Seminoles clouted Georgia, 101-69. He had scored in double figures for his 72nd consecutive game—every one FSU had played since the 6-6 Zephryhills boy gained starting status his first time out as a sophomore. He had run his 3 - season points total to 1,453, his average points per game to 20.2

Tribe's Ray Swain took a hasty pass from teammates deperately feeding the ball to him and banged in two points. That gave him an even 1,000 for his three years.

Swain, a 6-4 sparkler from Jacksonville, reigns as the most efficient field - goal shooter in FSU record books. He has made more than half of all the field goals he attempted in three seasons.

His last field goal gave him 31 points against Georgia, and Immediately Coach Bud Kennedy beckoned him to the bench. There was another standing ovation.

Big ovations were also given three other FSU seniors playing their last — Jack Davis, Rufus Ashworth, Tim Edney.

Girl friends, wives, parents were on hand to share the spotlight with the five seniors in pregame introductions, and to help give them a big sendoff. It was a fine night, marred only slightly by officiating that almost let things get out of hand a time or two. Georgia made a brisk contest of it in the early going but the Bulldogs were clearly no match for a hot team that sank 55.7 per cent of its field-goal tries in winning its second of the season from Georgia, pushing an all-time lead in the series to 12-to-6.

LIKELY NO. 1

The effort raised FSU's season shooting percentage to 51.2, a figure that will almost certainly gain them No. 1 national rank in this department, over Ohio State. Latest released of the NCAA showed Ohio State with a percentage of 50.7.

It was the seventh straight victory for the Seminoles, their 15th victory in 23 starts. Georgia, which closes tonight with Florida in Gainesville, lost its 15th in 23 games.

shooting from 5-10 guard Allan Johnson, who repeatedly sank set shots from the corner and totalled 34 points. Sinking 60 per cent of his tries, Johnson earlier this week had been selected to the All-SEC second team.

the Seminoles outscored Georgia, 10,0, in one stretch for a 60-44 lead that virtually wrapped things up.

With reserves finishing up, the crowd hollered for 100 points. Dale Reeves snak a fielder with five seconds left, and the Tribe had the 100.

The Seminoles with all five seniors starting and continuing as a unit for the first 12½ minutes, out-rebounded Georgia, 39 to 32, and had their best night from the free-throw line, hitting 23 of 25.

Junior Charley Long, a starter normally, came off the bench and bagged 12 points. Davis got 12 and ran his 3-year total to an even 500. Dale Ricketts, sidelined in recent games because of illness, hit five of five field-goal gries, had 11 points.

FINE SEASON

That final record of 15-8 provided FSU with its best basketball season, from a standpoint of accomplishment with a tough schedule. But it wasn't the school's best won-lost records. FSU finished in '56 with a 16-9 record, had a 22-4 chart at the end of '55.

In a preliminary FSU freshmen lost, 69-63, their second setback of the season at the hands of the Albany (Ga.) Marines, a tem that included former FSU varsity star Burt Deckel in its ranks. The freshmen, who twice beat Florida, closed with a 13-3 record.

The Marines, who have a 46-4 record, finished the game with only four players after three players fouled out. Jerry Shirley with 19 points, led FSU frosh.

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
