Daniels was checked with 13 ir points by the slick defensive play in of Swain. But Dick Jones, The Citadel's senior guard and captain, fired in 29 points, hitting 13 ci of 18 shots from the field. Jones was deadly from 20-25 feet out. With a steady rain outside Tully Gym, the Seminoles were ice cold inside in the early stages. The Citadel shot into an 8-1 lead before Ashworth's jumper gave FSU its first field goal with nearly five minutes gone.

The Seminole rally started early in the second half. Outscoring the Bulldogs, 23-12, in the first seven minutes, FSU finally pulled ahead when Coogle slipped loose for a two-pointer.

By contrast, the Seminoles managed only 38.1 per cent of its 84 shots from the field. But after making only four foul shots in the first half, the Tribe zeroed in for 15 free throws and 18 field goals after intermission.

Daniels ran afoul of the offi-3 cials in the first half, when Pace 5 called two technicals on the highscoring junior for disagreeing too Ŀ strongly on calls. Guard Jerry Buchanan drew the first of three e (lightning fast technicals in the 5. İ 1 final minute. eł Daniels got the next one and was sent to the bench, and the final technical was called against The Citadel's bench. According to Bill Stewart, pub-1 licity director of The Citadel. the team had not had a technical foul called on it in five years.

The Seminoles go after a 10th victory in a game with Valdosta (Ga.) State here Saturday night.
