The Seminoles pulled within 11 points with 7:06 left but late fools helped Vandy pad its final margin to 20 points, biggest of the game.

FEDOR TOPS

Dave Fedor. FSU's reliable junior forward, sparked the Seminoles in scoring and rebounding for the second straight game. Fedor meshed 18 points, 14 in the first half, and finished with 14 rebounds.

Sophomore guard Dale Ricketts
bagged 13 points, a season's high
for him, and center Ray Swain
added 10 points. Guard Bill Cotton, who flipped in 15 vital points
against Kentucky, was blanked

from the floor and closed with two points on free throws.

John Russell, a six-foot sophomore guard, tossed in 22 points; for the victors, mostly on fastbreak layups. Three other Commodores — guard Bobby Bland (16), center Bill Depp (16), and forward Larry Banks (12) — hit double figures:

Depp. a 6-7 senior, and Banks, a 6-6 senior, teamed to control the rebounds under the Seminole basket. Forced after the early going to rush their shots from far out, the Seminoles more often than not got only one shot at their basket.

FSU hit nine of 18 first-half shots but finished with 18 of 49 for

a season-low percentage of 36.7. Vanderbilt canned 25 of 61 shots (41.0 per cent) and had a 46-41 edge in rebounds.

DAVIS HURT

There were 43 personal fouls called, 23 against FSU. Seminole junior guard Jack Davis was struck in the forehead by an elbow of Vandy's Bob Scott with 51 seconds left. Four stitches were required to close the cut.

Vanderbilt, with six veteran players and promising sophomores up from a freshman team that won 13 of 14 games last season, had dumped Michigan, 58-43, last Friday. The defense-conscious Commodores had scouted FSU's victory over Kentucky with two assistant coaches and were well prepared for the Seminoles' new offense.

FSU; which returned to Tallahassee today, next must go against the SEC's defending champion, Auburn. The Eeminoles meet the Plainsmen in Auburn Saturday night.

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
