

With a difficult, scrambling basketball season out of the way, Florida State looks with some anticipation to the next one.

The Seminoles of Coach Hugh Durham finished with an 11-15 record, but the freshmen team posted a best-ever record, winning 17 of 19.

Bill Glenn, 6-4 Tallahassee junior, was Florida State's leading varsity scorer. An honor student majoring in English, he hit 390 points for an average of 15.6, though hampered in the last three games when a knee injury slowed him to almost half speed.

Just 18 points behind was sophomore Jeff Hogan, six-foot jump shooter from Akron, Ohio. He opened the year as a backup performer, but began starting when Lenny Hall was injured. Hogan wound up with a 14.3 average.

Junior Jan Morrison was third in the scoring column with 296 points and a 11.4 average. His 32 against Tampa in the final road swing was a season high.

Steady Darrel Stewart, junior from Seelyville, Ind., was fourth with a 10.7 average, followed by center Dick Danford at 9.0.

Danford beat out Glenn for the rebound leadership, 197-184. Danford turned in the top field-goal percentage mark with 92 buckets in 182 attempts for a 50.5 figure. Hogan's 49 per cent was next.

Florida State's opponents outscored the Seminoles by an average of 74.5 to 71, and out-rebounded the Indians by a total of 1,200 to 1,037.

Durham's outfit hit the century mark twice, downing Tampa 109-72 and Tulane 100-90.

The freshmen, who were tutored by Dennis Clifford, com-

bined an abundance of height, speed and shooting accuracy to average almost 93 points a game, while limiting the opposition to 79.

Six times during the season, the freshmen scored over 100, including a record shattering 133 against North Florida J. C., and 128 against Florida.

While the run-and-shoot offense was the club's forte the Seminole yearlings showed strong defensive ability, especially late in the season when they began meeting with the slowdown game.

"The biggest mark of our club though," noted Clifford, "was its desire. Our boys never gave up out there, and they played for the team. If one man wasn't hitting he wasn't afraid to pass off. It would be hard to choose one who stood out above the rest."

Hot-shooting forward Larry Moore, a former service AAU all-star from South Bend, Ind., was the club's leading scorer

A steady all-around player all season, it was not until the last few games that Gies really came into his own. He scored 41 points in his last two to lift his average to 10.8. He was also the club's second-leading rebounder, pulling in just over 10 per game.

"The nice thing about next year," said Durham, "is that we're going to have this winning attitude from this good freshmen team that will provide a lot of varsity competition. Combine this with the drive and hustle we had on the varsity this season, and things should be interesting."

Durham discounted rumors that one or two star freshmen might drop out of school.

"Might have been something to the rumor back in November," he said, "One or two of our freshmen were homesick. This is a natural thing. If they come from a good home they're pretty bound to get homesick. I know I was when I first enrolled here."

with 25 points per game. He hit an all-time Florida State high of 44 against Gulf Coast J. C.

Meanwhile, 6-7 center Dave Cowens, from Newport, Ky., was pulling in rebounds at the rate of 20 a game and averaging 14.4 points per.

Randy Cable was the team's most accurate all-around shooter. He averaged 52 per cent of his field shots, and 85.6 per cent from the free-throw line while contributing 20 points per game.

The Massillon, Ohio native had to settle for second place with his freethrow percentage, however, as fellow guard Carl Reynolds edged him out with 86-per cent. Reynolds, who is from Fairborn, Ohio, averaged 10.8 points a game, was credited with nearly as many assists as shots taken each game.

Jan. Gies, from Pompano Beach, was the only Florida player on the starting team. The 6-4 forward was tabbed the team's most improved ballplayer by Clifford.
