A pair of able junior forwards -Harry Hammonds and Gene Schumacher -- led a secondbalf - Alabama spurt that brought the Tide from behind. Hammonds was the game's high-scorer, with all but one of his 23-point total from the floor. Schumacher, most of whose baskets came at crucial moments, complemented his position-mate with 21 markers and was the winners' big man under the backboard, grabbing 10 rebounds. Coach Bud Kennedy's Semi-

noles presented their usual balanced scoring attack with four players in double figures.

Forward Jerry Shirley, who calls Mobile. Ala., home, kept FSU in contention most of the game. His 17 points were high for the Tribe. Center Gary Schull followed with 16, while spunky guard Pete Gonzalez contributed 14 and guard Bill Peacock 12. Only other Seminole to find the scoring column was forward Ron Malmen, who got seven.

Alabama was successful on 61 ⁿ per cent of its shots from the ^s floor, while FSU connected on ^p only 40 per cent. The situation ^o was reversed in free throws, ^a with the Seminoles shooting ac-^c curately 80 per cent of the time, ² the Tide 70.

d FSU was the better in the rebounding department 38-28, with Schull's 10 and Shirley's nine tops.

s Now 11-7, the Tribe goes to 1 neutral Baltimore Thursday to r meet much-respected Duquense. t Its triumph improved the Tide's 3 record to 12-5.

FSU had gone into the game as the nation's 20th best team defensively, and clearly played the better brand of ball in the first half. Alabiama's, capable center, Bob Andrews, who was sporting a 17-point average, picked up two personal fouls in the first minute and set most of the game out. Re-entering the action midway the second half, Andrews scored all of his 12point total in the final furious minutes. The lead switched hands twice soon after the opening tipoff but FSU went to the front for a lengthy spread on a 30foot jumper by Gonzalez that made it 5-4 with only two minutes gone.

With Shirley and Schull providing the impetus, the Seminoles gained their largest margin of the evening, when, with four minutes left in the period, Gonzalez rebounded his own shot, fired the ball to Shirley who pushed it in from under the basket-to-make it 31-23.

Field goals by Schumacher, forward Bambi Howland and Hammond closed the gap to 32-29 with 3:18 to go.

The Seminoles tried to stall things there, but center Bill Phillips fouled Hammonds with less than 30 seconds to go. Shaken up, Hammonds was replaced at the foul line by Reese Carr who shot true on his first try but missed on the second, putting the score at 32-30 where it remained until the buzzer.

An arching jumper by forward Charlie Perry-broughtthings to a 32-32 boil with 19:20 remaining in the game. Alabama was never behind again.

It was neck-and-neck, then, with the score knotted four times before, another basket by Perry and two by Schumacher pushed the Tide up front 46-40.

Seminole shooting suddenly went stone-cold from the floor, and Malmen's lone charity toss was the only addition to the FSU total while Alabama, ignited by Scumacher and the just-returned Andrews, extended its lead to 52-41 with 9:07 left. With the clock reading 4:31 and the visitors ahead by 62-51, the now - desperate Seminoles took the offensive with an effort to pull it out.

Schull started it with a layup, and things began to look up for the Tribe when Malmen intercepted a pass, then threw to Gonzalez for a layup. Andrews fouled him on that shot, and Gonzalez added a free throw to bring the Seminoles within distance at 62-58.

The action under the basket reached a peak then, and Schumacher fouled Gonzalez with 2:57 to go. The 6-1 guard got his first on a one-and-one sittion, but shot high on the second and it was 62-59.

Field goals by Schumacher and Peacock upped it to 64-61,

before Riley's Alabamans proved they had it in the stretch by quickly mounting a safe margin again.

Two charity points by slight guard Kenr Moses signaled the start of 'Bama's spurt and Schumacher and Hammond each tossed in two-pointers to propel their team into a 71-62 command with 1:06 to go.

Long jumpers by Peacock and another Gonzalez free throw whittled the gap down to 73-66 with the clock showing 0:37.

Soon after, sub guard Brian Murphy fouled Andrews, and the 6-6 center's two free throws were the last points of the game.
