FLORIDA



- The Seminoles are 10-0 this season and 8-0 in the ACC, following a 27-20 win over Miami last week. FSU has completed its 10th perfect ACC regular season in program history and is 10-0 to start a season for the eighth time.
- Florida State is No. 4 in this week's Associated Press poll. It is the 11th consecutive week FSU has been ranked in the top-5, the program's longest streak since 2013-14 when Florida State was in the top-5 for 27 consecutive polls.
- The win over Miami extended the Seminoles' winning streak to 16 games, the longest active streak in the ACC and
 - 3rd-longest active streak in the country. During its streak, which is also tied for the 3rd-longest in program history and 5th-longest ever by an ACC program, Florida State has outscored its opponents 636-282.
- FSU has held every opponent this season to fewer than 30 points. The 10-game streak is the longest active in the ACC and the 4th-longest active streak in the country. The last time Florida State held at least 10 straight opponents to fewer than 30 points was a 12-game streak in 2015.
- The Seminoles boast one of the nation's best pass defenses, leading the country in opponent completion percentage (46.9), pass breakups (61) and passes defended (68). FSU's defense also ranks 2nd in fewest passing touchdowns allowed (6) and 6th in opponent passer rating (102.08).
- Florida State (46.9%) is the only team in the nation forcing more incompletions than completions allowed. The last time a P5 team held its opponents below 50 percent completions in a season was 2018, when Michigan and LSU posted marks of 49.5 and 49.7 percent, respectively, and the last time FSU held its opponents below 50 percent completions for a season was 2012.
- The Seminoles have held five consecutive opponents below 50-percent completions, the longest active streak in the nation and the longest nationally by a team against Power 5 opponents since LSU in the last five games of its national championship season. In those five games, FSU's opponents have a cumulative 37.8 completion percentage.

QUICK HITS

- FSU is the only team in the ACC and one of six nationally ranked in the top-15 in both scoring offense and scoring defense. The Seminoles also are the only team in the ACC and one of four in the country ranked in the top-25 in both passing offense and pass defense.
- FSU ranks 21st nationally in red zone defense, allowing points on just 75.9 percent of opponents' drives that reach the 20-yard line, and its rate of 44.8 percent of red zone drives faced that result in a touchdown is 12th-best.
- Florida State's offense leads the ACC in fewest interceptions thrown (2, 2nd nationally), fewest turnovers (5, 2nd), touchdowns scored (49, 13th), passing efficiency (160.89, 15th) and yards per completion (13.66, 25th).
- The Seminoles are one of 13 teams nationally to have a receiver and a rusher with a

three-touchdown game this season. Keon Coleman caught a career-high three scores vs. No. 5 LSU, and Trey Benson tied his single-game career-high with three rushing scores vs. Southern Miss. Coleman is one of 30 receivers nationally with a three-touchdown game this year, and Benson is one of 69 players with three rushing scores in a game.


- Florida State's defense has faced 55 plays inside their 10-yard line this season and allowed just 13 touchdowns. In the 45-24 win over No. 5 LSU, the Seminoles faced 10 snaps inside their own 5-yard line and allowed only two scores. On LSU's first drive of the game, the Tigers had six plays inside the five-yard line, including four snaps from the 1-yard line, and the FSU defense forced a turnover on downs with a 13-yard sack on 4th-and-1.
- Mike Norvell is 22-5 (.815) in November as a head coach, including 10-3 (.769) at home.

QUARTERBACK



GB #13 JORDAN TRAVIS

- Broke FSU's career touchdown responsibility record at Clemson, passing 2000 Heisman Trophy winner Chris Weinke...record-breaking TD was gamewinning pass in OT.
- Broke FSU's total offense record on go-ahead rushing TD vs. No. 16 Duke.
- Only player in ACC and one of three nationally with 20 passing TDs and 2 or fewer INTs.
- One of eight players nationally with 20 passing TDs and 7 rushing TDs.
- Has thrown at least one touchdown pass in 22 consecutive games, FSU's longest stretch since 2013

Heisman Trophy winner Jameis Winston's 27-game streak in 2013-14.

- Had FSU-record streak of 16 consecutive games accounting for multiple TDs.
- Tied his FSU record by accounting for at least one rushing and one passing touchdown in four straight games, matching his record originally set in 2020.
- Tied single-game career-best with 27 completions in 38-20 win vs. No. 16 Duke.
- Had streak of 184 passes without INT, 5th-longest at FSU and 13th-longest in ACC history.
- Leads nation in passer rating (202.99) and yards per attempt (11.0) against ranked opponents, and is 4th nationally in completion percentage (74.2) against ranked opponents.
- Registered 99.9 ESPN QBR in 2nd half vs. No. 5 LSU, the highest rating in a half by any quarterback nationally vs. a ranked opponent since Jameis Winston in 2013.
- Posted career-high four passing touchdowns in 45-24 win vs. No. 5 LSU.

RUNNING BACK



RB #3 TREY BENSON

- Returning All-ACC back Trey Benson set the FSU single-game record (min. 10 rushes) with 18.2 yards per carry against Virginia Tech, running for 200 yards and two touchdowns on just 11 rushes.
- Benson's rushing total is the 2nd-most in the ACC this year (most in a conference game) and the 5th-most in Doak Campbell Stadium's 74-year history.
- Benson who was named the ACC & Doak Walker Award National Running Back of the Week - had second-half touchdown runs of 62 and 85 yards, the first Nole since Chris Thompson in 2012 with multiple

60-yard rushing touchdowns in a game. Those two runs are the longest of his career and FSU's longest runs of the season. His 85-yard run is the longest in the ACC and 3rd-longest nationally in 2023.

- The last Nole with at least 200 yards was Dalvin Cook in 2016 against Syracuse. Benson and Cook are the only Noles with a 200-yard rushing game since the 1980s.
- At Wake Forest, Benson led FSU with a career-high 100 receiving yards, the first 100-yard receiving game for an FSU running back since Cook had 106 vs. North

Carolina in 2016. Benson added 55 yards on the ground with an 18-yard touchdown, FSU's longest run of the game.

- Benson had a 55-yard touchdown run and averaged 8.1 yards per rush at Pitt, then scored two touchdowns against Miami.
- Benson's 10 rushing touchdowns lead FSU and are 18th in a season at FSU. His 19 career rushing TDs are 15th at FSU and he is the 6th player with nine rushing touchdowns in multiple seasons.

WIDE RECEIVER



WR #4 **KEON COLEMAN**

- Junior receiver Keon Coleman wore a Peter Warrick t-shirt during warmups before the Syracuse game and ended it by joining Warrick as the only Seminoles with over 100 receiving and punt return yards in a game.
- Coleman caught nine passes for 140 yards and a 58-yard touchdown and added six punt returns for 107 yards, with a 72-yard return. Warrick had a pair of 100-100 games in his Seminole career.
- Coleman's 247 all-purpose yards rank 14th in FSU singlegame history.
- Coleman caught a one-handed pass in the first quarter, one of many highlights for the junior against the Orange. His 72-yard punt return is the longest non-TD punt return in FSU history and 18th-longest overall; it is FSU's longest PR since

2018 and the longest return in the ACC this year, and his 107 punt return yard are 5th-most in a game nationally in 2023.

- Coleman caught a 24-yard TD in overtime that proved to be the game winner at Clemson and got FSU on the board with a 7-yard score in the second quarter.
- Coleman caught nine second quarter. Coleman caught nine passes for 122 yards vs. No. 5 LSU, and his three touchdown catches were the most for a Seminole in his FSU debut. His three TD catches were the most for a Seminole since Auden Tate caught three in the 2017 Independence Bowl; are tied for the most in the ACC this season; and was FSU's first three-TD game in a season opener since Nick O'Leary now in his first year on FSU's staff caught three at Pitt in 2013 to begin FSU's national championship run.
- Coleman added three catches for 48 yards and another touchdown against Southern Miss. He produced a highlight-reel hurdle in the second quarter of the Noles 66-13 win before catching a six-yard touchdown on the following play. .

Station Contraction

- Coleman had 7 catches, 66 yards and two more touchdowns . at Wake Forest.
- After missing the Pitt game, Coleman had a 57-yard punt return that set up a 6-yard touchdown pass from Travis to Coleman in the fourth quarter against Miami. He enters the North Alabama game with 10 touchdown catches - the most in the ACC and the most for a Seminole since 2017. He is tied for 13th in single-season touchdown catches at FSU.

LINEBACKER



LB #4 **KALEN DELOACH**

- DeLoach ranks 5th in the ACC his team-high 7.0 sacks on the season. His sacks are the most for a Seminole linebacker since 1993.
- DeLoach also leads FSU with 59 tackles and 10.5 DeLoach also leads FSU with 59 tackles and 10.5 tackles for loss and was named the ACC Linebacker of the Week after recording FSU's most impactful defensive play of the season at Clemson. The redshirt senior had a 15-yard sack on Clemson QB Cade Klubnik, forcing a fumble, recovering the fumble and returning it 56 yards for a game-tying TD in the third quarter. DeLoach had seven tackles and one of FSU's eight pass breakups in the contest.
- It was DeLoach's first career touchdown and FSU's

second defensive TD of the year (Jarrian Jones pick-6 vs. Southern Miss). It was FSU's first scoop-and-score since Jermaine Johnson II at Clemson in 2021, and the Noles longest fumble recovery for a touchdown since Derek Nicholson's 75-yard return vs. Wisconsin in the 2008 Champs Sports Bowl.

- DeLoach led FSU with a career-high nine tackles against Virginia Tech, six against No. 16 Duke (tied with Bethune) and eight at Wake Forest (tied with Bethune).
- DeLoach led FSU with 10 tackles, 2.0 sacks and 2.0 TFL against Miami. Both sacks came on third down, including a pivotal stop in the first quarter, a 10-yard •

loss that ended with a missed 51-yard field goal.

- DeLoach's 10 tackles were a career high and the first double-digit tackle game for a Seminole this season. His 2.0 sacks were also a career-best, and it was the 4th time a Seminole had multiple sacks this season (Jared Verse vs. Virginia Tech and Wake Forest; Patrick Payton at Wake Forest). .
- DeLoach passed 200 career tackles in the game and enters the North Alabama game with 203.
- DeLoach has at least 0.5 TFL in nine of 10 games this year.




