

# FSU Rallies to Rout Millsaps 62-45, Plays Stetson Saturday

Florida State University's Seminoles, who rallied in the second half to rout Millsaps 62-45 last night for their sixth consecutive victory on their home floor, will test their charm of success in the West Campus gym again Saturday night when they play the Stetson

Hatters at 8.

Coach Bud Kennedy's Indians, who reached the 500 mark for the season with their victory over the Majors, will be gunning for their eighth win of the campaign against Coach Bob Trocolor's DeLand quintet.

Stetson dumped the Southern Moos 59-50 early this week for their third win in nine starts. They are led by rangy Jim Taverniere, high-scoring center, and forward Fred Wilmer, sharpshooting forward.

**Jekyll and Hyde**

FSU's fifth Dixie conference win of the year was registered over the Majors last night with a Jekyll and Hyde performance.

Over-confident, impotent and inaccurate during the first 20 minutes of play, the Seminoles trailed 25-16 at the halftime as the smaller, speedier Major cagers outran, outpassed and outscored the heavily favored Indian five.

Kennedy, however, had found the solution to his problems late in the first half when he yanked all his regulars but big Tom McLaughlin and fielded a combine composed of hustling reserves—and the switch paid off.

The reserves, who had reduced Millsaps' 25-11 margin to a 25-16 deficit by halftime, really began to sizzle after the intermission.

Led by McLaughlin, who hit three quick double-deckers from the field and throwing a defensive blanket around the Majors which held them scoreless through the first five minutes of the second half, the Indians pulled up to a 24-23 deficit before Millsaps could rip the nets.

### Tide Had Turned

Harry Woods, a fine player all right for Millsaps, hit a field goal and a foul shot to give the Majors a 28-24 margin, but by that time the tide had definitely turned and the Majors were on the run.

PSU tide the count at 28-28 with 14 minutes to go on another one of McLaughlin's two-pointers, and from there on out the Indians turned the tilt into a shambles as they ran Millsaps into the floor.

McLaughlin, enjoying one of his best nights at the Seminole school, poured 22 points through the cords to dominate the scoring. Six of the big center's markers came in the first half when PSU was hurting for every point that it could eke out, and the remaining 16 sparked the terrific second half drive which saw the Indians slam 46 points through the hoop.

### Hewitt Sparked

Ted Hewitt, speedy grid star, was another big factor in the Seminoles rally. The all-around Detroit athlete hit three times from the field and three times from the foul line for nine points, and played an extremely good floor game, stealing the ball from the Majors and upsetting them with his forays.

Woods, whose two field goals and four foul shots gave Millsaps an early 10-3 lead, topped his mates with 14 points. Forward Peyton Weems was right behind him with 13.

Dick Trobaugh, Ronnie Nettles, Whitey Wyman and Larry Dickson scored only sparingly, but they were the boys who took the play away from the Majors after the halftime.
