



#### QB #13 **JORDAN TRAVIS**

- Broke FSU's career touchdown responsibility record at Clemson, passing 2000 Heisman Trophy winner Chris Weinke...record-breaking TD was game-winning pass in OT
- Broke FSU's total offense record on go-ahead rushing TD vs. No. 16 Duke
- Only player in ACC and one of three nationally with 19 passing TDs and 2 or fewer INTs
- Only player in ACC and one of four nationally with 19 passing TDs and 7 rushing TDs
- Has thrown at least one touchdown pass in 21 consecutive games, FSU's longest stretch since 2013
- Heisman Trophy winner Jameis Winston's 27-game streak in 2013-14
- Has accounted for multiple TDs in an FSU-record 16 consecutive games, 2nd-longest ACC streak in last 20 seasons behind only 2020 Heisman Finalist Trevor Lawrence (17)
- Has registered at least one rushing and one passing touchdown in four straight games, matching his FSU record originally set in 2020
- Tied single-game career-best with 27 completions in 38-20 win vs. No. 16 Duke
- Had streak of 184 passes without INT, 5th-longest at
- FSU and 13th-longest in ACC history
- Ranks in top-3 nationally in passer rating (1st), yards per attempt (2nd) and completion percentage (3rd) against ranked opponents
- Registered 99.9 ESPN QBR in 2nd half vs. No. 5 LSU, the highest rating in a half by any quarterback nationally vs. a ranked opponent since Jameis Winston in 2013
- Posted career-high four passing touchdowns in 45-24 win vs. No. 5 LSU

#### RUNNING BACK



## RB #3 TREY BENSON

- Returning All-ACC back Trey Benson set the FSU single-game record (min. 10 rushes) with 18.2 yards per carry against Virginia Tech, running for 200 yards and two touchdowns on just 11 rushes.
- Benson's rushing total is the 2nd-most in the ACC this year (most in a conference game) and the 5th-most in Doak Campbell Stadium's 74-year history.
- Benson who was named the ACC & Doak Walker Award National Running Back of the Week - had second-half touchdown runs of 62 and 85 yards, the first Nole since Chris Thompson in 2012 with multiple 60-yard rushing touchdowns in a game. Those two runs are the longest of his career and FSU's longest runs of the season. His 85-yard run is the longest in the ACC and 3rd-longest nationally in 2023.
- The last Nole with at least 200 yards was Dalvin Cook in 2016 against Syracuse. Benson and Cook are the only Noles with a 200-yard rushing game since the 1980s.
- At Wake Forest, Benson led FSU with a career-high 100 receiving yards, the first 100-yard receiving game for an FSU running back since Cook had 106 vs. North Carolina in 2016. Benson added 55 yards on the ground with an 18-yard touchdown, FSU's longest run of the game.
- Benson had a 55-yard touchdown run and averaged 8.1 yards per rush at Pitt. Benson leads FSU with 8 rushing touchdowns in 2023, and his 17 career rushing touchdowns are tied for 17th in program history.
- Benson's 80-yard catch at Wake Forest was the longest of his career, and he is responsible for FSU's two longest offensive
- plays this year (85-yard TD run vs. Virginia Tech). Benson is the first player in FSU history with an 80-yard touchdown catch and 80-yard touchdown run in his career; Benson is the only player nationally with multiple 80-yard plays from scrimmage this year.
- Over the last 20 seasons, only three ACC players have an 80-yard run and catch in same season - Clemson's CJ Spiller in 2006 and Duke's Shaun Wilson in 2015.
- Benson is tied for the ACC lead with three 50-yard rushes this season.

# WIDE RECEIVER

## WR #4 KEON COLEMAN

- Junior receiver Keon Coleman wore a Peter Warrick t-shirt during warmups before the Syracuse game and ended it by joining Warrick as the only Seminoles with over 100 receiving and punt return yards in a game.
- Coleman caught nine passes for 140 yards and a 58-yard touchdown and added six punt returns for 107 yards, with a 72-yard return. Warrick had a pair of 100-100 games in his Seminole career.
- Coleman's 247 all-purpose yards rank 14th in FSU singlegame history.
- Coleman caught a one-handed pass in the first quarter, one of many highlights for the junior against the Orange. His 72-yard punt return is the longest non-TD punt
- return in FSU history and 18th-longest overall; it is FSU's longest PR since 2018 and the longest return in the ACC this year, and his 107 punt return yard are 4th-most in a game nationally in 2023.
- Coleman caught a 24-yard TD in overtime that proved to be the game winner at Clemson and got FSU on the board with a 7-yard score in the second quarter.
- Coleman caught nine passes for 122 yards vs. No. 5 LSU, and his three touchdown catches were the most for a Seminole in his FSU debut. His three TD catches were the most for a Seminole since Auden Tate caught three in the 2017 Independence Bowl; are tied for the most in the ACC this season; and was FSU's first three-TD game in a season opener since Nick O'Leary - now in his first
- year on FSU's staff caught three at Pitt in 2013 to begin FSU's national championship run.
- Coleman added three catches for 48 yards and another touchdown against Southern Miss. He produced a highlight-reel hurdle in the second quarter of the Noles 66-13 win before catching a six-yard touchdown on the following play.
- Coleman added 7 catches, 66 yards and two more touchdowns at Wake Forest. He enters the Pitt game with 9 touchdown catches - the most in the ACC and the most for a Seminole since 2019. He also leads FSU with 38 catches and 538 receiving yards.

#### DEFENSIVE END



## JARED VERSE

- Florida State went 4-0 in October, and the defense allowed just 10.5 points per game.
- The Noles were the only team not to allow a passing touchdown in October, and led the country in opponent completion percentage, yards per pass allowed and opponent passer rating while also producing the ACC's best scoring defense.
- FSU held all four opponents in the month
- Virginia Tech, Syracuse, No. 16 Duke and Wake Forest under 150 passing yards, the first time since 1999 that FSU allowed fewer than 150 passing yards in four consecutive games.
- The Noles held Duke and Wake Forest under 100 passing yards, the second straight season FSU held consecutive conference opponents under 100 passing yards.
- After holding Pitt to 15-of-36 passing, FSU has held four straight opponents under 50 percent completions, tied for the nation's longest active streak.
- The Seminoles are now allowing just 48.4 percent of opponent passes to be completed. FSU leads the country in opponent completion percentage and passing touchdowns allowed, with four.


