

It was the second straight triumph for Coach Bud Kennedy's Seminoles and left Murray with a 1-1 mark for the season.

Durham, who led the Seminoles in scoring with 509 points last year, tallied only 10 points in FSU's opening game win over Tennessee Tech last Monday and observers were speculating that he had lost his touch.

The fiery 5-11 guard from Louisville, Ky., took over for the Seminoles last night however.

"Hugh has reached the point where he is playing his best," Kennedy observed. "His leadership was certainly felt out there tonight."

Kennedy also praised center Dan Boltz and forward Larry Strom for their work on the backboards and called the victory "a balanced effort."

Tabbed a 14-point underdog in some quarters at game time, the Seminoles gained the edge from the outset and stormed to a 22-9 lead in the first 10 minutes.

By halftime, they had built up

their margin to 39-18, mainly on the strength of accurate foul shooting on their part and poor marksmanship by the visitors.

The Seminoles dropped 13 of 16 free throw attempts in the first half while Murray hit four of 12 and only .214 per cent of its field goal attempts.

The second half turned into a wild and wooly affair in the early moments when FSU's Boltz and Murray's Gerald Tabors got into a brief fist fight at midcourt.

By this time, the contest was out of Murray's reach. Despite the fact that three Seminoles fouled out the visitors could never get any closer than 18 points.

Boltz, forward Burt Deckel and Strom all left via the foul route for the Seminoles and guard Bryl Willmore fouled out for the visitors.

Behind Durham in Seminole scoring were Deckel with 16, guard Jim Liteky with 14 and Strom with 13. Center Gullman Sullins, 6-9 senior, led Murray with 13 points.

The Seminoles surpassed their opponents in both shooting departments, hitting 27 of 70 from the field for .386 and 30 of 37 from the charity line for an .811 showing.

Murray hit only 23 of 72 tries afield for .319 and 14 of 27 from the free throw line to compile a .519 mark.

Both teams grabbed 56 rebounds with Sullins leading individually with 16. Deckel had 13 and Durham and Strom 11 for the Seminoles.

Monday night, the Seminoles seek their third straight win of the season in their first road game. They meet the University of Tennessee at Knoxville, then travel to Gainesville Wednesday to face Florida.

Charley Tinsley scored 23 points to lead Florida State's freshman cagers to an 82-44 opening game triumph over Norman (Ga.) College last night.

With Tinsley, a 6-5 forward from Miami, and Bill Archer, 6-4 center from Melbourne, leading the way, the Baby Seminoles raced to a 42-25 halftime edge over the Bears, and were never threatened.

Three men scored 12 points apiece to head the losers. Forward Pan Brown, guards Norman Disbro and Jim Anthony led Norman in scoring.

It was the 10th loss in 11 games for Norman. The Baby Seminoles' next opponent will be the University of Florida freshmen, the game scheduled this Wednesday in Gainesville.
