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MIAMI - Big Rick Barry tipped in a field goal with two seconds remaining in the game to boost Miami's basketball Hurricanes to an 82-80 triumph. over Florida State Saturday night and keep alive hopes for a bid to the N.I.T. Before Barry's basket, the tonsy-turyy game had seen the score tied 16 times and the lead switch hands 29 times. The victory avenged an earlier Miami defeat at the Seminoles' hands in an '80-78 game at Tallahassee. The Hurricanses, coached by Bruce Hale, finished their reg-1 ular season with a 20-6 record. It's the fifth straight year that it a Miami basketball team bas won 20 or more games. Florida State, 11-13 overall, couldn't break its away-fromhome jinx. FSU has won only once away from Tully Gymnasium this season, while dropping 12. ers. The Seminoles close out their season next Tuesday night at Athens, Ga., against the University of Georgia. Miami held a 40-36 command at halftime, but a rapid Tribe comeback turned the tables.

Sparked by team - captain) Pete Rogers, the Seminoles raced to an eight point lead with 6:30 left. The Hurricanes narrowed the gap to 71-70 with four minutes to go. -The-game's score thon-was tied at 74, 76, 78 and 80, before Barry tipped in a field goal shot that teammate Bernie Butts missed. --The. 82 points gave the Hurricanes a 96.2 average for the season, bettering the old season record of 95.9 established by Morehead College of Ken tucky in 1956. Barry, who ripped the nets for 35 points, set several records. Despite being a junior, he broke Miami's season records in individual field goal and free throw scoring and rebounds. Barry's 35 points kept him in the top 10 scorers in the nation. He also snared 16 rebounds. maintaining his spot in the nation's first 10 collegiate play-Florida State got double-digit performances from four men-Rogers, 24, Pete Gonzalez, 14, Gary Schull, 19, and Bobby Lovell, 11.
