb Gainer, in the spring Garnet and Gold game that sepa-

rated both Gainer's shoulders FSU Sports Information Director Wayne Hogan recalled Shiver as, "hitting Gainer right up under his outstretched arms, as he jumped up for the ball separating one shoulder, and then driving him into the ground, separating the other.

Think about it for a minute. Then try to imagine the grimace on Gainer's face as the pain hit him.

"That's just me playing ball," said Shiver, born in Tallahassee and relocated to Tifton, Ga. at age12. "When I put the toes and knocked him down. You don't get too many of those pads on, I've got to go out and do

the job."

Getting the job done is what it's all about to Shiver. Unlike many hard-hitting football players, he does not talk about it afterwards. In fact, he doesn't talk much at all. The soft-spoken south Georgian has impressed instructors and FSU personnel as a nice, young man.

"If you were to talk to him in a class or around campus and then saw him on the football field, you would definitely see a different person," said graduate assistant coach Pat Milligan, who works with defensive backs. "You could call it a case of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde."

Shiver claims he has played his football career. A Mickey Andrews type of player.

"It's not something he just picked up along the way," Andrews said. "He has truly earned his reputation. He simply likes contact. He won't drag folks down, he knocks them

His brutal, hard-hitting style of play has not only caught the eye and earned the respect of Seminole coaches, but of his teammates in the defensive backfield.

Prior to the season-opening Miami game, CBS Sports came to town to shoot FSU player head shots. Shiver's number 37 game jersey, selected at random, was one given to players for the camera shot. Many players balked at wearing a jersey not their own, even though the number would not show up in the photo. Free safety Dedrick Dodge was not one

"I won't mind being number 37," said Dodge, donning the jersey with a smile. "If people want to compare me to Shive, that's fine. He's a hitter, a big play man. He makes things happen. He might not say much on the field, but when he's around things happen."

Even the ever-candid Deion Sanders gave Shiver a tip of the hat at the 1987 Seminole pre-season media day while the pair sat before a panel of state sportswriters previewing FSU's

"Doggone good ballplayer," Sanders said of Shiver. "One of the best in the nation. He'll knock your head off. When receivers start talking, I call Shive and he takes them out on the

The Shiver reputation began early in his career at Florida State. He drew a starting nod in 1985, his freshman season. He made quite an impact with 54 tackles, including six for loss, and was named to the Football News freshman All-America team. It was a case of "everyone in the defensive backfield graduating," explained Shiver, to earn the starting assignment. Seven seniors in the defensive backfield were lost from

He actually won the job in the spring prior to his freshman campaign when he was named the top tackler and most improved freshman on defense.

"He was the best we had at the time," Andrews said. "He worked hard and has a certain pride about himself which has made him one of the most dependable players in the defensive backfield over the past four years.

While viewing the film of FSÚ's 30-7 win over Michigan State on his Sunday show, Head Coach Bobby Bowden called a Shiver stop of Spartan running back Blake Ezor, "a textbook tackle," where he wrapped up the opponent at the line of scrimmage and went no further.

"We call that a knock em' back," Andrews explained. "Knocking the ball carrier on his back. Stan just stepped on his

in a game.'

Teams that focus on the run are Shiver's speciality. It's the safeties who move toward the line of scrimmage, as opposed to cornerbacks, who move back on deep pass coverage. "He forces the run," Andrews continued. "Contains the play and forces it back inside. Stan usually takes on the fullback, tight end and guards. Players who are usually bigger than him, but not necessarily tougher."

In the 1988 season, Shiver has not been highly visible, right in the middle of the pack of defensive stats. The reason — he and Jim Thorpe award finalist Sanders have formed a dangerous combination on the left side of the field, according to Andrews.

"People have noticed that teams have not been going in the direction of Deion," Andrews remarked. "But Stan Shiver is also on that side.'

Shiver, in his fifth year of eligibility, is scheduled to graduate from Florida State in the spring of 1989 with a degree in social sciences. He said he has not heard much from NFL teams, although he ran with 4.6 speed for pro scouts. Bear in mind, he also received little notice coming out of Tift County High School, drawing a look from only Florida State and South Carolina.

"I'm open for any job suggestions," he said. "I've been around this part of the country all my life. I'd like to go out to California and see what it's like out there."





THE FLORIDA STATE ADVANTAGE BOBBY BOWDEN



ne hundred and one wins! It took Florida State University 20 seasons before it registered its 100th victory. Bill Peterson was the man who secured that milestone during the 1966 season with a 10-0 shutout of Missis-

Yes, 101 college football wins don't come overnight. When you think that in 41 years of playing the sport, Florida State - - a darned successful football institution by any standards - - has just 250 total scalps.

Then Bobby Bowden steps onto the scene. In three seasons prior to his 1976 arrival in Tallahassee, Florida State had rolled up a whopping four victories. At that rate, it would have taken Bowden 75 years to get 100 wins for the Seminoles, and that would have come in the year 2051.

Smart man, this Birmingham cracker. Realizing that he would have been 122 years old by that time, he revised the timetable. Instead of four wins every three years, he suggested something like 25 wins every three years.

Now this scenario seemed more to the liking of a whole lot of people. After turning 58 last November 8, Bowden has already knocked off a guick hundred. Nothing to it but a little planning. Twelve seasons: 101-37-3. Twelve seasons: nine bowls (more than half of the 17 in FSU history). Twelve seasons: three trips to New Year's Day Bowls. It is fitting that Bowden got his 100th win in 1988 against instate rival Florida and started on his next 100 with his third win in five tries against Nebraska in the Fiesta Bowl.

What this man has done in just 12 short years is nothing short of a miracle. Taking a program mired in mediocrity literally on the verge of dropping the sport - he has built one of the very best programs in the nation. He has taken Florida State to the doorstep of the national championship three times and he got the runner-up title in 1988. There are those who think that the man who patrols the sidelines for FSU with "Seminoles" scripted across the front of his sweatshirt will get that national championship before he retires.

Bowden, you see, is Florida State through and through. Oh heck, Bobby Bowden IS Florida State. Florida State University is certainly a respectable institution of higher education. It has got a quaint steel-structured stadium where the fans make a lot of noise. It has the nice locker room, the weight room and even Burt Reynolds Hall. But really, Florida State has nothing that dozens of other schools can't offer. Except one thing. Bobby Bowden is the Florida State advantage.

Slowly but surely over these 12 years, America has come to recognize his qualities as well. Of course, America would rather talk of how it loves to watch his teams play. Uh-oh, here comes the reverse. Holy cow, there's the fake punt. Jeez, did he throw the bomb on fourth-and-one? That's Bobby Bowden for you. A riverboat gambler of the first degree.

Bowden continues to climb the ladder among the active coaches nationally. His 174-69-3 career mark is topped only by Michigan's Bo Schembechler, Penn State's Joe Paterno and Georgia's Vince Dooley. His 101 wins at FSU came after he posted a 42-26 mark at West Virginia (1970-75) and a 31-6 record at alma mater Samford (1959-62).

Bowden's 101 wins have not come the easy way. Saddled with the nation's toughest schedule three of his 12 years, he has managed to beat the nation's best teams on the road. "King of the Road" he was once dubbed and his 48-24-2 record away from Tallahassee includes victories at Auburn, Michigan State, Florida and Nebraska in 1987 and previously a Who's Who of college football.

If there's any question about the national impact he's made at Florida State, gander this little fact. In 29 years of football prior to Bowden, Florida State had made the weekly AP Top 20 just 13 times. In Bowden's 12 years, FSU could be found on that list in 118 of 169 weekly polls. Only 31 times since he first got the '77 Seminoles into the Top 20 has he spent a week out of that group. An incredible 48 times under Bowden FSU has been in the Top 10 on any given week. And what about a finish in the Top 20 - eight times in 12 seasons!

A polished speaker, Bowden is in demand. A busy schedule curtails many speaking engagements, but many times he can be found in a Baptist church pulpit on a Sunday



Bowden is adored by the media. You'd be hard pressed to find a better one with the press. Open and candid, he has no secrets from them. His style makes Florida State a dream beat for the reporter.

Bowden was born in Birmingham and was a dandy player at the famed Woodlawn High School there. He went on to Alabama as a freshman quarterback, the fulfillment of a childhood dream after growing up in the shadows of Legion Field. During that one semester at Alabama, he found the true love of his life was back in Birmingham. Ann Estock soon became Bobby's wife and he was soon a transfer student at Samford University there, then Howard College.

Bowden was a "Little All-American" at Samford and would soon start a long Bowden tradition at the school. He returned there to take his first head coaching position in 1959.

Chuck Amato **Assistant Head Coach Defensive Line** (North Carolina State '69) Seventh Season at FSU

Chuck Amato has been Florida State's defensive line coach since 1982 and was named assistant head coach in 1985, giving him added responsi-bilities in the administrative area. Since he joined the staff, he has helped to rebuild the Seminole defense into a nationally-ranked unit.

His most recognized player at Florida State was defensive tackle Alphonso Carreker, a 1984 first-round draft choice of the Green Bay Packers, who Amato coached during the 1982 and 1983 seasons.

Amato arrived at FSU from Arizona where he coached the Wildcat linebackers for two seasons. Prior to his work in Tucson, he coached at his alma mater, North Carolina State.

He first joined the N.C. State staff in 1968 as a student assistant coach under former Florida State defensive coordinator Jack Stanton. 



Since taking over Florida State's recruiting efforts, Scott has played a major role in improving the Seminoles' pool of talent. His 1984 group was named best in the nation by Super Prep Magazine and made up the junior and senior classes on last year's Fiesta squad. The 1985 group was judged in Super Prep's top 10 while the class of 1987 was listed eighth in the country and second in the Southeast.

One of Scott's personal recruiting areas—the Jacksonville area—has yielded some of the brightest talent on the squad since Scott first began recruiting there in 1985. Traditionally an area where FSU did not sign many players, Duval and Clay counties began showing up on the Seminole roster


The Seminole Sports Network, a regional radio network covering three states, brings Florida State football to fans, alumni and college football enthusiasts throughout the Southeast.

THIS IS FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY


Florida State University, home of the world's fastest supercomputer, is setting the pace as higher education in the state prepares to enter the 21st century. The FSU Supercomputer Computations Research Institute attracts international attention with scientists from many nations using the University's two powerful supercomputers in their research.


The Department of Physics' Tandem Van de Graaff Superconducting Accelerator Laboratory, ranked in the top four in the nation by the National Science Foundation, houses two powerful atom smashers which also provide unique research opportunities.

Located in Tallahassee, the capital of Florida, FSU is a public, coeducational university and a senior member of the State University System. More than 24,000 students are enrolled, representing all 50 states and 100 foreign countries. The University offers more than 250 graduate and undergraduate degrees in its 15 schools and colleges. Outstanding programs in the colleges of arts and sciences, business, communication, education, engineering, home economics, law and social sciences combine with the schools of criminology, library and information studies, music, nursing, social work, theater and visual arts to make Florida State a nationally acclaimed university.

The Florida State campus, located just blocks away from the state capitol, is beautiful in all seasons. Its 347 acres mirror the picturesque features of the surrounding North Florida region. The buildings are nestled among evergreen live oaks, pines and palms, as well as hardwoods that provide fall color, and dogwoods and azaleas that are covered with a profusion of springtime blossoms.

As an institution, FSU began as coeducational Seminary West of the Suwannee River, approved by the Florida Legislature in 1851 and assigned to Tallahassee in 1857. Name changes over the years included Florida State College in 1901; then in 1905, Florida Female College and, in 1909, Florida State College for Women. Gov. Millard Caldwell signed a bill in 1947 which again made the institution coeducational and changed the name to Florida State University.





The University's location affords excellent research and internship opportunities in government, law and the social sciences. The reputation of Florida State's research programs and the expertise of its more than 1,500 faculty members—including four members of the National Academy of Sciences and four members of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences—represent major strengths of the University. FSU prides itself on pursuing academic quality while maintaining a friendly, welcoming atmosphere.

Programs in music, dance and theater at Florida State have earned well-deserved national recognition. The visual and performing arts exhibited and produced on campus offer students and the community a wealth of enrichment opportunities.


Student activities at FSU create an important balance between the classroom experience and the personal life of the individual scholar. Honors programs, student government, intramural sports and more than 200 organizations are available for student involvement. Furthermore, the Flying High Circus, the world's only all-collegiate circus, makes its home here.

Florida State academic programs extend well beyond Tallahassee. The FSU Marine Laboratory is located on the Gulf of Mexico, 45 miles away. Students participate in professional training programs at the Asolo State Theater in Sarasota and the Burt Reynolds Institute for Theatre Training in Jupiter. The Panama City Campus of Florida State offers upper-level courses which lead to bachelor's and master's degrees. The Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed in the Florida State Conference Center on the edge of the main campus, manages educational outreach activities from Pensacola to Miami.

The physical growth of the University during the 11-year administration of President Bernard Sliger represents new construction expenditures of more than \$100 million. It includes such additions as the University Union expansion project, the new Paul A.M. Dirac Science Library Building, the Jeffersonian-style Village Green project at the College of Law, the new wing of the Rovetta Business Building, and the new FAMU/FSU College of Engineering at Innovation Park.

It is not only the academic programs and facilities of Florida State, but also its people—students, faculty, alumni, administrators and staff—who make this University such a proud monument to learning.

UNIVERSITY ADMINISTRATION



DR. BERNARD F. SLIGER President, Florida State University

Dr. Bernard F. Sliger was named the 10th president of Florida State University February 7, 1977, following six months as the University's interim president.

After joining the administration in May 1972 as executive vice president, he assumed the addi-

tional duties of chief academic officer, and served as director of the University's London Study Center during the fall guarter, 1975.

Formerly executive director of the Louisiana Coordinating Council for Higher Education, Dr. Sliger's background as an educator includes 19 years as a faculty member and administrator at Louisiana State University. During that time, he served LSU as head of the economics department, member and chairman of the graduate council, dean of academic affairs and vice chancellor. Taking leave of absence from LSU in 1969, he organized the Louisiana Coordinating Council for Higher Education, and became its executive director, a position equivalent to the chancellorship of the State University System of Florida.

An economist and scholar in the special fields of economic theory and public finance, he frequently has served as a consultant to private and public commissions and organizations. Dr. Sliger also served a year as Louisiana Commissioner of Administration and Chief Budget Officer.

Dr. Sliger's administrative and consulting experience extends beyond the states of Florida and Louisiana. In 1987, he was appointed to a four-year term on the NCAA President's Commission. Since 1983, he has been a member of the board of directors of the Federal Bank of Atlanta, Ga. and is also a member of the Council of Presidents for the Southeastern

Universities Research Association and the Executive Committee of the University Research Association, Washington, D.C.

Born September 30, 1924, the native of Trout Creek, Mich., holds three degrees—the B.A. ('49), M.A. ('50) and Ph.D. ('55)—from Michigan State University, all in economics. He has taught at Florida State, Michigan State, Louisiana State and at Southern University at Baton Rouge, La. He holds memberships in 10 professional, scholastic and honor societies including Omicron Delta Kappa, Phi Kappa Phi, Omicron Delta Epsilon and Alpha Kappa Psi.

Dr. Sliger and his wife, Greta, have four children, Nan, Paul, Greta and Sten.



CHARLES W. EHRHARDT Faculty Athletic Committee Chairman

A professor of Law at Florida State University since 1967, Charles W. Ehrhardt is beginning his fifth year as Chairman of the FSU Athletic Committee.

Ehrharut served on the committee from 1969-71, and was reappointed to the board in 1983. He succeeded Dr. James Jones as chairman in 1984, and became Florida State's representative to the NCAA with the appointment.

A native of Elkader, Iowa, Ehrhardt received a bachelor's degree from Iowa State University in 1962. Two years later he earned his law degree from the University of Iowa and went on to become an Assistant United States Attorney in that state before coming to

Tallahassee

A widely-respected expert in the field of Evidence, Ehrhardt holds the Florida State position as the Ladd Professor of Evidence. He wrote the Florida Evidence Code, passed by the state legislature in 1976, which deals with the admissibility of evidence in court trials. Ehrhardt is also the author of a book on evidence, first published in 1977 with a second edition published in 1984.

Ehrhardt is frequently called on for lectures and speaking engagements. He is also asked to do private consultations with lawyers and judges nationwide on evidence matters.

From 1984-86, he was president of the Metro Conference which made him the league's chief representative to the NCAA. He is still active in conference administration, serving on the editorial budget committee.

Ehrhardt and his wife, the former Judy Sutton, have three children.



ATHLETIC DIRECTOR, HOOTIE INGRAM

Cecil Ingram, known to his friends and associates as "Hootie," has headed Florida State's athletic department for the past eight years. He came to FSU in January of 1981 after eight years with the Southeastern Conference.

Upon arriving in Tallahassee, Ingram initiated a \$10 million dollar building program for athletic facilities. The building program included construction of the Moore Athletic Center, and completion of Dick Howser Stadium as well as renovations to Doak Campbell Stadium, the Bim Stults Aquatic Center and Mike Long Track.


Ingram is in his third year of a four-year term on the prestigious NCAA Council. As an elected member of that body, he is one of 22 representatives from Division I schools. Ingram is also a member of the College Football Association (CFA) television committee, chairman of the NCAA nominating committee and chairman of the major independents.


A native of Tuscaloosa, Ala., Ingram played football for the hometown Crimson Tide from 1951 to 1954. He was named All-SEC as a sophomore when he led the nation in pass interceptions. He was a member of both the 1953 Orange and 1954 Cotton Bowl squads, and also lettered for the Alabama baseball team as an infielder.

After graduation and an Army stint, Ingram began his coaching career in 1956 as an assistant football coach at Bradenton (Fla.) Manatee High School. The next year, he became head coach at Tuscaloosa Brookwood High School.

Ingram moved into the college coaching arena in 1960 as an assistant at Wake Forest. He also made coaching stops at Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas before accepting the head coaching job at Clemson in 1970, the only collegiate head coaching job he held. Three years after taking the position, Ingram left Clemson to join the SEC as assistant commissioner.

Ingram and his wife, Toni, have a son and two daughters.

1988-89 Basketball Talent, Optimism Abound in Seminole Camp

Hopes are high in Tallahassee.

Talent, experience and depth characterize the Florida State basketball team as it prepares for the 1988-89 season. The Seminoles return a strong nucleus of players and this year's squad may have the talent to rival the accomplishments of the 1972 FSU team that lost to UCLA for the national championship.

This wealth of optimism comes on the heels of a truly remarkable season. With just one starter returning from the previous year's NIT squad, Florida State was picked to finish next to last in the Metro Conference in 1987-88. However, the Tribe turned in one of the school's finest seasons, finishing second in the conference race and earning its first bid to the NCAA tournament since 1980. The ac-

complishment becomes even more impressive considering how the Seminoles got to the tournament. Florida State Head Coach Pat Kennedy had moved an overweight, seldom used forward to point guard; based his offense on a junior college transfer with a bad leg; and faced a difficult schedule with a 6-7 center. From that tenuous position, the Seminoles forged their second consecutive 19-11 season and finished the year in storied Pauley Pavilion at the NCAA West Regional basketball tournament.

The Seminoles begin the 1988-89 season in a completely different situation. The difficult schedule is still there, but FSU returns four starters and will be a preseason

top 20 squad. The attention should kill any opportunity the Garnet and Gold had of "sneaking up" on its opponent, and the combination of seasoned starters and a talent-laden bench put the Seminoles among the favorites in the competitive Metro Conference.

"I am very excited about the potential of this season," Kennedy said. "I am a very positive person, so I am always looking forward to the year. But I think when you look at what we have coming back and the newcomers, you have to consider Florida State a topnotch team. The season is long and a lot of things can happen to prevent you from reaching your potential, but I really feel we are worthy of the preseason attention. And I feel that we can compete for the conference championship, but road wins will probably be the key in the Metro again this year."

Why are expectations so high in Tallahassee? Consider the return of four starters; the return of 79 of the 84 points per game which ranked the Seminoles among the nation's top 15 offensive teams; and the addition of in-

side force Irving Thomas and talented guards Lorenzo Hands and Byron Wells to an already loaded roster. The numbers add up to a talented group of hoopsters.

While FSU had just one senior a year ago, the Seminoles will rely on the leadership of four seniors this year. George McCloud and Tony Dawson are back to lead the offense, Tat Hunter is set to defend his Metro rebounding crown and Derrick Mitchell will again be "instant offense" for the 1988-89 Tribe.

McCloud, the "overweight, seldom used forward" of a year ago, burst on the college basketball scene in his junior season, topping it off with first team all-Metro honors and an invitation to try out for the United States Olympic basketball team. McCloud used the early portion of last season to develop his ball-handling skills and get comfortable with a new position. Then he lit up the scoreboard, overtaking Dawson for the scoring title in the last two games and finishing with an 18.2 points per game average. An excellent shooter and adept passer, McCloud is one of the top returnees in the Metro this

Dawson was among the conference leaders in scoring and rebounding in 1987-88 and narrowly missed all-Metro honors his first year. Dawson came to FSU with a reputation as a proficient scorer after earning first team All-America honors at Gulf Coast Community College. Seldom has a player lived up to his press clippings like Dawson — he literally carried the Tribe offense early in the year, baffling opponents for an average of 17.9 points and 7.6 rebounds per game. After further rehabilitation to a leg injured in a childhood accident, he should be in all-conference form this season.

Tat Hunter may have been the biggest suprise of last year. Most experts pointed to the lack of a true center as a major problem for FSU, but the 6-7 Hunter led the Metro with an impressive nine rebounds per game average. He also av-


eraged 9.4 points per contest and led the squad with 40 dunks. His outstanding work on the boards was a major reason Florida State was outrebounded just seven times in 30 games.

FSU's fourth returning starter is hot-shooting guard Tharon Mayes. Among the nation's top three-point shooters last season, he hit 46 percent (46 of 100) from behind the threepoint stripe. Mayes improved steadily as the year progressed and finished the season as the third leading scorer with a 13.2 points per game average.

A talented group of sophomores make up the bulk of what could be one of the best benches in college basketball. Michael Polite earned a spot on the Metro's all-freshman team despite starting just one game last year. He averaged 6.3 points and 3.8 rebounds and his pure athletic ability drew praise from coaches and fans. Brad Johnson joins Polite in a "sixth man" role. A quarterback on the football team, coaches credit Johnson's solid play as a freshman for FSU's success in avoiding an upset in 1987-88. Johnson started 11 games at small forward and averaged 5.9 points and 1.6 rebounds

Aubry Boyd came on late last year to play impressive ball. The 6-6 point guard showed an ability to play inside and may see time at forward this year. David White should benefit from a year of collegiate experience after adjusting to a small forward position. Joey Barnes returns to back-up at both (Continued on page 86)



1989 Squad Takes Shape as Martin Goes for 500th Win

Through the years, coaches of all sports have heard it. "Coach, you should have your head examined!" Last year, Florida State baseball coach Mike Martin accidentally did just that.

Martin, watching his team take infield as he has thousands of times, stood behind the pitcher's mound on the Howser Stadium playing surface when. Smash! Martin was tagged by a line-drive

throw of freshman catcher Marc Ronan. Falling to the ground as if struck by an assassin's bullet, Martin frightened every member of his team. A trip to the emergency room and 22 stitches later, though, he was ready for the start of the season.

Martin's luck was not fitting for a coach who this season is on schedule to reach the 500-win plateau faster than anyone in NCAA history. With FSU's second victory this spring, Martin will reach that mark. Following the unlucky beginning of last season, Martin proceeded to demonstrate his coaching prowess by leading his freshman-filled team and young pitching staff to within two games of the College World

"That ball club far exceeded expectations with the schedule we had to play," Martin said of his 50-18-1 team. "If you had told me at the beginning of the year LSU wouldn't have even gone to a regional and we would have come within two games of the World Series, I would have driven you to Chattahoochee.'

There's little doubt 1988 was Martin's finest piece of coaching. Sure, his previous two Seminole teams loitered at the top of the polls and twice visited Omaha, but with drastically decreased talent, the 1988 Seminoles narrowly missed a return trip to the big show.

That team is just another chapter in Martin's book of success over the last nine seasons at FSU. His is an awesome record of achievement at one of the nation's top collegiate baseball programs.

Martin's happy marriage to Florida State began nearly two decades ago. Martin came to FSU following two All-America seasons at Wingate Junior College and his prowess at the plate continued throughout his career at Florida State. His senior year, Martin hit .373 and was the Tribe's starting centerfielder.

Drafted by the New York Mets out of college, Martin spent a short stint in the club's farm system. As a rookie, he roomed with Houston Astros superstar Nolan Ryan. Martin later moved back to Tallahassee and began his coaching career at Tallahassee Community College and later Godby High School.

A few years later, the Charlotte, N.C. native joined the Seminole staff as an assistant under current Seattle Mariners' general manager Woody Woodward and also coached under

Martin, who has had a role as a player, assistant and head coach in five of Florida State's nine College World Series appearances, succeeded Howser on November 27, 1979.

He soon raised the level of the program to another plateau. One of the most influential coaches in the college game, he sits on the influential NCAA Championship Advisory Committee which annually selects teams and sites for postseason play. He was also the catalyst in FSU's one million dollar renovation of Howser Stadium.

"Six years ago, Florida State was one of the few schools that had a baseball stadium," Martin said. "Now I can think of six schools in close proximity that have undergone stadium

Martin's accomplishments on the field are equally impressive. In nine seasons, Seminole teams have won at least 50 games a year, while playing host to NCAA Regional Tournaments in eight consecutive seasons. He came within one game of a national championship in 1986. Through the years, he has coached current Boston Red Sox star Jody Reed, All-American Richie Lewis and Golden Spikes Award winners Jeff Ledbetter and Mike Loynd.

Martin is also one of the most colorful skippers around with a special knack for coming up with one-liners. Following a 10-7 come-from-behind win over Florida in Gainesville one season, Martin said, "What an emotional lift this series is for us, we haven't swept Florida in Gainesville since Hitler was a corporal."

At the end of last season, when FSU fell to Stetson on the final day of the regional, the state's media filled a tiny press

Eagles Flying High on Way Back to Playoffs

The bald guy is usually hard to miss at a Georgia Southern football practice. Hands clapping, he stands behind the offense, directing athletes through plays.

During the course of practice, he may move to the defense to lend some guidance. Or maybe he'll ease over to the special teams. Or the scout teams.

His day starts before the sun emerges, yet he can be found barking, 'Go' during practice-ending sprints as the sun begins to set. Always, he's keeping an eye out for examples of extra effort from his players – the kind of effort that looms so important in a close game down the stretch.

It may be 90 degrees in the shade in this south Georgia town of Statesboro, but Coach Erk Russell, with the Telly Savalas look, commands 100 percent effort from his Eagles. And the hard work and sweat have registered into victories for the Georgia Southern Eagles, 38 in just a little more than three years.

In the last three seasons, the Eagles won two Division I-AA national titles. Last season, in what was expected to be a rebuilding year, they advanced to the quarterfinals of the Division I-AA playoffs.

"(Winning) is my livelihood. That's why I'm here," Russell said.
"That's what I think about 24 hours a day, 12 months a year."

Perhaps Russell is as industrious as the 8,000-student Georgia Southern College, where enrollment has nearly doubled since 1981 when the school revived its football program after 40 years. The opportunity for new challenges intrigued Russell, coordinator for Vince Dooley's Junkyard Dawg defense.

In Russell's first season at GSC (1982), the Eagles finished 7-3-1. The next season, Southern upgraded its program to Division I-AA, a step below the Florida States, Floridas and Miamis.

Three short years later, on ESPN, the Eagles rallied from a 28-8 deficit in the third quarter to defeat Furman 44-42 to capture the division's championship. Southern's quarterback Tracy Ham would eventually go on to spearhead another national championship the following year. Ham is now the starting quarterback for the Edmonton Eskimos in the Canadian Football League.

But Southern has never defeated a Division I-A school. The Eagles lost to East Carolina 35-33 in 1986 and 16-13 in 1987. GSC lost to the Florida Gators 38-14 in the 1986 season opener.

Again Russell has assembled a Division I-AA powerhouse. As of Oct. 1, the Eagles were ranked 11th in Division I-AA by the NCAA.

The Eagles' offense is orchestrated by sophomore quarterback Raymond Gross. The 6-foot, 180-pounder is the Jamelle Hollieway of Division I-AA. He may be more dangerous during a broken play than one drawn on the blackboard. It was the insertion of Gross as a starter midway through last season that propelled Southern into the playoffs.

How much does Gross mean to the Georgia Southern offense? Well, after spraining an ankle near the end of the first half against Tennessee-Chattanooga, Southern failed to score in the second half. The ankle never fully healed and Gross was a mere shadow of himself the next week on a rain-soaked field at Middle Tennessee. Gross was pulled late in the second quarter as the Eagles fell behind 17-3.

"We have a quarterback-oriented offense," Russell said, "And

when our quarterback has a big game, the team usually does well."

But the Eagles aren't one dimensional by any means. Sophomore fullback Joe Ross led the squad in rushing with 1,125 yards and was named a third-team Division I-AA All-America by the Associated Press last year. He started this season hampered by a sore ankle but finally got in gear against Middle Tennessee State, rushing for a career-high 157 yards.

Ernest Thompson and Karl Miller line up as slotbacks in the offensive formation. Both have excellent speed and are threats to take option pitches and go all the way. Thompson has already scored seven touchdowns.

When the Eagles are forced to the air, wideout Tony Belser is the man they look to most. Belser set a single season record for receptions with 35 in 1987. He has caught at least one pass in the last 14 games.

Injuries have mounted against the defense this season for Southern. And that can be devastating since Division I-AA schools are allowed only 70 scholarships.

Eagles' defensive coordinator Mike Healey believed he had a strong unit going into the season, despite the graduation of seven starters. With a long list of injuries, Southern now starts three freshmen and five sophomores.

"We're awfully thin on the defensive side." Healey said, "I went into the huddle and I didn't recognize three or four of the players who were in the huddle. We just have to piece together things and get ready to play."

There are still several quality players in the Eagles 4-3 scheme. Sophomore defensive end Giff Smith recorded four quarterback sacks against UT-Chattanooga and diminutive linebacker Darrell Hendrix (6-0, 213) leads the squad in tackles.

Southern's special teams have played well so far. Freshman David Cool kicks long field goals while Mike Dowis boots short field goals and extra points. Cool's longest field goal came from 50 yards out against UT-Chattanooga. Sophomore Terry Harvin, from Keystone Heights, Fla., does the Eagles' punting.

Although the Eagles would savor a victory over Florida State here today, Russell and his squad are pointing toward a return to the I-AA playoffs to bring another national championship to Statesboro.




Joseph W. Cullen

Athletes command a unique position in American society and in societies throughout the world. Many view the athlete as a hero who strives for perfection. The public expects excellence, and to achieve these high standards and thereby maintain public favor. the athlete must maintain peak alertness, responsiveness, efficiency and coordination.

A small segment of the athlete population has resorted to the use of drugs (e.g., anabolic steroids, amphetamines and various "street drugs") purported to improve physical performance. The decision to use drugs to improve physical performance, for the most part, has not been based on sound information and could have dire physical consequences for involved individuals. Further, such usage violates NCAA ethical principles.

The ethics of sport need to be emphasized, particularly in that taking drugs to improve performance constitutes cheating. There is need to reemphasize the fact that the important thing in sport is to compete honorably; to win at all costs is a contradiction to the meaning of sport.

The athlete should not carry all the blame for the situation. Coaches, trainers and the medical profession need to share some of this burden, as does the public, for expecting and frequently demanding a winning effort every time.

Society has placed a number of demands upon the athlete. If one believes that athletes and the general public will make sound judgments most of the time when provided with the necessary information, educating athletes and others about drug effects. appropriate drug use and the skills needed to cope with such problems could have substantial benefits to the individual and to

Injuries Aside, Floyd Fights On

In the Florida State football version of the game show "Jeopardy", the answer is—

Concussion, hairline fracture right foot, fractured fifth metatarsal left foot, stress fracture left foot, shoulder injury, left shoulder dislocations, surgery on left shoulder, broken wrist, twisted ankle, and sprained ankle.

The question is **not** "What are the injuries on a busy day at a local hospital emergency room?" or "What are a list of Florida State injuries after the Michigan State game earlier this year?", although both are good guesses.

The correct question — "What are a list of FSU running back Victor Floyd's injuries?" There's no doubt those injuries have put Floyd's career in "jeopardy" many times in his five seasons at Florida State and before.

According to Floyd, a native of Pensacola, he has always been injury-prone. His list of hurts stretches back to his little league days.

"All my life, I've had some type of nagging injury," the 6-1, 205 pound senior said. "When I was small, my baseball team was playing in a state championship playoff game. The night before the game I was supposed to pitch, my little

brother hit me over the head with a bat and I couldn't throw."

Throughout his athletic career, the stories are similar. At age 14, his Pop Warner football team was contending for a state championship when Victor suffered a dislocated shoulder and missed the playoffs. Because of that injury, Floyd decided to stick to his first love — baseball.

Floyd gave up football for four years, until his senior year of high school.

"I loved, and still love, the game of baseball," Floyd said. "I was skeptical about playing football after injuring my shoulder in the Pop Warner league, but I decided to give it a try my junior year of high school. I went out and dislocated the shoulder. The next year, there was a new coach and everybody kept asking me to go out, so I decided to give it another try."

After rushing for 1,500 yards on 176 carries, including games of 230 and 298 yards his senior year, he was glad he tried. Floyd was named to the first team 3A all-state squad and was an honorable mention selection to the Adidas All-America team. Soon, college football recruiters were frequent visitors, anxious to sign this player who had come out of nowhere to become one of the top players in the state.

"It was something new to have coaches recruiting me," he remembered. "All the college coaches who came by asked why I hadn't played before. I just loved all sports — football, baseball, basketball, track. I tried to do a little bit of everything."

He's carried the idea over to his Florida State career. Maybe one of the best words to describe Floyd is versatile. At the running back position, he's done a little bit of everything. A self-proclaimed "finesse" back, Floyd has been successful rushing the football — he ranks ninth on the Florida State career rushing list with 1,507 yards. He has been a dependable receiver with 40 catches for 383 yards, including seven grabs this season. A tailback all his life, Floyd has even made the switch to fullback this year, where he is required to handle more blocking assignments.

"Fullback calls for a lot more blocking but I'm used to our blocking requirements because I've been here a long time," Floyd said. "The move was good for me, because I'm getting more playing time. It was limited with Sammie, Dexter and me at tailback. Being a fifth-year senior, I felt like I was not contributing, just standing on the sideline.

With me and Dexter in the ball game at the same time, either of us can catch a pass and it adds another dimension."

Although Floyd is comfortable with his blocking abilities now, it wasn't always so.

"Coach McDuffie used to give me a hard time about my blocking," Floyd recalled. "When I first got here, they called me 'Pink' Floyd. I didn't like it much at first, but now I've adapted to it. "

Floyd has made strides in off-the-field areas as well. Not known as a great student, he will have just 18 hours left for a degree in criminology after this semester. He admits football used to get in the way of his classes.

"It was mental in the beginning," he said. "I was bothered about not playing my freshman year; I had never sat on the bench before. I let football get in the way of school, but the older I've become, the more I realized how important school is "

He has received plenty of support in both football and academics from his family. His mother, sisters and brother attend most of the Florida State home games and also travel to some away contests. His mother offers free medical advice, too.

"When I broke my foot earlier this year, the doctors told me it would be four to six weeks until I could play," Victor said. "I was determined to play. One day my mom called and said in high school I had a twisted ankle and we put a pad under my arch to support it. So we went to the store, bought one and I put it in my shoe. Now she feels like she's a hero. I don't know if the pad is what's helping, all I know is the foot feels great."

The newest member of the Floyd family is his wife, Faye. The couple met in a summer enrichment program before both started school at Florida State, and have been together since. While Victor said married life is going great, he does have competition around the house. Faye was a fierce competitor in high school days in Orlando, advancing to the state track meet.

"Faye played basketball in high school too, so we go out and play one-on-one sometimes during the off-season," Floyd said. "I have to let her win to keep her happy. That way she won't get discouraged and will play me again."

Floyd is definitely familiar with competition. In addition to competition between the running backs at practice everyday and hotly contested basketball games with Faye, his younger brother is attacking Victor's records at Pensacola High.

"He wants to break everything I did," Victor said with a sigh. "He's really into competing with me. Even though he's six years younger than me, he's bigger, stronger and healthier than I was."

Despite his injury trouble, Victor has had some great moments in his career. In 1985, Floyd came on to claim the starting tailback job as a redshirt freshman and averaged nearly seven yards per carry. Against

South Carolina, he rushed for 212 yards, the fourth best single game performance in FSU history. Floyd's best season as a Seminole was in 1986, his sophomore campaign, when he was the squad's leading rusher. He ran for 654 yards on 129 carries and had another excellent day against South Carolina with 119 yards, two touchdowns and four catches for 60 yards.

"Performance-wise, I've had a history of playing South Carolina well," Floyd said. "My freshman year I piled up quite a bit of yardage. I don't know why, I just seem to have good days against them."

Now that Floyd is a senior, he sees himself in a leadership role, and is happy to help out the younger backs, just as Greg Allen and Cedric Jones did when he was a young running back.

"I try to be a leader as far as in practice, going from drill to drill," he said. "Some of the backs come to me, ask me certain things about a play or how a hole develops. I give 'em a hand. Ability-wise, this is the most talented group of running backs we've had in a while."

It's fair to say Victor Floyd is a different person than the freshman who came to Florida State in the summer of 1984. He's matured academically and athletically. He's adapted well to some of the toughest situations any athlete faces — injuries.

He's spent frustrating minutes that seem like hours on the sidelines with foot, ankle and shoulder problems, unable to do what he loves — play football. He's worked to get healthy, only to sustain another injury. With a positive attitude, intense determination and years of hard work, through the worst of times, Victor Floyd has endured, always promising to return. No one doubts he will.

Two outstanding freshmen complete FSU's roster. Lorenzo Hands, a point guard from Twin Lakes High in West Palm Beach, was runner-up for the 1988 "Mr. Basketball" title and could be an immediate contributor for the Seminoles. Hands comes from the same program that produced Dallas Maverick Derek Harper. Byron Wells carries a list of impressive prep accomplishments and his outside touch at 6-

8 will be tough to defend.

"I guess some people would shy away from expecting too much," said Kennedy, whose record stands at 38-22, including two post-season tournament bids, in his two years at Florida State. "But I just believe in our players and our program. The NCAA bid last year really gave us confidence. When I say us, I mean the coaching staff, the players, the administration and the fans. Everyone concerned with the program can see Florida State basketball coming on and I think this year you will see the Seminole program go a step further. Now that step? I think I'll keep that prediction to myself."

room to hear Martin blast his team.

"I tell you guys one thing," Martin said to open the press conference. "You could get me on the ground and kick me and beat me up, and I wouldn't say anything bad about this ball club."

Just a day before, Martin and his team dropped its first game of the tournament to arch-rival Florida. Martin was escorted to the press room, where he patiently waited for reporters to conclude interviews with winning coach Joe Arnold. Before entering the room, however, a member of the Sports Information staff stepped on Martin's glasses, badly disfiguring them. Without a word, Martin took the glasses and placed them on his face — almost. One side of the frame hung far off center, prompting the crowd of reporters to laugh.

"It's a tough day when you get whipped by your rival and then your S.I.D. steps on your glasses," Martin said with a smile.

Martin will build on last year's nucleus of underclassmen in assembling his 1989 team. The Seminoles return15 players, 10 sophomores. As fall practice started two weeks ago, the practice field was crowded with the veterans and Rod Delmonico's latest recruiting class which includes eight junior college players and seven freshmen.


Already, Martin has singled out the performance of his pitching staff, led by last year's ace in the bullpen, Ricky Kimball (7-2, 2.44 ERA). Kimball, a freshman All-America selection as a reliever last year, led the staff with 30 appearances while striking out 77 in 77.1 innings.

"Ricky certainly has the ability to be one of the names you remember in Seminole baseball," Martin said. "He was not used in the role that may be his best (reliever) last year. This year, I think we will move him back to the starting rotation and we'll even use him in the bullpen."


FSU also returns infielders Brad Parker and Buddy Cribb, but the infield positions appear to be up for grabs during the fall practice season. At third base, the Seminoles expect to use any number of players. The leading candidate for the spot is Rob Bargas from Sac City Community College, who turned down a lucrative professional offer to attend FSU.

The key for the Seminoles is replacing Edwin Alicea at second base and Donnie Erickson at shortstop — the key middle infield positions. Martin hopes the puzzle will be solved with signees, Rocky Rau (San Jacinto JuCo), Bob Reboin (Sac City CC) and Allen Bevis (Tallahassee Florida High)

Martin figures the outfield to be equally crowded with the return of starting rightfielder Dean Harrison and utility player John Marc Tamayo, who will be challenged by several newcomers.
