

SPARTAN LOSS FIRST IN LOOP

FSU Goes On Road To Mississippi

The Florida State University Seminoles snatched a 60-58 upset victory over the highly-favored Tampa University Spartans in the West Campus gym last night as Bill Weigle tipped in the winning goal in the final five-seconds of a see-saw thriller that kept an overflow crowd of 1,100 in a constant uproar.

Weigle's winning counter, which came after a teammate missed an angle shot from side-court, provided a fitting climax for both the Seminoles and the bespectacled Indiana boy.

The Seminoles, who have soaked up several surprising setbacks of late after getting away to a run-

ning start this season, outran and out-fought their favored foe to hand them their first loss in Dixie conference cage play this season.

After Weigle's winning bucket the Spartans made one last desperate try to tie the count with a long one from mid-court, but it fell short, and the game ended with Dick Kendall in possession of the leather under the Spartan goal.

Last night's tilt was a sharp contrast to earlier season games on the same court which were marred by dull listless play.

Both teams, finely conditioned, matched fire-wagon tactics in a battle for the lead that changed hands eight times and was tied on 11 occasions.

Feeling, which mounted as the lead juggled back and forth, finally reached its peak in the last two minutes when FSU's Ronnie Nettles and Tampa's Mac Williams were elected for exchanging harness blows.

Two men, Avron Bryan of Tampa and Kendall of the Seminoles, dominated the scoring, but practically every man on both lineups contributed at least one sparkling shot.

Bryan, who has been outshone by his brother Harry and Williams to date, was a ball of fire last night.

He threw in every kind of legitimate shot known, from practically every possible angle as he con-

stantly slipped away from his defenders to pour in 12 field goals and a pair of foul shots.

It was A Bryan who accounted for the four points that hauled Tampa up from a 54-58 deficit to a tie. And his performance marked the greatest one-man scoring show on the local court this season.

Kendall, the husky footballer who got hot in the opener against Stetson to give FSU a 49-40 victory, fell one shy of the 21 points he compiled against the Hatters. But he was a far better all-around man last night.

He combined with Tom McLaughlin to give the Seminoles their share of the rebounds, and he passed as accurately as he shot to set up numerous scoring sallies by his teammates.

It was Kendall too, who covered Williams, the ace Spartan gunner, and held him to nine points. Six of which came from outside when the tall Tampan hit set shots.

The first half was a real scramble as first one team then the other grabbed the lead.

FSU held the upper hand at halftime 31-29.

Tampa twice took the lead in the hectic second half 43-43 and 52-51, but they couldn't make it stand.

FSU also won the preliminary volleyball games 16-2, 15-0.

At halftime 29 Seminole grid-ers were awarded gold footballs in honor of their Dixie conference title.
