GAINESVILLE — Florida's giants, neither jolly nor green, lured Florida State into a valley of sorrow here last night, and lumbered away with a 75-62 basketball victory.

The muscular maneuvering of Gary Keller and Jeff Ramsey was the big, big difference in a wild contest marred by ragged floor play and hot tempers.

Keller, 6-9, scored 21 points and pulled down 16 rebounds. Ramsey, 6-10, put 19 points on the board and settled for eight recoveries and a noteworthy defensive effort which effectively kept FSU's offense at bay throughout most of the game.

However, the Seminoles put themselves out of the game in the last ten minutes of the first half with appalling floor

errors which gave the Gators a 37-23 intermission bulge. The score was tied 13-13 with 9:32 left when the Tribe hit its coldest spell in many a season.

Jim Lytle got a pair of foul shots with 5:37 on the clock, but the Seminoles were unable to score a field goal until Bill Phillips hooked one in at 4:03. By this time Florida had built an 11-point lead.

Traveling violations, bad passes, and fouls came in droves, as 22 of Florida's first 28 points followed FSU errors. Florida State took only 21 shots from the floor in the first half, hit only seven.

The Seminoles came back strong in the second half and outscored Florida 39-38, remaining within striking dis-

tance until the last four minutes when the Gators showed their strength and pulled away to the final margin.

The action was rough in the second half as the Seminoles pressed desperately to gain an advantage. Lytle was forced to leave the game with a cut under his left eye with 8:11 remaining, but later returned. Blood was streaming down Charlie Fairchild's face from a similar cut during the final minutes.

Florida State could muster only 16 field goals the entire night, but had a hot time at the foul line, hitting 30 of 34 attempts for a blistering .909 percentage.

Lytle led a balanced Florida State scoring attack, with 14 points. Darrel Stewart had

Florida outrebounded FSU 44-28 with Keller and Ramsey doing most of the damage under the offensive boards. Florida was able to get a floor shot and several taps at the basket each time it brought the ball down. Except for free throws, none of the two big Gators' shots traveled over six feet.

A hot-shooting sophomore named David Miller added 13 points to Florida's total on six of eight shots from the field, and veteran Paul Morton hit double figures with 11.
