

MIAMI—Miami's red hot basketball team took advantage of numerous free throw opportunities and fought off a closing rally by Florida State to defeat the Seminoles, 92-85, here last night.

A crowd of 25,028, the largest to see the Hurricanes play this season, viewed the contest which was never sewed up until the closing seconds.

The Seminole five was forced to overcome a 13 point halftime deficit to make the game as close as it was.

Captain Hugh Durham closed out his career by going over the 500 point mark for the second time. Durham scored 23 points last night to jump his season's total to 504, and his career total to 1,395.

Durham broke the 500 point mark with a field goal late in the second half.

Also closing out careers were seniors Jim Liteky, Dan Boliz, Joe Williams, and Fred Woodward.

Liteky helped pace a last half comeback by the Seminoles, and scored a total of 17 points.

BATES SCORES

Don Bates was second high to Durham with 22 points, hitting nine of his 11 field goals in the second half.

For Miami the rebounding and scoring of Harry Manushaw was a decisive factor.

Manushaw pulled down 21 of the Canes' 60 rebounds and shared scoring honors with Jerry Gardner with 23 points.

The scoring was nip and tuck for the first few minutes until Miami went ahead on Norm Nebel's field goal, 21-19.

Nebel scored 14 points in the first half to pace the Cane surge.

The Seminoles treasured constantly throughout the later stages of the contest.

FSU SURGES

Fighting back from the halftime disadvantage, Durham pulled it to within seven points with seven minutes left. Then baskets by Liteky and Durham closed 78-75.

However, Nebel and Manushaw collaborated to put Miami safely back in the lead.

With the score 84-78, the Seminoles came up again with baskets by Bates and Williams, pulling up to 85-81, but again Miami

shaw and Nebel got hot and pulled the Canes out of reach.

FSU lost four men by fouls, which hurt the Seminole attack considerably. At the end of the game the bench was cleared of eligible players.

Boltz was the first to go, leaving with 17 minutes left to play and followed almost immediately by Charlie Tusley.

With 4:45 Jim Savage was ejected, and Bates was forced to retire during the last 20 seconds.

The victory climaxed Miami's most successful season in the school's history. The Hurricanes won 18 this season and dropped only five.
