"Stewart was the man that Wagner was on, and he got in there for those quick sair,"

Sophomore Stewart got only nine points, but none were bigger than those six.

At the start of the game. Tech went almost five minutes with just one field goal while FSU worked a 7-3 lead as Jim Lyttle hit four early points.

About this time FSU's big man, Gary Schull, left the floor with a bleeding cut on his cheekbone. He was out of action for about six minutes. shattering a chance, thought many in the crowd of 3300. for a more expansive FSU lead.

When he returned Tech was ahead 11-9. Mainly on a hot. streak by 6-1 Pete Thorne, who iswiped the ball three times in three minutes, with two points coming after each theft, Tech jumped to its biggest lead of the night, 15-9.

ter by Bill Pescock, ter for the Seminoles 16 points, coupled with Ron Malmen's lay-up on the fast break brought FSU to an 18-18 tie with 7:47 left in the

"Malmen did a big job for us last night," said Kennedy, "starting his first game after being out with that dislocated elbow. I was pleased with the way he got in the thick of things and came up with eight rebounds."

After Malmen's shot; ne more than two points separated the two independent rivals until intermission.

With the clock showing 1:04 until the half Bill Glenn struck on a 3-point play that put FSU shead 34-32. But Tech got Stan Guth loose for two points under the basket, and worked an out-of-bounds play that culminated with a lay-up by Pres Judy that made it 36-34.

Judy, a 6-3 guard, was top scorer for the night with 18 points.

At this midway point Tech's shorter troops had dominated the boards in surprising manner, grabbing 19 rebounds to a mere eight for FSU. The Seminoles railied sharply on the boards in the last half, cut Tech's final edge to 34-33, as Schull bagged a game-high 14 re-

bounds, 10 in the closing half.

After Stewart brought FSU's 40-36 lead, Tech tied it 42-42 before two points by Malmen, three by Peacock, two by Schull gave FSU its biggest lead, 48-42.

Peacock's pot shots from the outside—he had 11 of his 16 points in the last half—figured prominently in the next few minutes as Tech charged back, again gaining a tie, 54-54, as Pete Caldwell and Judy spurred the push.

It was 60-60 with 5:10 left when Caldwell, in a 1-and-1 situation, missed at the foul line, with Schull nabbing the rebound and soon adding two points on free throws,

But Wagner's two free ones knotted it 62-62 at 3:32.

Then Lyttle, a bright quarterback all evening, drove in for a lay-up that provided a brief 64-62 lead. Charging was called on the shot and Tech's Boogle Hill tied it 64-64 at the foul line.

Schull retainated with a layup for 66-64 and Judy matched It, making it 66-66 at 2:30. And Tech had its last point.

Maimen put FSU ahead for good 67-66 on a free shot at 2:15. Tech, for more than a minute, sought an opening, and finally Judy fired from the corner with 43 seconds left, missed. Malmen came up with the game's most important rebound.

With 16 seconds left. Wagner committed his fifth foul, on Lyttle, who made it 68-66 swiftly toward the basket, with Caldwell driving, then passing off—as he was socked with an offensive foul.

Lyttle added two more free throws, and it was in the bag 70-66 with 10 seconds remaining. Peacock added another at the foul line in the last moments after a Tech man stepped out of bounds as the Jackets tried to get the ball in.

The Seminoles take a 10-7 record on the road this week-end, facing Memphis State on Saturday, Loyola of New Orleans on Monday, Tech is now 9-8.

FSU had one of its more efficient nights putting the ball through the hoop, hitting 56 per cent, on 25 of 45, from the field and 84 per cent, on 21 of 25, at the foul line. Tech was 40 per cent from the field, 73 per cent on free throws.

Lyttle and Schull trailed Peacock in FSU scoring with 15 points each. Wagner got 14 for Tech, followed by Cald-, well and Thorne with 10 each.

In a preliminary, Ian Morrison fired a playbook perlect pass to Russ Forkey for a layup off the fast break with five seconds left to give the FSU redshirts a 78-77 victory over the Seminole freshmen.

Morrison, a transfer from North Carolina where be started as a sophomore last season, scored 20 points to lead the redshirts Jeff Hogan got in 23 for the frosh.
