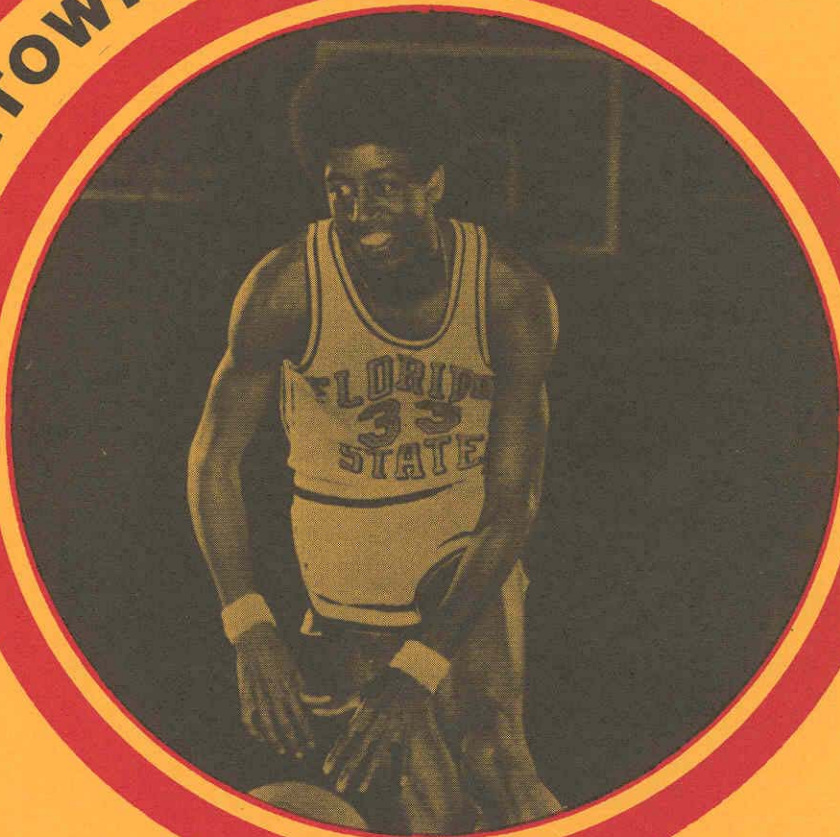

Bolts to 101-70 Win

FSU Finds a 'Twilight Zone'

If Georgetown University's young basketball team was watching closely last night, it may have picked up a few fine points of the game from Florida State.

The Seminoles covered all phases of how to rip a zone defense apart in rolling to a 101-70 victory over the Hoyas in Tully Gym.

Shooting over top, splitting the seams and racing past the Washington D.C. group, the Seminoles bolted to a 16-2 lead in the first four minutes.

The only suspense after that was reserved for the final five minutes or so when it appeared the Seminoles would be unable to score a measly six points to hit the century mark for the second time this season.

After some vocal urging from the 4,000 live spectators, the Seminoles broke a three-minute drought and edged closer until at last Otis Cole scored on a solo journey the length of the court for points 99 and 100 with 37 seconds left. Otis Johnson broke the charmed figure with a free throw as 11 seconds showed.

It was all very incidental, however, as the Seminoles ran their season record to 9-3 with Cincinnati visting on Saturday

afternoon for the national television game.

The game was won in the opening minutes, and that pleased Coach Hugh Durham as much as anything.

"Let's see," he said, pondering the season to date. "We've played 12 games, and, yes, this was the fastest start we've had...that's very pleasing."

There were other things pleasing besides the way the Seminoles opened against the Hoyas, who indeed started four freshmen while their record settled to 4-6.

"We ran well," Durham added, "shot well, played good defense and got on the boards."

All of Durham's points were well taken and backed up in the statistics' sheet as all five Seminole starters scored in double figures for the first time this season.

The Seminoles hit 50.6 percent of all their floor shots, out rebounded the shorter visitors 50 to 30 and turned the ball over only 13 times and only five of those came in the first half.

From an individual standpoint, Reggie Royals was the leader — hitting 12 of 20 floor shots, winding up with 24 points and 12 rebounds.

He also handed out seven assists, and that delighted Durham as much as anything.

"He's a very unselfish player," Durham noted. "He can just do it all. It's very gratifying to see some one who can shoot the way he does still looking around for someone to dump it off to... it just makes the other players so much more effective."

The statistics sheet pointed that out too.

Lawrence McCray wound up scoring 22 points, Benny Clyde 18, Otis Cole 16 and Otto Petty 10.

Petty, who scored all his points from the outside on five of nine attempts to help soften the Hoyas zone, went down late in the game with a reinjury of his bruised heel.

It was beginning to swell after the game and was packed in ice to await further

developments.

"I don't think it's too serious," Durham noted. "It's the kind of an injury that is slow to heal. He's been hurt before. He'll be back.

Petty hit three of his shots in the first eight minutes as the Seminoles opened a 27-9 lead in which time every starter had at least four points.

As time went by, Clyde was the clear offensive spark in the first 20 minutes, scoring 14 of his 18 points by intermission. He had 10 rebounds. McCray was the big factor in the second half, scoring 12 of his 22 points and taking down nine of his game-high 13 rebounds after intermission.

McCray was far superior in his head-to-head play against highly touted freshman Merlin Wilson, who found himself in early foul trouble and wound up scoring only nine points and pulling down four rebounds.

Practically all the visitors' offense came from freshman Jonathan Smith, who scored 21 points, but had to put up 19 shots to get 'em. Vincent Fletcher came off the bench to score 11.

As a team, the visitors hit 30 of 67 floor shots for 44.8 per cent, hitting 16 of 33 in the sec-

ond half to get up to that level and avoid a complete wipeout.

As it was, the Seminoles forged their biggest lead of the night at 36 points (94-58) with 5:28 left.

But that's when things stalled before Dennis Burke snapped the team out of it with a pair of free throws with 2:02

remaining. Johnson hit a pair himself before Cole made it an even 100.

There will come a day when the Seminoles would be able to put those last points to better use, but for the moment the fans thought they were very important.

And, who's to argue.
