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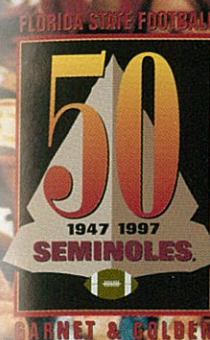
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From the Press Box

Bigger than anything you've ever seen before

Big. Really big. Bigger than big. The Florida State/Florida game is always a gut-wrenching affair for fans of either school (there are few fans of both), but today's game will surely add a new chapter to a college football rivalry that is still in its infancy compared to most intra-state showdowns around the country. While deadlines prevented a peek at Sunday morning papers, when the Seminoles could talk about the game for the first time, my guess is that the description "big" will be used a zillion times to describe this game.

You know what? It is!

Only three other times in NCAA Division I-A history have two undefeated teams met in the final regular season game, and a closer examination of the games is sure to put you closer to the edge of your seat, if that is possible.

On Nov. 19, 1966, undefeated Notre Dame traveled to unbeaten Michigan State. The result was a 10-10 tie. (If that happens today and say the score was, I don't know, maybe 31-31, we would line up on the 25-yard line and play it off. Somehow, 23 years later, a 10-10 tie holds a lot more romance than a win with OT listed afterward.)

On Nov. 21, 1970, Michigan brought an undefeated Wolverine squad to Columbus to take on hated rival Ohio State. The result? The homestanding Buckeyes prevailed 20-9.

On Nov. 24, 1973, Ohio State and Michigan were again undefeated when the two met in Ann Arbor. Three and a half chilled-to-the-bone, cheered-till-you're-hoarse hours later the scoreboard read: Ohio State 10, Michigan 10.

Actually, there's a fourth game that could be thrown in here. In 1971, undefeated and top-ranked Nebraska traveled to unbeaten and second-ranked Oklahoma and the only reason it does not qualify is that Nebraska played at Hawaii the next weekend. But the result of the No. 1 vs. No. 2 showdown was Nebraska 35, Oklahoma 31.

So against that backdrop, No. 1 Florida travels to Tallahassee. A place where old Gators fought like hell to keep "the girl's school" from fielding a team. Where they fought like hell to keep the team from building a stadium. Where they fought like hell to keep from ever having to play the

team, and definitely not in Tallahassee. Then, fought like hell to keep FSU from improving its stadium. The key, at least from Florida State's perspective, is that the Seminoles fought just as hard to get those things.

Now, these two giants of the football world have bumped into each other in a narrow hallway and neither wants to give. Both claim to be the bully in town and they're in each other's way. Or at least will be for 60 minutes out on the field at Doak Campbell Stadium.

Everyone is here today to see it. Out on the deck on the West side will be ABC's studio show, which ventures out of New York City exactly once a year. ESPN's Gameday crew will be broadcasting all day from where J.D. Drew usually camps under a fly ball at Dick Howser Stadium.

In the press box, writers from London, Paris, New York and Los Angeles eagerly await this clash of the titans.

It's all here. The glare of the TV lights and the hoopla that surrounds a huge

game. Who's got the advantage? Perhaps the Seminoles.

You see this is Game of the Century number four for the Seminoles. Florida's Fiesta Bowl berth last year was probably bigger for them, but it happened just the one time. History will tell that the Tennessee game came just too early to fall into that category for Florida.

FSU's schedule through the years has pitted the Seminoles in some of the harshest environments in the country and against the toughest odds. In 1993, it was "the biggest game in 25 years" according to *Chicago Tribune* headlines when FSU rolled into South Bend to take on the Fighting Irish. Later in 1993, familiar Nebraska stood in Florida State's path to a national championship in the Orange Bowl. In 1991, it was undefeated FSU (10-0) and undefeated Miami squaring off in Tallahassee. Back in 1979, Bobby Bowden had to take his undefeated Seminoles (10-0) to Gainesville with a chance at Oklahoma in

the Orange Bowl riding in the balance.

Not that this big game phenomenon has gotten old hat for Florida State, but the Seminoles may be more exposed to it than Florida.

While the Gators' regular SEC schedule is a mouthful, it has the comfort of familiarity to it. Florida players generally play in accustomed surroundings with fans who use the normal taunts. In fact, the Gators have played only one regular season road game against a non-SEC opponent other than their obligation to Florida State since 1987. Florida traveled to Syracuse in 1991 and lost 38-21.

All that remains to be seen.

So sit back, relax (ha) and drink it all in. History says this should be a BIG game.

A letter to his family

November 30, 1996

Dear Derrick, Summer, Bricson, Travis and Samantha:

Just thought I would drop you a line. I know I haven't written for the past four years, but it's just been unbelievably busy around here. After all, we've spent the better part of the last four years carving out our place as the most consistently successful college football program ever.

Back in 1993, we started the season number one and held onto it until we stumbled up at Notre Dame when the ghosts seemed to step in the way of our final drive. Funny thing, though, Notre Dame lasted only one week at number one before Boston College beat them and put us right back in the driver's seat.

We had to go down to Florida to play the Gators in what they call a swamp (nothing like you've got back in Louisiana, though). A national championship match-up with Nebraska was on the line that day and Florida had not lost at home since Steve Spurrier took over as head coach.

Warrick had already done some remarkable things as a freshman. He contributed in every game, but it was Warrick and his roommate (Charlie Ward) who paired up to make the big play when FSU needed it. Warrick's catch and run for the fourth-quarter touchdown against Florida will be legend around here for years to come.

Oh yeah, we went on to defeat Nebraska for our first national championship.

Warrick ran awfully well as a sophomore and junior, gaining more than 1,000 yards in both seasons and becoming the first back in FSU history to do that. He was developing quite a fan base not only in Florida, but around the nation. Heck, even a lot of Gators will admit they like him.

Your brother was so good that agents started trying to convince him that he needed to enter the NFL draft after his junior year. Faced with taking the money and running, literally, Warrick did what he has done most of his life — he made a difficult decision.

Warrick came back to Florida State for his senior year and as you read this he is getting ready for the biggest game of his life. One of the biggest games in any college football player's life.

Think he's nervous?

Let me tell you some things about your brother that he probably has not told you.

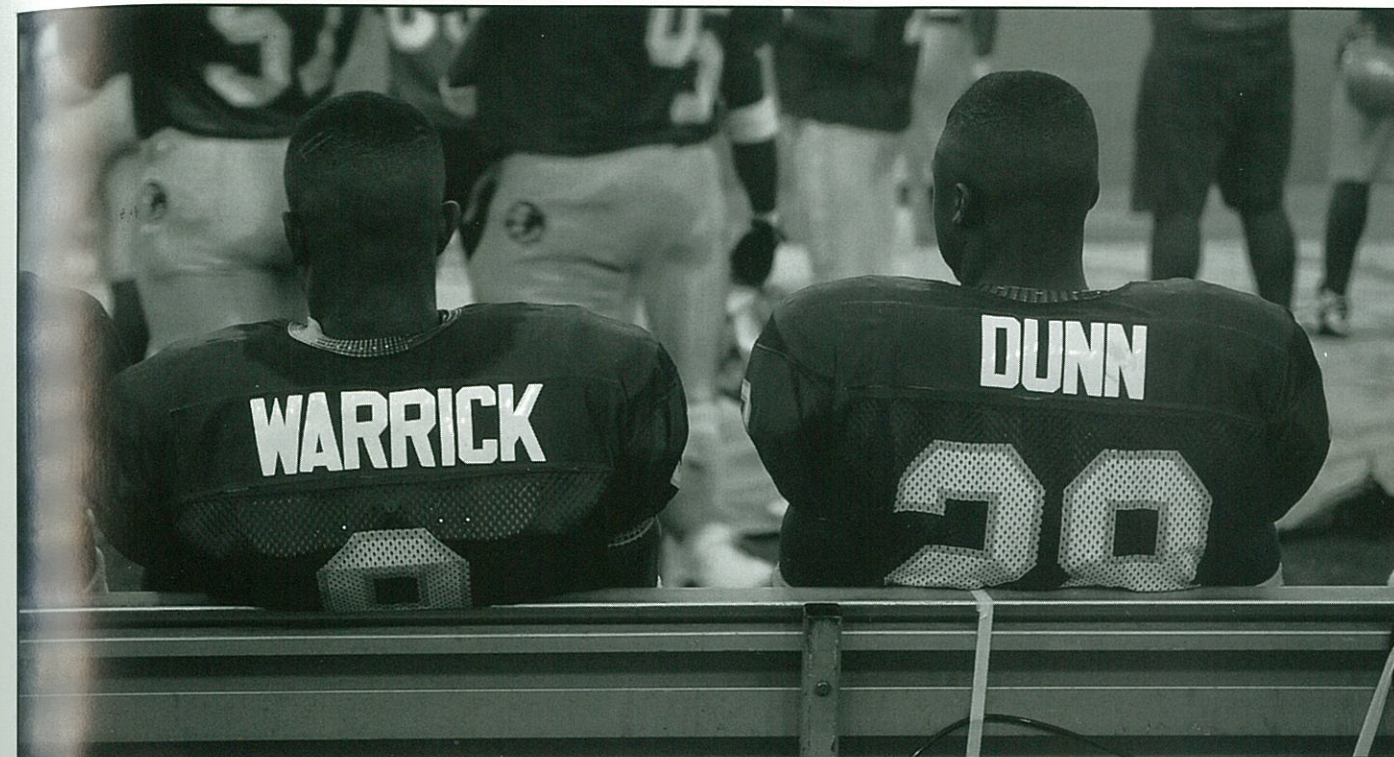
Like most people, I had a soft spot for Warrick before he ever came to Florida State. I was there in the airport when former Washington Redskin Super Bowl MVP Doug Williams told Charlie about your family's circumstances.

I'll never forget thinking how small and sad he looked when he arrived on campus in August of his freshman year. I'm accustomed to seeing homesick freshmen but not someone quite so heartsick and lonesome. When he stuck it out after those first few days away from home I suspected he

might be special.

Your brother leaned on Charlie a lot as a freshman and when the Heisman Trophy winner left, I thought maybe Warrick would suffer without such a strong friend to help him. But Warrick is smarter and tougher than that. He had been preparing all along.

He prepared hard in school also, establishing himself as a good student and trying a major (information systems) that required more outside work than all but a few. But, just like when he didn't take the easy way and sign with backyard neighbor LSU, Warrick was just doing what he felt was right.

Your brother has progressed from timid freshman, to quiet leader, to the finest running back in Florida State history. And he's done it with an awful lot on his mind.

I know he has missed all of you.

Someone once asked him what he thought about during a football game. I think they were trying to get at the specifics of whether he sets up blockers or debates in his mind how to make an oncoming tackler look silly. That's not the answer they got.

"The games are fun," he said. "A chance to get rid of all the problems and worries of the week. A time to clear your mind of everything and just enjoy yourself. It's an escape in a way. The fans don't even have to be there. It's just 60 minutes of fun."

I hope the officials think about that the next time they reach in their pocket debating whether to flag Warrick when he dives into the end zone after tearing over 60 yards of gridiron and 11 guys who tried to stop him.

His eyes tell a lot about this brother of yours. He carries a lot of sorrow in them. But when he smiles it is like a spring day

when the clouds part and shafts of sunlight knife through that are so distinct they look like they could be climbed. When he smiles it is ear-to-ear and so joyous that I choose to believe they can see it in heaven.

He would trade it all for one thing though. He'd trade all the magnificent plays in his career. He'd trade the good friends he's made here and even the great education of which he's taken advantage. He would trade the fame, the potential wealth that teases on the horizon, the records, everything.

But he can't bring her back. "Every day," sighed Warrick when asked how often he thinks of your mom.

Your brother has taught us a lot in his four years. He has taught us about courage and dedication. He has taught us about determination, desire and pride. He has taught us about taking the right way and not necessarily the easy way. He has given us examples of patience and contentment.

He is the finest ball carrier in the storied history of Florida State University. There have been times when No. 28 was bounding through a defense and I thought it was the most remarkable thing I

had ever seen.

Your brother has meant so much to this university and now we sit and wait for him to dazzle us for the last time on the Doak Campbell Stadium field that, I swear, he only touches a few times every run.

A mountain of records are coming Warrick's way. Among them a startling 49 career touchdowns. Most of which came at the end of runs so filled with highlights that you've got to watch the replay to appreciate it.

We will all miss your brother next year.

You know, he has always pointed to the sky after scoring a touchdown. At that moment of greatest joy, he points up as if to say "did you see that Mom." I choose to believe she does.

Maybe it would be most appropriate today that if Warrick does get in the end zone, all the fans join him in pointing to heaven.

Betty, your son done good!

"I appreciate every opportunity," Messam said. "Football has opened the door for me in many different aspects. I will attempt to earn and then take each one (opportunity)."

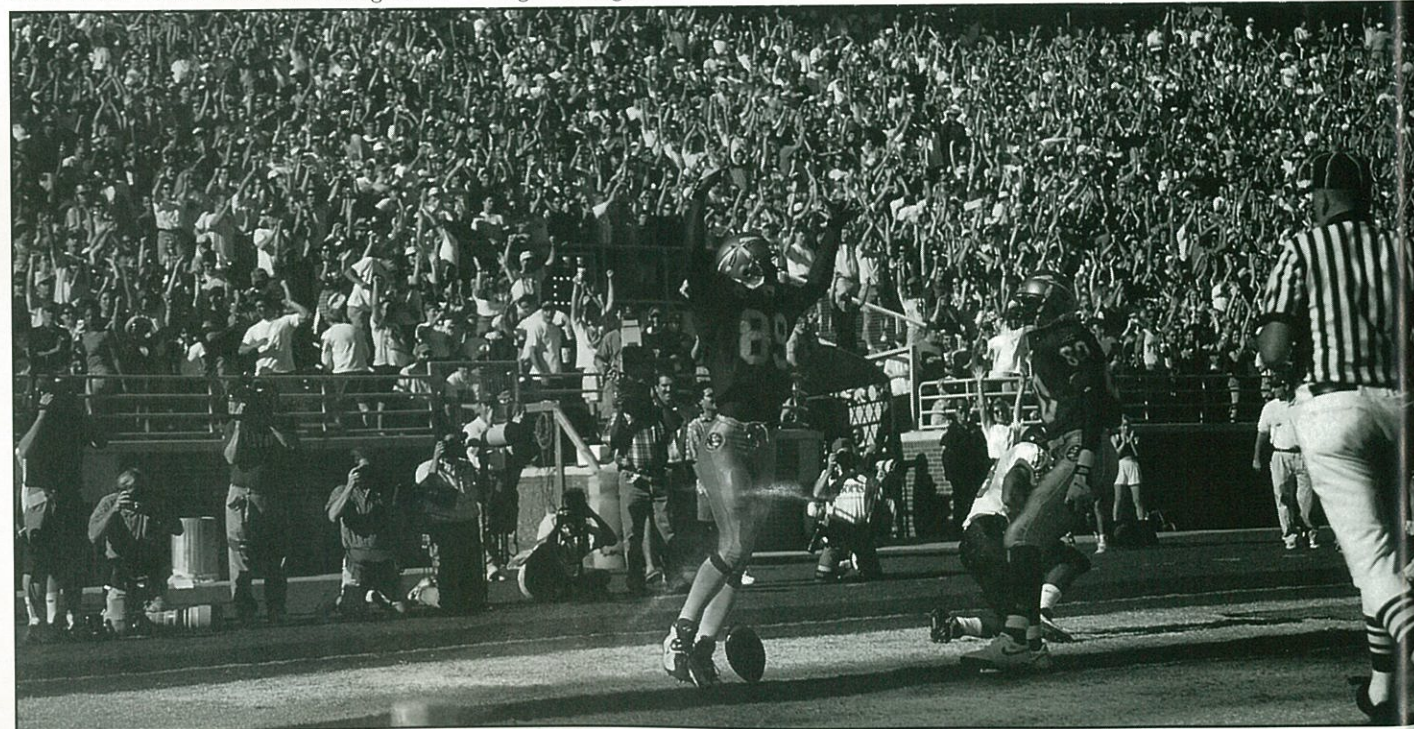
This passion for advancement can be credited to his father, of whom Messam is extremely proud. Son of a former seasonal migrant sugarcane worker, Messam was

"I am just a big ball of fun all the time," Spain said. "I get along with all the guys. We laugh and crack jokes. There have been a lot of fun times the last four years."

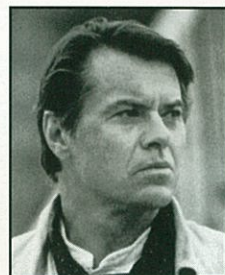

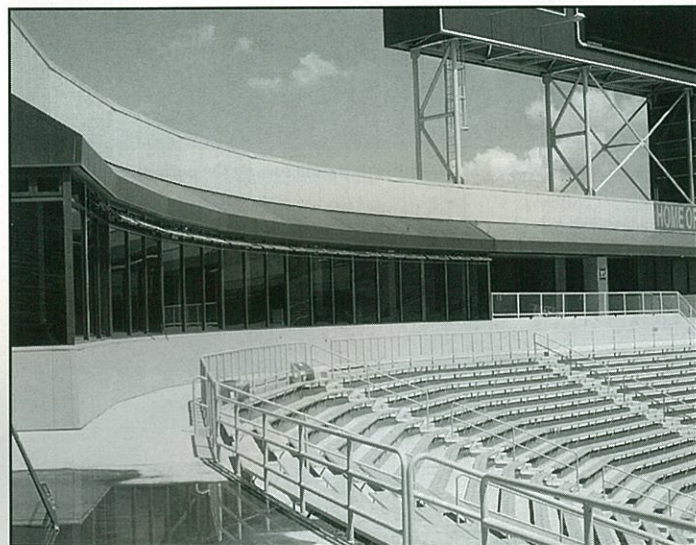

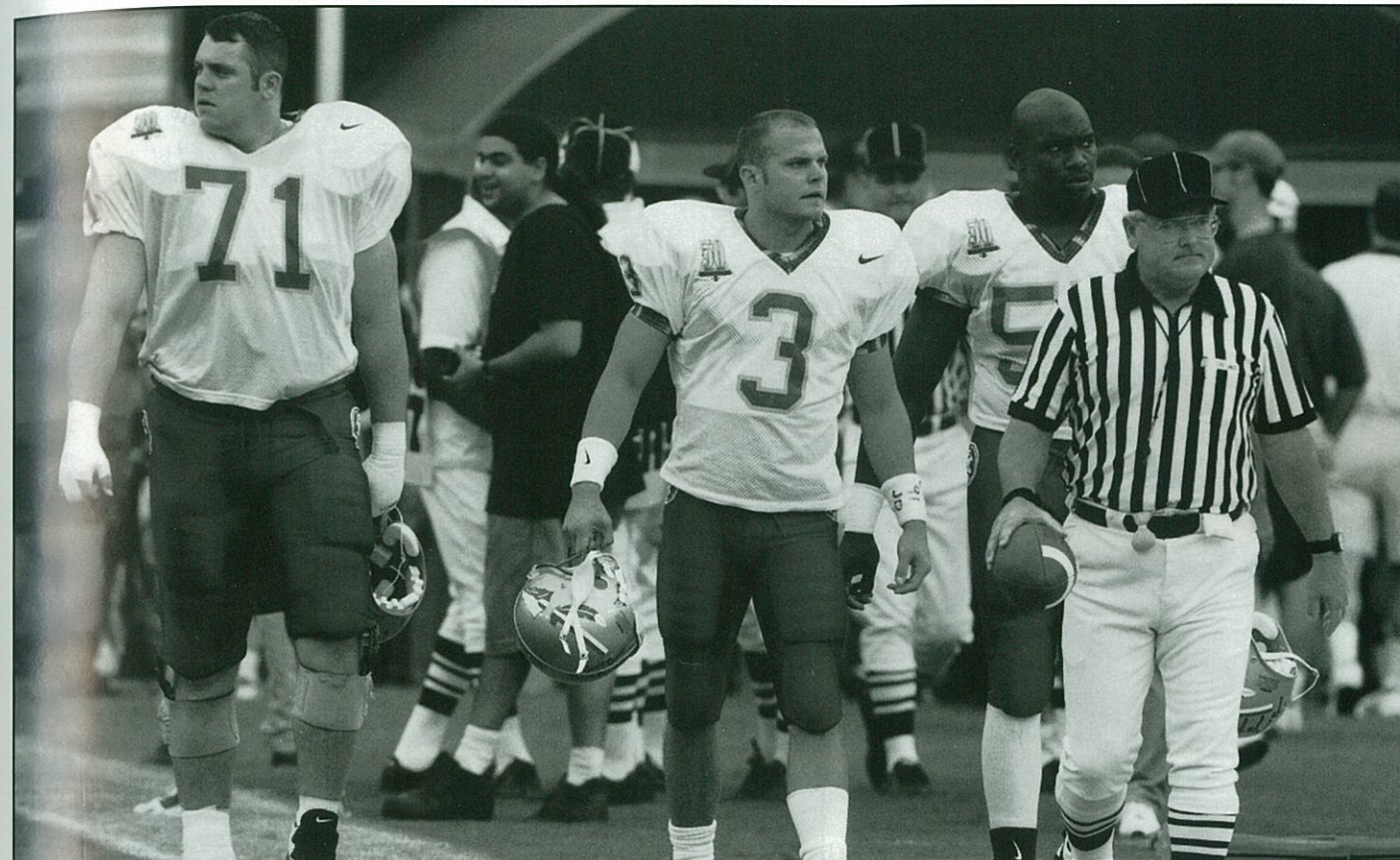

It has indeed been a glorious 50 years! Let's relive some of those wonderful moments together as we "Dance through the Decades," with the '90s.



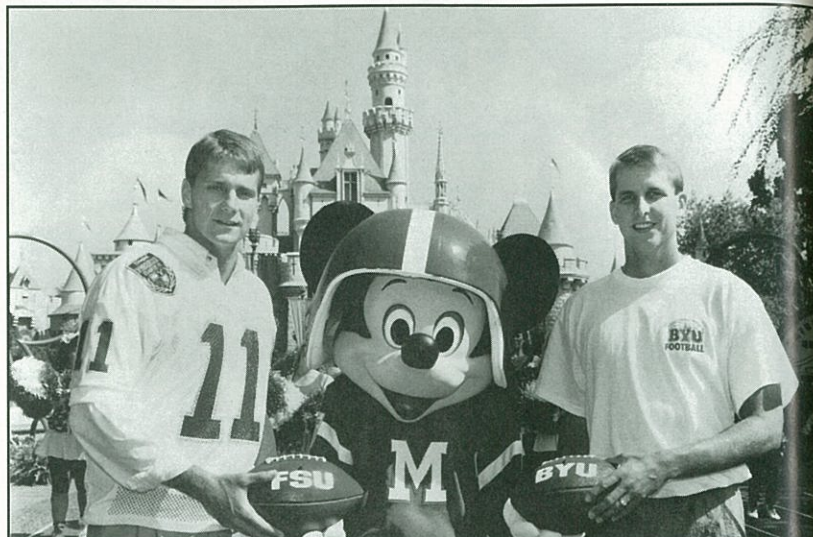

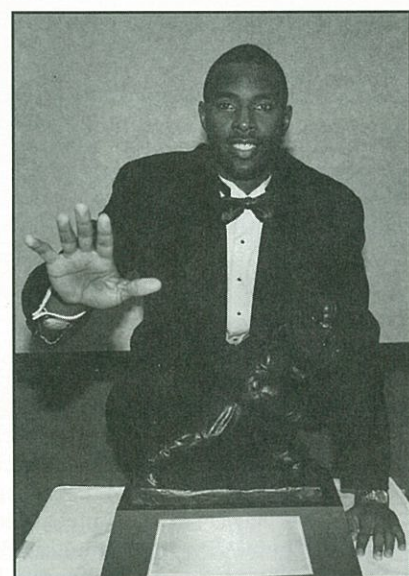
1992 Down 21-7 in the fourth quarter at Georgia Tech, Florida State fans saw the birth of the "fast-break offense." In desperation, the Seminoles began working from the shotgun without a huddle. Fans marveled at the heroics of QB Charlie Ward, who accounted for 206 of FSU's 207 yards on three touchdown drives in the final quarter. The Seminoles pulled out a 29-24 victory in one of the greatest comebacks in school history.



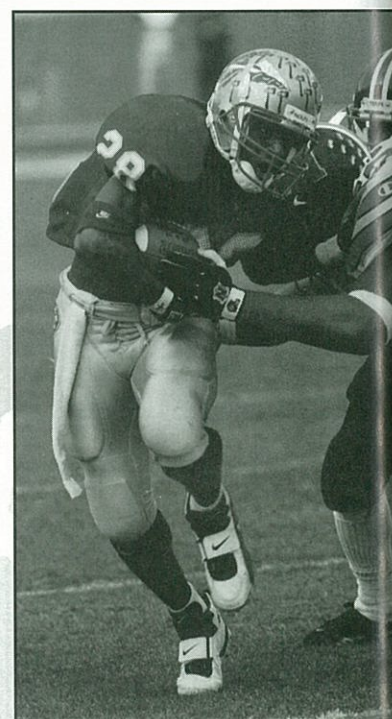
1994 The 1994 Seminoles set an NCAA record with their amazing fourth quarter comeback against Florida. Danny Kanell brought the squad back from a 31-3 deficit with less than 13 minutes remaining to tie the score at 31. Rock Preston capped off the comeback with a four-yard TD run. Kanell totaled 232 yards on 18-of-22 passing in the fourth quarter alone in one of the Seminoles' most memorable games.



1991 Florida State quarterback Casey Weldon (left) outshined 1990 Heisman Trophy winner Ty Detmer (right) as the Seminoles defeated Brigham Young, 44-28, in the Disneyland Pigskin Classic in Anaheim, Calif. Weldon, the 1991 Heisman Trophy runner-up and 1991 Johnny Unitas Award winner, earned game MVP honors as he connected on 21 of 28 passes for 268 yards and two touchdowns.



1993 Charlie Ward, one of the greatest players to ever don the garnet and gold, brought FSU its first national championship and Heisman Trophy in 1993. Ward, the most decorated player in the history of college football, won every major award he was eligible for as a senior quarterback. Ward, who wore No. 17 during his career, is one of just five Seminoles in history to have his number retired.



1995 Warrick Dunn became the first player in Florida State history to post back-to-back 1,000-yard rushing seasons in 1995. He set an FSU season record with 1,232 yards.

•**Dr. Joseph Camps:** The 1976 captain of the Seminole football team. B.S. in biology. Received his M.D. in 1982.

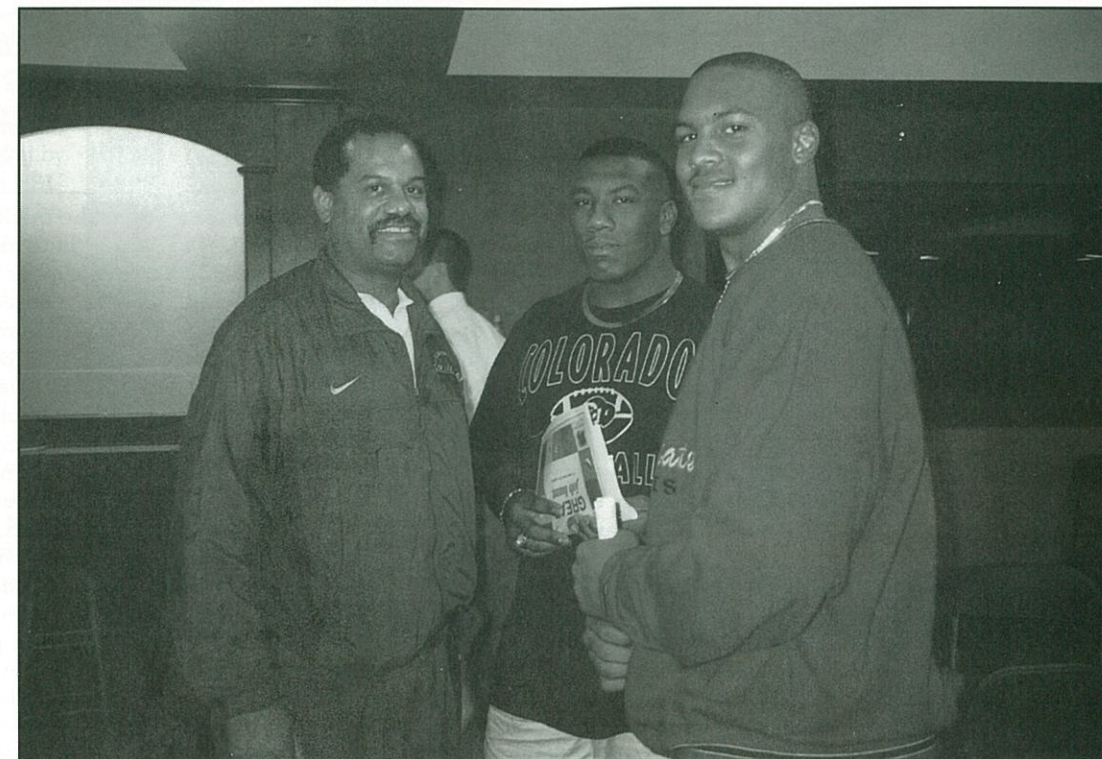
Member of Executive Board of Tallahassee Physicians Association. Currently a physician at the Southeastern Urological Center.

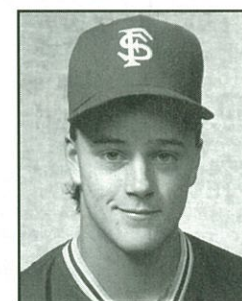

Led by Danny Kanell's record-breaking performance, seventh-ranked Florida State scored 28 points in the fourth quarter to tie fourth-ranked Florida 31-31 in front of a Doak Campbell Stadium record crowd of 80,210.

FSU tied the NCAA Division I-A record for a fourth-quarter comeback by pulling even with Florida after trailing 31-3 in the final quarter. Kanell completed a school-record 40 of his 53 passes for 421 yards and one touchdown while rushing for another.

UF's Danny Wuerffel and the Gator receivers enjoyed a successful first half. Wuerffel hit a wide open Aubrey Hill for a 58-yard TD in the first and hooked up with Jack Jackson for a three-yard TD pass in the second. A Judd Davis 35-yard field goal with 3:16 left in the half increased the Gator lead to 17-3. Following an interception, Wuerffel hit Jackson in the corner for a 28-yard TD giving UF a 24-3 halftime lead. In the third quarter, Wuerffel used another big play, hitting Reidel Anthony on a 51-yard bomb. Florida appeared on its way to one of the most lopsided wins in the history of the series before FSU began "The Comeback." Over the final 13 minutes, the Seminoles would score 28 points.

Doak Campbell Stadium
Nov. 20, 1976

The final game of the season looked like a track meet as Florida State's offense scored three times on plays of 75 yards or longer in a 28-21 win over Virginia Tech at Doak Campbell Stadium.

Virginia Tech took an early 6-0 lead but the Seminoles quickly responded when FSU running back Larry Key scored on a 97-yard draw play for the score. Key's run was the longest in FSU history. FSU scored in the second quarter on a 75-yard pass play from QB Jimmy Black to flanker Mike Barnes. The score put FSU on top 14-6 as the first half ended.

In the third quarter, Virginia Tech scored eight points to tie the score and then picked up another score in the final quarter to take a 21-14 lead with 13:58 left in the game. Freshman QB Jimmy Jordan entered the game and led the Seminoles on a 68-yard scoring drive. The drive culminated with a 33-yard touchdown pass to fellow freshman Jackie Flowers. On the next series, Virginia Tech marched to the Seminole 9-yard line before FSU linebacker Aaron Carter recovered a fumble on the 4-yard line. On the very next play Jordan hooked up with Seminole wide receiver Kurt Unglaub for a new Florida State record touchdown pass of 96 yards. The two-point conversion brought the final score to FSU 28, Virginia Tech 21.

In the first meeting ever between Florida State and Pittsburgh, Pitt jumped out to a quick lead before FSU ran off 31 straight points en route to a 31-13 win over the visiting Panthers.

FSU QB Gary Huff's first pass of the game was intercepted by Pitt defensive back Bill Adams who then raced 42 yards for the score. The Panthers held a 7-0 lead at the end of the first quarter, but the Seminoles erupted for 24 second-quarter points. Huff redeemed himself by connecting with Kent Gaydos for a 52-yard touchdown pass. FSU took the lead for good when Seminole fullback James Jarrett took a pitchout and raced around end for a 26-yard touchdown run. Huff then led FSU on a 50-yard drive that ended with a 23-yard TD pass from Huff to tight end Gary Parris, his first TD catch of the season. On the last play of the first half, Frank Fontes kicked a 41-yard field goal that was set up by two Huff-to-Dawson passes.

In the third quarter, FSU defensive back James Thomas intercepted a Panther pass and returned it 20 yards to the Pitt 7-yard line. This set up Huff's third touchdown pass of the game when he connected with Dawson for a 7-yard strike.

The win over Pittsburgh in the final regular season game of the year gave the Seminoles an 8-3 record and a trip to the first-ever Fiesta Bowl.
