MIAMI — Miami's red-hot shooting Hurricanes jump ed on Florida State for a 59-35 halftime advantage, then went on to win 112-90 has t night in Convention Hall.

The loss was FSU's 11th against 14th victories, Miami, playing an agg. essive, running game; was bent on avenging, an earlier 78-62 loss to FSU.

Displaying an almost flawless brand of ball, the flur-

ricanes spotted FSU a 2-0 lead on a foul - line jumper by Gary Schull, then 'quicky sported to an 8-2 advantage.

The Seminoles rallied to within three, but that was as close as they got.

Key to the Harricanes' firsthalf success was their torrid shooting from the outside, plus vigorous rebounding. At intemission Miami held a 32-to-11, advantage in rebounds.

A big portion of Miami's success on the boards was due to the excellent screening job Hurricane senior Stu Marcus did on Schull.

Playing one of the finest games in his career, Mareus kept Schull well in check and scored 18 points himself before fouring out midway the second, half, Schull managed only five rebounds in the first half.

Also contributing to the Hurricanes' drive was fine playmaking by guards Junior Gee and Rick Jones. The two scored 17 and 18 points, and hounded the Seminoles, causing numerous floor mistakes.

In the second half FSU played on equal footing, but could not overcome the broad lead Miami built earlier.

Miami, indeed, continued to fatten that lead early in the latter half. At one point the Hurricanes had a 35-points advantage.

FSU fought back to whittle the lead to a final 22 points.

The difference, reflected in statistics;—show—FSU—hitting—only 32 of 81 floor shots for 39 per cent and Miami 46 of 93 for 49 per cent. Rebounding was a big item, with Miami holding a final 72-43 advantage.

Miami is now 14-11.

Schull and Miami's Mike. Wittman shared scoring honors with 26 points, and Schull topped the Tribe with 18 rebounds. Lyttle followed Schull with 15 points. Sub guard Brian Murphy of FSU had his best night, getting 12 points, 10 in the second half after both Lyttle and Darrel Stewart got in foul trouble.

The loss climaxed a bad season on the road for FSU. The Seminoles won only two of the 12 played away from home

FSU closes the season Saturday night at home against Georgia.

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
