FSU Rips Colonels 107-75

Ignoring a possible conflict of interest, Florida State's basketball team combined the best of two worlds Saturday night and ran away from Eastern Kentucky 107-75 in Tully Gym.

Kicking their offense into its highest gear of the season and playing their usual tight defense when it counted most, the Seminoles rang up their

biggest victory margin of the season in hiking their record to 7-3.

Eastern, a young team with some talent, hung close for only the first 10 minutes while the Seminoles scraped gears before cranking up their offense.

And, once it got going, the Seminoles were at their point-making best of the season.

"We got the outlet pass out a lot quicker than we have been

doing," explained Coach Hugh Durham, "and it got our inside people moving. It makes a world of difference when you have three people on the break instead of two."

The Seminoles scored 10 field goals on chalk-board-designed fastbreaks, but more importantly the Seminoles' total offensive movement was a step or two quicker than usual and Eastern had no answer for it.

As a result seven Seminoles scored in double figures in reeling off a season-high 46 field goals while shooting at a hot 55.4 per cent for the game.

Greg Grady, who led everyone with 11 rebounds, paced the balanced Seminole scoring with 17 points.

Close behind was Wayne Smalls with a season high 16, Larry Warren with 15, Harry Davis with 14, Hank Mann with

11 and Zach Perkins and Carlton Byrd with 10 each.

The only answer Eastern had was the 21-point performance by freshman Mike Oliver and the 17 from Carl Brown, who was held to seven points under his average, mostly by Smalls.

The FSU running game produced 24 teams assist, second highest total of the season, as Byrd handed out six and Smalls five to lead the way.

The Seminoles, after being stunned early on the boards, regrouped as the game went along and won the rebounding battle 47-43.

But, as spectacular as the running game appeared, it was still the hard work of the defense that contributed.

Eastern came into the game averaging almost 82 points per c o n t e s t, and was solidly checked at 65 until Durham went to his bench and played three Seminoles, who had not seen a second of action this season, in the final three minutes. Eastern then scored 10 ragged points.

The 75 points by the Colonels were only five over the Seminoles' defensive average of the season - a rather remarkable figure when the run-and-gun factors enter the picture.

Eastern was guilty of 26 turnovers, forced mostly by the FSU defense. The Seminoles committed 22 turnovers themselves, but most of them came when the reserves were in the game

The final 32-point margin (the Seminoles led by 36 at one point) topped the 30-point victory margin over Marshall here earlier.

But, in the early going there was some doubt that the Seminoles would pull off such an impressive victory.

They were never in the lead during the first 10 minutes of the game when their shooting was horrible and the offensive rebounding was nearly nonexistent.

But, once the Seminoles finally forged into the lead on Smalls' fastbreak basket with 9:07 left in the half, they were off and winging.

From that point, until the intermission break, the Seminoles outscored the Ohio Valley Conference vistors 31-16 and reeled off a 20-5 edge over one five-minute span.

Doing most of the damage to the Colonels during those final nine minutes of the half was the freshman pair of Davis and

Between the two, they scored 19 of the Seminoles' last 27 points of the half.

If that wasn't enough to kayo the vistors, a 20-point run by the Seminoles in the first four minutes of the second half did the job.

The game reached its climax three minutes and 27 seconds before the game officially ended when Bob Chassee scored on a tip-in to send the Seminoles over the century mark for the first time this season.

The Seminoles swing back into action in Tully Tuesday n i g h t against Wisconsin-Milwaukee, which dropped a 100-85 decision to Jacksonville University Saturday night.
