

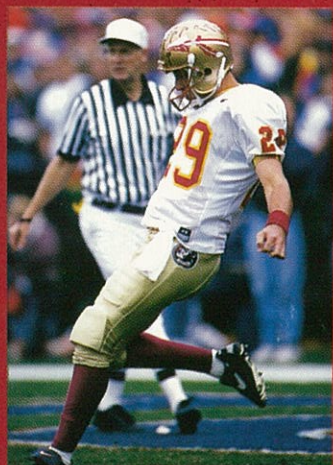

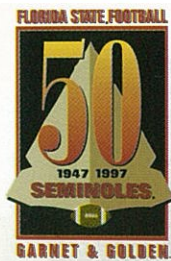

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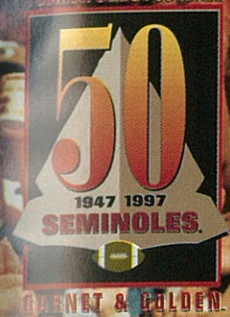
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From the Press Box

FSU alum Mack Brown brings a highly touted Tar Heel team to Tallahassee

A lot of people have been waiting for a day like today since Florida State joined the Atlantic Coast Conference five years ago. Sure the Seminoles gave up their 29-game conference winning streak at Virginia last year, but that was different. What the nation, the ACC and the Seminoles needed was a big game, within the league, that had national championship implications. A game where the entire week is spent dissecting each program's strengths and weaknesses. Today we've got it.

North Carolina brings a team that should be ranked in the top 10 into newly expanded Doak S. Campbell Stadium with the ABC cameras aimed directly at an important ACC match-up. No. 2 vs. No. 11 is enough to whet any sports fan's appetite and there have been some that claimed it might not happen within our league.

It's happening, and sooner than some might expect.

NFL scouts will nearly outnumber a huge press contingent for the game and perhaps most startling is the fact that there are more North Carolina players on their evaluation sheets than those wearing the garnet today. One director of player personnel claims that at least 11 players will be drafted from this North Carolina team. How's that stack up for talent?

A great running back, a powerful offensive line, gifted receivers and a winner at quarterback have given head coach Mack Brown the ability to put an offensive scheme together that he knows will beat most of the teams in the country. His hope

is that it will be good enough to defeat one of the best defenses in the country.

Word filtered out of graceful Chapel Hill, N.C., early in the preseason that things were different with the Tar Heels. "We've got to open things up more on offense and challenge people on defense," said Brown, who is in his ninth season at the helm of the UNC program. "I've seen FSU spread the field on offense and challenge people to beat them one-on-one and I think that's the way you've got to play football right now. We've got talent here and we've got desire, now we've got to put people in a position to be productive."

Brown has done that. His North Carolina team, just three games into the season, is considered to have an offense that can exploit any team's weakness, and his defense is considered on par with FSU's as the conference's best. Which "D" birdies and which bogies today will probably determine which of the teams has the inside track on the 1996 ACC championship and the reserved spot in the bowl alliance.

The game has national championship implications, it's within the conference, and it also carries the drama and intrigue that only comes with a big game. ESPN is considering televising its popular Game-day show from where J.D. Drew would be chasing down a ball in the gap of Dick Howser Stadium, with the majestic peaks of the University Center designed as the back-drop of the set.

Our stadium, our team and our university are guaranteed exposure on ABC as Brent Musburger, Dick Vermeil and Jack Arute will be calling the action for the network's second telecast of an FSU game

this season.

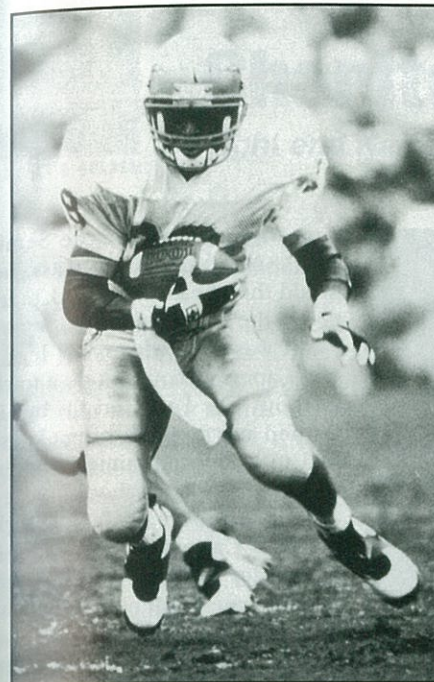
But adding the real drama to the game is a story line that will likely be overlooked all week. UNC head coach Mack Brown is coming home, and he has one of the strongest motivational tools in the arsenal to use on his team — he wants to win this game badly.

Anyone who has a brother, especially an older brother, knows that those first 10 years of life are basically spent trying to figure out a way to whip their sibling. That's the attitude Mack Brown is likely to bring into today's top 10 showdown with Florida State.

Mack Brown grew up in Cookeville, Tenn., and signed with Vanderbilt but

transferred to Florida State in 1971. He was FSU's third leading rusher as a junior in 1972, but was hampered most of the year with a knee injury. He graduated from FSU in 1974 and moved on to Southern Mississippi, earning his master's in 1976. He coached at USM for four years, then Memphis State, then Iowa State, then LSU, where he served as the Tigers' offensive coordinator in 1982. His work in Baton Rouge earned him his first head coaching job and at the age of 32 he took over at Appalachian State, finishing 6-5 and leaving the school to become the offensive coordinator at Oklahoma.

In 1985, Brown took over at Tulane and led the program for three years, earning only the fourth bowl bid in school history after a 6-5 regular season in 1987. Carolina came calling following that and they've not regretted it since. He has produced four straight bowl teams, including last year's squad that defeated SEC Western Division champ Arkansas in the Carquest Bowl, and six consecutive winning seasons. Brown stands third in tenure among active head coaches in the ACC and only 15 coaches nationally have been head coaches for a longer period at their current institutions.

Brown has an impressive résumé but the fact that he brings an undefeated and highly ranked Tar Heel squad to Tallahassee to play for ACC honors and perhaps the national championship may be the most significant event.

Ah, there's nothing like a big game!

Byron Capers

Following in FSU's two-sport athlete tradition

When you look back in Florida State history, you will find numerous athletes who starred in more than one sport. Deion Sanders is probably the most notable multi-sport athlete, but FSU has seen quite a few two-sport lettermen. Former standouts Rohn Stark, Ken Lanier and Dexter Carter were key members of the Florida State football and track squads of the past. Senior cornerback Byron Capers is a standout athlete of the present.

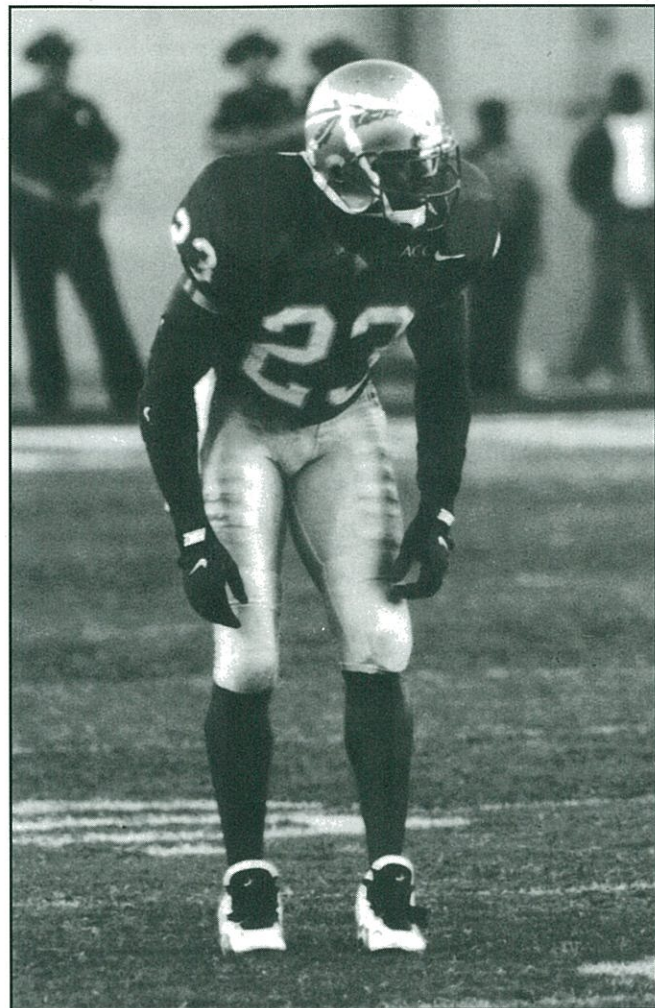
Capers joined Coach Terry Long's track team to improve his speed and to keep in top condition for football during the off-season. The track team has helped Capers in both areas and Long has found him to be a valuable asset to the men's team. Track has also been valuable to Capers.

"Track is my second favorite sport behind football," said Capers. "I love to run and compete against myself and other athletes. I started running my freshman year and I can really see a difference in my speed — a guy my size (6-1, 195) isn't supposed to be able to run fast."

After qualifying as a member of the 4x100 meter relay team for the 1996 NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships, Capers and his teammates set their goal to advance to the finals. Capers joined football teammates Phillip Riley and Warrick Dunn while six-time track All-American Jonathan Carter rounded out the four-some. With Capers anchoring the relay team, Florida State moved on to the finals and finished sixth in the country. By placing in the nation's top eight, the team earned All-America status.

"It was one of the highlights of my career because I never expected to earn All-America honors in another sport," said Capers. "Now, I would like to be an All-American in football my senior year."

Last year, Capers recorded 59 total tackles from his cornerback position. Forty-four of those were solo stops, which was second on the team. Perhaps the

greatest respect paid to a defensive back is having opposing teams throw to the opposite side, something Capers has seen already in this season's first game against Duke.

"Duke only threw to my side one time," said Capers. "And that was a three-yard out. It's good for the team when the linebackers and defensive line are getting the tackles, the only bad thing is it makes my stats decline."

Coach Bobby Bowden and defensive coordinator Mickey Andrews have called Capers the most consistent defensive back on the team. Capers is one of the hardest workers on the team, always looking for ways to improve his skills and technique. During spring football workouts, Capers would awaken early and do mat drills at 6

a.m. with the rest of the Seminoles. After attending class, he would then head off to track practice in the afternoon.

"It was difficult on my legs," said Capers. "I couldn't do a track workout like I wanted to, but it helped my conditioning. I just had to budget my time between football, track and school."

At Wheeler (Ga.) High School, Capers saw action on both sides of the football, much like a former Seminole now playing for the Dallas Cowboys. Capers was the featured running back in high school, racking up 1,305 yards on only 147 carries. That equates to almost nine yards per carry, while still playing safety on the Wildcat defense.

Capers is not the flashy defensive back Seminole fans have seen in the past. But even though he isn't as vocal and flamboyant as Sanders, Terrell Buckley or Clifton Abraham, Capers does his job on the field and chooses to lead by example.

"I don't take extra time before games to put all the extra gear on," said Capers. "My philosophy is 'BoP,' which means Based on Performance. My high school coach, David Shumake, told me to stick with the 'BoP' theory."

The 1996 Florida State defense has vastly improved from a season ago and has found itself ranked number one nationally after allowing only 91 yards of total offense against the Blue Devils in the first game of the season. In order for the Seminoles to win the ACC and play for a national title, it will be the defense that will be called on to win the close ball games.

"Last year's defense was missing leadership," said Capers. "Everybody was just trying to do their part. This year's defense is more unified. We have a lot of returning players and seniors. We didn't have any seniors in the secondary last year and now everyone is called on for leadership."

As a senior in the Seminole secondary, Capers has found himself being an anchor again. That's something the track All-American has proved he is more than "Caper-able" of doing.

Charlton's Island

Tight end Kamari Charlton is a leader by example

Each Seminole home football game in Tallahassee, there is an enormous amount of pride and spirit that fills the stands at Doak Campbell Stadium. There's nothing quite like 80,000 screaming fans cheering on their favorite team.

But that same Seminole pride and spirit can also be felt hundreds of miles away at Kamari's Bar and Grill in Nassau, Bahamas. Kamari's Bar and Grill is named after senior tight end Kamari Charlton. For the last two years, Charlton's father has owned and operated the establishment and for each of the Seminole football games, Seminole fans from all over the island of Nassau pack Charlton's place to view the game and cheer on their favorite tight end on one of the many television screens.

Although Charlton is far from home, the island of Nassau and its people will always hold a special place in his heart. Charlton spent most of his childhood diving and spear fishing in the oceans of Nassau. This was fine for a boy of this age, but Charlton's father wondered what would become of his boy if he stayed in the Bahamas. Upon entering the ninth grade, his father decided that he wanted something more for his son's education and sent him to the Florida Air Academy, a prestigious disciplinary establishment located in Melbourne, Fla.

"I am still an island boy at heart," Charlton said. "You can take the boy out of the island, but you cannot take the island out of the boy."

The mentality that Charlton learned at the Melbourne school has remained with him to this day on the football field. Looking back at the transition to the Florida Air Academy, Charlton admits it was what he really needed at that point in his life.

"The academy taught me a great deal of discipline on and off the field," Charlton said. "When I'm on the field, I'm cool and I'm calm. I do not need to make noise and celebrate after I make a play to show people I'm good. I want them to see for themselves that I'm good."

Charlton did not begin to play football until his junior year in high school. He

had been a basketball standout and really had little interest in football as he entered high school. In fact, as a freshman, Charlton was encouraged to try out for the football team, but after the first good hit that he took on the field, he decided that football wasn't for him and went back to the basketball court.

After two years and a lot of persuading, Charlton's best friend from Nassau convinced him to give football one more chance. After a few practices, Charlton realized there was little to fear and gained a good bit of confidence on the field. Soon Charlton was playing both ways for the Academy as a tight end and a linebacker and people started to notice. His senior year, he earned second-team all-state honors and was being recruited by such schools as Florida State, the University of Florida and the University of Georgia.

After a long collegiate career, Charlton's time has come, both as a leader and as a player this season. As a leader, he has really put forth an effort to encourage the younger guys to always practice hard.

"You've got to work hard all day in practice, every practice, if you want to

make it to that next level," Charlton said. "A lot of the time, these newer guys are away from home for the first time. I tell them to keep working hard and that everyone goes through it (being away from home). I went through it my first year at Florida Air."

Charlton and Melvin Pearsall share responsibilities at tight end this season and Charlton hopes a few more passes might be thrown his way as the season progresses. In recent years at Florida State, the tight end position has primarily been used for blocking purposes, but this season could see the position more involved in the passing game. Charlton would just like an opportunity to make a reception and show what he can do with the ball.

"I like to block, but I like to catch too," said Charlton, "so hopefully I will get that chance this season."

Charlton will definitely make an impact on the field for the Seminoles this season. He knows what it takes to be successful at this level and he is ready to put the experience he has gained to work. You can be certain they will be cheering Kamari Charlton's name in Nassau.

1996 Cross Country Outlook

FSU's men's and women's squads are off and running

Florida State's cross country teams open the 1996 season facing different challenges and goals. The men return six of their top seven finishers from the Atlantic Coast Conference Championships and plenty of experience as they try to move up in the league standings. The Lady Seminoles must replace their top performer, Kirsten Birmelin, who became FSU's first-ever All-ACC cross country selection.

Brian Lucyk, the men's top runner for the past two years, will again be counted on to set the pace. The junior from Longwood, Fla., will try to improve on his 20th place time of 25:43 at last season's ACC Championships. He was the Seminoles' top finisher in three meets, including the ACCs. Lucyk and David Ogletree, both walk-ons, scored in distance events at the ACC Outdoor Track Championships, a sign that Coach Scott Irving has the FSU program moving in the right direction.

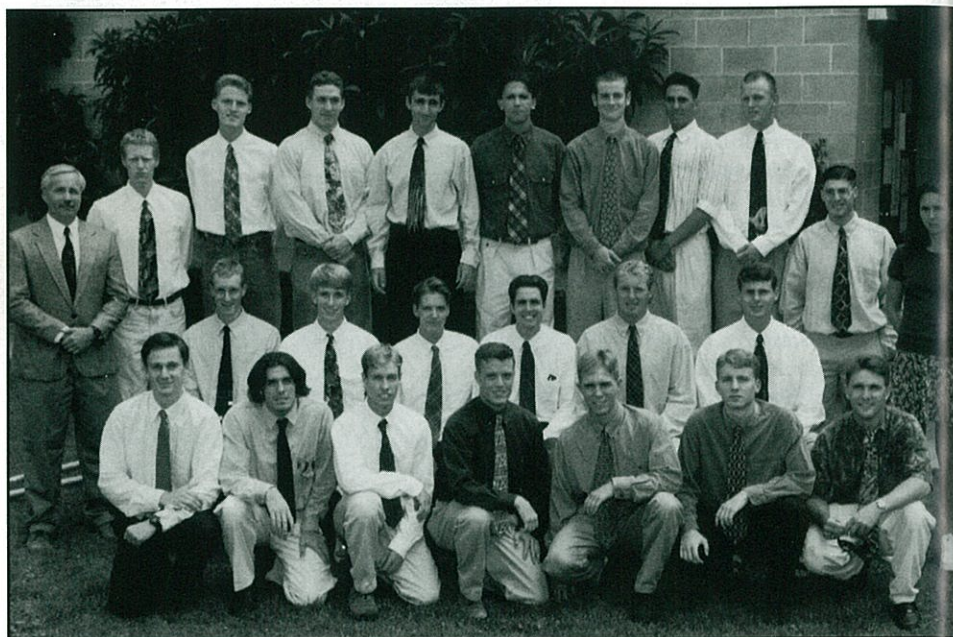
Following closely behind Lucyk and Ogletree are Reid Montini, Jasen Ritter and Joe Simolari. Montini was consistently FSU's number two runner behind Lucyk last year. Ritter and Simolari should give the Seminole men a solid nucleus of five runners.

"We need to have some guys step up to the fifth and sixth spots," Irving said. "It's a good situation because now I am in a position where I am looking for the five and six guys instead of a number one runner."

The Lady Seminoles, on the other hand, are in need of someone to fill the number one slot. Birmelin has graduated, but the women do return the rest of the 1995 squad. The women also have a new coach, Breeda Dennehy. An All-American at Western Kentucky, Dennehy will be in charge of the women's cross country program while assisting with the men.

Leading the way for the women will be senior Heather Anderson and junior Nicole Singleton. Anderson and Singleton should battle for the number one position vacated by Birmelin.

"Each year we have continued to improve our times," Irving commented. "Coach Dennehy will be a good motiva-

tor for the women and her distance experience will be a huge asset for our program."

There are several runners who could move into the scoring column for the women's team. Chateau Mangaroo, Nickie Bournias, Lara Bryant, Emilie Ruetenik

and Megan Lenker should push one another in practice as they battle for the top five. Melanie O'Bannon, one of the top runners from the '94 squad, returns after taking last season off. Irving also has high hopes for freshmen Diana Hartnup, Nadi Vlaun and Celeste Hayes as well.

Campus Spotlight

A new hand at the helm of FSU research

The last time Florida State University appointed someone to head its research program, well, most of the University's current students weren't even born.

In the nearly three decades since Dr. Robert Johnson was appointed dean of graduate studies and research and later FSU's first vice president for research, five men have served as university president, student enrollment has nearly doubled, and the research budget at FSU has grown eight-fold — from \$13 million in 1968 to \$100 million today.

In August, following a nationwide search and Johnson's retirement, Florida State welcomed a new vice president for research.

She is Dr. Susan Davis Allen, previously the vice president for research and dean of the Graduate School at Tulane University. Allen, born in Jacksonville, Fla., is the second woman to hold the permanent title of vice president at FSU and only the second vice president for research for FSU's still relatively young research program.

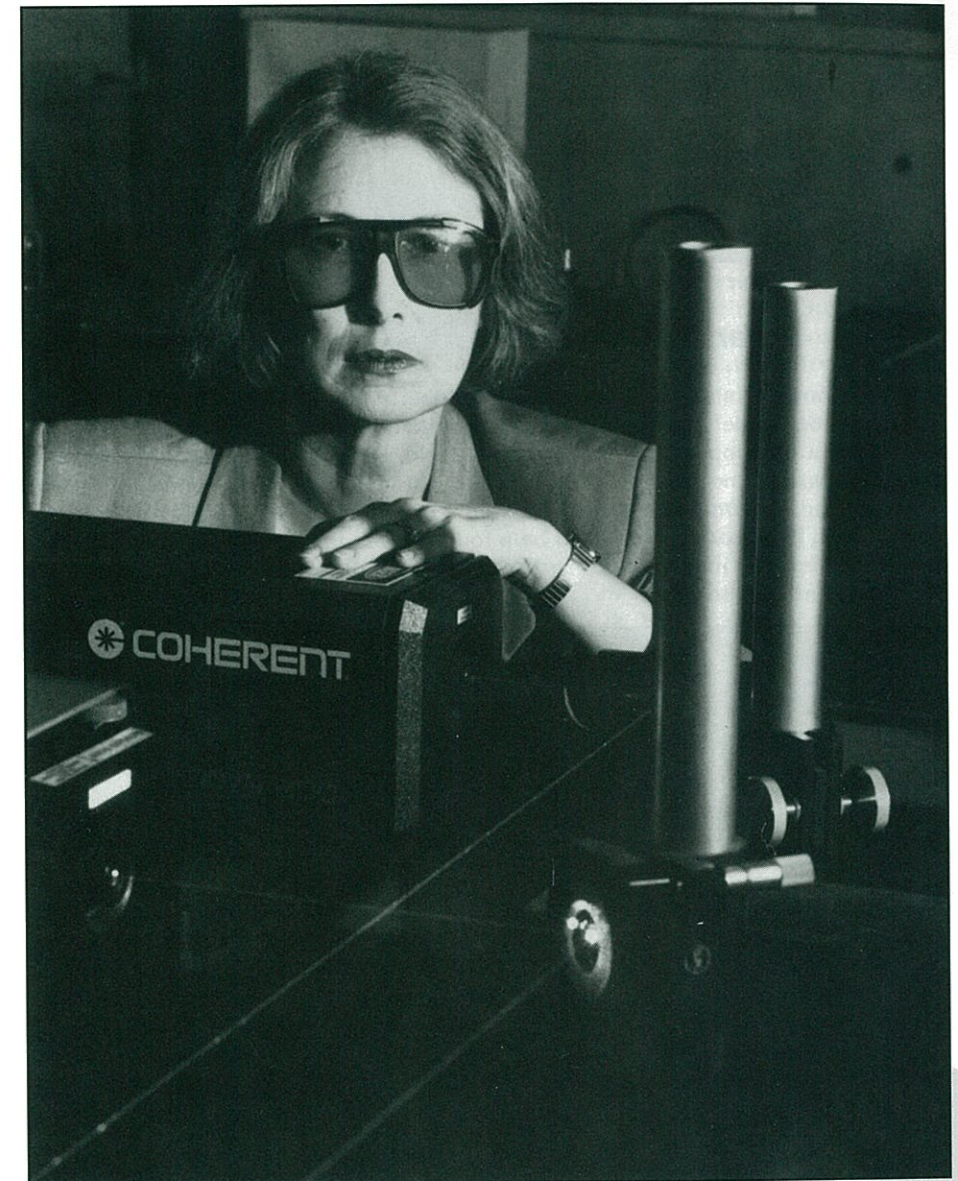
"The resources of FSU are formidable," Allen said, "not only in the sciences and engineering with various research centers and the joint Florida A&M University/FSU College of Engineering, but also in the social sciences, humanities and arts."

Allen, one of five university vice presidents, is responsible for research policy and the administration of sponsored research at Florida State. Beyond her many administrative duties, Allen remains very much involved in her own scholarly pursuits.

Holder of a doctorate in chemical physics from the University of Southern California, Allen holds joint appointments in FSU's chemistry and electrical engineering departments.

Her laser research in the area of micro-fabricating electronic and optical devices — creating very thin, pure layers of metal on surfaces for minute electronic devices — has won her two patents and a license to develop the laser "dustbuster," or laser cleaning of semiconductor wafers.

When she was a chemistry and engineering student, Allen often was the only woman in class, and she was the first female professor of chemistry at the Uni-

versity of Iowa. With such first-hand knowledge of the pressures on women and their low numbers in the sciences and engineering, Allen is a role model to young women pursuing degrees today. On the faculty at Iowa and Tulane, she organized a network of science faculty to encourage women and minorities in science and engineering, and hopes to do the same at Florida State.

In light of decreasing federal research dollars and increasing competition for grants funding, she also will take the lead as a public advocate for the educational

rewards of research.

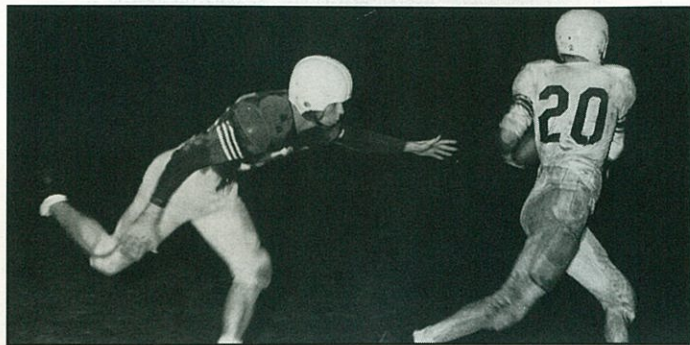
"The current national disenchantment with higher education, in general, and with research and creative activity, in particular, will eventually swing in the other direction, but we must find means to hasten the process by better explaining to the public what 'value added' research universities bring to the state and national economies and quality of life," she said.

A pictorial look back at the 1950s

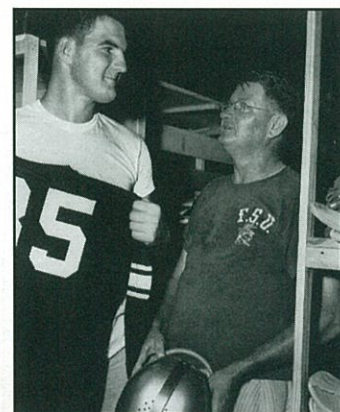
It has indeed been a glorious 50 years! Let's relive some of those wonderful moments together as we "Dance through the Decades," with the fantastic '50s.

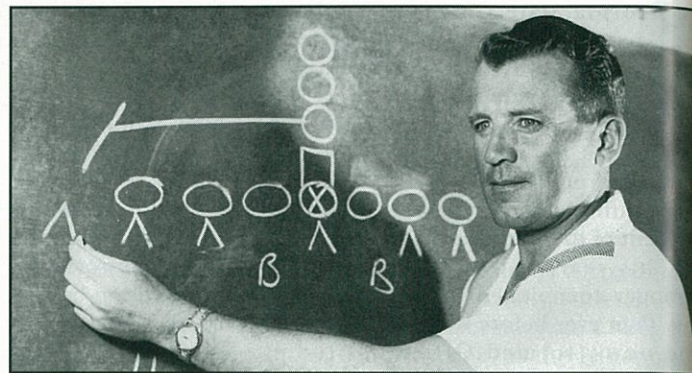

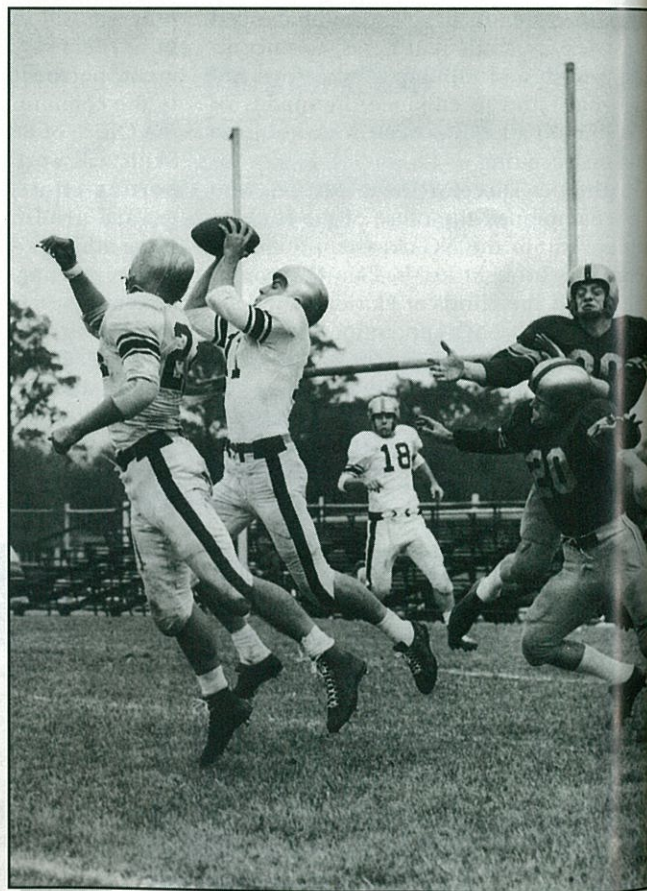
1956 Tom Feamster, a 6-5, 205-pound end, became the first Seminole to play in the NFL when he played for the Baltimore Colts in 1956. He is shown here with FSU equipment man Tilman Dixon. Note the holes on top of the helmets.



1958 Florida State's first win ever over an SEC foe came at Tennessee in 1958 when Fred Pickard had 133 yards, outgaining the entire Tennessee team by 22 yards. The Seminoles landed in Tallahassee to a mob scene eager to celebrate the 10-0 win.



1953 Florida State's football program gained its reputation for innovation under its third head coach, Tom Nugent, who took over in 1953 and coached until 1958. Among Nugent's many "unconventional" strategies were the I-Formation that he started at FSU. He also developed the typewriter huddle still used by some teams in modern football.



1956 Lee Corso led FSU in total offense in 1956 and was one of the Seminoles' finest defenders. He is tied with Deion Sanders at third on the all-time interceptions list with 14 in his career. This theft took place late in the Southern Mississippi (then called Mississippi Southern) game, preserving a 20-19 FSU win.

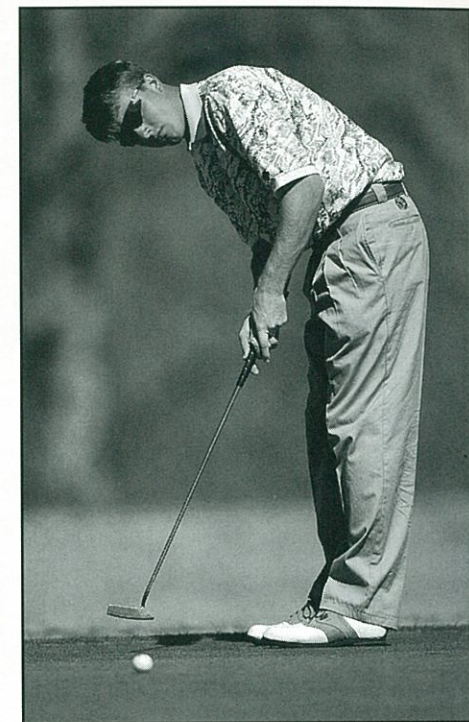
As the Seminoles enter the 1996-97 season Coach Ernie Lanford will look to a bevy of underclassmen to lead a team that will have to replace its top two players from last season. Although this will be the first collegiate experience for a number of the golfers, this season is full of optimism for a return trip to the NCAA Championships.

The success of the team will depend on the return of three players who saw action in last year's NCAA Championships. Sophomore Steve Carrington will enter the season as the No. 1 player for the Seminoles. Coming off of a very successful

summer that saw him win the Florida State Amateur title, Carrington entered the fall well prepared after the experience gained this summer.

Juniors Barry Dyché and Jason Pool will also be looked upon for leadership, as both golfers played in a number of tournaments last year. 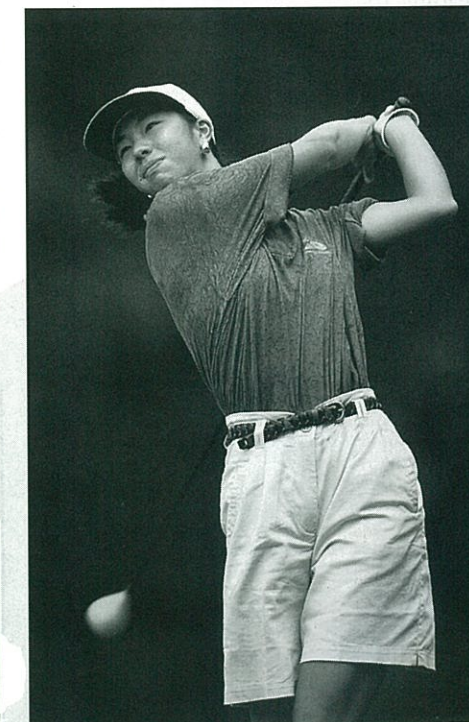

Michigan Stadium
Sept. 28, 1991

The battle between the No. 1 and No. 3 ranked teams in the country was an explosive and high scoring event with only eight points separating the two teams at the end of the first half. Florida State pulled away in the second half for a 51-31 victory over Michigan before a crowd of 106,145 at Michigan Stadium and an ABC-TV national audience.

Highlights included All-American Terrell Buckley returning an interception 40 yards for a touchdown on the first play of the game; Michigan's Desmond Howard, the 1991 Heisman Trophy winner, tying the score at 7-7 with a leaping grab in the back of the end zone; and Florida State scoring on a fake field goal attempt as holder Brad Johnson took the snap and hit William Floyd with a four-yard shovel pass for the score.

The win put Florida State at a perfect 4-0 for the year and added to its nation leading 10-game winning streak.

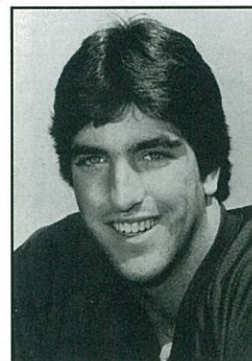

Florida State was able to hold off a tough Memphis State team to improve its record to 2-0 on the young 1981 football season with a 10-5 victory.

Memphis State scored early when the Tigers sacked FSU QB Rick Stockstill in the end zone for the first two points of the game. The Seminoles scored in the second quarter on a 12-play, 76-yard drive when Mike Whiting crossed over the goal line from one yard out to score his first touchdown of the year. The first half ended with FSU leading, 7-2.

After a scoreless third quarter, the teams then traded field goals in the fourth quarter to make the final score 10-5. Freshman Seminole kicker Mike Rendina booted a 46-yard field goal while Memphis State kicker Greg Hauss connected on a 27-yard field goal with eight minutes left in the game. That was the last scoring chance the Tigers had as the Florida State defense did not allow the MSU offense to cross the 50-yard line the rest of the game.

The Kansas Jayhawks came into Tallahassee unscored upon for the season and ready for their showdown with the unbeaten Seminoles, but Florida State prevailed 30-7 in the 1971 home opener.

FSU place-kicker Frank Fontes kicked two first quarter field goals to give the Seminoles an early 6-0 lead. Seminole quarterback Gary Huff connected with Kent Gaydos for a 24-yard touchdown pass with 30 seconds left in the first quarter to extend the FSU lead to 13-0. In the second quarter Kansas scored its only touchdown of the game. Set up by an interception, the touchdown came when Kansas quarterback Dan Heck threw a seven-yard scoring strike to cut the Florida State lead to six. However, Fontes kicked his third field goal of the half to give FSU a 16-7 halftime lead.

In the second half, Huff connected with Barry Smith for a pair of third-quarter touchdown passes. The first was a 19-yard TD pass, while the second was an 88-yard bomb which broke the old record of 86 yards from Gary Pajcic to Ron Sellers that was set in 1968. In the fourth quarter, neither team scored as both defenses dominated play.

The 30-7 Florida State win gave the Seminoles a perfect 3-0 record on the year.

"The Kangaroo Kicker"

While Warrick Dunn campaigns for the Heisman Trophy with electrifying runs, and Reinard Wilson and Peter Boulware earn accolades for their crushing quarterback sacks, Sean Liss has quietly not only established himself as one of the premier punters in the nation, but also as an all-time Seminole great. He has worked hard the past three years helping the Seminoles on special teams as their starting punter. Now beginning his final year, the Florida State punter stands on the threshold of what could quite possibly be his greatest season.

Liss, a native of St. Petersburg, Fla., grew up playing soccer and it wasn't until his high school football coach asked him to punt the football that he began to realize his tremendous potential. He started the following year (his sophomore season) and went on to average 46.4 yards per punt at Boca Ceiga High his senior year. These feats led to first team all-state honors and Liss was given the distinction of being called one of the top three punters in the nation according to *Super Prep* and Tom Lemming. As a result, he was heavily recruited by both Florida State and Penn State. Fortunately for the Seminoles, he chose to come to Tallahassee because of its closeness to home.

Now in his senior year, Liss can see how he has evolved as a player and how his role has changed over the years.

"I'm more mature and confident than in past years," Liss said. "I can offer leadership to the younger players on the special teams and also help the team with its defensive field position."

Some of this new attitude can probably be attributed to an improved off-season training schedule.

"I took hundreds of punts on the practice field and ran a lot during the summer," Liss said. "This allowed me to come into two-a-day workouts, not looking to get in shape, but to focus more on my kicking."

It will be another exciting year if Liss is able to continue his performance from last season. In 1995, he averaged an impressive 43.9 yards per punt and ranked fifth in the nation. Perhaps more impressively, he stepped up in big games against Virginia, Miami and Notre Dame. Against the Cavaliers, Liss punted a career-high nine times

for 360 yards. In the defeat of the Hurricanes, he averaged 50 yards per punt, including an incredible 62-yard punt — his career best. Facing the Irish in the Orange Bowl, Liss twice pinned them deep in their own territory, forcing quarterback Tom Krug to throw out of the end zone.

Perhaps the only thing left for Liss to accomplish is to surpass former Seminole great Rohn Stark's single-season average (46.0 yards) and career average (42.7 yards) records. While Liss says he does think about bettering Stark's marks, he also sees himself as a vital piece of the puzzle if the team is to capture the national title.

"The records aren't as important as the team doing well," Liss said.

After being named an honorable mention All-American last season, Liss has set his goals high for 1996.

"I would like to average 48 yards per punt, lead the ACC in punting, and be named first- or second-team All-American," Liss said.

Some may consider Liss somewhat of an unconventional punter. He would probably feel more comfortable kicking on

a nearby beach. He admits that punting the ball barefooted is something he has thought about doing. However, coaches have discouraged him from this practice. Instead, he has found what he believes the next best thing — his form-fitting kangaroo leather shoes.

"Unlike leather shoes, you don't have to take a long time to break them in," Liss explained. "Also, they give you a more direct feeling between the foot and the ball which helps you to kick it further."

If Liss continues to perform at this level, he will undoubtedly have an opportunity to fulfill his dream of becoming an NFL punter. However, if football is not what lies in his future, Liss will take his degree in criminology and pursue a career with the Federal Bureau of Investigations (FBI).

Regardless of what path he follows after his career at Florida State, Sean Liss has earned himself a spot in the hearts of Seminole fans as one of the school's all-time greatest punters. Quite ironic for a player who still considers himself a soccer player first and then a football player.
