


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## Seminoles Win 94-84, Then Big Blast Comes

Florida State and Tulane battered each other around Tully Gym Saturday night, shot 68 free throws between them and sent Otto Petty to the hospital as the Seminoles won, 94-84.

But, the on-court action was mild in comparison with the verbal blast between the two coaches following the game.

Tulane's Dick Longo leveled the first volley and FSU's Hugh Durham countered immediately.

'I'll never play Hugh Durham again as long as I'm head coach at Tulane, never," said a steaming Longo. "He didn't have to leave his regulars in there at the end and try to run up the score. I know he's trying for national ranking, but that's a disgrace and an unsportsman act. So what if he beats Tulane, what has he

gained?"

His statement excited Durham."He's bush," Durham snapped. "It's not my job to hold the score down. It was my job down there last year and I failed and we got blown out of 19 points. But, I didn't go begging and crying to pull the regulars.

"He wouldn't shake my hand after the game," Durham said. "Hell with him. I played 10 players in the first half, how

many did he play?

"Besides," Durham added, "he told me before the game he wasn't playing Florida State again. He said we had too many black players."

The verbal blast left the game almost lost in the shuf-fle.

But, for the record, the 11th and 14th ranked Seminoles had to fight most of the way before posting their 19th victory in 23

They got a spark down the

stretch from Junior Ron King, who fired the sometimes sagging Seminole offense with 15 of 19 points in one span, and generally played his best game in a number of weeks.

He finished with 24 points, his highest number in 10 games, and pulled off 12 re-bounds as the taller Seminoles dominated the boards.

King was joined by four

teammates in double-figure rebounding - Rowland Garrett. Reggie Royals, Lawrence McCray and Ron Harris with 12 each.

'That might be an all-time high at Florida State," Durham said. "Five players in double-figure rebounding is really pleasing."

It was more than the number to get into twin-digit scoring.

Behind King came Garrett with 22 points and McCray 1 1 - 1 - to - - to to - - 4

King only had six points at halftime while Garrett and McCray carried the Seminoles to a 53-37 edge, but the Louisville junior responded biggest after McCray fouled out and Royals drew his fourth.

"It was very pleasing to see King play the way he did in the second half," Durham said. "And, I liked the way Harris came in there and helped us in

the first half."

The Seminoles played pretty much in spurts. Jumping to a 15-point lead (34-19) before letting Tulane score 11 straight points (seven by Jeff Morris) to trim it to four (34-30) in a 2:05 span.

However, with Garrett, who scored 18 in the first half, and McCray, who had 13 by intermission, the Seminoles jumped

back to the 16-point lead at halftime.

The lead stretched to 18, biggest of the night at 56-38 a couple of minutes into the second half, but Tulane, behind Morris who scored 27 points for the night to set a school record for sophomores, charged back to within seven midway the period.

Then King took charge and Tulane could never get any closer than the final 10 again after King finished his run for a 15-point (85-70) margin.

Petty, the little point guard, was knocked unconscious with 14:30 left in the game and the Seminoles up by 11. He was taken to the hospital later and was to be kept overnight.

"I don't want to say anything about the officials," Durham said. "I haven't criticized them all year. They hustle and I'm sure there was a foul everytime they called one. "But, it's kinda strange when a guy gets knocked out and nothing is called," he added. "I guess they thought he hit his head on the rim."

The Seminoles peeled off 67 rebounds to 38 for Tulane, and it helped offset an otherwise lackluster shooting night.

For the game, FSU hit only 36 of 90 for 40.0 percent, compared to Tulane's 30 of 69, but the 21 more shots were relected in the control of the boards.

The Seminoles had 24 fouls called against them to 22 for Tulane. FSU made 22 of 35 free throws, Tulane 24 of 33.

Morris' 27 points gave him 407 for the season, and the distinction of being the school's only sophomore to score that many in a season.
