## Marshall Defense Frustrates FSU

Playing a quick and disciplined defense that frustrated Florida State for something close to 30 of the 40 minutes. Marshall University was an impressive basketball team as it won 71-59 here last night.

fit terminated a Tully Gym Reggie Royals, the Seminoles' winning streak of the Seminoles that had extended to 14 six minutes but got no points at games. Jacksonville U. was all. the last to beat Florida State in its cozy home arena (84-72).

When Marshall ran off to a 24-12 lead with 9:47 left in the first half, it seemed the Seminoles were through. But as Benny Clyde moved off the bench into the thick of action. it was Marshall that became 15 points out of its two 6-8 suddenly frustrated, and the guys, Randy Noll and Wayne

Seminoles rallied to a 30-29 halftime lead.

Then the Seminoles yielded three easy baskets to the visitors at the start of the second half and led only twice after that.

Not as tall overall as the Seminoles, Marshall got 16 and Smith, as well as 16 from 6-3 Mike D'Antoni.

Lawrence McCray topped the Seminoles with 21 while Otis Johnson managed 13. While scoreless, Royals did s n a r e a game - high 12 rebounds as the Seminoles controlled the boards 51 to 38. Clyde grabbed 10 rebounds including seven in the final eight minutes of the first half and scored seven points. (Greg G r a d y, the Seminoles' 6-9 freshman who has not been playing well of late, saw no action in this one.)

Hot at the start from the floor, then awfully cold, Marshall hit on just 36.8 per cent of its first - half attempts, as compared with 60.7 in the final

20 minutes. The Seminoles, by contrast, sank a weak 34.1 per cent after intermission. Overall Marshall went 47.0 per cent, the Seminoles a poor 37.8.

"We played the way we wanted to play in the second half," said Bob Daniels, first year coach of Marshall, "In the last five or six minutes they played to us. In that second half we played as well as we can.

"Some old Marshall hands may dispute me, but this to me is one of the two better victories Marshall has ever had on the road." He said a recent 106-103 triumph at Oral Roberts was the other.

"When the season started," Daniels continued, "we thought we would be playing three teams — South Carolina, Oral Roberts, Florida State — that would overpower us no matter how well we played." (South Carolina, on its home floor, was the only one of the three to beat the Herd, 88-71).

Florida State jumped in

front on a quick layup from the tip by Dennis Burke, but Marshall quickly tied it, moved ahead 14-8 after four minutes. With 9:47 to go in the half it was 24-12. The Seminoles went six playing minutes without a point.

Then the game turned around, with Marshall going scoreless for almost e i g h t minutes. With the score 24-12, McCray, Larry Gay, Clyde, Johnson, O t t o Petty, then Clyde again accounted for six baskets that tied it 24-24 as the clock showed 2:41 left in the half.

Marshall managed a free throw for a 25-24 lead. McCray tied it 25-25. D'Antoni put the Herd back up 27-25 at 1:08. Then Clyde and McCray hit 2-pointers for a 30-27 FSU lead with 28 seconds showing. Smith hit shortly before the buzzer to cut it to 30-29.

SOON AFTER halftime Smith got a layup, D'Antoni a steal and a layup. After McCray scored, D'Antoni got another easy bucket on a fast break for a 35-32 Marshall lead. McCray a g a i n got the Seminoles to within a point but Marshall kept the pressure on.

It was 46-41 when Otis Cole provided a lift, hitting two shots from outside, then stealing the ball and streaking for a layup to bring the Seminoles to within 48-47. Petty then grabbed a rebound and pounded downcourt for a layup that brought a 49-48 FSU lead.

A layup by Johnson gave the Seminoles their last lead, 51-50, with 9:05 remaining.

Marshall then reeled off five straight points, never let the Seminoles back closer than two. At 57-55, Marshall got seven straight for a 9-point lead, 64-55, with 3:05 to go.

School was out. Marshall fattened its lead on free throws.
