## Seminole Guns Shoot Down Panthers 104-82

Well, nobody's perfect, right? So, it came to pass, Florida State's basketball team was not perfect last night. Close. But

See, the Seminoles kept m is sin g those easy little six-inch shots. Sometimes it was embarrassing. Sometimes it was frustrating.

Most of the time it was down right dismaying to Coach Hugh Durham.

"I'm really disappointed," he said. "We missed enough layurs."

He didn't finish the phrase, but everyone got the drift of his conversation, and, after all, the Seminoles DID win the game, and winners, traditionally, don't dwell on the negative very long.

But, the Seminoles did score 104 points and that was 22 more than Wisconsin-Milwaukee managed in the Tully Gym shootout that wound up: Florida State 104, Wisconsin-Milwaukee 82.

And, Durham was quick to point out that a lot of things, naturally, had to go right.

"I saw a lot of good things happen with our offense," he confessed. "We got the ball out quick again . . . We got the ball to the open man... We had some movement in our offense . . We got a lot of shots . . .

We scored a lot of points . . .
"But, the best thing I saw
was the 8-3."

That's the Seminoles' record now.

It's the same one they'll carry against Biscayne in Tully Gym Saturday night in search of a third straight victory, and maybe even a third straight 100-plus performance.

It's becoming very clear the Seminoles have the capacity, and the inclination, to gun down anyone that'll stand and take it.

The Wisconsin-Milwaukee, Panthers, like the Eastern Kentucky Colonels before them, took it square on the chin.

Oh, the Panthers fooled the Seminoles for awhile with their offense, but Durham straightened that out during halftime, and, in the process, took all the gamemanship out of it.

It was a rout during the second half, and that's really what it was supposed to be — even with a dozen and half or so missed layups by the Seminoles.

Really, it was the missed layups early in the game — six in the first three minutes — that made it a sticky contest

for, oh, about the first 15 minutes or so.

It was part of the reason the Panthers led 9-2 and 13-8 before the Seminoles moved ahead at 14-13 after almost six agonizing minutes. It was why the Panthers trailed by only seven (52-45) at halftime.

After that the Panthers ran out of excuses, and flat into a redesigned Seminole defense.

"We didn't get a chance to scout them" Durham explained. "We couldn't deny their point man from penetrating in the first half and they proved to us they could make the five-foot shot."

Yes, they made 'em to the tune of 58.2 per cent (20 of 34) which translated into the most points the Seminoles had given up in a first half this season.

Despite all the missed layups and other misfires that restricted the shooting to 42.2 per cent (21 of 49), the Seminoles still managed to hit their season-high first half with 52 points.

Still, the Seminoles had to fall back on their defense to shake the Panthers, who managed only 14 points for the first 10 minutes of the second half.

 By then the Seminoles had opened a 21-point lead (80-59) and it was all down hill from there.

"We made a slight change in our defense," Durham explained, "and denied them the pass into the corner and that

kept the ball from going inside so much."

Kessem Grimes and Glen Allen had been the main benefactors in the first half with 15 and 14 points, respectively.

After the change they managed only three and eight, respectively, and finished at 18 and 22, respectively.

By the time the final horn sounded, the Seminoles had, once again demonstrated their balanced scoring with all five starters in double figures.

Larry Warren, popping in 10 of 18 shots, was at his best in a l m o s t a month with a team-high 25 points.

Wayne Smalls, playing right up there in all phases of the g a me, chipped in with 16 points, handed out 10 assists and played solid defense most of the time.

Greg Grady, who had the most trouble with the six-inch shot, nonetheless also hit for 16 points and skinned off 15 rebounds, some of them on his own missed layups.

Eugene Harris hit for 13 points and Zach Perkins for a dozen.

When the smoke cleared, the Seminoles had s h o t a season-high 90 times and m a d e only 41 for 45.6 per cent, almost five under their season average.

You can trace it all back to the missed layups if you're looking for an excuse for scoring only 104 points.
