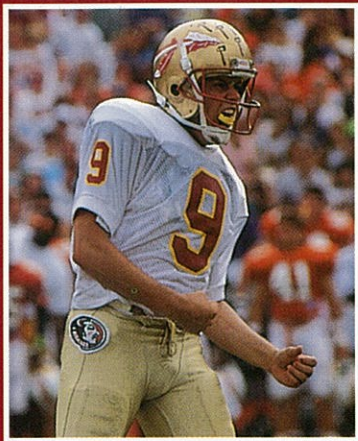


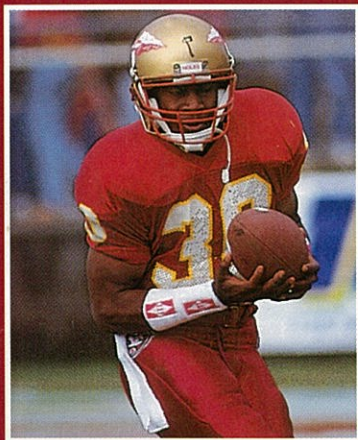

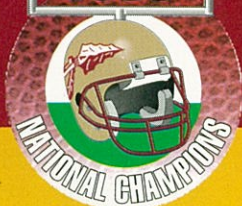

Seven straight top four finishes. Nine straight bowl wins. Two hundred thirty-nine career victories. Fifth on the all-time Division I-A coaching win list. The nation's winningest bowl coach by percentage — ever. Fourteen top 20 finishes in 18 seasons. Two Atlantic Coast Conference championships. Thirteen career bowl wins. Seven straight 10-win seasons.

It all adds up to an impressive list of credentials compiled by Florida State University Head Coach Bobby Bowden during a 28-year coaching career. But even with all those accomplishments to his name, not a day went by, hardly an interview concluded, without Bowden having to answer The Question.

"Do you feel your career is missing something without a national title?"

or

"Does winning the national championship eat away at you?"

or

"Does NOT winning the national title keep you awake at nights?"

And every time, even though he had answered the query a hundred times before, the Florida State coach would reply in this vein.

"Sure, I'd like to have one (a national championship), but I don't stay awake at nights thinking about it. It's not what motivates me.

"To me, the most satisfying thing is win-

ning games. I like winning 10 games a year. If they said you could go 11-1, 10-2, 11-1 every year and not win it, or go 5-6, 4-7 and then win one, I'd rather win the games."

Before Bobby Bowden set one foot in the Orange Bowl on Jan. 1, 1994, he was a college football coaching legend. Before Derrick Alexander led a ferocious charge on the top rushing attack in the country, before Matt Frier's impassioned halftime speech and William Floyd's determined running, before Charlie Ward's final masterpiece drive and Scott Bentley's most perfect field goal, even before Byron Bennett's "wide left" and the final gun — Bobby Bowden was a winner. But before that 18-16 victory over Nebraska, Bowden could not escape The Question.

Now, he never has to hear it again. And that, to him, may be the best thing about winning the national championship.

In the early morning hours of Jan. 2, when Bowden's Seminoles were unanimously proclaimed the 1993 national champions, it was hard to tell whether the veteran coach felt more happiness at winning that one single game, or relief about adding the missing element to his nearly unending list of accomplishments.

That morning, there was also a clue to just what has made Bobby Bowden one of the most successful college coaches in history. Because after the late night celebration with family and friends, the morning television shows and photo shoots, Bowden was already working on 1994. He went recruiting.

"I'll probably get to enjoy this in February," Bowden said at a press con-

ference later that morning. He wasn't kidding.

His "day after," spent in the homes of five top Miami area recruits, also showed that just because Bowden earned that first national championship, doesn't mean he's ready to stop there.

"The way I've got it figured, after retirement, there's only one big event left," Bowden said. "And I'm not ready for that."

Indeed, Bowden's "lifetime" contract at Florida State is renewed every year for a five-year period, ensuring that the man whose name has become synonymous with Florida State football will finish his career in Tallahassee.

Back in 1976, when then-president Stanley Marshall and athletic director John Bridgers brought Bowden to Tallahassee from West Virginia, there were few clues that the Birmingham, Ala., native would transform Florida State into the football power it is today. When he arrived at Florida State, the Seminoles had won just four games in the previous three seasons, including an 0-11 campaign in 1973. There was talk of ending the program.

"When I was at Alabama, all I heard was 'Beat Auburn.' When I was at West Virginia, all I heard was 'Beat Pitt.' When I got to FSU, their bumper stickers read 'Beat Anybody!'" Bowden joked in the early years.

Bowden had been hung in effigy in West Virginia, despite compiling a 42-26 record at the school in six years there and taking the Mountaineers to a pair of Peach Bowl berths. He left after a 9-3 season at WVU and returned to Tallahassee, where he had been an assistant coach under Bill Peterson from 1963-65, coaching the FSU wide receivers.

Upon his return to Florida State, Bowden immediately united the Seminole fans, alumni and team under a common goal. That goal — to play arch-rival Florida on an even keel. It's a promise he has kept. Since Bowden's arrival, the Tribe is 10-8 against UF.

Within two years of his arrival, Bowden led the Seminoles to their first 10-win sea-

son and to their first bowl game in six years when his 1977 team went 10-2, including a Tangerine Bowl victory over Texas Tech. It was just a preview of things to come.

In Bowden's 18 seasons at Florida State, the Seminoles have won 10 or more games 10 times. FSU has been to 15 bowl games in his 18 years, including a string of 12 in a row and eight New Year's Day trips. Prior to his arrival, Florida State had been to just eight bowls in 29 years. His FSU win total of 166 is greater than the total of the school's previous seven head coaches combined, making him easily the winningest coach ever at Florida State.

Bowden's Florida State record is 166-46-3. His teams have become nearly unbeatable at home with an 88-15-1 record, while earning the head coach "King of the Road" status with a 78-31-2 mark outside of Tallahassee. Many of those 78 wins came in some of the toughest stadiums in the country, as his squads played at Nebraska, Clemson, Notre Dame, LSU and Michigan, to name a few. By playing some of the nation's toughest schedules, Bowden earned respect for his team, lured the top players to his program and developed a reputation as an intense competitor, unafraid to take on anyone, anywhere.

Bowden has brought a 47-year-old Florida State football program into the national limelight. FSU is now mentioned in the same breath as long-time football powers Notre Dame, Michigan, USC and Nebraska. The Seminoles have become a mainstay in the Associated Press Top 25, and of late, the top 10. Under Bowden, the Seminoles have spent 127 weeks in the top 10. In the last three seasons alone, FSU has spent 24 weeks as number one and has rarely strayed

from the top five. In 18 seasons, Bowden's FSU teams have 14 top 20 finishes.

Last season's 12-1 record and No. 1 final ranking tied Florida State with Miami as the only schools ever to post seven straight top four finishes. Over the past seven seasons, the Seminoles have finished second (1987 and '92), third (1988 and '89), fourth (1990 and '91) and first (1993).

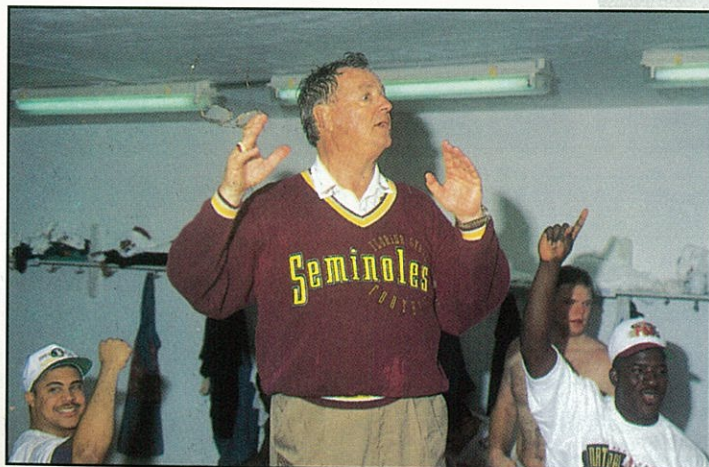
Those 10-win seasons keep adding up, and Bowden's career victories now total 239. Only four coaches in the history of Division I-A football

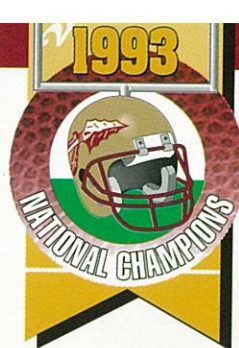

Game No. 19 ... Season No. 3 ... Record: undefeated.
So reads the record book under Florida State as the Seminoles have posted a 19-0 ledger in ACC play, just two shy of tying Maryland's record winning streak of 21 games set in the mid-1970s.

There is no secret along Tobacco Road, or down in South Carolina, or up in Maryland, that the Seminoles have a huge target on their back. Each school wants to be the first to beat mighty Florida State in the ACC football wars.

The desire is understandable, even healthy.

Imagine the frustration of constantly reading about how the Seminoles have so dominated this proud conference. As a fan, switch places and feel the hair on the

back of your neck stand on end as they talk about another conference member pounding your "helpless" Seminoles.

Truth is, none of the ACC is harmless. Someone is going to beat Florida State, and more than a little mousse must be dabbed by ACC fans to plaster down that hair.

Perhaps no school's nose is pushed out of joint more than today's rival — North Carolina.

The Tar Heels are a proud bunch. Which has, at times, inspired the rest of the league to want to powder their blue when they get the chance. North Carolina boasts one of the most successful athletic programs in the history of collegiate athletics and, in a league where it is difficult to rise any higher academically, they stand with the very best.

When FSU made the decision to join the ACC, one of the most universally contemplated questions was who would emerge as its rival.

Got to have one! Got to have a team that you want to beat more than any other.

Most guessed that Clemson would take on that immediate feel of the "big" rival. After all, FSU and Clemson had some tremendous games before the Seminoles and Tigers became conference pals including the infamous "Puntrooskie" game. And Tiger fans made no effort to disguise their impression that they were the football school in the conference.

Georgia Tech seemed to be the other leader in the clubhouse. With Atlanta just up the road from Tallahassee and a long history of playing the Yellow Jackets in the past, FSU fans seemed eager to paint the Ramblin' Wreck as the enemy. Charlie Ward may have derailed that for a few years with his dramatic come-from-behind heroics in Atlanta two years ago.

So, until FSU loses that first game it is North Carolina that seems to be — the rival! Appropriately, it's a rivalry born on the hard wood of the basketball court in this hoop-loving group.

Born when a flashy Seminole basketball team made its debut in the ACC — on the road — in , of all places, Chapel Hill.

With literally every ACC fan glued to the game, the Seminoles did what no one thought they would. They beat mighty Carolina on the road to start their own ACC basketball history.

To add the appropriate drama that fuels a good rivalry, guard Sam Cassell, displaying his wonderful sense of humor, tagged the UNC crowd as a "wine and cheese" group.

The media loved it, Tar Heel haters immortalized it and Carolina fans have not forgotten it.

Tonight, North Carolina will battle to end Florida State's winning streak — in Tallahassee — on national television, with history in the making.

Such is the joy of college football RIVALRIES.

It is Hitachi's and the College Football Association's privilege to participate in an on-field ceremony recognizing Tim Kerigan as Florida State's 1993 "Hitachi Promise of Tomorrow" scholarship recipient.

The "Hitachi Promise of Tomorrow" program awards a participant from each of the 67 CFA member institutions' football programs \$5,000 to continue his or her graduate studies or certification requirements in the field of education. "Hitachi Promise of Tomorrow" is the largest corporate-funded scholarship program associated with college football.

Kerigan, a native of Mexico Beach, Fla., was a Florida State student trainer for four years. Working with the Seminole football

team during 1993 provided Tim an opportunity to participate in and experience the national championship season. have more. Bear Bryant, Amos Alonzo Stagg, Pop Warner and Joe Paterno are ahead of Bowden on that all-time win list. The Orange Bowl win over Nebraska pushed Bowden ahead of Woody Hayes. It's mighty select company.

"To tell you the truth, when I started out, I never thought about breaking records or getting this many wins or that many. I just wanted to coach football and win games," Bowden said. "So far, it's worked out OK, so I guess I'll just stick with that."

Likewise, Bowden is hard-pressed to explain his unprecedented success in bowl games. Florida State's string of 12 bowl games without a loss dates back to the 1981 Orange Bowl, while the nine wins in nine straight seasons (an NCAA record) goes back to a 17-17 tie with Georgia in the 1984 Citrus Bowl. Only Bryant and

Paterno, with 15 each, have claimed more bowl wins than Bowden's 13. His 13-3-1 bowl record and .794 winning percentage is unmatched in the history of college football.

However, it is not Bowden's bowl victories or 10-win seasons or national rankings that make him special. Maybe it's his down-home accent, his folksy charm and his self-deprecating humor.

No one is a stranger for long. Bowden is quick with a handshake or a hug for everyone, big and small. He hates to say no to requests. He flies around the country every off day during the season and nearly every day during the offseason, giving speeches to churches and businesses, hospitals and youth groups, making appearances and shaking hands. His schedule would tire even a much younger man, but the 64-year-old makes it look easy. He has become Florida State's number one goodwill ambassador.

He enjoys dealing with the media and keeps up with what is written and said about his team. Everyday, he takes time out for phone calls and remains one of the most accessible major college coaches in the nation. His affinity for the media led some to say he was TOO well-liked, and that because he was a "good guy," people gave his teams a break in the polls last year. TOO well-liked? Too sincere? Well, if that's the worst thing people can say about you, it's been a pretty successful run.

Bowden is a man with his priorities in order. God and family top the list. In this day when coaches go crazy, threatening each other, throwing tantrums and living solely for their sport, Florida State's man says "I realized a long time ago that football is not life and death. It's just football, a nice game. I hate to lose, but I love life too much to let it get me down."

Bowden grew up in the shadow of Legion Field and was an all-star quarterback at Birmingham's Woodlawn High. From there, he went to Alabama, fulfilling a lifelong dream to play for the Crimson Tide. But, after one semester in Tuscaloosa, he returned to Birmingham to marry his

childhood sweetheart, Ann Estock. He transferred to Howard College (now Samford University) in his hometown and became a Little All-America signal-caller there in 1951.

After graduation in 1953, Bowden stayed at Howard as an assistant coach, serving in that capacity for two years before becoming head coach at South Georgia Junior College in Douglas, Ga. There, he compiled a 22-11 record and then returned to his alma mater as the head coach in 1959. He went 31-6 at Samford in four years, and dominated Alabama small-college football. Following his stint at FSU as an assistant coach, Bowden went to West Virginia as an assistant for three years and was subsequently promoted to the top job. Then, he slipped on a patch of West Virginia ice following his Florida State interview, made the decision to come to Tallahassee and the rest, as they say, is Seminole legend.

Bowden also is the patriarch of the "first family of college coaching." He and son Terry, the head coach at Auburn University and last year's national coach of the year, are the first father-son duo to lead Division I-A programs, let alone to coach them at the same time. Terry's brother, Tommy, is on his staff at Auburn, as is brother-in-law Jack Hines, who is married to Bobby and Ann's eldest daughter, Robyn. Youngest son Jeff joined the Florida State coaching staff in 1994 as the wide receivers coach. The rest of the Bowden clan includes Steve and Ginger. The six Bowden children and 14 grandchildren all attended last year's national championship game, making the victory truly a family event.

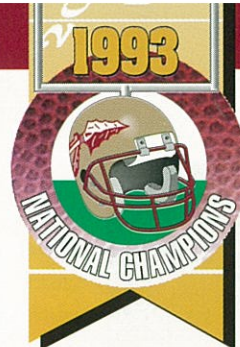

It happened with 4:32 remaining in the first half of Florida State's 41-17 season-opening win

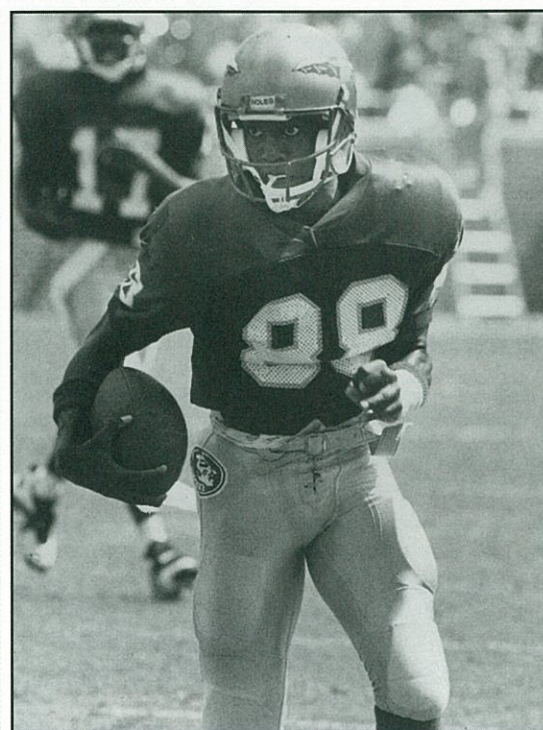
over Virginia.

With a modest four-yard grab, wide receiver Kez McCorvey surpassed Mike Shuman with his 135th career reception to move into second place on FSU's all-time career receiving list. McCorvey now has a shot at Ron Sellers' 212 career receptions atop the all-time list.

McCorvey shrugs off the accomplishment as if it were just another catch or just another day on the field. "I had to be reminded of that record. You look at what you accomplish for a second or two, then just go on. It does give me some immortality to be ranked second or ranked period at FSU. To be ranked anywhere close to the top at a school like this is something to be proud of."

The senior from Gautier, Miss., has become one of the Seminole players that opposing defenses have to key on. At 6-0, 185 pounds, McCorvey possesses an unimposing football frame. Yet his elusive moves and "soft hands" make him a player to be reckoned with. His precise routes and knack for getting open have made for long Saturdays for many a defensive back.

"I can do things better than other receivers" says a confident McCorvey. "I

forget last year's heroics at Notre Dame. With the Seminoles facing a fourth and goal situation with 2:26 remaining in the game from the Irish 20-yard line, Charlie Ward found McCorvey in the back of the endzone to keep FSU's comeback hopes alive.

Florida State's version of "Grace Under Pressure" takes it in

stride. "Making big plays is more a matter of confidence and just getting enough chances. I try to play every snap as if the game depended on it. If you get used to making big plays, then they become second nature."

Being the only returning starter at wide receiver, McCorvey is clearly FSU's "go-to" guy. He is surrounded by a young, untested, yet talented receiving corps. Naturally, all eyes are on McCorvey to lead. He is not a vocal leader. Bobby Bowden has even called him quieter than the notoriously soft-spoken Charlie Ward.

Receivers coach Jeff Bowden says McCorvey simply leads by example. "Kez is not a vocal guy; what he is is competitive every snap he takes, in practice and in the game. A guy that is competitive and wants to win at everything he does is going to be a great leader. You don't have to be real vocal to be a great leader. He is the best receiver I've coached."

"I'm not real outspoken," comments McCorvey. "On the field it's all business for me, and that's how it should be. I'm successful, so there's no need to boast and brag. Things have a way of taking care of themselves."

McCorvey, a sociology major, played on the same high school team as former Florida

Gator quarterback Shane Matthews, and ran pass routes against ex-Seminole star Terrell Buckley. It was Buckley who influenced his decision to come to Florida State. "Buck would come home to Mississippi and always talk about the players and how much he liked it here," remembers McCorvey. "He piqued my interest."

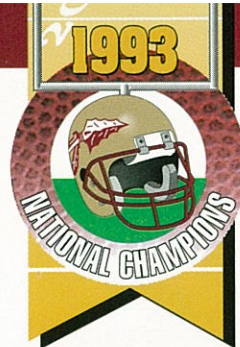
Opponents often don't know how to take McCorvey's laid-back attitude. He can often be seen tapping defenders' helmets after a play. "That's just something I do to try to compliment them. I'm not trying to bad-mouth them or make them look bad. That's just my way of telling them they did a good job. One guy from Duke took it the wrong way, and was yelling at me all the way from the sideline."

FSU cornerback Clifton Abraham said that McCorvey is more difficult to cover than a speed receiver. "I always said there's nobody out there besides Kez who can stick me one-on-one," said Abraham. "He changes directions before you realize it. The thing about Kez is if he beats you he makes you feel awful because he's nonchalant about it. He doesn't get in your face. He just tosses the ball to you and walks off."

A feeling felt by many faced with the task of covering McCorvey.

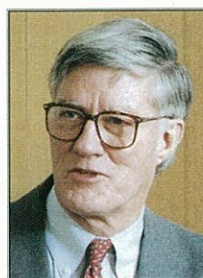
D'Alemberte served as the fourth dean of the FSU College of Law from 1984-1987 and has continued teaching on the law faculty.

of Denver, and Joshua Talbot, a senior at his father's alma mater, the University of the South. D'Alemberte is married to Patsy Palmer, children's-policy coordinator in Florida Gov. Lawton Chiles' office.

Talbot "Sandy" D'Alemberte

National Law Journal listed D'Alemberte as one of the 100 most powerful lawyers in the United States. He was the only law dean on the list and one of only 10 members of law faculties.

He was the 1991-92 president of the American Bar Association and the 1982-84

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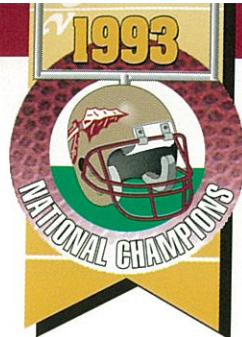
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Player Profile

When Dan Mowrey decided to attend Florida State, he envisioned leading the Seminoles to a national championship. What Mowrey did not have in mind was the role he would play during that championship season.

Mowrey was the Seminoles' first-team kicker during the 1991 and '92 seasons. Following the signing of high school All-American Scott Bentley, Mowrey found himself in an unfamiliar role; that of a backup. Bentley won a hotly contested battle for the Seminole kicking duties at the start of last season, leaving Mowrey as a backup for the first time in his life. Even though his role had changed, Mowrey was not about to throw in the towel. He sensed that his role as a leader was just beginning to blossom.

When Mowrey is not kicking, he is on the sidelines shouting words of encouragement. "I feel I played in every game last year. If not on the field, I played a role off the field."

Mowrey is quick to point out that he has not become complacent in his backup role. "Neither Scott nor I will let each other rest. We are constantly competing



against each other, and in the long run this competition will be a huge benefit for the team."

Head Coach Bobby Bowden agrees, "Both kickers watch out for one another, and if one doesn't do well, and the other one is, they know someone is right there who could step in and do the job."

Mowrey, a fifth-year senior who received his degree in political science this past summer, tries not to take his football competitiveness off the field. "In my free time, I like to hunt and fish, or play a round of golf. It helps me relax and gives me time to myself."

A Tallahassee native and graduate of Lincoln High School, Mowrey plans to continue his education after this season. "I hope to get into public relations, and even-

ually find a career in the sports industry." As Dan enters his final season at FSU, he would like nothing more than to walk away with another national championship ring on his finger. "I am willing to do whatever it takes to help this team achieve their goal of a repeat. And if that means that my role is to be a team leader on the sidelines, I am more

than willing to do that. I would do anything for this team." Nowhere is this more evident than on the practice field, where Mowrey keeps a positive attitude, all the

while still enjoying himself. "I love playing football, but I realize that it is just a game. I don't think of this as my life. It is something that got me into college to get an education."

Mowrey admits that it was not easy relinquishing the starting kicking duties, but he adds that he has no bitterness towards anyone.

"It was tough at first, but life goes on. It has been a dream of mine to play football for Florida State since I was a kid, and I would never give this opportunity up." Mowrey is so adamant about his pride in being a Seminole that he once told reporters after losing his kicking duties to Bentley, "If any of you even mention the word transfer, I will get up and leave."

Life poses many obstacles, but for Dan Mowrey it has not hindered his attempts to reach his goals. To his credit, he takes everything in stride. "I know my role for this team and I will do everything and anything that it takes to help this team be a winner."

Because of this attitude, Mowrey is the biggest winner of all.

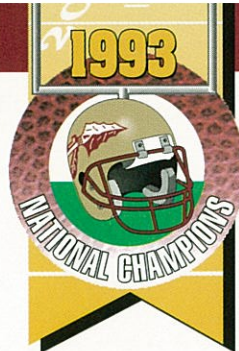


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The University

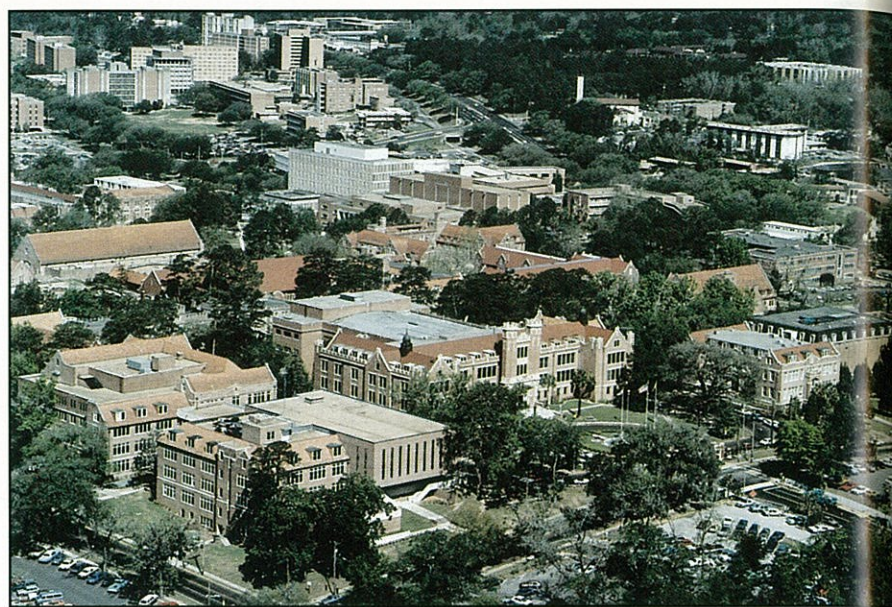
Florida State University, nearing its golden anniversary as a co-educational graduate research institution, is poised on the brink of joining the nation's academic elite.

A senior member of the 10-member State University System of Florida, FSU was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by legislative act and began operating in Tallahassee with its first students in 1857.

Today, Florida State's operating budget is \$415 million. Faculty and administrators generate more than \$100 million annually in external funding to supplement state-sponsored research. Three direct-support organizations serve to bolster the university: the private, non-profit FSU Foundation, which raises millions in private gifts to support academics, the Seminole Boosters and the FSU Alumni Association.

The main campus is spread over 418 acres in Tallahassee; FSU, which has the smallest campus in the SUS, has been actively acquiring land in the 1990s after many years of being landlocked at 347 acres. The university owns a total of 1,248 acres in Leon, Bay and Franklin counties.

Within the state, FSU maintains facilities at its 25-acre campus in Panama City, its Marine Laboratory on the Gulf of Mexico and the Appleton Museum in Ocala. The university's graduate theatre and film professional-training programs, the FSU/Asolo Conservatory of Professional Actor Training and FSU/Asolo Conservatory of Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts, are both located in the Asolo Performing Arts Center in Sarasota. The Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed



Switzerland, France, Panama, Costa Rica and the Caribbean. FSU's study centers in Florence, Italy, and London, England, are considered by many to be the best American universities in Europe.

Florida State offers 273 graduate and undergraduate degree programs through its eight colleges — Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication; Education; Engineering (operated jointly with Florida A&M University, a historically black institution); Human Sciences; Law; and Social Sciences (which also incorporates the School of Public Administration and Policy) — and eight schools — Criminology and Criminal Justice; Library and Information Studies; Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Work; Theatre; and Visual Arts and Dance.

With 1,558 members, the FSU faculty currently includes five members of the National Academy of Sciences and eight of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and has included five Nobel laureates. It is backed by 2,915 adminis-

tration system to other state university and national research libraries. The Paul A.M. Dirac Science Center Library is located at the heart of the university's main science research complex. FSU also maintains extensive music, library science and law libraries, and the Mildred and Claude Pepper Library houses the personal and professional papers of one of Florida's best known political couples.

On the top floor of the Dirac Library is the headquarters of the Supercomputer Computations Research Institute, a multidisciplinary, multinational program established in 1984 that brings together some 50 scientists, engineers and technicians. SCRI is electronically linked to an off-campus research complex at Innovation Park and the university's two powerful supercomputers.

Also providing unique research opportunities is the physics department's tandem Van de Graaff Superconducting Accelerator Laboratory, which houses two powerful atom smashers and is ranked among the top four nuclear research centers in the nation by the National Science Foundation.

In its mission of excellence in teaching, research and public service, Florida State University is advancing boldly into the 21st century.

FSU's main campus spreads out over 418 acres in Tallahassee.

This is Florida State

in the Florida State Conference Center on the edge of the main campus, provides extensive credit and non-credit continuing education programs statewide.

For years FSU has reached far beyond Florida through international programs in

One day as a youth many years ago, a spry 'Omar Ellison was playing a game of football with some of his friends. Suddenly a few of the neighborhood bullies showed up and decided to end the game by taking the ball.

"My best friend stood up to the two trouble makers and promptly received a bloody nose," recalls Ellison. Reflecting back, Ellison believes the experience to be one of the most memorable of his life.

"At that moment I didn't know what to do," Ellison remembers. "I didn't know whether to fight them, out think them, or grab the ball and out run them."

Fortunately, after a lengthy chase, the ball was recovered. But, to this day the lesson learned has not been forgotten. "The fact that I was indecisive could've cost me my football. Since that day I have tried to prepare myself for the situations that will arise in my life."

Away from the field, 'Omar likes to have fun like most of his teammates. However, Ellison spends a lot of his time in what he calls "The Mental World."

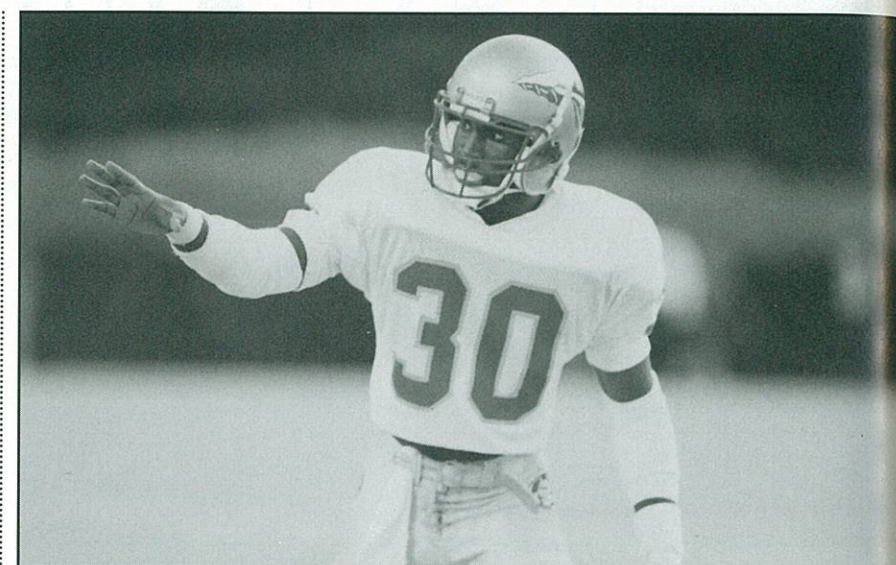

Ellison strives to put himself on par with the likes of Joe Montana, Jerry Rice and Michael Jordan. "When I line up against a cornerback I want him to be saying, 'Oh no, here comes that Ellison guy again.'"

The 6-1, 209-pound wide receiver from Griffin, Ga., has plenty of what it takes to make the big play, but he rarely contemplates the physical part of the game. "I think that football is just like life," says the philosopher in Ellison. "If I can conquer my challenges on the field, then I can certainly use that off the field to make myself a better person."

The phrases, "make myself a better



person" and "get better every day" consistently come up in conversation with No. 30. A devout Muslim, Ellison explains it this way. "My religion is based on peace and perfection. Muslims are always striving to be like the Creator. I know that I can never be totally perfect, but I'm always trying."

After this semester Ellison will be six hours shy of completing his undergraduate degree requirements. By the looks of his masculine physique, the nutrition and fitness major knows exactly how to apply his studies.

League, but if that doesn't happen I won't be discouraged. I'll then turn my focus toward being an intellect."

'Omar aspires to publish works on dietary habits and nutrition. "I want to write books and then tour the country giving lectures. People need to realize that what they put into their body is a direct reflection of what they get out of their body."

Speed is something that 'Omar gets out of his body. His 4.42 time in the 40 is the fastest on the team. That kind of speed makes him one of the Seminoles' deep threats. His background as a high school running back makes him hard to bring down after the catch.

Although he has not received the playing time he hoped for, Ellison is not disappointed. "Most people only know what a diamond looks like when it's in its finished form. If people are trying to find a diamond and they only know what the finished form looks like, then they will pass by many unfinished ones in the process."

Ellison views his first four years at Florida State as his time of being a diamond-in-the-rough. As every gem connoisseur knows, the most brilliant stones are the result of extensive cutting and polishing. 'Omar Ellison is completing the refining stage and is on the verge of shining with the best of them.

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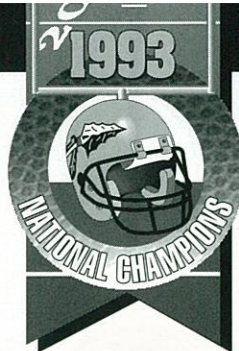
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Spotlight on Philanthropy

Loyal support from persons who understand a university's mission is a testament to the quality and credibility of the university. Florida State University can take great pride in the eloquent testimonials present in the support of two emeriti faculty members with a combined 76 years of service to the University.

Dr. Daisy Parker Flory, who retired as Dean of the Faculties and Professor Emerita of Government in 1984, and Dr. Don Veller, who retired as Professor Emeritus of Physical Education in 1982, both continue to have a great impact on FSU and its students in retirement as they did during long, illustrious careers.

Daisy Parker Flory graduated from the Florida State College for Women (FSCW) — the predecessor of FSU — in 1937. She obtained graduate degrees in government at the University of Virginia and joined the FSCW faculty in government in 1942. During the next 42 years, she distinguished herself as a teacher, scholar, friend of students and administrator. Her service as Dean of the Faculty from 1973 to 1984 distinguishes her as the highest-ranking woman administrator in FSU history. Among her many great interests while serving FSU, and since, has been the athletic program, especially women's athletics. She won the Ross Oglesby Award in 1981 for outstanding service to FSU athletics, received the Herbert F. Morgan Award for women's ath-

wing of the Coyle E. Moore Athletic Center named the Daisy Parker Flory Wing.

She is a life member of the FSU Alumni Association. She and her husband Claude — a retired FSU English professor — are members of the Seminole Boosters, and she is serving as a co-chair of the FSCW portion of *An Investment in Learning*, FSU's \$200 million capital campaign. The FSU Alumni Association has recently honored her further by establishing what will be, with state matching dollars, a \$150,000 Daisy Parker Flory Endowed Professorship.

Dr. Don Veller became Florida State football coach in 1948, and by 1950 had

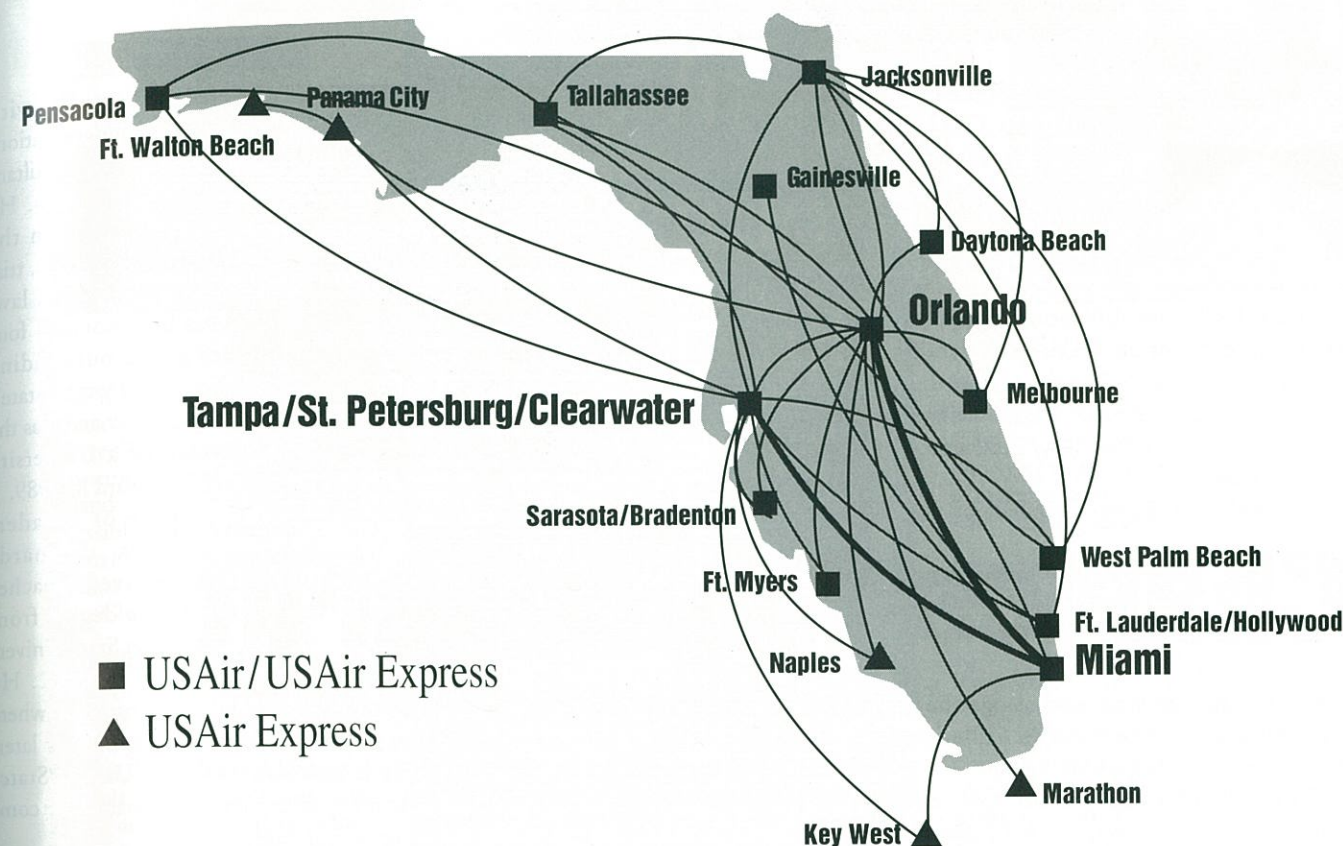
He coached the team to 15 straight appearances in the NCAA Championship, and the 1957 team went undefeated. He coached and helped in the professional development of a number of successful PGA Touring Pros, including Hubert Green, Paul Azinger, Jeff Sluman, Kenny Knox and Brian Kamm.

Dr. Veller is a member of five halls of fame: Indiana Football Hall of Fame, FSU Hall of Fame, State of Florida Sports Hall of Fame, Indiana University Hall of Fame and National Golf Coaches Hall of Fame. He also received the Indiana University Distinguished Alumni Service Award.

Veller has long demonstrated a great commitment to FSU, and now that commitment has become a significant financial investment. He and Frances, his wife of 58 years, made gifts to Florida State's *An Investment in Learning* campaign which total \$395,000 plus state matching funds. The Vellers' gift will be used primarily to create named, endowed scholarships for Florida State students and for the purpose of researching, promoting and displaying, in a museum-type atmosphere, the history and traditions of FSU athletics from the beginning.

The long-time service of Daisy Parker Flory and Don Veller will not be surpassed by many. Their commitment to FSU serves as inspiration for everyone associated with the university.

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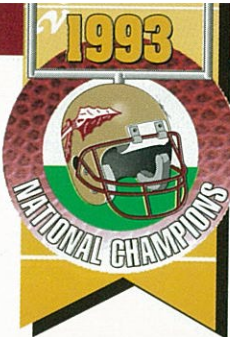
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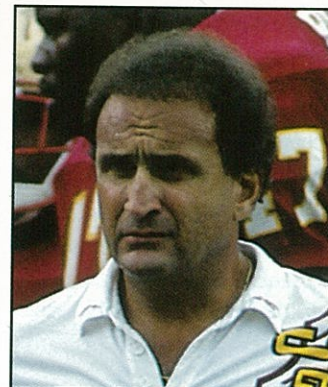

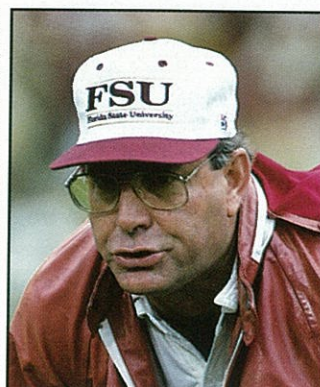
CHUCK AMATO

Chuck Amato is in his ninth season as the number two man behind Head Coach Bobby Bowden. A 13-year veteran of the coaching staff, Amato came to FSU in 1982 as the defensive line coach after serving two seasons as linebackers coach at the University of Arizona.

Since joining the Florida State staff, the Eaton, Pa., native has seen the Tribe defense lead the program to unprecedented national prominence. The last two years, the Seminoles have finished the season ranked in the top 10 in the nation in rushing defense.

Prior to his stint at Arizona, Amato coached at his alma mater, North Carolina State University. He started his career while still a student at N.C. State, as a student assistant coach in 1968. He remained at the school for the next 12 years working under head coaches Al Michaels, Lou Holtz and the late Bo Rein. In 1971, he earned a full-time position; three years later he was promoted to defensive coordinator, a position he held for the next six seasons.

A three-year letterman in football and wrestling, Amato earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees from N.C. State. On the mat, he claimed a pair of Atlantic Coast Conference titles in his weight class and went undefeated in dual matches.

Widely considered one of the top defensive coaches in the nation, Mickey Andrews is in his 11th year at Florida State.

Andrews' abilities as a defensive coach have not gone unnoticed. In 1991, *Athlon's Southeastern Football Magazine* named Andrews its Assistant Coach of the Year, and he is annually listed among the nation's top aides.

Andrews came to Florida State from the Arizona Wranglers of the United States Football League, where he spent two seasons as the defensive coordinator.

Andrews' coaching resume includes stints at Eastern Kentucky, Livingston, North Alabama, Clemson and Florida. He served as defensive coordinator at Clemson from 1977-80.

From 1972-76, Andrews was the head coach and athletic director at North Alabama. He also spent three years guiding the Livingston University program from 1970-72.

Andrews starred in football and baseball for Alabama from 1961-64. During his football career, the Crimson Tide won two national championships (1961, '64).

In addition to his football honors, Andrews was an all-Southeastern Conference choice in baseball. In 1964, he received the Hugo Friedman Award as the Tide's best all-around athlete.



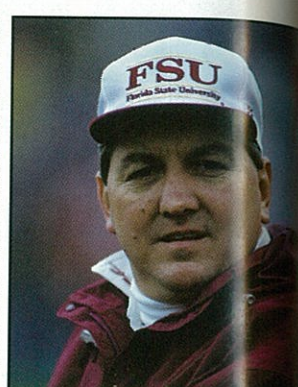
JEFF BOWDEN

Outside linebackers coach Jim Gladden has been an integral part of Florida State's rise to national prominence. When the 20-year veteran first came to FSU as a graduate assistant in 1975, the program was struggling, finishing 3-8 that year. Gladden was hired as a full-time coach upon Bowden's arrival in 1976 and the Seminoles have had only one losing season since that time.

In addition to working with the linebackers, Gladden is one of the best Seminole assistant coaches when it comes to recruiting.

Another of Gladden's responsibilities are the punt return and punt block units. In 1984, the Seminoles blocked a school record eight punts during the regular season. Since 1976, Florida State has blocked 58 kicks.

Gladden graduated from William Jewell College in 1962. As a member of the football team there, he was chosen to the all-conference team.

Over the next 15 years, Gladden coached in the high school ranks. He spent four years in Kansas City and St. Louis before moving to Kentucky, where he was the high school coach of the year in 1970. After two years as head coach at Hernando High in Brooksville, Fla., Gladden came to Florida State.

Bobby Bowden did not look far when he had a rare opening on his coaching staff this past season. Bowden selected former FSU All-America noseguard Odell Haggins to coach the tight ends and offensive line.

"He was one of the best players and leaders we've had here," said Bowden when announcing Haggins had the job. "He was dependable and accountable and that's the kind of qualities you look for in a coach."

A native of Bartow, Fla., Haggins was a four-year letterwinner and popular team leader during his years at Florida State. He was a Kodak and Walter Camp All-American in 1989 and a second-team Associated Press choice in 1988. The 1987 Florida State team finished the year ranked second in the country while FSU was the No. 3 team following both his junior and senior seasons.

Following his collegiate career, Haggins was drafted by the San Francisco 49ers and played with that team for several seasons, earning a Super Bowl ring in 1990. He also spent one year with the Buffalo Bills organization.

He earned a criminology degree from Florida State in May 1993 and comes to FSU from the state attorney's office in Jacksonville where he worked with juveniles.

In his ninth season on the Seminole coaching staff, Jimmy Heggins takes over as the Seminoles' offensive line coach in 1994. This marks the third year Heggins has worked with the FSU offensive line, as he assisted former FSU offensive coordinator Brad Scott with the split side of the line in each of the past two seasons. During his coaching tenure at FSU, Heggins also has coached the tight ends for two years and the noseguards for four years.

Heggins, an outstanding noseguard under Bowden in the mid-'70s, returned to his alma mater in 1986 as a full-time coach after a year at Southwestern Louisiana, where he tutored USL's defensive ends. Prior to that, he was running backs coach at Eastern Michigan for two seasons, and at Western Illinois for one year.

The Salisbury, N.C., native began his collegiate coaching career as a graduate assistant in 1980.

Heggins originally came to FSU in 1974 as a running back. He was an all-state back in North Carolina as a senior after gaining 1,670 yards. A fullback his first two seasons at FSU, Heggins made the switch to noseguard in 1976. At the end of that season, he was named the squad's outstanding defensive player. A year later, he helped FSU to a 10-2 record and the Tangerine Bowl championship.

Florida State assistant coach Mark Richt has been one of the nation's most respected young coaches for several years. His remarkable list of credentials includes the development of 1993 Heisman Trophy winner Charlie Ward and much of the implementation of FSU's record-setting 1993 offense. So it was Richt that Bobby Bowden selected to replace Brad Scott as offensive coordinator when the latter left to become head coach at South Carolina following last season.

Richt has logged eight total seasons as quarterbacks coach at Florida State, although 1994 marks only his fifth straight season in that role. In 1989, Richt left FSU to be the offensive coordinator at East Carolina University under current Georgia Tech Head Coach Bill Lewis. Richt previously served as a graduate and then volunteer assistant coach in charge of quarterbacks at FSU from 1985-88.

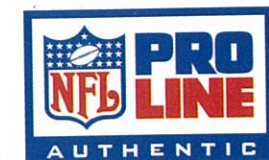
Richt was well-schooled in the passing game before coming to Tallahassee as a graduate assistant coach in 1985. The Boca Raton, Fla., native was a quarterback at the University of Miami under former Hurricane coach Howard Schnellenberger. He was the backup quarterback to Buffalo Bills star Jim Kelly during his three seasons at UM.

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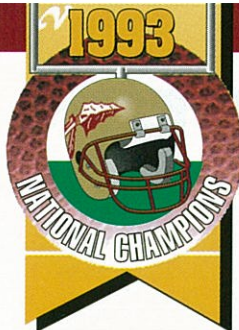


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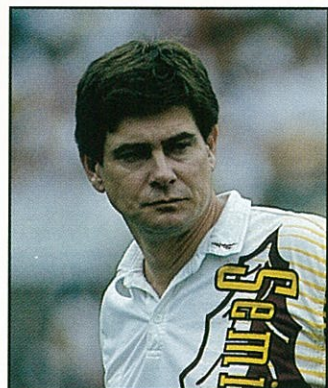

Billy Sexton has been a familiar sight on the sidelines of Florida State football games since 1973. The Tallahassee native started his career at FSU as a player for the Seminoles and went on to become a graduate assistant coach and then a full-time coach in 1977.

This year marks Sexton's 12th as the Seminole running backs coach, during which time a slew of current pros have learned and refined their skills under the former FSU quarterback.

Sexton joined the Florida State staff as a graduate assistant in 1976, Bobby Bowden's first year as the FSU mentor. He became a member of the full-time staff in 1977 and worked with the Seminole quarterbacks for five seasons until 1982, when he became the head junior varsity coach and handled scouting duties. The next season, he took over the running backs position.

A standout at Leon High School in Tallahassee, Sexton played his first three years of college football at Alabama before transferring to Florida State. He was the Seminoles' starting quarterback for the opening half of the 1973 season.

Sexton earned a bachelor's in business from FSU and began his coaching career as an assistant coach at Leon before returning to Florida State as a coach.

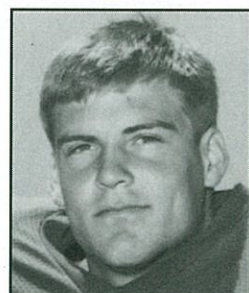
In the competitive environment of college football, games are often won because of strength and speed. Part of the reason for Florida State's success on the field is a year-around weight-room program run by strength and conditioning coach Dave Van Halanger. The 12-year veteran of the Seminole coaching staff has helped hundreds of FSU athletes get stronger, faster and more flexible.

In addition to work in the weight room, Van Halanger works closely with the FSU trainers to keep players in shape as they recover from injury.

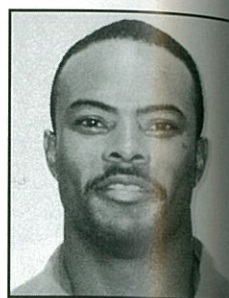
Van Halanger spent five years as the head strength coach at his alma mater, West Virginia, prior to his arrival at FSU in July 1983. He is credited with starting West Virginia's first organized weight training program.

A four-year letterman under Bowden at West Virginia, Van Halanger was a co-captain of the 1975 West Virginia Peach Bowl team. An offensive tackle, he earned All-East honors his junior and senior seasons and was an honorable mention All-America selection as a senior. He played professionally with the Atlanta Falcons in 1976 before returning to WVU as a graduate assistant and head junior varsity coach. He became the full-time strength coach at WVU in 1978.

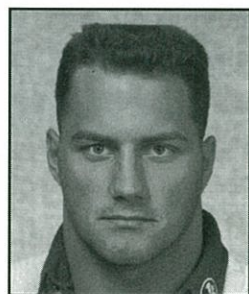

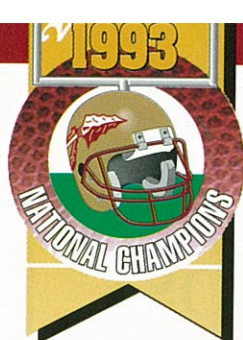
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The Seminoles' Home Field

Named for Doak S. Campbell, the first president of Florida State University, the stadium

sits adjacent to the Moore Athletic Center on the edge of the main campus.

The field itself is one of the finest in college football, carefully managed and manicured year 'round. A prescription athletic turf (PAT) system installed in 1988 and completely reseeded over the summer, quickly alleviates drainage problems through a series of underground pumps. The field can go from seemingly flooded to merely wet in a matter of minutes, thanks to the pumps, which allow a deeper root system in the natural turf.

Both stadium scoreboards are new. The large scoreboard made its debut in 1992 and features the most technologically advanced scoreboard computer anima-



14,481 since the end of the 1991 season. And that number will change with the addition of a section to the northwest corner, as well as the changes in the north end zone.

Charlie Ward capped an illustrious career by becoming the school's first recipient of the Heisman Trophy. A two-year starter at quarterback, Ward set 17 single season and career records at FSU. A two-sport athlete, he guided the Seminoles to the 1993 national championship. Perhaps the most talented QB to don the Garnet & Gold, Ward engineered the famous "Fast Break" offense developed to capitalize on both his passing and rushing skills. In addition to breaking seven Atlantic Coast Conference records, Ward was a two-time winner of the conference's prestigious player of the year award.

Fred Biletnikoff played wide receiver at FSU from 1961-64 under Head Coach Bill Peterson. He was FSU's first consensus All-American. As a senior, he ranked fourth in the nation with 57 receptions for 11 TDs, not including four TD catches in the 1965 Gator Bowl. Biletnikoff went on to star for the Oakland Raiders of the National Football League for 14 years. During that time, he played in four Pro Bowls and was the most valuable player of Super Bowl XI. In 1988, he became the first Seminole inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Three years later, he also became a member of the College Football Hall of Fame.

Ron Sellers remains the most prolific receiver in FSU history. He held most of the NCAA receiving records from the end of his senior season in 1968 until 1987. A flanker for FSU from 1966-68, he accumulated 3,979 yards on 240 receptions. He caught passes in a record 30 consecutive games, averaging 119.9 yards per contest. Sellers had 18 100-yard receiving days and five 200-yard games. He still owns nearly every FSU receiving record and caught 13 or more passes in a game seven times during his career. In December 1988, the 1968 consensus All-American became the first FSU player inducted in the College Football Hall of Fame.

One of the greatest defenders in Florida State history, Ron Simmons' No. 50 was retired in 1988. Simmons anchored the center of the defense that took FSU to a pair of Orange Bowl appearances in 1979 and 1980, resulting in FSU's highest final national ranking ever at that time. A dominating noseguard and the Seminoles' first two-time consensus All-American, Simmons seemed to camp out in opponents' backfields. He totaled 25 quarterback sacks and 44 tackles for loss — both Florida State records — during his career. Simmons is the lone Seminole defender to have his number retired.
