

Jackets, Seminoles Meet On Historic Date



xactly one hundred and two years ago today, Georgia Tech football began. On November 5, 1892, the Rambling Wreck-or, as they were

called in those days, the "Tecks"-took the field for the first time to meet another collegiate opponent.

In the confines of Macon's Central City record, is in need of a victory. Park, the Jackets received their first lesson in humility in a 12-6 defeat at the hands of a more experienced Mercer squad.

Apparently, though, Georgia Tech was a quick study where football was concerned as less than a year later—less than a year by a single day—Tech defeated its arch-rival Georgia for the first time, 28-6, in a game fraught with controversy.

Four national championships and 555 wins later, a struggling Georgia Tech team faces another mighty obstacle this afternoon as Bill Lewis' team takes on the mighty ninthranked Seminoles of Florida State.

The last time these 'Noles of Garnet and Gold cavorted on the turf at Bobby Dodd Stadium, led by the incomparable Charlie Ward, they broke Tech's heart in a 29-24 comefrom-behind triumph.

The Jackets were 4-1 under Coach Lewis prior to that game, and have managed but a 7-17 mark since. Perhaps this afternoon, in a game where few experts expect the unexpected, Tech can return the favor.

Don't misunderstand, the task is formidable.

In the midst of an ACC-record 22-game conference winning streak. Florida State has barely had to break stride against its family

Tech's 1992 nationally-televised contest still stands as FSU's toughest league test since joining the ACC for the 1992 season.

And this year, led by quarterback Danny Kanell, running back Warrick Dunn and outside linebacker Derrick Brooks, these 'Noles look every bit as talented and belligerent as Bobby Bowden's 1992 contingent, if not more contributions.

They will face a Tech team which will be a prohibitive underdog, and which, with a 1-6 his football team than Jamal Cox is doing for strike twice.

Lewis and his staff have seen injuries deplete their roster as they have had to employ no fewer than 17 freshmen or redshirt freshmen in significant roles to date this year.

Those rookies have seen considerable action, and at times, have played extremely well. Witness C.J. Williams' or Ron Rogers' the efforts of first-year defenders Dan Witherspoon, Patrick Bradford, Zach Piller, Keith Brooking and Ralph Hughes.

These youngsters have shown steady improvement over the past several weeks and could be on the verge of something very

But if Tech is to spring a much-needed upset this afternoon, it will most likely be because of the play of its veteran players, and a number of these have had solid, if not exceptional seasons.

Lost inside of the disappointment of several close losses has been the play of inside linebacker Jamal Cox. The 6-3, 230-pound senior from Baltimore, Md., leads the Atlantic Coast Conference in tackles with 101 hits in

Cox, who had an amazing 21 tackles against Arizona on opening night, has been a steady force for Tech's defenders who have held three ACC teams—Duke, N.C. State and Virginia—to their lowest vardage totals of the year in ACC play.

Cox's play is made even more impressive when you consider he has often played this year with true freshmen defensive linemen in

Lewis, for one, recognizes Cox's

"I don't think there is any linebacker in college football that could be doing more for

us right now," said Lewis.

"He is a tremendous leader and that quality is often overlooked."

Senior Jason Bender has been another strong bright spot. A double threat for the Jackets as a punter and pass receiver, Bender is quietly contending for all-America honors with his booming

Currently, the Pittsburgh, Pa., native ranks third in the nation,

averaging an eve-catching 45.7 vards a kick. To give some historical perspective, that's almost three yards more per kick than the Tech single season record of 42.8 set in 1981 by Jeff

But Bender's achievements also glow brighter when closely examined. Because he doesn't just punt for the Jackets. As the starting flanker, he's also a threat as a pass receiver, having caught 16 passes—tied for second on the club-for 235 yards, a 14.7 per-catch average and three touchdowns.

The combination of punter and player is performances at Maryland two weeks ago, or a unique one in this era of increasing specialization.

> "I think that Jason has all-America numbers," said Lewis. "He has punted the ball often and for a high average. I also think something that needs to be mentioned in this age of specialists, is that Jason is a valuable part of our offense.

> "He plays a full football game. It would be appropriate to have an all-America punter be a guy who also contributes to your offense."

Bender and Cox are two of Tech's key contributors who will have to have standout efforts this afternoon if Tech is to have a chance at upending the Seminoles.

Another is junior quarterback Tommy Luginbill, who was on a record-setting passing season of his own before a mild concussion suffered at College Park, temporarily sidelined

At various times this season, this Tech team has demonstrated itself capable of excellence in a variety of areas—offensively, defensively and in the kicking game. It's downfall, though, has been a lack of consistency and turnovers.

If Lewis and his young club can put it together today, we might witness a historic occasion to rival the one of 102 autumns ago.

After all, in 1984, on this same field, a heavy underdog Tech team put an end to a 20game ACC win streak owned by Clemson.

Maybe, just maybe Tech's lightning can



Yellow Jackets Host **High-Powered Seminoles**

e're playing a team that has been the class of the ACC since they entered the league," said Georgia Tech head coach Bill Lewis of ninth-ranked Florida State, who visits the Rambling Wreck this afternoon.

conference, but one of the top teams in college football over the last 10 or 15 years," Lewis added. "It's a game on the schedule that should excite everyone because of the opportunity it presents our team."

The Jackets (1-6, 0-5 ACC), winless in ACC play following a 42-27 loss at Maryland on Oct. 22, had last week off. Despite its record, Tech has played its ranked opponents close, with three losses coming by a combined 20 points.

Florida State (6-1, 6-0 ACC) defeated Duke 59-20 last Saturday to set an ACC record for consecutive conference wins (22-0 since becoming a member). The Seminoles' only loss this season occurred at Miami.

Tech is coming off its most productive offensive game of the season, having amassed 508 yards at Maryland, 162 of it on the ground. For the third straight game, the Yellow Jackets passed for more than 300 yards, having averaged 323 yards in those three games.

Starting quarterback Tommy Luginbill, who had passed for more than 300 yards himself in two straight games, was limited to 165 yards against Maryland when he was sidelined with a minor concussion. For the season, he has completed 129 of 232 passes (55.6 percent) for 1,583 yards. His 12 touchdowns are the most of any ACC quarterback and he ranks But they do as good a job throwing the ball." second in the conference in total offense.

Tech's passing game features a well-balanced receiving corps which has given the Yellow Jackets 15 of their 18 touchdowns. Eight players have 10 or more receptions this season, led by split end Charlie Simmons with 23 receptions for 320 yards and four touchdowns.

catches for 235 yards and three TD's, while lead the ground attack, along with fullback tight end Jeff Papushak, H-back Cedric Zachery, split end Omar Cassidy and fullback Michael Smith are also in double figures. Donnie Davis, converted two weeks ago from quarterback to flanker, became an integral part of the aerial attack with five receptions and a two-point conversion catch against Maryland.

Tech's ground game also got a boost from another position switch. After moving from a

"Not only are they the standard in our reserve cornerback position at the same time as Davis, redshirt freshman C.J. Williams gave the best performance by a Tech back this season, carrying 22 times for 80 yards and converting a screen pass unto an 80-yard touchdown. Williams may start against Florida State.

> Defensively, inside linebacker Jamal Cox continued to build on an all-America caliber season with 13 more tackles at Maryland, giving him an ACC-best 101 for the season and 352 for his career.

> Rodney Wilkerson, Cox's linebacker mate, also has performed well this year with 84 tackles, while strong safety David Hendrix has 72. Tackle Bill Neuss and outside linebacker Freddie Coger anchor a defensive front which is employing three

Always explosive offensively (494.2 yards per game), the Seminoles lead the ACC in passing offense (329.9) behind quarterback Danny Kanell and a speedy group of receivers.

"We're facing a talented, speed-oriented offensive attack," said Lewis. "From a defensive standpoint, you truly have to be ready to stop two dimensions. The one difference you see is that their quarterbacks are not making the big scrambling plays as Charlie Ward did.


Kanell has completed 59.7 percent of his passes, thrown for 12 touchdowns and ranks eighth nationally in total offense with 261.6 yards per game. Nine Seminoles receivers have 11 or more receptions, led by split end Kez McCorvey (38-568 yards, 4 TD) and flanker Andre Cooper (22-307 yards, 3 TD).

Warrick Dunn (519 yards, 6.9 per carry,) Flanker Jason Bender is next with 16 and Rock Preston (258 yards, 7.8 per carry) Zack Crockett, who has 10 touchdowns.

> All-America Derrick Brooks leads a defense that allowed just 93.2 rushing yards per game.

"Defensively, there's no change," Lewis said. "They come at you with four people screaming up the field. They let their speed work for them, and their great tacklers."

Tech leads the series with Florida State, 7-2-1, but has lost both of its meetings with

the Seminoles since they joined the ACC. The Yellow Jackets nearly pulled off a major upset two years ago, leading late in the fourth quarter before falling 29-24. The Seminoles took a 51-0 victory last season in Tallahassee. Tech's last win in the series was a 30-0 decision in 1975, at Bobby Dodd Stadium.

300 Yards, No Problem

Prior to this season, Georgia Tech had only 12 games in its history with 300 or more yards passing. The Yellow Jackets' season-high 346 yards passing against Maryland was the fourth such performance this season.

Quarterback Tommy Luginbill, who has a shot at Georgia Tech season records for total offense, passing vardage, completions and passing touchdowns, accounted for two of those himself, with 313 vards against North Carolina and 310 yards against Virginia.

He had 165 yards against the Terrapins, with backup Graham Stroman adding 181. Against Duke, Luginbill accounted for 205 of Tech's 318 passing yards.

C.J. Breathes Life **Into Ground Game**

Showing a combination of swiftness and power, C.J. Williams may be giving the Yellow Jackets a new dimension on offense.

The redshirt freshman, who played as a reserve defensive back in Tech's first five games, moved to tailback the week of the Virginia game and gave the Jackets their best effort by a back this season against Maryland.

His 22 carries were a season-high, and his 80 yards were the second-most. Meanwhile. the Jackets rushed for a season-high 162 yards.

Williams also took a screen pass and raced through the Terrapins secondary for an 80yard score, the longest pass play involving a running back in Tech history.

Lincoln Enters Top 10

Jimy Lincoln, who rushed for 57 yards at Maryland, advanced to No. 10 on Georgia Tech's all-time rushing vardage list with 1,603 yards. The Pittsburgh, Pa., senior surpassed Cory Collier (1,590) and Malcolm King (1,576), and now stands 87 yards behind ninth-place Bill Teas (1,689).

Three Reunions

Tech senior defensive tackle Raleigh Boulware will get a visit this weekend from his brother, Peter, who is a freshman reserve defensive end at Florida State.

Head coach Bill Lewis also will be reunited with a member of his East Carolina staff in Mark Richt. Richt was Lewis' offensive coordinator at ECU in 1989 before moving to FSU to coach quarterbacks. He was elevated to offensive coordinator prior to this season.

Another FSU player, center Clay Shiver, is the younger brother of former Tech standout pitcher Todd Shiver (1984-87).

Double Digits

So far this season, eight different Georgia Tech receivers have made 10 or more receptions, same as in Bill Lewis' first season at Tech in 1992 and one short of the all-time high of nine in 1991.

The Jackets have a chance to beat the mark of nine in the coming weeks. Tight end Carlos Smith has nine receptions this season, and the oncoming Donnie Davis has six, five of those in Tech's last game against Maryland.

Luginbill Takes Aim At Tech Marks

Tommy Luginbill's 785 passing yards over the last three games have put the senior in position to challenge for several Tech season records.

eveloping a reputation as one of the nation's premier football coaches, Bill Lewis draws upon an extensive depth of experience as just the ninth full-time head football coach in Georgia Tech history.

In each of his first two seasons at the helm of the Yellow Jackets, Bill Lewis has produced record-setting offensive teams that have come literally within a play or two of winning records and post-season bowl bids.

His first Tech squad, despite a series of debilitating injuries, posted a 5-6 record that included Tech's first back-to-back triumphs over Top 25 foes in a quarter of a century.

Lewis' second Yellow Jacket team also managed a 5-6 mark, coming within just eight points of a seven-win season with close losses to N.C. State (28-23) and Clemson (16-13). Tech's 1993 Jackets, though, finished strong down the stretch, winning three of its final four games, averaging 33.5 points a game during that

In his first two seasons on The Flats, Lewis' teacher's mentality and attacking on-field coaching philosophy resulted in offensively-potent teams that set school marks for passing vardage and produced the second-best total offense mark in Tech history.

Named National "Coach of the Year" in 1991 by the American Football Coaches






Association and UPI after guiding East Carolina to a school-best 11-1 season, the 52-year-old Lewis was tabbed on Jan. 6, 1992 to succeed NFL-bound Bobby Ross.

Though hampered by extensive injuries in his first season on the Flats, Lewis was still able to steer the Rambling Wreck to wins over Clemson and N.C. State, and he brought Tech within seconds of victory on three other occasions. dropping hard-fought heart-breakers to Florida State, Baylor and Georgia.

His offense set single-season school records for most yards passing (2,580) and pass completions (206), while two of his players, defensive tackle Coleman Rudolph and place-kicker Scott Sisson, were both named first-team all-Americas by the Walter Camp Foundation.

Lewis capped off his first season on the Flats with a highly-regarded class of 20 football recruits tabbed as one of the Top 10 in the nation by Blue Chips Magazine and the Tom Lemming Report. Lewis' success in recruiting was seen in Tech's remarkable success in the state of Georgia, which included five of the Top 11 prospects in the state according to the Atlanta Journal-Constitution.

Last winter, Lewis' recruiting efforts were again rewarded as the Jackets corralled their second straight Top 20

Lewis' wide-open style of offense allowed the 1992 Georgia Tech team to "I believe the offense should be in an shatter the school record for passing offense, as Tech threw for 2,580 yards last fall in just 11 games. The old mark of 2,547 was set in 12 games in 1991. More impressively, Lewis' new offense helped Tech set a single-season yardage mark while cutting the Yellow Jackets interception total almost in half.

> And last season, the Yellow Jackets compiled the second-best total offense

of 400 yards (399.8) a game in total offense. Tech also accumulated three of the top 10 total offense days in school history, managing 610 yards against Maryland (third), 593 yards against Duke (fourth) and 561 yards against Furman (tie for sixth).

coaching, during which time he has participated in 13 bowl games, Lewis compiled a 21-12-1 record (.636) in three seasons at East Carolina. His overall coaching mark for eight seasons as a head coach—including a three-year (1977-79) tenure at Wyoming—is 45-44-2 (.506).


A native of Bristol, Pa., Lewis graduated from East Stroudsburg State in 1963 with a B.S. degree in Health and Physical Education. He earned Little all-America honors as a quarterback and team captain at East Stroudsburg, lettering four times in both football and baseball.

Lewis left college to play in the Detroit Tigers' minor league organization for two years as a pitcher before returning to his alma mater to work on his graduate degree and serve as a part-time football coach. While in the Tiger's farm chain, he reached the AA level, playing with many of the same players who were the basis of Detroit's 1968 World Championship team.

Lewis began his coaching career at East Stroudsburg (1963-65) under his college coach, Jack Gregory—currently the Athletic Director at Bowling Green-and continued as an assistant for Dave Hart at Pittsburgh (1966-68), for Cal Stoll at Wake Forest (1969-71), for Bud Carson and Bill Fulcher (1971-72) at Georgia Tech and for Frank Broyles at Arkansas (1973-76).

During his first stay at Tech, Lewis, who coached the Yellow Jackets' defensive secondary, was part of a heralded coaching staff that has since produced seven head football coaches including Steve Sloan (Vanderbilt, Texas Tech, Mississippi,

Dick Bestwick (Virginia), Tom Moore (The Citadel) and the late Rex Dockery directors (Sloan-Alabama, Bestwick-South Carolina). While at Tech, Lewis helped the Yellow Jackets to back-to-back bowl trips in the 1971 Peach Bowl and the 1972 Tech assistant coach, the legendary Frank



In Lewis' first two seasons at Tech, the Yellow Jackets broke the singleseason record for passing and produced the second-best total offense mark in school history.

As an aide to both Carson (1971) and Fulcher (1972), he tutored two of the best defensive backs in Tech history, including the Institute's only three-time all-America in cornerback-free safety Randy Rhino, as well as cornerback Jeff Ford. Until 1991, when Willie Clay shattered Tech's career Duke), Jerry Glanville (Houston Oilers, interception record book, both Ford and

> > the Razorbacks, Arkansas captured the 1975 Southwest Conference championship and defeated Georgia in the Cotton Bowl. Also on the Arkansas staff at the time, and a close friend of Lewis', was former Dallas Cowboy head coach Jimmy Johnson. Lewis left the Razorbacks in 1976 for the head coaching position at Wyoming.

> > After three seasons with the Cowboys, where he coached all-Americas in linebacker Ken Fantetti and offensive tackle Dennis Baker as well as 16 all-Western Athletic Conference players, Lewis joined Vince Dooley's staff at Georgia and coached the defensive secondary during the Bulldogs' National Championship season in 1980.

He ascended to the defensive coordinator position at Georgia in 1981, helping the Bulldogs to nine straight bowl games and three Southeastern Conference titles. While in Athens, he coached 23 all-SEC honorees and seven all-Americas.


He left Georgia in 1989 to take over an East Carolina program that had not had a winning season since 1983. His first Pirate squad posted a 5-5-1 mark and his second finished 5-6, but they were within 11 points of a winning campaign.

The 1991 ECU team captured the imagination of the entire nation. Led by all-America linebacker Robert Jones—a Butkus

Award finalist-and quarterback Jeff Blake, the Pirates capped off a Cinderellalike season with the stunning, 37-34, come-from-behind victory over in-state rival N.C. State in the Peach Bowl.

Shortly thereafter he accepted Tech's offer to return to Atlanta.

"In collegiate athletics today, I see an

increased emphasis on academics and graduation rates," said Lewis. "I see a raising of standards. In my opinion, Georgia Tech represents one of the national leaders in that area. As we continue into the 90's and the turn of the century, I think Georgia Tech will have an opportunity to be one of the national leaders in academic excellence as it relates to the student-athlete.

In 1976, when Bobby Bowden came to Tallahassee from West Virginia, there were few clues that the Birmingham, Ala. native would transform Florida State into the football power it is today. He inherited a team that had won just four games the previous three seasons.

Bowden returned to FSU, where he had been an assistant coach under Bill Peterson from 1963-65, after a six-year stint at West Virginia during which he compiled a 42-26 record.

In Bowden's 18 seasons at Florida State, the Seminoles have won 10 or more games 10 times and been to 15 bowl games, including a string of 12 in a row and eight New Year's Day trips. Under Bowden, the Seminoles have spent 127 weeks in the Associated Press Top 10. In the past seven seasons, FSU has finished no lower than fourth in the final poll.

Only four coaches in the history of Division I-A football have more wins than Bowden-Bear Bryant, Amos Alonzo Stagg, Pop Warner and Joe Paterno.

Only Bryant and Paterno, with 15 each, have claimed more bowl wins than Bowden's 13. His 13-3-1 bowl record and .794 win percentage are unmatched in the history of college football.

Bowden was an all-star quarterback at Birmingham's Woodlawn High before going to Alabama, fulfilling a lifelong dream to play for the Crimson Tide, But after one semester in Tuscaloosa, he transferred to Howard College (now Samford University) in his hometown and was a little All-American quarterback in 1951.

After graduation in 1953, Bowden stayed at Howard as an assistant coach for two years before becoming head coach at South Georgia Junior College in Douglas, Ga. There, he compiled a 22-11 record and then returned to his alma mater as head coach in 1959, going 31-6 in four years at Samford. Following his stint at FSU, Bowden moved to West Virginia as an assistant for three years and was subsequently promoted to the top job.

Bowden and son Terry, the head coach at Auburn University, are the first father-son duo to lead Division I-A programs. Terry's brother, Tommy, is on his staff at Auburn, as is brother-in-law Jack Hines. Youngest son Jeff joined the Florida State coaching staff in 1994 as the wide receivers coach.


