Florida State's basketball Seminoles made with the manpower—and willpower—in the closing moments here Monday night to score a hair-raising 85-75 victory over Loyola of New Orleans.

It was the 18th straight home triumph for the Seminoles and gave them a measure of revenge

since the Wolfpack was the last team to beat them here, administering the Tribe an 30-76 setback in January of 1954.

WOLD AND GREGORY

Center Gary Wold, coming off the bench after collecting three early fouls, and junior Stu Gregory paced the winning surge for the Seminoles in the closing battie of nerves. The loss sent the Wolfpack down to their eighth defeat against seven wins. The Tribe has now won 10 of 17 contests.

The winners overtook Loyola's brief 6-4 lead after four minutes Monday night and led from then on; although the Wolfpack's Dick Vavrick and Charles Gallman made the \$00 partisan spectators uneasy in the final quarter when they squeezed the PSU margin to three points on more than one occasion.

But then Wold and Gregory proved to be the Tribe's salvation and Loyola's undoing, sparking a minute and a half of fast break with which the Wolfpack could not cope.

LAST HALF SURGE

FSU's prize guard, Jim Oler, continued his assault upon the record books. Held to two points in the first ten minutes, Oler made up for lost time in the second and third periods and paced the game's scorers with 29 points. Vavrick got 21 for the losers.

Seminole coach Bud Kennedy used only six men in achieving the 10-point margin. Florida State led at the half, 42-34.
