WINSTON-SALEM, N. C.—Wake Forest cashed in 31 of 39 free throw attempts here last night to defeat Florida State University Seminoles, 73-64.

The Seminoles, though outscoring their opponents from the field 23 goals to 21, could not keep from fouling, and hence the margin of victory.

Guard Don Bates and center Dan Boltz left the game via personals late in the contest as the FSU cagers committed 27 personal fouls to Wake Forest's 16.

Bates scored 20 points before his exit to lead the Seminoles scoring with seven field goals and as many free throws.

Captain Hugh Durham scored 17 points for the Seminoles.

Guard Don Ritchie was the hottest Deacon with eight fielders and seven foul shots for 23 points.

Florida State led by two points with nine minutes left after trailing at halftime, 36-25, but a profusion of fouling and the loss of the two starters hurt the Seminoles in the game's final stages.

The game was delayed an hour by a power shortage, and as a result both teams were cold at the outset.

The loss gives FSU a 2-2 record going into tomorrow night's contest with the University of Florida.

For the first time in Florida State history, the Gators are coming to Tallahassee for the contest. The games between these two teams have annually produced some of the most scintillating basketball in the state.

In the last two meetings, 1956 and 1957, the Gators have won by a margin of two and one points respectively.

Florida Coach John Mauer, one of the "deans" in the basketball coaching world, has instituted many angles into this year's attack in order to compensate for lack of height.

The Gators, this season, have used the fast break as the rule rather than the exception. Mauer has also followed the football example of Orange and Blue units which divide the game time equally.

The Orange unit, which usually starts the game, is composed of two seniors, two juniors and one sophomore. Providing the experience in the Orange team lineup are the two seniors and co-captains Charley Pike (6-1) and Dick Hoban (6-3).

Tom Simpson, a quick junior college transfer from Goldwater, Miss., has shown himself to be a real ballhawk in Florida's first three games this season. The other junior in the Gator starting five is Bob Sherwood, a 6-5 center, who has been scoring high for Florida this year.

The lone sophomore on the Orange unit is forward Bob Shiver (6-2), who was an outstanding freshman performer last season.

The Blue squad is made up of four sophomores and a junior. The junior is forward Walt Rabhan (6-3). Frank Ethridge (6-2), Paul Morney (5-10), George Jung (5-7) and Lou Marchant (6-0) include the sophomores on the Blue unit.
