# DICK KENDALL PACES INDIANS

### Indiana Boy Pours In 21 Points

The Florida State University Seminoles rode the unerring aim of Dick Kendall's sharpshooting to resity in an unexciting unextra-ordinary Dixte conference case tilt witnessed by an estimated crowd of 1,070 fans in the West Campus gym last night.

Kendall, a husky football flankman from Shelbythie Ind. ap-pearing in a substitutes role pro-vided most of the limited thrills and action as he poured 10 field goals and a foul toss through the net to dominate the Indian of-

Swinging into action midway in the first half Kendall clicked with his first three shots from the with his first three shots from the field before missing a long one from near center rourt. And his late spurt gave the Indians a 19-14 edge at halftime.

### Hatters Take Lead

Coach Ben Ciemons Hatters, fairly docile throughout the sluggish first half, roared out after intermission and shot into a 24-20 lead. But Kendall hit another hot hand at that point, and again, slipped in three double deckers before missing to tie the count at 26-all.

From that point Coach Bud Kennedy's caners pulled steadily away as Rendali aided by Bill Weigle and Tom McLaughiln. offted through the Hatter defense

offeet through the Hatter offense to pile up the victory margin.

The victory was FSU's fifth of the season against three defeats, and it was their fourth loop tri-umph of the year against only one loss. It also marked the Seminoles seventh straight win on their hothe court in a string that dates back to the final three games of the 1947-48 season.

All of PSU's losses this year were absorbed on a three-day Christ-mas tour through Tennessee. Both quinters showed the effect
